MPA road included in feasibility works funding

A DESIGN programme for the period 2014-2019 shows £129,718 will be spent on feasibility works for the MPA and Cape Pembroke roads.

Following the award of £600,000 during the budget session for design and consultancy. ExCo last week approved an allocation for external consultancy and design works only (internal design works must come out of the Design Section budget).

Included in the former are the elderly care home, power station and the temporary Infant Junior School classroom to be built in Stanley House grounds

£139,123 was approved for design and consultancy fees relating to the elderly care home and £116,206 for the Power Station. *More ExCo stories on page 4*

Michael at UN

CLIMATE change, organic farming practices and a wide range of approaches to sustainable development were subjects wrestled with at the third United Nations meeting of Small Island Developing States, attended by MLA Michael Poole and Environmental Officer Nick Rendell as part of the UK delegation.

The conference, hosted in the pacific Island of Samoa, involved more than 2,000 delegates with roughly 100 nations being represented.

He said they discussed, "communications challenges and the difficulties that come with being remote. There are 52 such nations in the SIDS grouping, and many face similar challenges to us."

Keen anglers kick start the season

KEEN Falklands anglers Nick Bonner (right) and Gene Berntsen were out testing the rivers on the first day of the season on Monday and caught 25 fish between them.

Nick said they fished the Hope Cottage part of The Pedro and Turners Stream with the smallest catch weighing in at 80z and the biggest at 4lb.


All the fish were released apart from one

The Falklands sea trout or northern brown trout was introduced more than 50 years ago and has adapted to local conditions with fish in excess of 10lb caught regularly.

The current record is 22lbs 12.5ozs and was landed at the San Carlos River by Alison Falkner in 1992.

The fishing season runs from September to April and while no licence is necessary, permission must be sought before entering private land and there is a daily bag limit of six trout per angler.

It is recommended that catch and release is practised by using a single barbless hook. Special conditions apply to the Murrell River with fishing not permitted from the culverts or within 100 metres of the crossing on either side. The daily bag limit is three trout and each trout must weigh over 1.51b or 0.5kg. Fishing is prohibited upstream from the area known as Drunken Rock.



New national accounts show Falklands GDP still volatile

RECENTLY released data shows that the Falkland Islands Gross Domestic Product (GDP) continues to be volatile; expanding considerably during some years and shrinking in others.

The Falkland Islands National Accounts 2007-2012 figures recently produced by the Policy Unit explains, "previously this has been caused by volatility in the fisheries industry but for the period 2010-2012 oil and gas exploration added to this effect."

Corporations directly engaged in oil and gas exploration related activities within the Falklands' territory were estimated to contribute annually about £50 to £55 million to GDP during this period. Oil and gas exploration was also the main source of growth between 2009 and 2010. It is expected that the overall GDP figure has decreased significantly for 2013 as there was no oil and gas exploration drilling.

exploration drilling. Looking at the GDP under the category 'value added by type of activity', fishing and aquaculture represents a massive 34.1 per cent. and oil and gas 24.9 per cent. The increased share of 'wholesale and retail trade, transportation and storage, accommodation and food service activities' in GDP to 18.2 per cent is mostly due to transportation and storage industry activities.

Per capita gross domestic prod-

uct is based on a population of 2562 persons and is £77.4 thousand for 2012. Gross national income figures that better reflect income earned by Falkland Islands residents will be released at a later date.

What does GDP measure?

Gross Domestic Product measures the size of economic activity within a defined territory and time-frame. GDP should not be viewed as a measure of the wealth of a nation. Wealth is something that is accumulated over time. Whilst GDP can give indications on how much new wealth is generated during a particular year, it does not consider how the new wealth is distributed.

HAVING mentally prepared myself not to curse at the state of the MPA to Stanley road on my return on Saturday, it was a pleasant surprise to find it in a slightly better condition than when I had last driven it a month earlier Not that the state it is currently in is anything for the Government to be proud of I hasten to add.

A screen shot of this much maligned but vital part of Falklands infrastructure flashed into my head at the Planning and Building meeting on Wednesday when an application for a garage and parking area for trucks near Boxer Bridge was met with some concern for the general appearance and how it might look to tourists. A quick glance around the table assured me that this was quite serious and no one was having a little tongue-incheek jolly jape.

Hellooo! Said tourists have to be hustled past Steptoe's Yard (aka Gordon Lines) and Mary Hill Quarry bursting with twisted metal and toxic substances before they reach Gypsy Cove and the penguins. Those that fly in have to endure 'that road' to get to Stanley first and if they choose to head out on FIGAS they get a birds eye view of the entire fiasco

I appreciate the need to prevent further eyesores being created, but to get things into perspective the area to the west of Boxer Bridge is essentially an industrial area and so one would surely expect to see workshops and vehicles parked up there.

In complete contrast a paper from the Public Works Department proposing what appears to be a long term plan for continued spoil dumping in the Mary Hill area of the National Nature Reserve of Cape Pembroke, was noted and agreed without a murmur.

To date spoil fill (including building rubble, metal, invasive plants and God only knows what else) has taken place over almost 15 acres with another 15 to be completed according to this latest plan, which comes hot on the heels of endless promises and papers to Executive Council and pleas from large numbers of the public to reduce such activity in the area

But perhaps there is some good to be had from it all (and now I am placing my tongue very firmly in cheek) because, "....evacuated material from Marine works, such as the temporary port will be directed into the western end of Mary Hill proper, so that this minimises the risk of leachates, including salt (shock, horror) escaping and causing damage to the surrounding vegetation etc.

Maybe the Committee was a bit like me in one respect and just couldn't muster up any enthusiasm about these extravagant lengths to protect a coastal environment from salt, but unlike them. I simply couldn't let it pass without comment.



Building update

PENDING further discussion on fire safety issues with Fire Chief Gardner Fiddes, the Falkland Islands Company (FIC) was given permission to build 25 two bedroom apartments on the land to the west of 34 Fitzroy Road.

The land to the rear of the FIC offices and warehouses on Crozier Place was described by FIC's Property and Construction Director Matthew Blyth at Wednesday's Planning and Building meeting as, "a piece of wasteland," which the company was trying to develop and tidy up.

He said the two storey blocks of flats and the three storey block would be built in a similar style to buildings currently being constructed in Stanley and would be 'set down" in the plot so as not to block light to the road. A two storey building for office units at Plot 25 Lookout Retail Park was also approved for lan Stewart Construction Planning Officer Fiona Wallace-Nannig said there had been some concerns about a nearby fibre optic cable to the adjacent IT building, but also pointed out that permission had previously been granted for a single storey building on the site, so the footprint was still the same size.

Grimmer and Jones Haulage was given permission to erect a garage workshop and a hard standing to park tipper trucks on at 18 Boxer Bridge as was the Public Works Department to build a double garage to house the hearse and pallbearers vehicle to ensure they are kept in a secure

and clean environment.

The new mobile home park at Murray Heights continues to grow with Henry Guala's application to site a home at 5 Teaberry Way approved, however Nick Davis' application to resite a caravan at 3 Mountain Berry Road was refused due to the condition of the building and because it was not in keeping with the other homes on the development. Director of Publie Works Manfred Keenleyside noted that all the plots had now been allocated.

Avril Bonner was given permission to convert the garage at 4 Felton Court into a two bedroom house with the condition that it remains within the ownership of the property and the Benjamin and Harris families at 18 and 19 Callaghan Road are to build a conservatory to the front of their semi-detached properties.

Other applications approved were erection of flag poles for Malcolm Jamieson at I Rex Hunt Rd and at the Natural Resources Building on the Bypass Road and the conversion of a garden to an enclosed polytunnel for Graham Fiddes at The Stables, Moody Brook

Provision for fuel storage is to be carried out at Stanley Growers Ltd in the form of a bunded laydown area for waste oils and at Fox Bay Village Stanley Services' application to install three self-bunded fuel tanks and improve the existing tanks was also approved.

Chemical Handlers Training Course

Who should do Chemical Training?


Anyone who uses agricultural chemicals or veterinary medicines should complete some training.

- Training is targeted to people involved in:
- Cropping
- Horticulture and viticulture
- Livestock production (vaccinations and drenches) Pest animal control
- And anyone else who uses agricultural and veterinary chemicals

A fee of £50 per person includes; attendance at the training workshop, a comprehensive training manual including all course materials and related resources and a certificate upon successful completion.

After 21 years with FIG Roy has bigger fish to fry

ROY Summers (40) completed 21 years service with the Falkland Islands Government this week and is moving into the private sector, taking his skills and experience to shipping agency Sulivan Shipping Ltd.

Mr Summers joined the Fisheries Department in July 1993 as data elerk, and transferred to trainee fishery officer later in the year

His training included a stint overseas where he successfully passed a number of maritime courses including the Class 4 Deck Officer course at Warsash College. Experience ashore and afloat was gained with the Scottish Fishery Protection Agency.

On return Mr Summers was promoted to Fishery Officer, then Senior Fishery Officer, and lat-terly Assistant Marine Officer.

Director of Natural Resources John Barton told Penguin News: "He has covered many miles around Falklands and South Georgia fisheries making a major contribution to fishery protection. He has been involved in many fishery protection incidents including being the fishery officer on the Dorada when the fishery protection gun was used for real for the first time.

Summers Mr commented "Working alongside crews of 10 fishery patrol vessels and hundreds of fishing vessels has been very rewarding and led to the development of friendships which have continued beyond the individual's departure from the fishery and the Islands.

However there was a down side, "assisting in the co-ordination of responses to maritime disasters was always difficult when you knew that a crew's 'home'

and their lives could be at risk if you didn't react in the correct way.

Mr Summers said, strangely enough, he was never interested in the sea when at school, and ended up for so long in the industry almost by accident: was informed I had the post of Trainee Fishery Officer while being sea sick on a research cruise on the Cordella, which made me consider if I was making the right choice," he said, adding that even after all these years the sea was still in charge as he still suffered with sea sickness if there was bad weather on the first few days of a patrol. He said he was looking forward to working with many of the same ships and people in his new job.

Mr Summers said there had been many interesting highlights over the years one being: "Convincing the Director of Fisheries all was in order to open fire on a poaching jugger.

In wishing him well his col-leagues presented him with a unique bookend fashioned out of a jigging weight confiscated from a squid jigger arrested in 2000, and turned into a collector's item by craftsmen Dima, Mark and Zac."

Dog dosing days increase

DOG dosing for hydatid cyst will increase in frequency from every six weeks to every five weeks for the foreseeable fu-ture. The new dosing regime will start from the beginning of January 2015, it was agreed at yesterday's meeting of the Agricultural Advisory Committee. The decision was based on new scientific information from the testing of artificially infected Patagonian foxes where it was found the prepatent period for E. Granulosus could be as short as 38 days.

20 cysts were submitted from

sheep during the 2014 export season. Of these 15 were negative and five were positive for the cysts. The five positives came from five different properties; three on East Falkland, one on West Falkland and one from an outer island. All of the cysts came from older sheep (Six years plus) and the total number of adult sheep killed in the abattoir this season was 26,753. This equates to a national prevalence rate of about 0.02%.

Six dogs tested positive following faeces samples. They will be retested this month.

Drink driver fined £450

MOUNT Pleasant woman Delemarie Dawn Hopkins (33) was fined £450 in the Summary Court on Monday after she admitted drink driving.

Crown Prosecutor Simon Rowe said a routine patrol by Military Police had spotted Miss Hopkins driving on the MPA Ring Road on August 8, just before midnight, with steamed up windows and had been concerned the driver's visibility was seriously impaired.

The vehicle was stopped and the situation brought to the drivers attention, however when Miss Hopkins drove off the police noticed that this time there were no headlights on and so pulled her over again and this time noticed there was a smell of alcohol.

Mr Rowe said Miss Hopkins failed the subsequent road side breathalyser test, but as had often been the case lately, the Camie Breathalyser at the Police Station was not functioning and so the defendant was transported to Stanley where some two and half hours later a lower reading of 69.9mg per 100ml of breath was recorded. Almost twice the legal limit

Justice of the Peace Andy Brownlee reminded Miss Hopkins of the seriousness of drink driving and the danger she had put other people in as well as herself.

In addition to the fine Miss Hopkins was banned from driving for a year, had her licence endorsed and was ordered to pay £85 prosecution costs.

Man bailed pending plea

FORMER fisheries observer Jon Andrew Kenny (35) was released on conditional bail to reappear in the Magistrate's Court on September 10.

Justice of the Peace Andy Brownlee said the case was of such serious nature that it would need to be dealt with by the Senior Magistrate on her return next week

Crown Prosecutor Simon Rowe said that Mr_Kenny who had voluntarily surrendered his passport after he was arrested on August 23, the day he was due to leave the Falklands, had made admissions to the police in interview and it was anticipated plea would be made at the next hearing.

Managing waste

A DRAFT action plan on Waste Management to be achieved over the next two years was approved in Executive Council this week. The plan covers many of the issues raised in various workshops and in the Mary Hill Quarry Oil Spill report, said MLA Rendell.

Approval was also given to recruit a person to implement the action plan.

LAST week was fairly busy with an Assembly meeting and I also stood in at Executive Council for the Honourable Barry Elsby while he is on his travels accompanied by Mrs Melanie Gilding. Some time is spent pre Exco with all MLAs so their views can be taken into account by the three members on Exco. However, as most people are aware, constitutionally, the actual decisions are made by those three members.

On Tuesday I leave for the UK for party conferences and other meetings, preceded by a few days holiday. Sadly I will miss the official opening of the Museum at its new Historic Dockyard site It has been a long haul for staff. builders and volunteers, well supported by the last Assembly as well as this one and by local businesses. Apart from being stunningly revamped it makes great use of some of our oldest and most interesting buildings. It will inform visitors that we have a fascinating history, great human and natural heritage and that we did exist for generations before the invasion in 1982. It is only a short walk from both schools so will be a more convenient resource for history lessons and many projects. It will also be a much more convenient site for tourists who often flagged en route to Britannia House when walking head down into a strong westerly wind.

As I said in the Assembly meeting, I have passed on to colleagues my very real concern about making noise nuisance a crime. I suspect many people would come up with many different answers. Unless it is extraordinarily well thought out there is a danger that too literal interpretation could impede some normal activities.

Falklands memorial stone unveiled at Aero Museum

New port business case discussed

A FINANCIAL Business Case for a New Port was examined by Executive Council Members at this week's meeting (August 27) of Executive Council and the Director of Central Services (DCS) attended for this item, reports Member of Legislative Assembly Phyl Rendell.

Members agreed the recommendation that there should a halt to further work on financing models associated with the Port William new Port Infrastructure Works, until further notice, due to the expenditure levels and the funding required.

Meanwhile the DCS was instructed to negotiate with Premier Oil on an extension to Temporary Dock facilities already in the harbour (it is currently allowed to remain in the harbour for three years only) as and when required for oil development, together with the long term needs for infrastructure in the Islands.

Two additional pieces of work in the paper were also agreed. Firstly that a review of the Statement of Policy Principles: port location and oil infrastructure development, is carried out to determine whether or not it remains fit for purpose in light of the first recommendation in the paper and secondly that an inhouse review of the port service needs of the fishing, tourism and agriculture industries can be adequately met until a permanent new port is developed.

Fuel supply


The DCS was also present for a paper on the Fuel Supply Licence Part B. After much discussion it was agreed that an extension to the fuel licence held by Stanley Services Limited be approved in principle until 2023 but excluding the existing sub-contract.

The DCS was authorised to continue negotiating with SSL, the terms for an extension to the exclusive licence and to bring those terms back to ExCo for a final decision in December.

The DCS will continue to work for FIG from the UK on port and fuel licence issues in order to complete these pieces of work. **Prison extension**

ExCo approved a temporary extension to the prison. As this was a departure from the Development Plan. ExCo approval was required. The Planning & Building Committee recommended additional temporary facilities, comprising a modular prison block extension to be installed south of the existing prison building. The Director of Emergency Services is currently in the process of procuring the buildings. There had been objections from the public but in light of available funds, ExCo members were of the view that this is the best solution at this time

Fiftieth anniversary of protesting pilot's bizarre racecourse landing

MONDAY is the fiftieth anniversary of an odd stunt by Argentine Cessna pilot Miguel Fitzgerald who landed his light aircraft on the Stanley racecourse, left a note of protest about the 'illegal' British occupation of the Islands, handed an Argentine flag to a bemused bystander, and flew away again.

Fitzgerald's story was recorded by a number of newspapers in 1964, and he told them the idea of flying to the Islands was not a new one. Speaking of his exploits, he said in fact that pilots who flew from the Argentine Monte Grande airfield spoke of it often, although it was generally considered a kind of joke or prank idea. However it was one that had been in Fitzgerald's head for fourteen years he told one interviewer.

His was not the first attempt though, in 1952, Aldo Comi along with Cesar Alvarez, an Aerodrome flight instructor, had departed from Rio Grande with a flight plan to Ushuaia. Once in the air they announced they were cancelling the flight plan filed and were heading to the Falklands; but weather prevented them landing. They lost sight of the Islands and in a seven hour flight returned to Comodoro Riyadavia.

But why September 1964?

When recording his exploits Fitzgerald said at that time the issue of the decolonisation of territories was high on the UN agenda. His intention was to draw attention to this and raise sentiment in Argentina about Britain being, "caught in an act of unacceptable arrogance."

Fitzgerald explained his intentions to colleague Siro Comi. Comi was up for the adventure and offered 'tickets' for the order of modifications to the Cessna (185, 260 HP Registration LV-HUA) which was referred to as 'Luis Vernet'.

The plan was kept under wraps, although one Horacio Franco was aware of it; his role was to add fuel tanks to the aircraft with a total capacity of 200 litres

Others who worked on the plane had an inkling a long im-

portant journey was to occur; an electric pump was added and a radioman called Quintana placed a long distance HF radio in the passenger seat.

Fitzgerald chose to offer his story, which would come out the moment he succeeded, to the journal 'The Reason' where his friend worked. He was very keen for publicity because if he lost his licence, he and his family would be in dire financial straits. 'The Reason' was less than enamoured, but it was taken up by a new paper called 'The Chronicle'. The young boss of the paper Hector Garcia was immediately enthusiastic. "He offered me the tickets, gasoline, expenses and paid me to travel with me a photographer for the newspaper. But that trip was mine. I just wanted to make a note when I returned ... to cover me," said Fitzgerald.

Fitzgerald chose September 8, half way through the couple of weeks that would be dedicated by the UN to discussing decolonisation. One day delayed, however, and all would be lost as an important football game was occurring on the 9th and nobody in Argentina would be interested in a maverick pilot when a championship final was occurring.

On September 6, Fitzgerald left Monte Grande Airfield bound for Olavarria, Buenos Aires, and then Trelew, Chubut.

The next morning he went south through Comodoro Rivadavia and Caleta Olivia.

An engine problem occurred and he landed in Pico Truncated before solving the problem at a Naval Air Base and Aeroclub. At Rio Gallegos he spoke to Ignacio Fernandez (Southern Commander and Manager) who he had entrusted with his plan in order to obtain necessary technical information and weather reports. There he also spoke to a radio operator with whom he would be in touch hourly during the journey.

The following day he was assisted in taking off secretly by Fernandez' friend who happened to be an Argentine Air Force officer. Fitzgerald eventually left Gallegos, "recalling the failed attempt of those who wanted to do this 10 years ago."

In his first call to Rio Gallegos he reported that everything was normal: "I was at 8,000 feet ... as I interned at sea, heading to the Islands, located five hundred and fifty miles from the coast of Argentina When a plane goes over the line of the coast and flies over the sea, everything changes. The engine sounds different. The hood vibrates differently. It is necessary to ignore all that and concentrate on navigation, engine instruments and calculations."

Fitzgerald could not swim so wore a lifebelt in case of having to ditch into the sea, but he knew in any case his chances of survival would be minimal.

The weather was cloudy on the way but guided by AM radio, Rio Gallegos and radio compass he eventually spotted some rocks. He decided to continue visually although visibility was no more than 150 metres.

He informed Aeroclub Rio Gallegos he had found what he wanted and that he was crossing the, "Strait of San Carlos."

He hoped to reach the Falklands by midday, "when hottest and most suitable for clouds - if any - were as high as possible."

After three and one quarter hours of flight he broke through the clouds: "I felt sure of success." He had reached the Islands with, "12 hours of flight range, so everything else was reduced to finding a suitable place to descend."

Fitzgerald spotted Stanley, made two turns to show himself off to residents and sought a place to land. Having come to a halt on the racecourse and exited the plane with the flag he said people immediately began to arrive. "One of them approached me. He thought I was lost. 'Where do you come from? Do you need fuel?' I thanked him and told him I did not need anything. It did not occur to him that I was Argentine, surely. I gave the proclamation and said. "Take, give this to your Governor."

He then returned to the plane and flew back to Rio Gallegos, "not before making a few passes over the house of the said authority."

Back in Stanley a surprised Jim Shirteliffe, who had been employed building the first Dorran type house in the Ross Road West area, along with John Rowlands (father of Robert Rowlands) delivered the flag and letter to Government House and to the interim Governor the Honourable H Thomson. The letter was read and a report sent to London the following day. Give us two minutes...

Illustrious career conceals flawed strategy

The Royal Navy's sole surviving aircraft carrier, HMS Illustrious, steamed into harbour for the final time last week, ending a career that was celebrated by the thousands of men and women who served on the ship over some 32 years and, in a small way, by the rest of the nation. Illustrious steamed nearly a million natical miles guarding Britain's global interests. She supported small wars on land and helped many thousands of people who were caught up in humanitarian crises.

I spent a memorable few days travelling on Illustrious, reporting on the crew's cooperation with the US Marine's Harrier force, and I loved every minute of it. So she was special to me. I joined in the applause as she headed into retirement. But I know that behind the celebratory nostalgia was a flawed story of naval aviation.

The truth is that while we maintained two small "flat-tops", Illustrious and Ark Royal, until relatively recently, in latter years they have been white elephants because we have had no attack aircraft to fly from them. The Sea Harriers that were purposedesigned for the Invincible class of ships and cut their fighting teeth in the Falklands, were withdrawn from service over eight years ago, and the more modern GR7 and GR9 models, designed for land-based service but capable of operating from carriers, had all been scrapped or sold off by early 2011. It is purely down to good luck that the UK has had no recent need to project air power from an ocean base. What is more, that good luck had better hold out for another six years, until the new carriers, HMS Queen Elizabeth and Prince of Wales become operational

The three mini-carriers that made up the Invincible class came into service around the time of the Falklands war, and of course HMS Invincible herself was an absolutely vital element of the 1982 task force. At their conception, the MOD and

the Navy designated the ships "through deck cruisers" in order to fool the Treasury, which was sympathetic to those who thought carriers were outdated and too expensive. It was said that the third ship of the class, HMS Ark Royal, was to be sold even before she had entered service. However, Invincible's remarkable contribution to the Falklands campaign was convincing evidence that the little flat-tops were a justifiable expense.

Although never again operating in high-intensity warfare similar to that of the Falklands, the carriers and their Harrier aircraft supported land operations in small wars and humanitarian missions for years - until, with no strategic thought, they were emasculated. Sea Harriers were taken out of service in 2006, followed a little while later by the land-based Harriers. We were told that in a crisis our allies - i.e. the Americans would fly their planes from our carriers, but they had their own flat-tops, so why would they use ours? Illustrious was re-designated a helicopter carrier for a while, but that was transparent spin: we already had a helicopter carrier, HMS Ocean, and if we'd needed another, we would have built one.

As a footnote to this sad story, HMS Illustrious may become a floating museum. However I doubt that enough money will be raised to save her, and even if initial fund-raising is successful, the project will probably hit the buffers when she becomes a money pit of huge proportions. The relatively small HMS Plymouth, a frigate that saw action off the Falklands, was to be saved for the nation (and should have been), but funds ran out and she is now facing an almost inevitable date with the scrapyard.

Those who call me cynical are right; we should not look back but ahead, to the decades beyond 2020 when British naval power will be magnificently reborn. But that's assuming it is. The defence chattering classes have already begun debating whether we really need two new carriers. Might we not sell one? Or mothball it? Or lease it to the French? Or just sell it? In fact we do need two. because such ships must spend frequent long periods in dry dock. and if we don't have one ready to go to sea at all times, we might as well have none.

I know; as a Falkland Islander with a vested interest in the long reach of British sea power, I would say all of this. But this is not a parochial issue. World peace is again becoming fragile and we must maintain our commitment to the only variety of warship that can really project stabilising power globally.

Betting on Scotland

Before I write my next column for PN, the people of Scotland will have gone to the polls to vote for or against independence. I'm going to wager that the majority of Scots will vote to maintain the status quo; the Union that has not done them badly over many generations and is far better than the unknown. I think they will do that because they are mostly sensible people. If I was Scottish, I would be very worried about dropping the Pound, dividing the Armed Services, renegotiating membership of the European Union and taking on the administrative burden of running a country and an economy (to name just a few negatives).

But of course, many will be ruled by their hearts rather than by their heads, and they will be part of a trend. Nationalism seems to be increasingly strong these days. In the 19th and early 20th Centuries, it unleashed wars, while in the latter part of the last century, we realised that it was better to break down national barriers rather than erect them. Now, though, the pendulum is swinging back, and I, for one, don't like it. The siren song of nationalism can make the heart beat a little faster, but I hope the Scots have the strength to ignore it.

Battle of the Falklands on the Silver Screen

I was fascinated to learn that the British Film Institute has discovered and restored a long forgotten silent film telling the stories of and, to some extent, reenacting the Battles of Coronel and the Falklands. The film will see the light of day again, accompanied by a newly composed musical soundtrack, before audiences at the London Film Festival later this month.

Although these major battles of 100 years ago were strategically important and huge in the scale of their tragedy, they are barely remembered beyond the Falklands (where they will, of course, be suitably commemorated later this year). So the rediscovery of a film that may revive awareness in the UK is to be welcomed.

The national amnesia about Coronel and the Falklands is strange considering Britain's fascination with its own maritime history. But both naval battles occurred early in the First World War (not, please note the Americanism World War One), and in the years that followed the narrative of the "Great War" was dominated by the truly shocking prolonged tragedy of static trench warfare. Arguably, the Battles of Coronel and the Falklands heralded the application of heavy modern industry to warfare, but the trenches provided the most vivid and lasting testament to its cruelty.

It would be great if a digital recording of the restored film and the new soundtrack can be sent to the Falklands for screening during the 100th Anniversary commemorations. Perhaps this is already in hand; I hope so.



CFL sponsors the Maritime Collection to be known as *The Isles of the Sea: the Maritime Collection in partnership with CFL.*


The sponsorship is for 10 years and grants the company founding partner status at the Museum in perpetuity.

Accidental death verdict following accident at sea

THE inquest into the death of Spanish fisherman. Santiago Moreira Fona, was completed in the Coroner's Court last week.

Mr Moreira died on July 28 this year after falling into the sea from the trawler. *Ventura* following an accident on board

Acting Coroner, Peter Judge, explained that the purpose of an inquest is not to attribute liability or blame but to answer four basic questions:

Who had died? When had he died? Where had he died? How had he died?

Mr Moreira had already been identified formally at an earlier hearing on August 5.

To answer the other questions, written statements were taken from a number of witnesses, including the captain of the *Ventura*, two other members of the crew, the winchman from Sea King helicopter, medical staff from the KEMH and a Home Office pathologist who had carried out a post mortem.

The relevant evidence was read out in court in front of representatives from the *Ventura's* owners and the local shipping agent.

After hearing the evidence, Mr Judge read out a summary of the facts and gave a verdict of Accidental Death.

Conditions at sea on the night of the accident had been described as "terrible" with winds of 30-40 knots and waves of up to 40 feet.

Mr Moreira had been thrown overboard after a sudden movement caused a trawl door to open suddenly, throwing him into the sea and another crewman onto the deck.

The lifeboats could not be launched but life rings were thrown out and a search that involved eight fishing vessels, an RAF Hercules and a Sea King search and rescue helicopter was started.

Because of the conditions, Mr Moreira was not found until he had been in the sea for nearly four and a half hours.

Efforts to revive him had been made throughout the journey back into Stanley and for another 25 minutes after he had reached the KEMH, but these were unsuccessful and Mr Moreira was pronounced dead at the KEMH late on the evening of July 28.

The post mortem showed that the injuries were consistent with the evidence about the accident and the cause of death was given as drowning and cold immersion following an accident at sea. The pathologist said that Mr Moreira had probably died soon after going into the water.

The Acting Coroner said that it was a, "tragic event" and that the Search and Rescue crew had shown, "considerable skill" in finding Mr Moreira.

Mr Judge thanked those who had been involved in the search and said he would be writing to the Commander of British Forces to commend the bravery of the Search and Rescue team.

Before formally closing the inquest, Mr Judge expressed his sympathy and condolences for Mr Moreira's death.

"NOW don't fall outta my boat," yelled John Balke as we crashed up against a rock and slammed to a halt in our raft.

White water rafting had been well up my list of things to do in Montana, but with everything else we had managed to get done it had slipped until the last 48 hours. But now here we were paddling furiously when told and yee-haaing loudly as the chilly, fast running water sloshed into the raft and over our heads as we bounced through the rapids.

A family of two teens and their mum made up our boat and it soon became evident that the oldies were enjoying the ride far more than the kids. "It's cold and I need the bathroom," grumbled the girl, while her stuffy younger brother looked disdamful as John enthused about his job and tried to explain 'reading the river,' to him. "What's the salary," he asked. "Sunsets and making good friends," was John's light hearted reply which was met with a stony glare and, "well that won't support a family," a comment more worthy of 70 year old than a 12 year old.

I can see that lad is going to make a great accountant or estate agent. I thought as we executed a neat circle to see how the raft behind us was faring.

After what seemed the fastest hour and a half of my life the ride was over and as we headed back to Bozeman, I wondered at the fact that for a small Island dweller, it was the first time I had spent any significant time away from the sea and not missed it. Previous travels had left me with an urge to draw a deep breath of fresh sea air and when in Texas a few years ago, 1 had driven to the coast especially to indulge the urge - it was a complete waste of time as the murky waters of Galveston bore no resemblance to the

But somehow in Montana the crisp, clear air, the rivers and the busy outdoor lifestyle had completely filled the usual void, and the rafting had certainly helped.

The previous day after taking a final ride with Kim and Ellen in the hills and having a great time with Jack's perky paint Comanche, a former cow pony with a heart the size of a race horse we had piled kayaks into the pickup and headed out to Harrison Lake.

A complete green horn at the activity 1 clambered in and figured 1 had always had to paddle my own canoe anyway and after a few clumsy circles followed Kim and Ellen out into the lake. Ellen on the other hand neatly placed her handbag on the back of her kayak, declared that at Darwin School they'd had to build their own canoes before they paddled them and steamed off up the lake. Well that had to be about 45 years ago, I calculated with my mouth



hanging open, so I guess paddling is much like riding a bike and you don't forget how.

It was a lovely peaceful way to explore the lake and the various small birds gathering into large groups not to mention a huge flock of Canadian geese chattering overhead as they prepared to head south was a definite reminder that we would soon be doing the same. But first we had another river experience to enjoy before we zipped up the suitcases and heaved on our rucksacks.

A river float was the perfect way to end our holiday and once we had pumped the inner tubetype rings up we climbed in with a few beers on ice and a hearty lunch and quite literally went with the flow for a couple of hours.

We floated over the Madison/ Gallatin county line admiring the towering rocks we had driven past on several occasions and not been able to stop and take photographs of, and exchanged the time of day with anglers fly fishing for the trout which occasionally jumped around us.

Montana has a great law which deems that all recreationists have full use of natural waterways between the high-water marks, so fishers, floaters, swimmers, kayakers and rafters mingle quite happily.

Inevitably there are a few dissenters who would like to have it all to themselves, but generally it works well and each group is considerate of other users. The same law applies even to rivers running through private property, so that's one thing money can't buy.

We may not get too many days fit for floating during a Falklands summer, but rest assured that now I am home I already have plans for some of those tractor inner tubes I've spotted in Kenneth's garage.

Well, I've ridden through Drunken Rock Pass enough times over the last decade, but I think this may be the year to float it too. So if you see a crazy old bird perched in an inner-tube floating around Port William at some point this summer, do come and rescue me.... it could mean the Murrell is running a bit faster than anticipated and my floating has gone a rather pear shaped.

Mount Caroline Frequency: 147.725 (-600 Duplex) This repeater serves the north of West Falklands, including the cross sound ferry main operational area and links to Stanley via Mount Kent and Sapper Hill. Marine Band: 156.800. Channel 16 (Stanley area) 2.182 MHz HF In the event that com-munications fail on all the above frequencies then the RFIP may be contacted direct on 153.650 (duplex + 1.6). It is however unlikely that this frequency will be functional from West Falkland





Far west inshore research trip reveals exciting new data

THE South Atlantic Environmental Research Institute (SAERI) has been established since March 2012, and already has an expanding team of 12 employees based in Stanley (one of whom is a PhD student), five international PhD students, three employees based in Ascension Island and one working in Saint Helena - all on various projects.

One such project is the Inshore Fisheries Research project, funded by the Falkland Islands Government's Economic Development Strategy, which aims to determine the potential for a small-scale commercial fishery on certain inshore marine species and to fill some gaps in our knowledge-base of the inshore marine environment, of the Falkland Islands.

The project is investigating the distribution, abundance, age, growth and reproduction of almost 20 focal species, in order to determine whether the species are present in large enough quantities and have life histories that will enable them to be fished sustainably. This is being conducted in partnership with the Fisheries Department (FIFD) and the Shallow Marine Surveys Group (SMSG): a group of volunteer divers and scientists who dive on a weekly basis, when possible, and record species and habitats within each location. The group collect samples of the target species and the Project Manager. Dr Deborah Davidson, processes the specimens in the lab to determine their age, growth, maturity and fecundity, and when each species are likely to spawn. These life history parameters are crucial information for stock assessment and fisheries management.

Within the winter months, these weekly collections have been restricted to within the vicinity of Port William and Berkeley Sound. However, given that the Falkland Islands have such a vast coastline, a wider distribution of sampling effort is also needed.

Therefore, a team of SAERI, Fisheries and SMSG team members took part in a 10 day research cruise onboard the RV *Hans Hansson* from August 7 to 17. The cruise was conducted around Weddell Island, Beaver Island and New Island.

Despite being struck by bad weather for most of the cruise, in a total of seven dive days the divers (Dr Paul Brickle, Dr Paul Brewin, Joost Pompert, Stevie Cartwright, Jamie Simpson, Dion Poncet and Juliette Hennequin) assessed the habitat and species present at each dive site, took photos for later analyses and collected specimens of the candidate species for the "ship-side team" (Debs Davidson and Emily Hancox) to process.

Samples have also been taken back to shore for analyses in the lab. Primarily, lots of Chilean sea urchins (Loxechinus albus) and ribbed mussels (Aulacomya ater) were found, both of which are heavily exploited in Chile. The team also found two new scallop (Zygochlamys patagonica) beds which, depending on further research, could prove fruitful for future fisheries.

As well as conducting dive surveys, the team also performed plankton trawls during the night or early morning to determine what animal plankton species are present in the waters of the area. Water characteristics (salinity and temperature at depth of the seawater) were measured at each dive site and on the final two days of the cruise a string of these samples were taken in Queen Charlotte Bay and in Falkland Sound to determine the salinity, temperature and depth profile of the areas.

These data can be used to determine what environmental preferences each species has, and will allow us to predict what species will be present in an area, based on both habitat type and environmental factors. Drop down cameras were also deployed from the vessel at each of the water sample stations in the final two days, and the footage recorded for analysis.

This comparatively quick method of data collection at each location will allow comparisons to be made on the habitats and species present, and relate these to the respective water characteristics of each.

This cruise is the most up-todate and detailed survey on potential inshore fisheries resources in the area, and has certainly set the precedent for future inshore fisheries research cruises. Excellent, detailed information and data were collected during the research cruise.

With all this exciting new data we will be able to predict the probability of commercial species presence in un-sampled areas. However, none of this would have been possible without the help of all involved.

Thanks to FIFD and to Paul Ellis for the use of their equipment and to the team for all of their effort, help and support. Thanks also to the captain and mate Dion Poncet and Juliette Hennequin for all of their hard work and the use of the *Hans Hansson*, which proved to be an excellent platform for this research cruise.





The battles of Coronel and the Falklands in the making

ONE hundred years ago this week - a daily diary of events leading up to the battles of Coronel and the Falklands by Islander and marine archaeologist Mensun Bound

Saturday 5th September 1914 Falklands Islanders, like everyone, were horrified by the stories reaching them, both real and imagined, of 'Hun brutality' in Belgium which were posted. sometimes with accompanying propaganda cards, in the postoffice Subscription lists were opened in Stanley and the settlements for both the Belgian Relief Fund and the Prince of Wales National Relief Fund. Fund raising gave people a feeling that they were doing their bit, but the conflict still seemed distant and Governor Allardyce was bemused by his lack of success in raising war-awareness. If there was any genuine anger in the Islands it was directed not so much towards the Germans, but rather to FIG that had just outraged everybody with its proposed new Ordnance for the Protection of Penguins' which amounted to a tax on eggs (5 shillings per 1,000). What Allardyce did not understand was that penguin eggs were considered part of the Lord's bounty and a Godgiven entitlement of all Kelpers.

Cradock: Good Hope put into Pernambuco where a message was waiting for Cradock from the Admiralty: 'Cornwall to be under your orders. Canopus ordered to Abrolhos to guard colliers and supplies there, under your orders. Acknowledge

Cradock is now thinking about von Spee and before leaving for the Abrolhos requests the latest intelligence: *Gneisenau, Scharnhorst* reported Caroline Islands 8 August. Is there any later information as to movements? Several German colliers said to be in vicinity of Magellan Straits. Reply Pernambuco'.

Dresden Dresden is at Orange Bay behind Cape Horn. Her supply ship Santa Isabel now at Punta Arenas where it sent a message from Capt. Lüdecke to Berlin requesting instructions. Otranto left the Abrolhos for the Plate.

Sunday 6th September 1914 Cradock: The Admiralty replied to Cradock's query regarding von Spee's squadron: 'No certain information of these ships since 8th August. C-in-C, China, reported they had colliers with 20,000 tons of coal with them. Rumours of German cruisers near Sumatra. Magellan Straits and its vicinity quite possible. Falkland Islands anchorages might also be used by them'.

Cradock decided his dispositions: Glasgow, Monmouth and Otranto would head for the Straits where something was stirring and where Dresden might well be heading. He would remain with Good Hope, Cornwall, Bristol, Macedonia and Carmania patrolling lower Brazil and the Plate.

Von Spee: To save coal the German squadron had been drifting near Christmas Island (Kiritimati) while they awaited the return of Nürnberg from Honolulu_ When she arrived she gave them newspapers, the first they had seen since the outbreak of war. In general, events on the Western Front seemed to be going their way They also found that they had been making headlines; one item. which had them laughing, reported on how the defeated hulks of the Scharnhorst and Gneisenau had been towed into Hong Kong with blood still pouring from their scuppers.

Captain von Schönberg of Nürnberg told von Spee that he had been eavesdropping on transmissions from the British wireless and cable station at Fanning Island, about 150 miles north-west of Christmas Island. The Fanning cable was one of only two links between Australia and Europe. Von Spee ordered Nürnberg and Titania to destroy the station while the squadron began coaling at Christmas Island.

Monday 7th September 1914

Glasgow Glasgow anchored in the roads off Montevideo. In pouring rain and pitch-dark Lloyd Hirst was secretly sent ashore in an oared cutter. He took a taxi to the British Legation where 'because, as no one would answer the door-bell, [he] made a dramatic entry in dripping oilskins on a diplomatic card-party'. Arrangements were made for coaling and half an hour later he left for the Consulate to meet the British Minister to collect any intelligence he might have on the Dresden. He got back to the Glasgow on a tug at 3.30 am. Monmouth meanwhile was searching the estuary for Dresden.

Codes: On 11 August the German steamer Hobart was boarded off Melbourne. The ship's confidential papers were found behind a secret sliding panel in the captain's cabin. In amongst them was the codebook used by the German navy to communicate with their merchant ships. The Australians did not at first realize the significance of what was found for it was not until several weeks later that they notified the Admiralty and asked how it might best be forwarded. On this day Sturdee replied:

Copy German code and key and forward to Admiralty by carliest opportunity. Photography of pages is quickest method of reproducing book'.

The breaking of this code would lead directly to the destruction of the *Dresden* the following March when Lüdecke used it to send rendezvous coordinates to a collier.

Admiralty: On this day an intelligence assessment was made at the Admiralty which concluded that von Spee could be off Punta Arenas by 22 September. It concluded: "Note: German force is much stronger than existing British dispositions to meet it".

Fanning Island: With weapons drawn and flying the French flag, a raiding part from the *Nürnberg* stormed ashore at Fanning Island. While *Titania* dragged up and cut the cable, the shore party destroyed the transmitting equipment and aerials. An Englishman at the station later wrote:

"What impressed us most was the speed with which the operation was carried out. It seemed to take only seconds before we were completely cut off. We felt uncomfortable, but they were very friendly and terribly polite. "Would you be so kind as to pass me an axe?" they asked, for example, before they cut down the flagpole. "I am sorry gentlemen, but this is war.""

Tuesday 8th September 1914

Glasgow. In the morning Glasgow entered Montevideo Harbour and exchanged salutes with the fort on *El Cero*. Luce signalled the Admiralty.

Glasgow and Monmouth coaling Montevideo. Otranto arrives 6 pm today. Trade as usual. Have no information of German cruisers from China crossing Pacific Ocean. Will remain at Rio de la Plata until 1 am in wireless contact with R.A.C. 4th C.S. [i.e. Cradock] who has telegraphed coming south'.

Elsewhere: Cradock in Good Hope arrived at the Abrolhos. Macedonia arrived Pernambuco; after a brief meeting with HBM Consul left for Abrolhos. Canopus left Cape Verdes for Abrolhos, speed 9 knots. Collier North Wales left Cape Verdes for Falklands, the first of many ships that would soon be heading in that direction.

Samoa: Ever since the Allied seizure of German Samoa ten days before, von Spee had been contemplating a raid. Now, with his squadron concentrated at Christmas Island, he informed his captains of his intention to raid Apia, not to retake the Island, but to sink shipping:

The forces in occupation will need constant provisioning by steamers and these will be protected, it may therefore be presumed that steamers and warships are lying off Apia. An attack before dawn on ships at anchor might have good results'. Wednesday 9th September

1914

Von Spee: Scharnhorst and Gneisenau departed Christmas Island and proceeded on the 1,300 mile passage south-west towards Samoa leaving their supply train in the care of Nürnherg. They would rendezvous a couple of weeks later at the Marquesas.

Dresden: Sturdee's counterpart in the German navy was Admiral von Pohl. His diary on this day stated that endeavours were being made in Berlin to concentrate *Leipzig* and *Dresden*. This day *Santa Isabel*, at Punta Arenas, received instructions for *Dresden* to operate with *Leipzig* which had just reported being located in the Gulf of California. Berlin sent a similar message to *Leipzig* which then headed south to join *Dresden*.

Glasgow: Mid-morning Glasgow proceeded out of Montevideo to join Monmouth.

Thursday 10th September 1914 Cradock's squadron: Macedonia arrived Abrolhos. Leaving Macedonia to guard the Abrolhos, Good Hope weighed for the Plate. Monmouth departed the Plate for Bahia Blanco, Argentina, where Dresden was rumoured to have been seen. Glasgow and Otranto on patrol at the entrance to the Plate in thick fog. Bristol heading for Abrolhos. Cornwall at Pernambuco about to proceed to Rio. Carmania on way to Montevideo.

Defence: In response to the intelligence assessment of 7th September warning of the need for reinforcement to meet von Spee should he head for South America, Defence was ordered from the Mediterranean to proceed to South America.

Emden: On this day in the Indian Ocean von Spee's rogue cruiser *Emden* began a rampage which, by the end of the month, would claim 15 British merchantmen.

Friday 11th September 1914

Glasgow: Glasgow: received false information, via Montevideo, to say that Dresden was hiding in islands off Santa Catarina. Luce, at this moment was out of touch with Cradock, but because there were many German communities in this area of Brazil, the report seemed plausible, so using his discretion Luce races north at 19 knots for Santa Catarina.

Leipzig: Off Cape Corrientes Leipzig sunk the British oiler Elsinore on her way to Panama.

Santa Isabel: Punta Arenas to Admiralty: 'Santa Isabel sailed Westward'. This marked the moment when things suddenly became interesting in Stanley ...

Minefield clearance priority areas named as bidders visit

FOUR minefield clusters have been pinpointed as priority areas for the next clearance phase.

Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) Advisor for minefield issues Alistair Craib confirmed on Wednesday, that Priority 1 is Minefield 59 on either sides of the MPA Road near Wall Mountain and Mount Harriet (see right). This was chosen for reasons of public safety, that is, concern about the state of the road and the risk that people might go off the road into a minefield.

An area near Eliza Cove is priority 2. This includes the Eliza Cove minefield itself and to the north, plus an old booby trapped area and an area that has not yet been released which is not a minefield but requires checking (see below right).


Priority 3 is situated along the MPA road close to Stanley, south of Sapper Hill and west along the road.

Priority 4 comprises three minefields just south of Stanley.

Mr Craib said depending upon a number of factors it was hoped the project would start at the end of November and would continue until the end of March 2016. He cautioned that there was no guarantee that all of the planned minefields would be cleared by then.

The UK Government has allocated a total of £2 million in each financial year (the current and next) for the entire project including clearance.

Two contracts are up for grabs, the clearance contract itself, and the much smaller contract the Demining Project Office (DPO) contract. The DPO is the public

voice of the project. Readers may remember Mr Guy Marrow as the face of the DPO during previous phases.

Earlier this week some of the



bidders were in the Falklands with Mr Craib. Representatives of companies from Dubai, Zimbabe, UK and Denmark have been examining the minefields in detail. The group includes former demining contractor BACTEC. Having returned to their countries they will put in a proposal, "as to what they believe they can do with the amount of money that is being allocated," and later this month, "we will sit down in London and evaluate the proposals that come in," said Mr Craib. Then a determination will be made, "which one we believe will serve our purpose best," and clear the most minefields to the best standard.

He said clearance undertaken on the Islands will be to a higher standard than is required by international mine action standards. Friday, September 12, 2014

Pic: Helen Marsh Man wrecks his future with a kiss

A THIRTY-FIVE year old man was given a suspended prison sentence on Wednesday, after he admitted kissing a 15 year old girl who he knew to be under the age of 16.

Jon Andrew Kenny, a former fisheries observer with no previous convictions who is currently on a visitor's permit in the Falklands, said he had. "made the mistake of a lifetime," when he kissed the girl after a chance second meeting in the West Store Foodhall.

In interview the victim said she had consented to the kiss and was not frightened, but regretted it and felt stupid as a result.

In police interview Mr Kenny accepted he knew the girl's age before kissing her, saying he felt unusually, "connected," to her after a long period of being alone.

He took responsibility for his actions saying it was a, "momentary madness," when he forgot the difference in age and that he "should have known better."

Defence lawyer Mark Neves said his client, who will now be on the sexual offenders register for seven years, had, "effectively destroyed his own future."

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said all sexual offences against young girls were treated very seriously, adding that there was particular concern in this case that he was twice the victim's age. She said it was appropriate that Mr Kenny be given a three month prison sentence suspended for two years and that he would be required to register as a sex offender. "You are now in a complete mess because of this," she said.

RELEVANT, effective, efficient and sustainable training is required by Islanders in order to achieve maximum economic value from tuture changes to the Falklands.

Who could possibly argue? But alas, despite the sincere enthusiasm of Scintilla Associates Director Jonathan Knight (see page 5) commissioned to deliver a clear way forward in terms of training needs within the Islands, I suspect his mission will face a little bit of scepticism and grumbles of 'yet another expert telling us what we already know' (What is it they say about consultants? Someone who takes the watch off your wrist and tells you the time?). OK fair enough we do already know that training is required and we're also perfectly aware of the constraints he mentions: in particular the tendency here for individuals to move around jobs rather rapidly, but one comment made by the gentleman did cause me to accede with wry smile

He said that FIG wanted him to identify training needs, "to help ensure that the right investments are made in education and training to provide Islanders with the skills etc.

Why do I yield? Because while we might often claim to know what the Falklands needs, it hasn't always necessarily followed that money has been spent in the right places in order to achieve the desired result. An intention then to pay someone to find out exactly what established and up and coming, industries require from future employees seems supremely sensible. Having the knowledge to be able to usher our relevantly trained youth, and more mature individuals too, towards lucrative employment can only be a good thing for our economy. (Although hopefully 'lucrative' will also apply to decent salaries for Government tradespeople.)

Of course the efficiency of that process depends on a few things. Firstly that the final report really is as functional, practical and future proof (a delicious bit of '90s jargon born of the electronics industries) as it is claimed it will be. And secondly that our establishment having read it, does not leave it gathering dust in the in tray until some bright spark comes upon it cons later and declares. "Oh this would have been useful a few years back

FIP to be reviewed and tightened up

MOVES to change the farm Improvement Programme (FIP) from an individual farm subsidy programme to a strategic industry. development programme (IDP) are to be discussed more widely before the next financial year, it was decided at a recent Agriculture Advisory Committee meeting

It was also recommended that the Labour Scheme should cease and available funds (£30,000 inthe 2014/15 financial year) be transferred to the adjusted programme

Outlining the concept Senior Agricultural Advisor Neil Judd said farm businesses had to, "explore change," adding that he was not sure this was currently being carried out vigorously through the Department of Agriculture or that there was a process in place to "determine key drivers of farming profitability

It was agreed by the majority of the committee that there was a need to change or "tightenup." the current FIP although Raymond Evans warned against duplicating past projects or of making it so complicated as to putpeople off.

Hew Grierson said the programme needed more control and was in favour of returning to the £1 investment on a £3 return system.

The FIP was initiated in 1999 as the pasture Improvement Programme (PIP) with the aim of increasing sheep numbers by 760,000 animals and wool production 2.5 million kilograms per year. These projections were

later considered too optimistic and in an effort to stimulate interest in improving activities the PIP scheme was broadened in 2004 to become the FIP Introducing new sheep genetics was also introduced in 2004 with some 20 farms taking up the initiative and combined with on-going investment in the National Stud Flock is thought to be adding in excess of £1million per annum increased profit to farms above status quo.

Others have used the FIP scheme to invest heavily in forage cropping for beef production with the supply of approximately 500 high quality beef to the domestic market valued at an estimated £250,000 per year.

Over the years the list of eligible activities within the FIP has been broadened to allow many direct cost items such as animal health products (drench, trace element supplements etc) to be included, which some committee members thought was unnecessarv

MLA Phyl Rendell agreed it was good timing to review the scheme and asked the farming representatives to take the idea to farmers and explain how it could work before further consultation on how an industry development programme would work, adding that there was a definite need to tighten up the current programme.

Referring to the Labour Scheme MLA Rendell said getting rid of the direct subsidy would look good for the DoA and that improving farm productivity rather than personal gain was best use of public money.

£1,000+ penalty for young man who 'over-reacted' looking after his sister

STANLEY man Bradley Rhys Crowie (19) was fined and ordered to pay compensation to the total value of £1,095 on Wednesday after he admitted criminal damage and assault by beating

Crown Prosecutor Simon Rowe told the court how on August 2, Mr Crowie had been out with a male friend and some female friends and had enjoyed, "a drink and a good laugh."

He said there had been no hint of trouble and the group had gone to the complainant's house where at around 2 am he and one of the females had become intimate and spent a couple of hours together in the bathroom.

On leaving the bathroom the complainant had encountered Mr Crowie's younger sister and had kissed her and had taken her into the bathroom

Mr Crowie became worried about his sister and kicked the door in and punched the victim

an estimated 12 times and threw a beer bottle against the wall where it smashed, littering the room with glass.

The complainant called the police and then shouted after Mr Crowie who was leaving the house with his sister and her friend that he had done so Mr Crowie shoved the complainant back into the bathroom and was heard to shout, "stay away from my sister."

The 22 year old complainant suffered bumps and bruises but did not require medical treatment, said Mr Rowe. In police interview the complainant said he had been, "unwise" to take both young ladies into the bathroom on the same evening, but added that Mr Crowie had over-reacted.

Defence lawyer Alison Inglis said her client had never been in any form of trouble before, he rarely went out socialising and his mother had described him as a "gentle giant." She said he was normally a laid back person and while he was protective of his sister was not controlling of her actions.

In police interview Mr Crowie said the complainant had spent the entire evening chasing after his sister's best friend, spent hours in the bathroom with her, but had still "took a shot," at his sister. "I wasn't happy with that," he said.

Passing sentence Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said she had given Mr Crowie credit for his early guilty plea and taking responsibility for his actions and noted that the assault was not premeditated.

She ordered Mr Crowie to pay £300 compensation to the victim and fined him £500 for the assault; £110 compensation for the broken door and a fine of £100 for the criminal damage plus £85 prosecution costs.



AS reported last week the frequency of dog dosing for hydatids is to be increased from every six weeks to every five weeks as a result of an increased number of hydatid cysts found in sheep and dogs.

Senior Veterinary Officer Steve Pointing said of the 20 cysts found in sheep, 15 were negative with the positives coming from five different properties. 578 dogs were tested in March with the initial screening revealing six positive results from three working dogs and three pet dogs.

It was noted that a positive result in Stanley dogs, so far removed from the farming community was unusual and no pattern could be established.

MLA Phyl Rendell described the result as disappointing but unexplainable, adding, "we will just have to battle on."

Reindeer settle at Albermarle

PENDING an Executive Council decision the Agricultural Advisory Committee agreed that the National Reindeer Herd should become the property of Albermarle Station owners Shaun May and Tanya Ford.

The Government will retain an interest in a small nucleus of the herd so that there will always be some of the animals in the Falklands.

The original reindeer were brought from South Georgia in 2001 to ensure that some survived the planned mass eradication. The reindeer have thrived at Albermarle since 2006 with numbers building up to more than 100 from the 12 animals shifted there.

CE has to OK posh travelling

THIS week's Executive Council made up of MLAs Mike Summers. Phyl Rendell and Barry Elsby approved the Falkland Islands Government's expenses policy under the Management Code, to include an amendment to require approval by the Chief Executive for any proposed business class travel.

Director resigns

DIRECTOR of Education Annic Tempest resigned from her position as Director of Education earlier this month and the post was advertised in last week's Penguin News.

Ms Tempest is reported to have resigned for personal reasons.

Education Director banned from driving

STANLEY woman Anne Leech-Tempest (63) was fined £500 for drink driving, £150 for failing to provide a breath sample and banned from driving in the Falklands for 15 months with her licence endorsed on both counts on Wednesday.

The court heard that on September 2, a mobile police patrol had stopped Ms Tempest on Ross Road East at 10.48pm after she had been recorded travelling at a speed of 38mph in a 25mph zone.

Three attempts to obtain a road side breathalyser test failed and Ms Tempest was arrested and taken to the Police Station where only one of two Camic tests were successful giving a reading of 65.5mg of alcohol per 100ml of breath (35mg is the legal limit).

Defence lawyer Mark Neves said Miss Tempest had been out with a group at the Waterfront Cafe that evening and had not realised how much alcohol she had consumed.

He said this was not an excuse just as there was no legal reason why there had been a failure to provide a breathalyser sample.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said the two offences demonstrated to all the dangers of drinking socially and not keeping a close eye on how much is consumed and ordered £85 prosecution costs to be paid in addition to the fines.

Heavy rain rips roads apart

HEAVY rain which started on Saturday and continued for several days caused flooding and extensive damage to the road/all weather track network across the Islands.

To the south of East Falkland, the Falkland Landholdings settlement of North Arm has taken on 'island' status with the connecting road being washed away at the Sound and being completely impassable.

On Thursday with the water subsiding Roads Engineer Simon Catton and General Foreman Nunca Summers were out on East Falkland surveying the damage so a plan to undertake repairs could be prepared.

Roads Foreman Roger May said other parts of the network were known to have suffered flood damage and that the Rincon Grande section was also closed with the top of the road scoured off leaving a loose and soft surface.

The Greenfield bridge on the San Carlos road and the cattle grid marking the boundary between Waimea and Blue Beach is also



The Sound road gives way to the water impassable said Mr May.

Looking out towards Salvador the crossing at Kings Creek is reported to be soft with a large hole washed away, but is passable with caution. Also in the North Camp, part of the Johnsons' road on Port Louis land has been badly damaged and the Pedro River passing has been washed away, but was passable with care, said Mr May. Picture A Joshua

The extent of the damage on West Falkland had not been fully assessed to date but flooding on the North Arm causeway between Fox Bay East and West is known to have been damaged as well as a section at Doctors Creek.

The MPA Met office reported that by the end of the first week, it was already the wettest September on record. Page 3

If there was ever a reminder needed that the Falklands isn't just Stanley, it arrived Saturday night in the form of rains of biblical proportions which carried on coming down with hardly a break for almost two days. The amounts have been record breaking and that of course has had a pretty dramatic effect on the rural roads with some being partially washed away/eroded/undermined, whilst others have had to be closed completely due to culverts failing and some crossings disappearing completely. Images that have appeared on social network sites just goes to show what a tenuous grip we have and just how powerful nature can be.

I would urge all who use the road to drive with great care and I fear we have not had the last alert from PWD about roads being affected. I would ask that everyone also has patience; it is going to take a bit of time to assess what is needed and start rolling into action

It isn't just the roads that will be affected though as some farms 1 believe were also due to start their lambing when great rains hit and I sincerely hope that the effects are not too awful.

To Incorporate or Not To Incorporate?

STARTING a new business and becoming your own boss is arewarding and exciting experience, but also full of challenges. One issue to consider when starting a business is incorporation. Should they operate as a sole trader or partnership - or incorporate as a limited company? This question should be kept under regular review, particularly in times of expansion or change.

Advantages of incorporation

Incorporation allows you to operate with the benefit of limited hability. A company is a distinct legal entity, and it is the company rather than you personally that is liable to creditors. In practice banks, landlords and major suppliers may seek security in the form of personal guarantees from directors to ensure the company meets its obligations. A bank may require a loan backed by a director's guarantee to be secured on the director's personal assets such as their house. In such circumstances the benefit of limited liability is more theoretical than real.

However, the protection of limited liability is particularly important if your business is 'high-risk' and prone to negligence or other legal claims. A major claim from a client could potentially bankrupt your business and you as owner, but if the business is carried on through a company your liability would be limited to the amount

you have invested in the company. Instead of you being made bankrupt the company would be forced into liquidation,

Another advantage of incorporation is that it provides flexibility in ownership. The owners of an incorporated business own shares in the company. Each owner or shareholder can hold a different number of shares. Shares can be bought and sold, mortgaged, gifted or transferred through inheritance (subject to any rules in the company's constitution, known as the Memorandum and Articles of Association)

Tax implications

The tax position varies between unincorporated and incorporated businesses. If you operate as a sole trader or partnership you will pay income tax on your business profits. If you operate as a company the profits of the business will be subject to corporation tax.

If you are paid a salary by the company, the taxable profits of the company are calculated after deducting your salary payments, but you have to pay income tax on your salary Dividends to shareholders are paid out of a company's reserves, which means what's left after corporation tax has been charged on the taxable profits, but you have to pay in-

The rates at which income tax and corporation tax are payable may vary significantly. An individual can claim a personal allowance for income tax, meaning that the first chunk of income is not taxed (presently £15,000 in the Falkland Islands), but no such allowance applies for corporation tax

Both unincorporated and incorporated businesses will be liable for medical services tax (MST) and retirement pension contributions (RPC) in respect of their employees' earnings, but the payments for owners of the business will be different depending on whether or not it is a company. In simple terms the directors of a small company will be treated as employees, but self-employed persons will be liable to MST on their business profits and will pay RPCs at a higher rate to cover both the employer and employee contributions

Anybody setting up in business, or considering the incorporation of an existing business, should consult an accountant on the tax consequences for them of the different ways they might structure their business.

Disadvantages of incorporation

There are a number of potential disadvantages to incorporation as a limited company. The importance of these will differ from one business to the next but can include:

· Start-up costs: a company is more expensive to form.

· Red tape: a company is required by law to maintain detailed company books.

 Bureaucracy: a company must give timely notification to the Registrar of Companies of any significant changes in the company's organisational structure or personnel

- Operating costs: a trading company must file with the Registrar of Companies both an annual return showing the members and officers of the company, and annual accounts prepared by an accountant: the preparation and filing of these documents is an extra cost which unincorporated businesses do not have to meet

 Lack of confidentiality: the obligation to file annual accounts with the Registrar of Companies means that the accounts are open to inspection by third parties.

Conclusion

In most cases, the extra time and cost of running a company should be easily outweighed by the advantages of limited liability possibly coupled with tax savings. However, it is important to review the pros and cons of incorporating your business and receive as much information as you can about the process beforehand, and be sure you understand the obligations as well as the advantages.

Investment in training to embrace the future

A TRAINING and learning plan that aims to extract maximum economic value from future changes to the Falkland Islands has been commissioned from Cambridgeshire company Scintilla Associates.

Speaking to Penguin News this week, Director Jonathan Knight explained he will be working with Karen Lee of Wilkins Kennedy Etd and Carolyn Montgomerie of Engage (Executive search and HR consulting)

In line with the vision set out in the Islands Plan, the Falklands Islands Government and the FCO have asked Scintilla Associates to help identify training needs on the Islands, "to help ensure that the right investments are made in education and training to provide Islanders with the skills to fill any skilled and better remunerated jobs that will be created over the next 25 years," said Mr Knight. He said this will ensure that any investment made in education and training creates a sustainable economy in the long term.

He said they aim to deliver a plan that will enable both Islanders as individuals and the Islanders as a community to extract maximum economic value from changes.

Mr Knight said it was all about, "supply and demand."

In terms of 'demand' they will examine changes in cross sectors

of the economy, "how they're going to change the requirements for skills in jobs over the short to medium term," giving a sense of, "some of the skill sets required," as well as what the appetite is amongst the Falklands population for the different types of jobs.

They will also look at, "what the constraints are, what the realities are in terms of IT infrastructure," and also to what extent people can actually undertake training bearing in mind the Islands has full employment.

He said having two people on

the ground in the Falklands will give, "real perspective about what is happening, what is needed and what will work."

There will be an in depth consultation and information gathering phase which will start shortly and last several weeks. This will finish by the beginning of December and a four person team will run extensive feedback presentation sessions on the Islands at beginning of December.

Mr Knight hosted a drop in session on the subject at the Chamber of Commerce on Wednesday. Mrs Lee and Ms Montgomerie plan to run the imminent consultation process including an online survey on Facebook.

He said they were keen to hear from people, "if they have any views or have issues or questions," which can be directed to them via Lucille McMullen at the Department of Education.

In summary he said the goal of the project is to propose a structure and offering for learning and training which is flexible (allowing for the inevitable certainties about future development), which is "future-proof" and which is practical. He said: "Training delivered needs to be relevant, effective, efficient and sustainable. It should also benefit from all the strengths and opportunities that exist within the Island community."

Unwelcome visits from aircraft

1 READ with interest in last weeks Penguin News the article about the flight of Miguel Fitzgerald in a Cessna 185 aircraft to the Islands in 1964. What did puzzle me though was the distance he stated as 550 miles from the coast of the mainland to the Islands. 1 believe the distance is in fact 300 miles. Perhaps he didn't fly direct.

Shortly after this unusual event the Colonial Secretary Mr WH Thompson ordered the racecourse to be blocked off in order to prevent any further aircraft from landing there. However the obstructions were removed at a later date and just about exactly two years later another aircraft landed on the racecourse. This time though it turned out to be somewhat more dramatic than Fitzgerald's arrival as this was an Aerolineas Argentinas DC 4 airliner. The DC 4 had been on a domestic flight from Bahia Blanco to Rio Gallegos during which it was hijacked by a bunch of militants protesting about the Islands being occupied by the British etc. However neither the pilot or indeed anyone on board the aircraft were aware that there was no airport anywhere on the Islands and when the aircraft arrived over Stanley it had insufficient fuel to enable a return flight back to Argentina. Therefore the pilot elected to land on the racecourse which he did with considerable skill given the size of this aircraft and the relatively small racecourse. However shortly after landing the aircraft not surprisingly became bogged down and it took about ten days

to have it de-bogged when it taxied down to the grandstands was turned around and finally took off to continue its flight to Rio Gallegos. Probably needless to say but when the aircraft did take off, it being a fine Saturday afternoon, most of the residents of Stanley witnessed the event.

Yet again and a further two years on during 1968 Fitzgerald returned again but this time in a twin engined Grand Commander aircraft. He apparently intended to land on the racecourse again but due to a strong southerly wind, i.e. crosswind, he decided to land on Eliza Cove road but as the aircraft's undercarriage was wider than the road he crashed. fairly gently though damaging the main and nose wheels of the aircraft. So on this occasion Mr Fitzgerald didn't fly back to the mainland instead he was transported courtesy of the Royal Navy on board HMS Enchurance.


Well that was the end of illegal and uninvited flights at least until April 1982 when we seem to receive quite a lot of them. Gerald Cheek

Why is money and time Quering spent on clearing out the drainage ditches that border the MPA road. Even after a particularly heavy rain, the ditches never appear to be carrying more than just a minimal amount of water. Also they tend to look more in keeping with the surrounding countryside if they remain undisturbed leaving the grass etc to grow along the edges

Director of Public Works Manfred Keenleyside provided the following response

routine cleaning out of sections of the drainage ditches is to remove material which has built up so that the ditches are returned to their original level.

It is necessary to keep the road construction drained so that it does not lose structural strength and it is to help maintain this free drainage of the construction that the ditches are cleared, so that the bottom of the ditches stays below the base of the road (typically by 100mm), rather than necessarily relating to the size they may need to be to carry runoff during rainfall or snow melt.

Although this may go unnoticed by road users, buildup of material within the ditches is sometimes sufficient to close off the entrance or exit of cross drains under the road


Museum Dock Yard dream becomes a reality

TWENTY eight years after the idea was first suggested and more than ten years since the Falkland Islands Museum and National Trust (FIMNT) began to seek the development of the Dockyard as a museum and heritage area, the dream has become a reality.

On Saturday evening the beautifully preserved old Central Stores building, now housing glearning glass fronted display units, works of art, and hundreds of attractively and imaginatively displayed pieces of Falklands history was the venue for the opening of the museum.

Following a speech by FIMNT Chair Tim Blake, who outlined the background to the project which ran from 1986 through to the present day, guest of honour Sir Neil Cossens OBE FSA FMA rang The Dockyard Bell to declare the museum open.

Sir Neil wrote the original report on the development of tourism in the Islands in 1986 and called for the use of the Dockyard for historic, leisure and tourism purposes including a museum.

Museum Manager Leona Roberts also spoke of the work leading up to the opening and thanked many of those who contributed to the mammoth task. In particular she thanked the organisations and individuals "our founding partners," who had supported the project including a generous bequest from the late Mrs 'Tim' Simpson. This has been used to create The Tim Simpson Memorial Reading Room and Gallery.

Other contributors comprise: Beauchene Fishing Company Ltd, Consolidated Fisheries Ltd, Richard Cockwell, Doccombe Global Logistics, Fortuna Ltd, Gladiators Ltd, Stefan Falkland Heijtz, Heather Norman, Philips Electronics UK Ltd, Pioneer Seafoods, RBC Ltd, David Roberts, Seafish (Falklands) Ltd, S & JD Robertson, Stanley Services Ltd, UK Antarctic Heritage Trust and Workboat Services Ltd.

Richard remembers nine months in Antarctic Reclus Hut

TWO of the three men who spent the winter of 1957 at the Reclus Hut in Antarctica visited the Falklands this week as part of the celebrations for the opening of the new Dockyard Museum.

Richard (Dick) Foster said he and Ray McGowan had been happy to make the journey which was also the first visit to the Falklands since 1957 when they had stayed with Mrs Brecon and not only enjoyed the first proper shower for two and a half years, but had feasted on "cloud" berries (teaberries) and fresh cream.

The third member of their party, Dennis Kershaw has since passed away.

Mr Foster, working for the Falkland Islands Dependencies (FIDS) had travelled to Antarctica in 1955 to establish a new base to carry out topographical and geological surveys.

Using the helicopter from the Navy ship Protector which was deployed as a whaling protection vessel, the area was investigated for a suitable place to build a base.

Danco Island in the Lemaire

Channel was located and considered a good place to work from (Base O) and the Hut was built on Cape Reclus (now known as Portal Point) on the Antarctic Peninsula.

Mr Foster said that while he and his colleagues did not actually build the hut there was a lot of hard work involved with landing not only the materials for the build but all the equipment needed for the winter.

In 1957 Mr Foster and his colleagues wintered in the small hut while they carried out local survey work and created depots and sourced suitable routes in preparation for a four man team from Hope Bay (Base D) to attempt the first east to west crossing of the Antarctic Peninsula.

Much of this time was spent snowbound in tents and Mr Foster described how they would have to move camp when the heat from the sheepskins meant they were sleeping in hollows – likewise a spill when cooking in the tent could result in a similar need to 'move house.'

Communication was by morse code and sporadic so the progress of the team from Hope Bay was

unknown. Reduced to half rations (around 3,000 calories per day) they waited on the Graham Plateau until one day little black spots appeared in the distance which was the tow dog team group which included the famous polar explorer Sir Walter Herbert, a surveyor on this particular expedition.

Mr Foster said they made their way back down the mountain together, but as there was only room for three in the hut the Hope Bay group camped outside.

With their numbers boosted to seven fresh conversation was most welcome he recalled as they waited for the relief ship *Shackleton* to pick them up. However after sustaining damage the *Shackleton* was diverted back to South Georgia and while Mr Foster said he was not that concerned about the vessel, he was a tad worried about his £400 being carried by an officer which would finance his travels through South America after he left the Falklands.

Mr Foster was enthusiastic about the Dockyard Museum, saying that although he could not compare it to the previous building, "it is as good as any museum I have visited anywhere." Manager Leona Roberts and her team had done a "magnificent job," he concluded. Page 10



The battles of Coronel and the Falklands in the making

ONE hundred years ago this week - a daily diary of events leading up to the battles of Coronel and the Falklands by Islander and marine archaeologist Mensun Bound

Saturday 12th September 1914

Stanley: On this day the war reached the Falklands. Governor Allardyce received a message from Captain Milward, HM Consul in Punta Arenas, and what it contained made very uncomfortable reading. It reported that the German steamer Santa Isabel had loaded with livestock and large quantities of foodstuffs, and had left heading east along the Straits. Although the name Dresden had not been mentioned, it was clear to both Milward and Allardyce that this was the ship for which the supplies were intended. And if she was heading east it very likely meant that Dresden was hiding somewhere along the Atlantic coast south of the Plate and was thus within striking distance of the Falklands. The Volunteers were put on full-alert.

Sunday 13th September 1914

Stanley: Allardyce concluded that Dresden was mostly likely holed up at San Jose on the Argentine coast and, if an attack on the Falklands was contemplated, then it was imminent. He wrote: I reckoned that the Santa Isabel would take from two and a half to three days to reach San Jose, about half a day to transfer her provisions to the Dresden. and that the Dresden ...would take something under two and a half days to reach the Falkland Islands, so that we might expect her arrival on the 14th or 15th of this month

Monday 14th September 1914

Dresden. In hiding behind Cape Horn, finished coaling from *Baden*.

Cradock: Acting on planted information, Good Hope, Monmonth, Glasgow and Otranto converged on Southern Brazil in search of Dresden. For the first time all the ships that would fight at Coronel were functioning as a unit. Cradock was now convinced that Dresden was well south and ordered his ships back to the Plate to coal.

Stanley: Mood tense. If Allardyce was correct this was the first of the two days on which they might be attacked by *Dresden*.

Samoa: At dawn Scharnhorst and Gneisenau charged into the harbour at Apia (the capital of what had been German Samoa) only to find it empty of shipping. As they continued along the coast a boat came out with two German planters on board who gave

details of the Allied landing and related how the German Governor had been badly treated before being taken into custody. When the squadron later swooped on the Falklands, one of their intentions was to capture the Governor in reprisal for the perceived mistreatment of their Governor at Samoa. As they left the island they made a feint to the NW then, once out of sight, headed east. For over three weeks von Spee had kept his enemies guessing. Now as he steamed away he could hear Apia radio reporting the attack.

Carmania: On this day Cradock at last had some good fortune when AMC *Carmania* found the German AMC Cap *Trafalgar* off the Brazilian island of Trimidad and sank her after a brutal battle lasting an hour and a half. **Tuesday 15th September 1914**

Stanley. It was the second of the two days on which they were expecting an attack. During the evening a strange event occurred that remains one of the unsolved mysteries of Falkland's history. At about 23.00 sentries at Hooker's Point reported a vessel in Hooker's Bay approaching from the east that resembled a steam launch. When she was about two or three hundred yards from the shore the two sentries fired a blue warning light to alert the guards at the wireless station. The Volunteers were mustered and preparations were made to repel raiders. At the same time the outpost on Sapper Hill phoned to say there was light off the Wolf Rocks. Sentries at Navy Point reported the same. The light was watched for an hour. The vessel in Hooker's Bay, possibly alarmed by the signal, turned and steamed off towards the Wolf Rocks. Later the light was seen heading out to sea in a south-westerly direction.

Cradock: The Admiral received a signal from Churchill:

There is a strong probability of the Scharnhorst and Gneisenau arriving in the Magellan Straits or on the West Coast of South America. The Germans have begun to carry on trade on the West Coast of South America. Leave sufficient force to deal with Dresden and Karlsrühe. Concentrate as squadron strong enough to meet Scharnhorst and Gneisenau,



From this it was apparent that Churchill thought Cradock had 'sufficient force' to destroy von Spee, and that he was to have Defence which, with its 9.2-inch guns and 23 knots, would be the only credible fighting ship in his squadron.

Wednesday 16th September 1914

Samoa: News of the German raid on Apia reached the Admiralty. The German squadron had moved 2,500 miles closer to South America, now more than ever Cradock needed reinforcements. However, because von Spee left Samoa in a north-westerly direction, Churchill assumed - despite the views of his admirals and staff - that von Spee was heading west and not towards the Americas. It was an old trick, naval ships that did not want their destinations known usually left sight of land in a different direction. As far as Churchill was concerned, Cradock's main mission was now to suppress German trade off Chile. On this basis Churchill ordered Defence to remain in the Med. He telegraphed Cradock: 'Situation changed. Scharnhorst and Gneisenau appeared off Samoa on September 14th to find it British, and left steering N.W. ... German trade on W. Coast of America is to be attacked at once. Cruisers need not now be concentrated. Two cruisers and an armed liner would appear sufficient for Magellan Straits and West Coast. Report what you propose about Canopus and coaling bases'

The salient feature of this message was that it did not inform Cradock that Defence had been withdrawn. He had just lost his most powerful ship and he did not

know it. As a result, all his strategic and tactical thinking until 12 October would be profoundly flawed.

Dresden departed Orange Bay and headed up the West Coast of South America.

Thursday 17th September 1914 The Bacchantes: Churchill took the train to Scotland to see Jellicoe. With him were Sturdee and Commodore Keyes. The latter, yet again, urged Churchill to withdraw the three old Bacchante-class cruisers from their patrol off Holland as they were live bait' for submarines. Sturdee objected: 'My Dear Fellow, you don't know your history. We have always maintained a squadron on the Broad 14's.' Tragedy was now just days away; it is dwelt on here because it further illustrates the prevailing incompetence within the Admiralty, and because it was part of a pattern of failure that included Coronel.

Elsewhere: *Glasgow*, *Monmouth* and Otranto at River Plate *Canopus* arrived Pernambuco. *Cornwall* guarding the Abrolhos. Leipzig arrived at the Galapagos.

Friday 18th September 1914

The Bacchantes: Churchill wrote to First Sea Lord Battenberg asking him to withdraw the Bacchants. Sturdee, however, convinced him to leave them on station until the yards released some new-builds to take over.

Dresden: While heading south down the coast of Chile the PSNC liner Ortega ran into the Dresden steaming north. Dresden fired blanks and ordered the liner to stop. Her captain refused and raced into the back-channels of the Chilean archipelago. Dresden continued on her way.

Orama: The former PSNC liner Orama, now and AMC, departed the Thames and headed south. No one could then have imagined that this ship was going to play a key role in one of the most famous episodes in naval history - the hunt for the Dresden - and that six months later, with guns blazing, she would participate in her final destruction.

Cradock: Cradock now in the Plate prepared to sweep south. He replied to the Admiralty's message of the 16th: 'When finished coaling am proceeding with Good Hope, Glasgow, Monmouth and Otranto to sweep south, region of Magellan Straits and search. Glasgow and Monmouth will continue to west coast of America to destroy trade. Canopus will be ordered ... to proceed to Rio de la Plata to guard trade and colliers and remain pending events Heavy continuous gale here interferes with scheme of operations ...



Everest climber and yachtsman conquer SG unclimbed peaks

CONQUERING three unclimbed peaks at the northern end of South Georgia could only be described as a, "consolation prize," by the most ambitious, experienced explorers, and British mountaineer Stephen Venables (the first Briton to climb Mt Everest without supplementary oxygen) and extreme sailor and mountaineer Skip Novak, are most certainly that.

The pair who returned from the south earlier this week on Skip's yacht *Pelagic Australis*, told Penguin News their aim had been to climb a number of, "six possibilities," at the southern end of South Georgia in the Salveson range, "but those six we failed on completely," due to weather, said the yachtsman cheerfully, who has 25 seasons in the Antarctic region under his belt.

It was a: "comprehensive failure but we snatched victory from the jaws of defeat," joked Stephen, referring to their remarkable feat.

So how did this particular adventure evolve?

In 2010 Stephen was skiing past the, "stunning peaks," and in his mind it quickly became, "unfinished business."

He suggested a late winter trip to Skip (an unusual time of year to visit South Georgia) because he anticipated, "more snow cover; the glaciers should be better covered, maybe more stable weather and no crowds." (In an interview with the Telegraph last year Stephen strongly criticised the devaluation of Mt Everest by tourism - so 'crowds' really aren't his thing).

Always keen to head for the highest of latitudes Skip, well known for taking part in four Whitbread Round the World Races, agreed to the expedition, which had a few added risks at

"On the way down we had a very strong south west flow... It was interesting because we got completely iced up with sea spray freezing on the boat in minus temperatures." They ended up with ice on the deck, the lower rigging and all the winches but, "not very high up so it wasn't really a safety concern yet, but we were slightly preoccupied so we spent the last two days coming into the island chipping off ice as it accumulated."

Too much ice and a vessel's centre of gravity is raised and with that comes a strong possibility of capsizing.

Hot water and lots of chipping eventually freed them up said Skip who described the experience cheerfully as, "exciting."

The next move was to make a dash to the south end of the island in order set up the climbing group at Troll Hull Bay on the south west coast.

Unfortunately the south west wind was strong, "and we couldn't actually get around because it had to be fairly calm to land the group of six of us that were going to climb."

They ditched the operation and tried to start from Larsen Harbour

but, explained Skip, "it was still too windy, quite steep and there were a lot of new snowfalls, so the whole idea of getting somewhere up onto the Salveson range didn't look good with the weather forecast going forward not good for several days."

They also had other people on the boat, "who were just doing the coastal tour and we didn't want to compromise their time too much so we ended up seuttling back north and changing the plan completely to a project in the north central section." culminating in an attempt to climb three peaks of a range called the Trident.

At this point a deeply disappointed Stephen Venables was feeling, "quite depressed." He had been planning the ascents for two years. However in South Georgia, "any day you make progress," is "a bonus" and "you have to be realistic," he admitted. **Continued page 4**

Your questions answered

Reference the large amount of crushed rock infill that has taken place in the roadside ditch opposite the Quarry; is it planned to fill all the ditches on the Stanley to MPA road and how much has it cost to fill the current section?

A Director of Public Works Manfred Keenleyside provided the following answer The ditching north of the Pony's Pass quarry site was needed to both better drain the road, for the reasons given in relation to last week's question on why the ditches are cleaned out, as this section was prone to higher than typical maintenance due to the high water table, and to reduce the amount of water entering the quarry site itself.

Some stone fill was placed in the section of ditch which is being monitored and as expected demonstrated during the recent heavy rains that the reduced capacity arising from even part filling the ditches results in a higher water table during rains, as some of the flow was above the level of the stone fill.

Additionally it can also already be seen that some fine material has washed into the stone, which will over time further reduce the capacity of the diteh to carry water and effectively drain the road. Placed in isolated sections such as this the negative effects of placing even clean stone fill in the ditches have a lesser effect, but will I think continue to be demonstrated at this location to result in reduced function and to a need to remove and replace the stone periodically which would, if all of the MPA road ditches were to be filled become and almost continuous process.

It is not planned to fill the ditches along the MPA road at this stage, although review of this is likely to form part of the review of options for surfacing the MPA road which has been included in the programme of consultancy works recently agreed by ExCo and which is currently scheduled to commence in year three of that programme.

Costs have not been pulled together.

Road repairs ongoing with West damage to be assessed

WORK to repair the flood damage to the road network has been ongoing this week with the Greenfield and North Arm roads both opened by Wednesday.

Roads Engineer Simon Catton said that work was still ongoing on the Rincon Grande road and the Salvador Road would be closed until the culvert that had failed was replaced.

He said this was in fact the culvert which was top of the list for replacement during the forthcoming season, adding that there was a passable alternative route on the Salvador road.

On West Falkland a section of road near the Little Chartres bridge has suffered some damage and is only passable to light vehicles. Mr Catton said it was unclear exactly what the damage was, adding that efforts were being made to assess the situation.

West Falkland residents have reported that they have concerns over the safety of the actual bridge since the flooding and are looking forward to a full assessment by the Highways Department in the near future.

Burning Permits 2014/15

Please note that grass fires or 'camp burns' will only be permitted on wet white grass flats on weekdays during September and no permits will be issued for 'camp' burns after 30th September due to environmental impact.

Permits will continue to be issued for the burning of trash on cultivated areas of ground. Please ensure the guidelines available from the DoA are followed.

Belligerent bloke banned from driving

STANLEY man James Earl Hamilton Curtis (22) was banned from driving pending a presentence report being prepared after he admitted drink driving, obstructing a police officer and failing to wear a seat belt.

Prosecutor Crown Simon Rowe told the Summary Court that on August 31 at 1.51am a mobile police patrol had stopped Mr Curtis who when asked when he had his last drink had replied, "About an hour ago. You know I've been drinking, you saw me."

He said Mr Curtis became, "verbally combative," when a roadside breathalyser test was suggested and his obstructive behaviour meant it was some 20 minutes before a road side breath test was recorded. Mr Curtis then ran away from the police officers and jumped down off the sea wall onto the beach where he further resisted arrest.

A Camic breath test was finally achieved at the Police Station at 2.47am giving a reading of 75mg per 100ml of breath (35mg is the legal limit), said Mr Rowe, adding that Mr Curtis had remained belligerent throughout the proceedings, being particularly abusive to one police officer saying, "No one likes you UK e*** coming down here.

The same police officer gave Mr Curtis a lift home and received an apology which he said he accepted, adding that he knew the young man to normally be, "polite and friendly.

Justice of the Peace Keith Biles said that given the severity of Mr Curtis' actions and reactions throughout the incident, it would be in the interest of justice for a presentence report to be prepared. Given that a ban from driving was mandatory an interim disqualification was put in place with immediate effect with Mr Curtis to reappear in court on October 9 for sentencing

The failure to wear a seat belt offence took place on July 15 on Pencil Lane and the court noted that Mr Curtis had been verbally warned in December 2013

Five road traffic offences fined in Summary Court

STANLEY woman Rosalind Ca-triona Cheek (40) was fined £150 for speeding on the ByPass Road on August 6. Police carrying out static speed checks near the Department of Natural Resources recorded Miss Cheek travelling at a speed of 51mph in the 40mph zone. Miss Cheek acknowledged that as Head of Legal Services and as an officer of the court who had a role in the prosecution process, the incident should be treated more seriously. She said she would expect the court to look at the higher end of the scale where a fine was concerned

Overseas student Thomas Elsby (22) was also fined £150 for driving at 50mph on the Moody Brook Road (40mph zone) on August 16. Mr Elsby apologised to the court and described his actions as a, "lapse in concentration

Murrel Farm man Nathan Reginald Eugenio Lowe (18) was fined £150 and had his licence endorsed after he admitted driving

at 40mph in the 25mph zone of Ross Road East.

Stanley man Andrew New-man (43) was fined £300 for using a mobile phone while driving on August 11. Mr Newman said he had had a very busy day and made a five second call to arrange to arrange to be picked up after dropping off a vehicle. However Justice of the Peace Keith Biles said the fact he had made the call while driving exacerbated the situation.

Stanley woman Coral Elizabeth McGill (43) was fined £150 for not wearing a seatbelt on August 13. Mrs Betts who had previously been warned about not wearing a seatbelt was pulled over on Davis Street and told police officers had never worn a seatbelt, adding, it's a matter of getting into the habit

All five individuals charged with road traffic offences had their licences endorsed and were ordered to pay £85 prosecution costs in addition to their fines

Wood stolen from Museum

THE theft of at least 15 lengths of decking timber from the Museum work site in the old Dockyard has left the project out of pocket and possibly unable to finish part of the walkway

Museum and National Trust trustee Richard Cockwell told Penguin News that the wood had been especially imported for the job and is much heavier than normal decking.

The decking wood (pictured above) is 140mm x 55mm is 4.2 metre in length and costs approximately £45 per piece.

PC Tim Wilson said the wood was stolen on Tuesday night and asked that anyone who might be able to help in any way to locate it to give him a call on 28100. He said any information would be treated in confidence.

Mr Cockwell said he was, saddened rather than angry. that the theft had taken place, given the tremendous community support for the project in the build up to, and since, the opening earlier this month.

He said it would be nice to think whoever took it, "might have a fit of conscience and if it should be discovered abandoned somewhere, the trustees and staff would be extremely grateful.

Repeat slips can be dropped into the repeat prescription box, requests can be sent by email to dispensary@kemh.gov.fk, or over the phone by calling 28010 or they can be requested in person Repeat prescriptions take two

working days to process. The pharmacy team is also available to provide information and advice, not only about medication, but also minor ailments.

They have a large selection of medication that can be purchased over the counter without the need to see a GP for a prescription. Ms Toulson said: "We have been

aware for a number of years that

our opening hours are inconvenient for members of the public, but inadequate staffing levels made it virtually impossible to make any changes.

"It is hoped that with the recruitment of a second, full time Pharmacy Technician, patient satisfaction will increase and waiting times will be significantly reduced. It is a very exciting time for the department as we are hoping to make a number of improvements to the service over the coming months."

Conquering South Georgia's unclimbed peaks - continued from front page

After a couple of days of annoyingly good weather in Possession Bay (where Captain Cook landed in 1770) they were met by. "an almighty hoolie blowing over the Shackleton Gap. I think again we had chosen the windiest place on the entire island. When we were about to set off in the morning Skip turned to me and said do you think we should actually be going." laughed Stephen.

"Well, we had turned back enough already so we fought our way up to the Shackleton Gap in this hideous wind, just blasting and knocking us over." The strength of the gale meant skis were out of the questions and were replaced with crampons.

Much to their relief things improved at the Gap as they rounded the corner. At the first camp they built a large snow block wall and had a good night's sleep, "and in the morning the wind had lessened," meaning an enjoyable day of sledging, "up to these three peaks called Trident and suddenly the island was a beautiful place again. It was just stunning."

A day confined to camp due to snow and wind followed but on the fourth day the Gods were again kind: "We got up in the morning and the sun was coming through: it was dead calm, no clouds in the sky. It was the kind of day you dream about. In fact it was the best day in six trips 1 have ever had on South Georgia," enthused Stephen.

The team went on to successfully climb the central and highest Trident peak which has a rather precarious pointed summit on which only one man could

Leaving around 8am each morning they then summitted the south and north peaks over the following two days. With six climbers as opposed to a neater two it was, "a bit more cumbersome." said Stephen, as they were obliged to, " slide back down ropes and fix anchors and suchlike."

"We finished up that first day skiing back to the tents down this perfect nursery run, five degrees probably, immaculate beautiful soft snow; and thinking, 'Oh I'm not bad at skiing after all'. It was just a fantastic way to end the day, skiing back down to supper in the tent."

But how was the climbing?

It involved, "a bit of sport," said Skip in his and Stephen's understated descriptive style "walking together roped up at the beginning but the tops were all technical, where you had to put in anchors.

"Stephen was leading all the top summit parts. He would fix the ropes and the rest of us would jumar up the rope. It wasn't straightforward but the fact that we did it all in very easy weather made it very enjoyable because there's an anxiety factor when the wind kicks in and you get blown all over the place, so it worked out extremely well."

It was all too soon over however, and with rain and moist air in the offing and always a danger of getting weather bound, rather than continuing another planned traverse they hustled back to Possession Bay and set off north.

So with the Salvesen range still, "unfinished business," will they be heading back to take on the six peaks?

Stephen admits South Georgia is, "a hard habit to break." His next trip south however is in 2016 and will be to the Antarctic peninsular.

Skip on the other hand will be off back to the island next year to deliver and then assist up the glaciers, scientists from the University of Maine on an ice coring project.

They agree heartily though, "we'll always go back."

Support a human right

FOR six years Clare Howes worked in remote camps with Karrenni refugees from Burma, leading such a quiet life that on arrival in the Falklands she was a bit overwhelmed by all the chatty and friendly people she bumped into.

She says she is loving the Islands and has been humbled a number of times by the "community spirit and kindness of the people here."

Clare is still in contact with many of the students and teachers she trained from Thailand and Burma, "and a number of them have now returned to their home country to teach in their respective villages. However their journey ahead still holds many challenges. She hopes very much to be able to assist them and to begin fund raising in the Islands. Clare takes up the story...

Burma, officially the Republic of the Union of Myanmar, commonly shortened to Myanmar is a sovereign state in Southeast Asia bordered by Bangladesh, India, China, Laos and Thailand. For most of its independent years, the country has been absorbed in extensive ethnic conflict and countless numbers of Burma's ethnic groups have been involved in one of the world's longestrunning unresolved civil wars.

During my years with various non-government organisations 1 worked with ten different ethnic tribes from Burma implementing various community projects and teaching English amongst the local community. The Ka-

renni were one of the many ethnic groups oppressed by the Burmese government since 1948. As a consequence, thousands of Karenni people had abandoned their homes due to villagers living under the constant threat of rape, beatings, arbitrary arrest or execution, slave labour for the Myanmar army, and having their food and possessions taken without compensation. It was here that I totally immersed myself in their humble and gracious culture, simultaneously being in awe and deeply moved by the resilience of these peaceful people whilst they faced such hardships.

I hope to keep helping these people with their struggles in any way I can and to begin by fundraising here within the Islands. I want to create an event to raise money to support 'The SchTheh Learning centre' that has recently been established in Karenni State, Myanmar, to supply a qualified Karenni teacher and learning resources. Many of the students I have taught over the years have now been brave enough to return to their motherland. They came to the refugee camps for safety and to gain an education in order to one day return to Burma as teachers themselves, transferring their knowledge and skills in order to empower their local community. Their dream is of a peaceful land, where they can rebuild their lives once more and they value education as the key tool towards developing this sustainability.

The Narrows will be hosting a Halloween fancy dress party, a live band, a raffle and an Asian cuisine buffet on October 31, in order to raise money for the Karenni. In addition to this Paula Fowmes from FITV has rallied support to host the first ever Halloween Ball Teen Terror Ball' for the Community school. The proceeds will go to the PTA and further funds raised on the evening will support the Karenni appeal.

My wish is that through the kindness and generosity of the Falkland Island community this event will help support and raise money for this worthy cause. All the money raised from these activities will help the Karenni to achieve one of their basic human rights in life, the right to an education.

All about... Medical Treatment Overseas

PRACTICAL issues arising from the policy on Medical Treatment Overseas are raised regularly in discussions with patients and their families. This short series of articles from the hospital aims to clarify some of the most common issues.

The first article will cover the way that referrals are made from the point at which the doctor discusses with a patient the potential need for a referral overseas. Over the next few weeks the articles will look at: flights and internal travel in the UK, accommodation and support, hospital appointments, and coming home. There will also be a piece on the importance of completing the questionnaire that is given to all patients returning to the Islands.

From time to time in the Falklands there is a need to refer patients to a destination where there is a wider and more sophisticated range of medical resources.

Patients may be referred for the purpose of diagnosis, specialist assessment, treatment and, very occasionally, for long-term



care. Decisions about overseas treatment are emotive, as they concern both the immediate and long-term health and well-being of individuals. They may also entail considerable upheaval in the individual's life and that of their family. It is important, therefore, that decisions about referrals and associated funding, are transparent, consistent and fair.

Initial Referral Process

Following appointments with your GP, if it is decided that you require further investigation or treatment that cannot be carried out here, you will be advised that a referral overseas may be necessary.

Your GP will inform you that your referral will need to be discussed further with a group of medical officers at the weekly Medical Treatment Overseas meeting. The decision to refer a patient overseas, either to the United Kingdom or South America, is made jointly by the group. The importance of your referral being discussed at this meeting is that every referral has the benefit and experience of all our doctors in reaching the best clinical decision for each patient.

Following the Medical Treatment Overseas meeting, your GP will make contact with you and advise if your referral has been approved, also where you will be going, UK or South America. You then will be asked to make contact with the Overseas Medical Co-ordinator who will continue working with you to finalise the on-going arrangements.

If in the event of an emergency referral taking place outside of the meeting, this will be dealt with separately by the Chief Medical Officer and the referring clinician.

The infamous Erebus and Terror

EARLIER this month news reports told of a Canadian team that claimed to have found the wreck of one of the ships from Franklin's infamous expedition to find the North West Passage that set out in 1845.

It could be either of two ships - *Erebus* or *Terror*. Both played a key part in Falklands history and are also central to the most enduring mysteries in polar history.

Polar maritime history enthusiast, Harbour Master Malcolm Jamieson takes up the story.

Terror (326 tons) had already been involved in Arctic exploration and had nearly been lost due to damage with icebergs before it was sent South.

Erebus (372 tons) was built in 1826 but only spent two of the following 13 years at sea. Built as bomb vessels, designed to withstand the shock of firing large three ton mortar cannons, they were deemed to be strong enough for ice. The ships had shallow flat bottoms which were considered well suited for manoeuvrability in the ice, but also had the result of rolling and pitching in heavy weather and lumbered along at no more than five knots.


After the Napoleonic wars the Royal Navy found itself with plenty of ships and men but no work. Sir John Barrow, Second Secretary in the Admiralty decided to use the ships of the Royal Navy to fill in the gaps in the world's maps which included the Arctic, Antarctic and Africa with success and disaster in near equal measure.

After many years in and around the Arctic, Barrow and the Admiralty set their sights south with a view to explore Antarctica and establish the position of the South Magnetic Pole and to study magnetism.

Hereafter lies a number of individuals whose names live on in the Falklands in the form of Ross Road, James Street, Crozier Place and Hooker's Point.

In April 1839, James Clark Ross was appointed to lead the next expedition to the Antarctic. He chose a trusted friend and comrade to be his second in command. He was Captain Francis Crozier. The surgeon on *Erebus* was a certain Joseph Hooker.

Erebus and *Terror* sailed in September 1839 and reached Tasmania which was at the time still known as Van Diemen's Land. They went ashore to Government House to meet the Lieutenant Governor, one Sir John Franklin who by then had already become known as 'the man who ate his boots', during a previous practically disastrous expedition in the Arctic when they famously resorted to eating 'tripe de roche' which loosely translates to tripe of rock

Erchus and *Terror* stayed at Hobart for some three months before venturing south and crossed the Antarctic Circle on New Year's Day 1841.

The discovery of land dashed hopes of them sailing to the South Magnetic Pole but they discovered what they named Victoria Land and a chain of mountains. discoveries followed Other One mountain was seen to emit smoke and they realised that they had found a volcano which they named Mount Erebus which remains the most southerly volcano. The island they found was named Ross Island and was later to become home to Scott and Shackleton 70 years later. A nearby headland was called Cape Crozier which went on to be the scene for 'The Worst Journey in the World' which is another epic story in its own right.

They wintered in Hobart and then returned to the Antarctic where they left off the previous season, but were thwarted by ice and both ships suffered damage. Where they had sailed through the same area the year before in five days now took 47 and by February they made for the north.

Ross and Crozier rounded Cape Horn and arrived in Berkeley Sound in April 1842 and stayed for eight months or so.

During this visit, Governor Moody requested that they assist him in his search for a permanent new site for a capital. James Clark Ross came back with his recommendation to site a town in Jackson Harbour which was renamed Port Stanley. The rest, as they say, is history.

Érebus and *Terror* sailed south once more for a third season and were again slowed by ice and struggled to make head way where Weddell before them had sailed through without hindrance and so some land which was just over the horizon was left for another year to be discovered... or in some cases 90 years.

The ships left the Antarctic for the last time in March and arrived in Folkestone in September having spent five months in Cape Town. James Clark Ross married and promised not to conduct another expedition.

Erebus and *Terror* had discovered 1,000s of miles of coast including the Ross Sea, Ross Ice Shelf and McMurdo Sound. The South Magnetic Pole was located but not reached until Shackleton's Nimrod Expedition in 1909. James Clark Ross was knighted the following year. Joseph Hooker went on to become the most authoritative botanist of his day and is commemorated by a plaque in Westminster Abbey. He also advised Scott prior to the Terra Nova Expedition.

Sir John Franklin returned to England in 1844 and like Crozier, didn't really have a job while John Barrow was preparing for another attempt to find the North West Passage. Franklin was chosen to lead the expedition and *Erebus* and *Terror* were again chosen, as was Crozier. This time though the ships would be fitted with an auxiliary engine of some 20HP!

iliary engine of some 20HP! On May 19, 1845, *Erebus* and *Terror* departed with three years provisions and sailed north, arriving off Greenland at the end of June and were made aware by whalers in the area that it was a bad season for ice. One ship, the *Enterprise* had seen *Erebus* and *Terror* moored to an iceberg waiting for ice to break up.

Enterprise sailed to the hunting

grounds at the end of July 1845 knowing 'all was well'. *Erebus* and *Terror* and all 129 men onboard then vanished.

As the expedition was expected to last three years anyway, it was not until 1847 that concerns were raised. Ship after ship ventured north in search of the expedition by which time *Erebus* and *Terror* had both been abandoned, trapped in the ice with starvation and other complications - there remains speculation about botulism and lead in the tinned food. The men did not possess great skill in hunting or any real grasp of living off the land, being more accustomed to fine china and engraved cutlery.

John Rae, an Orkney man returned to the UK in 1854 from a remarkable overland journey with what he described as, "mel-ancholy tidings" which included that he had reason to believe that the remnants of the expedition had resorted to cannibalism which was a bit too much for genteel society to believe and was effectively shunned and became an outcast. Remnants of the expedition such as personalised cutlery found with Inuit did nothing to stop some thinking that the expedition might still arrive even though Franklin died in 1847 and the details of the rest are unknown and it is thought that Crozier probably died in 1848.

The following rescue attempts were subject to disaster themselves as some of the rescue ships had to be rescued themselves. One such ship was the *Resolute* which was abandoned only to be found largely intact by the Americans in 1855 and later returned to Queen Victoria. Wood from the ship was made into a table and gifted to the United States in appreciation of the ships' return. *Cont. overleaf*

This table still sits in the Oval Office of the White House.

The Franklin expedition became a national obsession for decades and mixed with controversy, as the ships logs were never found, the full story remains a mystery which is probably why it has never left the public imagination.

Only one note found in a cairn written to advise on the abandon-



ment of the ships and the death of Franklin has been found - so far. Some speculate that Crozier was the 'last man standing'.

Bodies from Franklin's expedition were found in the early 1900s by Amundsen during his successful bid for the North West Passage. Remarkably it was Franklin's story that inspired Amundsen to become an explorer in the first place. Our illustrations show the cabins of Captain Sir John Frauklin, and Cap tain Fitzjames, in the *Erebus*. Sir John's cabin is in the stern of the vessel, and has double windows.

Among the external peculiarities of construction may be mentioned the following — Round the outside of both vessels is a projection as far as the shrouds, melosing the chains as a protection against the ice: it is flat on the surface, except at the bows, which form an angle. What is generally the figure head is a solid block of wood; the vessel is double, and the hows are a mass of timber about eight feet thick. The stern is nearly perpendicular, for unshipping the rudder; and an ice board is raised above the bulwarks, which projects over the side, to aid in steering clear of the ice. The serew-propeller is worked by an engine of 25 horse power, which formerly ran upon the Greenwich Railway.

News from the Falkland Islands Community School Clubs staff and healthy statistics

THE Falkland Islands Community School celebrated the largest number ever of students heading off to college in UK this year. A grand total of 15 students will be accessing further education in the UK as well as one student off to study in Singapore.

Following analysis of the grades FICS Headmaster Martin Winward confirmed that the number of students attaining at least five GCSEs between A* - C has increased for the last three years. Numbers of students attaining at least five A*-C grades including English and maths has also increased over the last three years.

Mr Winwards also said the number of students making expected progress from KS2 to 4 in English and maths has increased for the last three years and this is impacting directly on the positive five A*-C grades.

Preparing for Ofsted

In preparation for the up and coming inspection in November a Wiltshire based consultant Daph Marion, has been visiting in order to support the Education Department said Mr Winward.

Ms Marion will be working primarily with the Community School ahead of the inspection but will also have opportunity to work alongside Headteacher at IJS Karen Steen as well as Camp Education and Mount Pleasant School.

The battles of Coronel and the Falklands in the making

ONE hundred years ago this week - a daily diary of events leading up to the battles of Coronel and the Falklands by Islander and marine archaeologist Mensun Bound

Saturday 19th September 1914

Stanley: Gov. Allardyce is still worried. He telegraphed Chief Minister Innes in Montevideo:

What is the naval situation at present as far as hostile attack on Falkland Islands is concerned? Where is *Dresden*?

Sunday 20th September 1914 Stanley: The FO was showing more imagination than the Navy and wrote to Allardyce via Innes:

'I am instructed by HM Secretary of State to request you to send me a short harmless message en clair [in plain English] every twelve hoursIt is important you should not fail to send some message at the intervals above stated as the failure to receive here a message from you will imply that your wireless station has been destroyed and I am to advise Admiral Commanding the British Squadron [Cradock] accordingly

Allardyce replied immediately.

'Owing to severe atmospheries I am unable to send you regular nightly messages but will do my best'

The deplorable state of the Volunteers' shoulder arms were still a concern. Allardyce telegraphed the Secretary of State:

..my Government will require 150 short rifles M.L.E. complete with web equipment and slings also 150,000 ammunition ball .303 in clips and maxim .303 with tripod mounting and spares and ammunition belts maxim .303 in. 250 rounds'

Cradock: Cradock, held up by weather in the Plate, signalled his intentions to the Admiralty:

...Glasgow and Monmouth to West Coast of South America to destroy German trade and reconnoitre as far as Valparaiso; Good Hope to Port Edgar in the West Falklands

Churchill disapproved and sent a memo to Sturdee from which it is clear that, despite the warnings, he had no appreciation of the threat posed by von Spee to the WSCA

'COS ... It is surely not necessary to send Monmouth and Glasgow both round to the S.W. coast.

One of these and an auxiliary wd be the right force to operate against trade in waters where no enemy warships are expected. On the other hand cruisers are needed on the S. Atlantic trade route to hunt down Dresden and Karlsruhe, W.Ch.

Monday 21st September 1914

Von Spee: Von Spee departed Bora Bora for Tahiti. He signalled his purpose to the squadron:

'I intend to engage any enemy ships encountered at Tahiti and to requisition coal and provisions. A parley boat will be sent and will return: the ships will follow a little later. Force will be used if our demands are refused. Our first objectives will be the points from which fire is opened, then defences, the arsenal, public buildings, etc.... armed cutters are to be available to carry requisitioned goods.

Tuesday 22nd September 1914

The Bacchantes: On this day the unimaginable happened. Early in the morning, in the Broad 14s off Holland, German Commander Otto Weddigen in submarine U9 saw through his periscope three old Bacchant-class cruisers (Cressy, Aboukir and Hogue) heading towards him at an unspanking 10 knots. They were not even zig-zagging. In less than an hour all three had been sent to the bottom taking with them 1,459 men and boys. It remains the most famous action in the history of submarine warfare Weddigen was decorated with the Iron Cross by the Kaiser himself. Germany was jubilant; Britain was consumed by feelings of black despondency which would erupt in anger at the Admiralty, six weeks later, when the news of Coronel arrived from Chile.

The buttoned-up and very married Prime Minister, Herbert Asquith, was enjoying a romantic entanglement with a friend of his daughter, Venetia Stanley, 35 years his junior. This day he wrote to her about what had happened. The letter is important as it shows that the Cabinet was losing confidence in Churchill and the way in which his absences from London were distracting him from his core duties at the Admiralty

We have just had some very bad news: the worst, I think, since the war began. Three good and powerful cruisers ...were sunk this morning in the North Sea . The Navy is not doing very well just now: there are nearly half a dozen German cruisers, Emden, Dresden, Karlsruhe &c, which are at large on the high seas and sinking or capturing British merchantmen. ... Unfortunately, on this day, when of all others he was most needed, Winston is away on one of his furtive missions, this time again to Dunkirk: and is not expected back till evening. I think (between you and me) that the Admiralty have not been clever in their outlying strategy'

In Stanley Allardyce withheld news of the sinkings from the

people. Convoy: Von Spee never knew how successful he had been in tying up the Allied navies. Nowhere was there greater anxiety than in New Zealand where the first ANZAC troop convoy was about to depart for Europe. Their Government was deadlocked over what to do. The Governor of New Zealand telegraphed the Colonial Office:

Since German cruisers have appeared near Fiji and Samoa, Cabinet does not agree with Admiralty's views of 19-9-14. Leader of upper House threatens to resign which would place New Zealand in ferment ... your Ministers had better postpone departure. May be delay of 6 weeks Number 10 was shocked. As-

quith wrote to his inamorata:

Things came almost to a climax at the Cabinet today, when we learnt that the New Zealanders absolutely decline to despatch their expeditionary force ... unless we can provide them with a sufficiently powerful escort ...as there are no available ships [all were hunting von Spee's ships] we have been obliged to tell them to wait for what may be as long as another six weeks..

Cradock: In the morning the British squadron left the Plate and headed south in line-abreast formation, the ships roughly 20 miles apart with Good Hope at the in-shore end searching the coast. Everything was now converging on lower South America. Cradock did not know it but he had been caught up in a flow of events over which he would have increasingly less control and which would soon end in his death.

Cradock received a message from Milward in Punta Arenas:

Secret message received by W/T as follows: Ortega outside

Western Straits and chased by two German ships. Origin of message must not on any account be disclosed'

He wondered if it was the Dresden or von Spee.

Von Spect At 05.00 Scharnhorst and Gneisenau charged into Papeete, the capital of Tahiti. The French opened fire from their shore batteries and the cruisers replied. The Island's coal de-pots were set on fire. There was now no point in landing and von Spee could not risk casualties as it would diminish the fighting capability of his ships. Once again he had given away his position for nothing but this time he had expended irreplaceable ammunition. He now headed for the Marquesas to make rendezvous with Nürnberg

Wednesday 23rd September 1914

The Bacchantes: The Navy might be allowed a stumble or two but what had happened to the Bacchants was clearly botchery on an epic scale and confidence in the Navy plummeted. The officers were furious. Richmond wrote:

It is utterly sickening that such carelessness should be the cause of this waste of life. To my mind it is simply criminal. Leveson said, in my hearing, that it 'couldn't be helped'. Of course it could be helped ... Chief of Staff Sturdee's answer, as usual, is that nothing can be done'

Years later Churchill admitted it was the fault of the Admiralty:

The loss of the three cruisers marked a turning-point ...mistakes were bound to happen ... and in each case it was easy to assert that someone blundered. In most cases, indeed, this was true'

Thursday 24th September 1914 The Bacchants: What happened to the Bacchants was the result of a malaise within the Admiralty


which would also claim Cradock. Richmond in the War Room at the Admiralty was still spitting: There is no doubt we are the

most appalling amateurs ... the most supreme case of ineptitude is connected with the loss of the Cressy and other ships ... this miserable lot of nincompoops who call themselves a Staff ...

Friday 25th September 1914

Cradock: Ortega ran into Cradock's net. Its captain informed them of his dramatic escape from the Dresden and Baden in the Pacific on the 18th.

Dresden: Put into Coronel where Lüdecke was informed by the German Consul that von Spee was expected in Chilean waters at the end of October.



Virtual classroom will revolutionise education in Camp says MLA

A VIRTUAL classroom system for use of children educated in the rural community will "revolutionise the way we provide education to those in the Camp.' stated Member of Legislative Assembly (MLA) Barry Elsby at yesterday's meeting of Legislative Assembly.

During his portfolio speech MLA Elsby speaking of the intranet (as opposed to internet) system provided said that over the last few weeks, "the successful linkage of all Camp schools to each other and to the schools in town has happened."

He said: "We are also in the progress of trying to link remote houses with children to Camp schools and to town.

The latter can happen, but it will take longer said MLA Elsby.

He said the virtual classroom system had been tested and it worked both for audio and for live video links

He paid tribute to, "the drive and determination of the Director but especially to the Deputy Head of the Junior School/Camp Education Rebecca Robinson, and also thanked Synergy Information Systems and Sure for their assistance in setting it up.

More work needs to be done on how the teachers will use the facilty, said the MLA, but it will, "revolutionise the way we provide education to those in Camp," and will also have a huge significance on all aspects of life in Camp not just education. "Some big moves and big changes are afoot.

He assured that because it was using intranet and not satellite, there would be no additional cost to the families in Camp.

Also in his portfolio speech MLA Elsby spoke of the up coming Ofsted inspection of the schools which will take place in the first two weeks in November and consist of a small team of inspectors visiting the Islands and conducting a wide range of assessments of the schools.

They will focus not only, "on the grades achieved but will look in depth at how we ensure that each individual student achieves their full potential."

He said it would need to be shown that the schools have correct systems in place to be able to monitor the student regular basis from the time they enter the Infant/Junior School until they complete their GCSEs.

He said the idea is to identify any concerns with a student, "before they become serious, so that we can give extra help to that child and ensure that everyone will achieve their full potential whatever that will be."

MLA Elsby believes this approach is far more important than looking at GCSE results in isolation.

He said the approach has meant a much greater workload for

Airport properly certified

WORK is well advanced for Stanley Airport to be properly certificated and able to offer a full range of services which includes accepting international flights by the end of the calendar year. MLA Roger Edwards said on Thursday this would be dependent on the provision of a suitable fire engine for the airport and explained

staff in the schools and thanked all teachers and staff for their commitment.

The idea is that if there are any problems identified with teaching, "we will be able to work with those teachers to enable them to produce and improve such that they are giving the highest standards of tuition to our students."

There will be a parents evening on October 16, that will also allow parents to learn more about how the new tracking system works to, "help us to ensure those children meet their full potential," said

Lack of resources impact on already poor Camp roads

A LACK of resources is as much of a problem as a lack of money in terms of improving Camp roads, emphasised two MLAs at Thursday's meeting of Legislative Assembly.

MLA Phyl Rendell having spoken of the recent high rains that further deteriorated roads all over East and West Falklands added that it was imperative that Government maintained roads, the ferry and FIGAS, "which are absolutely critical to the development of Camp.... without communications and without transport services there is no business."

She noted, "in the coming months and as we approach another budget session we must look at how we improve those facilities, particularly the road network." and also, "how we look at integration to make some sensible savings."

She said much of the problem. "may not just be related to money but I think it is related to resources and we will have some serious issues to look at relating to resources in the coming year, particularly with a vibrant oil exploration phase coming up which will draw on the workforce." She said: "We will have to take positive action to back up the programmes that we want to see carried out."

MLA Edwards pointed out that, "things were bad and then the rains came," noting that this had happened just as those roads faced a busy period and heavy vehicles.

He welcomed the longer term contracts, "put out to the private sector on road works," but said he understood that there had been no bids for one area that had been recognised for many years as being, "very poor and very dangerous."

He said he looked forward to seeing a full report, "on how we are going to overcome this lack of resource and how we are going to make some real improvements to our roads and in particular our Camp tracks."



Laura studies law to manage Courts

CHANGES are afoot for the long term management of the Courts this week, as Laura Street, the Court Assistant, starts her studies to become a lawyer and begins a career path that will see her eligible and fully trained to take on the role of Head of Courts and Tribunals Service in the coming years.

Laura has been working at the Courts for 16 months, during which time she has shown her dedication and enthusiasm to learn from the numerous changes and challenges encountered. Initially recruited to assist with the administration of the Court, Laura has already taken on more than her role initially envisaged. She was encouraged to undertake her studies by the current Head of Courts and Tribunals Service, Aimee Meadows, and the previous Senior Magistrate, Carl Gumsley, after they saw the potential that I aura clearly had to lead the Courts in to the future.

The studies she has commenced will take her four years to complete and will see her qualify



as a lawyer. During this period she will also be trained internally by Ms Meadows to advise the Justices of the Peace and ensure the continuous development of the Court Service, as per the Ministry of Justice report adopted by the Government in 2013.

Laura's development has been made possible due to a grant under the Community Development Fund and through the positive attitude of FIG to succession planning. FI on BOT passports

THE Falkland Islands British Overseas Territory Citizen passport book is to be changed to include 'Falkland Islands' on the front cover, it was agreed a few weeks ago.

MLA Mike Summers explained that each Overseas Territory has the option to choose on this, however most Falkland Islanders hold a British UK/European Union passport because of British citizenship having been granted to the Falklands and Gibraltar in 1983.

"Our understanding is that there is not an option to have 'Falklands Islands' included on the front cover of these passport books and this is no different to other Overseas Territories whose citizens opt to take up a full British UK/European Union passport," said MLA Summers. Gibraltar is the only exception and this is because of their geographical location and particular relationship with the EU

Collector of Customs Robert King added that the issue of all British Overseas Territories Citizen and British Citizen passport books is now undertaken in the United Kingdom, except for Cayman Islands' BOTC passports, but this function will be repatriated to the UK when their current stocks run out.

East and West roads back in use

REPAIRS on the Johnsons road on East Falkland were completed this week and was reopened to all vehicles, subject to the weight limits.

Updating on the roads on West Falkland PWD Roads Engineer Simon Catton there had been some erosion around the Little Chartres bridge which had to be coned off to highlight the area to be aware of, however the road was open to all vehicles, again subject to weight limits.

Doctors Creek (between Fox Bay West and East) however is only passable with caution and only using light vehicles due to severe erosion of the road by flood waters, said Mr Catton, adding that PWD Highways would be undertaking repairs when it can and would advise in due course when the work had been completed."

All about... medical treatment overseas

Medical Treatment Overseas – following on from last week's article provided by the KEMH

The Overseas Medical Co-Coordinator would have been in contact with you by now to continue the on-going arrangements for your referral. The next part of the process is explained below.

Flights and Travel

Once the decision to refer overseas has been made, a referral letter will be sent to the hospital or clinic overseas to request an appointment. Once an appointment date is known, you will be booked on an appropriate flight. KEMH will book and pay for the return flight. When travelling to the UK, this will normally be the flight before the last flight that would get you to the appointment on time. Only rarely will a patient be sent to the UK/Chile without their first initial appointment.

If you are going to the UK as a routine patient, you will travel on the RAF airbridge flight which is scheduled to leave the Islands each Tuesday and Friday. If, due to your condition you are not fit to travel on your own and you require assistance during the flight, you will fly with a medical team on what is known as the aeromed flight: this is a team of trained medics that travel down to the Islands and then back to the UK on the airbridge every two weeks. If your referral is to Punta Arenas or Santiago you will travel on the Lan Chile flight, which arrives/ departs the Islands weekly on Saturday.

In the case of children and young people under the age of 18, an accompanying adult will be funded by FIG. Only in the most exceptional cases (and based on a clinical assessment of the needs of the patient) will adult escorts be funded.

When emergency situations arise and a patient is seriously ill (and cannot therefore travel on the scheduled RAF or Lan Chile flights) the patient will be evacuated by air ambulance to Santiago. In some extreme circumstances where this is not possible, patients will be flown to Montevideo on an RAF Hercules.

Please note that from time to time, flights can be subject to delays; this may be due to technical faults or adverse weather conditions and may result in last minute changes being necessary.

Ground Arrangements

KEMH will arrange and pay for ground transport for patients from Stanley to Mount Pleasant and also onto their final destination in UK/South America. This is usually via taxi or bus, but for patients who are referred further afield and out of the normal taxi or bus range, alternative travel arrangements will be made, for example by train or internal flights. Where patients prefer to use personal private transport, a mileage allowance is payable.

Your questions answered

A DOES a person require Falklands status to be able to buy a house/land in the Falklands?

Answer provided by Legal Secretary Lands Roxanne Reglado:

QANY person can buy land in the Falkland Islands but different rules apply depending on status.

Permanent Residence Permit (PRP) and Falkland Island Status holders require no additional permissions. However, those without PRP or Status must obtain a licence to hold land. Different licences are needed for a building plot or an existing house. Due to the shortage of housing a licence to build is more easily obtained for policy reasons.

Applications are made to the Lands Committee by applying to the Legal Services Department. who currently acts as Secretary to the Lands Committee Each application will be assessed on its own merits. Executive Council has delegated power to the Lands Committee to determine certain types of application, provided they fall within existing policy More complex applications, or those which fall outside of existing policy will be considered first by the Lands Committee, then referred to Executive Council, along with the recommendation of the Lands Committee. In the event that a licence to hold land is granted, that licence is personal to the applicant, specific to the address stipulated on the licence document and is nontransferable

There are a number of circumstances, policies and procedures to be taken into account when considering an application for a licence to hold land.

Guidance notes are available from the Attorney Generals Department

RAF presents Falklands mini bale to Woolmen

Interest of owners to train dog well

THERE has been a flurry of activity on Facebook recently about the subject of dogs, dog owners and how they interact with the non dog owning population.

This is definitely not a veterinary matter but I do have a view on what constitutes responsible dog ownership and I think it simply comes down to having consideration for other people in the environment. The dog owner knows his dog best - how well behaved it is, how responsive it is to commands etc and he should take this into consideration when exercising it in a public place Some dogs like everyone and others are much more wary and the personality of the dog needs to be taken into account. It is a well known fact that some dogs are comfortable with adults but less so with young children (because of their unpredictability) - so be aware of this if you see young children playing on the beach and remember that a bouncing dog can appear very threatening to a very small child.

Dogs do not have to be on a lead at all times but there is an expectation that they are kept under control and within sight of their owners. Well behaved dogs can be allowed a bit more freedom than poorly behaved dogs - so it should be in the interest of the owner to train his dog to behave well. There are many things in common between bringing up a well behaved dog and a well behaved young child but I won't go any further in that direction because I believe that has also been the subject of much Facebook discussion in recent weeks!

The battles of Coronel and the Falklands in the making

ONE hundred years ago this week - a daily diary of events leading up to the battles of Coronel and the Falklands by Islander and marine archaeologist Mensun Bound

Saturday 26th September 1914 Von Spee: The German squadron arrived at the island of Nuku Hiva in the French Marquesas. Sunday 27th September 1914

Von Spee: Von Spee despatched coded messages to Berlin in which he notified them of his plans to head for Valparaiso by way of Easter Island and Juan Fernandez. He requested that 20,000 tons of coal and provisions for 2,000 men for three months be ready for him in Southern Chile. In letters home to his beloved wife Grete, he said how much he missed the Chinese cooks and laundrymen whom he had put ashore at the beginning of his odyssey. He also spoke of his pride in his two boys Otto and Heinrich who had been given permission to leave their respective ships to dine with him on the Scharnhorst.

Allardyce: Allardyce sent the first of his innocuous uncoded telegrams to Innes in Montevideo to demonstrate that the enemy had not destroyed the wireless station: 'Easterly gale barometer falling' Monday 28th September 1914

Cradock: Good Hope, Monmouth, Glasgow and Otranto assemble at the entrance to the Magellan Straits. They fell into an 'open order single line-ahead formation' and proceeded up the Straits to Punta Arenas. Cradock was informed by Consul Milward, that Dredsen had been anchored at Orange Bay, a small harbour behind Cape Horn.

Antwerp: On this day the German howitzers began their bombardment of Antwerp.

Tuesday 29th September 1914 Cradock: At 00.55 the squadron departed Punta Arenas for Orange Bay.

The Bacchantes: The officer class within the Navy had lost faith in the Admiralty. Commodore Keyes wrote: 'I can't write or think temperately about that appalling - and I think - absolutely unnecessary sacrifice ... for the last month they have been parading up and down. You could set your watch by their movements . I begged the War Staff, Sturdee, and Leveson, to believe that they were a gift to a submarine .

Fisher called it an act of 'pure murder.' In a few days they would be saying the same of Coronel.

Churchill: A Court of Enquiry later found that the responsibility for the loss of the Bacchantes was attributable to the Admiralty War Staff.

The papers, however, did not wait for the official verdict, they could smell incompetence and immediately set about giving Churchill a good kicking. Churchill was now in trouble, he knew the Cabinet was losing confidence in him and that his cherished position as head of the Navy was in jeopardy. He later wrote:

'A storm of criticism was directed at the Admiralty, and naturally it was focused on me.

One of the most shocking, previously-unknown documents to be found by the writer was a letter written on this day by Churchill to First Sea Lord Battenberg, seeking to have Cradock sacked

First Sealord

I am not satisfied with Admiral Cradock's operations. The very large force of cruisers and other ships at his disposal should have led in these two months to some better result. Apart from the action of "Carmania" he has not succeeded in forming contact at any point with the enemy. It is necessary to some extent, though by no means wholly, to judge by results in war, and a Cruiser Admiral who produces no results will after a certain time have to be relieved in order that we may see whether some other officer will be more successful ... Will you consider this and make me proposals'

He signed it in red pencil 'WCH 29.9.14' then across the top in prominent red letters he added 'Secret'

When Churchill came to the Admiralty he consolidated his power by removing anybody who might challenge him. He brought in Battenberg who had been a brilliant sea-Admiral but in Churchill's hands was as putty. His nickname at the Admiralty was 'I concur' after the words he often wrote across the bottom of Churchill's instructions. Battenberg knew exactly what Churchill was up to, he had seen it all before. Maybe because Cradock was an old friend, maybe because he himself at that time was being victimised because of his German birth, but whatever the reason. today Battenberg did not bend to Churchill's will. Immediately he replied:

'Until I see a full report with day-by-day movements of the ships and the reasons and information on which they were based, I am unable to express an opinion as to whether Ad. Cradock's actions were satisfactory or the reverse.

'So long as the South American republics grant facilities to the German ships for obtaining fuel and supplies this game of hide and seek may continue for a considerable time

Churchill had been thwarted by the very man Fisher had called his cypher.

Wednesday 30th September 1914 Cradock: At first light the British stormed into Orange Bay for 'the battle that wasn't'. Cradock later reported:

September 30th. Search of Orange Bay fruitless owing to enemy's movements north. consider it advisable now to coal Monmouth and Glasgow before going north and have sent them to Falkland. Otranto proceeding Punta Arenas till October 3rd, then rejoining Glasgow and Monmouth Good Hope remaining in vicinity of Falkland for the present.

At 07.05 Glasgow and Mon-mouth proceeded for Port Edgar in the West Falklands; Good Hope would follow after further investigation of the area.

Admiralty: News of the raid on Tahiti reached London. Despite Tahiti being east of von Spee's last-known position, Churchill persisted in thinking that von Spee was heading west and signalled Admiral Patey who was still in Australian waters to say that von Spee ought to be expected back at Samoa or even New Zealand.

The men on the ships, however, were thinking otherwise; on this day the wireless operator on the Good Hope wrote that 'more powerful ships' were essential if they were to 'see off' the Scharnhorst and Gneisenau.

Thursday 1st October 1914

West Falkland: At first light Monmouth and Glasgow sighted Cape Meredith on the south side of West Falklands. By 09.00 they were at anchor in 10 fathoms within Port Edgar.

The Glasgow had been without fresh meat for many months and so Lloyd Hirst requested permission from Captain Luce to see if he could buy some sheep from Fox Bay.

In his diary he described how, in bitter conditions, he set off over the snow covered shoulder of land that separated the two bays.

An hour later from the top of a low hill he could see the red roofs of Fox Bay West, and across the dividing inlet, the larger settlement of Fox Bay East.

Behind, between the waves of sleet, he could just make out the masts of the Monmouth. At the Big House of FBW he found the Manager, Mr Robson, who told him that all his men, except one, Biggs, had left for Stanley to join

the Volunteers.

The best way to gather the sheep would be get some men from FBE to lend a hand.

They crossed the inlet in an open cutter where they found the Manager, Mr Packe, a local land owner recovering from a broken leg and living in difficult circumstances because his house had recently burnt down.

He was unable to help because what hands he had left had gone to collect penguin eggs to pickle for winter. So they headed back to FBW where, in sleet and snow, Robson, Biggs and Hirst set off on horseback to gather what sheep they could and drive them to Port Edgar. By evening they had 45 sheep ready for embarkation to Glasgow. Hirst made a diddle-dee fire to signal the ship which sent in two boats.

Because the ship was busy coaling the sheep were left in the boats overnight off the stern. The next morning they found that almost all had died of exposure. 'However', concluded another writer, 'we ate them all the same, and they were very good after weeks of bully beef and salt pork'.

Friday 2nd October 1914

West Falkland: While they waited for the Good Hope to arrive at Port Edgar, Monmouth sent a party ashore to shoot geese. The hunt was led by Harry 'Black' Rogers, 'a black-haired Cornishman and real character' who a month later would be dead at Coronel and whose name today features on the WWI Naval Monument at Plymouth.

They came back laden with some two hundred birds, two dozen of which Rogers brought over to Glasgow: Captain Luce was at the gangway when he came on board. Luce thanked Rogers then added 'But these are Kelp Geese and quite unfit for eating, too fishy. He also explained that they were a protected species with a fine for every bird killed.

Von Spee: The German squadron departed the Marquesas and headed for Easter Island some 2,000 miles away. During the night the wireless operator on the Scharnhorst picked up a signal that was prefixed with the Dresden's call-sign. 'My position Mas Afuera Island. Intend to proceed to Easter Island to join Cruiser Souadron'.

Antwerp: Antwerp was on the brink of capitulation. Churchill offered to go there to evaluate the situation. The disaster that followed would have an impact on Cradock.

Once again there is also the dining experience for 14 people at Government House.






Waterfront Development – Historic Dockyard Opportunity





ALTHOUGH not complaining about what has been a very mild winter, I feel that spring is just around the corner, the winds are blowing, daylight is coming in much earlier in the mornings and leaving us later in the evenings, and there is a feeling of weight lifting from the depressions caused by the gloom. It will soon be time for the body to get toned up and the face and hands to become yet more wrinkled and weather-beaten. And so be it!

Here the seed and cutting compost has been warming up and all is now ready to start planting some vegetable seeds. The propagator is all fitted with small square pots sitting on a bed of sand to keep temperatures reasonably even and sited in an area of light but not too much sun. Into these little pots will go some tomato, pepper, courgette and pumpkin seeds. It would be a good time to sow cucumber and aubergine seeds also but we don't use them so no point in wasting space is there? I'm not planting too many of each of the other seeds either, for they grow rather quickly and we don't have the conditions to keep them warm once they have germinated and been pricked out. But that is in the future.

In the meantime, in pots again but growing in the tunnels with plastic covers on them and no artificial heating whatsoever are the staples, that is, the seeds of the various cabbages, broccolies, cauliflowers and sprouts. Not forgetting the lettuce seeds which will grow quickly and keep us going with salads until it is time to plant seeds outside.

The leeks and swedes have all been brought in, blanched in the microwave, and placed in the elastic-sided freezers. The last of the Russian kale has made its way into the compost bin, but has

served us very well both raw and cooked. The 'perennial' kale is starting to come into its own after a bad, and late, beginning and I have just given all the spring greens a snack of 6X to give them some oomph after the winter

The brussel sprouts, inside, have now finished. They did very well this year and I managed to freeze some of those also. The tops which form as they grow are lovely and mild cooked in any way but, the biggest surprise was the small, dense, white heart they formed which was quite wonderful shredded in a salad. In their place in the tunnel I have planted some early potato seeds, having fed the soil with lots of manure first

There is a lot to be said for the modern equipment we have now, I well remember washing nappies and watching with pride as the snowy white towelling squares swung in the wind or became stiff as boards in the freezing cold, when the clothes pegs, and your fingers, stuck to them. Our clothes line is at the back of the house and so, at this time of year, gets very little sun until later in the day, the days of nappies being long passed

I turn to the tumble dryer quite frequently. My ex-cuse? Well, it really is not good for the is not good for the lawn to walk on it when it is so wet and/or frozen. A wonderful excuse.

Another very useful bit of kit is rechargeable

Crocuses celebrate spring the window 'hoover' Bill gave me as an anniversary present a couple of weeks ago. What a joy to own. And no, I'm not thinking of the housework, this wonderful little gadget is fantastic for cleaning greenhouse glass, it even makes the job quite enjoyable.

Not long ago I mentioned we may be down-sizing the veg garden little by little. Not any more. A visit to the shops showed that the meat prices had risen once again. They might well still be (slightly) cheaper than the UK

prices but we don't live there. Besides in the UK, not only can you can shop around for best value. there are also cheaper fresh, frozen and tinned goods not to mention the much cheaper dairy products, which help to keep the cost of living down. Frozen (imported) chicken, once considered a bit of a treat is now the cheaper option, as indeed are other frozen and imported meats. There would appear to be only two options for those living on a tight budget. Go vegetarian as we are tempted to do, or take the rather less healthy way of life and use the cheaper processed

A swift plant patrol has shown a lot of spring flowers giving their best, the baby Iris from bulbs, snowdrops, Puschkinnias, some small daffodils and at last, grown from seed and tried many times before the eranthis (winter aconite) has flowered, lovely! The paeonies are showing their juicy big red leaf buds also.

This time of year is so exciting, even if the weeds are growing faster than the plants.





New hotel and more to follow as companies chase oil market THE first sign of oil industry urgency in the application which and

THE first sign of oil industry impact on the face of Stanley is in the offing with planning approval given for an 80 room portable hotel near The Trough.

The hotel plan was approved on Wednesday along with a car park at 2 Kiel Canal Road to provide accommodation for employees of the oil industry.

An initiative of Goodwin Offshore Ltd, the development which company representative Hamish Wylie described as similar to the temporary hotels used at major events such as the Commonwealth Games or more recently the Ryder Cup. is to be sited to the east of The Trough, where there are currently a number of KTV radio masts.

The Planning Officer noted that as the development was intended to support the oil companies in the forthcoming exploration programme there was a degree of urgency in the application which had been submitted in advance of the tender documents being released.

The design is for two rows of portable self contained accommodation units providing 80 rooms which could in an emergency accommodate 160 people with a utility building housing a kitchen, dming and recreation area and raised walkways around them.

Access will be from the VPC Road spur adjacent to the Trough.

Head of Planning Steve Builer pointed out that there were a number of similar proposals currently in the system with the Falkland Islands Company Ltd having been granted outline permission for land at Dairy Paddock Road early last year.

"They're all chasing the same kind of market and there may be more applications to come," he While the permission for the Goodwin Offshore accommodation is temporary the permission for the site usage is permanent.

Mr Wylie explained that there was considerable cost and effort involved in getting the site set up for the accommodation units which in contrast however could be moved fairly easily.

Planning Officer Fiona Wallace-Nannig said the nature of the development was such as it could be treated differently from a standard hotel as the occupiers would be employees of the oil industry who would be overnighting and would not be paying individually for the facility.

"The structure is distinctly industrial in design and so is not out of keeping with those in the surrounding area," she said.

Law change cases quashed

SEVEN people who have been prosecuted under the Protection from Harassment law are expected to have their cases quashed in the Supreme Court following an amendment to the law.

The prosecutions date from 2005 to 2013 leading up to January this year when Senior Magistrate Carl Gumsley ruled in the case against Kevin McLaren that the Protection from Harassment Act 1997 (UK legislation) did not form part of Falklands law.

The Attorney General at that time found the Senior Magistrate's judgement, "surprising" it was noted in an Executive Council paper, but after considering whether the judgement might be subject to appeal or judicial review concluded that it was a matter of interpretation and it was a fairly simple matter to put the law back in the position it was widely believed to be in prior to the Magistrate's decision.

Falklands stand at Party Conferences attracts Ministers and MPs


Hopefully though resources are currently being poured into Ross Road in order to offer an attractive, and once more welcoming high street to the eager passengers disembarking vessels in the coming season.

Apart from the appearance of the sun, which unfortunately nobody can guarantee. I'm still cautiously optimistic that with finished streets, heavy plant off elsewhere, and the planned Stanley tidy up, our capital will once again regain her unconventional but undeniable mojo.

On a more upbeat note - 1 know everyone keeps banging on about how marvellous the new Museum is, but every time 1 wander into the area my heart sings a bit more. As the outside with its attractive little walkways develop and more imposing erections appear, it's not impossible to imagine a near future involving tourists tripping between various displays of traditional skills and other demonstrations, already delighted, before having even set foot in the museum itself.

With that in mind I appreciate a point raised by Ailsa Heathman in her letter on page 5: that space within the Dockyard should be kept so that the Museum complex might grow if required and in a manner in keeping with its current carefully planned and charming appearance. (Incidentally it was reassuring to hear that the plan for the area does not include piece meal growth - see plage 3)

OK it's true most towns have both structured and more unstructured areas, but it has always been an absolute that the majority of Stanley residents prefer the traditional grid system - perhaps we could just stick with it now?



Argentina objects to Top Gear's FLK number plates

TOP Gear presenter Jeremy Clarkson was described by the Mirror on Thursday as facing the wrath of Argentines, after driving through the country in a Porsche with a number plate that appears to reference the Falklands War.

However the programme's bosses denied the number plate H982 FKL was used intentionally during filming of a special edition of the show in Argentina. The plate went unnoticed on the first part of his trip on the famous Patagonian Highway from the ski resort of Bariloche to the southern port of Ushuaia.

But, it made local headlines midweek as Mr Clarkson neared the end of his 1,350 mile trek at the head of a convoy of vehicles including a Lotus and Ford Mustang driven by fellow presenters James May and Richard Hammond.

The Mirror said Argentine newspaper Clarin claimed it was highly sensitive for Argentines and Mr Clarkson could have problems. The presenter was also criticised on Twitter with one user telling him: "Your irony is not funny in Argentina."

But Andy Wilman, Top Gear's executive producer, said: "Top Gear production purchased three cars for a forthcoming programme; to suggest that this car was either chosen for its number plate, or that alternative number plates were substituted for the original is completely untrue."

Extending on overseas term? We'll decide say Members

EXECUTIVE Council turned down a recommendation that the power to offer another overseas contract to those who have been employed by FIG for five years be delegated to the Chief Executive.

The recommendation was made in the hope of reducing internal government bureaucracy and in turn the administrative burden placed on MLAs by removing the requirement to seek formal Executive Council approval, "for each and every case where departments seek to extend an officer's appointment on overseas terms from five years up to the maximum of seven years, (where such a request fulfils an operational necessity and offers significant budget savings)" according to a paper presented by the Director of Human Resources

MLA Barry Elsby stated: "Members were very clear that we want people with the skills the Islands need to settle here and encourage everyone to think of applying for PRP after their third year," however they also felt that extending a contract on overseas terms beyond five years, "would only be considered in exceptional circumstances and ExCo wished to make that decision."

How to respond to Argentine planes

A PAPER outlining the process the Director of Civil Aviation has to follow if a plane from Argentina applies to fly to the Islands,was examined in Executive Council last week.

MLA Elsby said: "As people will be aware. Argentina banned Charter flights to the Falklands in 2003 and this paper clarifies how we will respond to any requests from planes coming from Argentina."

No 'piece meal' growth for Dockyard

FALKLANDS Conservation's application for outline permission to build a two storey building for use as offices to the north of the Dockyard Museum, however was refused on the grounds of prematurity.

The committee agreed in principle with the point made in a letter of objection from the Museum and National Trust that the site should be developed as a whole, not with "piece meal development."

Deferred at the previous meeting of the Planning and Building Committee SAERI (South Atlantic Environmental Research Institute) had its application to erect a temporary office structure within the conservatory at Stanley Cottage approved with temporary conditions.

The siting of two more mobile homes was deferred for David Clarke and Joan Clarke at numbers 8 and one Diddle Dee Dive respectively, pending more detail of the type of home, while Veronica Sinclair's proposal to site a mobile home at 9 Villiers Street was approved. Alex and Carol Reid were refused permission to change the conditions of occupancy of the Portakabin unit from family only on the grounds of privacy issues.

Rachel Crowie's application to build a house within the grounds of 10 James Street was refused due to lack of parking and the density of the development being higher than acceptable, while Wayne and Sarah Clement had their application to extend their home approved and Gary Clement's application to put up a garden tunnel at 9 Snake Hill was also approved.

Mark and Sandra Harrison's request to build a two car garage at 13 Ross Road East and and Colin Summers' application to build a one and a half storey house at 58 Rex Hunt Road were also given the go ahead.

Rincon Road now open

THE Highways Dept has completed repairs to the Rincon Road and is now open.

Roads Engineer Simon Catton said they were now hoping to undertake repairs on West Falkland at Little Chartres Bridge today (Friday) and Doctors Creek on Monday.

In order to undertake the works at Doctors Creek the road will be need to be closed. Access for light vehicles can still be made at the old pass during this time.

Highways will provide updates as work progresses, said Mr Catton.

Serviced site not another vehicle dumping ground

OUTLINE planning permission was agreed for the Government to progressively develop a serviced site for mixed uses on white land to the south of the FIDF complex on Kiel Canal Road. There is already an officially designated lorry park and some plots are leased for storage within this area.

Planning Officer Fiona Wallace-Nannig noted that land available around Stanley and officially designated for the proposed uses was at a premium with demand increasing.

The proposed layout includes the use of the existing track plus two new access roads and the land divided into 45 plots. Director of Public Works Manfred Keenleyside noted that the layout of the plots was notional and allocation would be dependent on users needs. MLA Gavin Short asked what the plans were for policing if the area was to become full of, "dead vehicles," however Mr Keenleyside pointed out that it was already full of dead vehicles as were several other areas in Stanley. "If this area is to be addressed then so should the others," he said. MLA Michael Poole chairing

MLA Michael Poole chairing the meeting said a letter would be sent to vehicle owners in the Kiel Canal area asking that they give some consideration as to what was junk and could be disposed off in the Mary Hill Quarry. This he said was not ideal, but was at least a designated area for the disposal of derelict vehicles.

MLA Poole was supportive of the project noting that there was a demand for such a development and it was, "good to see it progress."

Permission to speak

EXECUTIVE Council has agreed amendments to the Planning Ordinance for members of the public to speak at Planning and Building Committee meetings as well as at Executive Council if an appeal is lodged against a refusal.

Other changes to the ordinance allow powers to be delegated to officers within the department which will streamline the system and prevent unnecessary delay with routine applications.

Head of Environmental Planning Steve Butler said that at the moment valuable time is taken up at meetings with routine planning applications which comply with the policies and nobody has objected to.

"This leaves less time to discuss more controversial applications and bigger pieces of work, such as the on-going development plan review or work on Environmental Impact Assessment Regulations." He said the proposed changes mean the Environmental Planning Department would have the power to grant planning permission, subject to a number of conditions (such as there being no objections and it not affecting a listed building). Where officers wish to refuse permission, or where the conditions are not met, annitications would still need to go to conunitiee.

applications would still need to go to committee. Members of committee would also have the power to insist on any specific application being brought before committee, and the requirements for publicity (including neighbour notification) remain. Therefore an application for a standard house type on a plot on Sapper Hill might be approved under delegated powers, but a domestic extension where neighbours object would still go to committee. "This will hopefully mean that for people applying for permission, routine applications are not unnecessarily delayed, and that committee can focus on more complex applications and key strategic areas of work," said Mr Butler.

RT offenders rounded up in court this week

MOUNT Pleasant man David William Hallsworth was fined £600 and banned from driving for 18 months on Monday after he admitted drink driving.

Mr Hallsworth was stopped by police in the FIC car park at 3.27pm on September 25, acting on a tip off from a member of the public.

He told police he did not think he would pass a breathalyser test as he had consumed three to four beers and was, "topping up from the night before."

A Camic reading of 66.5mg per 100ml of breath (35mg is the legal limit) was recorded at the Police Station.

The hearing was brought forward on compassionate grounds as Mr Hallsworth had received news of his brother's death on September 24 and needed to leave the Islands to attend the funeral.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds noted that there were exceptional circumstances surrounding the incident but warned of the danger of topping up from the night before. Mr Hallsworth also had his licence endorsed and was ordered to pay £85 prosecution costs.

In the Summary Court on Thursday John David Toby McKay (29) was fined £375 for not having a valid vehicle licence and intent to deceive after he admitted displaying an incorrect label in his vehicle. Mr McKay offered no explanation after he admitted he had changed the labels between his two vehicles.

Christopher John Poole (31) was fined a total of £550 for not having valid insurance and failing to produce a driving licence. Mr Poole was stopped for speeding and given a verbal warning but was unable to produce appropriate documentation within the three days stipulated by the police.

Four speeding offences which occurred in 25mph zones were also dealt with by Justices of the Peace Andy Brownlee, Judy Summers and Bernadette Pring.

Rodolfo Tellez (34) was fined £300 for driving a taxi carrying one passenger at 36 mph on Ross Road West while Alexander Colin McDonald (27) was fined £150 for travelling at the same speed also on Ross Road West.

Dr Naranda Pranlal Dave (62) was fined £240 for travelling at a speed of 37 mph on the same road and Nina Elizabeth Humphreys (19) was fined £230 for driving at 38mph while carrying two passengers in the vicinity of the Beaver Hangar on Ross Road West.

All the defendants had their licences endorsed and were ordered to pay £85 prosecution costs.

Legislative Assembly Member Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into his working week

LAST week Manchester, this week we are in Birmingham for the Conservative Conference, and the atmosphere is perceptibly different from Labour's last week which was a little flat in a post Scottish referendum hangover. They have in common an element of building election fever and airing policies that they hope will be winners. New candidates are working overtime to make a name for themselves and old hands with slender majorities are working hard to hold on to them. There is also a risk that one or two more MPs may 'jump ship' in a desperate attempt to improve their chances of re-election; as I wrote that we heard news of the departure of the aptly named Mr Reckless to UKIP

Some of our old friends will be standing down. I feel some sadness, especially for the old party stalwarts who must despair at what is happening in a world of spin and gloss, tokenism and knee-jerk responses to instant news. As a keen observer of political developments in the UK I can see events more and more driven by those who report on them. Newspapers have laid off many of their serious commentators and reporters as in a fast rolling digital age there seems little time for serious thoughtful analysis, though mercifully some survives.

Days one and two of the conference were extremely busy in contrast to the first day of the Labour Conference last Sunday and we have had visits from the Foreign and Defence secretaries and many more MPs. Unfortunately the two students we expected last week and one today have failed to appear: both disappointing for us because we could have arranged alternates. and a missed opportunity for them. We've had many interesting visitors with a genuine interest in learning more about the Islands as well as a few daft questions. Some mistake us for an information stand because we are in such a prominent position, others want to charge a phone. borrow an envelope or acquire a bag to carry all the literature and freebies they've picked up. One or tao at each venue visit multiple umes, each time picking up pens and pins and papers until I fear that one day an addicted hoarder will be discovered trapped in a house overfoxing with conference literature and pens.

Medical Treatment Overse following on from last week's article provided by the KEMH

BY now you will be aware of where you are going for your overseas treatment and flights and transfers will be in the process of being finalised.

Support & Accommodation UK/South America

If your referral is to the UK, Colin Da Silva at the Falkland Islands Government Office (FIGO) in London is your medical coordinator. Colin is your contact throughout your stay and is there to support you and make your stay as pleasant as is possible in the circumstances and to offer any help or assistance that you may require. It is very important that you keep in contact with Colin as he updates KEMH regularly on your progress.

Colin arranges all FIG funded accommodation for patients in the UK. Initially, KEMH sends an information sheet to Colin with all the patient details and from that information arrange suitable accommodation

There are many different types of accommodation offered in the UK: these range across 'bed & breakfasts', travel lodges, Premier Inns, hotels and in some situations flats, depending where you are going and what accommodation is appropriate.



FIG's first choice of accommodation is bed and breakfast, if available at the time of booking. If this is not available then the next best value for money accommodation will be identified. FIG pays only bed and breakfast; all other meals and expenses have to be met by the patient. Where patients have to stay in the UK for several months, more appropriate accommodation will be arranged wherever possible, for example a flat

Patients travelling overseas sometimes choose to take a relative/family member with them; in this situation KEMH will request Colin to book a larger (or maybe an extra) room, with any difference in cost being met by the patient relative(s). However, in the case of children and young people under the age of 18, an accompanying adult will be funded by FIG. Only in the most exceptional cases - and based on a clinical assessment of the needs of the pawill accommodation costs tient for adult escorts be funded

If for any reason you are do not wish to stay in the accommo-



dation that has been booked for you and wish to make your own alternative arrangements, KEMH will fund only up to the cost of the original accommodation; any difference must be paid by you. If you have family or friends living in the UK and you would prefer to stay with them, a rate of £20.00 per night per adult and £10 per child is payable.

If your referral is to South America, in Punta Arenas your contact is John Rees from the Clinic Magallanes. He will liaise with you regarding all your appointments and is there to offer help if required. If your referral is to Santiago your contact is Lizzie Olivares from Clinic Alemana, or a member of her international patient service team. They too will liaise with you regarding all appointments and any other help required

Accommodation in South America is usually arranged by International Tours & Travel or KEMH. Hotel accommodation in both Punta Arenas and Santiago will be booked on a bed and breakfast basis and all other meals and expenses are to be paid by you. Similar arrangements in all other aspects as referred to above for the UK will apply in South America.

AG to administrate estates if no will made

THE Attorney General will be appointed as official administrator of a person's estate following their death if they have not made any will or named anyone to administer their estate.

This was agreed at Executive Council last week and MLA Barry Eslby said it highlighted the need, "for us all to make wills and appoint Executors of those wills and keep them up to date." The fee for Government to administer an estate is 7.5 percent of the value of the estate said MLA Elsby

He also advised that will forms are available on line and relatively easy to complete or a local solicitor can do it for you.

Over time it is anticipated that the best permanent place for the appointment is with the Reg istrar General and it is proposed that as part of the development process the Attorney General will support the Registrar General to obtain the necessary skills and experience to deliver the role as part of a structured development plan

Airport was properly certificated

I MUST say I was rather astonished to hear at the recent meeting of the Legislative Assembly that Stanley Airport had never been properly certificated.

In fact prior to the airport being opened for operations in November 1977 it was certificated for international flights as recommended by an Operations Official from the United Kingdom's Civil Aviation Authority.

The airport's communication system together with the navigational beacons and let down procedures were also certificated by another UK CAA official prior to the airport's opening. Accordingly the first international flight, a Fokker Friendship aircraft operated by Argentina's military airline LADE, landed at Stanley on December 1, 1977.

This airline continued to conduct flights from Comodoro Rivadavia to Stanley until the Argentine invasion in 1982. Stanley Airport then remained under the military control of the Argentine air force until June 1982 and then the Royal Air Force until May 1986. At that time it was handed back to FIG. Shortly afterwards the airport was again inspected by the UK CAA and certificated following their approval.

The Punta Arenas based airline DAP then operated an international service to Stanley Airport mainly using a Twin Otter aireraft during the early 1990s. This was finally superseded by the

Borders and Southern plan for 2015 drilling

ONCE partnering and funding has been secured Borders and Southern Petroleum ple will go ahead with an intention to participate in the 2015 Falkland Islands Drilling programme.

Borders and Southern Petroleum Plc made the announcement on Monday, along with their financial statements for the six months up to June 30, 2014.

During the first half of the year Borders received the final processed data from the 2013 3D seismic acquisition programme along with the reprocessed data of the 2008 3D seismic survey. Based on this data the company reported in June that the estimated most likely recoverable resource for Darwin was 263 million barrels of condensate from wet gas.

Chief Executive Howard Boee said the next phase of the evaluation was to complete a detailed seismic reservoir characterisation study, using the well data to calibrate the seismic response.

"It is hoped that the study may allow us to differentiate between oil, gas and water charged reservoir and therefore rank the anomalies and prospects that have been identified," he said.

This work, currently in the planning stage, will continue through the fourth quarter of 2014.

In the six month period to June 30, 2014, the Company reports a loss of \$0.9 million (June 30, 2013: \$3.3 million loss). Administrative expenses for the six month period were \$1.7 million (June 30, 2013: \$1.4 million).

The cash balance remains strong at \$21.5 million.


Over the past 20 years a massive £175,000 has been raised with more than 200 people assisted during what is a stressful time of their lives.



Planning Officer Fiona Wallace-Nannig looks at how the designation process works and how your input can help

WE all know the historical value of areas such as Pioneer Row and the Dockyard, and the history of objects such as Whalebone Arch, and the importance in our cultural identity of the wrecks found around Stanley Harbour.

Much has been written about all of these and most have been afforded protected statuses, but what about other features such as the grid-iron street pattern or the traditional components of a person's garden? Or areas that are involved in significant events in our history such as Lookout Rocks or Sapper Hill?

Even locations or buildings that have an interesting past

or a significant role in the development of Stanley and the community may be worthy of consideration for inclusion in a proposed renewed Stanley Conservation Area.

Development and change is necessary to provide homes, jobs and facilities. However, it is important that such development is respectful of Stanley's historic character. Although the current Town Plan contains a Conservation Area, it is proposed through the ongoing review to refine and in places strengthen this.

To this end, I am currently doing a Conservation Area Appraisal of Stanley and the surrounding area and am now seeking the public's input.

The historic environment provides a tangible link with our

past and contributes to our sense of national, local and community identity. Designating a Conservation Area is an effective way to protect the historic fabric of a place, by providing clear guidance on how development can contribute to its character.

This may include identifying existing elements which detract from the heritage value, where change and development would be particularly welcomed. It is therefore not the purpose of a Conservation Area to give everything within it protected status as a listed building/ structure. As it is, the listing of a building as being of historic or architectural importance can only be done with the owner's consent (and brings with it potential eligibility for grant funding).

To undertake a thorough

appraisal we need your help.

Let us know what you believe is important within Stanley; be it a building, a road, a vista, a view, a layout or an object. 



FITB measures occupancy rates in the serviced, self-catering and remote house accommodation sectors. and these are reported quarterly in Falklands Forecast. The average room occupancy rate for serviced accommodation in 2013 was 40.3 per cent, with self-catering accommodation achieving a lower unit (house or cottage) occupancy rate of 17.9 per cent.

During the first six months of 2014 serviced accommodation occupancy rates have been up in four months (January, February, May and June) compared to 2013. Selfcatering occupancy rates in 2014 have outperformed 2013 in all six months





The battles of Coronel and the Falklands in the making

ONE hundred years ago this week - a daily diary of events leading up to the battles of Coronel and the Falklands by Islander and marine archaeologist Mensun Bound

Saturday 3rd October 1914 West Falkland: At 09.00 Glasgow and Monmouth departed Port Edgar leaving Good Hope to coal. 'In a stinking gale', with Monmouth four cables astern, they headed for Punta Arenas. They learned of von Spee's raid on Tahiti and worked out for themselves that he was coming their way.

Antwerp: On this day Churchill was 'off gallivanting' again, this time across the Channel to the beleaguered city of Antwerp. A contemporary naval historian wrote:

'For four whole days ...the 'August robe' of the Admiralty was flung aside, leaving the First Sea Lord, the Secretary and Chief of Staff to look at an empty chair and at each other. While the First Lord was listening to the thunder of the guns at Antwerp, the situation which led to Coronel was shaping itself ...It was necessary to reinforce Cradock, but evidently, so far as the First Lord was concerned, France was very near and Cradock and the Pacific were very far away'

If the Admiralty had been functioning properly, the First Sea Lord, Prince Louis of Battenberg, would have handled everything and Churchill would not have been missed. But he also was now part of the problem.

Battenberg: For some time the First Sea Lord. Prince Louis of Battenberg, had been under attack by the media and certain prominent members of the establishment because of his German birth. For a time he was able to treat it with the distain it deserved but, gradually, the unrelenting malevolence of this well-organized campaign ground him down; his mental and physical health deteriorated and he slipped into what today would be called a clinical depression.

Vice-Admiral Sir Stanley Colville recognized that the innuendo was 'rot', but 'from all one has heard and knows it is pretty well self-evident he had become a nonentity and a simple tool in WC's hand'. To Fisher, Battenberg had become one of the country's 'damnable war difficulties', and in a letter on this day he wrote: 'Our directing Sea Lord is played out'. Members of the Board going into Battenberg's office in the moming were shocked to find him leisurely reading The Times.

Kent: The only ship that fought at the Falklands and which has so far not been mentioned, is *Kent*, which today is remembered in Stanley by a street name. At the outbreak of war she was in dock-

yard hands at Portsmouth with her funnels, engines, boilers and both turrets on the quayside undergoing repair. On this day in Portsmouth she was recommissioned for service. At 07.30 her new captain, John Allen, was piped aboard. He was not greatly impressed. He had been hoping for something better than an old cruiser just out of mothballs. Could he have foreseen the events of 8th December he might have felt very different. Of the four fights-to-the-finish that made up the Battle of the Falklands, his was to be the most heroic.

Dresden: Dresden departed Mas Afuera in the Juan Fernandez Islands for Easter Island. To conserve coal she was taken in tow by her supply ship Baden.

Sunday 4th October 1914

Von Spee: During the night Scharnhorst heard the *Dresden* trying to reach her sister ship, *Leipzig*. The signal was coming from 3000 miles away, something hitherto thought impossible. Despite the risk of revealing his position von Spee decided to interpose. It was a pivotal moment because, after this, the British knew that he was heading for the West Coast of South America and he knew that the British were off Chile and that he must now prepare for Battle.

Dresden reported herself to be 1000 miles east of Easter Island and that Leipzig was on its way south. Von Spee informed Dresden that he was heading for the WCSA. Rendezvous was set for Easter Island. Dresden also informed von Spee that the Good Hope, Monmouth, Glasgow, an AMC and a Queen-class battleship had passed Punta Arenas on 28th September and were now in the Pacific.

This exchange, that was in the Merchant Shipping Code which the Germans did not know had been broken, was intercepted by the W/T stations at Suva (Fiji) and Wellington (NZ) who passed it to Melbourne for decryption. Only a small part of one transmission had been caught but its importance was obvious and it was sent immediately to London.

Antwerp: On Churchill's instructions, a brigade of 2,000 Royal Marines left England for Antwerp. But Churchill wanted more and telegraphed Kitchener:

"...pray give the following order to the Admiralty: Send at once both naval brigades, minus recruits, via Dunkerque, into Antwerp, with five days' rations and 2,000.000 rounds of ammunition'. Senior officers within the Navy looked on in disbelief. When Richmond got home he decanted all the frustration he felt into his diary:

The siege of Antwerp looks ugly. The first Lord is sending his army there; I don't mind his tuppenny untrained rabble going but, 1 do strongly object to 2,000 invaluable marines being sent to be locked up in the fortress and become prisoners of war if the place is taken. They are our last reserve. No board of Admiralty with two-pennyworth of knowledge and backbone would have allowed marines to be used in such a way. We shall be crying out for men presently, and our invaluable marines, and several seaman gunners, will be interned in Holland or locked up in German fortresses. It is a tragedy that the Navy should be in such lunatic hands at this time'

Beatty, in charge of the First Battle Cruiser Squadron in the North Sea, was also despairing of the First Lord. In a letter to his wife he groaned:

if he would either leave matters entirely alone at the Admiralty which would be the best thing to do, or give it his entire attention and complete attention, we might get forward, but this flying about and putting his fingers into pies which do not concern him is bound to end in disaster ... If we only had Kitchener at the Admiralty we could have done so much more and the present state of chaos in naval affairs would never have existed. It is inconceivable the mistakes and blunders we have made and are making

Monday 5th October 1914.

Admiralty: Sturdee received the decipher from Melbourne:

'Suva intercepted message in secret German Mercantile transposed code at 8.15 pm, 4th October, which translates:

Begins: "Scharnhorst on the way between Marquesas Island and Easter Island. Present position..." Ends. Groups after 'position' were not read by Suva. Call sign not decipherable but Wellington reports message heard at same time, call sign of Scharnhorst to Dresden but message not yet reported to Navy Office. V.A.C. and C. in C. China informed. Ends'.

It was just a dozen words but it changed everything. Now they could no longer cleave to Churchill's view that von Spee was heading west. Clearly he was now moving into Cradock's theatre and Cradock had to be warned immediately. We know that it was Sturdee who handled it because the pencil draught of the message that follows is in Sturdee's hand. He addressed it to the Intelligence Officer, Montevideo, for onward transmission to Stanley and Cradock. He began with the message from Melbourne but then added:

From this intercepted signal it appears that *Scharnhorst* and *Gneisenau* are working across to S. America. You must be prepared to have to meet them in company possibly with *Dresden* accompanying them.

Canopus should accompany *Glasgow, Monmouth and Otranto,* the ships to search and protect trade in combination. Arrange about coal and consider whether a collier should accompany squadron. If you propose *Good Hope* to go, leave *Monmouth* on east coast and arrange for a Senior Officer for East Coast. Inform R.A. *Good Hope* at Falkland Islands and *Canopus.* Report when message has been passed to *Good Hope'*.

Cradock: As we shall see Cradock did not receive the foregoing until the 7th. In the meantime Otranto had intercepted a coded wireless message which it sent on to the Admiralty for deciphering. It seemed to say that enemy ships were just behind the Horn, presumably where Dresden had been before. The Admiralty signalled Cradock who ordered another descent on Orange Bay. Good Hope raced out of Port Edgar and headed for the Horn while Glasgow, Monmouth and Otranto approached from the Chilean side.

Antwerp: The Naval Division now moving on Antwerp numbered 10,000. There can be no doubt that the First Lord was enjoying it. It was his cavalry charge with the 21st Lancers at Omdurman all over again, but this time he was in command of an army. At last he was truly driving the history he would write. With the siege howitzers booming, he would stand without cover looking towards the enemy lines, so that he could be 'photographed and cinematographed' looking suitably pugnacious. One who was there described how he: 'put forward his ideas forcefully, waving his stick and thumping the ground with it. After obviously pungent remarks, he would walk away a few steps and stare towards the enemy's direction'.

Rise in drug psychosis cases from strong Falklands grown cannabis

PEOPLE are increasingly growing their own cannabis in the Falklands and the strong strain is causing drug induced psychosis in some.

Speaking to Penguin News this week Chief Medical Officer Becey Edwards said: "Here in the Islands we've always prided ourselves on our 'drug-free' status, however recently at the KEMH we have been seeing more young people and adults who are using cannabis frequently. Most of the cannabis appears to be home-grown and therefore of a stronger variety than UK street sold varieties."

She said: "We are also seeing the first problems of drug psychosis creeping in here and there "

Cannabis use around the world is of course common; two million people in the UK smoke cannabis and half of all 16 to 29 year olds in the UK have tried it. But research suggests that it can cause mental health problems in some vulnerable people and this is what concerns Dr Edwards.

Of course apart from that, production of cannabis is also an offence under section 4(a) of the Misuse of Drugs Ordinance. Attorney Generals Chambers Paralegal Ulia Sytchov confirmed the maximum penalty on conviction is seven years imprisonment and a fine of up to level 10 on the standard scale (up to £125,000).

But how does cannabis work?

Dr Edwards explained that when smoked cannabis from the lungs goes into the blood and is carried to every part of the body. Several chemicals in cannabis bind to receptors in areas of the brain that deal with pleasure, memory, thought, concentration and the awareness of time. There are two main kinds of chemical involved: •A group called the Cannabinoids, which seem to give you the more pleasant effects - feeling relaxed, happy, sleepy, with colours appearing more vivid and music sounding better.

•THC, which seems to produce hallucinations, anxiety and paranoia.

These feelings don't usually last long. Although as the drug can stay in your system for some weeks, subtle effects can last a few days. Long-term use can make you depressed and make you less motivated

What is the risk to mental health?

Depression, anxiety and panic attacks could occur.

1,600 Austrahan children aged 14 to 15 were studied for seven years. The ones who used cannabis every day were five times more likely to become depressed and anxious by the end of the study.

Insomnia is another feature of cannabis use and people may become dependent on cannabis to help them sleep.

Drug induced psychosis/ schizophrenia:

• If you start smoking cannabis before 15, you are four times more likely to develop a psychotic illness.

• The more cannabis you use, the more likely you are to develop psychosis.

It isn't clear why cannabis use in adolescence seems to have such an effect, but it may be because the brain is still developing.

Is there such a thing as cannabis psychosis?

Some people seem to get a short period of psychosis that is brought on by cannabis but which stops soon after the cannabis is stopped. Cannabis psychosis is an extremely distressing and unpleasant thing to suffer.

Paranoia an aspect of psychosis,

characterised by suspicious and frightening thoughts can be a long term effect of cannabis use.

But if it's so dangerous, why don't more of my friends get unwell you might be asking?

Probably because most people don't use cannabis before they are 15 and they don't go on smoking large amounts on a daily or frequent basis said Dr Edwards. Psychotic illness is uncommon anyway. Only about one in 200 people have a diagnosis of a psychotic illness at any given time, however, as most of us probably don't know that many people, even if cannabis does increase the risk, you aren't likely to notice an 'epidemic' among the people that you know.

Furthermore, mental ill-health is often under reported by those experiencing it.

What about other effects?

• The connection isn't clear, but regular cannabis use does affect how you do at school or college.

• Cannabis users are more likely to leave work without permission, spend work time on personal matters or daydream.

Regular users report that it has interfered with their work and social life.

ONE of the famous Jubilee Villas on Ross Road is to be listed as a Building of Special Architectural or Historic Interest.

In August Falklands Conservation asked the Environmental Planning Committee for a listing report to be prepared on 41 Ross Road Jubilee Villas and this was presented to the Historic Buildings Committee on Wednesday. The Committee were delighted that the owners had made the request and readily agreed it in principle (ExCo make the final decision).

The house (far left) is one of four terraced houses built on land owned by Mrs Orisa Catherine Dean in 1887 and named Jubilee Villas in honour of the Golden Jubilee of Queen Victoria. The artisans and building materials for the Villas' construction came from England on the Dean's sailing vessel Dennis Brundit.

The listing does not include outbuildings or the interior. The latter has been modernised extensively. The exterior however has a plethora of features of historic interest including exposed brick construction with decorative banding and corbelling, decorative brick chimneys and a corrugated iron roof.



France showed that cannabis users are more than twice as likely to be the cause of a fatal crash than to be one of the victims.

• Health: One joint = 20 cigarettes. This increases your risk of lung disease.

Is cannabis addictive?

It has some of the features of addictive drugs -- a regular user has to take more and more cannabis to get the same effect (tolerance) and can get withdrawal symptoms.

Psychological Addiction

Three out of four long-term users get cravings, half become irritable and 7 out of 10 switch to tobacco to try to stay off cannabis. Many find that they spend much of their life seeking, buying and using it. It is probably about as hard to stop as tobacco.

How can I cut down my use of cannabis?

Guidance on cutting down and stopping suggests that you write down your reasons for wanting to change, plan how you will change, plan how to cope with withdrawal symptoms and have a back-up plan.

You can also work through the leaflet on the FRANK website (http://www.talktofrank.com).

You could join a support group like Marijuana Anonymous UK. (http://www.marijuanaanonymous.co.uk).

For professional help you can contact your GP, the Practice Nurse or the Community Mental Health Services at the KEMH who can to talk through your concerns with you.

The GP. Practice Nurse or Community Psychiatric Nurse (CPN) can help you to stop taking cannabis, to cut down the amount you use and to reduce its impact on your life.

Firm Falklands supporter and stamp authority dies aged 86

WITH sadness we report the death on October 5, of Ronnie Spafford, a world authority on the philatelic history of the Falklands and a frequent visitor and friend to the Falklands.

Ronnie was also a founder member and Vice-President of the Falkland Islands Study Group, author of the definitive work on the Falklands Centenary Stamp issue, early member and later office holder of the Falkland Islands Emergency Committee, Ex-Chairman and Vice-President of the Falkland Islands Association, author of the Falkland Islands Newsletter 1982-1992 and Trustee and Ex-Chairman of Falklands Conservation.

For the last twenty years (wrote John Fowler in an article for Penguin News in 2005) one of the sure signs of summer in the Falklands is the sighting in the streets of Stanley of Major Ronnie Spafford, leading yet another small group of eager visitors, usually of mature years, but often wearing, with varying degrees of self-consciousness, sweatshirts of psychedelic hue, emblazoned with the words 'Falklands Experience'. "Ronnie makes us wear them, you know," one lady confided.

know," one lady confided. He added: "Anyone spotting Ronnie for the first time, ambling along Ross Road, sock less, his feet in the open-toed sandals which he wears even in the most atrocious weather, evidence of a hearty breakfast on his tropical shirt and his remaining grey hair streaming in the wind, might suspect that he is some kind of aged hippy, rather than a former longterm career soldier in the Royal Artillery."

But what was even less immediately evident from his appearance and benign, somewhat

bumbling manner, is that over the years. Ronnie Spafford did more to promote the Falkland Islands than almost anyone else, wrote John, and, "single handedly has almost certainly brought more tourists to stay in the Falklands than any other individual or company."

In the 1960s, observing a fellow officer while away the long hours of evening duty arranging his stamp collection, the idea came to Ronnie that if he resumed this hobby, which he had abandoned as a school boy, it might provide a substitute for more active pastimes, like rugby, for which he was getting too old, and offer an interesting and profitable way of investing the savings he was making from his army pay.

Looking for a single country which produced stamps which gained in value and were few enough to be able to aim at 'catalogue completion' he hit upon the Falklands.

This grew into an insatiable interest in the people of the Falklands, probably kindled and certainly fuelled for many years by the late Mrs Dickson, formerly of Teal Inlet and mother of Ron and Gerald.

Mrs Dickson began to write to Ronnie after the Rev Peter Millam, then minister in charge of Christ Church Cathedral had suggested that Falkland Islands residents should correspond with people in Britain as a means of making the Falklands cause understood. At first, her letters came once a month, with every sailing of the RMS *Darwin* and then, with the introduction of an external air service, with every plane and although in Ronnie's words it, "became a bit much," keeping up with this torrent of correspondence, he was by this time firmly "hooked" on the Falklands.

It was this interest in, and knowledge of, the people of the Falklands that started Ronnie off on 'Falklands Experience', the title under which he marketed his own very personal brand of tours of the Falkland Islands and under which banner he brought at least one and often two groups of visitors to the Islands, every summer from 1989, on a philately trip that might also include battlefield tours, wildlife watching, fishing or diving on wrecks.

As a measure of the understanding his groups gained of the Islands a significant number of his clients left the Islands enrolled in either Falklands Conservation or the Falklands Islands Association.

When Ronnie eventually gave up his tourist trips he said he would remain 100 per cent committed to the Falklands and was looking forward to beginning to exhibit his stamps again and to aiding ex-Governor David Tatham in completing the ultimately marvellously successful Dictionary of Falkland Islands Biography project.

RFIP officer denies perverting public justice

MOUNT Pleasant woman Jill Christine Roberts (47) denied a charge of perverting the course of justice in the Senior Magistrates Court on Thursday.

The reserve officer with the Royal Falkland Islands Police Force is alleged to have encouraged a sergeant at the Mount Pleasant police station on August 15, to end an investigation into a speeding offence committed by Darren Abram.

Ms Roberts pleaded not guilty to the offence and a trial date of November 12, was scheduled.

Crown Prosecutor Simon Rowe said the case had largely been served to defence lawyer Alison Inglis, apart from some telephone conversations which were yet to be copied.

He said the trial was expected to last just over a day with several witnesses to be called.

A Police spokesperson declined to make any comment regarding the case when asked if Ms Roberts was still serving as a reserve constable.

£85 for driving without licence

STANLEY man Patricio Andres Balladares Vergara (31) was fined on Wednesday after he admitted driving without a valid driver's licence on September 2.

Crown Prosecutor Simon Rowe said a police officer out conducting a driving test had spotted Mr Vergara sitting alone in a vehicle parked on St Marys Walk and recognised him as a person who had failed two driving tests.

On checking whether Mr Vergara had since passed a test it was confirmed he was the holder of a provisional licence.

Mr Vergara said he had driven to pick up his wife and child adding that he had made a mistake to do so. He said he had taken further lessons as advised by the police and filled in the relevant forms to take another test but had not received a reply.

Justice of the Peace Dick Sawle noted that Mr Vergara had been well aware that he did not have a valid driving licence and fined him £85 for the offence plus £85 prosecution costs. He urged Mr Vergaras to proceed with lessons and obtain a licence at the earliest opportunity.

Size of old peoples home to be decided

DESPITE unofficial reports that the planned old peoples home will only have 10 beds. MLA Mike Summers stated on Wednesday when contacted by Penguin News, that in fact there was not yet, "a firm specification or size for the old peoples home."

He said there had been a number of internal discussions in KEMH regarding what was required. He explained that on the return to the Islands of Director of Health and Social Services Derek Muhl: "We will convene a small working group to review the demographics, confirm the likely range of demands, determine whether it will be a residential care home (all patients requiring nurse care) or a retirement home, admission criteria and payments for residents, whether it should be wholly publicly owned and funded or whether there is scope for private sector investment, to determine staffing ratios and requirements, and from this set out a likely range of publicly funded operating costs."

This will then be put to Executive Council to see what level of operating cost funding will be required, and what FIG considers to be affordable. This should assist in then determining the initial physical characteristics of the building, and suitable sites; and in turn will require public discussion and consultation throughout the process, said MLA Summers. He said it was important, "that

He said it was important, "that we go through this planning process in a logical manner to determine operating costs, before moving to physical design and layout, including facilities, to determine capital cost." The design will be extendable according to future demand, "and it will be the task of the architects and designers and planners to set out the options for this, building on the initial base at which we start."

He said they would also wish to consider whether the facilities that are created have any additional role to play in supported living for other sectors of society in accordance with the vulnerable persons strategy, and how it interacts with existing care in the community services including sheltered accommodation.

The working group will also need to consider how to manage this process going forward, what project management capability is available to us and what additional resource we might have to buy in said MLA Summers. Page 3

All about medical treatment overseas

FOLLOWING on from last week's article provided by the KEMH By now you should have ar-

By now you should have arrived at your destination and settled into your accommodation, also you may well have had your first appointment at the hospital. This week we will cover:

On going appointments UK/Chile

Important information UK only – On arriving in the UK we ask that all patients register with a local GP within their area. This is very important for repeat prescriptions/medication and also in the event that you become unwell during your stay and require medical attention.


If after your first initial appointment you are advised that you require additional appointments for maybe a follow up, or in some casessurgery it may be that you are lucky enough to be given a date relatively close to your first appointment for example: within 1-2 weeks.

However, there are many situations where this is not the case and there can and has been, a waiting period of up to 3-4 weeks or even longer between followup appointments. Unfortunately once you leave the Falkland Islands, KEMH/FIGO has limited means of influencing any ongoing appointments it is down to the treating hospital to fit you when they have available appointments/ surgery slots within their waiting lists. KEMH/FIGO will do their best to try and liaise with the hospitals to achieve an earlier appointment for you but they have procedures in place that apply to all patient referrals.

Should you anticipate a 6-8 week waiting time you should Contact Colin at FIGO who will then liaise with the KEMH and a decision will be made about the most appropriate action to take. It maybe that this is to fly you home for that period and send you back once an appointment has been given. This will be discussed with you as part of the decision making.

If your destination is to Santiago or Punta Arenas your first appointments will normally be at the beginning of the week and if any additional appointments are required then these are given during the remainder of the week so that you will be able to return on the scheduled weekly flight. Only on very rare occasions do patients have to stay for more than one week

No money in Scotia

NOBLE Energy will take a 75 million write down for exploration costs after determining that its offshore Scotia well in the Falkland Islands is not commercially viable. The well was drilled in 2012 using 2D seismic interpretation but was deemed non-commercial following analysis of 3D seismic data.

Noble updated its guidance for third quarter exploration expenses to be between 230 and 240 million, including approximately 75 million related to the Scotia well.

Despite the Scotia well decision Noble will continue its Falklands exploration efforts. Noble plans to drill the Humpback prospect following an extensive 3D seismic program over parts of its 10 million acre position in the Falklands.

The Humpback prospect is one of multiple stacked fan prospects clustered together in the Fitzroy sub basin.

Noble estimates that this group of prospects has a combined estimated gross un-risked resource potential of approximately one billion barrels of oil equivalent.

Drilling operations at Humpback are projected to being in the middle of 2015, dependent on rig arrival.

Noble Energy is currently finalising prospect locations for a second exploration well, planned for later in 2015 following results at Humpback.


Noble Energy operates its licenses offshore the Falkland Islands with a 35 per cent working interest.

"The Falklands provides an opportunity to create another core area for Noble Energy through organic exploration success." Noble's vice president of exploration Mike Putnam said.

Avoid infecting the dentists

THE Dental Department has asked that people who are suffering from communicable illness put off dental appointments until they are fully recovered. They say that increasingly, staff are themselves becoming ill immediately after seeing infective patients. This considerably reduces their operational capacity. Of particular concern are vomiting and diarrhoea, active cold sores (this viral condition poses a threat to dental staff's eyesight), flu/upper respiratory tract infections and sore throats. They remain happy to see people in urgent/emergency need, but ask patients to postpone routine appointments if they are unwell.

Happy 150th birthday Rose Bar

FOUNDED on October 8, 1864 as the Rose Hotel by Thomas Aldridge, the Rose Bar has been serving customers for 150 years this week.

Thomas Gilmore became owner of the property in 1856 after which it changed ownership twice before landing in the hands of the FIC.

Thomas Aldridge purchased the property in 1864 and it stayed in the family until 1934 when Albert Hardy owned it for nine years before selling it to Axel Pettersson whose family it remained with until 1987. Ellen Berntsen (now Davis) was the next owner with James Wallace, Trevor Browning also running the business before current owners Tracey and Rag Macaskill took ownership in 2004.

Over the years The Rose as it is known locally, has featured as the finishing post for one of the earliest horse races in Stanley, watered the troops who lived in the nearby barracks (think Barrack Street) in the late 1800s, through to serving those who were stationed here after the 1982 war and has been the stop off for a traditional, "one before supper," for many generations of Islanders.

A masterly account of the Battle of the Falklands

The Battle of the Falklands 1914 By Graham Pascoe reviewed by David Tatham

WITH the centenary of the 1914 naval battle coming up in December and commemorations planned for Stanley and London, Graham Pascoe's concise account of the battles of Coronel and the Falkland Islands is well timed Pascoe, who together with Peter Pepper is working on a comprehensive history of the Islands (The Falklands Saga) and a shorter version (A Brief History of the Falkland Islands), has extracted his account of the events of November and December 1914 and produced a short generously illustrated book of 60 pages

He describes the book as "A Falklands Perspective" and indeed it gives local background and stories in a way that none of the previous histories have managed, merging local incidents with the high strategies of the British and German fleets. The author is uniquely well suited to his task - not only does he know the Falklands background from his research and his visit to the Islands, but he has a complete mastery of German, living in Bavaria and being a professional trainer of interpreters. More than this, Pascoe is a historian of daunting accuracy and exactitude. He has studied all the sources, compared the various editions and checked translations against originals (revealing some striking differences). He is well-versed on naval procedures, on navigation and on such areane topics as the Coriolis effect and its possible impact on British gunnery.


His narrative begins with the placid background of Stanley before the outbreak of war and a complacent New Year's editorial in the monthly Falkland Islands Magazine (FIM). Pascoe recalls the routine visit of 11MS Glasgow to Stanley early in 1912 – a round of matches – football and shooting – concerts and services in the Cathedral. Glasgow was an extremely happy ship and, more

unusually, with a very temperate crew. Against this, Pascoe discovers an ominous article in the FIM dated March 1914 and asking "...what of the Falklands should war break out?" As indeed, five months later, it did.

The FIM is one of his main sources for the Falklands perspective, together with a vivid description which Governor Allardyce wrote for the Colonial Office of the months from August to December 1914. But in addition there are letters from ordinary Islanders evacuated from Stanley to camp (the countryside) packed onto the SS Falkland when invasion threatened.

Pascoe is equally sure-footed in describing the movements of the German fleet under Count von Spee and its encounter at Coronel off the coast of Chile with the British squadron of Admiral Sir Christopher Cradock, which was weaker in ships, less experienced and less skilfully led. Cradock was roundly defeated in the most serious British reverse at sea for a century. Two British warships were sunk with all hands, including Cradock himself. When news reached the Falklands the colony was close to despair. It was saved by the decision of Winston Churchill (then First Lord of the Admiralty) to detach two heavily armed and fast battle cruisers under Admiral Sturdee to the Falklands to enable the Royal Navy to confront von Spee. Even so, Pascoe makes it clear how narrowly the almost undefended colony escaped a German landing. Both fleets dawdled as they approached the Islands in the first days of December: "but it was the Falklands" good luck" to quote Pascoe "that at the vital moment, von Spee outdawdled Sturdee". So the British battlecruisers arrived less than a day before von Spee - effectively trapping him.

The battle itself is well described: there is a wealth of British sources and the senior surviving German officer, Hans Pochhammer left a graphic ac-



count of the action, of the sinking of his ship the Gneisenau and of his civilised treatment by his British captors. (Pascoe has freshly translated the extracts from Pochhammer's book). From the Falklands viewpoint, it is made very clear which German ships were spotted by Christian Andreasen on Sapper Hill and which were reported by Mrs Felton and her maid Christina Goss from Fitzroy. The site where Canopus was beached and secured to provide a firm firing position is also convincingly identified.

The sole German warship to survive the battle, the Dresden, made for the coast of Chile and for three months played hide and seek with the Royal Navy in the fjords until she was cornered and sunk by Glasgow and Kent. The threat to the Islands was over.

I have applauded Pascoe's scholarship: with it goes a sardonic sense of humour which I found refreshing. He demolishes various myths built around the events of 1914, usually by Malvinas-obsessed Argentine writers. One "absurd and totally untrue theory" is debunked at length in case its author (in fairness, not an Argentine) is tempted to publicise it during this centenary year!

But this scholarship carries a heavy cargo of footnotes – the average reader may be put off by a page which is up to two-thirds composed of footnote, as several are. It would perhaps have been better to concentrate the references and comments as end-notes following the narrative.

A few small niggles, I have mentioned the generous provision of illustrations, all with full and careful captions which add to their value. It is not the author's fault that many of the photographs are out of focus as they were taken by amateurs, literally in the heat of battle. But I did long for a sharp photograph of the battleeruisers say, or HMS Canopus, to enable me to appreciate their size and their armament. It would too have been good to see some of the German paintings which attempted to mythologise the battle. Pascoe mentions Willy Stoewer's painting of Dresden with her prize the Conway Castle: there is also Hans Bohrdt's propagandist painting "The Last Man", reproduced in Stanley Museum, with a sailor clinging to wreckage and cheering on German reinforcements.

A map of the Chilean coast would have been helpful, not just for the battle of Coronel but to illustrate von Spee's slow progress towards the Falklands and indeed Dresden's movements in early 1915.

Finally a little more on the Battle Memorial in Stanley, which after all is the prime commemoration of the Battle and the site of the annual parade, would have been interesting: surely it is only fair to mention the sculptor (Frank Ransom) and the fact that the initiative for its construction came from the Falkland Islands Company, which largely paid the bills.

But these are minor quibbles. This book cannot be beaten as a clear professional and readable account of the two battles in which the Falklands first briefly appeared on the world stage. Graham Pascoe is better placed than anyone to give us the Falklands perspective on these events and this he has done with flying colours.

Making his second visit within a year Prison Advisor Keith Munns says conditions for prisoners have improved but there is still a lack of work for them. He asked that people consider work which could be carried out by the prisoners in a secure environment

suitable to go out into the community.






Peruvian adventure awaits you of local silver and baby alpaca prod-

STANLEY based company Interna-tional Tours and Travel Ltd. Recently sent their travel agent Dahiana Burucua to visit Peru and Bolivia in order to gain a personalised insight into the experience offered by her company.

Dahiana takes up the story:

My trip began in the capital city of Peru, Lima. I was greeted by a guide at the airport who told me a little about the history of the capital and had a chance to see some of the most important buildings in the area. In the afternoon, I had the opportunity to inspect some of the more popular hotels in the vicinity as well as some of the new properties

The following morning I look part in a city tour which highlighted the colonial sites and modern parts of Lima finishing the day with an optional visit to the Larco Museum which has an exceptional collection of relics, a lovely garden and a great restaurant

After a short flight, I landed in Arequipa which is located at 2400 m/8000 ft above sea level. The afternoon included a city tour of Arequipa, known as the 'White City' taking in the Plaza de Armas (Main Square), the Cathedral, La Compañia Church and the famous Monastery of Santa Catalina.

The following morning, headed to the Colca Valley by bus. The journey took approximately five hours. We were able to see the spectacular Misti and Chachani volcanoes and our guide told us about some of the local legends associated with them. On our way to Chivay we went to the National Reserve of Aguada Blanca where we were able to see heaps of local camelids such as vicuñas and guanacos. After lunch we had the afternoon at leisure with the opportunity to enjoy the local thermal baths.

The next day we had an early

'Cruz del Condor'. The drive allowed us to see some of the agricultural terraces around the valley, and stopped in a few towns on the way to purchase souvenirs and visit a few small church-

After a short wait at 'Cruz del es. Condor', we were able to see a group of condors flying around the valley and some of the local flora. On the way back to Chivay we slopped at several road stands to try some of the local fruits that come from cactuses in the mountains. After a visit to the Colca valley,

I returned to Arequipa to catch a

flight to Cusco which is located at 3,400 m/11,200 ft above sea level. The afternoon comprised a city tour which included some of the most iconic historic buildings and some of the most stunning landscapes in

The following day, before head-ing to the Pisac Ruins, we went to a small local market were we were able to see the natives carving small wooden idols for souvenirs. After our brief stop, we headed to the Pisae Ruins where we explored the different buildings and learned about their various purposes. Before lunch, we had the opportunity to purchase and see the production

ucts We visited the village of Pisac which is located 20 miles/32 km from Cuseo in the Urubamba Valley and had the chance to walk around the colourful Indian Market.

Following lunch we visited the Ollantaytambo Fortress, the last living Inca town, which is located in the Sacred Valley of the Incas. We made our way to the top where we could appreciate some of the most breathtaking views imaginable.

The next day I was incredibly excited as the greatest highlight of Peru awaited me, Machu Picchu. We took one of the early trains from Ollantaytambo to Aguas Calientes (Machu Piechu Town). Once in Aguas Calientes, we headed to catch the zigzag bus which takes you to the entrance site at the top of the mountain.

After a short while of climbing steps, we were able to see the first view of the Lost City of the Incas. We walked around for approximately two hours visiting some of the most beautiful sites from this lost civilization and learned about their architecture and agricultural techniques as well as their traditions.

Most travellers access the site by train and bus as I did but some opt to arrive at the Sun Gate after walking the Inca Trail. The trail has different levels of difficulty and can last from four days to ten depending on how confident the passengers are. This enables travellers to experience Machu Picchu as well as the riches along the way; darting hummingbirds, delicate orchids, soaring condors and astonishing works of masonry.

We stopped for lunch at Machu Picchu Sanctuary Lodge after our guided tour has come to and end. After lunch we were given the chance to go back to the site and explore independently.

The battles of Coronel and the Falklands in the making

ONE hundred years ago this week - a daily diary of events leading up to the battles of Coronel and the Falklands by Islander and marine archaeologist Mensun Bound

Saturday 10th October 1914

Antwerp: Following the loss of the Bacchantes, the fall of Antwerp was another major disaster for the Admiralty. A barrage of criticism soon arose: all agreed that the Navy should never have been involved and that it had all arisen from Churchill's inexperience and impetuosity. The Conservative press in particular was merciless. What we desire chiefly to enforce upon Mr Churchill.' intoned the Morning Post, 'is that he is not a Napoleon, but a Minister of the Crown with no time to organise or land armies in the field.'

As for Beatty, he was left spluttering; in a letter to his wife he railed at how the First Lord had made 'such a darned fool of himself over the Antwerp debacle. The man must have been mad to have thought he could relieve [Antwerp] by putting 8,000 halftrained troops into it'. Prime Minister Asquith was furious describing it as a 'wicked folly' Churchill tried to attribute grand purpose to his Antwerp venture claiming that an additional objective had been to defend the city long enough to consolidate the allied hold on the channel ports of Calais and Dunkirk. Maybe, but to many this had a strong whiff of evasion that was recalled later when Churchill tried to shift the blame for Coronel onto Cradock.

This was the moment that Asquith should have sacked Churchill. Certainly he considered it, but he had nobody to replace him. Churchill also recognized that somebody's head had to roll and his thoughts turned to Battenberg. Antwerp had pitched the Admiralty into crisis, this would now be compounded by the removal of Battenberg: together, such was the distraction, they made Coronel inevitable.

Richmond: The only one within the Admiralty who was thinking proactively was Richmond. In his diaries for this day we find another tirade against Sturdee:

As today I found that no orders had been given of any kind about ships to deal with the *Scharnhorsts*. I concluded that the question had been answered at the Cabinet against my views. So, as there was now no other means of getting the matter brought forward, I wrote a new paper and then went and told Marsh that I wanted to speak to Winston. At half-past one he sent for me. I gave him the paper and he read it. He said, 'Ah. Harcourt was anxious about that.' Then he said he

had asked the Chief of Staff. Sturdee, who had said there was no possibility of such a thing being done... He read the whole thing through, said *Canopus* could beat the other ships. To which I replied that she might, if she was there to do it, but that she could not prevent their going round the Horn if they didn't want to be intercented.

By the end he showed that he was impressed, though he repeated that he had been told exactly the opposite by Chief of Staff Sturdee He asked if I should like the paper referred to Sturdee. I hesitated, and said. 'there are two men in the Admiralty for whose opinions I have great respect - Oliver and Duff. I suggest you refer it to them.' He got up at once and said, 'that is so, I will,' walked straight into the Secretary's room and sent it to Oliver, whom I saw at lunch, who told me it had been sent to him__So now I feel I have done all that is possible.

Stanley: On this day many of the crew from *Good Hope* were given shore leave. Apart from Father Migone's picture show. Stanley had little to offer the men except for its pubs. Probably the most popular at that time was the First & Last, the only one with a bagatelle table (the Stanley Arms and Ship Hotel had billiard tables). The Landlord's wife, Molly Biggs, later wrote:

After I was married in Sept. 1914 we went to live at the 'First and Last' Hotel situated at the east end of Stanley. A very bad situation to make a good living. Owing to the war however, as Stanley was a Naval Base, many colliers and storeships were often in harbour ... We served teas and cakes to many of the officers and midshipmen both before and after the Battle, and as my autograph [book], a large one, com-menced in 1908 was lying on the piano (old and out of tune) they all signed the book, did sketches. wrote verses etc. and that was how I obtained the autographs from all the ships in the FI Battle.

That book is still my most treasured possession, and I have added many famous autographs since. Sir Ernest Shackelton drew a penguin in it. This was [in 1915] after his historic voyage from Elephant Island across to South Georgia ... Two other names in my book always sadden me to look at. These were a little sailor and a marine from HMS *Good Hope*. Neither of them could possibly have been more than 15 years old. The *Good Hope* was sunk two weeks later with all her crew.

Not surprisingly a significant number who went ashore this day drank themselves senseless. Had von Spee appeared that day the fighting capability of the *Good Hope* would have been severely compromised. Something had to be done.

Elsewhere: In the afternoon *Glasgow, Monmouth* and *Otranto* arrived at Vallenar Roads, their secret coaling base within the Chilean Archipelago. Canopus departed Abrolhos for the Falk-land Islands

Sunday 11th October 1914

Cradock: Cradock had become concerned about his capability to stop von Spec. First, in so much ocean there was no guarantee that they would meet; second, if they did meet, it was extremely unlikely that he would be able to defeat him; and finally, if von Spee had more important objectives for which he had to husband his ammunition, then he might well decline to fight, in which case there was nothing Cradock could do to stop him. Furthermore, if the Germans went on to destroy the coal supplies at the Falklands then he would be unable to give chase. What was needed was another squadron on the east coast of the Americas. The message he sent suffered some mutilation in transmission:

Without alarming, respectfully suggest that in event of the enemy's heavy cruisers and others concentrating West Coast of South America, it is necessary to have a British force on each coast strong enough to bring them to action. For otherwise should the concentrated British force sent from S.E. Coast be evaded in the Pacific, which is not impossible, (?and) thereby (?get) behind the enemy, the latter could destroy Falkland, English Bank and Abrolhos coaling bases in turn, with little to stop them, and with British ships unable to follow up owing to want of coal. Enemy might possibly reach West Indies'.

Stanley: On this day the fol-

lowing document appeared on the noticeboard of the Post Office and Assembly Rooms.

Proclamation

By His Excellency William Lamond Allardyce, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of St Michael and St George, Governor, Commander-in-Chief and Vice-Admiral of the Colony of the Falkland Islands and its Dependencies

Whereas a state of war exists between His Majesty the King and the Emperors of Germany and Austria-Hungary, and whereas it is imperative that no facilities whatsoever should be afforded for in any impairing the efficiency of His Majesty's Naval Forces, and whereas the Senior Naval Officer has urged the prohibition of the sale of alcoholic liquors at Port Stanley to men of His Majesty's ships during the period of hostilities, I. William Lamond Allardyce, Governor and Commander-in-Chief, by and with the advice of my Executive Council, do order in pursuance of the powers in me vested by the Licensing Ordinance, 1901, and it is hereby ordered, that all premises in which intoxicating liquors are sold by retail shall be closed during the hours when men from His Majesty's ships are granted leave to be ashore.

The proclamation does not appear to have been officially rescinded but, as we shall see, it was soon relaxed.

Dresden Dresden arrived Easter Island where it waited for von Spee.

Monday 12th October 1914

Chile: In the early morning Monmouth and Glasgow departed Vallenar and headed up the coast of Chile to Coronel.

Admiralty: Cradock's message of the 8th in which he also asked about Defence arrived at the Admiralty. Churchill minuted it to Battenberg:

"First Sealord, In these circumstances it would be best for the British ships to keep within supporting distance of one another, whether in the Straits or near the Falklands, and to postpone the cruise along the West Coast until the present uncertainty about Scharnhorst and Gneisenau is cleared up.

They and not the trade are our quarry for the moment. Above all, we must not miss them.

WSC12/10/14

From this it is clear that Churchill, with Coronel only 20 days away, had no proper understanding of the situation and still

thought of the *Canopus* as his 'citadel' against which von Spee could not prevail.

The one man who should have spotted all the flaws and eventualities was Battenberg, but by this time he was so completely beaten down that he simply wrote 'Settled' across the bottom. The other person who would have seen this exchange was Sturdee, and perhaps also Leveson, but they also said nothing. Although Cradock in Port Stanley did not know it, the noose about his neck had just been tightened.

Von Spee: On this day the German squadron arrived at Easter Island, a Chilean possession 2.400 miles from the mainland. Five months before the outbreak of war an English archaeological expedition had turned up on the Island headed by Katherine Routledge. Her purpose was to conduct the first survey of the Island's iconic stone heads. She later wrote a book in which she described the arrival of von Spee's ships:

We had just begun the week's work on Monday, October 12, when word was brought that some steamers had appeared. The whole of the native staff, of course, at once departed to see what could be begged from the ships. The vessels turned out to be a German squadron ...some more turned up later, till there were twelve in all, four or five of the number being warships, and the remainder colliers or other smaller vessels. We had not, of course, the slightest idea that war had broken out ...

We seized the opportunity to write letters, which were posted on the ships, and one of our number went to see the doctor. To the credit of the enemy be it said, that almost all the letters subsequently arrived, a sad exception being a butterfly addressed to Professor Poulton at Oxford, which, if it was retained as something valuable, presumably went down off the Falkland Islands'.

Tuesday 13th October 1914

Good Hope: During the weeks to come many hundreds of cards were posted by servicemen in Stanley. Extremely few have survived. On this day in Stanley one of the men on Good Hope, 31-year-old Leading Seaman Henry Buckle, sent a card to his wife in Southsea, Portsmouth:

My dear Wife and all,

I am quite well and hope you and all are same (No mail yet). Hope baby is well and I shall soon be home with you.

From your ever loving husband,

Henry xx

Henry, of course, never saw his wife and baby again, and the card would have arrived well after the papers had reported the sinking of his ship.

Von Spee: The Germans at Easter Island were busy coaling and preparing for battle by stripping down their weaponry for greasing. Two days before von Spee had written that, if they could complete with coal at Easter Island and again at Mås Afuera in the Juan Fernåndez Is, it would 'ensure that we have full bunkers when we enter the area in which a meeting with the enemy is likely to occur'. On this day he wrote to Grete about how his son Otto had joined him from the Nürnberg, and together they had gone ashore in pouring rain to look at the heads.

Wednesday 14th October 1914 Leipzig: On this day Leipzig joined von Spee. With him were three well-laden supply ships, Amasis, Anubis and Karnak, all were of the Kosmos Line which for a number of years had held the mail contract for the Falklands. It is known that a Kosmos captain had been urging Dresden to attack the Falklands and it seems likely that these captains would have done the same with von Spee_ Certainly they would have provided him with charts of the Islands. This might well have been the moment that von Spee decided to raid Stanley.

Admiralty It seems that Richmond's intervention of the 10th was having some effect, for on this day Churchill discussed Cradock's dispositions with Battenberg and clearly Richmond's paper was on the table. At the meeting they adopted Richmond and Cradock's suggestion to convene a new squadron on the east coast of South America to meet von Spee should he evade Cradock in the Pacific and come around the Horn. The matter of reinforcements were discussed. After the meeting Churchill memoed Battenberg:

Will you direct the C.O.S. [Sturdee] to have a statement prepared showing the dates by which these dispositions will be completed, and the earliest date at which *Scharnhorst* and *Gneisenau* could arrive in the respective spheres.

Sturdee did as asked but he was livid with Richmond who had usurped his authority by going over his head with proposals regarding the German Squadron. There followed an explosive meeting.

Richmond: 'Chief-of-Staff' sent for me [today] and reprimanded me ... [he] was furious. Went for me for 'laying down an Admiralty policy'. Said I had no right to put such a thing on paper ... he went on, saying that he had to read everything I wrote, and when rot like this came in it wasted his time, and was generally as unpleasant as he could be'.

The new dispositions are telegraphed to Cradock in the Falklands:

'Concur in your concentration of Canopus, Good Hope, Glasgow, Monmouth, Otranto for combined operation. We have ordered Stoddart in Canarvon to Montevideo as Senior Naval Officer north of Montevideo. Have ordered Defence to join Canarvon. He will also have under his orders Bristol, Cornwall, Orama and Macedonia. Essex is to remain in W. Indies.We shall send supply ship Crown of Galicia, to Montevideo with colliers, to be moved on as you order. Acknowledge receipt of this telegram'.

This message would have come as a blow to Cradock because he now knew for certain that he would not be receiving defence or any other reinforcements. Short of a miracle, he and his men were doomed.

Monmouth: Glasgow put into Coronel to confer with the Consul while Monmouth remained outside for gunnery practice. On this day aboard the Monmouth, 19 year old Bandsman William Wileman Hart from Gresley, Staffordshire, sat down to write to his parents.

In contrast to those at the Admiralty, who could be dazzlingly inept and arrogant, were the men who went south. From their letters and diaries a very different picture emerges. They were mostly men of rudimentary education whose writings contained no great thoughts, just plain folk. recording their everyday lives, missing home, wishing it was over, but always doing what was asked of them in the sanguine behef that it was right by God. King and Country. Of all the letters seen by the writer, the following (in Stanley Museum) is the most poignant. What hovers over his words is the thought that 18 days later he would, for no purpose, be dead, and that the family to whom he wrote so movingly, and who received this letter many weeks later, would be plunged into lifesapping grief from which they probably never fully recovered. The orthography and syntax have not been changed.

Dear Mother and Dad,

We expect to meet a mailboat shortly so I thought I would drop you a line to say I am in the pink and hope you are the same ... We are just off Chile now on the other side of America. The weather is perfect now but all last week we had very rough weather round Cape Horn bottom of America. We were hunting around there for a supposed German warship we searched all amongst the islands and inlets for over a week but could not find any trace of her later we heard she had given us the slip. The scenery in the Magellan Straits bottom of America was beautiful the numerous islands and snow capped mountains. We crossed over to the Falkland Islands very cold there our butcher and a few others went ashore and killed fifty two wild sheep so we have had plenty of mutton. Officers went ashore and shot wild duck and pheasants so we have been living in stile. We are now on our way to Valparaso about half way up the Pacific side of South America. HMS Glasgow is with us and the armed liner Otranto is following us up behind. A provision ship is expected to meet us at Valparaso so we shall be all Page 13

right. I am living well at present. Having porridge, dripping and perhaps comed beef for breakfast roast meat, beans and pudding for dinner. Jam for tea and corned beef again for supper... We are not getting much news about the war out here just the bare wireless. We anchor on average once a week in some uninhabited part of the coast and coal from our collier etc. There is some most wonderful bits of scenery though. We expect to meet some more of our own ships shortly. There are some German warships round here some where but we can't find them they are hiding from us. I expect we shall meet them sooner or later. We are getting very disheartened because we cant find them, but we are bound to meet them sooner or later. I have been taking up boxing lately. We have got a chap in the band who has been a bit of a welter weight champion about my own age and we have got a bit chummy and he has been pulling me up a few moves... I have got over my sea sickness that I used to have in the Colossus and am now able to laugh at the other young sailors. Well I hope I shall here from you soon. It is the general opinion out here that the war won't last much longer. If you are alright, I don't mind staying out here for a bit we are always seeing fresh sights and new wonders, and besides I am saving up money all the time. I hope to have ten pounds to my credit by Christmas Hoping you are all well and in the best of health and spirits with lots of love to you all.


Valparaiso: *Glasgow* and *Monmouth* reached Valparaiso. While ashore on ship's business Hirstheard that a German has been enquiring about charts of the coast so he bought every copy he couldfind. From newspapers he learned that the war was not going so well for the Allies.

Gneisenau: Since the Marque-sas many of the men on *Gne*sienau had come down with a virulent strain of dysentery. On this day Chief Gunner Kraft died. He was immediately stitched up in sail cloth, weighted at the feet, and before the ship's assembled company, was passed over the stern into an open boat which was then towed out into deep water by apinnace for the committal. First Officer Pochhammer wrote: 'the ship had lost a brave and active petty officer, whose eyes would have gleamed at Coronel and the Falklands and whose gun, the 8.2 inch of the forward starboard casemate, played such an active role in both battles'.

Friday 16th October 1914

Valparaiso: At 00.18 Glasgow and Monmouth proceeded out of Valparaiso. To confuse the spies they headed north but, once out of sight of land, they doubled south to rendezvous with Otranto.



Tax reliefs agreed for all of Camp

A RANGE of tax reliefs across all of Camp (area outside of Stanley) was agreed by Executive Council on Wednesday

Executive Council consisting of MLAs Mike Summers. Phyl Rendell and Barry Elsby approved the policy for the tax reliefs to support rural development which will now be subject to further policy development and drafting work, said MLA Summers as spokesperson.

He said the reliefs would apply equally across all of the Camp and would allow for corporation tax holidays for three years on new business created in Camp. introduce job tax credit for new jobs created and would allow for enhanced allowances on certain assets, including renewable energy assets which will attract a 150 per cent relief against corporation tax.

Equipped for Ebola

A SIGNIFICANT amount of planning has been undertaken between the hospital and the MoD to make sure that in the highly unlikely event of an individual contracting a disease that required a quarantine unit, "we would be able to deal with it," MLA Mike Summers told Penguin News.

He confirmed the hospital was not equipped to deal with an airborne infection risk in its quarantine unit, but noted that Ebola was not airborne and a facility was available to deal with anyone suspected of carrying that virus. The issue of Ebola is to be discussed at the CMT Managers' meeting on Monday afternoon and there will be a further statement about how they propose to deal with any eventuality.

General Manager Falkland Islands Tourist Board Tony Mason said: "This is really big for us, very exciting and a definite indicator of our successful efforts with tourism over the past year."

The Islands were in the final against Alaska, Australia, Botswana, Equador, Galapagos Islands and South Africa.

Mr Mason will collect the award at World Travel Mart which takes place in two weeks time.

Director of International Communications

Falkland Islands Tourist The

Board (FITB) has approved the new post of Director of International Communications, a marketing post for an individual who will work out of the Falkland Islands Government London Office (FIGO)

Apart from the vital role of marketing the Islands around the world, it will reduce travel costs within the FITB budget and further underpin the strengthened relationship between FITB and FIGO. Mr Mason told Penguin News yesterday that the two bodies had recently been working much closer together and sharing resources in promoting the Falklands.

MLA Michael Poole said that as a part of the Tourism Development Strategy (TDS) there had been in-principle support for a couple of years now for the concept of establishing a marketing post in the UK (to cover the UK and US markets in particular). This would be in addition to the current General Manager role based in Stanley.

He said as a Board they see there being benefits to this role in terms of access to the Falklands' key markets, "easier attendance at key events and financial savings in terms of less need to employ external agencies and firms to assist in the logistics of events.

The filling of the post is not imminent however, Mr Mason is currently contracted until the end of the year and has agreed to stay on until a replacement GM (a Chief Executive under the new Statutory Corporaton) is found.

Recruitment for that is currently being undertaken.

All of this is still, "working its way through the system," said MLA Poole.

FORGET Dior jackets, sports cars or holidays in Mustique, it occurred to me while staring into my shopping basket this week that a crazily extravagant Falkland Islander might be one defined as purchasing exotic mushrooms the same day as salad stuff. As I reluctantly replaced the fancy fungi with regulation ones (wouldn't want anyone thinking I was raiding the PN petty cash) my next thought was a routine one -how on earth do families manage? As a person with no dependents and on a reasonable salary, the price of food in the Falklands blows my mind and decimates my budget, so what does it do to someone with a whole lot more mouths to feed?

OK so what I'm saying is nothing new; food is expensive and fresh food is enormously expensive blah blah. But as more people arrive and work in the Islands (assuming all goes well with the oil industry) and a small sector of our own community earns more money from their involvement in that industry, prices are only likely to increase.

Perhaps I'm being overly pessimistic but there's a sinking feeling in my stomach that not only are low earners set to be left further behind, but with inflation, the term low earner will begin to encompass more people; in fact I strongly suspect it already has

Not of course that we should be surprised bearing in mind what's happening in the rest of the world. According to a recent article in the Guardian taken together, the bottom half of the global population own less than one per cent of total wealth. Then again we're not the rest of the world. Our education is free, as is health care; Government assists first time buyers in terms of housing and hopefully the price of both heating fuel and electricity will be kept at a reasonable level

But for our largely classless society to avoid ending up scarily disparate in terms of wealth distribution Government may have quite a job on its hands. Certainly the amount of FIG housing available will have to increase in order that rent rates remain accessible, surely FIG salaries must increase to a more realistic level and potentially the price of some healthy and locally produced food stuffs subsidised.

ON a less gloomy note, congratulations to FITB on the Falklands winning the Travel Agents Choice Award. While wildlife film makers and birders 'in the know' have long recognised the superb quality of Falklands wildlife - it's gratifying to have the Islands as a wildlife destination celebrated at such a high profile and commercial level.

Criteria agreed for funded roads

IN ORDER for businesses to obtain funding for roads to non agricultural destinations there must be, "an overall economic benefit that exceeds the cost of construction," it was decided at this week's meeting of Executive Council

The controversial issue of whether a business (for example a farm with a destination of interest to tourists that can currently only be reached off road) should be given monetary assistance by

FIDC in order to build a road, was discussed at length on Wednesday

MLA Mike Summers said, "a revised recommendation agreed that proposals may be submitted to FIDC for analysis, in accordance with agreed criteria, to be considered as part of the National Infrastructure plan.

The details of the scheme are published within a public Executive Council paper.

Oil industry social effects programme

PROPOSALS from the Policy Department on a social effects monitoring programme relating to hydrocarbons development were agreed at this week's meeting of Executive Council

MLA Mike Summers said: "This will identify a range of social indicators to identify, quantify and assess the social and cultural effects - both positive and negative - of the development of hydrocarbons in the Falklands.

The results will be the subject of regular review and remedial action where necessary. The pro-

ject is co-funded by FIG, Premier and Noble."

He also noted that a proposed paper to agree the Code of Practice for the procurement of local goods and services by the oil industry and their contractors was withdrawn prior to the meeting, due to incomplete consideration of some legal issues. MLA Summers commented: "Members expressed concern at this late intervention and discussed the issues involved. The revised paper will be resubmitted for the next meeting.

Concerns that the Jetty Centre Car Park and would not be ready to receive visitors are unfounded Tourist Board Manager Tony Mason has assured

He said the Public Works Department would remove everything from the car park on Tuesday (14th) and grade the parking lot the following day. Mr Mason said assurance had been received from PWD on Tuesday that everything was "on track

MLA Michael Poole who holds the Tourism portfolio said work on the Public Jetty replacement is due to re-commence next month when the piling equipment that is currently being utilised on the

Noble TDF become available. "It is hoped that this will improve the efficiency and quality of the build so it has been deemed worth delaying the work until that is available," he said

Director of Public Works Manfred Keenleyside said it was not expected that anything other than the piling would be progressed on the Jetty itself before end of the cruise season.

The piling work will be fitted around cruise vessel visits once the barge becomes available and the timing for that looks likely to he November

He said work has been carried out on the piles which are now stacked on the infill section ready for use

Other work to the jetty will not commence until after this cruise ship season, concluded Mr Keenleyside.

MW fixed and back on air

THE Medium Wave (MW) radio service transmitted from Mount William has been repaired and is now back on air

The Government advised earlier this week that the equipment damaged during a storm earlier this year had been repaired and was broadcasting Falkland Islands Radio Service again on 530MW as well as BBC World Service when FIRS is not on air.

However, British Forces Broadcasting Service (BFBS) has advised that the BFBS Radio 2 channel previously transmitted on 550MW from the BFBS Bush Rincon site will no longer be available as the equipment is beyond economic repair.

The Government statement noted that a number of areas are still experiencing difficulty receiving some or all of the new FM channels.

An assessment of reception around the islands has recently been carried out and a report has been prepared for the Government outlining the various difficulties and problem areas. The options for resolving these issues will be considered by Executive Council in November and it is hoped that proposed solutions can be implemented in the near future

Your views on pension restructure

THE Falkland Islands Government will be carrying out a public consultation between the October 20 and the November 7, seeking the community's views on the possible restructure of the Retirement Pension Contribution scheme (RPC).

Under the current system, RPCs are made at a fixed weekly contribution rate for all individuals earning above a set threshold, or a 'horizontally equitable' system. The consultation will look four possible models that explore income-related contributions, or a 'vertically equitable' system.

An information booklet has been prepared which contains further details on each suggested model. This booklet and copies of the questionnaires can be obtained from the Post Office, the Public Library or the Treasury.

Your Questions Answered

Qls whistling in public a public order offence or in fact any sort of offence at all? A Heau of A Cheek said Head of Legal Services Ros

I cannot imagine any circumstances in which simply whistling in a public place might fall within a public order offence. I suppose at a stretch it might form part of other behaviour or a series of other behaviours which together amounts to a public order or, perhaps more likely. harassment offence, but there would have to be something considerably more to it than simply whistling.

Does the Agricultural/Vet-Qerinary Department have any power to stop shearing when weather conditions are extreme as recently experienced?

Veterinary Officer Zoe Fowler supplied the following information

Shearing is permitted after AShearing is permittee and September 15 until October 31 with cover combs. Normal combs can be used after November 1. The Veterinary Service would be unlikely to ban shearing given extreme weather as individual farms may experience different weather and have different contingency plans (be able to keep recently shorn mobs in the shed, supplementary feeding, have shelter belts etc). However, good animal welfare does include protection from climatic extremes and so to continue shearing and turning out sheep with a critical wind chill factor would be viewed as foolhardy at best

Senior Veterinary Officer Steve Pointing added, "I think you need to be very careful when the figure exceeds 80 and, unless you have got good shelter, then you probably shouldn't be thinking about shearing when the figure is 90+."

QIf a pensioner is impris-oned are they still entitled to receive a full pension while serving sentence?

Senior Accounting Assistant Jody Aldridge provided the following information

A pension is a regular pay-Ament made during a person's retirement. In order to fund that pension the individual and/or their employer would have made contributions during their working life. Individuals who are in receipt of a retirement pension would have to have made the minimum number of contributions to become eligible to receive a pension. This pension is payable upon the recipient reaching retirement age, and would be paid regardless of personal circumstances.

Hospital discharge/Returning home, follow up and MTO questionnaire

Once you have been advised of a discharge date from the hospital you will need to get your hospital doctor to complete the Medical Risk assessment form. This was given to you before you left the Falklands please send this on to FIGO. This form is then sent on to the RAF and they will make the decision as to how you will fly home, as a normal passenger or with the Aeromed team.

All patients are expected to return to the Islands on the first available flight after being discharged from the hospital. If a patient wishes to stay longer no accommodation will be funded from the date that your confirmed flight is available.

Should a patient wish to remain in the UK following the confirmed flight date, you would be expected to pay a percentage or all of the southbound airfare - up to four weeks 50 per cent of the southbound flight cost and over 4 weeks 100 per cent of the south-

Patients who are required to return to the Islands on an escorted Aeromed flight may have to wait several days or a week perhaps for the next routine medical flight as these are scheduled only every fortnight. In this situation accommodation would be funded up to that flight date.

For patients flying to South America you would be expected to return to the Islands the following week. If you choose to stay longer than a week the same rules would apply to the accommodation and flight costs as per UK.

On your arrival back in the Islands you will be contacted by the overseas medical Co-ordinator who will make an appointment for you with your referring doctor. At your follow up appointment the doctor will discuss with you the treatment you have had, any ongoing care you may need.

An MRSA swab will also be taken in line with our infection prevention policies. All patients returning from overseas have this completed.

Finally, we ask that every patient on their return to the Islands completes the Medical Treatment Overseas (MTO) survey form. This survey helps us access the experience you have had from start to finish of the process. It is also very helpful in ensuring we make the changes necessary to ensure the service supports the needs of our patients.

We hope that the articles covering Medical Treatment Overseas over the past few weeks have given individuals a better understanding on how the process works, if anyone has any questions relating to any of them then please do get in contact with the Overseas Medical co-ordinator who will be happy to answer any questions you may have.

Power Station can replace your faulty meter cards

ANYONE who purchases a faulty meter card should now take it directly to the Power Station and a member of staff will able to check the card and issue you with a replacement straight away.

In the past faulty meter cards could be taken to the Post Office and would be issued with a replacement immediately.

With the outsourcing of the Post Office, the public can no longer take a faulty meter card to Falklands Postal Service for a replacement.

Some members of the public had been somewhat disgruntled when they had recently gone to the Post office with their faulty card, and from there were sent to the Power Station - that was not the end of the trail however as there the card was stamped and verified by a member of staff before the owner was sent to the Treasury to be issued with a replacement.

Meter cards can be purchased from the Falklands Post office (FPS), Kelper Stores, Scafish Chandlery and the Falkland Islands Company Ltd.

Reveal the cannabis growers

I HOPE I am not alone in being somewhat shocked by the KEMH revelations about cannabis use and apparent cultivation in the Islands today. As we have a zero tolerance to drugs I assume that any evidence or suspicions that KEMH have are automatically passed to the RFIP? Or is it all tangled up in medical-in-confidence and human rights? Drugs are illegal and the law is the law - and surely trumps all that?

Anyone found to be taking any drug should be taken to court - if a PRP or resident - given a custodial sentence and if a work permit holder a brief custodial sentence and immediate deportation after. Let's keep our zero tolerance and not end up with a trendy liberal mess like so many other countries.

I am also surprised at the ambivalent attitude of FIG to repeat, albeit relatively minor criminal offences by a few work permit holders. As an employer we have to accept financial liability for the person's repatriation costs

If required - it is about time something useful was done with this. Any WP holder convicted of some minor offence, for example violent behaviour or serious drink driving, no insurance or theft that is, offences that risk others, should be given a written warning from the court in addition to any fine.

If that person comes in again then likely cancellation of their permit unless there are some very relevant special circumstances. At the same time it would not be a bad idea if all cases for say speeding had their penalties related to the offence and risk to others rather than their ability to pay which sounds to be happening at times. 





Over the garden fence with Ginge Kidd

SUCH was the level of boredom caused by the bad weather that while I did not pull out the duster and polish (perish the thought) I did, for the first time in many years, get the Christmas cake made a few months before it is required rather than the more usual, very last minute effort.

It is a good recipe but the extra time will allow the flavours. especially the brandy, to mingle in nicely. Also got the last of last year's berries out of the freezers and made into jams and jellies and so I did not feel too idle. I do enjoy making preserves and love to see the glowing colours of jellies in jars.

Recently we could be forgiven for believing spring had arrived, the temperature, according to our thermometer, never passed 13 degrees but that combined with a very gentle breeze made for a beautiful day.

Not one to miss such an opportunity. I decided the raised beds were warm enough to plant some small seeds. Having 'borrowed' a piece of wood from the resident carpenter measuring roughly fivefive inches wide and the length the width of the raised beds, I set to

I've always found bits of string for straight lines, especially when over such a short distance to be time consuming, so I use the board for marking and filling a row on either side of it, as I will not be stepping on these beds Five inches is wide enough for most vegetables, especially so for long roots, and my planting consisted of carrots and parsnips.

The seeds are in, the rest is up to nature

Today that means pretty high winds, so who knows how the seeds will fare, at least there is still plenty of time to plant more should there be a problem.

Inside the tunnels, which have been pretty well flooded throughout the last couple of months, carrots and other seeds have gone into styrofoam boxes. These should give them some root space and the bonus being fairly pest free, at least from earwigs who don't seem to like them, but the woodlice seem to thrive in those conditions.

Never did get to plant the garlic outside last autumn and so they have just been planted in the tunnel as well. The length of guttering is also being pressed into service as a pea seed-tray again but this year, in case we have a frost problem again, I have planted a back-up in modules.

Yesterday was such a pleasant day that I ventured on my board to see to the roses in the borders. I never tidy them before the winter



as I feel that the old wood gives them some protection during the cold months, so it was a matter of cutting them down to a tidy plant.

There is a lot said about the proper way to prune roses, but I've found treating them to a trim in the same way as a hedge works just as well and has no nasty side effects and does not affect blooming either.

Once finished 1 gave them some 6X fertiliser just to get them going, later it will be proprietary rose or tomato food to give strong growth and flowers.

The dwarf rhododendrons and azaleas bought from the garden centre last year got a snack of 6X also; again just to start them into growth, although I'm not sure they need any help as most of them are covered in flower buds, the resident rhodos are a little behind, but I've no doubt will catch up

While on the subject of feeding, I have been out and given all the fruit bushes and trees some fertiliser too.

In their case, potash for strong growth and fruiting. A little seaweed plant food made its way on to the strawberries and rhubarb. It could never be to rich for rhubarb, so when I've got a moment it will get a good covering of well com-



posted manure as well

My man has been out there rotovating the vegetable plots. I itch to get out there and plant, but am contenting myself by just planting early potatoes in the plots until the ground dries up a bit. By then hopefully the cabbages and all other greens will be large enough to harden off and put into the soil; meanwhile we will continue planting seeds of vegetables in the tunnels.

The tomato seeds have been pricked out, this year I have put them into root trainers so that they won't take up too much space in the porch (because I've done it again, about twenty varieties and nowhere to keep them until it warms up). They seem to be growing quite happily in those until it is time to move them into something considerably bigger.

In the flower borders all is not grass. The species tulips are flowering as are many of the daffodils, the grape hyacinths are starting to flower and the gorgeous scilla siberica with its lovely blue flowers is putting on quite a show too. The eranthis have finished and the snowdrops are almost done, as are most of the crocuses and all the early irises, the chionodoxas, flowering in white, pink and blue look wonderful, and so do the yellow erythroniums, the lilies are starting to poke their noses through and the fritillarias and eremurus also. Most of the hellebores are working hard out there and the various types of primulas are, as ever, giving their wonderful all.

Your questions

What sort of watering regime do you recommend for tomatoes grown indoors in pots?

Assuming these are fairly large plants in pots (not just seedlings) I would recommend a good watering every morning (not at night as a frosty night might damage them in an unheated greenhouse or tunnel). A good way to ensure water reaches the roots (and food once a week once they start to flower) is to put a small plastic bottle neck well into the pot (above left) or soil if planted in the border, cut the bottom off it and half fill it daily. A tall, thin plastic plant-pot will also do the trick.

What is the best time to plant swedes?

Many gardening books (and some gardeners too) will say that November is the month for planting swede seeds. I have always preferred to sow these seeds as soon as the ground is warm enough in October. They are very hardy vegetables so not affected by cool weather and planting this month allows a longer growing season for them. Send your questions to deputyeditor@penguinnews.co.fk



The battles of Coronel and the Falklands in the making

One hundred years ago this week - a daily diary of events leading up to the battles of Coronel and the Falklands by Islander and marine archaeologist Mensun Bound

Saturday 17th October 1914

Cradock: Cradock soon became close friends with Governor Allardyce, enjoying evenings with him at Government House and returning his hospitality on the *Good Hope*. The sight of Cradock striding along the waterfront to and from GH with his pet terrier was a common one. 'Cradock', wrote Allardyce, 'was an extremely nice man, one of nature's gentlemen. I saw a good deal of him, and we became great friends. He just came and went as he felt inclined, and we frequently took long walks together't.

Another who got to know the Admiral well was the Governor's ADC and Private Secretary T.N. Goddard:

'The Good Hope was here for some time before she went to find these swine. The admiral was a very brave old man; he knew that he was going to almost certain death in fighting these new and powerful ships and it seemed to be quite all right as far as he was concerned. I was dining with him one night and about the only thing I could find in his cabin was a piece of old cloisonce with the top knocked off. I asked him how it got broken and he said, "I got that in China when I was a lieutenant and I have carried it with me ever since and it has always brought me luck, but last month when we changed over into this ship from the Suffolk at half an hour's notice. I only managed to get on board with my dog in one fist and this vase in the other; and carrying cloisonee vases from one ship to another in mid-ocean isn't any fun, and I dropped this as soon as I got on the Good Hope and knocked its head off, and I am very much afraid that, that means I am not going to see those Germans at all

Evacuation: By now it was obvious to most that von Spee's squadron had concentrated off Chile and that it was overwhelmingly more powerful then Cradock's. Moreover, they realised that, in the Governor's words, sooner or later, the Germans 'would undoubtedly pay the Falklands a visit'.

On this day the Governor and the Admiral agreed that it was necessary to evacuate the women and children from Stanley, so the town's two leading employers, the farm owner Vere Packe and William Harding of the Falkland Islands Company, were summoned to a meeting the following day at Government House.

On this day Cradock put the squadron on half salt rations. Crews grumbled.

Von Spee: Von Spee convened a council of captains on *Scharnhorst.* From now on, he told them, sea conditions would deteriorate, and if the likely upcoming battle was fought in turbulent water, opening ranges should be kept at between 7,000 to 8,000 yards, but could be higher if conditions allowed.

Beatty: As we have seen, England's two top sea-Admirals, Jellicoe and Beatty, were deeply unimpressed by Churchill, but being on sea-keeping duties off Scotland there was little they could do to influence matters. Beatty, the more spirited of the two, had become so exasperated with the Admiralty that, on this day, he by-passed Jellicoe and wrote direct to Churchill:

At present we feel that we are working up for a catastrophe of a very large character. The feeling is gradually possessing the fleet that all is not right somewhere'.

Sunday 18th October 1914

Cathedral: On this day the Chaplain of the Good Hope preached at the Cathedral in Stanley. Amongst the congregation was 20-year-old Pearl Allan, a local beauty whose father, Alen Allen, managed Darwin, North Arm and Walker Creek. Pearl later described her life in Stanley during that epic year:

In the winter of 1914 I went to stay with Mrs Dean [at the corner of Villiers St and Ross Rd] and her adopted daughter Rissie who married Reg Pole-Evans. There were fifteen of us in the house and we tobogganed down the steep roads of Stanley Hill with an icy bath as the hazard at the bottom and we danced every evening and I fell in and out of love with distressing frequency'.

Pearl described the service at the Cathedral in a letter sent on the *Good Hope* to Lieutenant Harold Hickling on the Glasgow with whom she was enjoying an innocent flirtation:

Last Sunday the Padre of Good Hope, the Rev. Arthur Pitt, came ashore and preached at the Cathedral, it was packed, rather a change from Hobley. His sermon was most touching and I was not the only one who wept.

"...And after all it was Christ who made the supreme sacrifice so that we who came after him might be saved. The time may be not far distant when we may be called upon to do the same, and who are we to flinch from following Our Lord's example and laying down our lives so that our folks at home shall be saved from the domination of a ruthless foe. That reminds me, only yesterday I had the glad tidings that my wife had presented me with a daughter, our first born, I wonder if I shall ever see the bairn. And now to God the Father..."

After the service we all stood outside on the green chatting to the officers; the midshipmen and cadets in their Eton jackets and gold buttons looked such children'.

She recognized one of the boys as John le Geyt Pullen. Pearl had gone to school in England and John's sister had been in her class. John was only 15 years old and was one of the boys who at the start of the war was taken out of cadet school at Dartmouth and put on Monmouth and other ships. He rather shyly asked Pearl if she would send his mother and father some snapshots of himself taken on his first ship and some other little mementos he wished them to have. To this she agreed if he would deliver the above letter to Hickling on Glasgow. Le Geyt Pullen, whose name is on the Plymouth Naval Memorial, was to die 13 days later with the other boy cadets of Coronel, but as we shall see he did succeed in having the letter delivered.

Evacuation: In a letter to his head office in London, Harding informed them of the meeting at Government House to discuss the evacuation of Stanley:

'At the Governor's request Mr Packe and I called on him at Government House, and were informed that Admiral Sir C. Craddock (sic) had learned that 5 German cruisers had concentrated on the West Coast [of South America], and that he and the Governor took a serious view of the situation, in fact they had come to the conclusion that it was their duty to advise heads of families that women and children would be safer away from Stanley. The Governor said that the Admiral did not wish any notice to be published until after his departure on the 22nd instant, but I pointed out that if they intended to issue this advice at all it should be done as soon as possible, more especially as the s.s. Falkland would be leaving on the Tuesday for the West Falkland and could not be back for a week. The Governor said that the Admiral's opinion was that the Germans might slip through, and if they attacked Stanley, it would be in a week or a fortnight. In reply to our question as to whether a naval vessel could not be left, the Governor said the Admiral had received positive orders to go out and meet the Germans if possible, and he therefore had no option... The Governor desired that the Falkland should take out as many as possible to the West. and asked that a reduction should be made in the fares. Seeing that the usual fare carried with it the right to accommodation, and that it would be impossible to give this to the number who wished to go, I said that we would charge one half the tariff rate.


Easter Island: By this time the British archaeological party on Easter Island were becoming suspicious:

Rumours reached us', wrote Mrs Routledge, 'that there was something mysterious going on... On Sunday, however, news came which we could no longer wholly discredit. The German tobacco planter [who lived on the Island] had been on board, and the crew had disobeyed orders and disclosed to their countryman the fact that there was a great European war...'

That same evening, 18 October, they saw the squadron heading out to sea, their flagship leading the way. They were now six ships of the Imperial Navy (Scharnhorst, Gneisenau, Nürnberg, Leipzig, Dresden and Titania) and five steamers (Göttingen, Amasis, Anubis, Karnak and Baden). Their destination was Mas Afuera in the Juan Fernåndez group 1,550 miles to the eastward.

Churchill: We have seen that First Sea Lord Battenberg had, in effect, abdicated his authority to Churchill and, more than that, because of the very personal manner in which he had been victimized by a well-orchestrated hate-campaign of letter-writing and press comment, he had been reduced to but a husk of his former self.



SULIVAN Shipping Services Ltd welcomed a new launch to their fleet on Tuesday as the Fitzroy made her way into Stanley harbour at the end of her Falklands maiden voyage from Mare Harbour. The Fitzroy replaces the Frank Wild, a reliable work horse and a strong powerful boat which has served the company well for the last 25 years. And in the manner of her predecessor the Fitzroy was hard at work by 5.30am on Wednesday morning assisting Captain Stephen Clifton, as pilot, to put the trawler Costa do Cabo alongside FIPASS. Managing Director John Pollard told Penguin News that at this stage there were no plans for the Frank Wild, "other than to take her out of the water and give her the TLC that she deserves."

More responsibility for JPs and electronic tagging up for debate

EXECUTIVE Council have approved that all criminal proceedings will commence in the Summary Court before the Justices of the Peace under the new Criminal Procedure and Evidence Bill and confirmed the policy that people convicted and sentenced to imprisonment should serve two thirds of their sentence before remission is due. In the UK only half the sentence is served before remission is due.

Other aspects of the bill such as the removal of some exceptions to those eligible to serve on a jury and some simplification and updating of the principles for the sentencing of youths were also agreed, however the introduction of electronic monitoring tags was deferred for the time being as MLAs wanted to be assured they had considered all possible factors.

MLA Mike Summers said that although MLAs were minded to agree to the introduction of electronic tags. "insufficient information has been provided on possible objections to their use."

Electronic monitoring tags could be used by the court and the police to ensure that a person on bail, or a person convicted and sentenced, is in the location they are required to be at the appropriate time. Curfew tags are used as a bail condition to ensure a person returns home at an appropriate time and remains at that location. A curfew can also be imposed as one of a suite of conditions attached to a community order as a direct alternative to the imposition of a custodial sentence.

The Attorney General Peter Judge said it was believed that it could be an extremely useful tool where the public interest demands a restriction on movement during particular times of the night or day and has clear cost and resource saving benefits over the imposition of a custodial sentence.

Next week (Thursday and Friday) Legislative Assembly will hold a two day meeting as several bills are laid on the table including the Criminal Procedure and Evidence Bill and the Crimes Bill and the concept of electronic tagging will be further debated. MLA Summers said if that

MLA Summers said if that section of the Bill survives there would not be an automatic introduction of tagging but, "an ability to introduce it."

The judge has to be satisfied that suitable electronic tagging equipment exists before he can make any order to use it and it will be for Exco in due course, to receive proposals to acquire equipment, and to be satisfied on the many questions about coverage and accuracy, as well as the proposed uses, said MLA Summers.

Soldiers deny sex charges

IN the Senior Magistrates Court on Thursday, two members of the British Forces based at Mount Pleasant denied charges of sexual touching of a child under the age of 16, alleged to have taken place on June 1.

Christopher Clive Henry Beechey (22) and Mark Anthony Sampson (22) had their case adjourned for a pre-trial review to be held on November 18, and were released on unconditional bail. Falklands Legal lawyer Simon Crowder said both men had, had their tours extended until the end of the court proceedings and their Commanding Officer assured the court of their presence in the Islands for future court appearances.

He said both men had been back to the UK in the period since the offences were alleged to have taken place and had returned to the Islands willingly.

Low risk but contingency plans for Ebola in place

ALTHOUGH the threat of Ebola reaching the Falkland Islands is extremely low the Chief Medical Officer has made the decision that all shipping vessels leaving a country with a 'high' level of Ebola transmission (currently only Guinea, Liberia and Sierra Leone) would be refused clearance at our ports and any vessel seeking to enter would be isolated until 21 days after their departure from the West African country in question. This is part of contingency

This is part of contingency plans based on prevention, but with further contingency plans being laid down as a backup to a possible outbreak, it was noted in a Government press release this week.

The Falkland Islands contingency plans for Ebola are based on the assumption that there is a low, but nevertheless real, risk of importing a case of Ebola from West Africa.

The CMO has been in discussion with the Ministry of Defence at Mount Pleasant and contingency plans have been drawn up as to how to deal with a suspected case of Ebola in the Falklands. The situation is constantly being reviewed and plans altered, "according to the perceived level of threat to our country."

The virus is only transmitted by direct contact with the blood or body fluids (such as blood, saliva or vomit) of an infected person.

The incubation period of Ebola ranges from 2 to 21 days, and so whilst unlikely, it is not impossible that a person infected in Guinea. Liberia or Sierra Leone could arrive in the Falkland Islands. An individual infected with Ebola may arrive in the Falklands with symptoms that began prior to departure, or with symptoms that developed in transit, or they may arrive before developing any symptoms.

The threat of the virus arriving via airport routes is not impossible, but it is extremely low. It must be stressed you cannot catch Ebola through social contact or by travelling on a plane with someone who is infected, without direct contact with the blood or body fluids of an infected person.

It is also important to note that a person who is infected with Ebola is not contagious until they have a fever and start to become unwell.

Castro 'demands' BBC apology

ARGENTINA'S ambassador to Britain has demanded an apology from the BBC following the motoring show Top Gear's trip to the country last month.

The presenters and crew had to flee after they faced violent protests, during which rocks were thrown at them, for driving a car with licence plate H982 FKL interpreted by some as an insulting reference to Argentina's 1982 invasion of the Falkland Islands. The BBC insists the licence plate was a coincidence. The Argentine embassy in London said ambassador Alicia Castro had complained to the BBC about Clarkson's "provocative behaviour and offensive remarks toward the government and the Argentine people" and called for an apology. The BBC said it would follow its usual complaint procedures.

Sulivan's new work horse

Two possible replacements for the Sulivan Shipping vessel were identified several months ago, one in the UK and the other in Holland and so Sulivan's chief coxswain Lee Clement and Mike Pole-Evans in a consultant capacity travelled north to check them out.

The Holland vessel was duly selected and named *Fitzroy*.

Mr Pollard explained that the Sulivan launch crew had suggested re-naming her *Fitzroy*, "and with a keen personal interest in marine and Falkland history, for me the name could not have been better," he said

"Fitzroy had a part in our history and we, at Sulivan, are proud to perpetuate his name with our new boat."

Captain Robert Fitzroy commanded the Beagle in the southern ocean with the naturalist Charles Darwin on board in the 1830s, later in life he was appointed to head a department for the collection of weather data at sea, the department now known as the UK Meteorological Office, Ironically, as a devout Christian he was a fierce critic of Darwin's theory of evolution.

The *Fitzrov* is an aluminium boat built at the Menzer yard in Hamburg, powered by twin Scania marine diesel engines. She is 16.59 metres length with a beam of 5.58 metres and was used for inshore survey work in Holland prior to the purchase.

She was delivered to the Solent Refit yard in Southampton for a programme of works to prepare her for the trip south and her eventual new life in the Falkland Islands.

"These works included a re-modelling of the bow to increase her pushing capability, a new electronics package fitted by Simrad technicians and a complete re-paint in our preferred Sulivan red," said Mr Pollard.

Lee Clement spent several weeks in Southampton during the refit and was joined by Paul Anderson for the final stage of sea trials and the loading on to the Hurst Point at Marchwood for shipping to the Falklands. "Lee, Mike and Paul are all to be congratulated on a job well done," he said.

The Fitroy has had a full MCA inspection and carries a five year MCA Workboat certificate to fulfil her role as the main agency workhorse.

Runaway drink driver banned for three years

STANLEY man James Earl Hamilton Curtis (23) was banned from driving for three years and given a one year probation order for the offences of drink driving, obstructing a police officer in his duties and failure to wear a seat belt in the Summary Court on Monday.

Mr Curtis pleaded guilty to the offences on September 16, when the case was adjourned for a presentence report to be prepared.

The court heard that he had been verbally abusive, obstructive and at one point had tried to run away from the police on August 31, when the drink driving and obstruction offences had occurred. The failure to wear a seatbelt was on July 15 and followed a verbal warning in December.

Mr Curtis' defence lawyer Simon Crowder argued that a probation order was appropriate given the rapport already achieved with his social worker. He said his client was a hard worker by nature, employed as a driver and aware of the consequences of not having a licence.

Justice of the Peace Keith Biles reminded Mr Curtis that if the probation order was breached he would be re-sentenced for the offences and ordered £150 costs to be paid.

15 mth ban for Robert Duncan

Mount Pleasant man Robert Alfred Duncan (25) was banned from driving for 15 months and fined £500 after he admitted drink driving on October 4. Mr Duncan was stopped by a police officer on the verge alongside the Bypass in the Dean Street area at 2.05am when he said he was, "testing the four-wheel drive system on his Land Rover." A lower Camic reading of 67.2mg per 100ml of breath was recorded. Mr Duncan also had his licence endorsed and was ordered to pay £100 costs.

THREE men and a woman appeared in court on Thursday morning charged with various assault offences alleged to have taken place against George Toolan on June 29.

Bono John McKay (21) entered a guilty plea to an individual matter but denied the remaining offences of assault by beating and occasioning actual bodily harm. Arthur Leonard Pitaluga Turner (48) entered not guilty pleas to all charges as did Lauren Joyce McKay (19) including a further assault charge against Hannah Collier on August 16. Dylan Stephenson (22) did not enter a plea pending obtaining legal representation. All four are now represented by Simon Crowder of Falklands Legal.

The four were released on unconditional bail until November 18 when a pre-trial hearing will take place, but were reminded that as there was a witness intimidation allegation attached to the case and there was a, "need to tread carefully, the police will be watching," said Crown Prosecutor Simon Rowe.

Drivers fined

THREE people pleaded guilty by post to driving offences and were fined on Tuesday in the Summary Court.

Shane Leon Mitchell (23) admitted driving without a seatbelt, failure to notify change of ownership of a vehicle or have a valid vehicle licence. The court heard that Mr Mitchell had received a caution for not wearing a seatbelt at 10.45 am on September 20, but was again spotted and subsequently charged for the offence at 4.20pm the same day. He was also cautioned and fined in 2011 Checks on the vehicle revealed the other offences.

Justice of the Peace Keith Biles said Mr Mitchell had a somewhat repetitive history of failing to wear a scatbelt and handed down a fine of £166. For failure to notify and lack of vehicle licence he was fined £50 and £125 respectively. His licence was endorsed and he was ordered to pay prosecution costs of £125.

Elizabeth Bonner (25) was fined £130 for speeding and £125 for not having a valid vehicle licence. Mrs Bonner was recorded travelling at 35mph in a 25mph zone on Ross Road West on September 3.

Marc Ian Finlayson (31) was fined £165 after he admitted driving at 31mph in the 10mph zone of the FIPASS Causeway on September 6. Mr Finlayson and Mrs Bonner both had their licence sendorsed and were ordered to pay £85 prosecution costs each.

WE are expected to hit the ground running when we arrive back from work overseas so I try to keep up with everything while travelling. Sometimes that is not easy with unreliable hotel internet, in one case charged at £5 per hour. Difficult to believe perhaps, but I was very relieved to get back to my Sure silver package. predictable and considerably speedier than a number of the others I'd used while travelling It was surprising how poor the Wi-fi was at some of the conference venues given the numbers of people wanting to use it. On the plus side I detected a little more consideration and courtesy in people's use of mobile phones, perhaps some of the novelty has worn off.

LAST Monday evening, straight off the flight, I read through a fairly substantial set of ExCo papers in preparation for the review meeting at 8am on Tuesday when all MLAs have an opportunity to comment on the papers before they go to Executive Council the following day. ExCo members are not obliged to follow the advice of the other five MLAs but may take their comments into account when discussing the papers at Executive Council. In addition to normal meetings and other portfolio briefings I had the regular meeting with the Chamber of Commerce Board with my trade and industry hat on accompanied by the Honourable Michael Poole who is second MLA on that portfolio. This is a useful opportunity to catch up with a representative group of business people but is not the only way in which we receive representations from the business community who sometime have competing and conflicting interests.

Today. Monday we have had the last Select Committee before the Crimes and Criminal Procedure and Evidence Bills go to Legislative Assembly next week. These bills represent an enormous volume of work by Gillian Curl, others in the Attorney General's department, and most of my colleagues who had to plod through many hours of select committee. If passed next week they will update and simplify vast areas of legislation making them clearer and more accessible .

Shackleton **Scholarship**

DR BLANCA Figuerola from the University of Barcelona has been awarded a Shackleton Scholarship and will spend November in the Islands studying spatial patterns and bryozoan (a phylum of aquatic invertebrate animals) biodiversity from the Falklands and South Georgia Islands.

Dr Figuerola will work in collaboration with benthic experts and experienced divers in the Islands and told Penguin News: The bryozoan list produced during this visit will help to establish a regional biodiversity database of bryozoans.

"Moreover, the results will serve to design patterns of distribution and to compare these data with the rest of the neighbouring regions.

To carry this out, diverse sites will be selected around East and West Falklands and collections of samples will be made at each site in the intertidal zone and sublittoral samples will be collected by diving

The large marine collections of the local institutions (Shallow Marine Surveys Group (SMSG) South Atlantic Environmental Research Institute (SAEG) and the FIG fisheries department will be examined and identified. The project will also be supported by funding from the SMSG, the SAEG, the Fisheries Department and the British Antarctic Survey.

Guerrilla tourists: they're not worth it!

The Top Gear Incident is now visible only in the rear-view mirror as it slips into the distance behind the turbo-charged rolling diplomatic nightmare that is Jeremy Clarkson. But if I might apply the shiny disk breaks for just a moment, there is still something interesting to be said about this.

In the same week that Clarkson and his incorrigible chums were playing with number plates and in serious risk of becoming Top Gear a la planchain Patagonia, I noticed that someone had published on-line a video of an Argentine tourist playing the Argentine National Anthem on an electric guitar while standing in the middle of Ross Road. No doubt this smug-looking youth wanted to convey himself as a brave campaigner for the motherland, but it was noticeable that he didn't need much courage to perform his stunt. He was in more danger from an assault by logger ducks on the sea walf, whose slumbers had been disturbed, than from enraged Islanders. No one could be arsed to pull his plug, let alone chase him westwards and hang him from Britannia's statue on the 1914 Battle Memorial. If anyone saw him or (dear God!) heard him, he was recognised for what he was: a plonker of the first degree.

Of course, Islanders are used to such petulant and childish little demonstrations by visiting Argentines. Many a tourist has "courageously" smuggled an Argentine flag ashore and waved it briefly in Stanley or at the Darwin cemetery for the benefit of mobile phone cameras and the folks back home. And, franky, who cares? Most people recognise that such antics are of no consequence at all. They do not change the very comfortable Falklands status quo one iota. That being so, why should anyone be arsed to react?

I have, though, seen some among the Falklands Facebook chatterati venting their spleens over these things. Falki-facebookers sometimes conclude their postings with the demand that "something must be done!" Why not, say some, introduce legislation that would render such pro-vocative "incidents" criminal? My advice (sorry, I know you didn't ask for it) is this: any reaction, whether by officials or mobs, would only give the infantile nationalists a huge amount of satisfaction. What they want are reactions. It's great that they don't get them.

The understated message of tolerance is clear: "Unlike the community that wished to barbecue Clarkson and his chums, we are secure, confident and have much bigger and more

exciting things to think about than jingoistic guerrilla tourism."

Tourism Honour Shows the Falklands Have Arrived

While on the topic of tourism, many congratulations to the FI Tourist Board, the hoteliers, the Air Service, tour guides, shopkeepers, drivers and all others involved in the burgeoning industry, whose efforts led the industry magazine Selling Travel to recognise the Islands as "The Best Destination for Wildlife and Nature."

It is 20 years since 1 was involved in the pioneering phases of tourism development at home, so 1 m not familiar with the trade publications any more. But 1 would imagine that Selling Travel magazine is significant. Back in my time we would have considered it remarkable if such a magazine and the tourism professionals to which it caters even knew the Falklands' existed. That knowledge is clearly out there now, though.

It does not, of course, follow that there will be an immediate rocketing in tourism figures (even if that was desired). Distance from the markets, inadequacy of international flights, and the need to develop local infrastructure will keep a check on growth. But if nothing else, the award is evidence that the Falklands potential is now very widely known, and that has to be good for business.

So congratulations to those whose job it is to develop tourism and promote the Falklands. I hope it is the first of many such awards.

Ebola: Panic Must not Beat Pragmatism

I don't know how much thought is being given in the Islands to protecting the population against the possible arrival of ebola, the dreadful viral disease that is out of control in parts of West Africa. As it threatens to move to other continents, I would hazard a guess that there have been both measured debates about this in the corridors of the Secretariat, and panicky conversations about the risks in other parts of the community.

Panic is understandable, because this disease is truly terrifying. But fear needs to be controlled and the limitations of the threat need to be understood. Sadly that has not happened in the Caribbean, where a cruise ship carrying just one person who may have come into contact with an Ebola patient was denied permission to dock in Mexico and Belize, even though the potentially infected person had been quarantined in a cabin and has since been proven to be in good health.

Even in the UK, there is a strong under-current of fear, which would immediately ratchet up to terror if just one case of full-blown ebola was discovered among people entering the country.

Fortunately, the government is responding very carefully and doing nothing to exacerbate irrational fears (remember it is not an easy disease to catch), and doing a great deal to contain and treat the outbreak in West Africa, where the death rate is rising exponentially.

In fact, the UK, along with the USA and (bless 'em) Cuba have responded more than any



other states, by sending medical staff and field hospitals to Sierra Leone and Liberia. An old friend of the Falklands, RFA Argus, is now en route for Sierra Leone, carrying medical staff and a cargo of medicine, although, curiously, the ship will not accommodate ebola patients in its hospital. (As a merchant ship, Argus served in the Falklands war as Contender Bezant and was subsequently taken into permanent service with the Royal Fleet Auxiliary.)

Fleet Auxiliary.) The truth is that those of us who are fortunate enough to live in Europe and, for that matter, the Falklands have little to fear: quarantine measures can swing into action at very short notice, protecting the public from infected travellers.

My hero of the month is 29-year-old William Pooley, who contracted ebola while working in Sierra Leone. He survived because he was evacuated to the UK while his illness was still in the early stages. Now fully recovered, be has said that he will be returning to West Africa to help local people. Mr Pooley reminds us that we can still think altruistically rather than selfishly about this crisis. The disease needs to be brought under control in West Africa, but it will take a great deal less selfish worry and a lot more commitment to other countries than has been shown hitherto.

The Royal Marines 350 years of service

WHILE the Corps was formed on the 28th October 1664, the history with the Falkland Islands can be traced back as far as 1765 where, as part of Captain Byron's surveying expedition Marines first landed. A subsequent expedition a year later, under Captain Me-Bride, included 25 Marines and landed at Port Egmont, Saunders Island. The graves of those who died there from those early years remain, close to the ruins of the first settlement and barracks.

In 1833 Great Britain established a settlement on East Falkland at Port Louis, which until 1842 was administered by Naval Officers supported by detachments of Royal Marines.

In 1844 the settlement was moved to its present site of Stanley during which Royal Marines played a significant part in the development of the new Capital.

In 1864 on orders from the Admiralty, a detachment of Royal Marines arrived to form a permanent land based garrison. When not engaged in military duties the detachment carried out many projects for Government such as the construction of a new gaol and the road now known as Villiers Street. The detachment remained until the establishment of a civilian police force in 1878.

Since the turn of the last century, Royal Marines served on ships of the South Atlantic Squadron which regularly called at Stanley. The Battle of the Falklands in 1914 and the Battle of the River Plate in 1939 brought renewed contact with the Royal Marines, particularly through the detachment on HMS Exeter.

In post war years the Royal Marines presence continued. Naval ships embarked on ice patrol duties have always had Royal Marines on board, notably HMS



Protector and HMS Endurance. Between 1964 and 1982 Royal Marines maintained a continuous presence in the Islands as members of NP8901. Although NP8901 ceased to exist post 1982 several Royal Marines remained and settled after marrying local girls.

In 1976 the Honorary Freedom of Stanley was conferred upon the Royal Marines in appreciation of their close association with the Falkland Islands for more than two centuries.

The momentous events of 1982 merit particular recognition of the

On Tuesday Royal Marine Association Members and selected guests will go by helicopter to Saunders Island where a short service will be conducted in honour of the Royal Marines buried there. This will be followed by receptions on board HMS Iron Duke and at Government House with a 'tot' and photograph at the Royal Marines memorial on the way to MPA for a regimental dinner. Royal Marines, who, as an integral part of Operation Corporate, played an illustrious role in restoring freedom to the people of the Falkland Islands.

The Falkland Islands Branch of the Royal Marines Association is I believe, with only 18 members, the smallest RMA in existence worldwide and probably the most remote. We are however extremely proud to have served and cherish our distinguished history with these beautiful Islands.

From fighting on the decks and in the mastheads at the Battle of Trafalgar, through World War Two, to the modern day, leading the assaults on the Falkland Islands and Iraq and operating in Afghanistan, the Royal Marines are an integral part of Britain's defence and the Royal Navy.

Formed in the reign of King Charles II on October 28, 1664 as the Duke of York and Albany's Maritime Regiment of Foot (or Admiral's Regiment), the name Marines first appeared in the records in 1672 and in 1802 they were titled the Royal Marines by King George III.

Since then, Marines have taken part in more battles on land and sea around the world than any other branch of the British Armed Forces; so numerous are the Corps' battle honours they are simply represented by the famous Globe and the single honour 'Gibraltar'.

Today, the Royal Marines are the UK's Commando Forces and the Royal Navy's amphibious troops. An elite force held at very high readiness, they are trained for worldwide rapid response, able to deal with a wide spectrum of threats and security challenges.

ON April 5 Falklands resident Ken Passfield set off in his yacht Porvenir bound for the Chilean canals and then on to French Polynesia with partner Sally Poncet. This third part of his story for Penguin News covers their time in Polynesia WE arrived off the island of Man-

gareva in early July, 41 days out from Juan Fernandez. The anchor rattled down into an impossibly blue lagoon; the scent of flowers and land was almost intoxicating. Mangareva is the largest island in the Gambier group, the most easterly archipelago of French Polynesia. French Polynesia consists of 118 islands and groups of atolls scattered across thousands of square miles of ocean with a total population of 270,000.

The French Overseas Territories around the world have several different types of status; some such as Martinique arc full 'departements'. send MPs to Parliament in Paris, use the euro and are very much seen as an integral part of France. French Polynesia belongs to a slightly different category, having its own elected President and Government; however the Gendarmes are part of the French system, wear Inspector Clouseau hats on special occasions and always carry guns (an incongruous sight on a quiet tropical island). One gentleman we met told us that France feels an ongoing guilt over its nuclear testing in the Pacific and the fallout from that is that the cash keeps coming in to support the economy

One thing we found noticeable was the lack of overseas contract officers. There may be plenty up in Tahiti but the islands we visited had very few - the teachers, nurses and other professionals were nearly all locals, which shows the results of years of investing in education. Most foods are imported and there's a 'red-list' of basic foodstuffs subsidised by the Government. This is a good way to help people on low incomes, but some of these subsidised foods such as Australian cream crackers, Chinese tinned mackerel,

American tinned peas and even frozen Uruguayan beef, seemed a strange choice. Mangareva has about 1,000 peo-

ple, and is the largest of several islands in a big lagoon encircled by a fringing coral reef. With an anchorage sheltered from all wind directions (quite a rare thing in the Pacific we were to learn) it was the perfect place to relax after the once a year, for a month at Christcrossing and get the feel of Polynesia. The lagoon was dotted with bungalows on stilts where the work of seeding oysters was carried out. expense so you have to be really ill This involves introducing an irritant to the oyster around which a black pearl will form. Pearl farming is big business in French Polynesia and anywhere with suitable lagoons has its lines of oysters. It obviously pays well too, judging by some of the very nice houses dotted around the island and all the expensive new 4 x 4s. It is impossible to talk about Mangareva without referring to its history. There is a big stone cathedral that could hold the whole population twice over, and the rest of the island is dotted with churches, jetof these were in old gardens over the ties, stone walls and even the ruins of a nunnery, all built at the instigation of Father Laval, a megalomaniac Catholic missionary who arrived in 1834. Some accounts hold him responsible for the deaths of over 5,000 people and the destruction of the Mangarevan culture. 

After a week in Rapa we went north to Ile Raivavae, a three day run, and were pleasantly surprised to find the yacht Whanake already at anchor, with Chris and Suzanne. A few days later the Antarctic charter yacht Vaihere, a regular visitor to Stanley, arrived - moonlighting in the Pacific for a winter's charter. Raivavae is a stunning island, straight out of your Pacific islands holidays brochure. They have had an airstrip for about 10 years but are keen to keep tourism low-key and not be swamped by visitors, as has happened at Bora-Bora, near Tahiti. There were lots of dugout outrigger canoes, many with outboards, sitting under the trees but no-one was going out in them. On asking why, we were told it was winter so far too cold to go out on the water. Silly tourist question! After all it was a

Our final island in French Polynesia was Ile Tubuai, the 'capital' of Iles Australes. After Rapa, which had the feel of 1950s Stanley (I'm only guessing here), Tubuai scemed like a bustling metropolis with a supermarket, a pharmacy, a vet, two banks and a fuel station (all the other islands we had visited were still getting fuel in drums). It also has the secondary school for Iles Australes and a boarding hostel. The island is famous for its market field of carrots, cabbage, spuds and other veg including tomatoes, as well as the tropical crops of taro, coconuts, lychees and bananas. The carrots had not come up to scratch due to drought so were being fed to the horses. We met a lovely lady called Melodie who was kind enough to drive us around, show us the sights and tell us the legends of the mermaid who made the pass in the reef and the octopus who forms the mountain. Of course no-one really believes these old legends any more, but it's nice to know they are being passed on.

A barge had been sent down from Papeete to dredge the harbour approaches. After two days some of the locals, worried about sediment polluting the reef, picketed the jetty to prevent work taking place. There followed a very Polynesian protest with the demonstrators sitting calmly on grass mats on one side of the road and the contractors from Tahiti playing boules on the other side, probably enjoying the extra awayfrom-home allowance and hoping nothing would be resolved any time soon

It was very sad to say goodbye to Melodie, and to leave the day before the annual horse racing on the beach but time was passing and we had to get to New Zealand before the start of the cyclone season in the South Pacific. We sailed out of the pass at dusk, losing sight of the island quickly in the rain squalls.



Parent teacher new style info evening

PARENTS of Falklands' school children experienced a new style of information evening at the Falkland Islands Community School on Thursday, at which the pupils "journey" through school was explained by the Director of Education, Head Teachers and pupils.

MLA. Barry Elsby, the portfolio holder for education, introduced the presentation, commenting that their primary aim was to ensure every child achieved their full potential. He also emphasised that the parents also could play their part by demanding excellence from their offspring. Director of Education Annie Tempest went on to introduce the Head Teachers noting it was vital that not only did students have targets but were able to understand what those targets were, and in turn, what the next would be. She also spoke of the upcoming OFSTED inspection and how the schools were preparing for this.

Infant Junior School and Camp Education Head Teacher Karen Steen then guided parents through their child's journey



from nursery to the community school. She noted that the school worked closely with the local nurseries and a 'nursery alliance' had been formed, all of which contributed to the high quality of childcare and preparing the children to be ready to learn when they started school.

Ms Steen spoke of the early years and all of the key stages in the child's education, noting how the pupil was assessed through to the SATS tests prior to entering the Community School. Within the presentation school, within the presentation she also explained what would occur if, "something doesn't go to plan," including, "tracking," 'personalised learning,' and the use of advice from outside Ms Steen agencies. also explained the primary aims of the school improvement plan and outlined the school's wider curriculum

IJS/CE pupil Hugh Lilley gave a short and highly competent talk about his role as School Council Secretary, before FICS Head Girl Chelsea Middleton and Head Boy Jack Ford gave statements expressing their hopes for students. Chelsea noted that she wished for students not to simply settle but achieve the highest grades that they could, while Jack emphasised the importance of pupils enjoying school and learning, and achieving the best grades.

FICS Head Teacher Martin Winward then spoke to the many parents present of the transitions from the US through FICS, GCSEs and vocational pathways and on to higher education. He explained developments within the school, dynamic teaching and learning and the importance of exploring carcers and also self management.

The evening ended with an unexpected magic treat from teacher and magician Mark Harrington whose rope trick was used to illustrate the pupils learning journey from early years to further education.

The battles of Coronel and the Falklands in the making

One hundred years ago this week - a daily diary of events leading up to the battles of Coronel and the Falklands by Islander and marine archaeologist Mensun Bound

Saturday 24th October 1914 British dispositions: British dispositions: After leaving Stanley the Good Hope cut under the Falklands and then headed for Cape Horn. On this day she arrived at Orange Bay. After leaving Stanley Canopus went north-about around the Islands before heading for the Straits. Her carpenters were still working on the construction of an extra funnel to disguise her identity. Glasgow, Monmouth and Otranto were at their secret coaling base of Vallenar identity. within the Chonos Islands of the Chilean archipelago. In an attempt to raise spirits the Monmouth's brass band went on board Otranto to play for an hour in the early evening.

Cradock: Cradock was now caught up in a relentless flow of events against which he could do nothing with the likelihood of being able to stop von Spee still a worry.

Churchill: Having dismissed Battenberg, Churchill was now having problems instating Fischer. Nothing seemed to be working within the Admiralty and his position was still under pressure. He turned to Richmond who later recorded in his diary that he had never seen him so despondent.

Sunday 25th October 1914 Good Hope: Only a week had passed since the Rev Arthur Pitt had preached at the Cathedral in Stanley. He was depressed; while in the Falklands he had received a photo of his new-born baby which he believed he would never see.

Only two diaries have survived from the Good Hope, one that was sent home from Stanley, the other was that of Charles Gould, one of a lucky few sent ashore to set up an early-warning hill station at Vallenar and thus missed the battle. From his entries it is evident that the men of Good Hope knew they were doomed. On this day he described how at Sunday Service, the Rev Pitt, to illustrate a point in his sermon, took out the photo of his wife and baby, at which point he lost control and burst into tears. By the time the last hymn was over the entire congregation was weeping for their loss and the families they knew they would never see again.

Canopus: At 4.08 p.m. Canopus entered the Straits of Magellan. The strain was starting to tell on some of the crew. On this day Earnest Bunt, a 31 year old leading seaman from the RFR was reported for being 'strange in his manner'. He had gone up to an officer on the bridge saying, 'that he wanted to see the Germans and then proceeded to go up the mast and down the other side' When questioned by the Senior Medical Officer 'he attributed everything to worry concerning his wife whom he had only recently married'.

Darwin: The Darwin refugees were amongst the last to leave Stanley. Vincent Biggs' wife and children were on this boat including his 12 year old daughter Madge.

Darwin was much bigger than it is now. In a letter from Pearl Allen, daughter of the manager, we are given a picture of life at the settlement in 1914:

All the headmen and most of the shepherds were from the Highlands of Scotland and had the Gaelic. It was a delightful community All the dancers were in their Scottish style, reels etc. and the music supplied by the pipes and an accordion The three stations carried 400,000 There were cattle and sheep horses .. . I sailed, rowed, danced and in the winter we rode to Port Stanley and staved with friends The ride to Stanley took two days and the first stop being at Hill Head with the McLeods. Alice Felton and I did it in one day to stay at GH for a dance, it took us 15 hours. ... We had our evening dresses in our saddle bags. Mine was pink georgette and travelled well. Alice's was green satin and it took a lot of ironing to get out the creases ... Visitors from West Falklands and other islands and sheep stations came for what festivities were offering, mainly balls, theatricals and GH had drinks and soirees.

Monday 26th October 1914 Von Spee: On this day the German squadron arrived at MasAfuera (now better known as Alejandro Selkirk Island) in the Juan Fernandez Group about 370 miles from the Chilean coast. In dismal conditions that persisted throughout their stay they immediately began coaling. They were now in continuous W/T contact with Valparaiso. knew from Captain They Lüdecke of the Dresden that a British squadron had passed into the Pacific.

Cradock: By sound management and a little luck, Von Spee's men were always well fed, and this benefited morale. By contrast the British ships were ill-prepared for lengthy operations in distant

oceans; they lacked charts, suitable clothing and, above all, they were poorly provisioned to the extent that before this saga was over there would be a case of scurvy on both Glasgow and Kent, something that had not been seen in the Navy for many years. To help resupply the squadron Allardyce had given Cradock the Island's gold reserve (some £3,000), but this was not nearly enough. On this day Cradock signalled the Admiralty via Punta Arenas outlining the shortage and requesting six months of supplies be delivered by mid December.

The Admiralty responded immediately:

'We will send store ship to Montevideo. You are to send fuller information to Admiralty as to movements of ships under your command.'

Cradock replied: October 26th, 7 pm, at sea. With reference to orders in Admiralty telegram received on October 7th to search for enemy and our great desire for early success, consider it impracticable on account of Canopus slow speed, to find and destroy enemy's squadron. Have therefore ordered Defence to join me after calling for orders at Montevideo. Canopus will be employed on necessary conveying of colliers. Most respectfully submit that, from experience of August 6th, not to oppose depredations of *Karlsruhe.* May it continue until he meets vessel of superior speed.

It arrived the next day but Churchill did not see it until the following day.

Cradock had not been informed of the whereabouts of the Defence since 14 September and therefore assumed it was by then on the east coast. His reference to Karlsrühe was to remind them of the way in which the German cruiser had so easily out-run him on 6th August. Speed was everything, and none of Stoddart's ships could catch her. Therefore it would be wiser if Defence was with him on the west coast where her added firepower and revolutions might make the difference in a battle with von Spee. All this, however, was lost on Churchill.

Canopus: Sounding as she went, the Canopus passed up the Straits of Magellan until she was off Punta Arenas at 06.00 where she collected messages and intelligence from Consul Milward. At 18.25 she continued on her way westward_

Fisher and Beresford: The question that now arises concernswhy it took so long for Fisher to take up his appointment as First Sea Lord. The reason seems to have been the King. There were many who did not want Fisher back, and he was one of them. Although, during his first tenure as Sea Lord, he had built the Royal Navy into the finest fighting force in the world, he was, as a person, opinionated, devious, cantankerous, insensitive and, in general, collected enemies like Edwardian schoolboys their stamps. He had left the Navy a house divided and the King feared that now, in time of war, it could happen all over again.

Richmond: The opportunity for a countermove against von Spee had now passed. Richmond still blamed Sturdee: "He suggests nothing himself", fumed Richmond, 'but blocks every proposal for any action As it is now, the complacency is appalling. While the enemy is making every possible preparation to attack us, we sit and twiddle our thumbs (we) have no fixed ideas of any kind. These comments complete the picture of an institution bereft of vision, poorly ruddered and lacking the animus to act. Remarkably, just a few hours after these words were written, the Navy would suffer its heaviest loss to date - the sinking of the Battleship Audacious. Tuesday 27th October 1914

Audacious: Since the start of war Richmond had been speaking out about the need to stop Germany from laying mines off the British coast. As so often, he was proved right. At 08.45 the Battleship Audacious, that had been in commission for only a year, hit a mine and sank. Jellicoe proposed, and Churchill and the Cabinet immediately agreed, that the loss should be concealed from the public. For the remainder of the war she remained on all open lists of ship movements; it was not until after the armistice that her loss was officially reported in The Times.



Not ripping off the Islands says new FIC Chairman

WITH an on shore investment of £7 million over the last five years and a further £25 million planned for investment in the Islands over the next five years, the Falkland Islands Company (FIC) is "not ripping the Islands off," newly appointed Non-Executive Chairman Dick Sawle told Penguin News this week.

The FIC is an important company in the fabric of Falkland Islands society, said Mr Sawle, adding that speculation that it was trying to buy up local businesses and create a monopoly, was completely unfounded.

He said the role of the company within the Islands had changed and there was more emphasis on wanting to work with the private sector.

The FIC wants to grow its interests in the Falklands, said Mr Sawle adding that the recent amalgamation of Turbo Tim's and the FIC garages had in fact resulted in prices being reduced, "which has to be good for the man

Bactec awarded demining contract

CONTRACTS have been awarded to two companies for the next phase of work to clear minefields laid by Argentina in 1982. Bactec International has been awarded the Land Release contract which will involve surveying suspected hazardous land and removing any contamination while Fenix Insight will deliver the Demining Project Office, providing quality assurance. Over the two year project, a minimum of 23 mined areas will be cleared, as well as one further area of suspect land which will reduce the number of remaining mined areas in the Falkland Islands from 108 to a maximum of 85.

on the street," he said.

There are further plans to build a new garage to house the extended business and also to provide a modern and professional servicing centre.

The company had succeeded in attracting inward investment in the Islands and as a result 110 per cent of last years profits were invested in the Islands. This would not have been possible without instilling confidence in outside investors, explained Mr Sawle.

As part of his new role Mr Sawle said he particularly wanted to tell people about how the company operated now and share the plans for the future rather than dwell on how it was 100 years ago.

Nowadays the FIC's profits are just over £1 million, "which is certainly not outrageous for a company with more than 200 employees," said Mr Sawle, adding that last year £4 million was paid to local businesses, tradesmen and suppliers as well as £3 million in wages resulting in half a million to FIG in income tax as well as the company paying Falklands taxes.

FIC's scheme for first time buyers had proved very popular and had helped many young people including his own daughter get on the housing ladder, said Mr Sawle, adding that this initiative had also alleviated the pressure on the Government to put a scheme in place.

The company also offers training opportunities and Mr Sawle said he was keen to see this develop and would help put interested parties in touch with the right people within FIC. "There are schemes in place and other ideas are welcome," he said.

Recognising that growth was dependent to some degree on the outcome of the next oil rounds, Mr Sawle concluded: "The FIC is looking forward to being a major player in the economic development of the Islands," Mr Sawle, a former member of the Legislative Assembly from 2009 to 2013, took up the post of Non-Executive Chairman on Monday.

He will work closely with Roger Spink, General Manager of FIC, and with John Foster the Group Managing Director.

David Hudd, Chairman of the parent company Falkland Islands Holdings, said he was, "delighted to welcome Dick to FIC. His knowledge of the Falklands will bring additional expertise and insight as we continue to invest for the next stage of the company's growth".

Mr Sawle is currently the Principal Complaints Commissioner for the Falkland Islands, a Justice of the Peace and Chair of the Citizen's Advice Bureau. Prior to being elected he was Managing Director of his own fishing company and sold all of his business interests prior to entering the Legislative Assembly.

Special Needs Teacher dies suddenly at home

THE inquest into the death of Kathryn McGeachie (54) was opened and adjourned in the court of her Majesty's Coroner on Monday afternoon.

Mrs McGeachie who has worked as a Special Educational Needs teacher for the Education Department for the past five years was discovered dead in her flat on Jersey Road on Sunday by fellow teachers Jenny Sol and Crarg Scott.

Becoming concerned for Mrs Mcgeachie's well being after she had failed to respond to telephone calls and a visit to her flat Miss Sol had climbed through the kitchen window and found Mrs McGeachie in bed.

Mrs Faulds said the event had "shaken the community," and she shared the court's concern for Mrs McGeachie's close friends in the Islands and family overseas.

The inquest was adjourned to a date to be fixed for further investigation and a post mortem to be carried out.

The Falkland Islands Govern-

ment extended their condolences to Mrs MeGeachie's family at this very sad time.

"She was a teacher and friend to many in the Islands, and was much loved by staff, parents and students," said a spokesperson.

The Director of Education, Ms Annie Tempest and Headteacher of FICS, Mr Martin Winward said 'Mrs McGeachie was very much part of our team at school and a wonderful teacher. She will be greatly missed by all members of our school community, which will unite in this time of grief.'

On Thursday the inquest into the death of Isobel Mary Williams (59) was opened and adjourned in the court of her Majesty's Coroner, Clare Faulds.

Mrs Williams died on board the cruise ship Ushuaia and was formally identified by her husband at the KEM Hospital on October 29 after the ship called into Stanley.

The inquest will resume at a date to be fixed.

Honouring Royal Marines at Saunders Island

Royal Marines celebrate 350th anniversary

MEMBERS of the Royal Marines Association (RMA) in the Falklands took part in a heetic schedule of events on Tuesday as they celebrated the 350th birthday of the Corps.

The day started at 7.30am with a helicopter pickup from the FIDF. The party consisted of local RMA members, selected Military representatives from MPC and five of the 16 Marines currently visiting the Islands. They travelled to Port Egmont on Saunders Island to purposely lay a wreath at the grave of a Royal Marine, buried there in 1765.

The wreath was laid by WO1 RSM Steph Moran RM (Former RSM of 3 Commando Brigade) with the short service being conducted by Naval Chaplain Keith Robus. The service was held at the small cemetery by a small cairn and plaque, dedicated and unveiled in 1997 by Major General D A S Pennefather CB OBE the then Commandant General of the Royal Marines.

After the service the party visited the site and ruins of the former Royal Marines barracks near the water's edge before returning to Stanley to attend a lunchtime reception hosted by the Captain and crew of HMS *Iron Duke*. During the reception, the RMA, their partners, invited guests and all 16 visiting Royal Marines were given a guided tour of the ship and an extremely realistic demonstration of the ships capabilities.

RMA Chairman Curly Elstow said it was very poignant for some of the veterans who had come under fire aboard ships in 1982.

His Excellency the Governor Colin Roberts CVO hosted a reception at Government House from 4.30pm which was attended by invited guests of the RMA. Governor Roberts commented that Government House should be a home from home for Royal Marines, their families and friends. "Just look around and you'll find all kinds of mementos of Royal Marines that have been before." He referred to the special relationship Royal Marines have with the Falklands, adding that the evidence, "is in those who have made the Falkland Islands their home,"

A Royal Marines Association Falkland Islands plaque was presented to His Excellency the Governor in appreciation of the reception.

Both former and serving Royal Marines then gathered at their "Royal Marines Rock" on the sea-front for a group photograph before being transported to Mount Pleasant for a 350th celebratory Regimental Dinner, chaired by WO1 RSM Steph Moran RM and with speeches from Curly Elstow, WO1 RSM Steph Moran RM and Major Molly MacPherson RM.

"The 350th Anniversary of the Royal Marines is a momentous milestone in the history of our Corps. We feel extremely honoured to have had 16 serving member's travel 8,000 miles to attend our celebrations and we thank them all for making the journey. May our historic ties with the Falkland Islands continue for the next 350 years and beyond," said Mr Elstow.

beyond," said Mr Elstow. WO1 (RSM) Steph Moran RM said that for the16 Royal Marines who made the journey, "this has become the most special and unique of our 350th year celebration. The fact we have seven men who fought in the campaign in 1982 makes this pilgrimage all the more special. The Falkland Island RMA and the residents of this small, special but vitally important part of our United Kingdom have made us as welcome as long lost family members; and for the fine men that fought in 1982 and the men that made the ultimate sacrifice I feel that's exactly what they have become. The welcome we have received by the people on the Islands has been

truly humbling and has confirmed that some things are truly worth sacrificing and fighting for. This truly is a journey that will never be forgotten and on behalf of The Royal Marines on our 350th birthday - Thank You."

The Chairman and Committee of the RMA thanked all those who had taken part and helped make the day such a memorable one.

Marine Luxton

ONE of the earliest Marines with descendants still in the Islands that we are aware of, was marine William Luxton who arrived in 1859.

William spent 10 years with the garrison before he demobbed and returned to the UK

Having found himself a wife, William returned to the Falklands and settled where he and his wife worked for Mrs Orissa Dean at Stanley Cottage

as gardener and housekeeper. His son William Henry Luxton later went to Port Stephens on West Falklands to work and eventually became assistant manager. Meanwhile further north, the farm now known as Chartres had run into difficulties and William Henry was sent there to manage it by Mrs Dean who was co-owner with a Mr Anson. When Mrs Dean died she left him her two thirds

share in the business. However Mr Anson was reported to be overly fond of "fast women and slow horses," and each time he found himself in financial difficulty, he sold off more shares to William Henry.

The shares were handed down through the family until eventually full ownership was obtained. The land remains under the Luxton ownership of Bill and his son Stephen. If you know of any other families descended from the early marines, Penguin News would like to hear from you.

UK MPs to visit the Falklands

TWO UK MPs Yvonne Fovargue and Guy Opperman will be visiting the Falklands from 13 to 18 November, accompanied by Falklands government representative in London, Sukey Cameron MBE.

A full agenda of interviews and visits with government, the private sector and at MPA has been programmed for the two MPs who have a special interest in the Falklands.

Ms Fovargue from Makerfield. North West, is shadow Defence minister having reached parliament after winning a women-only selection to succeed the former Minister Ian McCartney who stood down through illhealth (and after problems with his expenses) in 2010. She is the first female MP for the former mining constituency.

MP Opperman represents Hexham, North East and is PPS to James Brokenshire as Minister of State for Security and Immigration. Home Office, and has declared among countries of interests the Falklands. India and Syria. A member of the Society of Conservative Lawyers, Opperman said he became a lawyer because he was not good enough to be a professional steeplechase jockey, and because his first novel was turned down.

In 2011 he initiated a debate on the future of the Falkland Islands, in which he was critical of the Foreign Office, calling for more robust diplomacy.

War film show at the Chamber

SEVEN Days Down South: a war story, will be shown in the Chamber of Commerce meeting room on Wednesday November 12 The film represents Dr David Jackson's return down south on the anniversary pilgrimage in November 2007. It is the first and only doctoral dissertation that is about the aftermath of war and how war impacts on a person's life. It was submitted to the University of Bristol in 2010 and David was subsequently awarded his Doctor of Education in 2011. The film was shortlisted by the Qualitative Inquiry for the Dis-sertation of the Year 2013.

LAST Tuesday we had a useful 'away morning' with senior officials on budget and on Island Plan progress. It is good to check on progress as the plan has some ambitious items which it will be difficult to complete in the three years that remain in the life of this Assembly. Past experience also shows that new priorities emerge, sometimes items that could not have been anticipated at the time the plan was made so inevitably some items will slip.

PLANNING and Building Committee including members of the Historic Buildings Committee met last week to discuss the Development Plan which then has to be cleared by Executive Council for the next stage of the statutory consultation which must take place before the plan is finalised and put in place. We had a good discussion on the many proposals included and were in danger of overrunning our allotted time at the Chamber of Commerce. A considerable amount of time was spent talking about trees with some interesting views emerging. While we do not have any thousand year old trees many believe that those trees we have generally enhance the town. I support the idea that when trees have to be cut down for good reason we should encourage alternate planting either in a different place or of a more suitable type.

THIS week the public meeting on the Capital Programme predictably involved a lengthy discussion on the merits or otherwise of the raised crossings on Ross Road which are designed to allow those walking along the seafront to skirt some of the commercial premises. I confess that I rather like them but agree that there needs to be an information campaign to clarify their use. At the same time it may be useful to remind some drivers of the rules regarding other marked crossings which seem to be blatantly ignored on an almost daily basis with drivers even parking on the one on Reservoir Road. It would also be helpful if drivers used their indicators consistently as pedestrians and other drivers need to know which way they are about to turn.

The importance of powers of attorney

OFTEN people think about using a power of attorney because they want somebody to act on their behalf if their health deteriorates. Although this is an important use of a power of attorney which will be discussed in this article, there are many other situations when appointing someone as an attorney may be appropriate.

Many Islanders choose to leave the Falklands for weeks or months at a time. Yet what happens if you are in business, or want to sell a property? Who can sign documents on your behalf if you are away? Who can help manage your personal affairs if an emergency occurs while you are abroad? Alternatively, who will act for you if you become seriously ill or have an accident either at home or abroad? These issues can be resolved by appointing an attorney

Types of Powers

The key legislation in this field is the Powers of Attorney Act 1971 and the Enduring Powers of Attorney Act 1985. For practical purposes there are three types of power of attorney: general powers; specific powers; and enduring powers.

General powers have a wide scope. They empower the attorney (the agent) to sign any documents or enter into any transactions on behalf of the donor (the person who is granting the power).

A specific power has a far narrower scope. It could allow the attorney to act for the donor only in relation to a particular matter such as managing a share portfolio, or only within set financial limits. It is important that the deed clearly sets the parameters of the attorney's powers including any time limit.

Enduring powers are commonly used by elderly people who wish to appoint a family member to manage their affairs. Enduring powers of attorney specifically provide for the donor's mental incapacity and the subsequent continuation of the attorney's powers Additionally, there may circumstances where you can appoint someone to act as your agent without granting a power of attorney, but you can only do this in limited circumstances such as authorising a secondary signature on bank accounts or appointing an agent to help file your tax return.

How can you appoint an attorney?

To be legally binding a power of attorney requires a written document that must be executed and writnessed as a deed. Depending on the type of power of attorney you want to grant, the document may have to be in a very specific form. If you informally or verbally appoint someone then they will not have the legal authority to act on your behalf and cannot be your attorney.

Who can be your attorney?

It is vital to make sure that you select somebody in whom you have



complete trust, and feel confident that they will be able to perform their duties correctly and in accordance with your wishes. The attorney can be a friend, relative or partner.

Some things you should consider are: how well do they look after their own affairs/finances?

- how well do you know them?
- do you trust them to always act in your best interests?
- will they be happy to make decisions for you on your behalf?

When granting a power of attorney you can appoint one or more attorneys. If you appoint more than one attorney, you can specify whether they have to make a decision collectively or are each allowed to act on their own without first seeking agreement from the other attorneys.

How can you end a power of attorney?

General and specific powers can be terminated by the donor telling the attorney that they are revoking their appointment.One of the best ways to evidence this is by creating a deed of revocation. A general or specific power will automatically end if the donor loses mental capacity.

It is a sensible precaution to notify any third party who has relied on the power of attorney (such as the Bank) that it has now been terminated, so that they know that the attorney no longer has power to act for the donor.


In addition, a specific power will expire if the transaction for which the power was granted has been completed or the relevant time period has ended.

An enduring power can be revoked at any time before a person's mental capacity is lost but can only be revoked by a formal deed of revocation. Again, it is a sensible precaution to notify third parties

Conclusion

A general or specific power of attorney is a useful tool for anybody who is going abroad and requires somebody to look after their affairs, but an enduring power of attorney is appropriate for anybody who wants to make provision in case they have an accident or their mental faculties start to wane. In every case take time to consider what is appropriate in your particular circumstances, and always ensure you appoint as an attorney only somebody in whom you have complete trust. Need for more FIG houses to be built

THE amount of available Government housing is on the increase with financial provision for up to 66 units within the capital programme and 20 of those completed to date.

Director of Public Works Manfred Keenleyside said that of the 20 completed 10 were already on line and 10 constructed by Morrison (Falklands) Ltd as a result of an open tender, were due to come on line in February. A further six houses being built by Paul Chapman are also expected to be finished by the end of the calendar year.

The construction of a further 30 houses is to go out to tender and Mr Keenleyside said the Government was looking for alternative ways to get the private sector involved with providing government housing.

This could be addressed by companies sourcing, importing and constructing housing which the Government would then purchase, building houses as a baseline or even building and maintaining properties for an agreed period and price.

Mr Keenleyside said tender- s

ers would be asked to submit an alternative tender alongside the current system whereby FIG buys houses and pays for their construction so that if a suitable alternative is not found, the old system could be reverted to.

He said FIG had been looking for some time for ways to get the private sector more involved and hoped that the time might now be right for it to be viewed more favourably.

At a recent meeting of the Housing Committee the housing pool was described as healthy, with a reduction in waiting times for the more urgent cases which was due in part to several properties being vacated over recent months by tenants who have built their own homes, and other tenants who have moved in with relatives in order to save money to build homes.

At Monday's Public Meeting Mr Keenleyside said the uptake of the plots at Sapper Hill had been good with 44 taken by private individuals on the first loop leaving just four available and on the second loop a further 38 were still available.

Ian Sargent to take on prison management

DIRECTOR of Emergency Services Barry Marsden has announced the appointment of Ian Sargent MBE to Prison Manager for HMP Stanley, to commence employment November 11.

Mr Sargent joined the UK prison service in 1994 and progressed through the ranks to Senior Management level. He was involved in key strategies in the UK prison service in dealing with offender management, piloting the national offender management model and regional responsibilities for the management, advice and guidance of new sentencing procedures.

In 2010, Mr Sargent was appointed as the Director of the Prison Service for the Turks and Caicos Islands, and was awarded an MBE in 2013 for his work in the development and reform of the Prison Service in that British Overseas Territory.

On notification of his appointment as Prison Manager for the Falkland Islands, Mr Sargent said: "I am honoured and excited to have the opportunity to be involved in the management and future development of the prison service in the Falklands Islands. I very much look forward to structuring a system that both the Government and the Falkland Islanders can be proud of, and have confidence in. I also look forward to working for the community and meeting the people of the Islands that I have heard so much about."

Director of Emergency Services, Mr Marsden, added: "We are extremely fortunate to have attracted such a high calibre and experienced individual as Ian. There is a tremendous amount of work required to change the prison regime and further develop the culture where educational, rehabilitation, and resettlement programmes are seen as essential parts of a persons term of imprisonment. I am sure Ian will make a huge contribution."



Horse care in Stanley yards

THIS is the time of year when horses return to Stanley for the summer period. Please take some simple precautions before you place your horse in one of Stanley's many grazing plots around town.

Check that the area is suitable for keeping a horse ie adequate grazing, in a neat and tidy condition (no bits of wire, tin, roofing or cladding material, piles of timber etc etc), no sharp stones or boulders, no deep holes (especially deep narrow holes) and with an adequate and well maintained fence around the perimeter. A bit of time spent cleaning up a grazing plot can save so much hassle later on.

Florses are very prone to injuring themselves especially on their lower legs and feet and wounds in this area can be difficult and time consuming to treat and heal. It is always much better if the horse doesn't get injured in the first place than having to deal with consequences of an unnecessary injury.

Please take a small amount of time to look around the yard or paddock to check that the environment is totally safe for your horse and do this each time you move your horse to a new area for grazing.

In the case of horse injuries, prevention is definitely better than cure.

Country size does count

REFERENCE your comments on fresh food prices in PN October 17. It is a simple case of geography and population.

geography and population. We are too few and live in a remote part of the world and off the commercial track. Give the Islands a population of 30,000 and the ball would change.

Example: We purchase two, one ton pallets of apples every two months. Wow!

Same apple exporter in Chile sells 10 x 40ft containers with 22 pallets inside EVERY WEEK to say Tesco. Tesco thus have power to negotiate on price – we don't – we probably pay the same price in Chile before freight and a margin to us and Stanley stores that Tesco then RETAIL same apples for in England! Plus Tesco have a choice of many large shipping companies to Europe, all competing with each other. Large ships can charge less per container than small ones as lower unit costs. We are small and remote so have one small shipping line (which does its best).

For high value short life fruits and mushrooms, Western Europe has 350+million people, thousands of efficient longhaul 40ft container trucks(and roads!) hundreds of economical 90 ton air freighters a week, dozens of huge container ships a week – all competing for freight. The Falklands has one small

The Falklands has one small shipping line that can handle 40ft chillers and one small aircraft a week that can just carry cartons of loose freight – not pallets – and no temperature control.

Example: it costs over £2.20 a kilo net product freight Chile-Falklands (and that is before you add in damage losses, bruising etc) you can probably airfreight fresh freight Chile - London for less if a big operator. Big planes are cheaper per kilo and bigger busy airports cheaper to land at – MPA is possibly worlds most expensive - because of little use.

Example: Some time ago Jan and I were at a Trade Fair in UK and were ordering products, maybe one or two cases each. Next to us was a supermarket buyer ordering same goods by the lorry load each product – result – he was being offered prices 40 per cent BELOW our purchase price! Simple business reality on any product the Falklands needs to import.

Local production – we have the same investment in growing systems in a half acre greenhouse that a UK grower has in a 5 acre on, so ours = 10 times more investment per lettuce to try and recover! Field crops – we have no economies of scale and poor soils and a harsh climate – all = \pounds s. So much as I love my coun-

So much as I love my country – small is NOT always beautiful! People have to accept reality. It would be so nice one day to have the occasional comment on the wide range of all products- not just fresh – that you can buy in Stanley shops in such a small remote place. For those who come to our Islands and constantly carp and moan about food prices – you actually are not forced to live here!



Page 9 Over the garden fence with Ginge Kidd

WELL, every second or third day might be awful but I think we can say spring is here, the plants are in no doubt about it anyway, and all seem to be rushing to show off their very best clothes. At the moment it is the daffodils stealing the show, and there must be at least thirty different ones, each lovelier than the last, both the tiny ones and the larger ones we are more used to seeing. They are all impressive.

The tulips are just coming into their own, with a few already opened, I always wonder just what colours will appear (and where) for rather like some patches of crocuses end up being white with a lilac tinge whatever they started out as so too, do tulips, except in their case, it's yellows and reds which predominate, never mind, they are all beautiful anyway.

It has been a rather busy couple of weeks since I last wrote, as at this time of year everything is demanding attention. Finally all the small seeds are in and, hopefully, will remain in their positions and sprout, rather than disappear in the high winds; someone must have got our carrots last year, it certainly wasn't us!

Bill has made wire-netting covers for the raised beds, they give some protection from weather, cats and pesky birds. The rest is up to us. Armed with many packets of all sorts of veg such as lettuce, beetroots and turnips I planted seeds to my heart's content. Having bought fresh parsnip seeds I then made drills, about an inch deep, poured water into them and soaked them well before planting the seeds thinly in them. parsnips take even longer than carrots to germinate and three weeks is about normal so I also

pop in a few radish seeds in every row before covering both with some soil and patting it down, this way I will know where the row is when the weeds need to be cleared away. Most other seeds are just waiting for the right conditions to germinate, none proving as troublesome as parsnips although some people find difficulty germinating parsley which actually is quite easy to grow using the wet drill method or if the weather is very cool, in a pot indoors.

The potatoes have also been put in the ground, it is early for the main-crop ones but, those which were missed in the ground last year are putting on growth so it can't be too cold for them.

All the young 'greens' have been hardened off and planted out as have the peas Jasmine planted up some more peas inside, we should have enough this year to get some as far as the cooker? Either way, they will be enjoyed by the kiddies who should also have loads of fresh carrots this year as well as quite a lot have been planted under cover too. Also in the tunnels, I have planted some runner beans, they should do well and we love them. The tomatoes are also all in their positions under cover and growing strongly. Next week I hope to put the various marrows and pumpkins in the borders under glass where they will get all the warmth and sun available

Last week we had the small children from Miss Nightingale's class up to visit the garden, it was a beautiful day and both morning and afternoon children walked up with their carers. Sasha had popped some main-crop peas into little pots and each child had one to take away. Brian will very kindly provide them with some support when they grow tall

Thad a preview of the new roses at the Garden Centre. Oh my!

Jan very kindly let me have the ones I wanted so I could harden them off and plant them out when convenient, I am NOT going to



mention how many I got as Bill sometimes reads this but.... there were rather more than a dozen!

Anyway, I cleared the areas I wanted to put plants in (hopefully will get the rest done soon now that the veg garden is planted) and the roses went into the borders, well some of them anyway, some lovely climbing ones have gone against a fence between the house and the veg garden. All this planting out has meant many empty pots awaiting soapy water and scrubbing brush and all were sitting in the tunnel where they end up at the end of the day, always with the best of intentions of cleaning up the mess, but, 'not today'. Well that last nasty day was my 'tomorrow' and I had no excuses left. Once started it all cleared up quite quickly, and once stacked it wasn't as bad as I thought, although the pyramids of dirty plant pots and seed trays looked massive, an hour's work saw the tunnel cleared of them and a lot more space for more 'goodies'. Having washed the pots as well I'm now resting on my laurels, well, for the moment anyway.

The daily job, (and sometimes twice a day when it is warm), at the moment, is the watering of all plants growing under cover. The raised beds also require quite a bit of water, having the soil damp helps with germination but also helps to stop the seeds blowing away as they might if they were just sitting in dry dust, they and the swedes planted in open ground on another plot, are growing well.

Historic pictures gifted to museum

WITH the 100th anniversaries of the battles of Coronel and the Falklands drawing ever near, the Museum was the grateful recipient of a large collection of photographs and other relevant documents from local collector and maritime historian Robert Rowlands on Friday.


TAKING full advantage of the warm weather the Watch Group took part in a Beach Clean Challenge at Whale Bone Cove on Saturday.

Strange fish identified as banded bellowfish



EARLY this month the crew of the Falkland Islands trawler *Argos Figo* found a strange looking fish when they were sorting catches.

Lars Juergens an observer onboard who has more than seven years experience in Falkland fisheries, was shown the fish but even to him the species was unknown.

He took it back to Stanley to the Fisheries Department and after searching the scientific literature, the fish was identified as *Centriscops humerosus*, the banded bellowstish. The animal was a female, 21cm long and found in a bottom trawl at a depth of 226 metres.

Mr Juergens said it was known that this species could live to a maximum depth of 1,000 metres, but usually lived between 400 to 750 metre depth. The fish feeds on small invertebrate animals on the sea floor like crustaceans and

worms. Photos were taken of the fish and sent to Dr Clive Roberts. a fish specialist and New Zealand museum curator who confirmed its identity. According to him, the banded bellowsfish is common in the waters around New Zealand and Australia, but rare in the Southwest Atlantic. There is one reference for the species off Rio de La Plata (37° S), and another one for Tristan da Cunha and Gough Island. As such, this new find represents the first record of the species for Falkland Islands waters, and a range extension for the SW Atlantic to 52° S.

"It's amazing that even after 30 years of fishing around the Falklands, we are still making new and interesting discoveries", commented Dr Sasha Arkhipkin, Senior Fisheries Scientist.

The specimen is now preserved for further research.

THE South Atlantic Environmental Research Institute (SAERI) will soon be celebrating the second anniversary of inception with a number of events for the community to become involved in.

Stanley fight to maintain a 1-1 draw at MPA

An injury to Michael Betts after 40 minutes meant Sam Toolan was called upon and the midfield was reshuffled.

During the second half with the wind behind them, Stanley started to increase the pressure, with a number of long range efforts from Wayne Clement and Saul Zuvic coming close, with the latter hitting the woodwork. An injury to

Alejandro Santana forced him to leave the field and Mark Allen took his place in midfield. A quick counter attack down the left hand side from MPA, caught Stanley off guard and a low cross was met at the back post for a simple tap in. 1-0.

Stanley continued to press; with probing runs from Sam Toolan and Stevie Aldridge along with relentless chasing from Aiden Morris caused a number of problems for the MPA defence and as a result a number of corners were won. The battles of Coronel and the Falklands in the making

One hundred years ago this week - a daily diary of events leading up to the battles of Coronel and the Falklands by Islander and marine archaeologist Mensun Bound

Sunday 1st November 1914 -Battle of Coronel

At about 03.00 Scharnhorst received a message from Prinz Eitel Friedrich in Valparaiso to say that that a light English cruiser [Glasgow] had anchored in Coronel the night before. Von Spee was already heading south and Coronel was only 190 miles At maximum speed they away. raced for Coronel hoping to catch it. As the day drew on they found themselves punching into a force 7 and growing. It was All Saints Day and special services were held during the morning on all the ships

The two squadrons were now closing on each other fast. At this stage both sides were expecting to make contact with an enemy light enuiser.

At 16.17 the Germans sighted the British At this point the Nurnberg was some 25 miles astern of the squadron. Von Spee altered course to starboard and ordered his squadron to clear for action and to concentrate upon his Flag At 09.15 of the fatal day, Glasgow weighed and was gone from Coronel. Its rendezvous with the Good Hope and Monmouth was 50 miles westward. The ships joined at 13.00. Canopus was then toiling in heavy seas some 300 miles to the south

By that time the sea was running so high it was impossible to lower boats, so the messages from Coronel together with an intelligence summary were put into a 6-inch cartridge case that was then dragged across the bow of the Flagship. 'Manoeuvre well executed', signalled Cradock. The heavy seas prevented Hirst from complying with his orders to join *Good Hope*. 'Had I done so', wrote Hirst, 'I should have been dead six hours fater'.

At 13.50 while the dragging operation was in progress, wireless operators on the Good Hope overheard a Telefunken signal at near full strength. The enemy could not be far below the Cradock ordered the horizon squadron to spread 15 miles apart. on a line NE by E with Glasgow closest to the coast, followed by Otranto then Monmouth then Good Hope. At 10 knots they steered north-west-by-north. The spread was only half complete when at 15.56 smoke was spotted and Glasgow went to investigate. At 16.40 she was able to identify four-funnelled armoured two cruisers and one three-funnelled light cruiser. These Scharnhorst, Gnesienau These were and Leipzig. She reported 'enemy's

protected cruisers in sight steering between South East and South *Glasgow* then turned and raced to close on *Good Hope*.

At 17.35 von Spee was just over ten miles to the eastward of Cradock's line with Nürnberg and Dresden still well behind. At this point Cradock held the advantage of the light, but as soon as the sun fell, that would pass to the other side. Despite the far greater German superiority Cradock was determined to engage and altered course 4 points to port in an attempt to close on the enemy and commence the engagement. By then sunset was less than an hour away. Von Spee, however, declined and altered course away to port. Naturally he was awaiting the setting sun that would put the British in crisp silhouette while he was being absorbed into the darkness

At 17.57 Cradock signalled *Canopus* of his intention to attack, but with the Germans jamming all transmissions only his position - 37°30° S: 74°0 W – got through. At this time *Canopus* was about 285 miles south. In her log the first indication of a change to routine occurred at 18.30: "Raised steam for full speed. General Quarters'.

By 18.24 the two squadrons were on a roughly parallel course and heading in a southerly direction with von Spee to landward. Scharnhorst was roughly abeam the Good Hope and the range was down to about 13,508 yards. The Gneisenau was three cables behind its flagship, and Leipzig five cables astern Gneisenau. Dresden brought up the rear. Nurnberg was then out of sight to the British.

At 18.33 when range was down to 11,400 yards, and the British were in sharp focus, von Spee ordered the *Scharnhorst* to opened fire. *Gneisenau* then *Leipzig* followed. Each targeted its opposite number in the enemy line.

Von Spee's gunnery trophies had been well earned. Although they were pitching and rolling the German shooting was remarkable; their main armaments were soon straddling their targets while their side guns rippled along the side at 15 second intervals as they delivered broadside after broadside, even though their gunners were frequently kneedeep in water as the sea broke over their bows and swept the deeks.

For the most part the British 6-inch guns were mounted too close to the water-line for regular organised salvo firing in storm conditions. The other problem

was the way in which the breaking spray blurred their optics and their general loss of vision because of the growing darkness. In these circumstances accurate gunlaying was impossible.

The Scharnhorst's first shot was short, the second appears to have been an over (although this is disputed in some sources), and the third shot hit the Good Hope between the fore turret and the conning tower. The fire was put out but seconds later she was hit in almost the same spot igniting a cordite blaze that they could not extinguish. There were only two guns on the British side that the Germans need fear and these were the fore and aft turrets on the Good Hope. In the opening seconds of the battle one of these was destroyed meaning that the effective fire-power of the British had been reduced by 50 per cent.

The Monmouth was soon also taking a pounding from Gnetsenau who quickly found her range. One shell burst on her forecastle starting a fire that apparently ignited the charges of the forward turret which soon blew up. Very shortly after the vessel yawed to starboard.

As for *Otranto* there was little she could have done, she was a large target whose small guns were all out-ranged. For this reason, soon after the exchanges began, Cradock had ordered her to leave the action. This left both *Leipzig* and *Dresden* concentrating their fire upon *Glasgow*.

commenced Glasgow had firing eight minutes after the first shots when range was down to 10,000 yards. From almost the start she had gone to independent fire as the pitching and rolling of the ship, the spray on her optics and the cloaking darkness, made coordinated controlled fire impossible. For their part the German light cruisers also had difficulty seeing the Glasgow and later reported that their best view of her was when her bow was pitched upwards on a wave. Spotting the fall of shot for both was extremely difficult and in the case of Glasgow her gunlayers could do no more than fire at the enemy flashes. None the less after eight minutes the Leipzig found Glasgow's range and thereafter she was constantly being straddled, but she presented a small target and, because they were at close to extreme range, the angle of descent was so steep there was no chance of ricochet strikes.

About 19.20, when range was down to about 4,000 yards, the midships section of the *Good*

Hope exploded sending flames and debris to a great height. Very likely the vessel was blown in two; the flames, however, were soon extinguished and everything was then lost in darkness.

All fire was now concentrated on *Glasgow*. Captain Luce soon realized that the Germans were shooting at his muzzle flashes because for every shot he discharged three came back; because of this, at 19.35, he broke off the fight hoping to elude his opponents in the darkness.

After ceasing fire *Glasgow* made visual contact by moonlight with the *Monmouth*, which had extinguished the fire, but had been badly holed and was down by the bow. 'Can you steer north-west?', Luce signalled to Brandt, 'the enemy are following us astern'. There was no response: there was nothing he could do for the *Monmouth* and unless he escaped now, his own destruction was assured. At 20.05 *Glasgow* hauled off to the north-west to lose herself in the night.

Not long after the Nürnberg chanced upon the Monmouth. When the stricken ship refused to surrender, Nürnberg was obliged to deliver the final blows, but then could not stop for survivors because they had no idea of the state of the battle, only that there was at least one other light cruiser nearby which might come charging out of the darkness at them were they to halt. But even had they been able to stop, there was no way they could have lowered their boats in such seas.

By 20.45, Grant on *Canopus* learned from *Glasgow* that the battle had been lost. His position then was about 250 miles to the south. He then headed west to intercept the colliers.

The Admiralty never released the number of those who died that night, but it would have been about 1,600. Maybe they were reluctant to draw attention to the number of boys who died and who were lamented for many years by men like Luce. After the war Stoddart gave a lecture in which he spoke of how the Monmouth had 'a number of very small midshipmen' on board and how he 'always grieved for those poor little chaps, taken from Britannia, who, before they got their sea-legs, went into action and went down'
