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Dramatic end to house with a history as Burnside burns

A CAMP house with a colourful history. Burnside House near Goose Green, burned to the ground on Wednesday as a result of what Falklands Landholdings General Manager (FLH) Owen Summers described as a "freak accident."

The house is owned by FLH as part of Goose Green farm, but is rented to Wayne McCormick and his partner Alison Baker.

Mr Summers confirmed that it was believed that while local builder Wayne McCormick was installing new windows in the old house a spark from his angle grinder may have blown up into the eaves of the house igniting the loft space.

Goose Green Manager Keith Alazia confirmed this was likely, adding that the very old insulation in the house was made of thin felt and horse hair - a flammable combination.

Mr McCormick and his colleagues returned to the house to eat lunch but then spotted smoke outside. When he looked in the loft space it was already ablaze, explained Mr Alazia.

A spokesperson for the Falkland Islands Fire and Rescue Service said the fire was reported at 13.39 on Wednesday whereupon one major tender, two fire equipped Land Rovers and ten fire fighters were dispatched.

By the time the team arrived the house was "a total loss" however as a result of quick thinking and fast work by Goose Green Manager Keith Alazia, six farmhands and passers-by including Marty Smith and two paratroopers on a battlefield tour, using the Goose Green fire pump, the outbuildings were saved from igniting. Mr Alazia said, "We were about

Mr Alazia said, "We were about 15-20 minutes to Burnside from Goose Green and the lads did exceptionally well to get water on the fire so incredibly quickly."

Fire was still burning under the tin cladding on the ground when the Fire Service arrived so they were able to dampen down the area to prevent the fire burning into the ground. A group of fire fighters and military police from

MPA also attended the scene, but unfortunately the military fire appliance became bogged when it was driven off the road.

The house, which Mr Summers reported was insured, burned to the ground in less than 90 minutes.

Mr Alazia, Ms Baker and Mr Summers asked that their grateful thanks be passed to all of those people who helped on the day. Acting Chief Inspector Len

Acting Chief Inspector Len McGill confirmed that the fire had been set accidentally by the occupants of the property and that there were no suspicious circumstances.

Burnside House, built in 1928, has an interesting history. At the northern end of Darwin Harbour and therefore a little removed from Darwin Settlement and even further from Goose Green, Burnside was where the Darwin stud rams and ewes were kept, in isolation from the main flocks. Having always a plentiful supply of water from the brook or 'burn' which gave it its name, Burnside was also where the main sheep dip for Darwin farm was located.

With the coming of the singleline telephone system from Stanley. Burnside became an important communication hub, because it was there that the line divided, to go south to Goose Green, Walker Creek and North Arm, or north to San Carlos.

The wife of the shepherd who lived at Burnside House controlled the switches which diverted the calls one way or another and therefore occupied a position of great power.

For many years in the seventies this was Mrs Jessie Phillips and any call to Stanley from points beyond Burnside began with a call to Jessie – three short bursts on the telephone's handle – to ask for her aid. Jessie would then put the switches over to cut off whichever branch line was superfluous and call one or two other subscribers along the Stanley line – maybe at Swan Inlet or Laguna Isla – to "ring together" to get enough electricity fizzing down the line to attract the attention of the Stanley operator.

By 1982 and the invasion of the Falklands by Argentine forces, Burnside House was occupied by Gerald Morrison and his wife Kay, who with Gerald's mother Molly and a family friend Jim Harvey came very close to becoming the first civilian casualties of the war, when the house was attacked by A Company of the 2nd Battalion, the Parachute Regiment (2 Para).

Believing that they had received fire from the house and wishing to ensure that there were no pockets of enemy left behind the line of their advance on Goose Green, the Paras' attack was a ferocious one as Gerald Morrison himself relates in 'The Falklands War Then And Now':

"Then the house was hit, bullet fire first, all over the place – mother had a row of eleven bullet holes just above her head. A grenade came through the window of one bedroom but luckily there was no one in it. It lifted the roof of the bedroom about five inches and all the furniture caught fire. We thought we were caught in cross-fire but then we heard them shouting orders in English and a bit of swearing. "We started shouting that we

"We started shouting that we were civilians. It seemed a lifetime before they heard us but I don't suppose it was long. One fellow answered, but I don't think you would want to write down exactly what he said. He wanted us to surrender. Jim and I went out and they made us stand with our hands against the house. They were full of apologies then – but it was a bit late.

"We counted 130 holes in the house afterwards and then gave up counting."

Fortunately, the only casualty from Burnside House's first baptism of fire was Gerald Morrison's dog which was shot through the jaw and later had to be put down.

DESPITE a vow made during an enjoyable Christmas period on West Falklands, to read absolutely zero overseas media coverage of the Islands' foreign politics, an encounter with a social network site (being the only reliable way to contact my son and order him to feed my cat) drew me into the depressing world of British left wing bloggers de-manding 'what to do about the Falklands?' Not only that but condemning the British Government's support for our population's wish that we

should not negotiate on the sovereignty of our home. While motivation for their choice of stand-point was likely based on little more than a chance opportunity to take a pot shots at a governing political party not of their own choosing, it was no less galling to be so picked-over and patronised by individuals who view the issue so narrowly, that is, not as a matter of people and ethics but as nothing more than an objective legal problem.

But perhaps there is no need to dwell as Deputy Editor John Fowler rather more succinctly expressed my feelings of deep frustration in his most recent piece for the website entitled 'like a duck in a basket' (www.penguinnews.com). What I will add though, is, if there is one fact that I am inclined to convey to those people who so happily poke and prod, and pontificate on our lives from afar, it is that ultimately if anything should change in terms of the sovereignty of the Islands the only people to experience the effect would be the people of the Islands

The Argentine people, despite their hysterical obssession, would in fact see no change whatsoever to their lives, and the people of Britain would certainly see none to theirs. But this simply cannot be said for the people that have for so many generations loved and laboured this not always accommodating land. For Falkland Islanders every part of the life they know would change and distort.

One also wonders (rather whimsically I admit) if those same journalists would so comfortably and abstractly analyse similarly were it suggested their own nation be offered up for sovereignty negotiations with a foreign power.

Unfortunately of course, while the world knows little about us it is an easy thing for its citizens to treat us so objectively. It's all the more important then that we take advantage of what 2012 and the 30th anniversary offers us - attention. Whether we chat to visiting film crews, twitter, blog, network via trade shows or just offer a friendly word to a visiting tourist, it all helps sell us as a society, and worthy of being treated with understanding by all of those beyond these shores who term themselves humanitarian. 2012 is not the year to be shy.

OBE for Richard in **New Year's Hons list**

INCLUDED in the New Year's Day list of those to have honours

bestowed on them by Her Majesty the Queen was former member of the Falkland Islands Council. Legislative Richard Cockwell, who will receive the Order of the British Empire (OBE).

Mr Cockwell has yet to see the citation

which goes with the honour and although in his own words, "absolutely astounded and speechless" when the Governor told him about it a month ago, he cannot be absolutely sure of the precise reason for which it has been awarded.

Perhaps the most likely reason for Mr Cockwell's OBE is recognition of his long and distinguished service with the Commonwealth Parliamentary sociation (CPA). From being the Falkland Islands representative at a CPA conference in New Zealand in 1999, Mr Cockwell was elected to the organisation's Executive Committee in 2001, a position which he held for three years. For two of these years, which he says were spent "building up contacts and pushing the Falklands cause," Mr Cockwell was the Chair of the

CPA's Planning Committee and at its conference in Canada was elected Vice-Chair by

the unanimous vote of 700 delegates.

Being a member of the CPA Committee brought with it the need for much long-haul flying. This probably took a certain toll on Mr Cockwell's health as he was diagnosed with Richard Cockwell deep vein thrombosis

three times during this period.

Should a more local reason for Mr Cockwell's honour be required, it could well be because as Chairman of the Fisheries Advisory Committee from 1997 to 2009, he presided over significant changes such as the extension of the licence period and the introduction of the Individual Transferable Quota (ITQ) system for parts of the Falkland Islands fisherv

Whatever the citation may read - and some have even suggested Mr Cockwell's leadership during the occupation of Fox Bay by Argentine forces during 1982 it will all become clear to him at some as yet unfixed date next year, when he goes to Buckingham Palace to receive the honour from Her Majesty.

Twelve month medical budget all gone in six

STANDING Finance Committee will shortly receive a request from the Medical Services Department for further funding in the region of £750,000, the Health and Medical Services Committee was told on Thursday

Hospital Manager Michael Poole, standing in for FIG's Director of Health and Education, David Jenkins, told the committee that the Department's budget for the current financial year had

been spent in the first six months. This, he said, was largely due to the costs of overseas medical treatment being much greater than had been anticipated.

While the number of patients requiring treatment overseas had seen an increase of only two over the same period in the previous year, there had been four occasions on which it had been necessary to use an air ambulance service, which had escalated costs.

Two reasons for drug rationing says Director

DIRECTOR of Health and Education David Jenkins has said reasons behind recent rationing of pharmaceutical lines at the dispensary were twofold, the first being ongoing difficulties in sourcing certain drugs from the manufacturer and wholesalers due to shortages within the UK. At the Health and Medical Services Committee yesterday he said this was being worked on but was likely to be a concern for the immediate future until new wholesaler contacts could be explored. The other problem comprised "Supply-chain difficulties and delays, due to a mixture of the Christmas pressure on airfreight especially and also due to waiting for a large sea-freight delivery to arrive." He said this problem should lessen with the Christmas period being over and due to the arrival just before Christmas of a large seafreight order.

Vessel barred

A PRESS report yesterday that a Galician loligo fishing vessel fly-ing the Falkland Islands flag had been prevented from entering the Uruguayan port of Punta del Este has been described as inaccurate by Falkland Islands Fishing Association Chair Cheryl Roberts. Mrs Roberts told Penguin News on Thursday that the company in Spain had contacted the authorities in Uruguay in advance. of the ship sailing in order to request permission, and it had been denied. The decision made in December by the Uruguayan government to ban Falklands flagged vessels from their ports came in support of Argentina's claim to the Falklands. Almost twenty Galician South Atlantic vessels are registered under the Falklands flag.

Fatal journey

AN Argentine veteran of the Falklands War drowned while attempting to kayak to the Falkland Islands. Alejandro Daniel Carranza, 49, fell into the water about 200 meters from Staten Island in the southern tip of Argentina, and his body was rescued by Argentine navy personnel on December 28. His cruise mate, Juan Pablo Dacyszyn 36, was evacuated on the coast of Punta Barrasa, southwest corner of Staten Island, by ARA Gurruchaga Francisco.

Scottish venue for plant art

PLANT artwork with an additional dash of Penguin News, originally created for an exhibition in Stanley in 2010 has been exhibited in Dunbar Scotland.

The artists, Brian Bond, Richard Lewis, Jane Waterhouse and Joanna Waterhouse live in the UK but Richard and Brian may be familiar to some Islanders as they have been regular visitors to the Falklands over the last three years.

Richard is a botanist working with the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew and Falklands Conservation on invasive plant issues and has spent several months in the Islands, whilst Brian has sometimes accompanied Richard as a volunteer and field assistant.

The artwork is based on the formal scientific layout of pressed plant specimens used as a reference by scientists and kept in herbaria at academic institutions such as universities and botanic gardens.

The main technique used is called the cyanotype process which creates a dark blue photographic negative of pressed herbarium specimens.

Instead of the image being presented with the scientific information that would be expected on a herbarium specimen, this is replaced with an excerpt from Penguin News.

The excerpts are factual and perhaps unremarkable, but pertain to issues which have a strong influence on the economy and culture of the Islands. These issues

include oil exploitation, sheep farming, climate change, tourism and military activity, which in one way or another all present threats to the native flora of the Islands. Folded capsules, which usually contain additional plant material, instead contain further newspaper cuttings and these are attached to each cyanotype.

The cyanotypes are presented as specimens in a herbarium, arranged in folders according to the species' taxonomy.

One of the cyanotypes was originally displayed at the Jetty Centre in 2010 as part of an exhibition organised by Falklands Conservation. The complete set of five were displayed in August 2011 at John Muir's birthplace

in Dunbar at an Exhibition called 'One touch of nature: makes all kin'.

John Muir was born in Scotland but emigrated to the USA; he was a naturalist, author, and early advocate of preservation of wilderness. The curator Susie Goodwin thought the work, "made a valuable contribution to the growing eco-dialogue."

Five native Falkland plant species were used to create the images: Antarctic Buttercup (Ranunculus biternatus), Scurvygrass (Oxalis enneaphylla), Falkland Strawberry (Rubus geoides). Shield-fern (Polystichum mohrioides) and the endemic Silvery Buttercup (Hamadryas argentea), which is unique to the Falklands.

Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

ANOTHER year has flashed by, and it was a pretty eventful one, as alluded to in my last column. With all the doom, gloom and monetary woe emanating from the Northern hemisphere it is quite difficult to maintain a balanced perspective on our prospects. Even my optimism is not so blind as to believe that reality will overcome years of indoctrination and false information so quickly. I am, however, willing to lay several bets that the average man on the street in Rosario, Cordoba and Mendoza. has more important things on his mind than his poor leader's ambition to make the Falklands a colony of Argentina.

Last time we were asked what our New Year resolutions were, I said that I do not make any. If I did it would be to resist pressure to join social media on the internet. I've yet to be convinced that the mass of often unsubstantiated and trivial undigested information has real value.

The Deputy Editor will be pleased to learn that he is not to be deprived of debate on the Jury amendment Bill as the Select Committee will be held in public in February. The select committee process also gives an opportunity for amendments to be proposed and properly drafted rather than being done 'on the hoof'. Of course the decision whether any proposed amendments will be accepted rests with the Legislative Assembly when it reconvenes.

I wish everyone a happy and rewarding New Year and to my colleagues on the Assembly, no more resignations please!

Farmers and fire fighters battle George Island flames

SINCE New Year's Eve an island farmer, his family and fire fighters have been battling 10,000 square metres of burning peaty ground on George Island which is situated on the south eastern side of East Falklands.

Christopher and Lyndsey May, who own the George, Barren and Speedwell Island group were first informed of the fire while they were enjoying the Christmas festivities in Stanley on December 30. Chris told Penguin News this week that Falkland Islands Government Air Service pilot Troyd Bowles "alerted us to the fire and then flew us all over there "

Troyd had been flying over North Arm when he spotted the smoke.

Chris said: "Over the last few days we've just been trying to contain it as it's currently impossible to actually put it out. The ground is so hot the water just sits on the top of the ground and boils; we have to push the water into the ground. Now it seems surrounded and under control all we can do is chip away at putting it out."

It is likely, said Chris, that the fire was started by a lightning storm on December 23.

On Tuesday Lyndsey blogged: "Yesterday was a successful day fire fighting. The men got a good sized fringe out right the way up the side of the fire nearest to the house. Although the fire is unable to reach the house I can walk out to the nearest point of it in 10 minutes. Yesterday I walked up and down the area that is extinguished looking for hot spots and digging them out. I guess I dug out about 20 small areas that would have broken out again."

The two initial fire fight-

ers Derek MacDonald and Jock

Sutherland left the island on Mon-

day.

Lyndsey said: "They have been fantastic, working from 6.30am to 8pm each day. They have been replaced with two full time fire fighters, Jed and Geoffrey.

'This afternoon Christopher, Shaun and Tanya are away in Theo to get more petrol for the pumps from Speedwell. Jed and Geoffrey have continued fire fighting by themselves... The area they are working in now is very deep and rather then just a fringe the whole area needs to be put out otherwise it will just reignite. as it burrows in through the peat. It is a great shame because there is no doubt that most of the areas that have been burnt out will now blow away. In some areas it was only approximately six inches down to the rock and it has burnt right down to it. In the autumn we will try rolling and re-seeding the area but we are not hopeful that we will get any vegetation back. Some of the fringe has been put out with salt water so that will not help the cause. It is a case of sacrifice some to save the rest."

Chris told Penguin News most of the fire is contained south east of the house (it had progressed West into the wind) and narrowly missed his tussac plantation by about 20 metres. The whole group, which includes the couple's son Shaun and his fiance Tanya Ford, have also been involved in the rescue of a small number of Magallanic penguins (the species burrow nests into the peat). Most were out of reach from rescue however, and it is believed many will have died in the fire.

Lyndsey blogged this week, "Christopher rescued another three penguins today: two of them had singed feathers but they seemed okay.... Shaun and Christopher rescued a baby Jackass (Magellanie). The mother had left the hole but the baby was still in it. They took him out washed out the hole, put the fire out all around it and popped him back in. He turned out to be a friendly little ehap and came back out and stood next to Christopher's leg. I have seen three dead Jackass so far."

Chris was confident that the loss of vegetation would not mean he would have to reduce sheep numbers on the island (currently 1500 plus lambs) "the fire didn't set in where the sheep are mainly kept."

The group are using around 800 metres of pipe provided by the Fire and Rescue Service and are pumping water from a pond as well as the sea.

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE: VACANCY

An opportunity has arisen for a member of the community to become involved in helping to ensure that FIG is delivering value-for-money to the residents of the Falkland Islands. Expressions of interest are sought from members of the public wishing to become a member of the Public Accounts Committee (PAC).

Under the Falkland Islands Constitution, the PAC comprises:

(a) a chairman and two other members appointed by the Governor; and (b) two members of the Legislative Assembly.

The PAC currently has a vacancy for a chairman under (a) above. The role involves six (or so) meetings per year, each lasting two hours, with an estimated time commitment of four hours per month for background reading and preparation. The role is unpaid but expenses are reimbursed. The appointment period will be until 31 January 2014 (in order to tie in with the appointment periods of the other, existing members).

The PAC has an important scrutiny role over the public accounts of all government departments and specified bodies. The PAC's task is to ensure that public funds have been expended properly, for the purposes for which they were voted by the Legislative Assembly. Hence the role is varied, complex and fascinating. Individuals appointed to the PAC make a significant contribution to the community, in helping to maintain high standards of public administration and good governance in the Falkland Islands. This calls for PAC members themselves to have the highest standards of personal integrity, discretion and commitment to the good governance of the Islands.

Applications should be submitted to the Governor by Monday 23 January, setting out the reasons for the applicant's interest in appointment to the PAC and the skills and experience that the applicant would bring to the job.



WELL, happy New Year and all that, I trust everyone is getting back to some normality after the seasonal over indulgence.

What an eventful Christmas day we had! Our half breed Khakī Campbell ducklings hatched in the incubator. Being Christmas babies, all nine of them got appropriately festive names, sounding more like reindeer and carols than ducklings.

This is the first hatch off our new Campbell stock and our tried and trusted old mongrel ducks. Khaki Campbell's are reputed to lay 300 plus eggs a year! We thought our ducks were pretty good laying about 130 in a season, so it will be interesting to see if the new blood ups production in the crosses.

Campbell eggs are a bit smaller than our current duck eggs, so we might be able to fit them into egg boxes.

We increased from nine ducklings to 14 a few days later when our neighbour Ben and family, rescued some ferals from the tip.

Every year a feral duck, which lives with three drakes, hatches some ducklings, and every year they become an easy feed for rats and cats, but we beat them to it this year.

Hen egg production has dropped a little as it usually does at the very height of summer.

Everyone knows that hens need a certain amount of daylight to lay, varying with the breed, but most people don't realise that they also need a certain amount of night time, otherwise how do they know it's a new day and time to lay another egg? That's why egg production is higher in spring and autumn.

With the warmer days, it is good practice to provide at least two water sources for your birds. They drink a lot more when hot to keep cool, and it also ensures they have water in case one drinker blows over, or springs a leak.

If you have chicks, don't use a container they can get into but not out. Drownings of chicks and ducklings are commonplace. Garden thinnings and weeds will be appreciated by your hens, especially if they don't have access to fresh grass.

Remember, greens, not corn, make nice yellow yolks!

BACTEC team bounce back ready to start work

With many of the team having recently been deployed in mine clearance in Iraq, it is maybe no surprise that Guy Lucas says they are "glad to be back in the Falklands

The team is currently engaged on pre-deployment training and expects to begin operation on January 9.

Already on the Islands is the team's heavy equipment, including a nine-wheel Argocat and an Armtrac vehicle fitted with flails.

Guy Lucas warned Penguin News that, as a safety measure, it will sometimes be necessary to impose some traffic restrictions when demolition of explosive

No problems for Protector

DESPITE the recent banning of Falkland Islands flagged vessels from the port of Montevideo, the newly commissioned Royal Navy lee patrol vessel HMS Protector left there bound for the Falklands on Wednesday after a trouble-free stay in the Uruguayan port.

Juan Jose Dominguez, Vice President of the Uruguayan Ports Authority, ANP was quoted in the Montevideo morning daily El Observador as saying, "HMS Protector was authorized to dock in Montevideo because it does not contradict the Uruguayan government policy towards the Malvinas issue.

The paper had revealed the ship's arrival on December 30 and published a front page picture of the vessel with a Royal Marine, ordnance is being carried out.

Control of traffic on these occasions will take place on the section of the Stanley to MPA road, between the Mullet Creek track that runs past the old pump house and the water tanks.

Shearers and wool handlers bound for NZ Championships

LEE Molkenbuhr, Evan Jones, Sammy Hirtle and Vikki Lee will be the team departing the Falklands on February 11 bound for Masterton, New Zealand to take part in the World Shearing and Wool Handling Championships.

All team members fought off tough competition to gain a place in the team at the Falklands Championships held at the FIDF Hall on December 29, explained one of the organisers of the excellent event, Martha Molkenbuhr. She said: "Huge congratulations to the team members: I know you will do the Falklands proud and well done to everyone else who took part. There was a really high standard throughout the competition."

The competition began with the junior heats and four individuals competing. Alan Frame (42.9) took first place with Louise Pole-Evans (54.9) in second, Tom Lewis (56) third and Tara Wilson (62) fourth. Prizes were donated by Neil McKay Ltd, Southern Imports and Molkenbuhr Shearing.

Six people took part in the intermediate heats (prizes donated by Leicester Creek Farm, Southern Imports, Pitaluga family, Sammy Hirtle and Estancia Farm). The best five sheep were shorn by Jon Roberts in 40.96 seconds. Lucas Berntsen was second with 43.97, Daniel Ford third with 44.51 and Shaun May fourth with 48.96 seconds.

The farm shear followed attracting eight entrants. Lee Molkenbuhr took first (26.85) Jan Clarke second (27.2) Chris May third (34.25) and Richard Short fourth with 37.05.

The team shear followed and "was more of a fun event" said Martha. Each team had a captain (an open shearer) an intermediate member, and a junior plus one more. This event was sponsored by Molkenbuhr Shearing, "and surprise, the prize was a shearers best friend – apart from a handpiece – beer."

Jan, Lucas, Daniel and Shaun came first (37.79), Evan Jones, John McKay, Alan and Ewan Bonner were second (37.95) Molks, Richard, John Roberts and Duane Evans took third (40.82) and Joe Clarke, Scott Short, Robert Ferguson and Tom Lewis were fourth with 49.69

The Open Shearing Competition pulled in the biggest entry with nine competing for the EBF Ltd prize of a flight to New Zealand.

After three heats of shearing six sheep each the fastest and cleanest four shearers went forward to the final. Martha reported, "The excitement and tension could be felt all around the room and it was really buzzing when John McKay, Evan Jones, Jan Clarke and Lee Molks took to the stands again and oiled up their hand pieces. The shouts and cheers of support for all four almost raised the roof."

Lee Molkenbuhr was the popular victor (35.4) shearing ten sheep in 8.58 minutes. Evan Jones was just behind (37.8) shearing the ten in 9.14 while Jan Clark (38.6) completed in 9.40. John McKay took fourth place (43.6) taking 10.52 to shear the ten sheep.

Ben Berntsen presented the prizes and a barbecue (chefs Rodney and Harold) was followed by a dance (music by Mel and Val Lloyd).

Martha said, "Many thanks to Tex and Mandy, the RBA, Seafish Chandlery, Gibraltar Station and Michelle Evans for the donations of meat."

Wool handling

Only the second wool handling competition in Falklands history attracted an excellent eight (all girl) entries.

Each wool handler had two shearers to look after and all worked against the clock to keep the shearing board clean, throw a perfect fleece, skirt the fleece, sort out oddments and end up with a clean work area when the hand was raised to show the time keeper the wool handler was finished.

Sammy Hirtle was victorious in 24.85, Vikki Lee second in 25.4, Carla Rogers third in 34.45 and Charmaine Butler fourth in 40.05. (Prizes were sponsored by Gibraltar Station, Sammy Hirtle, Martha Molkenbuhr, Patrick Watts and Ailsa and Tony Heathman.)

Martha included an extensive list of thanks to the many people who helped organise, build, cook, judge, donate, man the bar and entertain but unfortunately it was a little too long to include. She added, however, "it took a lot of people to make it work - a big well done and thank you very much to everyone who helped and those who came to support the shearing industry."



TWO of the most common New Years resolutions are to lose weight and save money, perhaps proving we're not only running as a result of Nike offering to flog us the latest glow in the dark trainers that syne up to our ipods.

Running is the cheapest and most effective way to shed weight, provided you don't buy the syncing trainers.

Running types have been writing books on 'one foot before the other' for

years, but it's not a club that requires a person (to look good in spandex and a head band to join. You need an old shirt, shorts, some trainers and an aim of where to run and a strong will to run home again.

Those more self conscious of jogging about in a town where your intentions to get fit will be known by everyone, keep your goal in sight and the ends will justify the means if you stick at it. Finding people to run with of similar ability is a great way to keep motivated and for the rest there's always night time running (reflector strips and mobile recommended).

Nothing will match the unexpected rush of endorphins that will accompany the first run you finish with no gasping and panting afterwards.

If you don't have trainers already, try get fitted for a pair at a sports shop abroad.

Alternatively take note of your pronation and arch requirements and look online for tips on what shoes best suit your needs, and expensive doesn't always mean best.

Double knot your laces and tuck them in your shoes if comfortable; tripping is unsafe and embarrassing.

Some runners find success giving up shoes completely, but alternatively working shorter runs on grass into your training will build up your foot strength.

Interval or sprinting training helps push fitness levels up. Run like you stole something for 30 seconds followed by a longer s I o w pace or walking recovery a few times will get your Juda hat? heart pumping harder.

Listen to your body telling you that it needs a day of rest. It is better to go into a race under trained than overtrained. Glucosamine with condrotin is also advised for those with bad joints.

The weekend long run should be slow and, for some, you've already done your speed work during the week. The purpose of the long run is to condition the legs to run long, and racing it is essentially counterproductive.

Don't think too far ahead, run your own race at your own pace until you reach the end. Relaxation helps an efficient run.

Calculating pace needed to meet goals is important to some but a run is not math. Your worst run is always 100 percent better than the person who never tries. You're more likely to regret not going on a run than going for a run.



Is Argentine decision on LAN political pressure?

IN a move that some are interpreting as a step by Argentina towards further blockading the Falkland Islands, yesterday Argentine national aeronautical authorities forced LAN Airlines to reschedule flights leaving from the Buenos Aires City Aeroparque Metropolitan airport bound for Sao Paulo and Santiago de Chile.

The decision strips LAN Argentina of the rights granted to the company in March, 2010, allowing its regional flights to take off from the Aeroparque airport, like national airline such as Aerolineas and Austral companies do, reported Mercopress yesterday

LAN operating from Punta Arenas in Chile flies the only air link between South America and the Falkland Islands

Also on Tuesday Foreign Secretary William Hague in an update report to Parliament warned the UK would resist any attempts to blockade the Falkland Islands

Mr Hague said, "Our Ambassadors in the region were instructed to call on their host governments to express our strong objection to the Mercosur statement and to assess the practical implications for vessels operating between the Falklands and South America.

We made clear that the decision to close ports to ships flying the Falklands flag has no legal basis, and that it would be unacceptable and unbecoming for any Latin American democracy to collaborate in Argentina's attempts to economically blockade the Falkland Islands.

Cheap flights for war vets

BRITISH Falklands War veterans have been awarded concessionary flights to the Islands during 2012 courtesy of the Ministry of Defence SAMA (82) Falklands Chair Gary Clement told Penguin News yesterday.

A delighted Mr Clement said veterans will only have to pay £275 return and may bring two other family members with them.

FIMCo upgrade kicks off cost-saving season



THE Falkland Islands Meat Company (FIMCo) may export up to 30,000 lambs in the coming season compared to 26,000 last year in an abattoir successfully upgraded by local companies.

Manager John Ferguson said major works undertaken by Stewart Construction and Energise will contribute to cost-savings for the company.

Last season the export sales of meat and skins allowed the company to make a small profit for the first time, and as a result "no subsidy has been requested for this financial year," said Mr Ferguson. Speaking of the works, Mr

Ferguson said, "These are the remaining works of the planned upgrade and we combined them to get it all completed, so we would have the operational cost-savings, efficiencies and of course ability to process skins and red offals properly for export.

It was a major piece of work, again involving Ian Stewart Construction and Energise FI plus Approved Design Ltd from UK for the new slaughter line and Reid Steel for the buildings."

The work comprises two additional carcase chillers (extra capacity for 650+ sheep/lamb carcases) covered livestock yards extension, to hold approx 1,000-1,200 sheep/lamb and 20+ cattle in total and an upgrade sheep slaughter line from manual to a more modern 'moving' line to improve efficiencies and increase productivity.

Additional covered space for

Export cutting and packing room at the Falkland Islands Meat Company

holding palletised sheepskins and another to protect refrigeration plant has also been created plus an improved livestock unloading and turning area, along with upgrade drainage from plant to beach.

He said, "At present, we are several weeks behind overall project completion, but with many aspects done and operational. costs are expected to remain within budget.

"The completion of the upgrade will put Sand Bay into the type of plant and facilities that should have been built initially for exporting the full range of products required to make the meat industry viable from the Falkland Islands

"Much appreciation is to be given to FIG and the FIMCo Board for their support during the past few years to achieve this. It also proves that local construction companies can successfully deliver these types of works

Mr Ferguson said Falklands lamb can be sold successfully because it is "lean, with excellent eating qualities," although currently "there is a lack of confidence in what the market prices will be in say 3-6 months when the product reaches the end user." As a result some prices are below last years levels.

The sixteen week export season began this week and an impressive 58 strong team will deal with both the export and local market. Lamb will be sold to UK, Germany, Denmark, France, Sweden, Spain, Egypt and Hong Kong.

Manager of the abattoir John Ferguson told Penguin News that around 42 farms plan to provide the lambs while 60 farms are likely to provide both sheep and lambs.

Fires burning north and south

TWO Brazilian tourists camping without permission on farmland in the north camp caused a ground fire yesterday, probably as a result of their camp fire embers being blown into the grass.

FIGAS pilot, Andrew Alazia, spotted the fire burning into a peat bank on Thursday morning west of a rocky outerop known locally as 'Pee Rock' and circled the campsite whereupon the tourists appeared from their tents. The fire was burning in wether sheep ground owned by Neil and Glenda Watson of Long Island Farm. The

fire appeared to be out by midday, as a result of work by the tourists, Daniella Whitney, Leon Mitchell and the Watson's son Paul who attended the site after the family were alerted by FIGAS.

Another fire on George Island, as reported on in last week's Penguin News, is "probably about 90 per cent out around the edges with patches burning in the centre," ` island owner Christopher May reported mid-week.

The family continues to fight the fire with water and by digging out hot spots.

IJS pressure from increased numbers

US HEADTEACHER Tom Hill informed Thursday's meeting of the Education Board that due to savings related to the high level of staff retention at the school over the last few years, a number of proposals brought before the Board for approval would not require additional funds.

After some debate about the project's siting and likely longevity, the Board approved a request for £39,780 from the 2012/13 Capital Budget to provide additional classroom space using portakabins already owned by the PWD to be situated in the grounds of Stanley House, providing it was understood that this was a temporary measure.

A large rise in numbers for preschool places in 2012 has been known about for some time, but no action has been taken to accommodate it, the Education Board was told.

The Board was told that the proposed provision of three Portakabins on the site of the old Stanley House tennis court would free space within the IJS&CE building for an overarching primary secondary Special Education Needs unit, removing the need for additional staffing and accommodation at FICS and saving considerable expense.

Long term solutions involving a "new build" project are in the early stages of planning and should increase capacity permanently to meet on-going needs by the end of the decade, but in order to ensure provision for all children is available by September 2012 this proposal required very rapid consideration and action the Board were told.

Predicted numbers in Foundation Stage 1 (Pre School) for 2012/13 are currently 43. This substantial increase necessitates a corresponding rise in staff numbers to maintain the correct child to adult ratio. FS1 students attend school for half day sessions and the recommended ratio at this level is one adult to eight students. The current staffing is one teacher and one LSA working with a maximum of 16 children per half day session.

Based on birth rates, the figures show large cohorts in 2013 and 2014 necessitating the maintenance of higher staff numbers for at least this period.

At the meeting on Thursday, the Education Board was also informed that ever-increasing numbers at the IJS and a rise in the quantity of paperwork required have increased the need for clerical support, which was reduced by one person when the school absorbed Camp Education four years ago.

Members approved a proposal to increase the hours of the present clerk from part-time to fulltime, leading to a budgetary increase of £6,070 in a full year.

New approach suggested for old ordinance review

THE Education Department is proposing to employ someone on a temporary basis to bring the Education Ordinance 1989 up-todate and make it "fit for purpose."

As its title implies, the Ordinance was written over twenty years ago and takes no account of initiatives taken since such as the provision made for children with special needs or for students studying after the age of 16. For this reason, the recent meeting of the Education Board was told that the Ordinance may now be regarded as, "an obstacle to effective governance in terms of efficiency and in terms of public confidence."

The fear was also expressed in the paper by the Acting Director of Education which came before the Board that the failure of the Ordinance to take into account more recent decisions of Excutive Council could leave FIG open to litigation.

Mr Richard Fogerty, told the Board that the need for a review of the Ordinance had been recognised for some years, but, "operational and administrative pressures" had made significant progress impossible.

The proposal which the Board approved on Thursday was that the review should be offered on a contract basis against terms of reference compiled by the Education Department.

Described by Mr Fogerty as, "a bit of a stab in the dark" it is anticipated that if the proposal gains further acceptance, the work would take six months and involve considerable liaison between the Education Department and the Attorney General's Chambers, as well as consultation with the general public.

"To provide a realistic figure," according to the board paper, remuneration will be based on the civil service's C grade for 6 months.

The paper concluded that this was a project which could not be achieved in the foresecable future within existing resources. Offering it on a contract basis avoided the need for recruitment procedures and costs under the Management Code.

Falklands FCO staff numbers appropriate

LABOUR MP Derek Twigg enquired of the the Secretary of State for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs this week what assessment he had made of the level of staff resource allocated to the team within his department with responsibility for the Falkland Islands. Foreign and Commonwealth Minister of State Jeremy Browne replied. "Overall responsibility for Falkland Islands policy in the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FČO) sits with the Overseas Territories Directorate, working in close cooperation with others in London as well as with staff in Stanley and Buenos Aires and elsewhere in Latin America. Our current staff resource is appropriate, but as with the rest of FCO staffing levels is periodically reviewed so we have the flexibility to respond to operational demand.

82 veteran dies

A FALKLANDS veteran from Redditch, Nigel Beard, who was invited to Buckinghham Palace to acknowledge his part in the war on the 25th anniversary, has died. During the Falklands war he was deployed from Ascension Island to South Georgia where he gathered intelligence for the British task force. He was also covertly deployed to the Falkland Islands to monitor Argentine troop movements. A friend of Mr Beard said that he bore the suffering he went through as a result of his military service with "humanity, dignity and pride."

College visitor

PETER Brown, Vice-Principal of Chichester College, where many Falkland Islands students study, will be visiting the Falklands early this year and not, as previously advertised, International Coordinator, Ms Kate Stenning. Mr Brown will be meeting with prospective students and their parents as well as with members of the Education Department.

Uruguay visit

A GROUP of Uruguayan agribusiness representatives and farmers will visit the Falklands later in the summer. Director of Natural Resources John Barton said said this week: "There are a range of interests represented including wool, meat and agricultural supplies."

Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

MEETINGS start in earnest this week as people return from Christmas holidays. We have our regular weekly meetings with the Governor and Chief Executive. During the latter meeting we will also be discussing the outcome of the recent survey on year round summer time with the head of Policy and also be briefed by another member of that department on a recent visit to Gibraltar. I will attend regular portfolio meetings on education, minerals and health and chair the Education Board meeting on Thursday at which, among other things, we will review budget proposals. Work is underway to address the anticipated increase in the school roll with another exceptionally large group reaching pre-school age in the next academic year.

We will visit the Museum on Thursday for a briefing for new members and an update on the move to the dockyard site which was agreed in principle last year. Some of us will be spending time with the first of the many journalists we expect to see in the Islands over the next few months. While this is partly driven by interest in the thirtieth anniversary of the war, we are also encouraging visits by reputable Latin American journalists who can report the reality of our country as opposed to the propaganda churned out by Argentina.

Good to hear the firm statements by David Cameron on the Andrew Marr programme last weekend. He is probably very well informed, as Brize Norton is in his constituency and he was a regular and interested visitor to the Falklands stand at the Conservative party conferences prior to his election to the party leadership. It is well worth the time and effort we put in at the conferences, who knows who the next rising star in any party may be and what position they may hold in years to come?

During the first half of the term of this Assembly we have watched with interest the oil exploration activities of the various companies whose directors have had the courage to invest in a relatively high risk area. Long may their good news stories continue.

Criticism in court over "ridiculous" delays in charging

QUESTIONS were asked by the Senior Magistrate in court on Wednesday as to why it had taken so long to bring two relatively minor cases to court.

Stanley men. Campbell Kirkham and Neil Clifton both pleaded not guilty to charges of disorderly behaviour. These offences were allegedly committed against a customs officer and two other members of the public on October 28. Mr Clifton faced an additional charge of showing hostility towards one of the members of the public "based on his presumed membership of a particular racial group" to which he also pleaded, "not guilty."

Ruling that the cases which relate to the same incident should be brought to court again on January 18 when it was hoped a trial date could be fixed. Mr Gumsley said that on that date he would expect some reason for the "ridiculous" delay in laying charges to be offered to the court.

January 18 was also set by the Senior Magistrate for mention of another case which appeared before him on Wednesday morning. Mr Graeme Hemming of Stanley pleaded not guilty to a charge of drink driving. Prosecutor Ms Alison Inglis said that Mr Hemming was breath-tested for alcohol at his home on December 3 and later at the police station. It was alleged that these tests had given a lower reading of 134mg of alcohol to 100ml of breath. (This is over three times the legal limit)

The police had gone to Mr Hemming's home after receiving a call from a member of the public alleging that Mr Hemming smelled of alcohol and was driving.

Acting for Mr Hemming Mr David Lang QC indicated that he would be disputing some aspects of the allegations made against his client when the case came to trial.

Poor maths no excuse for speeder

ERROR in converting kilometres per hour to miles per hour was offered in court on Wednesday by Frenchman Terry Talichet as an excuse for driving a Mitsubishi Pajero at 52 mph on Stanley's Airport Road at six minutes past ten on the morning of Friday October 26.

While this excuse was noted by Senior Magistrate Mr Carl Gumsley, he found more relevant Mr Talichet's early guilty plea and the fact that he had no discernible previous convictions. Mr Talichet was fined £100 and ordered to pay a further £85 prosecution costs.

Warning as MPA drink driver just escapes jail

A GOOD night out in Stanley nearly ended in a custodial sentence for Maverick Bowers of MPA.

In the Stanley Magistrates Court on Wednesday, Senior Magistrate Mr Carl Gumsley gave a warning that the sentencing guidelines with regard to drink driving were currently being reviewed "with rigour" and with an alcohol to breath reading such as that of Mr Bowers, who tested at 117mg to 100ml of breath, most people would in future "go straight to jail."

Mr Bowers was first observed by a foot police patrol at 11.30pm on November 26, walking down Philomel Street in an unsteady manner. In the Visitor Centre car park he entered a Land Rover, seating himself in the driver's seat.

The police observed the driver's window to open and then the engine to start up. When breath tested some eight minutes later by officers in a marked police car, who were summoned to the scene, the engine was still running, though the vehicle had not moved.

In a court appearance on the same charge before Christmas, Mr Bowers had pleaded not guilty, claiming that his purpose in entering the Land Rover was simply to light a cigarette. He claimed he had no intention of driving and was expecting to stay the night with friends in Stanley.

In his summing up, the Senior Magistrate said that although he and his colleagues on the bench, JPs Andrew Brownlee and Judy Summers had "struggled" to know what sentence would be appropriate, they had finally accepted Mr Lang's plea in mitigation that it would be unfair to send his client to prison.

Mr Bowers was saved from prison, because he had changed his plea to guilty immediately after receiving good legal advice from Mr David Lang and because he had no previous convictions and appeared to be a normally hard-working young man.

Low percentage?

AGRICULTURAL Advisory Committee members expressed concern on Wednesday that National Stud Flock lambing percentages were lower than desired in such a "carefully managed" environment

Director of Natural Resources John Barton confirmed 571 lambs had been born with lamb marking at 61 per cent. The results will be discussed at the Saladero Advisory meeting.

He also reported the good news that average NSF hogget micron was 18.7 compared to 19.1 last season. (A micron is the measurement used to express the diameter of a wool fibre. The lower microns are the finer fibres.)

Ram hoggets weighed 41 kg on average at Christmas hav-ing gained 10 kgs over 11 weeks and may reach 50 kg at sale time. They had an average clean fleece weight of 2.86 kg.

In terms of the National Beef Herd (NBF) calf production. "has been good with calving at 92 per cent from 24 cows. Overall there are 20 bull calves and 15 heifers. The results for the Al programme, undertaken by Donna Minnell, were successful and the next round of AI has started," said Mr Barton. All bulls for lease from the NBF have been allocated and are being collected from farmers.

Ten hectares of oats "are growing well although brassicas have not been successful.

Stats style stays

IT will be recommended to Executive Council that the collection of farming statistics will be kept as they are under an amended Livestock Ordinance, however the Ordinance, "would need to be amended to allow a wider range of statistics to be collected, than those relevant to the control of infectious and contagious diseases."

It may also be recommended that the farming statistics collection form sent to farmers be divided into two parts. The second part, which would require statistics not usually available until later in the season could be submitted at the same time as the first part, or sent later when information relating to wool sales became available to the farmer.

Extra £20,000

MEMBER of Legislative Assembly Mike Summers and Senior Agricultural Advisor Andy Pollard, "have been instrumental in procuring an additional £20,000 for the Labour Scheme which has been oversubscribed this financial year," reported Director of Natural Resources John Barton on Wednesday. The scheme normally receives £30,000 of government funding with farmers able to apply for up to £3,000 per farm. He said, "the funding has helpfully been provided from the Rural Development Scheme funding held by FIDC."

Busy year for C'Bay

SENIOR Agricultural Advisor knowledge of fine wool in his department was not a concern. responding to a question from the Rural Business Association at the Agricultural Advisory Committee on Wednesday.

The question drew attention to Agricultural Advisors Tony Mills, Ian Campbell and Saladero manager Brian Aldridge having left the department.

Mr Pollard said Agricultural Advisor (with responsibility for wool production) Helen Thoday had scientific knowledge of wool production even if her experience was not in fine wool, and that she had been working closely with the Assistant Agricultural Advisor Lucy Ellis, who had many years of relevant experience in fine wool "and the practical issues that are dealt with in the Falkland Islands.

The Senior Agricultural Advisor also emphasised that regarding Saladero, management, decisions are largely based on physical measurements of wool production not visual methods. This is important as it became more about techniques than skills he explained.

He added that an operational management plan was currently being created by Ms Thoday, which would add consistency and "best practice" to the management of Saladero.

The plan would be debated at the Saladero Advisory Committee

Following a discussion regarding whether the aim should also consider that many farmers were turning to dual purpose sheep (wool/meat) MLA Summers felt while farmers were privately "do-ing such a good job" of breeding that type of animal there was currently no reason for the National Stud Flock to alter its aim away from producing fine wooled sheep

Mr Pollard later told Penguin News "The NSF aims to produce fine wooled sheep, but also with desirable carcase traits. In other words it is producing dual-purpose sheep.

He stated: "If there are any concerns people are welcome to come out and take a look."

James McGhie will take over the management of Saladero late February and a ram sale will be held on March 21 (provisional date).

'Quality' waterfront plans presented end of January



Stanley's waterfront this week but big plans for the future

SOME of the options considered by the Stanley Waterfront Masterplan Project Group will be presented to the public at the end of January.

The objectives of the Waterfront Masterplan Project are: to provide an amenity for Stanley residents and visitors, provide additional accommodation activities and attractions for tourists, provide a new and improved location for the museum, provide an attractive, appealing and high quality waterfront that will compliment Stanley, create a warm and appropriate welcome to disembarking tourists and improve the movement and flow of embarking or disembarking cruise ship passengers.

Marina Projects Ltd, the inter-

national marina and waterfront development consultancy, and their partner company, PLC Architects, were appointed by the Falkland Islands Development Corporation (FHDC) to develop a number of masterplan concepts for the Stanley Waterfront and Public Jetty project.

Following a visit to Stanley by three representatives of Marina Projects and PLC Architects, three schemes have since been developed by them following discussions with FIDC, FIG's Major Projects Board and land-owners.

Maturing democracy in the Falklands

The first of a number of edited extracts from a long article written by MLA Dick Sawle for publication in The Parliamentarian. MLA Sawle is keen to state that any views expressed are his own

IN what follows I would like to focus on the Falkland Islands, define where we are in terms of our democracy, briefly discuss what the impediments are to democratic progress, and finally stimulate debate on what changes we should be making for the future in our country.

Where we are now

The Falkland Islands has a population of around 3,000 people from a variety of backgrounds. There are families that have been in the Falklands for nine generations, and there are those that arrived here and settled in more recent times. Less than 50 per cent of our population is eligible to vote as voting requires the acquisition of Falkland Island Status (FIS) which can only be achieved after permanent residency of seven years or more. This may well be a point to consider.

We have two constituencies, Camp and Stanley. Elections are held every four years, and each elector can vote for up to five candidates within the Stanley constituency. In Camp, the vote is for a maximum of three candidates. An elected executive

The eight Members elected to the Legislative Assembly then elect three of their number to serve on Executive Council, one of those representing Camp, one representing Stanley and one whose role is to represent both Camp and Stanley. It is therefore a democratic process, where political leaders are chosen by the electorate.


The powers needed to run the country used to be exercised solely by the Governor; but as we have matured, the Governor's powers have been gradually reduced. Our revised 2009 constitution reduced the powers of the Governor to mean the Governor acting upon the advice of Executive Council. There are some reserved powers, but the role of the Governor in our territory has changed considerably from what it used to be.

All Members have the opportunity to discuss Executive Council matters and consequently can advise on all Executive Council decisions beforehand in a nonstatutory committee of all Members. But effectively the authority now lies with three Members of Executive Council rather than the solely with the Governor.

As elected Members, we set our own budget, we make our own laws and we are completely independent from the United Kingdom apart from matters of foreign affairs and defence. Defence, which is only necessary due to the political stance of Argentina and its sovereignty claim over us, has to be provided by the British forces. As we have no presence in foreign countries, we must rely on the U.K. to deal with foreign policy matters.

Ocean Guardian off hire

THE OCEAN Guardian drilling unit was towed from the 14/15-4 well location on Sunday and is now off hire to Rockhopper.

The rig has begun its two and a half month journey back to Scottish dock base Invergordon where she will undergo a standard refit and certification before being contracted to Shell.

14/15-4 was the final well in Rockhopper's first North Falkland Basin drilling campaign, which has lasted from April 16 2010 to January 8, 2012.

The Company estimates that it will have over USD \$100 million of cash resources available once all charges for completing the drilling campaign have been accounted for.

Sam Moody, Chief Executive said. "This marks the end of what has been a highly successful and safe drilling campaign. We have operated ten wells, conducted two drill stem tests, two short offset sidetracks and collected in excess of 450m of core with the Ocean Guardian on hire to us for a total of 397 days. I would like to thank the entire Rockhopper team and our contractors for their efforts which have resulted in seven successful wells of our ten drilled, with three oil discoveries, three gas discoveries, multiple successful Sea Lion appraisal wells and

a successful appraisal well on Casper."

Local Representative Ken Humphrey added: "I would like to say on behalf of everyone involved we have enjoyed working in the Falklands. The success of the campaign reflects the quality of local personnel and the tremendous support we have received from local businesses and the community in Stanley."

The Leiv Eriksson rig is now in transit to the Falklands and will drill two wells for Borders and Southern Plc (B&S) before moving on to the FOGL programme.

Teslyn's behind the lens

THE rarer than hen's teeth opportunity for a Penguin News reporter to photograph Ocean Guardian being towed on its bridle by the UOS Endeavour, was offered up by Giel Janssen, AGR Drilling Superintendent, last Friday.

⁴Me⁴ said 1, as my hand shot up, and it was a decision 1 didn't regret.

The rig itself had only been waiting for good weather before pulling anchors. This can take between 24 and 36 hours and furious rain on Saturday had delayed the flight, but by Sunday morning the word was 'go'.

The safety brief began well enough, as did my determination to listen carefully: 'here are your exits' and 'don't go inflating your lifejacket inside'... 'if the helicopter turns in the water, don't adjust your seatbelt unless you're immersed in water' 'if the life boat fails to automatically inflate, you can do it manually by pulling this, pushing this, flicking this, turning this, doing the same on the other side, pulling this (remember at arm's length) and boarding this way'

way' "What?" I wondered, returning from a day dream "When did we land in water?"

Luckily for those with poor short term memory it is required that any new passengers watch the safety briefing at least twice____

After being fitted for, and educated in, the safety suit, I was ready to go. CHC's top flying team, Perry and Kirk, reassured us with another safety brief and I promised faithfully I would not have to use the sick bags provided nor undo my seat belt when the door was open in flight.

My supervisor for the flight was Andy Crate, who wisely brought along another camera in case mine was blown out to sea.

The flight to the rig and back provided some brilliant photo opportunities over East Falkland, and after 50 minutes of failing to spot a whale, the silhouette of the Ocean Guardian appeared through the low-lying cloud. Andy secured the door open

Andy secured the door open and we adjusted our safety restraints to get a good lean from the chopper into the strong wind.


Circling the rig twice at 300 metres, just below the determined fog, we took shots from every angle before making a landing on the swaying rig.

We had just enough time on the rig to snap a few shots and battle to get our sea legs before we hopped back on board with eight off-going crew members who, no doubt, are glad that they won't be making the long journey back to the North Sea with the rig.





HAPPY New Year everyone; I hope you enjoyed the sports and the glorious weather that allowed so many little jobs to be done.

Here, I was finally able to clean up all the flower beds; they won't last long that way but they look good at the moment. Cleaning up also shows gaps which allow more plants to be shoe-horned in. As I was given some Garden Centre vouchers over Xmas it is not going to take long to do that. The planning is as good as the carrying out, though, having said that, our gardens tend to evolve rather than follow a plan. For example, the 'stumpery

After some too closely spaced and rather old Macrocarpas which became unstable and downright dangerous as they all competed for light and food, had been cut down, this was, I thought, the ideal place to grow ferns and any other light feathery plants.

The cats had other ideas. They were so impressed with the view that I swear they invited every cat in the neighbourhood to a loo-with-a-view warming party. When I had replaced some of the plants for the third time, I put some rocks around them to protect them. The plants settled, so did the rocks and there they remain. Yet another border turned into a rockery!

It has been an incredibly hot summer. It has been a few years since it's been so dry and I really feel for those poor animals waiting for grass to grow without the benefit of a good watering. Our veg garden has had to be watered most days and plants under cover have been really wilting so Bill has installed a few sprayers in the tunnels and greenhouses. It is the work of minutes to plug the hose in and let the water flow, but the problem is, the pressure here is not very high. so only one area can be done at a time. Still, it does save a lot of

standing around with a hose in your hand

I'd like to think I garden reasonably organically but I'm not a slave to it, and will use sprays and fertilisers as required. Because of that I can save myself an awful lot of work by using a weed killer between shrubs and trees, Round-up being a favourite but rather expensive option. However, you can ensure it's still effective even if it rains before the required six hours, if a tablespoon of washing up liquid is added to the mix just before spraying. This also makes it easier to see where you've been for the plants start to wilt and change colour immediately. Used sensibly, as these sprays are neutralised on touching the soil, the dying plants will just add nitrogen to the ground. which can't be bad.

I've yet to weed the tunnels; it has been much too hot for me in there. Bill built me a potting bench in one of them and it has led to a seriously needed clearing out and cleaning up of pots, labels and such like.

It has been great (it is next to the door with, usually, a slight breeze) to stand in comfort and pot on the various winter cabbages, broccolis etc, which have already filled the original seed pot There are also many perennials awaiting potting-on, not to mention the Eucalyptus and Maeracarpa which were becoming quite cramped in their pots, so it's all come at the right time

I think I've been in touch with those of you who kindly let me have cuttings last March. Most of you have either taken away plants of your choice or are coming to get them, but if I have forgotten someone in one of my senior moments please get in



touch. Anyway, once

again, thank you all. The strawberries are having fantastic year; so far the 'Clocker beetle' has not made it's appearance and so there are no signs of their awful white halfmoon shaped offspring which create such havoc amongst the roots, I've no doubt they will come but perhaps we can enjoy their absence for a little longer.

The tomatoes are in full fruit, and each little girl has one fruit on their pumpkins at present. The peppers are starting to form reasonable plants, and the thornless blackberry in the greenhouse is totally covered in fruit.

Outside, the raspberries are also full of fruit; the various currants are starting to colour, the goose berries are also okay, and - if the winds hold off - the cherry tree is looking very full of fruit ready to ripen.

On the vegetable scene outside. the potatoes are looking great (fingers crossed for no frosts). The golden turnips also good and the swedes are filling out. We've started cutting broccoli and cabbage (leaving a cross cut into the cabbage stem to grow more heads) the lettuce is plentiful and doing well in spite of the heat, the peas are filling out and the celery is doing well

What is required now, apart from any hoeing of potatoes left to be done, is the thinning of all root crops, in our case parsnips, carrots, turnips and swedes. The initial thinning only needs to be light; the ideal with carrots being a centimetre or so which allows those delicious baby carrots for the next thinning. The rest need at least a couple of centimetres at the first thinning and eventually a lot more

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
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Archers collect their medals







Continued favourable finances

THE positive financial position reported by the Falkland Island Government at the end of the last financial year as a result of income from oil exploration, continues in the first six months of the 2011/12 financial year.

The Falkland Islands Government showed a surplus of £5.515million compared to a revised budget deficit of £1.23million; a positive performance of £6.745million.

In a report to be presented at next Wednesday's Standing Finance Committee the Head of Finance also noted that with regard to net liquid assets (those funds that are readily available for use) during the first six months of the financial year, these increased by £1.425million to £111.6million.

In terms of revenue variance from the revised estimate, in favourable positions are Health and Education, PWD, Natural Resources, Central Services the Attorney General's Chambers, Mineral Resources and Transfer Payments, with only the Emergency Services in an adverse position. The latter, which relates to Customs Service, is a result of lower loligo catches than anticipated which has affected shipping activity.

In terms of operating expenditure variances from the budget for the year to date are also mainly favourable with only Health and Education (Medical Treatment Overseas £305K over year to date budget) and PWD in an adverse position. PWD has been affected by the wind farm only contributing to 33 per cent displacement of fuel rather than the 40 per cent the budget was based on. Highways salaries were also higher than anticipated.

The report also noted that to date Falkland Islands Government capital receipts are slightly more than estimated and capital schemes are currently behind schedule by £289K.

Medical equipment is currently £17K over estimate due to refurbishment of the reception area costing more than projected. The Department of Natural Resources Building project is currently £150K over budget.

Support of the British government and people thoroughly appreciated

THE Falkland Islands Government has expressed appreciation for the strength of support the Islands have received from Britain in the face of heightened media pressure and economic sanctions from Argentina.

Member of Legislative Assembly Mike Summers yesterday expressed gratitude in response to comments made by Prime Minister David Cameron this week supporting the Islanders right to self determination, and adding that Argentina was attempting to colonise the Falklands.

Mike Summers told Penguin News, "We endorse his comments about Argentina attempting to colonise the Falklands. It is clear that they are trying to do this via economic means and this must be resisted by all our means.

"The Falkland Islands Government thoroughly appreciates the strength of support the Islands are currently receiving from the British people and government at all levels." Asked if Islanders should be concerned that the Falklands issue had been raised at National Security Council level in the British Government he said, "No it's not worrying; it is precautionary to make sure they are satisfied they are doing the things that ought to be done. It is a routine piece of business."

He added that it was not the first time the Falklands had been raised in the Security Council and that it was part of their job to revise defence plans.

Mr Cameron commented during Prime Minister's Question Time in the House of Commons on Wednesday: "The reason for holding a National Security Council - which discussed other things as well - is to discuss that issue, to make sure nobody is in any doubt that Britain supports that right of self-determination, and we will go on doing so for as long as people in the Falklands want to continue in that way.

"I think it is important that eve-

ryone understands that.

Mr Cameron told MPs he ordered the NSC discussion so he could, "make sure our defences and everything else is in order." He added, "What the Argentin-

He added, "What the Argentinians have been saying recently, 1 would argue, is far more like colonialism because these people want to remain British and the Argentinians want them to do something else," he said.

"It's very important we commemorate the Falklands War in this year, the 30th anniversary, and we remember all those who served and who fought so hard and those who gave their lives and didn't come home," said Mr Cameron.

"The absolutely vital point is that we are clear that the future of the Falkland Islands is a matter for the people themselves.

"As long as they want to remain part of the United Kingdom and be British, they should be able to do so."

THE magazine House Beautiful, which sports the legend, "All you want from where you live" on its title page, is one of a number of publications dedicated to the idea that whether you live in a castle or a cottage your live your life can be transformed and happiness achieved with the right choice of curtain fabric.

I recently came upon their issue for July 2011 which was offering 48 pages of "dreamy reader homes," along with a chance to win £25,000 to spend on a summer house and advice on "real-life makeovers for driveways, deckings and gardens."

Looking at some of the mansions that have sprung up in Stanley in recent years. I was just beginning to wonder whether this paper should run the occasional interior decorating feature, when I came upon the worm at the core of House Beautiful's rosy apple.

Nestling between an account of a stable block conversion and a selection of old fishermens' cottages for sale at anything between a quarter and half a million pounds was a one-page article entitled "Make your home secure" which began, "Always secure front and back doors, even if you're in the house or garden as opportunistic thieves can strike while you're distracted" and then went on to advise locking the windows also, "if you're planning to spend a lot of time in the garden."

I don't know about you, dear reader, but given my tendency to lose keys faster than John McEnroe loses his temper, I would need the help of a burglar just to get back into my house from the garden if I followed this advice; then I would really be "distracted.

Worse was to come. After advising cementing plant pots to the floor, we are told, "Using Facebook or Twitter to boast about a fortnight in Barbados is enough to give the social media-savvy burglar all they (sic) need to know.

We have had the very occasional burglary in the Falklands, but the culprits have usually been not very "media-savvy" and have been identified and brought to justice in short order.

Periodically we are badgered by the police into locking our houses. and cars. This is, of course sensible advice, but many of us resist it on the grounds that we are prepared to accept the degree of risk that comes with some traditional freedoms and anyway wouldn't know where the car keys were if they weren't always kept in the vehicle. We feel that the burglars and car thieves should be made to conform, not us.

Despite the threats from across the water and the occasional shortages of potatoes, eggs, common sense, and "jazzy velvet planet fabrics" at £48 a metre. I thank *House Beautiful* for reminding me how very glad I am to live here without alarms, CCTV, or even a front door key.

Receivership threat to local fashion boutique

"WE are keeping an eye on it, but are not overly concerned at the was the response of moment " Falkland Islands Company (FIC) Managing Director, Roger Spink, on Wednesday to the news that the Welsh fashion retailer Peacocks had gone into administration. Quoting an operating profit of £50-£70m Mr Spink said that he was sure a buyer would be found and that the current difficulties would be overcome

Peacocks, which specialises in fashion for the budget-conscious, opened a boutique within FIC's West Store in November 2010. This immediately found favour with the shoppers of Stanley, who queued up to fill their baskets on the opening day.

Mr Spink's confidence in the survival of Peacocks was rather at odds with the gloomy predictions of the Daily Telegraph on Thursday, which suggested that the company's "collapse into ad-ministration" might put the jobs of 9,600 employees under threat.

Also according to the Telegraph, talks with Barclays and the Royal Bank of Scotland had come to nothing and Peacocks was left "teetering on the verge of bankruptey.

Chief Executive Officer of Peacocks Richard Kirk said on Thursday, "Peacocks is a brand with great heritage, and it is with deep sadness that we have been left with no other option but to place the business into administration. We have worked tirelessly over the past year to agree a new financial structure to take the business forward in the current, tough retail environment, including seeking new investment for the business.

Accountancy firm KPMG has been appointed administrator to Peacocks, which has 611 stores, , plus 49 concessions, and its parent company. The Peacock Group, which gave notice of plans to enter administration on Monday.

Chris Laverty, of KPMG, said: Like many retailers Peacocks has suffered from tough economic conditions, which have seen its customers reduce their spending on the high street. This factor, combined with a surplus of stores and high overheads, led to the business becoming financially unviable in its current form.

Peacocks shops are still open, but 249 staff from the Cardiff head office were made redundant on Thursday.

Man faces sexual offences charges

SIMON Reid (24) appeared in court on Wednesday in connection with a number of sexual offences. The charges he faces are six charges of activity with a child, six charges of possession of an indecent photograph of a child, five charges of taking an indecent photograph of a child, four charges of sexual activity with a child involving penetration and two charges of meeting a child following sexual grooming. No pleas were entered and the case was adjourned until the 15th February. He was granted conditional bail

Graeme Hemming (49) admitted to drink driving on Wednesday; a charge he had previously denied. Mr Hemming's representative David Lang explained that a welfare report was needed before an appropriate sentence could be reached.

Senior Magistrate Carl Gumsley agreed that Mr Hemming's, "extremely high reading," of 134 micrograms in 100mls of breath meant that it was appropriate for an interim disqualification to be issued and that the length of the disqualification would be considered when the case is brought be-

fore court again on March 1. Darren Bagley(39) pleaded guilty to a charge of drink driving on Wednesday, but an application for special circumstances has been entered. Witnesses and medical evidence have been requested for the next hearing, which is on the February 13. Mr Bagley said he had driven after a couple of beers and was reported to be over the limit, having a lower reading of 42 mgms in 100mls of breath. Mr Bagley was released on unconditional bail.

A trial date was set in the cases of Campbell Kirkham and Neil Clifton who last week pleaded not guilty to charges of disorderly behaviour. A second charge of disorderly behaviour against Mr Clifton was dropped but may be brought before the court at a future date. The trial will take place on the 8th February.

Bruce Humphrey (24) admitted by post to speeding. He was caught travelling at 52 mph on the Airport road which has a 40mph limit. "I thought I was doing between 45 and 50mph" he told police. The court ordered Mr Humphrey to pay a £100 fine and £85 costs and endorsed his licence.

Hero Harold calls in for a quick chat

THE FORMER BBC correspondent Harold Briley will soon be visiting the Falklands for a day and is looking forward to meeting as many of his old friends and acquaintances as possible.

Harold Briley was the BBC'S Latin American correspondent from 1979 to 1983 based in Buenos Aires but was forced to move to Rio de Janiero in 1981 because of death threats there.

However, he arrived back in Buenos Aires a few days before the Argentines invaded the Falkland Islands on April 2, 1982 and stayed on in BA throughout the war keeping the world up-to-date with his factual and brave reporting.

ing. He became a firm favourite in the Falklands as he refused to buckle to requests from Argentine authorities to present a more pro-Argentine stance in his reporting and he has always been afforded hero-like status when he has visited the Falklands.

When he returned to Britain after his four year stint as Latin American correspondent he became the BBC's defence correspondent until he retired at the end of 1991. He was awarded an OBE in July 1992 which he received from the Queen at Buckingham Palace.

Bank increases some charges to businesses

RUMOURS in circulation about swingeing increases in bank charges across the board were squashed this week by Standard Chartered Stanley Bank's assistant manager Barbara Keenleyside.

Mrs Keenleyside told Penguin News that while some new charges will be introduced on February 14 (as a Valentines's Day gift?) they will apply only to transactions involving business accounts and not personal accounts.

The charges were, said Mrs Keenleyside, much cheaper than those applied elsewhere and simply represented an attempt on behalf of Standard Chartered to "catch up" with common practice elsewhere in the banking world.

Among the charges to be introduced for businesses, is a levy of 10p per £100 when paying in or taking cash out of their accounts at the Standard Chartered counter. Lloyds charge 66p per £100 and Nat West 53p.

A charge of 10p per item will be made to businesses paying in cheques, which compares with 28p for Lloyds and 33p for Nat West.

Full details of all the bank's charges will be available in customers' end of month statements.

South Georgia shipping

THIRTEEN cruise ships visited South Georgia in December including new vessel L'Austral which, in line with usual practice, was joined by a Government Observer to look at the ship's operation, passenger management and biosecurity procedures. One vessel Plancius was acting as support vessel for two groups attempting the Shackleton Crossing. Sev-eral ships visiting around Christmas time held services in the old church at Grytviken. One vessel Fram, which had 200 passengers on board, included a small group of Chinese tourists as they have on several past cruises. Next season they have plans for a complete Chinese charter of the 200+ passenger vessel. HMS Montrose was on patrol in the area in December. Unusually for the summer season, after charter yacht Pelagic Australis left at the beginning of the month, there were no yachts around the Island.

Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

MORE journalists here this week, some expected, others just turning up on spec, we have meetings with several of them Each time I speak to visiting journalists, and they are here in numbers this week. I am reminded how many myths there are about the Falkland Islands Usually arriving with open minds enables them to go away better informed: unfortunately there are a minority who come with their story already written and nothing we say or do will change it. The common lines now are that the Islands are about to be ruined by the oil industry and overrun by oilmen or that Argentina's attempt to blockade the Islands is making life too difficult. No amount of facts will get in the way of these unproven theories. Fortunately some have the integrity to write about what they learn while here rather than concoct something to match their preconceptions.

I spent a fair amount of time last weekend writing a response to the piece by the Argentine Foreign Minister in the Times, only to have Edelman, our PR firm. fail to get it in for publication on Monday- not their finest hour and I could have been gardening instead

This week, in addition to normal business we've meetings with oil company representatives and with Plexus, the group doing a study for Rockhopper on the potential social impact of oil production if further exploration and testing proves the known resource exploitable. We hear a presentation on protected areas on Wednesday and later that day have our quarterly meeting with the Chamber of Commerce council.

An amusing spin has been put on the recent norovirus incident by the Argentine press, some of whom claim it was used as an excuse to turn away a ship because it had some Argentine tourists on board. They even implied that it might be retaliation for their recent attempts to blockade the Islands. I hope the situation was adequately explained to passengers, including the fact that we have only a relatively small number of hospital beds should the very contagious virus affect elderly or otherwise vulnerable people.

Death on South Georgia inquest

AN inquest into the death of a cruise ship passenger was opened and adjourned on January 13, in the Coroners Court

Eileen Madden Larrimore died on South Georgia on January 3, during a cruise holiday onboard MV Clipper Adventurer. Mrs Larrimore's body was brought to the Falkland Islands for a post mortem, performed by Dr William Lawler, a forensic pathologist from the UK

Mrs Larrimore was hiking on Shackleton's Walk on South Georgia when she slipped and fell. Her husband also fell, receiving minor injuries. Mrs Larrimore died on the way back to the ship.

Statements by the witnesses, including the ships doctor have been collected, and the Royal Falkland Islands Police are preparing a file for the Her Majesty's Coroner Carl Gumsley.

Mr Gumsley offered his sincere condolences to the family of Mrs Larrimore and also wished to thank the staff of the vessel, Dr Lawler and in particular the Royal Falkland Islands Police for their help.

The inquest was adjourned to a date yet to be set. (FIRS).

FCO to fund **Scolarships**

GOVERNMENT House has invited Islanders interested in postgraduate study in the UK to apply for a Chevening Scholarship Award

Chevening Scholarships are run by the FCO and offer funding to outstanding graduates to study at one of the many British Universities that subscribe to the Chevening programme. The programme is intended for future leaders and decision-makers. Awards are normally given for one-year Masters degree courses, but may also be considered for other courses of a minimum of three months' duration

Particularly welcome are applications for the following areas of study: good governance (financial management, public administration, the rule of law etc), climate change, sustainable development, environmental management, and criminal justice.

Chevening scholarships will be awarded in 2012/2013 to applicants from the UK Overseas Territories. Applicants will be assessed according to the merit of their applications and their qualifications (both academic and professional).

Successful candidates are offered full scholarships covering tuition fees, flights to/from the UK and living expenses sufficient for a single student.

IT'S been nice to do the daily round of the hen houses in the sunshine with relatively no wind these last couple of weeks (although it's blowing a hooley today).

It can take the enjoyment out of keeping poultry when you're battling with the elements and getting clouted on the head by nest box lids, or watching your bucket of feed, or basket of eggs go flying up the valley.

On bad weather days doing the hens is a chore. On a nice day however, your birds can be enjoyed and time spent amongst them

This not only keeps them calmed down and friendly, but it also gives you the opportunity to inspect them, observe and look out for signs of illness or unusual activity, like the hen that hides in the hen house, or has a limp (there's usually a reason that needs addressing).

This is also when you get attached to particular characters and names develop. Not good when it comes to the time to cull. I have a strict (ahem) policy of only keeping roosters for one season and hens for two.

That's why I have a few older member of my poultry community like Clive, Sneezles, Old Crooked, Blackie... Generally though, I do try and stick to roosters in their first year for several reasons. The boys get heavier on the girls when treading (mating).

Their spurs can grow very long and cause damage in certain breeds and in large breeds, the boys can get a bit lazy and clumsy.

As I'm just collecting my last batch of eggs for incubating, my roosters' lives are about to come to an end, although I won't actually do the deed until after the hatch in case anything goes wrong and I need to collect more fertile eggs.

It's a good job roosters can't read or they'd be working up a plot to sabotage the power supply to the incubator!

New headmaster is committed to British education overseas

DAVID Tongue (35) the new headmaster of the Falkland Islands Community School is "committed to the application of British education in an overseas context," he told Penguin News this week.

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His last post was at a British International School in Madrid where he was Curriculum Director, dealing with the education of students from age 3 up to age 18. Prior to that he undertook the role of Head of Department in a school in the UK.

Mr Tongue said the attraction of overseas education, "is a lifestyle thing for me and my family. The cost of living in Madrid was much cheaper than the UK and although some aspects of the cost of living here are greater, the overall quality of life we find to be superior."

He said he was very attracted to the Falklands post: "I did a lot of research about the location after I saw the advert for the post. For a while we were living in the mountains outside Madrid and we like bleak, remote, rural locations. I was attracted to the English overseas element along with the military history and the Falklands war. I'm also interested in how a

small community functions."

The Falklands has come up to expectation, he said, adding that the preparation given to him by the Falkland Islands Government Office in London "was excellent. I don't leap into these things lightly. Most of the research I had done was very accurate."

Mr Tongue described the school as striking and "exceptionally

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE: VACANCY

An opportunity has arisen for a member of the community to become involved in helping to ensure that FIG is delivering valuefor-money to the residents of the Falkland Islands. Expressions of interest are sought from members of the public wishing to become a member of the Public Accounts Committee (PAC).

Under the Falkland Islands Constitution, the PAC comprises:

 (a) a chairman and two other members appointed by the Governor; and
 (b) two members of the Legislative Assembly.

The PAC currently has a vacancy for a chairman under (a) above. The role involves six (or so) meetings per year, each lasting two hours, with an estimated time commitment of four hours per month for background reading and preparation. The role is unpaid but expenses are reimbursed. The appointment period will be until 31 January 2014 (in order to tie in with the appointment periods of the other, existing members).

The PAC has an important scrutiny role over the public accounts of all government departments and specified bodies. The PAC's task is to ensure that public funds have been expended properly, for the purposes for which they were voted by the Legislative Assembly. Hence the role is varied, complex and fascinating. Individuals appointed to the PAC make a significant contribution to the community, in helping to maintain high standards of public administration and good governance in the Falkland Islands. This calls for PAC members themselves to have the highest standards of personal integrity, discretion and commitment to the good governance of the Islands.

Applications should be submitted to the Governor by Monday 23 January, setting out the reasons for the applicant's interest in appointment to the PAC and the skills and experience that the applicant would bring to the job. well resourced. It is a very pleasant place for the students, architecturally pleasant and must be a great place to come and study."

So far he has not seen the school functioning due to the summer holidays but has examined inspection reports and met most of the teachers: "I've been very impressed with how many of them have been giving up their holiday time to give revision classes and exam invigilation. That is not something you see in many institutions."

Asked what he would change immediately he replied: "Nothing at this point. You can make judgements but until you've actually seen something in operation it is too early to say. I wouldn't want to make a judgement based on other people's assessments."

Mr Tongue says he is used to the feeling of being part of a small community: "In Madrid the expat community was quite small and probably a similar sort of size to the Falklands population. So despite being in a large capital city there are elements of living under a microscope and everybody knows everyone else. So I am quite used to that environment."

The curriculum in the Falklands is virtually identical to that taught in the Madrid school, he said, "although there are more vocational subjects here and more academic in Madrid. Some of the boards used are the same, other boards are slightly different. One of the useful experiences 1 bring is that I'm used to, regardless of the situation, adapting the national curriculum slightly, because you cannot apply it directly as if you were in England. Certain elements of history and geography would switch off students because they are just not relevant to what they are doing – so the experience I have got of that will be useful."

Asked if he felt he would have greater freedom to make decisions compared to past posts: "It is a little early to say; it is different. It (the school in Madrid) was an independent school so there were certain guidelines that were set within the school, unlike here where they are set at a slightly higher level. There's an element of more flexibility than there would be in the UK. But again it is a little early to answer that question."

A family man. Mr Tongue is accompanied by his wife and two small children and everyone has settled in well: "The biggest challenge may be that because of the way I've been moving around I'm going to go a whole year of winters as I would imagine this Falklands summer is virtually over. Coming from a warm climate that might be challenge.

Asked what professional challenges he anticipated he said, "Maybe I'm being overly optimistic but I'm not sensing so far that there will be any challenges that I won't be able to overcome." Mr Tongue is in the Falklands on a two year contract.

Chile is currently experiencing an outbreak of equine influenza in the Santiago metropolitan district. Fortunately for us it is a disease that we don't have in the Falkland Islands and we'd like to keep it that way. If the virus was brought in here FI horses would be 100% susceptible. The most common routes of spread are directly between horses or on stable gear and by personnel working with horses. The virus can, however, be transmitted on contaminated second hand horse gear - so we'd like the local horse owning population to be aware of this situation and to not bring back second hand horse gear with them if they've been visiting Chile.

Maturing democracy in the Falklands

The second of a number of edited extracts from an article written by MLA Dick Sawle for publication in The Parliamentarian. MLA Sawle is keen to state that any views expressed are his own

Mr Henry Bellingham, Parliamentary Under Secretary of State at the U.K. Foreign and Commonwealth Office, said in an Overseas Territories meeting in London in November 2011 that "constitutions are work in progress", and I agree with him. Our 1986 constitution was amended in 2009 and no doubt there is still room for improvement. Where are the challenges then to maturing our democracy?

A full-time job

First, the job of a Member of the Legislative Assembly (MLA) has become far more time-consuming than it ever used to be. If taken seriously, it is a full-time job. It involves town council matters, national strategic planning and international affairs - in short, a very fascinating and interesting political cocktail. I firmly believe that the days of part-time politicians are over in our country. The modern Falklands is moving and developing quickly and our politicians must also quicken their step to keep pace. With increased powers comes increased responsibility and also of course increased accountability. MLAs in the Falklands are paid, but not a living wage. This is a huge impediment to progress. Rather like many small parish councils and even county councils in the UK, this tends to mean that Members are those who are of independent means, retired or semi-retired, and usually therefore mature in years. There are of course those who hold down a full-time job whilst carrying out the role of an MLA, but the pressures on them. their employers and of course their families are great and there is evidence that this is simply unsustainable.

Moreover, whilst there are countries that have cultural, social or even legal obstacles that impede some members of the public from standing for election, we in the Falklands have only this single obstacle: pay and conditions. Effectively, no Falkland Islander who relies on income from their work to support a fam-

ily, a mortgage and meet all of the usual financial obligations can afford to leave their job and take up the challenge of political life. This cannot be right. Many who are extremely able and would make excellent leaders simply cannot afford the cost of doing so.

MLAs in the Falklands are paid approximately £350 per month or £550 per month if elected to Executive Council. Other allowances for attending meetings, for attending overseas conferences et cetera are also paid, resulting in a total payment (excluding claims for recovery of expenses such as travel) per annum of maybe £15,000 to £20,000. Actual remuneration depends on how active a Member is – arguably a good point.


That a Member who is elected to Executive Council should receive more than one who is not is. in my view, a nonsense given that Executive Council Members have very little additional powers to Assembly Members. Additional pay should reward additional responsibility. Without a Ministerial system the additional responsibility is negligible. Why attendance at meetings should be paid is equally irrelevant. Either we have full-time MLAs paid a full-time and adequate wage or we will continue with an out of date and inappropriate system that is not giving the Falklands the attention the islands deserve. It impedes recruitment of able and intelligent people who are prepared to take the risk of standing for election and becoming professional politicians.

A scrutiny deficit

Maturing the democratic process is not simply a matter of paying a decent wage for the job that MLAs carry out. The ability to deliver political promises requires professionalism and adequate resources. Resources are scant. Members generally work from home as there is no office space. Whilst we have an Assembly building, it is too small for Members to work from. We should professionalise not just the job, but also the environment within which we work.

We have no political parties as the population is too small to reflect large bodies of opinion. Consequently all eight elected Members are independent and we rely on consensus politics. The problem with consensus politics is that it tends to stifle debate and leads to the policy of least resistance. The Executive Council has no opposition in practical terms. The remaining five Assembly Members who are not elected to Executive Council are intended to perform the essential democratic task of scrutiny. However, with the sole exception of forming policy, this is not the ease as all Members are involved with equal voting rights in all matters of finance and legislation. Whilst Executive Council alone forms policy, all Members are consulted on all policy matters (and indeed all other matters) and it is rare that Executive Council does not reflect the consensus of opinions expressed by all Members.

So where are the real mechanisms of scrutiny? The Governor exercises some scrutiny, ensuring that due process and good governance are maintained. We also have a Public Accounts Committee (PAC) and a Complaints Commissioner. However, the PAC has on it two elected Members who then potentially are called upon to scrutinise financial decisions in which they themselves have been fully involved.

THE OFFICIAL Falkland Islands government reason for refusing to allow passengers from the cruise liner Star Princess to come ashore last Saturday has apparently been repudiated by some of the ship's crew and passengers according to reports received by an Argentine News Agency

A press release from FIG's Public Relations and Media Manager, Darren Christie read, "Due to a reported outbreak of norovirus on the cruise vessel Star Princess. following agreed protocols, the Chief Medical Officer took the difficult decision not to allow the vessel to land in the Falkland Islands as scheduled. The vessel had been due to arrive in Stanley at 8am on the 14th January

The King Edward VII Memorial Hospital in Stanley were informed of the problem on the afternoon of the 13th of January, and communicated the decision that evening following consultation with both the ship's doctor and a consultant microbiologist in the UK

This difficult decision was not taken lightly, and was made in the wider interests of the public and tourism industry. Norovirus is highly infectious, and causes potentially severe sickness and diarrhoea. It is spread easily by direct contact, touching contaminated surfaces, and through inhalation. The virus has become a serious issue in hospitals and vessels around the world and can be very serious in the elderly and the very young. An outbreak in the Falkland Islands would put enormous pressure on our limited medical resources, and jeopardise other scheduled cruise visits.

The statement ended by wishing those affected by the virus a speedy recovery and an enjoyable onward journey and pointing out that this was only the second occasion that a tour vessel has ever had to be turned away from the Falkland Islands, which welcomes over 100 cruise ship visits each year.

According to an article on the Argentine website perfil.com on Monday, a passenger claims that the crew of the vessel suspected that the refusal to land was "a re-prisal for the prohibition of British vessels flying the Falkland Islands flag.

The source of this report was apparently an Argentine psychologist travelling on the vessel, who claimed that the Captain showed surprise at this decision which he considered wrong, given the small number of sick people involved. The passenger claimed that the vessel with 3,600 passengers aboard had only 20 cases of 'gastroenterocolitis' though figures given to Penguin News by Customs and Immigration and the ship's local agents suggest that there were only 2,608 passengers

aboard, of whom 58 had been registered as suffering from the effects of the norovirus.

Apparently there were 256 Argentines on hoard the vessel and the Argentine psychologist, who is described as a specialist in the problems of the aged, is quoted as telling the DyNpor news agency that "There was a lot of disenchantment among those who wanted to land on the archipelago. Many were going to pay tribute to their dead from the Falklands War [

Ever eager to make fantastic statements about the Falkland 1svolved in giving so many passengers the best possible experience, whether as tour guides, transport providers, caterers, port security or wardens at penguin colonies etc have had to take time out from other full-time occupations to participate.

When a ship does not come in, for whatever reason, they not only lose the income they would have received, but also a day from their holidays and, in some cases, their pay from their normal employment.

If the non-arrival of a ship hurts individuals and the companies

lands, Argentine Foreign Minister Hector Timerman who had clearly heard of the statement by the Argentine psychologist aboard the Star Princess, issued a communi-que entitled "Banned again from visiting the Malvinas Islands," which complained that "the authorities of the illegitimate and self-proclaimed government of the Malvinas Islands banned tourists, including Argentine citizens. from getting off the cruise due to alleged health concerns.

The ship, which belongs to an American company, had previously complied with all the required sanitations protocols both in Argentina and Chile," the communique added.

Suspicions that the ship, which left Valparaiso in Chile on January 7 might be facing some kind of medical crisis, apparently began to arise when the numbers of passengers booked to go on tours with local operators suddenly began to drop alarmingly as the ship approached Stanley.

The failure to visit of such a large ship would have a significant impact in any port, in terms of the loss of revenue to shops, tour operators, taxis, bus companies, restaurants and the like, but this is particularly so in Stanley where the resident population barely matches that of some of the arriving ships.

Faced with numbers that would otherwise be overwhelming, possibly the majority of people in-

that rely on the spending power of the tourists to boost their taking during what is a very short tourist season from November to March, it also hurts the government who, at £18.00 per passenger would have lost £46,944 from passenger arrival tax alone had Star Princess been allowed to anchor.

Although it is difficult to put an exact figure on it, the loss to the Falklands economy caused by the banning of the visit by the Star Princess may have been over a hundred thousand pounds. Given that the Star Princess flies the flag of the Bahamas and is Americanowned, a ban as an act of reprisal against Argentina would have been a pathetic failure. Apart from being an extremely expensive action in cash terms, it would also have cost the Islands the political benefits of giving 256 Argentines and many other Latin Americans the chance to learn something of our realities, first hand.

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portfolio Although tourism holder MLA Summers has said that he is satisfied that procedures were followed and the correct decision was made, FIG's press release promised a post incident review. This is something which will please FIC Director Roger Spink who has publicly expressed dismay at the turning away of such a large amount of business and called for a review of the procedures to be followed in such cases, and in particular the way in which the risk to the general public is assessed

When a similar situation involving the Holland America vessel Norwegian Crown occurred in 2009, the Falkland Island Company made enquiries of various authorities including those in the port of Gibraltar.

Captain Peter W Hall, Chief Executive and Captain of the Port of Gibraltar (GHA) said of his authority's reaction to the news of norovirus on a cruise ship, "We treat this as any other infectious disease, as follows; We advise the GHA infectious disease department before the vessel arrives to port

"The Officer goes on board before anyone else does and makes sure that the affected people and those that have come in to contact with them or have shown signs of the virus are kept in isolation. Once clear and the duty officer is satisfied we then proceed to allow the passengers to come ashore."



The Wool Market Report - January 12, 2012

The start of 2012 has looked up for wool prices after the Christmas recess. The first week of trading closed the EMI at A51,216/kg or 823pence up 59 pence on the last EMI of 2011. Australia has seen a good export market in the last quarter of 2011 which has been shown in year end figures and improvements in the Australian and American Dollar exchange rate are both large parts of this upturn.

Sales cleared 92% of wool this week which has been one of the highest since October Next week a very large sale of over 57,000 bales is on offer which should test the water on whether this is a temporary lift in prices or overall global demand is on the up again. Chi-nese New Year at the end of January can have an effect on trading and a different picture may be seen after this holiday.

New Zealand and UK have witnessed slow starts to the season with a down turn in prices but South Africa have opened with record Merino prices 49% higher than January last year.

Land release progressing well due to good weather

THE BACTEC land release project on the Stanley Common has been blessed with good weather and the project is "progressing solidly," confirmed company Chief Executive Officer Guy Lucas.

As previously reported in Penguin News, operations commenced on January 9 south of the Stanley to Darwin Road in an area bounded by the Stanley Hill water tanks and the Mullet Creek pump house track.

The team arrived in Stanley on January 1, 2012 and commenced refresher training and site orientation over the next week.

The training was concluded with an accreditation process where all systems were tested and a full scale casualty evacuation drill was conducted.

Heading the project Guy Lucas and Andy Frizzell said this week that the operation this season differs quite significantly from what was conducted in the 2009/10 summer.

Mr Frizzell said, "This time the aim of the task is not to deliberately clear minefields as was the case in 2009/10. Rather it is to confirm the locations of the four known minefields inside the SCF, proving the area around the minefields is free from mines by processing the land with an armoured mechanical flail system; and subsequently erecting new fences around each of the four minefields (marked in red) within the project area." The remainder of land outside the minefields will be processed by a combination of detector aided visual search, conducted by the Zimbabwean deminers and a towed detector system.


The aim of this part of the operation is to ensure that no other unexploded ordnance is present before the land is returned to public use.

The project is funded for three months and the team is required to clear at a minimum the area marked blue on the attached map (including proving and fencing the four minefields).

Weather and time permitting

the team will then work in priority order to clear the areas marked green then the two pink zones in the South of the area.

The SCF will be realigned towards the end of the project to correspond with the area that has been successfully cleared and released to public use.



for Penguins and Ian took them




into the lead as the aggressive first-half gathered pace.





This could be the shape of things to come

WHILE Rockhopper Exploration has been seeking to capitalise on its discoveries in the Falkland Islands Northern Licensing area with the drilling rig Ocean Guardian, an absolute floating behemoth by comparison has been making steady progress from Greenland to the South Atlantic to begin drilling operations in the deeper water of the Southern Licensing Zone.

The mighty deep water rig, Leif Eriksson, which had been engaged in Greenland drilling for rumoured Rockhopper buyin partners, Cairn Energy, arrived in the mouth of Berkeley Sound in the Falkland Islands on Saturday night. The first well is expected to be spudded in a matter of days.



Oil quest draws US investor

ACCORDING to Houston press reports, US petroleum grant Anadarko, tour of whose executives visited the Falklands recently by company jet, has made a provisional offer to invest nearly 1.6 billion dollars in Rockhopper Exploration plc, but this has not been officially confirmed.

Reports of talks on a possible takeover or majority acquisition in Rockhopper by Anadarko Petroleum Corp, one of the world's largest independent oil and gas exploration and production companies have already benefited shareholders in the company.

Shares in Rockhopper surged in London trading following a report that Anadarko Petroleum was in talks with the only company so far to have made a commercial oil discovery off the Falkland Islands.

Rising to their highest price since February last year, Rockhopper shares have increased 44 per cent in the past six months. Shares in Desire Petroleum Plc, which has licensed acreage adjacent to Rockhopper's also advanced by 7.6 per cent.

Six energy companies have approached Rockhopper's quest to bring in a partner by the end of March to develop its discovery. but Anadarko is by far the biggest The Sunday Times mentioned Houston-based Noble Energy Inc., Hess Corp and Murphy Oil USA Inc. are also interested, as well as UK firms Cairn Energy and Premier.

Anadarko was a minority owner in BP's Macondo well, which exploded spilling almost five million barrels of oil into the Gulf of Mexico and killing 11 workers. It agreed last year to pay BP four billion US dollars to settle claims over the disaster.

Funding of Rockhopper's expensive exploration programme faced difficulties in the present European economic climate. Anadarko's involvement could lead to a deal that will meet Rockhopper's urgent need for funding of further exploration costs.

Rockhopper Chairman Pierre Jungels said last month the company has a range of options for the Sea Lion prospect (a 500 million barrels field) and that it will open a data room to seek partners. The company needs about USDS2 billion to develop the find off the Falkland Islands.

It plans to start commercial production in 2016 when it hopes to develop the Sea Lion field with a giant oil tanker moored over it. The ship will be fitted with a drilling rig and have the capacity to store up to three million barrels of oil, which would be off-loaded to other tankers.

Islanders have been reported in the United States press as indicating they feel encouraged by US investor interest in the oil exploration believing US corporate investment in the oil exploration programme will introduce an international dimension and implied US interest. One press report said while Falkland Islanders are aware that US corporate investment doesn't equate with US political or strategic interests in the area, "they remain optimistic that such a large investment will generate interest in Washington."

State Department spokeswoman Victoria Nuland recently stated the Falklands were "a bilateral issue that needs to be worked out directly between the governments of Argentina and the United Kingdom. We encourage both parties to resolve their differences through dialogue in normal diplomatic channels.

"We recognize de facto United Kingdom administration of the islands but take no position regarding sovereignty," Nuland said.

Anadarko has headquarters in

The Woodlands, Texas, and employs about 4,700 people world wide.

Several members of Rockhopper Exploration's management team have visited the Falklands in recent weeks and have met with the Mineral Resources Department.

A team from Plexus Energy visited from January 14 to 28 to conduct the follow-up visit for their Socioeconomic Impact Assessment for the Sea Lion development. A final study report will be prepared and submitted in the next few months.

Roger urges EU to protect our rights

DURING his speech to the Overseas Countries and Territories - EU Forum, this week Member of Legislative Assembly Roger Edwards urged the EU Commission to ensure that the rights of citizens of OCTs are not compromised in relations with countries and regional bodies, "especially at this time of heightened pressure from Argentina on our trade and economic position.

The tenth OCT-EU Forum was held in Brussels from January. 23 - 26. Approximately 100 delegates attended from 22 overseas countries and territories.

The Falkland Islands delegation comprised the Honourable Roger Edwards MLA, Honourable Sharon Halford MLA, Falkland Islands Government Head of Policy Jamie Fotheringham, and Falkland Islands Government UK Representative Sukey Cameron.

The Falkland Islands took the lead in presenting a joint position on trade issues and regional integration facing all OCTs, to the European Commission

In preparing the presentation the Falkland Islands delegation worked closely with the delegations from Anguilla, Curacao, Greenland and St. Pierre Miquelon

MLA Edwards's message was also underlined in the speech by the representative of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) during which he specifically affirmed the UK's support of the right of the Falkland Islanders to self-determination.

Memorial wood vandalised

LOCAL horticulturalists, Tim and Jan Miller, who have been involved in the 1982 Memorial Wood project since its beginning, were appalled last Sunday to discover for the second time this month that some of the trees planted in memory of servicemen who lost their lives here - one for each life lost - had been deliberately uprooted and dumped to one side. Also pulled up and scattered were a quantity of poppy crosses, some of which had been placed by the families of the dead servicemen commemorated there.

Assuming that children may have been responsible for such a wanton act of vandalism, which they describe as, "totally unacceptable and offensive to what these Islands stand for and what the wood commemorates: the real cost of our democracy and freedom," the Millers told Penguin News: "We find it beyond belief that there can be parents in Stanley who presumably do not know, or care about, the significance of the 1982 Wood to have explained it to their children earlier, as there can be no excuse for such behaviour in this place, even more so in this year when so much is at stake." They expressed the wish that those responsible would feel suitably ashamed of their actions.

Chamber asks for more time

IN response to the proposed Standard Chartered Bank (SCB) charges which were announced recently and are due to be implemented on the February 14, 2012, the Chamber of Commerce Couneil has written to Mr Karia at SCB on behalf of its members and with the interests of the community as a whole in mind, to request that at the very least a delay of three months before implementation be given to give him time for consultation with the business community.

The Council said that it is confident that he will give favourable consideration to their request to allow for a deferral and reconsideration of the proposed increases.

Welsh Guards families to visit

VISITING the Islands at the end of February will be a group of veterans from the Welsh Guards and relatives of members of the regiment who were lost on the Sir *Galahad* when it was bombed near Fitzroy.

Leader of the group, Steve Gelly has issued an open invitation to anyone who wishes to join the group for a service which they will hold at the Welsh Guards' memorial at Fitzroy on St David's Day, March 1.

Inquest told of lessons to be learned from tragedy

AN inquest into the death of baby Nivek McLaren was opened in the coroner's court on Monday. Baby McLaren was born on March 11 2011, five weeks earlier than his due date, and died the following day.

HM Coroner Carl Gumsley informed the court that because the baby's death took place in a hospital and, "fault potentially lay on a member of the state" the investigation would take a, "wider form."

The court heard testimony from all hospital staff involved in the care of the child as well as both parents and a friend who visited them in hospital.

There were concerns about baby McLaren's blood sugar levels, which can be attributed most commonly to being cold, undernourished, or to infection. The baby was kept warm with blankets and given a top-up feed but there was only momentary improvement. The hospital staff were using an adult machine to test his blood sugar which had an inaccuracy risk. Later some even lower readings were recorded with no advice given to top-up feed or follow-up.

Another concern raised in court was the infrequency the premature baby was visited and monitored by staff during the night and leading up to his death.

During the night baby Mclaren's breathing developed a 'grunt', and it was suggested by the nurse on duty that the baby was, "just dreaming."

Later that day baby McLaren was discovered by his father not to be breathing. After some confusion hospital staff found the correct machine to attempt resuscitation but discovered it had no batteries. "Then he died" Mr McLaren told Coroner Gumsley.

Chief Nursing Officer Mandy Heathman agreed that all parentsto-be should be made aware of the hospitals capabilities and equipment, "so they can make informed decisions." She has started work on an information sheet.

Mrs Heathman said it was previously assumed that parents would be aware that there is no neo-natal intensive care facility in the Islands because of, "priorities and cost." She explained that if a baby required extra care, doctors and nurses would react to the situation as it arose, by asking for specialist advice from their UKbased consultant obstetrician. If the situation could not be handled here, the baby would be sent for specialist treatment in Chile with an inevitable delay of several hours.

Since what the Chief Nursing Officer described as "these tragic events," improved training had been given in the recommended care procedures and more stringent patient note taking.

Care plans are prepared for those babies who have reached full term but Mrs Heathman acknowledged, "we are not used to looking after a baby born early." What was done was noted on his chart, she said, but not what should be done as the baby, "seemed to be doing well... breastfeeding and a good size and weight."

The inquest will conclude today, 27 January.

Fuel puts retail Price index up

AN increase in the price of kerosene from 68p to 75p was the principal cause of a 1.5 per cent increase in the Stanley Retail Price Index during the last quarter of 2011, according to the report presented to Standing Finance Committee by Synergy Informa-tion Systems Ltd. What were described as 'miscellaneous' items contributed 0.6 per cent of the increase. A further 2p per litre increase imposed with effect from January1, 2012 will be reflected in the index for the first quarter of this year. The biggest percentage quarterly increase in the Index was 3.6 in the second quarter and the smallest of 0.6 per cent occurred in the quarter ending on September 30. The first quarter's increase was 2.4 per cent, giving an average quarterly increase for the year as a whole of 2.025 per cent.

MBE for Edna

THIRTY years of fund raising in aid of a Plymouth hospice has earned an MBE for 94-year old Falkland Islander, Mrs Edna Carlton. Mrs Carlton, who was awarded the honour in the Queen's New Year's Honours List is the sister of Shirley Hirtle's late father, Wallace Hirtle and her uncles Enie and Len. Still actively lead-ing a team of volunteer collectors, over the years since the early eighties, Mrs Carlton is estimated to have raised more than £26,000 for the St Luke's Hospice in Turnchapel. Now a widow, Mrs Carlton left the Falklands just after the Second World War when she met and married Arthur Carlton, a merchant seaman who had arrived in the islands on the MV Baltavia. When told of the award she said, "I don't feel like I've done anything at all - I'm just a little old lady who likes helping the hos-

Cristina: we're not the bad guys

THE Argentine President's comeback speech on Wednesday after her recent thyroidectomy was less explosive than some pundits had predicted, and though she did not exactly wind in her new neck on the subject of the Falklands, she did say that there would be no "intemperate shouting or actions" on this issue from her government.

"I've been told that we have some bad intentions for the anniversary and are preparing naughty surprises. Well it's all nonsense; we are going to keep to the political, juridical and diplomatic path we have been working on.

"This is only an attempt, who knows by whom, to show us as the 'bad boys' or the 'violent guys' of the picture."

Legislative Assembly Diary

MLA Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

THE Times piece, somewhat diluted, was eventually published last Saturday next to William Hague's very comprehensive and welcome article. There was additional good coverage on the Falklands by visiting journalists writing for the Times and the Independent and a number of excellent live interviews for BBC Radio Five by a freelance journalist. Even better, most of it was accurate and friendly. I did a very brief interview for ITV news and the Hon Dick Sawle did a number of interviews for Spanish language stations which, judging by the vituperative correspondence he is now receiving from Argentina, must have been very effective. The Hon Sharon Halford set the scene for a Sky TV debate and the Hon Mike Summers took part in a radio debate, both programmes further airing the truth in the face of blatant Argentine propaganda. Perhaps Argentina might finally realize how counter productive their recent activities have been, in particular in providing us with many opportunities on which to hang our story.

MLAs and others were invited Wednesday of last week to see the land release project which is well underway in the stone corral area of the common. This project is particularly pleasing because it should release a very useful and attractive recreational area for the benefit of all. It will involve carefully defining the position of the minefields in the area rather than clearing them and clearing any bits of weaponry that may be lying around between them. Importantly, we understand the contract also includes the restoration of disturbed areas.

This week, as well as the normal monthly round of meetings of GPC, Executive Council and Standing Finance Committee, some of us are seeing more jour-nalists from the UK, Chile and Norway. The public meeting this month will be mainly taken up with the Waterfront presentation. Before people become alarmed at the scale of it I would like to emphasise that firstly this is a consultation phase and we really would like to have your views, and secondly the only part for which funding is already agreed is that for essential work on the Public Jetty.

Caribbean agrees Action Plan on Falklands self determination

MINISTERS attending the Seventh Ministerial UK-Caribbean Forum have agreed an Action Plan, which recognises the right of self determination for the Falkland Islanders.

The meeting, held in Grenada, was held under the theme "Prosperity Towards Sustainable Growth" and was attended by the UK Government and members of the Caribbean Community organization (CARICOM). Numerous Caribbean Heads of Government and Ministers attended the meeting, with the UK represented by the Foreign Secretary William Hague, and the Overseas Territories Minister Jeremy Browne. The forum agreed an Action Plan containing agreements on a range



William Hague of issues from climate change to

sustainable development. Of great significance to the Falkland Islands, the Forum agreed, "To support the principle and the right to self determination for all peoples, including the Falkland Islanders, recognising the historical importance of selfdetermination in the political development of the Caribbean, and its core status as an internationally agreed principle under the United Nations Charter"

Member of the Legislative Assembly Jan Cheek said: "We are delighted to have our rights recognized by our friends in the Caribbean. We have much in common with island states all around the world, and we have long maintained our right as a people to determine the future of our home and country. This basic right is what the Argentine Government are trying to deny us."

Maturing democracy in the Falklands

The last of three articles in which Legislative Council Member Dick Sawle examines the current level of democracy in the Falklands and suggests ways in which it might be improved. Towards the end of the second article, Mr Sawle asked "where are the real mechanisms of scrutiny?

IN common with many small jurisdictions, we call upon members of the public to carry out many scrutiny roles on a variety of committees, but the pool of volunteers is generally small. In the case of some bodies such as tribunals, it has been almost impossible to find willing volunteers.

The essential tools for proper scrutiny are therefore, in my view, deficient in our current system. Effectively, political opposition is led by the public who is the only real and practical challenge to our consensus politics. This in turn leads to constant (and understandable) discontent with political leaders.

Who is the opposition?

Who leads our political system and can be challenged by the public or other elected Members? We have no elected Leader and we have no continuity within the elected Members themselves for various external tasks such as the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association. This means we lack continuity and do not gain advantage from contacts made and networks established.

Because we also have no ministerial powers, despite all members having portfolio responsibilities, this results in politicians frequently viewing the civil service (who are accountable only to the Chief Executive and who in turn is accountable to the Governor) as the opposition.

In summary, politicians frequently view both the civil service and also the public as the opposition and the result is discontent and dissatisfaction all round. But of far greater importance than this, is the fact that our democratic but flawed system leads to lack of direction, lack of cohesion and lack of common purpose. Heading for a more mature democracy

How can we advance the current system? There are a number of improvements that can be made and which are now being debated:

•Elected Members have to become properly paid professionals with adequate resources to carry out their tasks. This opens the pool of potential political leaders and thereby expands the potential for more talented Members.

•With professionalism comes the requirement to have sufficient powers. Members need to move towards a ministerial role. The powers of the Chief Executive need to be reduced. Civil servants need to be accountable to elected politicians and not an appointed Chief Executive.

•We need to accept the requirement to appoint a Chief Minister or Leader. In a small community such as ours this is difficult, but we should meet this challenge and cope with it. We have to have a focal point of contact for the outside world.

•We must ensure that with ministerial responsibility, continuity is maintained, especially where this relates to our relationships with overseas bodies.

•We should have one single constituency. Recently a referendum opposed this idea; but it is no longer acceptable that 10 per cent of the people are represented by nearly 50 per cent of the political leadership.

•We may well need to have more elected Members as we progress and mature.

•If we were to effect these changes they would need to be made in a carefully co-ordinated fashion as many of the changes are inter-dependent.

•Finally, and most importantly

of all, we need to have effective scrutiny which is not just formed by formal bodies such as a PAC, but involves some form of formally constituted opposition. This latter point is perhaps the most important part of maturing our democracy. But it may be that, until we grow the population to a far greater extent, allowing for party representation is simply not possible.

Continuing the evolution

No democracy is perfect. A cynic might say that democracy is the name we give the people whenever we need them! Each democracy is, as Henry Belling-ham said of OT constitutions, a, "work in progress." What is of great interest to me is how we can achieve what we must in order to mature, develop and keep pace with our progress as a territory. We have many challenges ahead of us at present. Our Islands have made huge economic progress since 1982. We have a balance sheet that would be the envy of many nations. We have the prospect of oil exploitation in the near future and of course this brings with it increased pressure from Argentina.

It is time for us to look at our system and accept that it is not perfect and that it will always require changes and improvements. Some of the more standard means of scrutiny open to other countries, such as an elected opposition, will not be practical possibilities until we grow the population.

However, there are many things that we can do in the meantime to improve what we already have. I would welcome views from people and colleagues both within the Falklands and, equally as important, from other countries which have faced similar challenges.

FOLLOWING last year's success in producing an animated film of the Three Kings made by North Arm and Goose Green School, the children of Camp Education East Falklands have now co-produced another movie telling the traditional nativity story of the birth of Jesus. This is told through the observations of the Christmas trees in the forest behind the stable, with a twist.

With great imagination and professionalism, the Falklands children produced the backgrounds and the puppets were created by Primary Children in the Island of Fetlar, Shetland.

Each puppet speaks with the voice of a pupil, their parents or teacher from Camp Education or Fetlar.

A spokesperson for Camp Education told Penguin News: "All of our pupils from FS1 to Y5 have thrown themselves enthustastically into the project. Some of the voices were recorded in their schools, over the phone or in many differing locations. The children did not hear the interaction with other people until the premier this week.

The Head of Camp Education in the Falklands, Tom Hill, said: "It's great to have friends across the world and this has been a fantastic opportunity for children across East Falklands to become involved in something seasonal with an international dimension.

Kick smoking at dedicated KEMH clinic

A DEDICATED Smoking Cessation Clinic is to be launched by the hospital.

Dr Paver explained: "Hopefully most people are aware that nicotine replacement therapy for smokers trying to give up is freely available from the KEMH pharmacy and has been for some time.

"Some smokers stop successfully on their own, but the majority struggle and the evidence is strong that if smokers have the help not only of nicotine replacement but also of healthcare professionals their chances of giving up are greatly increased."

In order to enhance the service offered, from February 1, the pharmacy will encourage people to book an appointment with the practice nurses. The dedicated elinic will start at the beginning of March.

Dr Paver said: "The free weekly issue of nicotine replacement will continue but we hope that by offering added support through clinics with a more structured approach more smokers hoping to be ex-smokers will succeed."

Step closer to facility for oiled penguins

THE new wildlife facility that will home oiled seabirds and other rescued wildlife is one step closer to completion, confirmed Sarah Crofts of Falklands Conservation.

The latest phase was the transportation of steel corimec units from Mount Pleasant to a new site at the Department of Agriculture.

The need for a facility was identified during the Oil Spill Contingency Plan review in 2009.

Ms Crofts said, "Although we hope not to see oiled penguins, being prepared and having good facilities is key to successful rehabilitation when it does happen.

"Until now, all oiled seabirds have been accommodated in a small shed with no water or electricity making it challenging for volunteers and staff involved."

The project is the collaborative effort of FIG Veterinary Department, Falklands Conservation and the British Forces at Mount Pleasant: "The latter have been instrumental - donating not only the unused corimec units for the facility, but also in raising money, along with other charitable donations and a FIG contribution,"

said Ms Crofts.

She explained, "The BFSAI Conservation Group prepared the units for haulage into Stanley, kindly facilitated by Interserve Defence Ltd and Defence Infrastructure Organisation.

"At the Stanley end, Morrisons Ltd were very generous despite their busy schedule by preparing the site and reassembling the units.

"There is a still lot of work to make the facility operational, which will also double up as a wet lab for scientific work.

"FC wishes to thank everyone who has been involved with the project so far, with special thanks to CBF Brigadier Aldridge, George Johnson (IDL) and BF-SAI Environmental Theatre Protection Officer Roy Smith."

Annexation ambitions

DURING my recent holiday in New Zealand I was struck by the many different forms that "colonialism" took around the globe. Without doing much in the way of research (none, in fact), it is apparent that in New Zealand and Australia the experiences of the Maoris and Aborigines were Whereas significantly different. in New Zealand the official policy was recognition of its native inhabitants, to the extent that a Treaty was signed with them, in Australia no such recognition was accorded the Aborigines. (The good start in New Zealand was largely whittled away by greed and shady practices which the Maoris are still suffering from, but then we all know how the road to hell is paved.)

The combination of good intentions and faulty logic which lay behind the colonial experience in these countries - I have been told that James Cook's brief was that if a "new land" was populated by peoples showing some degree of civilization and land management, the country was to be deemed "inhabited" and unfortunately for the nomadic Aborigines they didn't quite tick all the boxes - highlights the difficulties of using "colonialism" as a catchall word with a concise meaning. Except perhaps, to the extent that under colonialism the wishes and powers of the native inhabitants were largely obliterated by the colonisers.

So the concept "colonialism" now conjures up horrible impressions - not altogether wrongly - of mistreatment of natives, exploitation and above all, imperial ambitions. It has served Argentina well as a catchword for attacking the UK in relation to the Falklands. But clearly they haven't really done any more research than I have and bandy the word around like a cudgel at a Flintstone family party - a handy tool for bashing and badgering anyone who disagrees with them without the need to have any idea what they are talking about.

So although I, like most, am rather gleeful to see that David Cameron has decided to get his own verbal bat out and join the fray. I can't help thinking that there is a more apposite and appropriate word to use than "colonialism" - with all its manylayered meanings - to describe Argentina's ambitions for the Falklands. I think "annexation" is a much clearer description. And like the Poles and the Czechs found out many years ago, in those circumstances there is not even a pretence that the wishes and powers of the native inhabitants should be deemed worthy of consideration. The road to hell is made of entirely more sinister material.

Waste of money

(A LETTER sent to MLA Dick Sawle.) I have heard, and also read in the Penguin News that there's a lot going on with our waterfront.

Dick, there is nothing wrong with our waterfront. All that is required is a two metre wide, concrete top put on it to make walking safe. I recall the Market Garden staff leveled off the verge between the sea wall and the road side kerb, and planted grass. Although a few years ago now, the last I saw of it, it was quite green, so why waste money that apparently the Falklands has not got?

The Public Jetty is another supposedly finished job (FIDC project). The building could be more favourably used by the Customs & Immigration Department, instead of then renting rooms in a private building.

When the underneath of the Public Jetty had the wooden piles replaced, a number of Falkland Islands qualified tradesmen stated that the repair work being done was a dead loss, that it could not hold against the weather. I also understood that Mr Roger Spink was interested in 'total renovation work' of the jetty. If we look at the East Jetty the FIC workforce fixed it. This was done by filling up underneath with big boulders, put in place with the use of their crane. Large rock was put on top and it was completed with a 6" thick concrete surface. A jetty that will last forever, and it's practically maintenance free

A local work group had been putting a new concrete top on the seawall from up West. I'm sure not a fraction of what this 'expert' will charge. FIDC should be made to leave our waterfront alone; it looks fine and has done for years. An extortionate expense caused by FIDC is not wanted.

Burnerd Peck Stanley PETER Pepper, who is writing a book on Falklands history with Dr Graham Pascoe is currently visiting the Falklands.

Penguin News invited Mr Pepper to comment on an accusatory article on the Falkland Islands that appeared recently in the Chilean press, and by doing so respond to many similar arguments being made by the Argentine government and the Argentine press with regard to their 'claim' to the sovereignty of the Falkland Islands.

LW: Peter, former Chilcan Foreign Minister Juan Gabriel Valdes used a number of historical and other arguments in Argentina's favour in an article in the Chilcan paper El Mercurio earlier this month. Are these arguments correct?

PP: No, Sr. Valdes got many of his facts wrong.

LW: Is it correct to suggest that the proximity of the Falklands to present day Argentina is an argument in favour of Argentine sovereignty over the Falklands.

PP: No; in international law proximity is of little importance. It does seem important to popular opinion, but in law it's history that counts, not proximity.

If proximity were important, the Channel Islands, which are within sight of France, would be French. Instead, they are British because of history - and the will of the people. These same reasons apply to the islands of Michelon and St. Pierre in the estuary of the St. Lawrence River. They are French, not Canadian. There are many other examples.

In any case, the Patagonian coast opposite the Falklands could just as easily have become Chilean. It only became Argentine after the Argentines seized what is now Puerto de Santa Cruz in 1878 to put a stop to Chilean activity there, and this was confirmed by treaty in 1881.

LW: Sr. Valdes points out that the Falklands are 12,000 kilometres from Britain. Is it important that Britain is so far away from the Falklands?

PP: No. This is the same issue as proximity. Australia and other parts of the old British empire are further away still. That didn't make them any less British when they were colonies. Argentina is also thousands of kilometres away from its mother country, Spain, and was a colony too. The Spanish empire stretched all around the world.

LW: Sr. Valdes makes the point that there was no war between Britain and Argentina in 1833. Is this fair comment?

PP: There was no war, but the Falklands were in chaos then, and there had been violence. And Britain had protested diplomatically in 1829 about Argentine activities there.

The chaos started when Louis Vernet seized three American sealing vessels in 1831. As a reprisal, and to stop it happening again, the American warship *Lexington* broke up Vernet's tiny settlement at Port Louis. The Americans had been catching seals in the Falklands for at least 60 years before then, and did not recognise Vernet's, ie. Argentina's, right to stop them.

When the *Lexington* left in January 1832, it persuaded all of Vernet's European settlers and most of his black slaves to go too – a total of about 40 people. It also took seven more men as prisoners for involvement in the seizure of the American ships. This left only about 25 people in the Falklands, most of them gauchos.

Britain then became alarmed by what the *Lexington* had done and ordered a warship to visit the Falklands once a year to maintain Britain's sovereignty rights - and ensure that no foreign forces were stationed there. Britain was just as worried then about the possibility of more American action as it was of further Argentine action. And Britain's action did in fact forestall another visit by the *Lexington* to stop more Argentine harassment of American sealing vessels.

EW: Did Britain expel an Argentine population and governor in 1833?

PP: No; Sr. Valdes has been misled by Argentine propaganda. Britain only expelled a recently arrived Argentine garrison, and there was no Argentine governor then.

Captain Onslow of HMS *Clio*, which was the British warship concerned in 1833, had orders not to molest any civilians, but to expel any foreign forces.

The gauchos were still there, and Onslow was also particularly keen for them to stay, as they were the only ones who could hunt the wild cattle, and so provide fresh beef for visiting ships. But the gauchos were unhappy about the treatment they were getting from Vernet and his men. Captain Onslow actually mentioned this in his report and described the difficulty he had persuading twelve gauchos to stay.

However, despite Captain Onslow's pleas for them to stay, two did decide to go. They were the Brazilian gaucho Joaquin Acuña and his woman Juana and the Uruguayan gaucho Mateo Gonzalez and his woman Marica. But they left of their own free will. The rest stayed. The last of them died in the Falklands in 1871.

The group that Captain Onslow told to go was a tiny Argentine garrison that had only been there just less than three months.

That Argentine garrison only went there because of the dispute with the Americans over

scaling rights. The American Government had tried to negotiate an agreement to allow them to continue scaling - as American ships had been doing for at least 60 years. But those negotiations failed in September 1832 because of what the Lexington had done earlier that year. So the American negotiator left Buenos Aires and, possibly as a snub to the Americans, the Argentines sent the tiny garrison to the Falklands. It was commanded by an interim "Comandante" for the Falklands, Etienne Mestivier, who was a Frenchman in the Argentine army. But the British minister in Buenos Aires then, Henry Fox, protested diplomatically about this on the 28th September that year -- although the ship taking Mestivier and the garrison had just sailed.

That garrison arrived in the Falklands on the 6th October 1832, and Mestivier was murdered by his own men a few weeks later on the 30th November in a mutiny. The mutineers then went on to cause chaos in what was left of the settlement and to terrify the handful of people there

It was this mutinous garrison that the *Cho* found in January 1833 and told to go. It consisted of just 26 men (with their 11 wives and 8 children). It's absurd to describe them as a 'population'. And seven of them were executed when they got back to Buenos Aires.

Mestivier was only an interim Comandante Politico y Militar, not a full governor, but he had been dead for more than a month by the time the British ship arrived. The ship that had brought Mestivier and the Argentine garrison got back to Port Louis four days before the Clio arrived, and its captain did try to take control there. But he couldn't be deseribed as a governor.

The falsehood that Britain expelled an Argentine population in 1833 is the best known Argentine argument against self-determination for the present Islanders. Argentina has misled the world and the UN with it.

The Argentine argument goes that the right to self-determination belonged to that original expelled "population," not those that replaced them. That is absurd when the few civilians there in 1833 were not expelled. A garrison there for just three months, and whose departure from Buenos Aires had been the subject of a British protest, cannot become a 'population'. If the Argentine troops in 1982 had survived three weeks longer, they would have been there three months. Would that have made them into a 'population'? Of course not

There had, of course, been no native population in the Falklands. There is some absurd Argentine reasoning here. In Argentina itself a native population was largely exterminated to make way for European immigrants, who now enjoy self-determination. Why shouldn't Falkland Islanders have this too when Britain had not exterminated or expelled a native population?

LW: Did Britain implant a population in the Falklands? And if so, should this mean that the current Falklands population has no right to self-determination?

PP: No. Argentina makes it sound as if Britain deliberately sent in settlers over the decades in order to frustrate Argentina now. That's just Argentine propaganda.

In fact the single biggest intake of immigrants was the 150 gauchos who arrived from Montevideo in two ships in November 1846 and May 1847 to work for Samuel Fisher Lafone. They mainly came from Uruguay, but many were in fact Argentine.

A few Falklands families are descended from soldiers sent at times to the Falklands. But most of today's Islanders got here under their own steam: just like the millions of people who immigrated to Argentina and other parts of the New World. Argentina itself had many incentives for immigrants.

There are now many sixth, seventh and eight generation Islanders. It's absurd to say they have no right to self-determination. If they don't, then the same should be true in Argentina, and the handful of surviving native Indians should be the only ones to decide what is done in Argentina.

Also a couple of dozen settlers here had assisted passages in the 1860s before the scheme was stopped, but most of these left again. In any case that scheme only started after the Convention of Settlement between Britain and Argentina was ratified in 1850. That settled all outstanding disputes between Britain and Argentina. This is something that Argentines prefer to forget, and clearly didn't tell Sr. Valdes about. Argentina dropped its claim then for the next 34 years, and there are statements by Argentine politicians saying there were no outstanding problems with Britain. Argentina only revived its claim in 1884 - after it had consolidated its hold on the coastline opposite, at Chile's expense.

By contrast with the Falklands many Caribbean countries really do have largely implanted populations, and yet no one queries their right to self-determination. I remember thinking about that when I watched Argentines complaining about the alleged implanted nature of the Falklands population to Donatus Keith St. Aimee at the University of Belgrano last year. He was descended from implanted slaves which make up most of the St. Lucia population, and yet was Head of the UN Decolonisation Committee.

LW: Sr. Valdes points out that Britain has not complied with UN calls for sovereignty negotiations. Is this fair criticism?

PP: I don't think so. No country is obliged to comply with UN resolutions. It's not a question of Britain having some privilege not to do so, because it is a member of the Security Council, as Argentina sometimes pretends. No country has to obey UN resolutions.

And the UN isn't a tribunal of justice either; it's a tribunal of influence, where countries try to get what they want by lobbying. The same goes for bodies such as Mercosur and the Rio Group. It is Argentine lobbying that has got them to say what Argentina wants. And that lobbying has often included the gross historical falsehoods I am mentioning here.

Also, I was reading Juan Yofre's new book "1982" recently. Interestingly he says Argentina spent 200 million dollars lobbying to get the UN resolution in November 1982, just after the war, that called for renewed negotiations, some of that being paid in wheat. That suggests that Argentina was buying votes then.

But Britain did do its best to negotiate a peaceful settlement of the dispute, as called for in 1965 by UN Resolution 2065. It was Argentina that stopped this process by invading the Falklands in 1982. This was a gross violation, not only of Resolution 2065, but also of international law - and of UN Resolution 31/49 which was passed in 1976. That resolution calls on both parties to the dispute to refrain from unilateral actions.

Since the 1982 invasion, Argentina has done other things unilaterally too. In 1994, it put a claim to 100% of the Falklands and South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands into its constitution.

That was clearly a breach of Resolution 31/49. UN Resolution 2065 hadn't said what a solution should be. It just asked the two parties to negotiate one. But now any solution would have to be a complete British capitulation even of territories such as South Georgia and the South Sandwich Islands that Argentina has only claimed relatively recently. This rules out any arbitration or legal case, as Argentina wouldn't be able to accept any result that went against its constitution.

Putting the Falklands into the Province of Tierra del Fuego in 2009 was another breach of Resolution 31/49. It would mean the Islanders being outvoted on everything by the much larger mainland population of that chaotic province. The Islanders' interests wouldn't count for anything.

LW: Argentina and Sr. Valdes also say that exploitation of Falklands natural resources is a breach of Resolution 31/49. Is this true?

PP: No. The oil exploration going on now only began after the 1995 Oil Agreement with Argentina. What is going on now is no different from the drilling program in 1998, which the Argentines made no complaint about at all.

The difference now is that Argentina repudiated that agreement in 2007. That was a unilateral act in breach of UN Resolution 31/49. Twelve years after it had begun, it was absurd for Argentina to expect oil exploration just to stop then, or for the ground rules to change dramatically in Argentina's favour.

It's Argentina that is breaking the rules here, not Britain.

LW: What about the complaint over missile firings?

PP: Argentina said that Britain was firing missiles "from" the Islands, and led the world to believe this was both something new, and which threatened South America. That was absurd. The missiles concerned were Rapier anti-aircraft missiles which only have a range of about seven kilometres.

They had been routinely testfired every year since the 1982 war, and these tests had been announced for safety reasons. Argentina just decided to make a fuss about them last year, and have misled Sr. Valdes into mentioning them.

LW: Last, but not least, do you think there is any chance of a "solution" of any kind now?

PP: Personally, I don't think so. Any move giving Argentina even a foothold here in the Falklands, would be ruthlessly exploited for more. Argentina is incapable of keeping agreements, and no guarantees for the Islanders would ever be kept.

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






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Seafront masterplan

THE public consultation stage of the Stanley Waterfront Masterplan project commenced on January 17.

This included a series of public sessions where members of the public were able to view and discuss the master plan options with Michael Betts, the FIDC Project Manager, and Geoff Phillips, the Lead Consultant from Marina Projects Ltd

A public meeting was also held in the Chamber of Commerce earlier this week where the master plan options were presented by FIDC and Geoff Phillips, who were also available for questions and comments

Public Consultation will continue until the February 3 during which time comments and input from residents and stakeholders are welcome. Mr Betts told Penguin News. He added that comments can be submitted by email to FIDC (mbetts@ fidc.co.fk) or by completing a feedback form to be returned to FIDC. Feedback forms can be obtained from the email address above or by calling FIDC on 27211. Each of the three option schemes has

been brought forward within the context of the Falkland Islands Economic. Tourism and Planning strategies with the aim of delivering a waterfront master plan that provides benefit for all explained Mr Betts and Mr Phillips, adding that, in particular it is the intention that the master plan delivers real amenity and public realm benefits for residents and improves the waterfront experience for visitors arriving from both land and sea.

Promotion of Stanley and the Falkland Islands as a 'gateway to the Antarctic' is also a theme and each Option provides a measure of improved facilities to support that initiative and in particular to encourage a greater level of engagement with smaller expedition ships.

The three options provide slightly different solutions for the master plan but all are considered to be of an appropriate scale for the Stanley setting, respectful of the history and character of Stanley and all with the potential to be delivered in phases. In each case it is anticipated that

the improvements to the public jetty and relocation of the Museum to the Historic Dockyard site will be brought forward as the priority packages of work.

Mr Betts and Mr Phillips provide a brief summary of each of the master plan option schemes and they say these should be read in conjunction with the accompanying plans and artist perspectives. The perspectives are provided to assist with an appreciation of form and scale and are concepts only at this stage. In due course the selected master plan Option will be subject of more detailed design development and consultation

Option 1: Under this scheme the existing public jetty is improved and extended and together with a scope of landside measures improves the facilities for visiting cruise ship passengers and will also assist in the management and marshalling of visitors and tour vehicles. A sheltered harbour is created opposite Christ Church Cathedral with pedestrian links along the waterfront. The harbour will function as an active waterfront with berthing for expedition yachts, marine leisure and tourism support craft and transient vessels. The harbour scheme will also incorporate an outer jetty for the berthing of small expedition ships. The Historic Dockyard will be converted to a museum and cultural centre and viewpoint promontory, suitably landscaped and with a continuation of the waterside footpath links to the War Memorials beyond and to Government House

Option 2: In this Option the existing public jetty is reconfigured to form an arm of a sheltered harbour accessed from the east. The cruise passenger facilities are relocated to a new embarkation/disembarkation position at the head of a mixed waterfront development located over the existing FIC pier. It is anticipated that the land development will incorporate a waterfront hotel and form the first phase of a more extensive development on the wider FIC land holding. The marshalling car parks for the cruise passengers will remain in their current location with enhancement measures provided along the







The Wool Market Report - January 19, 2012 by Agricultural Advisor Helen Thoday

The second EMI of the year closed at AUS1,190 down 26 cents on the highs of the opening index. This is 807p/kg clean in Stirling down 16pence. The large sale that took place combined with slow trading in China due to the Chinese New Year lestivities combined to drag the price down this week. A small sale next week and the Chinese back in active trading ma hopefully lift the prices once more.

Mid micron prices have stayed strong after exchange rate calculation and large falls have been seen at each end of the Micron range. Reflecting on last years prices the super fine micron has come back to prices that increase in a logical manner rather than the huge diferences seen between 18 – 19 micron and 20 – 22 micron in early 2011.

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ANOTHER few days of sun and heat without much wind; fortunately, there has also been some rain, not to mention the thunder and lightning that had us close to the window watching the spectacular display and the volume of noise it brought with it.

The main crop potatoes are flowering already; I find that a little troubling and hope it doesn't mean a bad crop. I daren't look underground to see what is happening but suspect I simply haven't watered them enough to help the developing tubers, we'll see what happens with time.

Because 1 got carried away getting more, new, seeds of early potatoes than we really needed 1 have ended up using most of the available space in the garden and now find that the winter 'greens', cabbages, sprouting broccolies, kales etc. are ready to be planted out and 1 have nowhere to put them. That will teach me not to be so greedy.... well, until next year anyway. Meanwhile 1 will just have to dig out some more early spuds to eat, oh dear, what a sacrifice that will be.

The swedes and carrots are filling out nicely now and the first lot of beetroot to be pickled has been done. It's now time to plant some more seeds of lettuce and beetroot and some more turnips to keep the fresh young vegetables coming on for as long as possible. These will be planted outside; not only do I find the heat in the tunnels unbearable to work in, but the plants are struggling in the heat also. Little by little they are both getting cleared out and cleaned up ready to put some overwintering vegetables in later on

In the greenhouse the tomatoes are colouring up, the pumpkins have set and the thornless blackberry is absolutely covered in fruit. Outside, the raspberries are ready, red and white currants too but the gooseberries are disappointingly low on fruit

and will have to be moved to another spot; it is obviously too dry for them there_Also_moved to a different location will be the strawberries outdoors; they are really suffering where they are at present and for the same reason.

The first few 'snacks' of fresh peas have been had and thoroughly enjoyed though they never got anywhere near the cooker; it looks like it is going to be a bumper year for them.


The flower beds continue to fill out. Last February we decided that the lawn in the front garden was a total waste of time; it was lumpy, dry, hard-packed and full of weeds. No amount of work, spiking, feeding and re-seeding was having any effect and so I took out my weed killer. Bill took out his trusty Rotavator a few days later and put it to work. He had to do this bit of land a few times as the tines couldn't always 'cut-in' and the whole machine was inclined to bounce as the ground was so hard.

I really wasn't too confident about this massive flower bed by this time, but we continued and, with the aid of hoses to mark it, we decided on the shaping of the path and beds so as not to have too many straight lines.

We've since had a new roof put on the house and the porch has been re-glazed and rooted too. this meant that there was quite a bit of foot traffic over the beds for some time. But, I was able to start planting by August and surprisingly, everything seems to be thriving, including the young roses which are growing so well they are starting to flower, I'm delighted to say the least. Though hopefully, next year it will look better as the plants grow and fill in the gaps, for much as I admire colour-themed gardens or those where everything is just so, they are not for me. I do like some form of boundary or edging but then fill them until they overflow. No plant in nature looks too large, small or garish next to

another and -for me- all plants are beautiful anyway, with the exception of those pesky weeds of course.

We seem to have some caterpillar damage this year, although I've not seen it around so don't know which one I'm dealing with. I have seen the mess it's left behind though, mainly shredded leaves! It seems to like soft, slightly hairy leaves such as those of Buddleias and some of the mallows. Hopefully it will go away and all will be well again, as I don't particularly wish to start spraying. Just hope it doesn't affect the flowers.

The Buddleia Globosa with its small yellow pompon flowers is looking great. As an evergreen its a good plant for hedges. The showier Buddleia Davidii with it's lilae type flowers is forming its flowers now; hopefully there should be pink and lilae. This is their second year from seed so have no idea yet; any purple ones are from last year's cuttings.

I had a butterfly land on my shoulder today, lovely surprise! It happened while I was tidying up the oriental poppies.

I'm hoping that by cutting them down and taking all the seed heads off the ferny growth will look more attractive and that they will give another show of flowers in a month or so time, I'm treating the Russell lupins in the same way. Both those plants get tatty and untidy once they have flowered but they are lovely, aren't they?

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





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Flt Lt Wales is here to do a job

"THERE are certain people that we would just like to allow to get on with their job if that's possible, and give them the opportunity to see as much of the Falklands as they possibly can," Commander British Forces Falkland Islands Brigadier Bill Aldridge said this week when asked about the deployment of Prince William to the Falkland Islands as an RAF search-and-rescue pilot.

Flight Lieutenant William Wales was scheduled to arrive at Mount Pleasant yesterday, Thursday February 2, to begin his six week tour.

The Brigadier also noted there had been indications that, "third parties" had already attempted to encourage persons on the Islands to take photographs: "I would be extremely grateful if people didn't, and I am sure it shouldn't be an issue with people in the Falklands..."

When asked if Prince William would have the opportunity to visit Stanley, Brigadier Aldridge said: "I tell all new arrivals the same. I encourage them to get out as much as possible, a. to meet the Falkland Islanders, b. to experience the fantastic scenery and c. to see the wildlife.

"It doesn't matter who you are I say the same to all of them, and I would expect them to make the most of it."

2012 security measures

Commenting on security at Mount Pleasant over 2012, the 30th anniversary of the Falklands War, he said, "I think throughout the year given the increased profile here we would like to be more stringent in checking people's identity; it is already checked but it is enforcing a rule that perhaps hasn't been enforced as well as it should have been in the past. That said I have been adamant with everybody on the front gate that people need to be sensible about realising that not everybody carries their passport or their drivers licence or some form of identity. So this isn't absolute, its just

common sense. And I think people would understand why we are being a little more stringent over the next weeks and months."

The Brigadier said it was a matter of being "sensible" but "without inconveniencing people," so that there is a higher awareness, "of who is around Mount Pleasant."

Asked about the current alert state at Mount Pleasant in relation to increased rhetoric from the Argentine government on the subject of the Falklands, he explained: "As I have said to other journalists there has been no change to the alert state, there is no change to our activity, we are no more or no less prepared than we have been over the last months or years.

"The threat (from Argentina) is not a military one at the moment but of course we are here to do whatever is needed, if necessary to defend the Islands, but first and foremost my job is to deter any military pressure against the Falklands or the other overseas territories."

He added he would not suppose to understand the inconveniences and pressures imposed on Islanders as a result of recent words and actions by Argentina, saying, "it would be far too pretentious of me to pretend to understand what you are put through. But if there is a threat here it is not military, and as a soldier it is about military matters I can speak and not

the political. But as someone who lives on the Islands I feel quite a lot of the pressures that everybody else does – we see things being less available in the shops, but I think it is fair to say that a lot of the furore such as it is, is generated by the media off-island and my impression is that there is an awful lot of debate and media coverage which is generated in the UK for UK readership and is not necessarily reflecting the reality of what life is like on the Islands or what the situation is."

The Brigadier confirmed that HMS *Clyde's* presence in Stanley last weekend was, "purely coincidental," explaining that it was a "demonstration of the various capabilities of the ships we have here and some of their embarked capabilities to the Governor and members of the government."

He said he was conscious "that for quite a few people MPA is seen to be remote and that perhaps there isn't as much integration as people would like."

The Brigadier would like to see "far more interaction between the military personnel and the personnel in the Falklands, so 1 am keen to keep MPA as open as I possibly can for those people who want to come to the cinema or use the pool, because of course you built those for us.

"And I would ask if people can bear with us and if people have difficulties or concerns about obtaining access please let us know." Friday, February 3, 2012

Odd incidents on New Island

STRANGE incidents on far north west New Island have left its residents Georgina Strange and Jason Stephenson bemused and nervous.

Inspector Len McGill was called to the island mid week to investigate the discovery late at night of a seal skull having been placed on the doorstep of Miss Strange's house. On inspection of the uninhabited house nearby it was discovered that doors had been left open.

There were only three inhabitants on the island at the time of the incident including a female scientist who was reported to be upset by the occurrence and invited to stay at Miss Strange's house as a result.

Miss Strange declined to comment on the incident, saying she did not wish to cause concern locally.

New Island, like a number of other small attractive islands, is frequently visited by foreign yachts, and there has been speculation locally that such visitors may have been involved in the incident.

Inspector Len McGill was not available yesterday prior to Penguin News going to print, to give further details.

WHEN asked by one of many visiting journalists just how eestatic were Islanders at the thought of Prince William coming to the Falklands this week, I was momentarily tempted to describe a conversation with my friend on Monday when, her voice bubbling with joy, she informed me that two incredibly exciting things had happened to her that day. The first it transpired was that she had grown a pepper, the second was that she had also managed to grow a cucumber.

Not, of course, that I didn't understand her glee bearing in mind the happiness I had also experienced on discovering three eggs wrapped in an old cup-a-soup packet and wrapped carefully with electrical tape sitting on the corner of my kitchen unit - a gift from my farmer mother. (It's a curious phenomenum in the Falklands that depending on the dearth, or outrageous price, of produce, the balance of power can change overnight from those proud poly-tunnel owning lettuce producers to individuals who have had the foresight to pick up a few pullets on E-chay.)

Of course we are delighted he has been deployed here, but in a country with such odd challenges that our worries can alter in seconds from a low lamb percentage to a neighbouring population of 3 million hell-bent on stealing our country by wiping out its residents via a scheme to reduce our vitamin c intake to zero (or so it seems) the visit of a Prince can perhaps seem strangely irrelevant. In fact were I to obtain an interview with the dashing young man my first question might very likely be "did you bring any bananas?"

A PAPER by Hagrannsoknir og Radgjof e.h.f. of leeland on the conclusion of the consultancy on the resource rent review was presented by the Director of Natural Resources John Barton to the Fisheries Committee on Wednesday.

The paper considered the main findings of the review process and final report from both the Falkland Islands Government and Falkland Island Fishing Company Association (FIFCA) perspective. Mr Barton noted: "Further work and analysis is necessary to translate the findings into a functioning system which could be considered further."

The work stemmed from the fishing industry expressing disquiet at the process by which fees were set and the level of some fee increases.

Mr Barton said: "Any process which results in fee increases is likely to attract some criticism unless the case for the increase is overwhelming."

Exco paper 228/08 set out the terms of reference for the consultancy. Tenders were invited and the contract was awarded to the Icelandic company

The main conclusions note that the Falklands is amongst a small number of fisheries which are consistently generating substantial profits or rents.

It adds that special fishery fees are relatively uncommon and largely unheard of at the levels entailed in Falkland fishing fees, where up to 67 per cent of the gross profit is being extracted, and over 80 per cent of the net profit in some cases after corporation tax is factored in.

The paper reports that the structure of the current fee system does not discourage fishing, but it does potentially discourage investment back into the fishery reducing the growth and long-term profitability of the sector.

It also notes that there are alternative fee options. The preferred fee option is assessed as being the option which has the least negative impact on investment propensity. This option is ranked more highly than the existing fee option.

The optimum fee level in absolute terms is viewed as being a complicated issue.

The report says, "On the one hand, fishing fees can only reduce economic efficiency in the fishing industry and retard its productivity growth. On the other hand, fishing fees are needed to fund government expenditures which may contribute both to social well-being and future economic growth."

The Fisheries Committee noted the findings of the Resource Rent Review and commended to Exco the setting up of a working group together with the tasks identified for the group.

Options on port facility

GOVERNMENT Projects Director Stephen Dent presented a paper to Executive Council (ExCo) in December relating to further work on options for the proposed new port facility.

It was noted that the next steps within the project will be for the FIG Projects Director to undertake a joint industry and public consultation process during late February.

Mr Dent is keen to draw together as much industry and public opinion throughout this process as possible in order to prepare a report to ExCo and welcomes thoughts on how the current facilities are meeting the present demands of various industries, how current facilities may cope with any future demands, the requirements of the proposed port development and a view on the various proposed locations.

FIG will release a detailed industry and public consultation plan shortly.

No crime wave, just ripples

THE difficulty of providing meaningful statistics from such a small community as ours was highlighted this week in the Report of the Chief Police Officer to the Police Committee, which dealt with the period between July 1 and September 30, 2011.

According to this report, the highest percentage of offences recorded, at 21.6 was in the category of forgery and counterfeiting. There is no particular need for everyone to check their change or the contents of their wallets, however, because this mini crime wave turns out to have consisted of a mere eight offences and was all the work of one person forging someone clse's name on cheques.

There was a total of 37 crimes reported during the same period, of which 36 were described as being complete. Of these, only four were closed as undetected, giving a detected rate of 88.8 per cent. The report points out that this includes the eight forgery charges to which a guilty plea was entered and six cases of driving over the prescribed limit. In this reporting period there were a total of 70 responses to incidents during normal working hours (0800 - 0200 hours). Of these 60 saw an officer deployed and on scene within the five minute response time. The other ten were low level responses and an officer was on scene within 12 minutes of the incident being reported.

There were two calls out of working hours (0200 - 0800) during the reporting period. Both of these incidents saw an officer deployed and on scene within the 15 minute response time.

During the first three months of the financial year there was a lower than anticipated level of revenue achieved. On this basis a shortfall of nearly £43,000 is predicted.

Cost of salaries of established staff was meeting the estimated expenditure despite being two officers short. For the same period in 2010, £3,415 was spent on overtime of officers compared with £8,327 for 2011, an increase of 144 per cent spent on overtime. At the same time the use of reserve officers was also increased with payments to reserves totalling £8,295 for the first quarter in 2010 compared to £12,842 for the first quarter of 2011, an increase of 55 per cent.

The Chief Police Officer reported that officers continue to be vigilant for drink drivers, speeders and the non use of seat belts. They are also enforcing vehicle licensing and driving standard offences. Drivers are being reported for these offences when they are detected.

Officers also continue to attend the Infant Junior School during peak times to assist and promote road safety with the children.

Public consultation opens on hire vehicle permit proposal

A FOUR week period of public consultation on a set of proposals for an interim permit scheme covering driving for hire or reward, including taxi and tourist drivers, began yesterday.

Road Traffic services in the Falkland Islands are governed by the Road Traffic Ordinance (RTO) and the day to day running is carried out by the Royal Falkland Islands Police (RFIP). The RTO has been in place since 1948 and has been subject to many revisions and additions as road and traffic related changes emerged.

Due to the increased road network and number of vehicles on the roads, Executive Council decided it was necessary to revise the RTO to allow for a more concise and up-to date document.

As part of this process Executive Council took the decision to introduce a permit scheme covering those driving passengers for hire or reward to be implemented before the RTO is re-drafted. It also decided that there should be a period of public consultation on proposals for an interim scheme.

It is proposed that the scheme should cover everyone driving for hire or reward. This will include everyone driving a taxi and everyone who drives tourists who are paying to be driven, whether the tourists are paying directly or have their fares paid for by another agency.

The consultative document produced on the proposed scheme by the Royal Falkland Islands Police states that the purpose of the scheme is to provide members of the public with confidence about their safety while in the care of a hire or reward driver, such as a taxi driver or a tourist driver and to ensure care for the customer and a high regard for the health and safety of anyone using the services of taxis or tourist vehicles.

In its initial stages, the permit system will not look at the condition of vchicles as this is only an interim solution. It is likely, however, that this will follow in due course as an increased safety measure.

It is proposed that the interim scheme should cover everyone wishing to drive for hire or reward on any licence. This will include those driving a PSV who wishes to carry fare-paying passengers. PSV licence holders are not asked to declare any health issues or convictions during their application, which those applying for a permit would be.

The application process for hire or reward permits will be administered by the RFIP Licensing Bureau.

Showers but no real rain yet



Craig keeps an eye on the sky DRYER than average weather this summer and seasonal demands for extra water are causing problems for PWD's Water Supervisor Craig Paice.

Despite the cloud bursts on Wednesday night. Mr Paice is appealing to the people of Stanley to be conscious of their water use.

Hoping to be able to avoid issuing a hosepipe ban, Mr Paice says that watering gardens during the heat of the day when evaporation is at its height, is a wasteful practice, which if avoided could make a significant difference. With the average toilet cistern holding around seven litres of water, the avoidance of excessive flushing by the inhabitants of Stanley could also help considerably.

Below average rainfall in December, when only about 12mm fell instead of the 35-45mm normally expected, has put a strain on the available reserves. Now that the Liev Erikssen rig is operational, some 800 cubic metres of water per week has been added to a demand already inflated by the requirements of the abattoir during its busy season.

In the longer term, PWD has plans for an additional water source located between Mount Kent and the Two Sisters, but this has still to pass through the relevant planning procedures. For the moment Craig Paice would just be happy with what he describes as, "a good hit" of about eight to twelve millilitres, or about eight to ten hours of constant rainfall.

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Legislative Assembly Diary

Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

JOURNALISTS seem to appear on every flight, the recent flurry of interest has been more sustained than on previous occasions. Much of the cover appears to be reasonably accurate given my theory that if they get more than 30 per cent right it is better than average. Several more are doing the rounds this week and many admit to being surprised at what they find. Certainly South American journalists who have been drip fed Argentine propaganda longer than most tend to have to review all their preconceptions within hours of arriving.

A quite different challenge arises shortly when the UK university fees rise, we have to find a way of ensuring that we can continue investing in our young people because we really are seeing the success of our use of increased income for education and training from the late 80s. At a meeting that I will not name in order not to embarrass anyone, 1 noted that half the participants were products of those years of investment in education: a seriously impressive group whose qualifications and skills are going to be crucial in the coming few years. Unfortunately we are not always constructive in our approach, I have heard people complaining in one breath about people with lots of bright ideas and no local knowledge being parachuted in from overseas to do one job but almost in the same breath criticising a local appointment to another post, somehow implying that they are not up to it. Perhaps it is a hangover from the days when many people had not had the benefit of appropriate education and training and the confidence they engender.

Similar denigration comes into play from all our armchair road building and construction experts who are always ready to pass judgement on projects without bothering to enquire, for example, what the specification was and whether it has been adhered to or not. I also sometimes despair when we have made a decision on a road upgrade, based on advice from the Transport Advisory Committee and others, only to receive angry messages from others who think their stretch is much worse.

Martin and Hugh fight it out in South Georgia half marathon

SOUTH Georgia Government's Martin Collins took first place in the South Georgia half marathon on Monday January 30, with former Falklands SCB Marathon winner Hugh Marsden in second place.

This year's run was reported to be a particular success with excellent weather and a large number of runners and walkers, nineteen turning out to take part. Winner Martin Collins completed the course in thr 47 minutes, closely followed by Hugh Marsden in thour 52 minutes. Young Falkland Islander Julian Pole Evans completed his first ever half marathon in 2hrs 25 minutes and Kalinka Rexer-Huber was the first female finisher in 2 hours and 18 minutes.

The course is certainly one of the toughest half marathons in the world, with a 1,000 feet climb up Brown Mountain before runners must face four miles and an equally steep descent on the other side.

The route also takes in the old whaling station at Grytviken and the remains of an Argentine helicopter from 1982. Participants then head back up the Bore Valley, over Deadmen's Cairn (600 feet) to Maiviken Hut before finally running back to King Edward Point and the start finish line at the jail.

With no roads and only a small part of the route over tracks - the rough stony terrain, tussac and boggy mossland is a real challenge for even the hardiest fell runner. This year runners participated from the Falkland Islands, South Georgia, UK, Norway, New Zealand, Australia and South Africa.

MPs debate harassment of Spanish vessels

LABOUR politician Lord Moonic this week asked the British government what discussions they have had with the Government of Spain about alleged harassment of Spanish vessels in Falkland Islands waters by the Argentine coastguard.

Minister of State, Foreign and Commonwealth Office, Lord Howell of Guildford, replied,

"There has, to date, been no harassment of Spanish-owned vessels within Falkland Islands territorial waters.

Our embassy in Madrid has discussed the Argentine harassment of Spanish-owned vessels in River Plate waters with the outgoing Spanish authorities, and we will raise this with the new Spanish Government. These vessels were exercising their right of innocent passage when travelling to and from the Falkland Islands and the port of Montevideo.

The Government of Uruguay and the Spanish embassy in Montevideo have also made statements criticising Argentina's attempts to infringe on the right of innocent passage in River Plate waters."

Routine deployment for HMS Dauntless

THE deployment to the Falklands of one of the Royal Navy's two newest Type 45 destroyers, HMS Dauntless, was described as routine by Foreign Secretary William Hague, who told media that the British ship, "packs a very considerable punch.

Dauntless is armed with supersonic Sea Viper missiles and an air defence system which it is claimed can take out targets the size of a cricket ball moving at

three times the speed of sound. A Royal Navy spokesman down played the S1 billion destroyer's deployment and rejected the idea that it was a sign of escalation in the tensions between Britain and Argentina.

The Royal Navy has had a continuous presence in the South Atlantic for many years. The deployment of HMS Dauntless to the South Atlantic has been long planned, is entirely routine and replaces another ship on patrol." the spokesman told the Guardian.

According to newspaper reports from Dauntless's home port of Portsmouth, we can expect to see the ship in the Falklands in March, when it will replace HMS Montrose as the Royal Navy's principal asset in the South Atlantic

The Argentine government as well as objecting to Prince William's posting to the Falklands also objected to the deployment of HMS Dauntless, stating this week, "Argentina rejects the British attempt to militarise a conflict regarding which the UN has said both nations must resolve though bilateral negotiations."

BACTEC off to flying start

FOLLOWING BACTEC's rapid in-country training and accreditation in the first week of January, land clearance operations have now been running for three and a half weeks. Work is taking place behind the Stanley common fence south of the MPA road

DPO Programme Manager Robin Swanson told Penguin News: "Progress has been remarkable; all minefields have now had their perimeters flailed. Keith Heathman has almost completed fencing the northern minefield closest to the road and the Zimbabwean searchers have searched and cleared a large chunk of the area to be released. Weather has been on our side; a stark comparison to the summer of 2009/10 which was the worst on record."

Mr Swanson also noted a visit had been made to the site on January 18 by MLAs Jan Cheek and Mike Summers, HE the Governor and the Suspect Hazardous Area Land Release Committee (SHALARC) which includes MLA Barry Elsby, key members of FIG and representation from Government House and HQ BF-SAL

He said SHALARC had been exposed to the decision making process for releasing the land and would be briefed again if changes to that process arise during the project as a result of new information or discoveries and again at the end of the programme.

Mr Swanson said there had

Under the Falkland Islands Constitution, the PAC comprises:

been a number of unexploded ordnance (UXOs) and practice rounds located so far, mainly sub-surface. These had been safe to move, "and may well be taken away for demolition at a designated site later in the programme."

He said Falklands residents, "may have heard a demolition on Friday Jan 27, when an Argentine M5 grenade was destroyed in a controlled explosion. The same week, an unfired and un-fused 155 mm high explosive artillery projectile was also discovered just under the ground surface not far from the road."

Andy Frizzell, Project Manager of BACTEC, said "This was a significant and important find. We've been told this was a former Argentine artillery position and obviously this shell never got fired and has lain undiscovered

Finally, BACTEC released a large chunk of cleared land to the DPO this week for Quality Control purposes. Under International Mine Action Standards, a certain quantity of any cleared land must be sampled again by an independent agency (the DPO) to validate the quality of the clearance process. Robin Swanson said afterwards, "there were no finds at all in the 44 sampled areas which allows BACTEC to continue searching the next lot of land with considerable confidence about the quality they are achieving.

Ministers praise Sukey and MLAs

BRITISH Labour MP IAN Murray this week invited Minster of State for the FCO Jeremy Browne, "to put on record the contribution that the Falkland Islands representative in Britain, Sukey Cameron, makes to the agenda, and the work that she does through her office to ensure that the Falkland Islands stays at the top of the political agenda in the UK, and to ensure that trips, such as the one the Minister is to make in June, are well-organised and well-informed.

Mr Browne replied that he was happy to pay tribute to Ms Cameron, adding, "I meet her frequently, and she is a great champion of the Falkland Islands and Islanders and makes an extremely compelling case for their interests.

He also payed tribute to the members of the Legislative Assembly, "who have been extremely effective in their meetings with other countries at explaining their position, in a way that many countries find compelling when they hear it directly from representatives of the Falkland Islands rather than just the British Government. I know those efforts are intensifying, and I welcome them."

ExCo summary

A SURVEY on time change preferences resulted in a clear majority favouring year round summer time, it was noted in the Executive Council Summary this week. The change will now be made permanent.

At the meeting of Executive Council on January 25, 2012 there were two substitutions for members currently overseas; the Honourable Gavin Short stood in for the Honourable Dick Sawle and the Honourable lan Hansen for the Honourable Sharon Halford.

The first of the financial papers dealt with the upgrade of some FIDF equipment and was agreed.

Additional funding was also agreed for West Falkland roads to allow the completion of some more work this season.

Agreement was given for a new special coin issue to mark the hundredth meeting of the Stanley Sports Association which will take place later this year.

The first paper in the legal and legislation section of the meeting was draft legislation to allow FIG to use independent actuaries to be engaged to carry out actuarial reviews of the pension funds. Executive Council agreed that it should be gazetted prior to presentation to Legislative Assembly.

The publication of proposed Amendment to the Administration of Justice Bill intended to close the loophole created by the time limit on prosecutions for some sexual offences was also approved.

Two papers were agreed relating to the registration of bare boat charters of fishing vessels and one allowing the delegation to FIG officers of off shore drilling approvals in certain circumstances.

The final paper in this section dealt with the forthcoming census. Members had some queries and suggested that one or two of the questions should be clarified and that it be made clear that anyone may choose to complete a paper copy rather than complete the census online if they wish.

Of the policy papers the FIG performance report and the abbreviated version of the Island Plan with some small modifications was noted, and MLAs approved both the FIDC business plan and the draft FIG IT Usage Policy.

A conversion of a PWD post was agreed as were new members for HMSC and the FLH board.

Verdict on baby's death

EARLY this week HM Coroner for the Falkland Islands, Carl Gumsley delivered his verdict in the Inquest touching upon the death of Baby Nivek McLaren.

On Monday, January 27, 2012, the Coroner found that Nivek had died from the effects of the infection, Staphylococcus Aureus which had led on to acute pneumonia.

During the Inquest the Coroner had heard evidence from a large number of hospital staff and had received written expert evidence from a number of UK experts.

The Corner expressed considerable concern in respect of a number of matters that came to light during the evidence. In particular he was concerned at the lack of protocols in force in respect of premature babies, the lack of any care plan having been formulated in the case of Baby Nivek, the lack of any specialised training the majority of the staff who were looking after Nivek had received. the lack of full note keeping and the fact that Baby Nivek and his parents had effectively been left on their own during the night. and without any proper medi-cal checks, for a period of about 8 hours, despite Nivek showing signs of possible illness earlier.

Other evidence revealed that Nivek's father had been sent to the West Store to get baby milk because the milk offered by the hospital was out of date, and that equipment used during the resuscitation attempt appeared not to have been working properly.

The Coroner said that he had thought long and hard about

whether the correct verdict was one of Natural Causes contributed to by Neglect.

However, although he considered that there had been a number of significant failures on the part of the hospital, the evidence had suggested that the infection was so serious that, even if these failures had not occurred, it was unlikely that Nivek would have survived. Consequently the appropriate verdict was Natural Causes.

As a result of his findings the Coroner announced that he would be writing to the hospital management to seek clarification in respect of a large number of matters and make recommendations which he hoped would be considered and implemented as a matter of urgency, in order to reduce the chance of anything like this happening again.

The Coroner offered his sincere condolences to Nivek's parents and stressed that the evidence had clearly shown that they had done all that they could have been expected to have done in their care of Nivek.

The King Edward VII Memorial Hospital released a statement in which Director of Health and Education David Jenkins said, "As they have been since March last year, our thoughts are with the family of Baby Nivek and we offer our most sincere condolences for their loss.

"Due to the nature of the inquest I thought it best to issue a public statement.

"The outcome of the inquest was death by natural causes, and

it appears unlikely that if KEMH staff had acted differently the death of Baby Nivek could have been prevented.

"However, Her Majesty's Coroner has noted throughout the inquest a number of areas where he feels the care afforded Baby Nivek could have been improved upon. Some of the issues had already been indentified by an external specialist neonatologists and internal KEMH review shortly after the death and have either been addressed or work is ongoing to address them."

Mr Jenkins said the issues raised by HM Coroner would be reviewed and responded to in a comprehensive report from himself to Executive Council in the near future.

He said, "The Government takes the care of all patients very seriously, especially those that are vulnerable. We still have further to go before we achieve all that we have set out to do, but we believe good progress has been made in some areas to ensure that similar tragedies are prevented wherever possible.

"KEMH operate in a remote and challenging healthcare environment where certain conditions and medical issues are only dealt with on a very irregular basis. I do not offer these up as excuses for any failings in care provided, but merely to note the particular challenges we face.

"If any member of the public has any questions or concerns about the service KEMH provide I would encourage them to please contact me directly."

The girls are point of lay (16 weeks plus), so a good size and able to go straight into the main hen run and house. However, one of them was being severely bullied and the lady was naturally concerned and seeking advice.

Hens being hens will always have a go at newcomers. There's no hard and fast rule how to stop it, but here are a few tips that might help.

Introduce new birds to the hen house in the dark and shut the pop hole so that they are all let out at the same time next morning. If possible, introduce more than one bird so that there a not a sole recipient of the bullving. Generally, if they have enough space, the new ones can run away from the bullying until accepted into the flock. If the 'hen pecking' doesn't stop. or you are introducing just one bird, try taking one of the older ones out of the run and palling it up with the new one(s) in another temporary area and gradually introduce more of the older to the new. If it's not their territory, it makes a more level playing field! Obviously, if there is any damage done, the injured bird should be treated. The problem with removing the bird is that you won't get over that bullying period, you'll just postpone it. Bullied birds tend to hide inside until this 'sorting of the pecking order' is over, and because of the darker environment, the harassment eases up. Just put some food and water in there for a couple of days and check the birds every few hours or so. A rooster often sorts out any fighting amongst the girls, but not always, sometimes it can be worse as the new girls are then dealing with his amorous attention as well!

If you've reared your own chicks with a hen, don't take the hen away from the chicks when they get older. Put her in the hen run with her brood of juveniles (no younger than six weeks old) and she will protect them until accepted, and she will probably start laying again. There's nothing as brave and feisty as a hen with her babies.

Blue Water Medal for Thies and Kicki

THE Cruising Club of America (CCA) has awarded its esteemed 2011 Blue Water Medal to Thies Matzen and Kicki Ericson for a commendable 24 years and 135,000 miles of sailing the oceans of the world with a focus in the high latitudes of the Southern Ocean.

Thies and Kicki, who have in the past spent two extended periods in the Falkland Islands will be well-known to many Penguin News readers.

Thies's skills as a boat repairer and joiner have been appreciated by many, while Kicki, who is an architect by training was responsible for surveying buildings and drawing up plans for the proposed move of the Stanley museum to the historic dockyard area.

After their last visit to the Falklands which included some time on West Point, 'island-sitting' for the Napiers, the couple set sail in their yacht *Wanderer III* for South Georgia, where Thies's skills were once again put to good use in the museum. Thies and Kicki were already no strangers to the island having been married in the Norwegian whalers' chapel at Grytviken in 1998.

The first Blue Water Medal was awarded in 1923; and is given to "the most meritous example of seamanship." Its recipients,

which have in the past included Jerôme and Sally Poncet, are selected from among yachtsmen and women of all the nations. Thies and Kicki's medal will be presented by Commodore Daniel P. Dyer, III at the annual Awards Dinner on March 2, 2012 at New York Yacht Club in Manhattan.

Thies Matzen was born in Germany in 1956 and grew up to be a wooden boat builder. In 1981, he purchased *Wanderer III*, a 30 foot wooden sloop, built in 1952 for Eric and Susan Hiscock who made two circumnavigations with it and received the Blue Water Medal in 1955. Matzen sailed *Wanderer III* to Scandinavia where he cruised extensively, including to the Lofoten Islands and then crossed the Atlantic Ocean. In 1989, while sailing in the Caribbean, he met Swedish-born Kicki Ericson, and the two have lived on *Wanderer III* ever since.

After leaving the Caribbean, they sailed through the Panama Canal and into the Pacific Ocean where they spent seven years before sailing to Indonesia, exploring the Indian Ocean, and sailing around the Cape of Good Hope.

From 1997 to 1999, Thies and Kicki made two circuits of the South Atlantīc, starting in Cape Town and visiting Argentina, the Falkland Islands, and South Georgia before heading back to Cape Town and South America, where they rounded Cape Horn before returning to the Pacific.

The couple's last twelve years have been filled with explorations in the Southern Ocean, including Tasmania, the Auckland Islands, Antarctica and the Falkland Islands. Recently the two spent 26 months in South Georgia. Currently, Matzen and Ericson are in Brazil and plan to do some work on *Wanderer III*, which has been kept in its original condition with no electronics on board except a VHF radio and handheld GPS.

The vessel, the smallest boat to sail to and from South Georgia, has a 16 horsepower diesel engine and the hull, rigging and gear have been self-maintained using traditional methods.

Keith Padgett steps in to fill the CE gap

A PRESS release from Government House on Monday announced that the Governor was pleased to be able to report that Mr Keith Padgett, who at present is FIG's Financial Secretary, has agreed to take on the additional duties of the role of Chief Executive on an interim basis

Mr Padgett will take on the mantle of Chief Executive with effect from February 1, 2012 until such time as a successor for the

current Chief Executive, Dr Tim Thorogood, is recruited and appointed.

The release quotes Mr Padgett as saying that he was looking forward to taking on this interim role "at what is an exceptionally exciting time in the Islands history

Mr Padgett is no stranger to the duties of this post, having occupied it on an interim basis in the past, when Dr Thorogood has been on leave.

New ambassador is former air hostess

THE appointment of a close friend of the Kirchners' and of Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez as Argentine Ambassador to London has been greeted favourably by the British Foreign Office according to press reports. On Monday, Mercopress re-

ported that the British government acknowledged on Friday the naming of the new Argentine ambassador to the United Kingdom, and stated that they hoped the coverage of the long-vacant posi-tion would permit, "the strengthening of cooperation" between the two countries."

Alicia Castro, who Penguin News sources state was once an Aerolineas Argentinas air hostess, is said to have played an important role as head of Argentina's Caracas embassy.

'We take with great satisfaction the decision to name an Ar-gentine ambassador to London," stated a spokesperson for the British Foreign Office a day after the nomination of Alicia Castro to the position.

"We hope that this provides us with the opportunity to strengthen the cooperation between our two countries, including bettering bilateral relations, working together on world challenges such as combating climate change and strengthening collaboration in science and innovation," the spokesperson added, without mentioning the differences between the two countries over Argentina's claim to the sovereignty of the Falklands.

The role of Ambassador to London has been vacant for nearly four years and Ms Castro takes the place last occupied by Federico Mirres, who left office in August 2008 at the end of his mandate to retire.

The appointment of an ambassador after such an absence comes at a time of heightened diplomatic activity over the Falklands sovereignty dispute.

The Argentine foreign ministry sent out a communique on Thursday stating, "on this occasion the Argentine government would like to reiterate, again, their request for dialogue with the British government to comply with the resolutions made by the United Nations over the matter of the Malvinas Islands.'

Ms Castro has a unionist and lawmaker background and her last post was Argentina's ambassador to Venezuela.

1982 Goose Green 2 Para A Coy **Commander in Falklands visit**

AN unexpected, but welcome visit to the Penguin News office was made this week by retired Major-General Dair Farrar-Hockley MC and his wife Vicky.

In 1982, the then Major Farrar-Hockley was awarded the Military Cross for his leadership of 2 Para's A Company in the assaults on Goose Green and Wireless Ridge

In his second visit to the Falk-lands since 1982, Major General Farra-Hockley told Penguin News that while he would be paying his respects to fallen comrades the main purpose of the visit was to show his wife the Islands' wonderful wildlife.


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
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

hearathon raises £2,3 THE West Falklands Shearathon

2012 raised over £2,300 for the Cancer Support and Awareness Trust last week

The aim of the event was to shear sheep in as many sheds as possible on West Falklands in as short a time as possible. The fundraiser was the brain child of Tex Alazia who had the idea after observing the success of the 24 hour motorbike challenge on West Falkland a few years before.

As a contract shearer as well as a farmer, Tex believed this would be something he could manage and he was keen to undertake the challenge to raise funds for charity. After persuading Kevin Marsh to be his shearing co-pilot and Lisa Newman to be rousie. Justin Knight was persuaded to he driver

The team of four was unanimous that any funds raised should go to Cancer Support, a cause close to their hearts and one which has touched many lives on West Falklands. Nuala and Keith Knight later asked if they could accompany the shearathon team as additional helpers/back up vehicle.

The team started the shearing feat at Shallow Harbour at 4 am on Friday as the sun began to rise. The red and purple of the sky through the open shearing shed doors was pretty awesome, but not an unusual sight for us early risers on the West. From the starting line at Shallow Harbour the two rovers sped north west to Chartres and the farms around the Hill Cove and Dunbar area, then North to Port Howard, Manybranch and Bold Cove before heading south to Port Stephens and all the farms south of Fox Bay. The final leg was north from Port Stephens to Fox Bay. Practically every farm on West Falkland was visited over the course of the day.

From the first shed until the last sheep, it was a race against the clock. All eating and drinking had to be done on the hoof. On arrival at the host farm, vehicle doors would fly open, shearers would jump out, get set up and would be



shearing within a couple of minutes

No more than fifteen minutes later they were hot-footing it back out the door and into the rovers before tearing off to the next farm. Host farms helped keep up the fast pace by telephoning ahead to the next farm to make sure they had the sheep in and were ready for the team to roll as soon as they landed.

The sprinting paid off as the team were ahead of schedule for the first part of the day, providing a cushion for delays or problems. No problems were encountered but the extra time was gradually eaten up as the team slowed down as the hours travelling and shearing mounted.

It wasn't the sleep deprivation, the shearing or the travelling that the team found the hardest part of the day. It was counting the number of cattle-grids passed en route on the day. In return for shearing sheep, farmers had to guess the answers to three questions: How many sheep would be shorn? How many miles would be travelled? How many cattle grids would be crossed?

In order to know the answers to the questions, the team had to count each. The sheep and the mileage were easy to count but the cattle-grids were tricky; they appeared to be camouflaged, and counters were reduced to mumbling "you are at cattle-grid" otherwise they would be sailed over without being registered. The cattle grid count generated a bit of rivalry between the two drivers. The boys would roar suspiciously "how many have you got?" as they stopped at each shed.

MEMBERS of the Chilean Community in the Falklands met on Tuesday night to voice their disquiet about the threat to the weekly LAN flight between the Islands and Punta Arenas posed by recent statements from the President of Argentina. Organisers of the meeting Antoine Daille and Fernanda Tapia said that its purpose was to send a message to the Chilean Government not to abandon them, but to stand firm against any pressure from Argentina. A peaceful demonstration was planned for Victory Green on Thursday night and a further meeting for next week.

Argentina will appeal to UN

THE Argentine President Cristina Fernandez de Kirchner accused Britain of "militarising" the South Atlantic, in her speech to provincial governors, union leaders, senators, and deputies from the Casa Rosada in Buenos Aires on Tuesday night.

Despite expectation and some concern expressed by Islanders that her intention was to bring about an interruption to the airlink between the Falklands and Chile, her primary point was in fact that she intended to file a complaint to the United Nations on the issue of the Falklands.

She said, "I have instructed our foreign minister to protest at the UN the militarisation of the South Atlantic which implies a grave risk for international security, precisely when we see in other countries situations that become unmanageable. The coming wars will be for natural resources and Argentina is one of the richest regions in world in those resources," she said. The Argentine President prom-

The Argentine President promised to lift secrecy over a 1982 military report, named after General Benjamin Rattenbach, which was commissioned by Argentina's former military dictatorship.

She said. "I want to ask the British Prime Minister to give peace a chance; give peace a chance, not war."

Fernandez spoke at the presidential palace in Buenos Aires in front of a large map of the Falkland Islands painted in the blue and white colours of the Argentine flag.

It appeared her intention was to internationalise the dispute and raise pressure on London to discuss sovereignty.

She added, "It is an anachronism in the 21st century to still have colonics: there are only 16 cases in the world, of which 10 are British and we've seen in recent days how the Spanish claim regarding Gibraltar has been renewed."

A summit of leftwing leaders in Venezuela last weekend backed Fernández's campaign as a panregional cause. Her Venezuelan counterpart, Hugo Chávez, said Caracas would support its ally in a military conflict.

A Foreign Office spokesman said: "The people of the Falkland Islands are British out of choice. They are free to determine their own future and there will be no negotiations with Argentina over sovereignty unless the islanders wish it."

The US Acting Assistant Secretary for Western Hemisphere Affairs, Roberta Jacobson, ratified the Obama administration's standing on the Falklands sovereignty issue, which urges Argentina and the United Kingdom to find a diplomatic exit to the matter, Mercopress reported on Wednesday.

Member of Legislative Assembly Mike Summers also told Mercopress that Argentina were welcome to take the "militarisation" issue to the UN Security Council and General Assembly, but they should be aware that as guardians of the principle of right to self-determination, that issue would also be raised in the context of any discussion regarding the Falkland Islands.

He said if Cristina Fernandez would sincerely like to "give peace a chance," she should consider removing the punitive measures she has put in place in an attempt to force Islanders to bend to the will of her government.

MLA Summers commented, however, that he welcomed the news of investment in much overdue mental health facilities for Argentine war veterans.

Argentine media response to the speech was varied. La Nacion's Joaquin Morales Sola commentated: "More gestures than actions....although all the announcements were right, it is difficult to understand why so much noise was made about so little.

"David Cameron faces internal problems and perhaps, as Argentine officials allege, he reached for the Malvinas to distract public opinion. If this is true, Cristina Kirchner should take care not to follow his steps. Malvinas have already been abused and it has never resulted in anything good."

Mario Wainfield in Pagina 12 said "Serene and meticulous in state matters, the President confirmed a correct political direction, opening the game to the opposition and civil society representatives. The British response is likely to be obvious and arrogant in the short-term."

FIRST of all, while we might not be sending her a bouquet on the fourteenth, I think we should give a big 'abrazo' and a resounding thank you to the President of Argentina for providing the Falkland Islands with the kind of public relations opportunities which we might otherwise have had to pay millions of pounds to achieve.

If nothing else, Madame K knows how to whip up a media frenzy and her calling together so many different factions of Argentine society to hear her "surprise" announcement in the Casa Rosada on Tuesday night did just that.

In the event, though the President's speech turned out to be less news-worthy than some of the prior speculation about its content, it did have one result which she may not have considered. I estimate that never, since 1982, when an Argentine junta chose to 'militarise' the previously peaceful South Atlantic to the applause of thousands of gleeful supporters in the Plaza de Mayo, have so many Falkland Islanders had the chance to put their views directly to the world.

Thanks to the presence in the Islands of the heir to the British throne we have recently enjoyed something of a media invasion, including a number of TV crews. Due to the infrequency of flights into the Islands. journalists are forced to stay here for a week and by day three of their visit, when the story that brought them here has been dealt with or found not to exist, and the obligatory penguins have been filmed, they tend to wander the streets of Stanley despondently looking for something...anything that might conceivably make a story

This week, thanks to Mrs Cristina Fernandez de Kirchner, there was a story or might have been.

After weeks when the media focus had been almost exclusively on Westminster or Buenos Aires and, as usual, our existence hardly seemed to matter, suddenly the phones of any Spanish speakers in Stanley were jumping off the wall with calls from Argentine radio stations and there was hardly anywhere in the world where you could switch on your radio or television without encountering some Falkland Islander or other stating the basic facts of our existence. Tiring though it might have been on occasions, it was a golden and free opportunity to explain that, contrary to the Argentine propaganda myth, we are not an enslaved colonial possession, but an increasingly independent, dynamic, democratic and evolving country

Well Mrs K, thank you once again for giving us such a 'win-win' situation. How was it for you?

"We live in a civilised society, not a playground," the Senior Magistrate tells offenders

ON Wednesday, the Senior Magistrate heard the cases of Neil Clifton and Joseph Campbell Kirkham who were both charged with public order offences following an incident which arose when Customs officials had been seen setting up equipment in conjunction with a local provider of satellite television; equipment which was then to be used in the testing of satellite boxes which had been seized following importation into the Islands.

The Prosecution agreed not to proceed with the trial of the matter if both Mr Clifton and Mr Kirkham agreed to be bound over to keep the peace.

They were both bound over in the sum of £400 for 12 months.

The Senior Magistrate said that

in the light of the papers he had read and the information he had received he considered that this was a sensible and appropriate approach in this case.

The Senior Magistrate went on to say that however ill-judged it might have been thought for the Customs Department to use the services of someone who could be directly affected by the outcome of the results of the testing in the process of examining the equipment, this was no excuse for any person getting involved in, or berating, or getting angry with officials. Those carrying out their public duty had to be protected by the Courts.

Mr Gumsley went on to make it clear that disputes were to be solved properly through proper complaint procedures and if necessary the courts. He said "we live in a civilised society not a playground".

The Senior Magistrate also referred to an allegation that some racist abuse had been heard during the incident.

Whilst he made it clear that he had not had to decide whether this had happened or not, and he was conscious that this was denied, he said that people should be fully aware that any kind of behaviour with racist connotations would not be tolerated by the courts.

Earlier Mr Lang QC, who represented both defendants, said that his clients profoundly apologised for any adverse consequences resulting from the incident, which he said had not been intended.

While I am aware that there is real danger of 'consultation fatigue' setting in I would urge those interested to respond to whichever of the current consultations are of interest to them. There is an industry consultation underway regarding a new port, but perhaps of more general interest is the FIDC sponsored series of proposals for the devel-opment of Stanley Waterfront that I mentioned last week. There is little doubt that if we had a decent marina, offering good facilities, it would be used. Much thought needs to be given to this and the better use of some of the scruffier areas along the sea front but caution is needed if we are not to lose areas with real historic value, character and charm. What ever your views, feed them in, it is too late after the event.

Another recently published consultation document relates to several pieces of legislation that are out of date or unfit for purpose. The Committees (Public Access) legislation, passed with the best of intentions, has never fully worked as originally hoped so needs updating. I believe that the Data Protection and Access to personal files legislation was never applied because the supporting regulations were not produced. They too now need updating and if you are interested in the background, the paper is available from Gilbert House, as are the proposed amendments to the Committees legislation.

Stanley is looking good this summer as more people discover and rediscover the joys and rewards of gardening. To avoid disappointment put in the shelter first. Shelter leads me to my next subject; one of the many projects to celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee is a plan to plant a million trees in the United Kingdom. We could not have such an ambitious target but a thousand would not be unrealistic, and would make up for some of our forbears who believed the myth that trees would not grow here. There were some honourable exceptions and we can enjoy some mature trees as a result. They start slowly and need pampering until well established but are well worth the effort

'Boxes' case against FIG

THE case brought against the Falkland Islands Government by Gary Clement and others, to release channel receiver boxes from Customs took directions in the Civil Court last Friday.

Mr Clement, said: "Our information is, the satellite we are pointed at is broken so they are broadcasting clear and un-coded channels... When it's fixed we will pick up only free channels that broadcast," and the box will, "continue to be a receiver."

FIG believe the boxes had been adapted to pick up channels that require subscription, and that the satellite would soon once again be coded: "if they were adapted before code change, then it is piracy"...they were picking up channels illegally," said FIG Counsel Alison Inglis.

Mr Gumsley said he was not advising Mr Clement to drop the case but, "if you're going to drop it, do it quick."

He then expressed serious concern over the evidence presented by FIG: "Emails had been sent to providers telling them what to write," he said.

Providers BBC Worldwide explained that KTV Ltd had provision authorising them to access their channels. Then, in an email statement prompted by Robert King, they added, "no third party or agent has the right to access."

The email sent by Mr King to the channel provider outlined what Customs required the provider say so that it might be used as evidence, "and it was generally repeated back, clearly without much consideration.

"Weight is not attached to a statement where there has been collaboration," said Mr Gumsley. He added, "one statement says there is a licence, the other says no one is allowed access to digitally encoded channels, largely because Customs requested it."

The case was adjourned until March 13, 2012 so that legal advice can be gained by the complainants. can. Calvin Curtis, Nick Rowlands and Travis Jaffray Roger and Sharon discuss principles

This is a follow up to the visit of the MLA Mike Summers and the MLA Roger Edwards to Antigua, Dominica and St Kitts and Nevis late last year.



The Falkland Islands Constitution devolves responsibility for all issues, with the exception of defence and foreign affairs.

HAVING watched MLA Jan Cheek on FITV February 3, I wasn't convinced a full consultation had been conducted on the poll regarding time changes. I for one knew nothing about the email or on-line questionnaire, nor heard any radio announcement or sighted anything in Penguin News to bring this to my notice. You said 60% of the business community were in agreement to keep summer time all year and about the same number of the general public. I would like to know who was in your survey? Did you trawl the telephone directory or get them from the electoral roll?

The decision was almost sleight of hand, just like the fiveday consultation period when the continuance of summer time was introduced last winter. Pity other decisions were not fast tracked the same.

Twice over a period, 1 came across a petition in the Post Office asking for comment against keeping summer time throughout the year. Each time I signed against it. Stating that now was a good time to kick out summer time and stick with sun time.

I think using the time difference with UK business hours is a lame excuse. In this modern age with answer phones and e-mail, I ask you?

My concern is one of safety and health. Too often in the winter, pedestrians have almost come to grief. I heard of a chap in dark garb, bouncing around a vehicle bonnet. Brakes have squealed when persons appear out of the dark, not wearing high visibility clothing.

Another concern is the early morning pre-dawn icy road surface, where heavy fuel bowsers are called out to keep heaters burning, often with the operator dragging a hose up a slippery path. One more hour for the sun to rise will make a difference most times.

Likewise, that earlier hour in a cold shearing shed brings a certain reluctance to start.

The bypass road past Megabid is rarely salted, a FIGAS land rover spun off the road last spring. this occurred between VPC Road and Lellman Way junction. Fortunately, there were no injuries to the occupants but the vehicle was written off. What a price to pay for one hour of wrong time.

Children on playing fields or in the school yard before daylight, left by parents on their way to work is often a talking point!

While on the subject, it's TIME to call for a proper referendum, giving everyone a chance to speak out. Before this is set in stone binding us all in a warp of folly.

Developing Democracy

READING Dick Sawle's series of articles about the developing democracy in the Falkland Islands has prompted me to write to PN. He succinctly set out where we are now and his views on where we should go next. I heartily agree with most of his conclusions, especially the move to ministerial government.

At present, the MLA's only have influence via committees (an excellent way of not getting decisions made) and do not have the accountability that a modern democracy needs. My suggestion is that one MLA should become the 'Chief 'and take on some aspects of the Chief Executive's role: either selected by the elected group or, perhaps, be the candidate with the largest proportion of the vote. He/she could be supported by a professional civil servant who would take the role of running the civil service and central services.

The 'Chief' MLA would then be responsible for the running of FIG, similar to the Prime Minister in the UK and for overseeing that policies are implemented. Other MLA's can then take other Head of Department roles (Fin Sec, Education, Health, Safety, etc). The remaining MLA's could then form the official opposition; this might lead to the formation of political parties and could also make the MLA role, either in a FIG role or in 'opposition', full time and therefore paid.

The great advantage of ministerial government is that MLAs would be directly responsible for the running of FIG and the implementation of their policies. The buck would stop squarely with the 'Chief' MLA and his/her inner circle. The time has passed that MLAs are able to hide behind committees and the odd 'rogue' Chief Executive!

I do not agree with the formation of a single constituency: the Falkland Islands are so much more than just Stanley. One of the biggest problems in rural UK is getting 'townies' to understand the differences: the same is true here and Gavin Short publicly acknowledged this just before the recent referendum. Bill Luxton made a valid point in PN that there should be a Stanley Town Council: MLA's should be working on National and International issues and leave solely Stanley issues to the council. I do, however, agree with his point that Camp is over represented and suggest that Camp MLA's are reduced to two but split the Camp constituency into East and West. None of these major decisions should be rushed but could be worked towards over time, with plenty of open forum discussion.

In conclusion, I believe Dick has made several excellent points. The move to ministerial government is overdue and should be encouraged at every opportunity. John Maskell-Bott Hill Cove.

Not experts but human rights initiative

I'M enger to assure my good friend Ginge Davis that, as far as I am aware, there are no more Human Rights experts coming to visit the Islands in the near future.

He may, however, have got wind of a recent local Human Rights initiative.

In late 2011, on behalf of FIG's Executive Council, the Attorney General invited the Falkland Islands Human Rights group (FIHRG) to use funding provided by the Commonwealth Foundation to help prepare a low-key National Action Plan. Such a Plan would require little or no extra budgeted resources but might serve to guide FIG regarding current priority areas for its attention. FIHRG has since agreed to use this money to remunerate a suitable person to survey FIG Departments and Civil Society groups then draft their Report.

If such a Report highlights any parts of Chapter I in our 2008 Constitution ('Protection of Fundamental Rights and Freedoms of the Individual') with which our community does not yet fully comply, then a National Action Plan could assist in promptly addressing these matters.

Chapter 1 of the Falkland Islands Constitution enshrines most aspects of the European Convention on Human Rights and other key treaties and conventions, so no more legislation is needed. Instead, greater familiarity with the basic individual freedoms and rights which are now fully pro-tected by law in all Overseas British Territories is strongly recommended. From now on, the local FIHRG exists to assist in the fullest practical outworking of this precious constitutional provision, to the benefit of us all. **Richard Hines**

A fitting welcome to Antarctica as the waves break on the submerged ice

A whale of a tale from Falklands to Antarctica

Penguin News' winter Deputy Editor shares her experience and images on board the 26 metre Hans Hansson, the most recent addition to the Poncet fleet....

"It pains me to tell you this, but Dion is looking for a cook," my friend Jacqui Jennings, told me with a snort, adding, "and you're bloody lucky I'm so busy or I'd be ringing him myself, not telling vou.

Just a few days earlier we had been sitting at the kitchen table at Jacqui's lodge on Pebble Island, feeding a stranded sailor tea and home baked cakes and discussing the chances of lowly souls like ourselves ever getting the chance to travel to Antarctica.

This particular yachty, who introduced himself as Ian, had found himself high and dry on what he claimed to be an uncharted reef on Bullock Island that morning and had come ashore in his inflatable to let us know that he was OK, but he did have some concerns about when his yacht would float off. After checking the tides and assuring the somewhat embarrassed sailor that 7.30am looked good we topped up his tea cup and encouraged him to tell us about his travels.

Antarctica was top of his list and off course the conversation immediately shifted to the Poncet family, the most accomplished Antarctic sailors in the world, and their newly acquired vessel the Hans Hansson.

"That's what I want to go to Antarctica on" Jacs and I both said at the same time and then laughed as in reality we realised the chance of that happening was slimmer even than the recently married Kate Middleton, and that took a bit of beating.

The conversation flowed and as I was about to top up the sailor's tea cup, the door opened and a male guest popped his head in the kitchen. "Ah you must be the owner," said lan leaping to his feet. "No, Jacqui is the owner and manager." I said firmly. He might have got away with it had he asked if this rather well-heeled and demanding guest was the owner, but to assume, just because he was the first male he had set eves on the island, was a bit too much for independent types such as myself and Jacs.

Having despatched him back to his yacht without the customary home baking to relieve the wait for the tide to lift his vessel free, we joked between ourselves about who would be most likely to land a job on the Hans Hansson.

But, with two aircraft to meet, guests to despatch and greet, a three course meal to prepare for eight and all the cleaning up that follows, all thoughts of sailing of to Antarctica or anywhere else for that matter, were soon forgotten.

And now here was Jacs telling me that Hans Hansson skipper Dion Poncet was looking for a cook for a January voyage.

Being of an impulsive nature I got in touch with Dion immediately and while I assured him the cooking side of things was not a problem, whether I was equipped with sea legs was an unknown quantity. My limited experience on small boats. a cruise on a luxury liner and a couple of lively ferry crossings to Ireland were not I thought, in the same category as the Drake Passage, the more than 600 mile stretch of infamous ocean that separated the Falklands and Antarctica.

No amount of reading and research could have prepared a land lubber like me for an ocean crossing of such magnitude and just half an hour af-

ter leaving Stanley harbour on January 15, and minutes after giving my husband Kenneth and stepdaughter Nicole a merry blast of the ships horn as they bid us farewell from Cape Pembroke lighthouse, we plunged into great waves which smashed over the bow

Dashing from the bridge to the lower decks Dion showed fellow newbee sailor Ben Cockwell and I how to check that everything was correctly stowed to prevent any breakages. All great fun and I'd taken pills so there was no way I was going to be sick. Two hours later an ominous prickly heat descended on me and sweat broke out on my forehead. Sh*t. Get to the most central point of the boat I decided, which was either a shower cubicle or the seat in my cabin. I chose the latter, but half an hour later I was in that bathroom. Putting every bit of advice I'd been given about sickness into action, I climbed into my bunk and lay as still as the pitching vessel would allow me. Aaah that's better" I thought as I grew accustomed to the motion. Taking more seasickness pills throughout the night, along with a few more dashes to the bathroom. I figured I'd soon have it all under control. Three days later, and I'd had enough. I wasn't throwing up, but each time I felt better and got up, my head would spin, there was a roaring in my ears and there was nothing for it but to get horizontal again. At one point I'd tried to fight it and had blacked out in the bathroom. thankfully with no more damage than a violent purple bruise the length of my forearm.

Enough was enough and I said to Dion that when we got to King George Island I was out of here. He was convinced my symptoms were not typical of seasickness, but a side affect or reaction to the pills, and thank fully convinced me that having come this far it would be such a shame to go home without experiencing at least some of Antarctica. Thank God he managed to get through to me (not always possible once I have the bit between my teeth) because the days that followed will remain ingrained in my memory for ever.

Arriving in the South Shetlands after three and a half days with the last 36 to 40 hours being a constant roll of about 30 degrees, knees wobbling and feeling a bit weak after a four day diet of two cream crackers and two ginger biscuits, I finally managed to do what I was supposed to be doing for the entire trip - I placed plates of bacon and eggs before my fellow crew mates while I bravely forced another cream cracker down and wondered at how they could even consider such a feast

Anchored in the north west corner of Edgell Bay, Nelson Island, I got myself ensconced in the galley and was soon turning out loaves of bread and cake which I put to cool on the after deck with a back drop of snowy mountains and scree slopes. I was feeling better by the hour since following the skipper's advice and not taking any pills and by the next day I was even getting my sense of humour back, a point noted aloud by Ben Cockwell, who figured it was a sure sign 1 was sorted

Ben, who was as much a landlubber as myself, had been amazing on the crossing, taking his first watch about 10 hours into the trip and managing to rusile food together whenever he had a chance between watches and getting some kip. The other crew member Aidan Smith, was a young sea dog anyway, having worked on the South Georgia


fishery patrol ship Pharos for a couple of years and as for Dion, well he was quite literally born at sea, although he does admit to the odd bout of seasickness, one of which apparently nobbled him on the first night of this particular voyage.

The purpose of the trip was two separate charters: the first being a NHK and KEO film project with a Japanese crew of 13 to the Peninsula to film key points for a Japanese version of the Frozen Planet. This included Japanese heart throb television presenter Takao Osawa who travelled complete with stylist and make-up man and enough luggage to cloth a family of four.

Two days later as we approached the Peninsula and were welcomed by the most magnificent icebergs. I wondered why on earth anyone would even want to look at him at all when there was such a plethora of amazing sights. This was the real Antarctica, and it was every bit as breathtaking as Dion had promised

Crossing the Bransfield Strait had been proof that I was gaining some sea legs. Now in a cabin in the bow of the ship I had given up trying to sleep as the pitching left me hovering several inches above the mattress and I'd stood on the bridge until 2am and things had calmed down. We hauled up in Cierva Cove for the film crew

to get some shots and gazed in awe at the icebergs glistening in the dazzling sunlight. It was impossible to remain in the galley and prepare the meal so the spuds were carted on deck where I could

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sit and neel and take in the view

The icebergs fascinated me and in the incredible silence of the evening as they sighed and inched their way across the bay it was difficult to believe that they were not living creatures. My over-active imagination soon had me discerning animal shapes, which despite my insistence my fellow crew members failed to appreciate.

Leopard and crab-cater seals lounged on floes and could barely be bothered to look over their shoulders at us as we include past and that evening as we headed for Enterprise Island we were treated to the soft pastels of an Antarctic sunset which turned the blue white ice to a warm glowing orange.


Our first visit to Enterprise was brief, but perhaps any visit would be too short to this stunning harbour, in which the wreck of the Governoren, a whaling ship that was abandoned after it caught fire in 1916, rests and provides a favourite mooring spot for yachts.

Later that day as we cruised through Wilkhelmina Bay looking for whales, we were treated to a display that even had Dion leaping around the ship with excitement.

Two Humpbacks played around the ship and put on a display directly behind our Japanese presenter as he faced the cameras. Rolling on their sides and displaying fins and flukes with fabulous elegance given their size Ben and I dashed from starboard to port vying for best position for photographs. Seeming as though they would never tire of playing around the boat, one suddenly, as though overly excited, heaved its massive body out of the water and flopped back down again. Dion's yell of appreciation left us in no doubt we were witnessing something pretty special as the great mammal twice more gave us a view of his massive white chest and gnarled fins. Thinking it couldn't get any better. I was treated to a parting shot in the form of a drenching from a whale blow so close to the port side was the whale. A great waft of fishy air was closely followed by a splat of whale-blown water right in the face. Might not have been everyone's cup of tea, but it sure as hell made my day!

And so feeling very special, we headed out into the Gerlache Strait, bound for Cuverville Island before we pushed as far south as we could through the ice.



PHEW, some terrible winds again. We try not to water more than is absolutely necessary, though some plants, such as the young perennials and shrubs which have yet to form roots going deeply enough to find any moisture available, have got to have some water, and they can look a little threadbare. However, we try to restrain ourselves to just watering the vegetables as they only have the one season to grow in, and of course all plants growing under cover Sadly that means the lawns must be ignored. Fortunately they recover as soon as there is a bit of moisture. or during the winter months. Meanwhile Bill mows them less frequently and on a higher cut.

When we'd killed the grass and Bill had rotavated what used to be a sort of lawn in the front garden, we were left with what is known as 'trash'. That is, dry, untidy, curled up bits of ground and grass.

Normally we would have simply added it to the compost bin, however, when clearing one of the tunnels of flowers I had removed large chunks of soil with the Gladioli bulbs They produce hundreds of baby bulbs which keep popping up through the years, which is not too bad outside but in a sheltered and warm environment, wow!

In an effort to kill off any of the bulbs I might have missed I decided to cover the soil with black mesh (the sort you use to stop weeds coming through). It then occurred to us that maybe that ground could be put to better use if I were to put some maincrop potatoes under the mesh but sitting on top of this 'trash'. This would help to build up the soil again as well.

Putting the trash on top of the remaining soil in a 6 inch (15 cm) deep pile with a good amount of 6X it was then just a matter of popping the mesh on top, cutting out crosses every 15 inches or so



and shoving a potato into each cross. Other than watering, that was it.

The other day some tourists asked to see the gardens and one of the ladies. on spotting the potatoes flowering in the tunnel complimented me on my 'Hydrangeas.' Oops! Well they had grown very tall and so 1 expected little or nothing from them underneath.

Imagine my delight on cutting the haulms off at ground level and turning back the mesh, to find loads of rather large potatoes under there. Two roots overflowed a two-gallon bucket. If the rest are the same we should have a very good year.

Anyone with a garden will usually be given ornaments and I have had quite a few over the years; I'm rather fond of piggies and meercats but have other animals as well, and quite enjoy some gnomes peeking out of the bushes too! Imagine my surprise on encountering a 'visiting' gnome the other day, out in the open and not in the least bashful. I called a lady well known for her collection of gnomes and she confirmed she was missing a few, but sadly this was not one



of them. She started me off on a new plant hunt though. What some gorgeous delphiniums she has! Hopefully we can come to an arrangement! Meanwhile, is anyone missing a gnome out there?


For the first time ever I've tried freezing some beetroot, cooked it for a couple of hours, cooled it sliced it, put it in a bag removing all possible air by sucking it out with a straw and popped it in the freezer. I let it thaw naturally overnight in the fridge and tried some last night. Great!

We have all been picking red currants (kiddies too). To save myself time they are going straight into the freezer and will be turned into jellies and puddings later, so far we've picked 4 ½ kilos and there are still stacks more to go.

The white currants, though they look insipid, are actually very similar in flavour to the red and crop even more heavily. The raspberries are also producing well, but, as we only have five plants of them at the moment there is little point in saving them. I will plant more when more drums can be found but for the time being will just enjoy them on Tuesdays (and some more on Wednesdays) when the fresh cream arrives. Thank you Lisa. The strawberries are just about finished and those outside just look miserable. The blackcurrants are nearly ready 100

One of the kiddies was here when I planted our swede seeds and wanted to help. I gave her a row about 50 ft long just below the main crop potatoes and some 12 year old seeds, I knew that at least one in every ten would germinate. What I did not expect was all of them to do so. I've had to go behind her back and thin and thin and thin them but I have to say, her swedes are almost football-sized already. They just don't make 'em like they used to; seeds I mean.

Some of the Hemerocallis, which are called day lilies as each flower only opens for one day, are finally in flower. They may only last a day but there are masses of them. The Alstroemerias or Peruvian lilies which were yanked out of the tunnel because I needed the space, are also flowering outside. Some are sulking underground but should appear next year. The purple/blue Iris bulbs are finished and very thick so I have been pulling them out. Large flowers on knee high plants anybody out there want some?

your body will find it harder to adjust to training if you don't take time to rest and recuperate. Rest is an important part of a training schedule that gives your muscles time to rebuild, strengthen and repair. Overtraining will eventually cause your body to become weaker and slower, effectively undoing your hard work.

Sleep patterns and energy levels will feel the effects, but left untreated eventually, a person's immune system may crash causing lose of appetite and illness and you don't have to be logging 100mile weeks to suffer; recreational ninners can easily overtrain too.

Some signs are easier to spot than others, but Runners' World offers these indicators as signs that your body needs some days to recover

I BODY MASS: A two per cent drop in weight from one day to the next indicates a bodyfluid fluctuation. Most likely, you didn't hydrate enough during or after your last workout. Dehydration negatively impacts both physical and mental performance, and could compromise the quality of your next workout.

2 RESTING HEART RATE: Take your pulse each morning before you get out of bed to find what's normal for you. An elevated resting heart rate is a sign of stress, your nervous system is releasing hormones that speed up your heart to move more oxygen to the muscles and brain. The body won't know the difference between physical and psychological stress. A hard run and a hard day at work both require extra recovery

3 SLEEP: A pattern of consistently good sleep will give you a boost of growth hormones, which

fibres. Several nights in a row of bad sleep will decrease reaction time along with immune, motor, and cognitive functions-not a good combination for a workout.

4 HYDRATION: If your pee is dark yellow this can be an indicator of dehydration, barring the consumption of vitamins, supplements, or certain foods the evening before. The darker the colour, the more you're struggling to retain fluids, because there's not enough to go around.

The RAF had a great chance to get their two goal lead back when a lovely cross from their right was headed against the crossbar and Stanley managed to clear.



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Some sense is heard in the South Atlantic

ON Wednesday, US State Department spokesperson Victoria Nuland said the US had, "no concerns," about the alleged militarisation of the South Atlantic by Britain, which was claimed by Argentina last week before the United Nations.

"The UK has made clear to us and to the Argentines that what they are engaged in. in a naval capacity is normal and is typical for this time of year. So we don't have any reason to question that," said Ms Nuland

Regarding the deployment of the Prince of Wales to the Falklands with the Search and Rescue helicopter crew, Ms Nuland said that this was simply part of the Prince's normal work.

The State Department position was not well received by Argentine authorities according to the Buenos Aires media.

Amid all the shrill craziness of the international media frenzy during the last two weeks, of which the worst possibly was the weight given to the ill-informed utterances of former Hollywood bad boy Sean Penn, there has also been the emergence of some quiet voices of reason in some rather surprising places.

Described as one of the leading historians of his generation in Argentina, Luis Alberto Romero had a piece entitled. "Are the Malvinas really ours?" in Monday's La Nacion, one of Argentina's leading dailies usually associated with the official Kirchner view of things.

In the article Romero suggests that the reason that it is so difficult for any Argentine to hold anything other than the official view on the Falklands sovereignty question is that to do so is to be accused of a lack of patriotism.

Romero finds the revival of the importance of the sovereignty claim, "profoundly worrying." On June 15 1982, he says there was wide consent that the Argentine military should be repudiated, but observes that although there were those in 1982 who reproached the military for going to war, the majority only reproached them for having lost.



A hastily-assembled protest rally called by local photographer Norman Clark on Wednesday evening brought out 130 vehicles and possibly as many as 300 Falkland Islanders.

The large turn-out at very short notice is evidence, if evi-

Romero in his piece questions the solidarity of the kind of blind nationalism which demands that everyone be convinced about Argentina's inalienable rights to the Falklands.

"Few Argentines know them and few could say that they would affect their personal lives. But the 'Lost little sister' is embedded in the very centre of the nationalist complex. The 'Argentineness' of the Falklands, less mentioned in the 19th Century has been affirmed everywhere in the 20th, beginning with the schools.

"Any action aimed at establishing Argentine rule will be celebrated or at least approved. Many criticise some aspects of the consequences of this idea, particularly militarism, but that's not enough."

Romero continues, "It's very difficult for me to think of a solution for the Falklands which isn't based on the wishes of its inhabitants who have lived there for almost two centuries. It's impossible not to take them into account like the Argentine Government does. Supposing that we had dence were needed, of the frustration and annoyance felt by many Islanders regarding some of the bizarre statements and opinions expressed on the global media during the recent war of words raging in the South Atlantic and elsewhere.

won the war, what would we have done with the Islanders? Perhaps we would have deported them or locked them up in a concentration camp. Perhaps we would have thought of some final solution. Suggesting such extreme ideas - we believe far from any actual intention - allows us to see the extent of the problem with clarity."

In another article which appeared in La Nacion a day later. Silvina Walger, a feisty and often controversial journalist and sociologist wrote, "It's surprising that the present Argentine administration doesn't know the difference between winning or losing a war. Wars are either won or lost; there is nothing in between. To the winner it doesn't matter if who the war liberated was Caligula or the Kirchner fans. The loser has no alternative but to submit, pull himself together and resort to an intelligent and non-aggressive dialogue."

The piece ends, "Please, let's leave in peace these islanders who have much more possibilities of becoming a serious country than we do." Friday, February 17, 2012

Potential oil prize \$180bn

AN investment research report says the Falklands could be set to take \$180 billion in royalties and tax if the 2012 drilling proves successful.

Edison Investment Research in their report entitled Falklands Oils - kicking up a storm in the South Atlantic, notes, "within the context of oil and gas, any ground-breaking discovery would radically change the islands' royalty and tax revenues, potentially adding up to \$167 billion over the years if the 2012 drill targets prove successful. Even without this we expect the islands to benefit to the tune of around \$10.5 billion from the development of Sea Lion alone. With current tax and fishing incomes in the region of \$40 million the islands look set to be transformed by the oil industry

At the same time the report notes that the Falkland Islands fiscal regime is considered to be one of the most attractive in the world. A combined take of 33 per cent from corporation tax of 26 per cent and an overlying production royalty of 9 per cent are very low and can be favourably compared to the UK and other countries. While such a low take is attractive to oil companies, the Falkland Islands is still in line to benefit financially on a scale that will dwarf its current tax revenues.

The report adds, "Clearly with so much potential money at stake it is not surprising that we are witnessing so much sabre rattling between the UK and Argentina."

Borders and Southern Petroleum and Falklands Oil & Gas are the companies involved in drilling in the southern basin, and follows the successful discovery and appraisal of Sea Lion in the northern Basin by Rockhopper Ltd.

The report notes risks from political tensions between Britain and Argentina over the sovereignty of the Falklands, referring to it as the 'proverbial spanner in the works' but notes that it would be a worse case scenario for the situation to become too difficult for any field developments to be executed.

SO peculiar has life become in this office. I would hardly have batted an eyelid on Wednesday if Spike Milligan had bounced through the door shaking off cobwebs and quoting lines from his nonsense poem *Bazonka*.

While attempting to explain to the Sun newspaper photographer, frowning over my right shoulder, how to extract images from non flattened image files, an Argentine war veteran popped his head around the door and asked me to "shhhhh" while his accompanying camera crew filmed the Deputy Editor.

In the midst of the melee of a dozen people milling through our paper strewn offices, with all three phones ringing and Hazel Minnell trying to pay a bill and likely have a chicken yarn with the Office Manager, in strolled an eccentric, elderly but energetic Falklands' lady.

Pushing past former Argentine soldiers, Islanders and tabloid reporters she plonked her elbows on the desk and asked me, "have you got a bob or two for fags?"

It was at that very moment I really began scanning the corners of the room for hidden cameras.

Perhaps the only equally extraordinary moment this week came while scanning the job description for the General Manager of Tourism.

Having already balked on behalf of any management hopefuls at the massively expectant 'Accountable for tourist growth to the Falklands.' (Forever? For the two short years he'll likely be here?) my astonishment was completed, when the advert revealed his team would include both a Sales and Marketing Manager (new position) and a Marketing Coordinator. Operations Manager, Project Manager (new position).

So the General Manager will be paid a £70,000 salary to do what exactly?

Might I suggest: Say Bazonka every day That's what my grandma used to say It keeps at bay the Asian Flu' And both your elbows free from glue. (Spike Milligan) It won't do any harm and it'll help him pass the time.

Zoran said. "The protest started around 1400 on Saturday with a message to Argentina to leave the Falkland Islanders alone. There were some 50 supporters to the cause and the protest was organised on Facebook. It was pleasing to see members of the British public stand together and show support during these times of increased rhetoric from Argentina."

He added, "The Falklands' flag now hangs proudly in one of the Metropolitan Police stations. One of the policemen present asked if

they could keep one of our flags to put up back at their base. Some of their officers had served in the Falklands during 1982." Birmingham University student Bill Schneider, who lived for many years in the Falklands, also joined the protest.

Crewmen return to ship

SEVEN Vietnamese crewmen who jumped into the sea from their Taiwanese fishing vessel in Stanley Harbour on Sunday, have made no complaint of any maltreatment onboard their vessel, and have said their reason for the act was to contact their families, according to a press release from the Falkland Islands Government

Despite the statement it has been confirmed that the day before the incident one other crewman was brought ashore. "for treatment and repatriation," confirmed the Royal Falkland Islands Police. Unofficial sources say the man had self-harmed by biting his own tongue.

A search operation by the Royal Falkland Islands Police, Fire and Rescue Service, Falkland Islands Defence Force, Ioeal launches, members of the public, Falkland Islands Company Agency staff and a Search and Rescue helicopter, found no sign of the missing crew in the water or on the coast during a search on Sunday.

The men were subsequently found by a member of the public on the Stanley Bypass Road and delivered to the police station. Having made no complaint of ill treatment onboard the vessel, they were taken to hospital to be interviewed by immigration officials with the assistance of a neutral interpreter. The crewmen were housed and fed at Lookout Lodge overnight.

The release added, "It appears their motivation in coming ashore was in order to speak to their families for their national New Year. Having achieved this, the individuals expressed a wish to return to their vessel, rather than be repatriated.

Sex offender refused bail

SIMON Reid (24) was taken into police custody on Wednesday, having entered guilty pleas to four of the 28 charges brought against him.

There were three cases encompassing the charges: sexual acts with a child; possession and taking of indecent photographs of a child; sexual grooming of a child and taking an indecent video of a child. There were four separate victims.

He admitted to three of the charges of sexual activity with a child and one of sexual grooming of a child.

Mr Reid had two previous convictions relating to sexual activity with a child. His trial will begin on May 7, but it is still unknown whether the three cases will go to trial together or as three separate cases. This will be decided at a pre-trial review in April.

Mr Reid was refused bail by the Senior Magistrate.

Legislative Assembly Diary

MLA Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into the work of a member of the Legislative Assembly

Last week was eventful but with my deadline of midday Tuesday (I write it on Monday night as most Tuesday mornings are spent in meetings) by Friday it is all old news. The much hyped nonevent on Wednesday (and the unedifying punch up afterwards) gave us yet another chance to air the facts, and the piece I did on camera for Clarin has been commented on as far afield as Spain. It is also encouraging to see that some older and possibly wiser voices in Argentina are urging caution on their president The allegations of militarisation are so easily refuted that they deceive no-one.

The incident at the weekend when seven men jumped off an illex squid jigger in the harbour and thankfully made it safely to shore reminded us all that conditions are not easy for those who spend many months at sea doing difficult and dangerous work. It is therefore hard to understand how and why, after risking death. they then chose to go back on board. Conditions on board can vary with nationality, type of vessel and competence of the officers from harsh and sometimes violent through to efficiently run and relatively comfortable.

As I have said in a previous column, MLAs are keen to hear your views on several consultations underway this month. Many thanks go to those who have already contacted us. Another important proposal is that of putting some vetting in place for those who drive taxis or tourist trips. It is important in this very competitive age that tourists and other passengers can be confident of the safety of the vehicle. and the competence and honesty of their driver. Most drivers already provide a high standard of service, probity and safety so would have no trouble meeting the proposed requirements.

I had an opportunity to meet the Uruguayan visitors on Friday and hope that most of our visitors leave with an equally positive picture of the Falklands. I believe that, almost without exception, the journalists who have been in the Islands recently have left better informed and this is most evident in their reporting.

Saying thanks for a miracle but still flying into politics

A TRIBUTE to a pair of intrepid aviators engaged in an epic flight to raise public awareness about organ donation, has been misinterpreted by newspapers on both sides of the current war of words between Britain and Argentina.

When former British Airways 747 Captain Chris McLaughlin and his wife and co-pilot Corrine, approached the Islands in their tiny Cessna aircraft last week, towards the half-way point of a flight which began and will end on Nantucket Island in the USA, they happily agreed to be 'intercepted' by two of the RAF's Typhoon fighters, based at Mount Pleasant. "After all," said Chris, "they have to have something to practice on."

Sadly, an experience that Chris McLaughlin described as one of the most thrilling in his long flying career, this greeting from two of the world's most advanced aireraft to one of the smallest ever to be flown here, was misinterpreted by one British tabloid newspaper which claimed that the two Typhoons had been sent to escort the Cessna as a precaution, in view of alleged heightened tension in the South Atlantic.

This misleading and inaccurate view of events was soon picked up and repeated by newspapers in Argentina, including La Nacion and the English language Buenos Aires Herald, much to the anger and dismay of Chris and Corrine McLaughlin themselves. For them this journey of over 16,000 miles is both a celebration of their love of flying – Corrine is a longserving British Airways purser and a private pilot – and a celebration of what they call, "a miracle of survival against the odds."

On St Valentine's Day 2010, Chris collapsed at his home in Guildford where he and Corrine were preparing for a family lunch. Rushed first to the Royal Surrey Hospital and then to University College Hospital, London, it soon became obvious that Chris, who had gone from being fine and active to suffering massive internal bleeding, would need a liver

transplant in order to survive. At this point he was transferred to the specialist unit at King's College Hospital, London.

The two months that Chris was to spend in intensive care, in a virtual coma and mostly unaware what was happening to him, were difficult ones for Corrine, but she received what she regards as lifesaving help from Listen, a patientled network that supports families before and after a liver transplant.

Despite being given only a 20 per cent chance of surviving the operation, in April 2010, 47 year old Chris received a new liver and a long hard road back to recovery began.

Although the surgical procedure had been a success, Chris was still very ill and had to spend a long time in rehabilitation, including having to learn to walk again. Despite being a towering six feet six inches in height, at the time of his operation Chris weighed just 130lbs.

Just over a year and a half after his life-saving operation, in December of 2011, Chris and Corrine took off from Nantucket Island in their four-seater plane on a mission to raise money for King's College Hospital and Listen. As well as supporting the people who had helped them so much. they also hope that their journey from Cape Cod to Cape Horn will help the people who hear about it to think about being organ donors. As Chris says to anyone who might be sitting on the fence about organ donation:

Winter extra evening light

I READ with interest Eric Goss's letter on the 'covert summer time' poll. I heard the article on the summer time poll relating to the e-mail or on-line questionnaire on FIRS at lunch time in November last year and contacted the policy unit and completed and returned an on-line form. I also noticed the petition requesting support to keep 'winter time' in several places including the Post Office and Michelle's hair salon and note with interest that Mr. Goss said he signed it several times. I only completed one on-line questionnaire.

I guess it depends whether you are a morning or an evening person, I rise at the same time summer and winter five days a week. It didn't bother me unduly going to work in the dark although it does bother me going home in the dark after work, especially when roads are icy. People are keener to go home in the evening at the end of the day than they are going to work on a cold morning.

Pre-dawn icy road surfaces are a concern but then so are icy surfaces in the evening.

My eight year old son is delivered to Rug Rats on my way to work and is collected by them after school and cared for until we finish work at 4.30 and on nicer evenings, with my permission, walks with his older sister to visit his grandmother.

My 13 year old daughter walks to school just before Sam from outside my place of work meet-ing up with friends who are also dropped off at the same time by their parents. FICS students are allowed access to the school from 8.15 in the morning. What's worse, 15 minutes in the dark walking to and waiting for school to open or leaving school half an hour before parents finish work and walking home in the dark, especially when it's snowing and the snow has been piled onto the pavements during the day to clear the road for drivers? Children are taught at school to wear high visibility clothing summer and winter for their safety and it is concerning when adults do not do the same

My 81 year old mother-in-law really enjoyed the extra afternoon light including not having to be home before 3pm if she had been out because it was too dark for her to see safely. On the nicer evenings, her grandchildren would walk to see her in the day light after school to say hello, something they wouldn't have done in the dark if the time had changed. It gave her a few extra hours of freedom and like me she felt that winter didn't seem as long or drawn out as usual.

On occasions I witnessed some beautiful sun rises and also whilst enjoying the benefits of the lighter evenings, sunsets. It was nice collecting children from swim-ming and other after school clubs

(with the exception of Karate) in the light and not having to navigate car parks in the dark with kids dashing around all over the place meeting parents. It was also noticeable how many children enjoyed the extra daylight either playing on the football pitch after school whilst waiting for parents to finish work at 4.30 or walking home. It is a lot safer for children walking home in the daylight and was great not having children adjusting to the time difference twice a year. This was especially noticeable in September after the August end of School year break and three weeks holiday and the shock of having to go back to school and then having to adjust shortly after this to a time change.

It was nice not having to remember to leave the outside lights on at lunchtime to avoid scrambling around in the dark trying to unlock the door after work Although I do not have hens I have colleagues who enjoyed being able to feed their hens in the day light rather than by torchlight and complete outside jobs after work in the light safely. Unlike Mr. Goss and other retired persons, most working people did not have the pleasure of being able to conduct their outdoor activities in daylight hours (apart from a very rushed lunch time) during the week in winter prior to not changing the time. Any extra evening light is appreciated for those purposes. It was also nice being able to start work on the garden and other outside jobs in late July/early August.

I do not think the time difference with UK businesses hours a lame excuse, when there is a five hour time difference the Bank only has until 10am in the morning to contact their head office and I'm sure if asked they probably benefitted from the extra time gained. It is

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almost impossible trying to contact suppliers for the purchase of goods in the UK/Europe by phone with a limited contact time; sometimes it isn't possible to use email and answer phones and is easier to talk to people direct. With our neighbours in South America causing difficulties with trading it is even more important to be able to maintain our contacts in the UK. It is/was also easier contacting family on holiday, living/ studying and/or working in the UK with a three and a four hour time difference respectively especially during the week.

Falklands agriculture 'enormous potential' says Uruguayan group

THE Falkland Islands has, "enormous potential" in terms of the output of agricultural products said Dr Nicolas Negrin. Head of Mission for the Uruguayan agribusiness delegation that visited last week.

An enthusiastic Dr Negrin, who described himself "amazed" at how well the group had been treated, said the Falklands had two, "very important points of development... firstly the meatprocessing facility at Sand Bay which allows farmers to diversify between wool and meat," and also Saladero which he said produced high quality sheep and cattle.

Dr Negrin also emphasised the value of the services of the Department of Agriculture, saying the organisation was key in terms of consultation and helping the farming community to obtain access to "high-quality genetics and technical services."

Asked what thoughts he had on improvements to Islands agriculture, he said, "speaking from a very humble point of view," he saw the benefits of increased field divisions through fencing.

He noted that fencing would improve grass quality, leading to higher stocking rates and best use of grass, and commented on the importance of utilisation of artesian water (needed if fields were smaller and without natural water sources) and planting of trees for shelter.

He anticipated trade in terms of animal genetics giving as an example polwarth sheep genetics, and further improvements to the already, "excellent Angus herd."

Dr Negrin said the visit had been far beyond his expectations

in a positive way, he noted that land in Uruguay was now in short supply as a result of the soya bean boom but, "here there are no land limitations."

With the world population increasing and food needs rising he believed the Falkland Islands Meat Company would find it easy to be, "very busy, because there are not enough companies to produce what is needed.

"We are lucky to visit at this phase in the Falklands' agricultural development when the Islands are starting to seriously take-off."

Dr Negrin, on behalf the delegates expressed his gratitude to the people of the Falklands for the warm welcome and to the Department of Agriculture for the excellent programme and planning. He described the whole trip as "worthwhile."

E250,000 has been awarded to the South Georgia Heritage Trust by the UK Government Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Defra).

The award was made to secure the survival of one of the world's most important seabird sanctuaries on the sub Antarctic island of South Georgia, said a spokesperson for the project.

The Habitat Restoration project is an ambitious three year plan to eradicate rats, which originally arrived on South Georgia as stowaways on scaling and whaling ships, but whose recent population explosion is having a catastropic effect on the island's wildlife and ecology, especially its endemic bird populations.

Following years of planning, a highly successful pilot phase of the project was conducted in 2011, which witnessed the successful removal of rats from a tenth of the total infected area. The only effective way to eradicate rodents on an island the size of South Georgia is by air and two helicopters were used to de-

liver the rat bait. After years of preparation, but in just 26 days, an 11 strong team of international experts, spread 48 tonnes of bait over 128 square kilometres.

Having demonstrated that the methodology and technology is effective, the stage is now set for the second phase of the world's largest rat eradication project to get underway in 2013 and 2014.

Explaining the government's support of this important environmental initiative on this southernmost UK Overseas Protected Territory, Minister for the Natural Environment and Fisheries Richard Benyon said:

"I've been captivated by South Georgia, ever since reading of the plight of Sir Ernest Shackleton as a child. With the centenary of this

famous expedition just around the corner, we have a once in a lifetime chance to help return this precious habitat to an even better state than that in which Shackleton would have first discovered it. I'm delighted that the UK Government has been able to offer its support to this valuable work and hope that others may be encouraged do the same."

This funding helps SGHT move closer to the estimated £2.8 million of funding needed by end of 2012 to continue the Habitat Restoration work in early 2013.

Speaking about the funding announcement. Howard Pearce, the Chairman of Trustees of the South Georgia Heritage Trust said: "The Trust is delighted with this generous grant from Defra, which gives a tremendous boost to our campaign to eradicate invasive rodents from South Georgia.

"The impact of the project, once completed, will be spectacular. Our vision is to return South Georgia to the pristine state in which Captain Cook discovered it in 1775.

A whale of an Antarctic tale

Continued from last week: Penguin News' winter Deputy Editor shares her experience and images on board the 26 metre Hans Hansson, the most recent addition to the Poncet fleet... Beautiful views and lively passengers.

WHILE I have been waxing lyrical about my Antarctic adventure I may have led you to believe it was a glorified jolly, I should point out that in between soaking up the sights and sounds and popping up in front of professional camera men to claim my shot, I was also cooking for 16 hungry men.

A similar misconception on my part had led me to believe that a Japanese film crew would probably thrive on two rice crackers and a bowl of miso soup each per day, but the reality was far from it.

It was like a 14 day sports week with vast cauldrons of hearty warming soup, stews, curries, lasagne and pizza constantly on the go with bowls being licked clean, and if my calculations serve me correct, some 60 kilos of flour turned into rolls and loaves during that time. And, if the hearty appetited gentlemen in question will pardon my saying, their night time habits were also akin to sports, with the saki, wine and conversation flowing freely until the wee small hours.... and still they were up and ready for breakfast by 7am. Much as it pains me to admit it, myself and my fellow Islander, sports hardened crew mates, were totally in awe of their stamina as we progressed south and it seemed one early night was enough to sustain them for another five!

Still high on the whale sightings of Wilkhelmina Bay we continued to Cuverville and Danco Islands, where we spotted the cruise ship Endeavour, a familiar sight in Stanley harbour throughout the season making her way north from Port Lockroy.

This was our anchorage for the night and with supper hurriedly served and cleaned up after we piled into the zodiac to make ourselves known to the Antarctic Trust employees (rumoured to be all female) who live on the tiny island for five months of the year.

At a first glance this could also be considered a cushy number, but in reality the four women and one man take a step back in time when they land on the island used for whaling between 1911 and 1931 and later the British military Operation Tabarin in which the Falklands were involved during World War II. Although Port Lockroy was renovated in 1996 and is now a much visited museum and post office, the Nissen hut living quarters were afforded no such luxury and the dedicated team only get a shower when a visiting cruise ship extend their hospitality. Despite this the competition is fierce to spend the austral summer at the base and the present incumbents had triumphed over several hundred other applicants to secure their place.

The museum is a credit to them all and the gaudy gloss painted interior is reminiscent of many an old outside house in the Falklands Camp with massive old radio system still in worki condition and the weather rec pristine. The only hint of a its early residents are the portraits of the (rather well a

the bunk room walls. Whether film star pin-ups, turn around and with repairs to the generator in a girlfriend or wife, that frail, feminine presence order we anchored in Port Charcot where Aidan adds a very human touch to what must have been and Dion worked until 11pm getting things sorta harsh lifestyle endured only by the strongest of men

Onwards south we nudged our way through the loose sea ice in the hope that we might reach the Ukraine base of Verdansky (formerly known as Farraday) which, as far as skipper Dion was aware no small ships had managed to reach this season

The dull clunk of ice on the hull had become a comforting sound by now, and as the bass line of JJ Cale's Ride the River blended in with the steady beat of the massive Bergen engine powering us forward, I prepared pie, mash and syrup and coconut tart for supper. While the film crew were not blessed with a massive sweet tooth the Hans Hansson crew were, and I knew what wasn't devoured with the meal would either mysteriously disappear during the night watches or be happily sayoured for breakfast.

It had been an interesting afternoon with the Japanese film crew setting their presenter on a random ice floe before retreating some 500 metres to film him from a distance. It had given me quite a turn to glance out the port hole and see not a leopard or crabeater seal, but a red jacketed, designer sun glassed super star, standing alone and looking somewhat forlorn on the sea ice. For the life of me I couldn't think what it had in common with the Frozen Planet production I had watched, but then neither had some of the other somewhat dramatic scenes they had set

Our attempts to reach Verdandsky were sadly thwarted near Uruguay Island just two nautical miles short of the base. As the wind got up and the ice thickened there was nothing for it but to

Having gone to bed after a cup of cocoa on the after deck admiring the ice free bay and laughing at the penguins antics belly sledging up and down the hill, it was with some amazement I awoke to an ice filled bay with huge ice bergs nearby. Just when you think you are getting the hang of this amazing continent it springs another surprise.

Heading towards Peterman Island, home to an Adelie penguin colony, we spotted the barque Europa up ahead. In the dull light and with light snow falling it was if the scene was in black and white. My overactive imagination was soon in action and as we gained on them I was convinced there was a Johnny Dep-like character swinging or possibly even swigging in the rigging. I (only just) restrained the urge to yell "fire" as we drew abreast into what seemed to me to be the perfect broadside position and gazed up at a flotation suited figure high in the rigging. Somehow all that modern cold weather gear worn by the 30 odd souls lining the deck bought us bang up to date deflating my piratatical fantasy, but it was the only ship we had not only caught up with, but left in our wake.

By nightfall we had travelled some 1,100 miles since we left the Falklands in the hardy little Hans Hansson and she was really starting to grow on me. The rattle of the anchor being raised causes a sense of anticipation of what we will experience next and whether it's a heavy swell, choppy waves or lumps of ice in her path she pushes ahead with the heart of a far larger ship. Some nights nestled in my bunk it's hard to remember in detail the feast of sights and sounds we'd experienced during the day, and making it all happen was this feisty, fifty year old lady who had made her name as a rescue boat in Arctic oceans at the other end of the world.

Filming completed in Peterman and following a return to Cuverville, Dion set a course for Enterprise Island. Tying up alongside the Governorn wreck at 5pm, it felt a bit like coming home, especially as the perfect conditions we'd experienced on our previous visit again welcomed us. With the film crew all ashore Dion, Ben and Aidan unleashed the fishing rods and were soon

hauling yellow bellies in while slurping at a well earned beer - the only thing missing was a barhecue

We returned to Cierva Cove, a fairly open area where the film crew made a live transmission to an estimated 10 million viewers in Tokyo. The success of this mission was celebrated in true Japanese fashion until well after we set sail at 11 pm. With my guitar restrung and tuned one of the camera men entertained with a host of Beatles songs as well as some 'almost country' Japanese favourites. With seven pound tomato tins as drums and various jars filled with crackers and peanuts beating out a rhythm we found ourselves singing "We all live on the Hans Hansson" to the tune of "Yellow Submarine" and again I couldn't help but think how well these guys from an entirely different culture would embrace our Falklands sports weeks.

Urged to play a few tunes I bargained for an eight o'clock breakfast, before bashing out a version of Jambalaya Dae Peck would have been proud off. With my sleep-in secured. I wandered of to bed as the Hans Hansson made her way back across the Bransfield Strait to Deception Island.

Deception has a unique landscape of barren volcanic slopes, steaming beaches and ashlayered glaciers. It has a distinctive horse-shoe shape with a large flooded caldera which opens

to the sea through a narrow channel known as Nentunes Bellows and is one of the only places in the world where vessels can sail directly into the centre of a restless volcano.

We were lucky enough to spend time ashore at both Bailey Head which is home to thousands of Chinstrap penguins, and also exploring the abandoned Norwegian whaling station Hektor which was in action from 1911 to 1931. Up until the eruption of 1967, the island had been occupied as part of Operation Tabarin, the covert wartime expedition aimed at securing control of southern regions, with an eye on the Falkland Islands, in the face of Argentine and German territorial claims. Deception Island provided a strategic location and denied access and opportunities to enemy ships and U-boats.

My adventure was almost at an end with a return flight to Punta Arenas with the film crew. but Dion, Ben and Aidan were preparing to welcome a BBC film crew and continue to South Georgia before taking on the Drake Passage again on the way home.

Sharon's crewmate Islander Ben Cockwell will take up the story and complete the circle on his return to the Falkland Islands.



TWO very different weeks have occurred in trading from a stable week to last weeks very buoyant price rises. With very little change in the EMI over the last two weeks of January the EMI then sharply rose by 50 cents to AU\$1,243. This is 847p/kg clean in Stirling, up 38 pence.

Changes in the American dollar exchange rate have caused some of this upturn but also a slowly declining amount of bales on offer has been compounded with keen interest from buyers particularly Taiwan and China. Lots for sale have varied over the last month by 19,000 bales and this has been shown by sale clearance rates hitting 96% last week.



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

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Legislative Assembly

REFERRING to the amount of information about Falkland Islands residents now being held by various government departments and private sector organisations, (in many cases without individuals having access to their contents) during Thursday's meeting of the Legislative Assembly MLA, Dr Barry Elsby introduced a motion requiring the consideration of the introduction of a Data Protection Ordinance. This motion was passed, but with some reservations being expressed by other members about its priority.

During the speeches for adjournment, a number of MLAs offered condolences to the Argentine people in the wake of the recent tragic railway accident in Buenos Aires.

Concerns were raised about the confrontational behaviour of some members of a recently visiting Argentine veterans group, though the public was warned that any response to this kind of behaviour had to be within the law.

Assurances were given to the Falklands Chilean population by MLA Mike Summers that in the unlikely event of the LAN flight being suspended as a result of pressure by the Argentine Government, FIG had contingencies in place for getting them home, should it be necessary.

Punta visit a possibility

THE imminent arrival in Punta Arenas on Thursday of what was described as "the first ship from the Falklands in two years" was reported in Chilean newspapers and the Buenos Aires Herald.

It is possible that other ships from the Islands may have visited the southern Chilean port since April, 2010, when Decree 256 was signed by Cristina Kirchner requiring prior authorisation for vessels bound for the Falklands intending to pass through Argentine territorial waters. However, the subject of the articles was the cargo vessel *Scout* chartered by South American Atlantic Services Ltd (SAAS)

Locally, SAAS were not prepared to comment on these reports.

US congressman in Stanley says cool it Argentina

SOUTH American rhetoric on the Falklands should, "be cooled, otherwise mistakes might happen," US member of the house of Representatives Republican Congressman F. Jim Sensenbrenner told the Falkland Islands Legislative Assembly yesterday.

Invited to the Falklands by MLAs who visited Washington in 2011, the visiting congressmen, who sits on the powerful Judiciary Committee and is Chair of the Subcommittee on Crime Terrorism and Homeland Security, offered firm support for self determination for Falkland Islanders.

He added that if the United Nations, "means what it says," it would have to stand behind, "the decision that Falkland Islanders had made for themselves."

Asked about the UN urging "talks" on the Falklands, he said later to Islands' media, "I don't see the Argentines being able to negotiate because Mr Menem put a provision in the Argentine constitution that says the Falklands belong to Argentina." He concluded that as a result, Argentina could only work towards that end, but no Islanders wanted Argentina to assume sovereignty.

He suggested, "rather than being treated to power point presentations by Foreign Minister Timerman they (the UN) should back up the self determination of



Falkland Islanders."

Mr Sensenbrenner described the Islands as vibrant and economically self sufficient. We appeared to have done better than most countries in escaping the effects of recession.

He said the Islands had a democratic form of government and he was impressed at how issues were debated with the public.

The congressman felt the Falklands had, "a lot to offer in terms of a developing economy and for a base for scientific exploration," with regard to climate change.

Mr Sensenbrenner also suggested that the Governor, if he ever visited the USA, should make it clear he is, "not a colonial Governor but a Governor of an Overseas Territory and there is a big difference between the two."

Calls for change by

Argentina CRACKS appearing in the previously impervious wall of Argentine opinion about the sovereignty issue, which PN noted in its lead story last week, have suddenly become wider.

Historian Luis Alberto Romero, whose article "Are the Malvinas really ours?" PN quoted, is one of a group of 17 Argentine intellectuals, journalists and constitutional experts who have called on their government to adopt a new strategy towards the Islands which would have at its centre the right to self-determination of the Islanders.

Entitled 'An alternative view on the Malvinas cause' the group's report which appeared in La Nacion, was described as, "an invitation to reflect," and was also published on the internet.

Taking up an argument which has often been employed by both the British and Falkland Island governments, the report says. "It is necessary today to put an end to the contradictory demand by the Argentine Government for bilateral discussions including sovereignty, while at the same time announcing that Argentine sovereignty is non-negotiable."

Suggesting real dialogue with the British, "and especially with the Islanders," with an open agenda and regional scope, the report goes on to state, "In honour of the human rights treaties incorporated into the constitution of our country in 1944, the inhabitants of the Malvinas must be recognised as entitled to the same rights. Respect for their way of life as demanded in the transitory clauses from the amended constitution means abdicating any intention of imposing on them a sovereignty, a citizenship and a government they do not wish.

"The obsessive statement of the principle, 'The Malvinas are Argentine' and the ignorance of, or scorn for, the subjugation (of the Islanders) that this supposes, weakens our just and peaceful claim for the withdrawal of the United Kingdom and its military base and makes it impossible to advance negotiations about natural resources between Argentines and Islanders."

AMID all the attention being given to anniversaries this year. I have just allowed one of my own to go by unnoticed. In fact, last November marked forty years since I first arrived in the Falkland Islands. (In view of recent statements from Argentina. I should point out that my wife and I had not been exiled by the British Government as a result of some misdemeanour or other, but were here voluntarily to take up offers of work.)

More scary than the thought of leaving everything behind to live at the other end of the world was the need to explain this to my fierce Irish mother-in-law, who was only just beginning to come to terms with the fact that her daughter had married a bearded protestant Englishman. She lived in Dundee in Scotland and to my surprise, when I told her we were going to the Falkland Islands, she said. "Oh that's great, I'll be able to see you at the weekends."

This confusion about the location of the Falklands was common forty years ago in Britain. In 1982, of course, the Argentine invasion brought the Islands to the attention of the British people and, more importantly, the British Government. After losing British lives to recover the Islands, giving away sovereignty was no longer an acceptable option, but making up for the previous years of neglect was.

The present Argentine government's confusion about the Islands is unsurprising given that they seem to be permanently stuck in 1833 and therefore unable to accept any of the facts of our present existence, but they also seem confused about the composition of Britain. For example, the rent-a-crowd protests recently in Argentina were all against the piratical 'Ingleses' or 'English' and never the 'British,' despite the fact that the Westminster Parliament is chock-a-block with Scots, Welsh and even Northern Irish members.

Now, according to some reports, the Argentine government is seeking to boost their sovereignty claim by forging an alliance with the Scottish Nationalist Party (SNP) and may send a delegation to the celebrations of the anniversary of Robert the Bruce's victory over the English at Bannockburn, 700 years ago.

Well, the Scots and Welsh Guards and other British - but not English - forces who fought and died here in 1982, might have a problem with that and because of the predominance of Scots among the many ethnic and national groups who have made their home here over the last 160 odd years, if SNP leader, Mr Salmond, does get to rule over a newly independent Scotland, he may well decide that his country has a prior claim over the Falklands, particularly as they were named after a Scot.

One day, said Geoff, a Senior NCO watched Charlie stand up, put on

his beret and salute the aircraft." The furious NCO demanded to know, "what the f**k he was playing at." said Geoff, and Char-lie replied, "It's my 21st birthday I'm taking the salute."

The talk was originally only intended for Falkland Islanders. but on arrival the pair was persuaded to give the presentation to members of HMS *Clyde* and to the Officers Mess at Mount Pleasant. They have also been invited to travel to West Falklands to talk to residents there

With a foreword by Major General Julian Thompson the book tells the stories of ordinary seamen, marines, soldiers and airmen including Falklands resident and war veteran former Royal Marine Gary Clement.

Interviewees were drawn exclusively from the lowest ranks of the series and none previously have been interviewed for publication

Charlie explained: "If any of us eventually receive payment for our contributions to the book we will be giving those funds to Liberty Lodge so that all Falklands veterans can benefit from it.

Meeting debates public access ordinance

ONE of two presentations given at the public meeting on Monday night included the proposals for public access ordinance.

Among changes proposed was that notice of government committee meetings should receive, "adequate publicity," and that minutes should be produced within 15 days of the meeting, although as before. the aim will be for publication within five days.

Currently the media has no protection should they report comments deemed to be defamatory made in the meetings, however, the new ordinance will provide protection if reports are fair and accurate.

At the public meeting a discussion on the proposals queried the current policy of non publishing of reports pertaining to 'work in progress,' and a query regarding access to background papers.

Interested persons still have time to put forward their thoughts on the proposals for public access ordinance.

The family was officially given the deeds to the island by the Phillips family in January 2011 and on Saturday a memorial stone and plaque was unveiled. The island will be untouched and remain as a wildlife haven Carol Phillips has assured the family

Mr Jones told the BBC that Craig Island "is a really good lasting tribute to him and his mates.

A chance to join or help

THE Falkland Islands Unit of the Sea Cadets will celebrate its 21st birthday this year confirmed Chairman of the Unit Management Committee David Lang.

All Sea Cadet Units are named after present or past ships of the Royal Navy. The Falkland Is-lands Unit was originally named TS Pursuivant. After a number of years, by popular demand the Unit's name was changed to TS Endurance after HMS Endurance (TS stands for Training Ship). The Unit was founded in March 1991 and officially admitted to the Sea Cadet Corps the following year.

Mr Lang said, "We plan to celebrate our anniversary from March 2012 to March 2013, starting off with an anniversary weekend on Saturday March 17, 2012 with an open day at the Town Hall. We have in mind to have an anniversary service led by our joint Chaplains Reverend Fr Peter Norris and Reverend Kathy Biles later in the year. There will be other events during the year including the Cadet Challenge in April and a Curry and Dance Night in October as close as possible to Trafalgar Night."

The Sea Cadets are the UK's largest maritime youth charity. In the Falkland Islands they cannot be part of the UK Charity so the Unit is registered as a charity in the Falkland Islands. TS Endurance is a small cadet unit with a limit of twenty-five cadets.

Mr Lang is seeking new members for the Sea Cadets. "You need to be between 10 and 18, keen to test your talents and eager to learn exciting new skills, such as sailing and power boating. Does that sound like you? Then contact us by emailing XO@tsendurance. org.fk"

Also within the Falklands Sea Cadets is a Royal Marines Cadets detachment. To join you have to be between 13 and 18. The Marine Cadets detachment of the Sea Cadets was renamed the Royal Marines Cadets in 2011 following agreement by HM The Queen to the use of "Royal" in the title.

"We are also seeking adults as instructors and helpers," he explained, "You don't have to be ex-Royal Navy, ex Royal Marine or ex-Merchant Navy. We welcome anybody willing and able to help.

Lastly, we need to raise funds every year. It cost over £7000 according to our Treasurer to run the Unit last year. Even though we had generous help from Government and the private sector we couldn't raise the whole amount, and had to run down our bank account. Please help us by supporting our fund-raising efforts. If we fail to raise sufficient cash, the Unit will not be able to continue."

Sea cadets: Public criticism at attempt to regulate those paid to drive for hire or reward

A LIVELY discussion at the public meeting on Monday night followed the introduction by Inspector Len McGill of a consultation paper on a certification process for those paid to drive taxis or carry tourists.

After inviting interested parties to email him with thoughts on the subject he explained that the proposal came about as a result of the Members requiring a process to increase public confidence in people who drive vehicles for hire reward.

Inspector McGill said he was often asked by tourists, "how do you regulate your drivers?" and he was forced to respond, "we don't," and this, "put people off."

The proposed permit looks at driving ability, the possession of a relevant licence, conviction rate, and health of the person driving as well as personal conduct and insurance cover. To qualify, the driver would fill out a form and volunteer the relevant information. Inspector McGill noted that it did not necessarily follow that a declaration of a certain illness or conviction would disbar the applicant from receiving a certificate. He explained that a health issue would have to constitute a,

"danger to driving a vehicle," for an application to be refused.

The public consultation period on the proposal will end on March

A number of members of the public commented negatively on the issue, claiming it would bring about a cost to drivers, who must already take the risk of driving on non designated roads, "where a 12 year old driving dad's vehicle might bump into us and knock us off road," said experienced tourist driver Gary Clement. He said, "It seems ridiculous

that we have to do this (be certified) but you would allow that to happen.

He noted, "I see this as another tax; you want us to pay more. We have tax and insurance, so why do we need more?

MLA lan Hansen said he was concerned about the proposal in terms of possible duplication of. . what is already put in place by FITB.

Bus company owner Andrea Clausen also raised the subject of duplication, and suggested that it might be more sensible to simply add further conditions (health, convictions) to public service ve-

MLA Sawle agreed there was an issue regarding, "more payment", and that he was in favour of certain types of people not driving but did not want it to affect the amount of drivers in the tourist industry. He said drivers were often called up on at the last minute and a certification process might prove, "cumbersome."

Further questions from the floor included: how would checks be carried out on drivers recently from overseas, and were not vehicles already checked as a result of requiring insurance?

Another member of the public noted there was currently also a lack of regulation regarding MOT, in that if one garage failed a vehicle then another might pass it.

MLA Mike Summers commented it should not be forgotten that the issue also arose because of there being no way to regulate taxi drivers. He explained that currently young individuals could become taxi drivers immediately after obtaining a licence.

Chair of the meeting MLA Roger Edwards concluded that the general feeling was the proposal involved "an unnecessary degree of control and that costs should be examined.

A SPECIAL museum exhibition commemorating the 30th anniversary of the Falklands war will focus on bringing out lesser-known stories from 1982 and in particular those of Islanders

Previously the museum's 1982 exhibitions have been largely a chronological record of events, but this time they are keen to use personal memories and anecdotes to tell the stories behind those events.

"There are some accounts that are heard very often, and those stories are important and do need to be told, but we should also try to bring out a broader range of stories," said Museum Manager Leona Roberts.

"It is vital that our younger generations and visitors understand what people went through in 1982; whether they were part of the Task Force, living under occupation here in the Falklands, or overseas, sick with worry for what might become of family and friends at home."

For the first time ever, the museum is collaborating with another organisation on an exhibition; the Fleet Air Arm Museum in Yeovil will be holding a 'sister' exhibition and some content will be shared between the organisations.


Because of limited space in Britannia House, the museum will be using St. Mary's Church Hall for the exhibition, which is planned to run for approximately 10 months, opening in June.

¹ HAVE listened with interest to BBC Breakfast today, and read your website with regards to Argentina's statement to the UN regarding the "militarisation" of the Falklands.

I would like to mention to the BBC that there is an angle to this whole story that has been missing from your reporting, and that is comment from us, the Falkland Islanders, who live here.

We are so very tired of the anger and threat from Argentina directed at us. Argentina doesn't recognise our right to self determination because they say we have no right to live here, hence have no right to comment on our future in the Islands. My question to them is, how long do people have to live somewhere before they can rightly call it home? My mother is a 4th generation Falkland Islander, my children now 6th. Many other families are now up to 8th or even more! As my husband (himself a 5th generation Islander) put it to me the other day, he could no more see himself becoming an Argentinean and living under their flag than he could see himself settling in England. Of course we have strong links to the UK, and not just through our great-great-great grandparents, but also more recent. British people have moved to the Islands and settled here regularly over our history. There has been a constant flow of people back and forward between the UK (and other countries too it must be noted) and the Islands for all sorts of reasons be it for education, health, financial or family reasons. Of course we see ourselves as British, but probably as "Falkland Islanders" first.

I wonder how far back Mrs de Kirchner's Argentinean roots go? How many generations can the current Argentinean government count back before they get to the European settlers who first ventured into Patagonia and displaced the Indians? Probably not many more generations back than I can count my own family. How come they have a right, as an "imported" nation to be taken seriously when the Falkland Islanders seem to be ignored?

There was no indigenous population here when the British and French first moved into the Falklands. Also, Argentina wasn't a country in existence either! It hadn't yet been formed from the United Provinces. General Rosas was busy ridding Patagonia of its native Indians while the British were setting up in the Falklands. Whether Argentina likes it or not, the history of our country is here as fact for anyone to research. Unfortunately, Argentina has a knack of rewriting its history books to adapt to the point they wish to make.

Your letters

With regard to the militarisation of the Falklands, a small point is surely the fact that if Argentina hadn't invaded our country 30 years ago, there would be no need for any military to be here. Yes, the government is very different now in Argentina from 30 years ago, but their aggressive stance towards the Falklands hasn't changed one bit. They still want us!

It is soul destroying to think that my children will have to face the same continued threat from Argentina as I have grown up with. Surely now is the time to put the past behind us and move forward together. I hope that Argentina will wake up and realise that we aren't going to vanish or give in to their bullying, and that they accept us as a nation of people in our own right, choosing to live the life we want to, quietly, in our own home, the Falkland Islands. I hope that soon we will see the Falklands and Argentina living peacefully, and respectfully, side by side.

Eric: Nocturnal deception

FOLLOWING on from my comment on 'Time' in Penguin News Vol: 23 No 36 Friday February 10, 2012. I am spurred on by the many calls in agreement to fuel up the debate.

I actually expected comment from the originators of the petitions, like the two I signed. What became of them? Who were they delivered to? My thanks to MLA Cheek for providing me with a copy of ExCo paper 20/12 Subject Clock Times to help broaden my understanding of the process.

I find it hard to grasp the paper from the Policy Unit of January 12 Survey on Clock Times was the basis of ExCo decision. This paper shows 209 responses received. 181 individuals, 28 business = 9 per cent of the adult population over 15 years of age. That is not a fair proportion of the population. Was any, or all the government departments consulted?

And it gets worse, (1,1.6) of the survey states, 110 individuals supported remaining on Summer Time all year round and 17 businesses. PUBLIC ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE: VACANCY

An opportunity has arisen for a member of the community to become involved in helping to ensure that FIG is delivering value-for-money to the residents of the Falkland Islands. Expressions of interest are sought from members of the public wishing to become a member of the Public Accounts Committee (PAC).

Under the Falkland Islands Constitution, the PAC comprises:

(a) a chairman and two other members appointed by the Governor; and (b) two members of the Legislative Assembly.

The PAC currently has a vacancy for a chairman under (a) above. The role involves six (or so) meetings per year, each lasting two hours, with an estimated time commitment of four hours per month for background reading and preparation. The role is unpaid but expenses are reimbursed. The appointment period will be until 31 January 2014 (in order to tie in with the appointment periods of the other, existing members).

The PAC has an important scrutiny role over the public accounts of all government departments and specified bodies. The PAC's task is to ensure that public funds have been expended properly, for the purposes for which they were voted by the Legislative Assembly. Hence the role is varied, complex and fascinating. Individuals appointed to the PAC make a significant contribution to the community, in helping to maintain high standards of public administration and good governance in the Falkland Islands. This calls for PAC members themselves to have the highest standards of personal integrity, discretion and commitment to the good governance of the Islands.

Applications should be submitted to the Governor by Monday 27 February, setting out the reasons for the applicant's interest in appointment to the PAC and the skills and experience that the applicant would bring to the job.

SOME nice quiet rain at last, 1 hope it doesn't mean more high winds to follow. The last ones really badly 'bruised' some shrubs and threatened to push out the only rhododendron 1've ever managed to grow from a cutting, however, it had surprisingly long and deep roots so all may be well. Some of the taller perennials did not fare so well though and look rather untidy now.

In the vegetable garden it was a different world; the wind seems to have passed it by and the potatoes were not burned off. Even the greens did not get their necks wrung as has happened before. The peas are still in full growth and some have even made it to the freezer, not too many mind!

Big competition among the girls regarding the pumpkins, but unfortunately each plant has had to carry at least two to satisfy demand so they will not get very big. The same cannot be said about the plants; they have spread rather madly and like triffids are growing amongst the tomatoes, making it very hard to harvest them. The tomatoes are producing very heavy crops and I have now 'stopped' them (removed the tops) to channel the food to the fruit. I have also removed some of the lower leaves to allow light to them. We 'girls' cut down the tops of the swedes leaving about six inches of greens on them. The rest went on the compost heap. They are

really rather good this year. 1 have lifted more potatoes too. The 'Estima' spuds did not do very well but they went in late. The other second early 'Charlotte'- my all time favourite potato - did very well. Shame they don't keep for too long. At least it has given us space to plant out the winter greens, which have been ready for some time now. I will also plant some seeds of cabbage for spring and some lettuce too. I am trying 'Winter Imperial' this year for that purpose.

While talking of seeds, I've just put in small pots various perennial and shrub and tree seeds. Those that come up now should make good growth before winter. If not will just have to find them some shelter over the colder months.

Have finished harvesting the red and white currants; masses of fruit! The black currants are heavy in fruit and probably my favourites for picking purposes, you can remove the branch bearing fruit just below the last bunch of fruit and have the kiddles carry it off to pick in comfort, in our case on the outside table watching the world go by. The bushes were so full that the pruning was heavier than usual this year but they will recover. It's a shame the red and white currants and gooseberries don't like the same treatment. The black-berries are also fruiting heavily now; they will go on doing so for some time yet and when they are over 1 shall move the plant (which is in a large pot to stop it taking over) into the lean-to greenhouse. This has a very high roof and will give it more space to spread itself. A grape went in there this year and is now growing well. Who knows

what it might do next year? Meanwhile, a friend has given me a cutting off her Tayberry. 1 shall treat that in the same manner but in another greenhouse as unlike the blackberry this one has thorns. The strawberries need cutting down to ensure they don't harbour any pests over winter. I'm going to put the outside ones in one of the raised beds, planting them through holes made in some black mesh. This might keep some pests at bay, perhaps.

I've continued to remove lilies from the tunnels and hope to put in some more potatoes there to finish cleaning the soil. Meanwhile, I'm shoe-horning the bulbs into the flower borders wherever a space appears, as the annuals I threw in go over.


Last year I grew loads of red Russel lupins to put amongst the oriental poppies in the 'rockery'. I came across a pure white one growing through one of the bushes at the back of another border and was so taken by it that I had to have more. As a child I used to say, "if one is good then more is gooder," I guess some things don't change for I found myself out between the squalls taking basal cuttings off this plant with no thought of waiting for its seeds. They might not be white seedlings anyway.

Talking of cuttings, I've been once again pestering people for rose cuttings. They really are a gorgeous flower and I cannot have too many of them. Most of them are very simple to propagate and a small cutting need hardly be missed or noticed on the parent plant; it's a simple thing to do and very satisfying to see them grow and flower. I like to get the ripe wood and a piece which has flowered is usually perfect. If it has very young leaves they tend to wilt very quickly so I ensure anything like that is cut off anyway. A piece about 20 to 30cms is perfect. Just gently pull the branch back on itself till it comes away with a little 'heel'

Secateurs are handy if it won't do it by itself or is too prickly to handle. You need a plant pot deep enough to accommodate it full of compost and a bit of sand and some water. Put on a plastic cover and then wait for the roots.



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

Port San Carlos to Stanley ultramarathon

THE first Falklands Ultra Marathon took place on the weekend. February 18-19. The long haul began at Port San Carlos at 9pm on Saturday, with seven runners starting the 65 mile route from Port San Carlos to Stanley and following in the footsteps of the soldiers and marines of nearly 30 years earlier.

The event had been planned for some time. The original date for the event was February 12, but with what turned out to be very accurate weather forecasting, the event was delayed for one week.

On arrival at the Port San Carlos the evening was wet and cold but as the runners emerged from their vehicles the clouds gave way to a spectacularly clear sky with very little wind.

The drop in temperature that night was very noticeable as temperatures plummeted compared to the recent warm spell. This took its toll on some of the competitors as most had expected slightly warmer weather, showing grit and determination all made to the half way point at Teal Inlet before sunrise. Three more runners joined the event at Teal Inlet, completing the half distance. As the sun started to rise the first two runners approached Mt Kent having watched the beacon on Mt Kent get very slowly

closer over the last 30 miles. The course then took entrants cross country to Stanley tackling the Murrell Bridge and avoiding the minefields. With 65 miles on the legs it was never destined to be a sprint for the finish, the two lead runners Major Shaun Lamb and Battery Sergeant Major Barry Daniels both from the Resident Rapier Battery crossed the finish line together.

Iwo of the seven competitors completed the full course and all three of the half course entrants completed the course. The winning time for the full course was 13 hours and 10 minutes. While the Half Ultra was won by Bombardier Jesse Jackson in a time of five hours. While many might consider it a rather strange way to spend a Saturday night and Sunday, a total of nearly £4,000 was raised for charity, with money going to the Marie Curie and the Anthony Nolan Trust Major Lamb commented, "Many of the entrants that attempted this have never run further than ten miles before, for those that almost made it what an amazing effort, and to all those that have contributed both with time and financially, thank you very much.



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


