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Margaret Thatcher remembered in bronze

FALKLANDS residents will gather next to the 1982 Liberation Monument tomorrow afternoon for the unveiling and dedication of the Falkland Islands Government commissioned bronze bust of Baroness Margaret Thatcher.

Created by sculptor and Falklands Museum and National Trust taxidermist Steve Massam. the stunning piece of work took around two months and 50 kilos of clay to create, he told Penguin News this week.

However from first accepting the commission to the final patina being applied at the foundry, the bust took around 18 months.

Mr Massam, who says he is now very pleased with the final piece, admitted he was initially very nervous: "When I was first asked by Darren Christie I said 'no way'," commented the modest artist. Mr Massam more normally sculpts wildlife, and includes a full size bronze King Penguin in his creations. He eventually agreed to produce a small scale (maquette) of the lady. saying if he was happy with it he would take the commission.

Of course things are never simple in the Falklands. Not only was he in the middle of assisting with the muscum move, but also moving house. As such, in his new house with partner, Sylvia Allen, the first room that had to be cleared was his studio.

With the Legislative Assembly and himself satisfied with the maquette, Mr Massam went on to order clay, "and much larger tools." Happily for the artist he discovered it easier to work on a larger than life piece than in small scale: "You have more leeway," he said.

In terms of a reference for

the work, he eventually settled on a photograph in the museum archives depicting the then Mrs Thatcher during a visit to the Falklands in 1983. This placed her in the correct period required by the commission.

In the picture she wore a Union flag brooch on her lapel,

a structured jacket, polka dot blouse, pearl earrings and two strings of pearls around her neck.

But the most difficult part was, "capturing her eyes," said Mr Massam.

Having toiled to get her expression correct he eventually, "had to step away," he laughed. With a clay bust complete, normally the foundry would send workers to create a silicon mould, however, because Mr Massam had worked before with the Bronze Age sculpture casting foundry (Limchouse, London) they were happy to allow him to create the mould.

That done, he transported the mould to the UK where a wax replica was made for him to check and sign off. Then came the final mould before the bronze was poured. This mould is made of ceramic so it can be smashed once the bronze has set.

Last of all comes the application of the patina. "I chose a basic black/brown patina that would withstand salt spray," he explained, "and will hopefully stand the test of time."

The 27 kilo. hollow. bronze bust was then brought back to the Falklands by DHL ready to be placed on the edge of Thatcher Drive in front of the Secretariat.

Making the bust particularly 'Falklands' it is weighted inside with an armature made of fencing standards.

Costing around £40.000. it will stand 8ft high on a stone plinth and bears a brass plaque with a quote from Baroness Thatcher on April 3. 1982: "They are few in number, but they have the right to live in peace, to choose their own way of life and determine their own allegiance."

A memorial service to Baroness Thatcher takes place at 17.15. The dedication is at 1800 and a public reception in the Town Hall follows at 1900. Son of the late Baroness

SOME years back working for a PR and events company my boss and I would occasionally receive phones call during which one or other might be asked: "I need someone to do X, can you guys do that?"

Yes, yes" we would most often reply, "no problem at all," before replacing the receiver and immediately Googling the meaning of "X"

In our defence, being a reasonably resourceful little team we rarely failed to complete X to the satisfaction of the client. As well as talking the talk, we could, on the whole, walk the walk.

So as a former PR person, just before Christmas while glancing through the Penguin News review of the year I was struck by the strength of the public relations theme that ran throughout.

The 'We are Falklands' exhibition in London weighted towards nature and wildlife was extremely well received, and of course there was also the prestigious international tourism prize for the Falklands as a wildlife destination. Bearing in mind our 'clean up Stanley campaign' in October and of course how noisy we are about emphasising the importance of oil companies producing Environmental Impact Assess ments, anyone hearing of such events, awards and objectives might judge us worthy of some kind of environmental excellence award - a kind of green canonization. That is of course as long as we hurry them past the flora and fauna haven that is Cape Pembroke, or shield their view of Mary Hill and the Common area near the rubhish dump at Eliza Cove

Regarding Cape Pembroke in particular. despite some movement towards protecting it (a road is planned to the Lighthouse) the area has deteriorated significantly in recent months with more vehicles than ever tearing the place apart - it's a heartbreaking mess. At the very least there should be signs indicating that such behaviour is unacceptable. If we have the resources to, almost without warning, chuck up some pretty street lights in the middle of summer, a gesture which didn't take the years of lobbying that protecting the Cape has been afforded, surely we could afford suitable signage? If created soon, perhaps it could be launched at the time of the Cape Pembroke Half Marathaon

And what can we say about the rubbish dump? It's just a horrifying mess with polythene blowing out over the Common and presumably out to sea. (Incidentally Eric Goss reminded last year that some kind of cover on skips is a requirement - not one that's normally obeyed).

The thing is I'm all for promoting these Islands and well done to those who have achieved so much, but let's just be careful that our actions support our pretty story telling - fact without a hint of flannel.

MLA Jan Cheek feels immigration has been an outstanding issue, "and while it is not part of my portfolio, we all need to agree firm policies that welcome people who can contribute to the community while the rules protect the right of status holders and do not place an unfair burdens on tax payers.

MLA Mike Summers said his key portfolio priority would be to engage with the new Director of Health to get some concrete and positive proposals to put before Exco on assistance to vulnerable persons, including particularly the elderly and those with complex additional needs: and also, "feeding into this to bring forward firm costed options for the Care Home.

"More broadly there is a collective responsibility to ensure that Government expenditure reflects both priority needs and ability to pay, and that we continue to defend the Falklands from continued aggression from Argentina in what will be a volatile election year.

MLA Roger Edwards said his resolution was. "To try even harder to do what the electorate wants. We sometimes get lost with other things and forget what we promised and what others want.

Suspended for fishing with FI licence

ARGENTINA'S Tierra del Fuego provincial government decided on Wednesday to suspend Pesantar's fishing licence. following claims that the company is associated with another group operating in the South Atlantic but with a Falklands' government license.

The claim was filed at the end of last year at Argentina's Agriculture and Fisheries, and Foreign Affairs ministries, by an employ-

ee from the Pesantar company, allegedly aware of the "illicit" procedure allowing the associated companies to benefit from licences extended by Argentina and the Falkland Islands governments.

Under Argentine law this is a crime since all companies operating in the Falklands are banned from doing so in Argentine waters

Graffiti splashed across FIC van and buildings

FALKLAND Islands Company Ltd (FIC) employees were greeted with a mass of abusive graffiti across their UK Brand Direct van on Thursday morning.

The many spray painted slogans on the van included 'Shame how the mighty have fallen: Desperation & Co: HRH is sickined [sic]: FIC=KGB and 'KGB to your doorstep.' while on the door and window of Home Builder and Home Living the words 'SCAM' and 'Buy, buy, buy' were splashed with white paint. On a nearby container 'persons beyond underpaid' and 'KGB' were scrawled.

FIC's Public Relations Manager Eva Jaffray said the company was saddened to see such an act of criminal damage and noted that it was of a similar nature to a recent incident involving Christ Church Cathedral and another private business

Mrs Jaffray said it was. "very unusual behaviour." within the community "We treat every case of criminal damage very serious-

Acting Inspector Paul McDade said the RFIP was informed of the vandalism at 7.40am when they had attended the scene and, "recovered potential evidence."

He said an investigation had been launched and the Police appealed to the public for any information regarding the vandalism. Contact investigating officer PC Stacey Steen on 28100 or use the confidence line 28111 or email safe@police.gov.fk. Last year. RFIP had two separate instances of graffiti reported.

Ag Insp McDade said that the first was graffiti on Ross Road where suspects were identified and received a citable caution. The second instance was where persons unknown had written 'Malvinas Argentina' on the retaining wall at the Cross of Sacrifice.

He said there were other such slogans at a couple of other locations which appeared to be linked to this incident, and a suspect had not been identified in this case.

Man proposes after admitting he assaulted young girlfriend

A THIRTY-FIVE year old man described by the prosecution as. "having a history of domestic abuse," was given an 18 month probation order in the summary court, after he admitted two charges of common assault.

Mount Pleasant man Alan Keith Joshua had made a full admission to the police saying he had. "laid a hand," on the 20 year old female victim, after he had questioned her about going out for lunch with another male. He said he felt she had lied with her explanation and following a row in her room on November 29, had taken her in his vehicle and driven for some five minutes down the Darwin road. He said he had not wanted the neighbours to hear their argument and told the Police, "but she didn't deserve what she got. I'm really sorry about that.

Mr Joshua said he had gone around to the passenger door and opened it. The victim had put her hands to her face as though she was scared and he had pulled her hands from her face with such force that she had fallen to the ground outside the vehicle.

Crown Prosecutor Simon Rowe said the young woman was at this point, "on the floor, defenceless." The defendant admitted he had then struck her with his open hand. Once back in the vehicle, Mr Joshua had pulled at her hair, said Mr Rowe adding, "it seemed for no other reason than that he was angry." The Royal Falkland Islands Police was alerted to the incident by the young woman's employer when she attended work the following day with a black eye, cuts and swelling to her face. The victim had refused to provide a witness statement, but the Police had followed their domestic violence policy and proceeded to interview Mr Joshua and following his admissions which included a previous occasion when he had. "laid hands," on the victim, arrested and charged him.

Defence lawyer Simon Crowder said his client had been unable to travel to Saint Helena for Christmas due to bail restrictions but that during the victim's time there the relationship had developed and Mr Joshua's proposal of marriage had been accepted. He added that the defendant was due to start work at Pony Pass Quarry next week and move to Stanley with the victim. He said that with this in mind there was little point in awarding compensation to the victim as it would remain, "in the family home."

Justice of the Peace Dick Sawle said the probation order took both incidents into account and noted that one had taken place after he had taken a young woman to an isolated, dark location. He said the pre-sentence report had highlighted that Mr Joshua was unaware of the seriousness of his actions and that he had seemed to expect nothing more than a fine and for things to continue as they were. The assistance of the Probation Officer may improve that outlook, said Mr Sawle, who reminded Mr Joshua that failure to comply with the order would result in re-sentencing which could mean custody.

Licence endorsed

SHEARING Contractor John David Toby McKay was fined £100 in the Summary Court on Wednesday after he pleaded guilty by post to failing to surrender his licence to be endorsed. Mr McKay was fined last year for road traffic offences, had settled the fines but had failed to present his licence to the Police Station to be endorsed.

He had been mailed notification of the need for him to present his licence on two occasions, however due to the transient nature of his work he had not received the mail.

Mr McKay apologised to the court for wasting their time and said that he had become aware that he had been required to attend court when he heard a news item on the radio. He said that when he had paid the fines he had thought everything was complete.

Justice of the Peace Dick Sawle warned that everyone brought before the court for an offence must take all directions seriously.

Mr McKay's licence has now been received and endorsed accordingly.

SSL planning appeal upheld

A PLANNING and Building appeal by Stanley Services Limited to build a gated access for trucks to turn onto their storage area to the west of the fuel station off Airport Road has been upheld at Executive Council. SSL General Manager Robert Rowlands and the Environmental Planning Officer attended the meeting and presented their cases. After consideration, MLAs agreed to uphold SSL's appeal. MLA Phyl Rendell said that among other reasons the decision was taken because of the level of traffic that would be using VPC road and Bill Roberts Way with new developments in the area. MLAs also recommended that the Planning and Building Committee review the status of the Airport Road, since a number of developments have been approved recently, requiring access onto it.

FITB new status

THE commencement date for the Tourist Board as a new Statutory Corporation was agreed at last month's Executive Council. Mike Rendell was appointed as Chairman, with Sally Ellis as Vice Chair. Members also agreed the creation of the post of Director International Marketing based in London as foreseen by the TDS (Tourism Development Strategy). It was agreed that the post should be based in the Government Office in London, "subject to successful discussions with the Representative on practical arrangements," said MLA Phyl Rendell.

Pension changes

LEGISLATION will come into force on February 1 2015 regarding amendments to the Falkland Islands Pension Scheme.

The Amendment Bill covers amendments to normal retirement age, members re-entering the Scheme, removal of actuaries, increases to the maximum age for payment of pension contributions from 70 to 75 and also provides for the calculation of refunds. The Bill also provides for pension sharing on divorce and the definition of "spouse" will now include unmarried partners.

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IT was about 5am on New Year's Day and I had been sleeping soundly since I switched the TV off minutes after midnight. I was stone-cold sober and had become tired of the grotesquely prolonged and polluting fireworks display over the Thames. As a New Year's Eve curmudgeon. By the time I arrived at the junction of the two roads outside our home, another person was already there: a neighbour. Liz. who was giving her dog a very early morning walk. Liz was helping a very young woman to the side of the road, one arm around her and trying to stem her weeping with comforting words. I joined them, and saw that the girl was thin to the point of malnutrition. dressed in cheap clothes that may have looked a little glamorous in a shop at the cheaper end of the high street but were now smeared with mud. Her bare arms were caked with blood.

emaciated state, she might have been a little older. I extended a hand to her in a gesture meant to be friendly and reassuring. She recoiled and staggered away from both Liz and me.

I uttered a few words that I hoped would reassure her: something like "It's OK. I just want to help you." But that just seemed to alarm her more. "I'm not talking to you." the girl said. placing the emphasis on the "you", clearly meaning (because she did not know me as an individual) that she did not trust me because I was a man. "I'll only talk to her", pointing to Liz. She evidently perceived women as less of a threat.

I stepped back and said, "That's OK. 1 understand," (although 1 didn't), "But you've been bleeding, so we need to do something. We've called for help and it'll be here soon."

A look of horror crossed her face, and she began shouting hysterically. There were many words, but among them 1 recall, "I can't talk to the police. I can't go with them. They'll section me." She broke away from Liz's arm and she ran, staggering down a dark street. If I, a man, was to chase her, it would alarm her further and Liz, who was leading her big friendly dog, could hardly run after her either. In any case, the girl did not go far. She disappeared into the front garden of a nearby terraced house, and we watched her from a distance as we talked and waited for the police to arrive. the few minutes it took for me to joint them. Her name was Lucy, and she had been taking Ketamine, a drug used as an anaesthetic in hospitals, but one which is also abused as a street drug causing temporary psychosis and very nasty physiological changes. Ketamine may offer an effective escape for people for whom the real world is too grim to tolerate, but it is also horribly dangerous.

Lucy's story only got worse. Through tears, she said she had been sexually abused by someone in her family and was "self-harming." The blood that covered her arms had come from deep cuts she had inflicted on herself.

A police car arrived and we told the two young officers what we knew about Lucy and where she was hiding. Fortunately, one of the officers was a women, so she approached Lucy first. We watched as the terrified girl emerged from the shadows and walked back to the police car. She was hunched, weeping and more vulnerable than anyone I have seen since I witnessed Galtieri's child soldiers retreating through Stanley in June 1982. The officers thanked us and we thanked them. They would ensure that she was fed. looked after until the Ketamine was out of her system, and then seen by compassionate social workers.

Despite her explicit fears about being sectioned - the legal term for compulsory psychiatric treatment - I hope she had been. This broken bird of a girl had no place on the street, where she could be sold drugs and abused by men.

In an odd way, I am grateful to Lucy for confirming to me that New Year's Eve is a contrived event, a night that is just as bad for many as any other in the calendar. It might be genuinely happy for a fortunate few but it is miserable for many more. I will think of this bloody, dirty and violated girl next New Year's Eve when I am again under pressure to celebrate, hoping that she is still around and faring better than she was a week ago. Publicity Stunts and Reconciliation

Passions appear to be aflame in the Falklands about the rash of Argentina nationalistic protests in Stanley and on the old battlefields, acts which have been made easy since the borders were opened to Argentine visitors during a phase of cautious reconciliation at the end of the last century.

Such activity is legal, as it should be in a democratic society where the rights of free speech and association are valued. It must be really frustrating, however, for Stanley residents to see tourists abusing the welcome they have been given. The, "something must be done," feeling on such occasions must be overwhelming, but nothing can be done unless damage is caused or violence provoked, at which point the police can step in.

Every now and again visitors step off the Lan flight with a more sophisticated plan for protest or reconciliation, one which will get him or her a few days of fame in the Argentine newspapers. The most recent of these. a guitartoting senator from the northern town of Salta, appeared to bring a confusing message: he was strumming in the name of peace so must have been in favour of building bridges, but he also stated that he was protesting against UK sovercignty. Whatever his purpose, no one seems to have listened to his songs. And I don't blame them.

So what to do about these rude visitors? If legislation was introduced banning unplanned and officially unapproved protests, then that would bite deeply into Falkland democracy, and of course such a law would also apply to Islanders wanting to protest about anything. The only option is to maintain a dignified silence and remember the old adage about sticks and stones.

But the absurd protests and the fake bridge-building gestures are damaging, because they make real reconciliation much harder. And real reconciliation would be a good thing. After 32 years of South Atlantic cold war, which always has the potential to turn hot (especially as Vladimir Putin offers Buenos Aires advanced attack aircraft) no sane person can deny that a real outbreak of peace and love would be a good thing. For our part, the hand of reconciliation has been extended meaningfully; we have repeatedly said we'd like to be friends and even share the bounty of fishing and oil. But since that period of cautious reconciliation in the late 1990s. nothing similar has come the other way

There is some risk that Islanders vocal dislike of protestors and spurious reconciliation gestures will seem unreasonable to outsiders and therefore damage the Islands image. If that is the price, so be it. Absurd gestures from puerile visitors must be replaced by words and measure that show a real Argentine wish for reconciliation. Penguin News, January 9, 2015

LIKE many others I have lost a good friend and wise counsellor in Don Bonner. On my visits to the Falkland Islands for over 30 years he always sought me out for a chat which I appreciated.

He was conscientious, modest and very proud of his role as Governor's chauffeur, and Governors viewed him as a friend.

During the traumatic Argentine occupation, he was particularly concerned to protect the fabric and contents of Government House where he had served for so long and knew so well.

He told me how he went to the Argentines and told them they must not damage anything there. And when the Argentine planned to position more defensive artillery in the area, he told them not to do so for fear of making it a target and putting Stanley residents in even greater danger. And the Argentines officers seemed to take notice. They told him not to worry; as soon as the British advanced on Stanley, they told him they would surrender.

He had lots of courage as well as integrity.

I will miss him as I do so many of my other Falklands friends of that era.

More *Exeter* connections

I READ with interest your excellent article on the links between the Falklands, HMS *Exeter* and the River Plate and would like to add a further connection; my parents.

My father Leslie Robert Johnson was a Royal Marine and served on the *Exeter* from 1935 until 1940, when he joined HMS *Kenya*.

My mother Elvira Hadassah (Dass) Fuhlendorff was born in Stanley in the Falklands. Her parents were Hjalmar and Elizabeth (nec Reive) Fuhlendorff. She had left the Falklands in 1937 to train to be a nurse at St Mary's in Paddington and spent the war nursing in London.

When the crew of the *Exeter* were billeted with Islanders after the Battle of the River Plate, my father was billeted with the Fuhlendorffs.

They asked him to look up their daughter when he got back to London and they met after the Guildhall reception.

They married six weeks after his demob in 1946 and were married for 35 years. (My father died in 1981).

We knew the Berntsen brothers and sister (Ern, Bernard, Nat and Ellen) as they had been my mum's neighbours in Stanley and saw them quite a lot in the UK.

I first came to the Falklands in 1986 with my mum; the first time she had been home in 58 years and we had a great two weeks with family and visiting as much as we could. (I have visited several times since and love my family home).

Your questions answered

Elsewhere, a deliberate attial explosive material onto a passenger aircraft is treated as a serious offence and perpetrator usually removed from the flight, arrested and taken to Court. Why is this not the case in the Falkland Islands?

Director of Emergency Services Barry Marsden provided the following response...

A The Falkland Islands takes Aviation security very seriously. There are a number of serious criminal offences in Falkland Islands Law (principally created under the Aviation Security and Piracy (Overseas Territories) Order 2000 and the Air Navigation (Overseas Territories) Order 2013 which applied provisions of the Aviation Security Act 1982 to the Islands).

In the event of a 'deliberate attempt to smuggle potential explosive material onto a passenger aircraft' there is no question - such activity gives rise to serious criminal offence(s). In such circumstances it is entirely appropriate for customs officers or the police to take a passenger into questioning to establish and to gather other evidence with a view to potential charging and prosecution.

However it is also important to recognise that the majority of the matters dealt with by Customs in relation to the detritus that some passengers seek to take home from 1982 battle sites is not of any danger to the public or aviation safety. Customs officers and security staff correctly have discretion about how to deal with such material. A large amount of this material remains on the Islands and as a result these officers are very experienced at making judgements about the correct course of action.

Technically, the removal of metal objects from the Falkland Islands which obviously represents no threat to aviation safety, will only fall foul of the local laws on the exportation of scrap metal. Given the small quantities usually involved in such 'attempted export' customs officers usually correctly adjudge that no serious offence has been committed and simply confiscate the item and allow the passenger to proceed. This procedure applies to all passengers on both the Lan Chile and MOD airbridge flights.


Martha said the competition was a great success and extended her gratitude to everyone who helped on the day as well as in the run up to the.







Sally and Pat awarded prestigious Polar Medal

ENVIRONMENTAL1ST

renowned sailor and Falklands resident Sally Poncet has joined an elite group of only eight women to have been awarded the prestigious Polar Medal this year South Georgia Marine Officer Patrick Lurcock has also received the honour.

The medal is awarded to UK citizens for conspicuous contributions to the knowledge of Polar regions or who have rendered prolonged service of outstanding quality in support of acquisition of such knowledge.

Mrs Poncet has been involved in exploration and research on South Georgia for more than 35 years. She first visited South Georgia with Jerome Poncet on *Damien II* in 1977 and later explored and researched Antarctica with their young sons.

Chief Executive and Director of SG Fisheries Martin Collins said: "Since then Sally has dedicated much of her time to studying and promoting the island's biodiversity and has worked on surveys of plants and seabirds, undertook the first rat eradication trial in 2002 and co-authored two editions of the South Georgia Visitor's Guide (with Kim Crosbie).

Sally has been a key adviser to the SGHT rat eradication project and the GSGSS1 reindeer eradication.

This week Mrs Poncet made the exciting discovery of the first South Georgia Pipit nest at Schlieper Bay on South Georgia, an area cleared of rodents in 2013 when she worked as lead scientist on the restoration project.

Unfortunately at the time of going to print we were unable to obtain a comment from Mrs

Poncet.

Mr Lurcock wintered at the Halley Base with the British Antarctic Survey in the late 1980s. For the last 20 years he has worked on South Georgia as a Marine Officer or Government Officer in the employ of Government of South Georgia and South Sandwich Islands (GSGSSI). The Government Officers are GSGSSI's representatives on the ground in South Georgia and are the primary interface with fishing and tourism industries and with military and civilian visitors

military and civilian visitors. Mr Collins said: "During the time Pat has been employed by GSGSSI he has played an integral role in the improvements in fisheries and environmental management. Pat has also spent considerable time researching and documenting the cultural heritage of South Georgia."

Mr Lurcock told Penguin News yesterday it was a great honour to be awarded the Polar Medal and he was thrilled, adding, "though I feel a bit of a queue jumper as Sally Poncet is receiving a much more deserved one this year too."

He said: "I have been lucky to have been here on South Georgia over a period that has developed in so many positive ways in terms of ecological, heritage, fishery and tourism management, and to have been able to play a small part in it all over the past 20 years. None of which I could have done without the wonderful support of Sarah, who luckily loves being here as much as I do and has made my small contribution possible."

He joked: "I am not quite sure why having an office with a view of snow-capped mountains in the distance, a beach full of seals and penguins in the foreground, ships full of interesting people to board and meet, clean air to breathe, pure water to drink, and a great team to live and work with, deserves a medal, but I will accept it anyway."

In 1904, the Polar Medal was inaugurated for members of Captain Scott's first expedition to Antarctica.

It was also awarded to the crews of both rescue ships, the Terra Nova and the Morning. Subsequent medals were also awarded to members of Ernest Shackleton's expeditions in 1907–09 and 1914–17.

Virginia Frances 'Ginny' Lady Twisleton-Wykeham-Fiennes noted explorer and wife of adventurer Ranulph Fiennes was the first woman to be awarded the Polar Medal,

The medal

The medal may be conferred on those citizens of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland who have personally, made conspicuous contributions to the knowledge of Polar regions (including South Georgia) or who have rendered prolonged service of outstanding quality in support of acquisition of such knowledge and who, in either case, have undergone the hazards and rigours imposed by the Polar environment.

The medal may also be awarded in recognition of individual service of outstanding quality in support of the objectives of Polar expeditions, due account being taken of the difficulties overcome.

TWO incredibly strong and inspirational women for whom I have enormous personal admiration have been suitably honoured over the past week; with some fanfare Baroness Thatcher and more quietly, as is her personality, Sally Poncet.

*Maggie' as she is affectionately known reached the heady heights of British Prime Minister and won an instant place in Islander's hearts with the news that a Task Force was on the way to rid us of our Argentine invaders in 1982. Her subsequent visits to the Islands and staunch support for our future well being was greatly appreciated and has been suitably recognised as she stands sentinel near the Liberation Monument. I now have to pass her each morning on the way to work, and its difficult not to feel that she is keeping her beady eye on how well I perform each day. Intimidating thought!

Sally's efforts on behalf of the Antarctic environment have also been properly recognised with a Polar Medal and we should not forget that more often than not when she is not researching, restoring, recording and exploring in the more southern regions, she is doing just that in the Falkland Islands where she has made her home.

This sort of work is not for the financial reward or personal recognition and it certainly doesn't include luxury travel and accommodation or a celebrity status as each project is completed. It does however require both physical and mental strength, great leadership skills and a belief that what you are doing is for the good of future generations.

Because of Maggie we are still here and because of the likes of Sally, we may even have something worth passing on to our descendants.

THIS week the editor was looking rather shiny-eyed after attending Professor Rognvaldur Hannesson's talk (page 5) and was completely enraptured by his knowledgeable analysis of the oil and fishing industries in Norway. While admitting she didn't understand every tiny detail of their tax regime, she described the talk as quite an eye-opener, particularly the Norwegian Government's apparently sensible decision to resist spending revenue too early on capital projects demanded of them by their citizens. She also claimed a moment of gloom, jealousy even, as the professor described the reasonable cooperation between Norway and neighbouring countries over allowable catches of straddling fish stocks.

Presumably the latter isn't something we can hope for any time soon, but perhaps a dream for the future.



Planning and building update

FIVE applications have been granted under delegated powers since the December meeting of the Planning and Building Committee

These were for the erection of houses at 46, 19 and 20 Rex Hunt Road for Breda French, Matthew Berntsen and Henry Guala Romero respectively. Andrew and Georgina Smith are to create a new access and second parking space at 11 Fitzroy Road East and Shane Clarke had his application to site a mobile home at 7 Mountain Berry Road approved.

Two retrospective applications were dealt with at Wednesday's meeting, the first being the change of use from cafe to hair and beauty salon at 58 John Street for the owners of Karma and for the change of use from warehouse to shop and construction of a new porch entrance at FIC Home Builder.

MLA Jan Cheek said she did not like to have to deal with retrospective applications, however it was pointed out that the owners of Karma had not been aware that permission was required for change of use and had hastened to provide relevant documents when it was pointed out.

With regard to the FIC Home Builder project, the committee agreed there was a need for an overall review of the parking in the area and that in the event the assessment indicated there was insufficient parking then additional spaces would have to be provided. Director of Public Works Manfred Keenleyside said there had been successive applications. each requiring parking (offices in loft area, spares section, Falklands 4x4, office conversions in main building etc) but no information for staff parking or num-bers had been provided. He said that if the old Home Living building was to become additional showroom space for Home Living it would attract more customers to the area. MLA Jan Cheek said that insufficient parking was detrimental to business as casual shoppers would simply not stop and browse.

Outline permission in principle was granted to the Government for the construction of service provision for a further five mobile home units at an area west of the existing Murray Heights, to the east of Teaberry Drive. Mr Keenleyside said there was a waiting list for sites and as the services were nearby it was considered a good way to assist more people.

A living room extension at 7 Anderson Drive for Marc Short was also given approval as was the erection of a single storey house for Kevin Ironside at 28 Ross Road East.

Premier ready for low oil prices

TONY Durrant, Chief Executive of Premier Oil said on Wednesday that the company was, "in a strong position to weather a period of oil price weakness due to its long term cash flow generation."

Premier published its Trading and Operations update, ahead of its 2014 Preliminary Results which will be announced on February 26.

The update noted that following the selection of a smaller, lower capex solution for the first phase of the Falkland Islands' Sea Lion project, "work is progressing on assessing the FPSO design options," and that the high impact, four well Falkland Islands exploration campaign was on track to commence in March.

Archaeological survey ship seeking German wrecks sits out the storm

AN archaeological search for and survey of, German warships lost at the Battle of the Falklands, and headed by Islander and marine archaeologist Mensun Bound, is being plagued by bad weather at sea according to most recent reports.

The Endeavour, the vessel on which the project is being undertaken headed for Stanley and docked mid week in order to avoid a coming storm.

Mr Bound reported on Wednesday that. "Nothing of archaeological interest," was uncovered during their most recent survey.

Funded by a British philanthropist resident in the UK, via the Falklands Maritime Heritage Trust (FIMHT)the project is being undertaken in close association with oil company Noble Energ

This is because the wrecks are situated within its licence area south-east of the Falklands and a drilling rig will soon be on its way to the Islands.

The company needs to know the precise locations of the wrecks and their debris fields, in order not to disturb the sites during their drilling operations that

will soon begin.

The aim of the project is to conduct a non-disturbance survey of SMS Scharnharst, Gneisenaua, Leipzig and Numberg which are all situated at depths of 1000 to 3000m about 90 miles south east of the Islands.

The team hopes to establish precise positions and the state of

the wrecks as well as map the debris field. All activities will be strictly non-touch. The team will follow the protocols established by English Heritage for their underwater survey of WWI ships (both German and British) off the coast of the British Isles.

In the Falklands case, however, there will be no diving, everything will be done remotely; there will be no attempt to retrieve any artefacts (bells, gun turrets, insignia, coins) from any of the wrecks. The positions, survey data and suggested exclusion zones will eventually be submitted to the Falklands Government in the hope that the wrecks that are currently unprotected can be designated as Historic Monument Sites

The results and project archive will be deposited in the Falkland Islands museum

Trough four trial begins

MLA Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into her working week

I LEFT Scotland just in time to avoid some pretty foul weather and with a little relief at escaping the early dark evenings to head south to longer days. It was fascinating to hear some of the political commentary: the Scottish seats could play a significant role in the make up of the next UK government in a few months after the general election. The Scottish referendum 'ves' campaigners were being challenged to explain how their plans would have been affected by the plummeting oil prices, most seemed very reluctant to comment.

On a very uneventful flight 1 could not avoid wry amusement as some of the instant Falklands 'experts' held forth to anyone within earshot on the basis of a few days spent on the Islands. Sometimes I cannot resist correcting the most outrageous fallacies: however. I usually desist out of possibly misguided reluctance to be discourteous to occasional visitors. In its most annoying form this involves a newly fledged enthusiast who has spent all of four days here lecturing locals who have a great deal of sound expertise on how they should manage wildlife. While I love their enthusiasm, they would do well to ascertain the nature of their audience before starting to say how things should be done.

The recess is a good way to ensure the occasional real break for members who would otherwise miss numerous meetings by taking holiday at different times. Only a few genuinely urgent matters required immediate response so I tried to resist getting involved in lengthy chains of trivia.

I can report that, whatever their legal status, a number of raised crossings in the part of Edinburgh I walked in most appeared to be respected by drivers and were well used by pedestrians The only markings I could see were a couple of bold white triangles painted on the left side either side of the raised part, clearly intended to be visible to oncoming traffic. Could it work here? I guess it depends on whether we have the willingness to make it do so without putting ourselves in a legal straitjacket.

250 year celebrations planned 250 YEARS since Britain officially claimed the Falklands will be celebrated on a number of oc-

casions this month Celebrations are being organised in Stanley by members of the public on January 21 and 24 and by Falkland Islands Government on January 23 and 31, along with a ceremony on Saunders Island at Port Egmont on January 23.

Taff Davies and other individuals have grouped together to suggest that on January 21 vehicles display Union and Commonwealth family flags.

They hope to see vehicles lined up at a start point on Sapper Hill, with a nominated person in a lead vehicle to unroll a flag and hold up for display and photographs.

The vehicles will set off at 3pm, explained Mr Davies and take a route around Stanley.

He said: "By doing this we are acknowledging this important date in the history of the Falklands

They have also organised a camper-style bash at the FIDF Drill Hall on January 24 with doors opening at 9pm until 1.30am (£4 on the door). It is hoped there will be a licensed bar. Mr Davies told Penguin News.

The group is also in the process of organising a time capsule for burial and commemorative books

to be signed by everyone in the Falklands, including contractors and British Forces, as a "snapshot of our social history at this time," said Mr Davies.

At 5.30pm on January 23 there will be a short ceremony on Victory Green when two flags will be raised simultaneously. Members of the Legislative Assembly, FIDF plus youth groups will be in attendance, and there will be a two volley salute, confirmed Teslyn Barkman from the FIG Public Relations Office.

The day will also be marked at the original settlement at Port Egmont by Saunders Island owners, the Pole-Evans family. Representatives of the Falkland Islands Government and the British Forces will be in attendance and a flag



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created and donated by Joanne Turner to mirror a flag from 1765 is hoped to be raised.

They are also planning a day of fun at the racecourse on Saturday, January 31, from midday to mid-night. This will include food vans, a bar, fun events on the course, such as football, foot events and a bouncy castle and most excitingly a produce fair. Later in the evening an open air concert is planned with both local and military bands playing. All members of the British Forces are invited to join in the day, said Miss Barkman.

The history

Between June 1764 and May 1766. Vice Admiral The Hon John Byron completed a circumnavigation of the globe as captain of HMS Dolphin. This was the first such circumnavigation that was accomplished in less than two years

During this voyage, in 1765 on a day between January 21 and 23. he took possession of the Falkland Islands on behalf of Britain on the grounds of prior discovery and established Port Egmont on Saunders Islands.

Another expedition arrived around a year later in January 1766, led by Captain John Mac-Bride, with the ships HMS Jason, HMS Carcass and HMS Experiment after which Carcass Island and the Jason Islands are named.

New missiles

BRITISH newspapers are claiming the Ministry of Defence is to order £228million of super missiles to protect the Falklands.

The Daily Mail reports that a source told the newspaper: Argentina's air force has not improved since their defeat in 1982, but they've repeatedly tried to sort that despite being cash-strapped.

Last month, it was reported that Argentina was looking to strengthen its air force by leasing attack jets from Russia.

The source told the Daily Mail: Britain must always stay one step ahead when it comes to defending the Falklands. Rapier has been a great asset, but it's time for a new system to counter further threats."

CFK accused

AN Argentinian federal prosecutor has accused the country's president, Cristina Kirchner, of attempting to cover up Iran's involvement in the bombing of a Jewish community centre in 1994. in which 85 people were killed.

Prosecutor Alberto Nisman said on Wednesday that he had issued a request that judge Ariel Lijo interrogate the president and the foreign minister, Hector Timerman, "for being authors and accomplices of an aggravated coverup and obstruction of justice regarding the Iranians accused of the Amia terrorist attack"

Norwegian fish and oil industry experience shared by professor

FISH and Oil The Norwegian Experience was the subject of a fascinating talk by holidaying professor Rognvaldur Hannesson at the Chamber of Commerce on Tuesday evening

Well attended by members of the oil and fishing industry along with other interested residents, Professor Hannesson spoke of the value of fish production in Norway (farmed and captured) noting that farmed fish now exceeded the value of wild capture fishing

He outlined how their Individual Quota System (IVQ) was a variation of the Individual Transferable Quota (ITQ) used in the Falklands; indicating that because it was already a quota system it would be a simple step to make them transferable, and move to the HQ system. Detractors of the ITQ systems in Norway, he said, were concerned that this would concentrate quota in the hands of a few. (In the Falklands there are safeguards against this).

Due to improved fishing technology, since the 1950s the amount of fisherman in the industry has reduced from 100,000 to just 2,000. As such the catch value per fisherman has increased said the Professor.

Of particular interest to those attending was his description of the cooperation between Norway, Russia and European countries on

pelagic and straddling fish stocks and the agreed catch quotas for each country.

This cooperation worked relatively well he said, despite the odd hiccup when stocks moved to unexpected areas

He also described the, "reason-ably good," cooperation between scientists from the different countries, who both met up and regularly exchanged data.

Speaking of Norway's oil industry he said production was currently in decline, but having found new areas for exploitation. unless the oil price continued, "to go through the floor," they were confident of its continued development (most Norwegian exploitation occurs in the North Sea).

Oil revenue and oil companies are heavily taxed in Norway at a total of 78 per cent, however the professor explained that the, "silver lining" was that the govern-ment paid most of the investment costs. With that and other positive measures it worked out that the company actually paid around 22 per cent.

He also said that guidelines exist which require that a certain amount of income from oil must be invested in order to maintain a permanent income (he reminded that once oil is gone it is gone) along with a guideline laying out the amount beyond which no government was allowed to save.

As a result of oil tax revenue Norway's sovereign wealth fund is the biggest in the world at £460bn (two times Norway's GDP). The fund also generates money from a large stake in the country's largest energy company. The net overall return on Norway's petroleum fund since 1998 has been an excellent 5.3 per cent (but with enormous variations year on year).

The Professor answered numerous questions from the audience who were interested in increases in Norway's population as a result of oil, and how and when income from oil was spent. He explained that a vast amount of money was now spent on Norway as a welfare state, and this had likely detracted from money that might have been better spent on infrastructure development.

Your questions answered

If someone without Falk-land Islands status arrives in the Islands without a work permit or medical insurance, on what conditions are they allowed to enter the country and who has the power to make the decision?

Collector of Customs Robert King provided the following information

A person arriving to the Falk-Aland Islands who does not have Falkland Islands status or does not hold a valid permanent residence permit, temporary residence permit or work permit may make an application for a visitor's permit.

An application for a visitor's permit will ordinarily be approved if the applicant satisfies all of the following criteria:-

. They are not a prohibited person; subject to a deportation order or have had their residence permit or work permit revoked within the past five years

· If they belong to a country of which its nationals also require a

 They have sufficient financial resources available to maintain themselves (without taking employment) during their proposed stay in the Falkland Islands

•They have or are likely to have accommodation available for the duration of their proposed stay

•They have already made or have sufficient funds to make arrangements for their onward or return travel to a destination in a country or territory which will permit them entry

• Their state of health does not appear to be likely to impose a substantial financial or other burden on public resources which, in all the circumstances, it is unreasonable to expect them to bear

 That if a visitor's permit is granted, the effect of issuing it would not mean that the applicant would be permitted to remain in the Falkland Islands for a greater period of twelve months in aggregate in any consecutive period of twenty four months

Medical insurance is not an entry requirement in regard to persons seeking entry to the Falkland Islands by way of a visitor's permit, but it is strongly recommended for all visitors to be in possession of a travel/medical insurance policy that includes provision for:


Emergency aero-medical evacuation to a third country to the value of USD \$ 120,000

Medical treatment to the value of USD \$80,000

Immigration officers are empowered to grant visitor's permits or extensions to visitor's permits so as to authorise the holder to remain in the Falkland Islands for a period not exceeding one month from the date of their entry. An immigration officer, if so authorised by the Principal Immigration Officer in the particular case, may also extend or further extend a person's visitor's permit so as to authorise the holder to remain in the Falkland Islands for a period expiring not later than twelve months from the date of the person's entry to the Falkland Islands.

A priceless piece of Falklands history

DONALD William Bonner was an unsung hero of the Second World War, as like so many other Falkland Islanders he was determined to give his support, and life if necessary, to defending Britain and its colonies.

In 1943 having seen many of his half-brothers, and his full brother Dennis, join up, he falsified his age, pretending to be 17, and jumped on a ship bound for England via Montevideo.

When it was discovered that he was actually a year younger than the minimum age required, he had to wait for his official seventeenth birthday in 1944 before being permitted to join a Royal Naval ship. One of his deployments was to assist with mine-sweeping duties in the English Channel and later in the Mediterranean.

After the War ended he joined various merchant ships and sailed to a variety of ports all over the world.

Don, as he was always called, was born in Stanley on November 24, 1927, the third son of Henry John (Harry) and Kate Bonner.

He had an adventurous spirit from the very beginning. When World War II broke out he was evacuated along with his younger brother Roderick and many other Stanley children, to North Arm sheep farm. He was firmly told by his Mother to, "look after Roddy,

It was not long before the two brothers were in trouble and were deported from the farm, having been blamed for an incident which resulted in a considerable amount of glass lying on the ground outside of the sheep shearing shed. As they rode out, under the watchful eyes of a few old shepherds also on horse-back, the other children lined the route to cheer them away. A stiffer regime at Walker Creek was their destination. Don was adamant to the very end that he and his brother were wrongly convicted of the offence - something which seemed to occur a few times later in life also, he maintained.

As soon as he was old enough he joined the Falkland Islands Volunteers, the fore-runner of the Falkland Islands Defence Force (FIDF) and was given various duties before being allowed to go on outpost, protecting the Falklands

from a possible sea invasion by the Germans.

Following his Royal Naval and Merchant Navy careers, Don vearned to return home and in 1950 the opportunity arose when he joined the crew of a small vessel called the Golden Chance which had to be sailed from England to the Falklands where it was to be deployed in the seal-catching industry. The ship was barely seaworthy, but despite a few storms along the way it finally sailed into Stanley harbour.

Don had a variety of jobs including working in the West Store for the Falkland Islands Company and was also for a short time a member of the Police Force

In 1952 he married and his daughter Carole was born the following year.

His love for the sea and ships took him out of the Islands yet again and he joined the Salvasson's whaling company on the Island of South Georgia, being employed at Leith Harbour where he was involved in manning the motor boat which ran between Leith and another whaling station called Stromness.

Returning to the Falklands he eventually decided to move to the Camp with his first stop being Lively Island where he was employed as a shepherd.

Meanwhile the family increased steadily with Simon, Nick, Jane and Susan being born in consecutive years between 1955 and 58. Tim was to follow in 1964 and Joanne in 1971

The family then moved to Arrow Harbour which was termed an 'outside shepherd's house' before moving to Walker Creek settlement

During this time Don established some sporting history as he was given a young sheep-dog which the owner was happy to dispose off as he deemed it to be 'useless for working sheep'. Don noticed one day that the dog, named Laddie, was quite adept at herding geese out on the green. and he subsequently decided to bring in a few sheep to see if Laddie could transform his skills in another direction.

The result was positively encouraging and while not being a great dog for a long day's gathering of sheep he was amazingly

proficient when it came to controlling five sheep in a dog trial competition. With Don's careful handling and deft instructions, Laddie achieved a unique treble, winning the Championship in 1962 and twice in 1963

The Camp called again for the Bonners and this time it was to the Chatta before they moved across Falkland Sound to Port Howard in 1968.

Having served as a sailor at sea and a shepherd with sheep it was somewhat of a surprise to many when Don applied for the position of butler and chauffeur to Governor Neville French in May 1976_

But Don, it transpired, was made for Government House and Government House was made for him and he adapted to his new role more quickly and easily than it would take him to train a novice sheen dog

Don abandoned smoking and became a man of sober habits. He served six Governors in all (French, Parker, Hunt, Jewkes, Fullerton and Tatham) and perhaps the figure should actually be seven, as for 10 weeks in 1982 he remained steadfastly at his post under the Argentine Governor, General Menendez.

On the night before the April 2 invasion, having as usual lowered the Union Flag at sunset, he raised it again on the Government House flag-pole so requiring the Argentine Forces to pull it down the following morning.

He sat, in Government House, for many hours with his shot gun at the ready, determined to assist the British Royal Marines, but as tiredness overtook him it was politely suggested by Major Mike Norman that he should return home to his family in their cottage across the road.

Later in the day he insisted that the soon to be deported Governor Hunt and his family should be taken to Stanley Airport in the official maroon Governor's car, and he donned his chauffeur's uniform as a defiant gesture. At the urging of the Governor he deviated from the Argentine led convoy and headed to the radio station where the Governor recorded a farewell message.

During those 10 weeks of occupation he protected the private possessions of exiled Governor Rex Hunt and his wife Mavis. He also exercised his authority over young Argentine soldiers who were brought in to carry out various supporting duties in Government House and ensured that the civilian staff were treated correctly.

Governors came to rely on Don for his wise words of advice and he was often able to relay the feelings of the community who regularly expressed their views to him.

He also acted as guide and offroad driver on many fishing and settlement visiting expeditions that Governors requested.

In 1991 he deservedly was awarded a British Empire Medal which was presented to him at Government House by the Duke of Edinburgh.

He retired from Government Service in 1993 but was often recalled to assist and advise at official functions

He was affectionately given the nickname of the 'Aga Khan' as he embarked on a new challenge in his life: that of importing race horses from Chile, primarily for his own family to ride at Falklands races.

He journeyed to Punta Arenas in southern Chile and carefully hand-picked the animals he wanted. Soon space had to be found at the family home for the positioning of a succession of Governor's Cups as Croacia won the prestigious event on four occasions in Stanley, Florida chalked up two victories and Dory one. There were also victories at the Darwin Harbour meetings and yet more trophies.

He had friends everywhere and his telephone would ring day and night with callers wishing him well. Comedian Jim Davidson was just one regular caller, along with 1982 British war veterans, and many young people.

DON Bonner was a man of many parts, shepherd, whaler, fisherman, seaman, sailor, racehorse owner, family man. He saw service in the Royal Navy in World War Two, and adopted a typically robust approach towards the Argentines at the time of the invasion, arming himself with Rex Hunt's shotgun, and driving Rex, in full uniform, to the airport.

Latterly, as major domo and chauffeur at Government House he was a most understanding adviser, friend and confidant to a host of governors, our wives and families, helping us to find our feet in a fascinating environment which was far from what many of us knew. We all had reason to be grateful to him. He had unparalleled experience to draw on, knowing the Islands and their people as well as anyone could, he was a fund of local knowledge and common sense. He came to be well known and respected by thousands of visitors to Government House over the years, dealing with all equably no matter how important, and was seen as an admirable representative of the Islands. And of course there was that mischievous sense of humour which saw through any nonsense or pomposity. Don has gone but his reputation will live on: there can be few like him.

We and our families send our sympathy to Vera and all Don's family. We shall remember him with warm affection and deep gratitude. Mavis Hunt, Gordon Jewkes, William Fullerton, David Tatham, Richard Ralph, Donald Lamont, Howard Pearce, Alan Huckle and Nigel Haywood.

HAPPY New Year! I hope everyone enjoyed Christmas. The weather was reasonable, some of the time anyway. Hopefully most folk got to enjoy themselves outside and were able to get to see some of the sports meeting without freezing. The great build-up is well and truly over and done with and the grandchildren tell me it's three hundred and fifty odd days till the next one, but, who's counting, eh?

The festive season is often called a time for excesses and I think that is probably correct. For a lot of women anyway. The cooking can begin some months before hand. The seemingly endless lists of jobs to do and shopping to get will grow ever longer and the list of presents required will be added to it and then the list for Christmas cards.

The wrapping of presents, the writing of the cards, the cleaning and dusting and finally the cooking of the meal and so. it goes on. But, what makes all of it worthwhile is the look on the faces of children as they see and then open their presents. For them it is quantity that matters and loads of small presents look better and seem to give more joy than two or three more expensive ones.

The tomato side shoots growing in the axils of the leaves and stem of each plant can be very untidy and reduce light to the fruits. It also makes it very hard to prop the plant up. It pays to remove them from the moment they first appear, but they will keep growing back again. I am never able to resist the temptation to pop these little "branches' into a pot full of soil and, yes, they usually form little plants which can extend the season by quite a lot some years. Even if they only produce green fruit it is a little extra for the pot or the seed packet.

The earlier bulbous Irises have finished and tidily disappeared

The rhizomed ones are now coming into their own with their beautiful velvety flowers in various colours, some all one colour, others shaded or bi-coloured. The Aquilegias (columbines) are also reliable if rather strangely put-together, but so pretty with it. The Potentillas, both shrubby and perennial types, are full of flowers as are the Aubretias, mainly in pinks and purples, but so plentiful that the flowers look to be falling over each other. The Alliums (ornamental onions) from the very tall purple ones to the shorter yellow ones are showing off their flowers (and the not particularly




pleasant smell) even the chives growing in a raised flower hed look very attractive at the moment. The Alchemilla (Ladies mantle) are covering themselves. with their lovely froth of yellow flowers. Meanwhile the hardy Geraniums (crane's bill) and the Erodiums (stork's bill) have come out and covered their rather large plants in various shades of pinks, whites, blues and purples. The Dianthus, covering many members of the pink family both large and small. are flowering happily, untroubled by any changes in the weather and the Delphiniums are great! The Rhododendrons are still

pulling out the odd surprise and their lovely flowers are always welcome. There is also a beautiful large plant of a pink azalea given to me a couple of years ago by a friend and which this year has fulfilled its promise marvellously.

The roses, including this year's new ones, are really doing well, and even in the weedier areas are flowering happily; exciting times.

Some cock-chaffer grubs have had a field day in the raised bed containing carrots. Admittedly it used to have some strawberry plants in it but they had been removed early





We have problems with some silver poplars determined to populate our garden. Every year we do battle with the suckers which spread a long way. This year they have reached the far ends of the tunnels, some fifty feet away from the parent plants. Left to their own devices they would form thickets all over the vegetable garden and I have to give them full marks for their determination. For every sucker I lift out, three or four take its place. I'm re-naming that variety Hydra

In keeping with most people, we seem to have more lettuce than we can possibly eat and all other vegetables seem to be doing quite well also. I must get out there and hoe the potatoes once more though. The frost last week caught a few, but so far they look to be recovering well.

And now as ever, weeding calls and so: I'm hoping the rain holds off for a couple of days. I shall venture in to the flower beds and greet some old friends again, there's loads to do out there.

Gerald Cheek addressed the Christ Church Cathedral congregation at the service in memory of Baroness Margaret Thatcher on Saturday evening, prior to dedication of the statue of the former Prime Minister Mr Cheek was removed from Stanley and held at Fox Bay by Argentine forces in 1982.

WHEN the Argentines invaded these Islands on the 2nd of April 1982 it certainly came as an extremely traumatic shock to all of us living here at the time. The sight of Argentine amphibious personnel carriers together with their armed soldiers on our streets was to say at least alarming.

Later on that day we saw the Governor Rex Hunt and the Royal Marines being driven to Stanley Airport to be flown out of the Islands. What would happen next. would we also be taken out perhaps to be disappeared in Argentina like so many of their own people who had refused to co-operate with their fascist government.

One can probably imagine our relief when we heard the wonderful news via the BBC that the Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher had directed the Royal Navy to assemble a task force in order to retake the Islands and the first of the ships would be sailing within the next 48 hours.

For the ten weeks of Argentine occupation that followed it seemed like it would never end, but finally on the 14th of June the Argentine forces surrendered. For us Islanders it was tremendous news but it also came as a dreadful shock when we learned that no less than 255 British service men had laid down their lives in order to secure our freedom. We shall never forget them

The next and a more happy event occurred in January 1983 when we heard that Maggie Thatcher was actually here in the Islands, having been flown from Ascension to Stanley Airport in a RAF Hercules with little forewarning. However word spread quickly around the town and by the time she arrived at the entrance to the Government House drive a large crowd had already assembled.

A great cheer went up as the car stopped and Maggie got out and shook hands with many of the people in the waiting crowd.

During the Prime Minister's four day whirlwind tour she visited four Camp settlements and as well as meeting many of the troops she made a point of meeting as many Islanders as possible. The mili-tary had kindly arranged for helicopters to bring them in from the outlying settlements. Mrs Thatcher was welcomed with tremendous

varmth wherever she wen and probably none more so than at Goose Green where the men, women and children who had been incarcerated in the hall gave her hree resounding cheers. Her next appointment.

indeed on this very day 32 years ago, was at Stanley's Town Hall which was packed with grateful well-

wishers, reckoned to be 600 or more, the largest crowd ever seen there. It took the best part of an hour to guide her through to the stage. There she was met by Harold Rowlands, the most senior local officer in the Falkland Islands Govemment, who gave a short speech saying that he was echoing the sentiments of all Falkland Islanders in expressing his pleasure at being able to thank Mrs Thatcher in person for their liberation and pledged Islanders to build a better future to ensure that the war had been worthwhile and that British lives had not been lost in vain.

He then presented her with the scroll conferring upon her the freedom of the Falkland Islands. Clearly elated the Prime Minister made a speech lasting for some twenty minutes, without any notes. She then received the most enthusiastic reception ever witnessed in the Falkland Islands. During her speech she said today the Union Jack flies over Stanley and may it ever fly there. This was followed by the biggest cheer of all from the assembled crowd.

In June 1992. Maggie again visited the Islands together with many of the senior military officers who had commanded the operations in 1982. The principal visit this time was to celebrate the 10th anniversary of the Falkland's War and appropriately she laid a wreath at the Liberation Monument before flying out to San Carlos to also lay a wreath at the British Cemetery. Amongst her many other appointments during this visit she dedicated a trophy For Services to the Community this trophy to be named the Margaret Thatcher tro-

It was with great sadness when we learned of her passing in April 2013. A memorial and thanksgiving service for her life was held in the cathedral here attended by a particularly large congregation.

I believe it to be fitting that. following this service Sir Mark Thatcher will be going to unveil and dedicate a bust in memory of Baroness Thatcher. This bust will perpetuate the memories about what this wonderful lady did for us here in those dark days in 1982 with her courage, determination and resourcefulness in ensuring that we would be freed from the tyranny of Argentina and to remain British as we wished to be then, now and for ever.

military history: comparable to Agincourt, Waterloo, Trafalgar and the Battle of Britain, and my mother would wish that their achievements and their sacrifice be ascribed that proper recognition.

I recall particularly two Welsh Guardsmen who as young men were introduced to the horrors of modern warfare aboard Sir Galahad only a few miles from here at Fitzrov

Both fortunately survived when so many of their comrades did not. Both have chosen to continue to serve to this very day. I refer of course to Garrison Sergeant Major Bill Mott and his brother Major Nicky Mott: great soldiers both. and greater men.

I was so proud that they led the bearer party in St Paul's Cathedral on mothers most important and final journey. Three people joined once again in the common destiny of the Falkland Islands, and our whole family were honoured and grateful that it was so.

It remains only for me to per-form one final and proud duty; to invite you all to demonstrate our allegiance in the time honoured but traditional manner, by asking you all to join me in the Loyal Toast. Governor, Falkland Islanders, "Her Majesty the Queen.

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 Largest team ever to Island Games

THE Falkland Islands will send their largest ever team to an Island Games later this year.

There are six months to go until the NatWest Island Games XVI begin in Jersey. The week of sporting competition will take place between Saturday June 27 and Friday July 3. It will be the second time that Jersey has hosted the event, with the first time in 1997. The Jersey organisers are confident that they will be able to host the best Island Games yet.

The NatWest Island Games is held every two years with 24 Islands taking part in friendly competition in up to 14 sports. Over 3000 competitors are due to travel to Jersey this year

The Falklands will be looking to build upon a successful 2013 NatWest Island Games which was held in Bermuda. There were a range of excellent performances from the Falklands squad with the Football team winning the Bronze medal and a range of new PBs set. The Bermuda Games was precedTHE Island Games began in 1985 as the Inter-Island Games, as part of the Isle of Man International Year of Sport. The event was such a success that it was agreed it should continue. The event is organised by the International Island Games Association.

There will be a mix of experienced competitors and those who will be attending the NatWest Island Games for the first time.

Falkland Islands Overseas Games Association (FIOGA) Secretary Stacy Bragger has been appointed as the Chef de Mission for the Falklands at the Games.

FIOGA Chairman Mike Summers said: "It seems no time since we were planning for Bermuda, and now we are in Island Games year again heading for Jersey, with once again our largest team. The addition of archery also increases our number of representative sports, and we wish all competitors well. A huge amount of training and commitment will be required between now and June. and we appreciate the support we already receive from a large number of Falklands businesses and individuals.

"This is always a great opportunity to show the Falklands at our best and to make friends for life from a wide range of countries and territories.

For the young (and the not so young) the Island Games is a fantastic experience. Whether competitors, managers, organisers or supporters, we will be guaranteed a great reception and a warm welcome in Jersey."

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

LA992 delayed while bullets confiscated from Gallegos pax

ATOTAL of 14 live rounds and 95 empty casings were found in the hold and hand luggage of several passengers departing Mount Pleasant on LAN flight LA992 on Saturday, causing an hour and a half delay in the departure time.

MLA Mike Summers told Penguin News on Wednesday that taking firearms, component parts, live ammunition or spent cartridges on to an aircraft without appropriate permission was prohibited.

"You can't do it, it is against the law. Against Air Navigation Order provisions and against Falklands Law," he said.

Chief of Police Len McGill, confirmed that it was also an offence to be in possession of ammunition without a valid firearms licence.

Then why were those passengers found to be in possession of illegal items not detained rather than let board the flight?

"Because those involved

were not sufficiently clear on what they should have done in the circumstances. They will be entirely clear from here on in," said MLA Summers

He said that attempting to take any of the items mentioned on to an aircraft without appropriate certification was a criminal offence. "In future the Collector of Customs if he thinks that the threshold has been reached, will call the police who will remove any such individual and their luggage from the flight and conduct their enquiries."

The maximum penalty for committing such an offence is an unlimited fine and imprisonment for up to two years.

MLA Summers said that there were gaps in people's understanding of what they could and should have done in the circumstances.

"To be fair, it was brought to light by an earlier incident. We were working through the process to see what was the best way to fix it when last week's incident occurred."

No new law is required to enforce the new protocol which is currently with the relevant departments and there is also a better understanding of how some laws apply, he said

"The Attorney General has briefed police only in the last couple of days on the application of that particular piece of law, which makes a significant difference," said MLA Summers.

He explained that the first passenger to pass through personal security on Saturday was found to have a significant number of items that couldn't be taken onto the aircraft.

This caused a delay right at the beginning, so security officers decided to take all the passengers destined for Rio Gallegos out of the queue and process everyone else first. It was their perception that this was where the principal problem was, said MLA Summers. Attempting to take prohibited items on board aircraft did not only affect the LAN flights, but had also been an issue on the RAF air bridge recently.

In terms of policing Argentine veterans and others while in the Falklands which has been a cause for concern among some residents recently, "there is a lot more goes on than many people realise," said MLA Summers.

"Just because somebody phones the police, but does not immediately see someone face down in the street with an arm up his back, does not mean nothing is happening," said MLA Summers adding that he thought this was important for people to understand.

"Occasionally amongst the visitors there are I think some fantasists, Walter Mitty types, who think they are coming to reclaim their land, but they are just dreamers, and they provide no threat to the Falkland Islands or the people here," he concluded.

THE art of diplomacy is an ancient one and largely a craft to be admired, offering up as it does connotations of skill and fine and delicate statecraft.

Of course when relating it to the Falklands the immediate significance seems sadly rather narrow: little more than that of elected representatives chasing around the globe in the act of limiting the damage inflicted upon our political situation by their Argentine counterparts.

Not that I'm suggesting our MLAs are anything other than masters of the art of promoting our cause - let's face it who can defend or promote the Falklands better than the people themselves? In fact my point is, it is sad that for us the concept of foreign politics has only one dreary meaning.

It was uplifting therefore to interview Science Symposium delegation leader Dr Lyndsey Chura this week and hear the words 'Falklands' and 'diplomacy' in the same sentences as the words 'constructive' and 'collaborative'.

While the lady's view that 'science has no boundaries' might be a bit too optimistic at this end of the South Atlantic (seems to be a big chunk of South America unrepresented) the presence of so many 'leaders in their field' in the Falklands is a great big leap towards much higher profile recognition of the Islands potential for scientific research.

Or to view it from another angle, recognition that this country is so much more than just a political squabble with some hydrocarbons thrown in.

Having said that, sadly politics are always difficult to escape, but 1 hope our 250th birthday celebrations this week won't be marred with too many references to our neighbours, after all they weren't even born then.

Chatting to a member of the younger generation on Tuesday on the subject of how we appear to be increasingly allowing more unsavoury Argentine habits shape our own behaviour. I was quite taken with a comment he made (in a rather charmingly old fashioned manner) which pretty much summed up my feelings: "Yes and what's it come to if we can't even celebrate our heritage without dragging Argentina into it?"



Trough four trial halts in light of new information

THE court had found itself in a "somewhat unusual situation," said Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds on Monday as the trial of Bono John McKay (22), Lauren Joyce Mckay (19), Dylan Stephenson (22) and Arthur Leonard Pitaluga Turner (48) was adjourned to a date yet to be set.

The four deny charges that they assaulted George Toolan (21) in the vicinity of the Trough on June 29, 2014 and charges of witness intimidation on August 16.

Mrs Faulds said she had found herself "kangarooed" out of the trial as Crown Prosecutor Simon Rowe revealed that some further previously undisclosed information regarding the trial had come to light leading up to the weekend and he had taken the decision to cancel the witnesses scheduled for Monday.

To avoid placing the Senior Magistrate in the position that she could not hear the trial, and of placing an individual in a position, "where his reputation may be harmed unjustly," Mr Rowe said he would not mention any names.

Mr Rowe said that the Royal Falkland Islands Police (RFIP)

had drawn his attention to an individual involved in the case last week, however at the time of the pre-trial hearing on Monday (January 12) he was not able to determine if the information was disclosable or not.

Further enquiries had been carried out in the UK, by a UK police force which culminated in Mr Rowe making disclosures to defence lawyer Simon Crowder on Thursday evening.

Mr Rowe said they been hopeful it would not impact on the trial, however on Sunday Mr Crowder had informed him that this was not the case.

Mr Crowder told the court that the additional information meant that additional advocates would be needed as at least "two different positions," could arise. Mr Rowe said he was con-

Mr Rowe said he was conscious that the court was booked for another trial on February 9. "Enquiries may not be the most straightforward given the location of the individuals," he said, adding that UK based investigations could slow things down.

Mrs Faulds adjourned the case for a pre-trial hearing on Friday (today) at 1.30pm.

Companies combine in heli support of forces



AAR Airlift, a US company that provides a range of aviation services, together with British International Helicopters (BIII) and Air Rescue Systems (ARS), will provide a combined Search and Rescue (SAR) and Support Helicopter service to the British Forces South Atlantic Islands.

The programme will include AgustaWestland AW-189 SAR helicopters, Sikorsky S-61 support helicopters, flight operations, maintenance, logistics, and facilities support at Mount Pleasant and the surrounding maritime region.

The mission includes allweather SAR, helicopter emergency medical services, rescue hoist operations, passenger and cargo transfers, and night vision imaging systems. Readiness states vary from 15 minutes to 60 minutes response and require a 24/7 operation. The 10-year contract will begin in April 2016.

lan Craddock. Head of Helicopters 2 in the Defence Equipment and Support department, said: "I have every confidence that AAR Airlift have the capability and experience to provide a search and rescue service that maintains the high standards set by the Royal Air Force, who we must thank for the service they have delivered to-date.

"We will work closely with AAR through the period of transition, with the RAF continuing to provide search and rescue cover until the new service starts. I am also pleased that AAR will be sub-contracting British International Helicopters, who are already successfully providing support helicopter services in the Falkland Islands, to support delivery of the combined service."

Pan-American scientific delegation visit is diplomacy with a difference

THE visit this week of a Pan-American science delegation is a, "phenomenal opportunity for the Falklands to engage in public and science diplomacy by bringing together eminent researchers and members of the media," the British Embassy representative leading the delegation explained to Penguin News this week.

Senior Policy Advisor Science and Innovation at the Embassy in Washington Dr Lindsay Chura who is escorting the 15-strong delegation, said the visit would "significantly raise the profile of the Falklands as a destination that offers wide ranging opportunities for collaborative research in both the physical and natural sciences."

With the knowledge in mind that science diplomacy is gaining traction around the world as a way of bringing together people of all different backgrounds in a constructive manner, the South Atlantic Environmental Research Institute (SAERI) and Falkland Islands Government this week welcomed researchers from six different countries plus members of the Uruguayan media and a representative from National Geographic The scientists, who are at the top of their fields, travelled to the Islands from Brazil, Mexico, Canada, USA, Colombia and Chile.

The entire week, or scientific symposium, as it has been billed, has been hosted jointly by FIG and SAERI. MLA Michael Poole, holder of the environmental portfolio, was opening speaker at the tirst session.

He said the visit had been of great value: "Not only has it allowed us to explore the range of different research opportunities that exist here across a number of scientific disciplines but it has also allowed us to learn from what is being done by the international institutions represented by our distinguished guests.

"This is clearly important to a community such as ours that places such value on understand-

ing and managing our natural environment."

The visit builds upon that of SAERI's Dr Paul Brickle and former Governor Nigel Haywood to the USA in 2013, which resulted in a number of Memorandum of Understanding agreements with US research institutions and also a number of science exchanges. Dr Brickle said that while "good science" was already being done in the Falkland Islands and wider South Atlantic, it was mainly in support of environmental and fisheries management. "There is a great deal about our environment we don't know so building on the science that we do well and diversifying that is critical for enhanced environmental management now and into the future."

Dr Brickle said he and his team at SAER1 were "absolutely delighted" to have eminent scientists from a variety of disciplines in the Falkland Islands for the symposium. "It has been an extremely productive week: we have a number of project ideas in discussion and we are writing a grant for one of them already.

"The week will end with agreed projects to pursue and agreements between the institutions that the scientists represent with regard to going forward with science in the Falklands and wider South Atlantic.

"This will greatly enable SA-ERI and other science organisations within the region to collaborate and conduct research in environments which they would not ordinarily have access to."

The idea for the science symposium was developed with SA-ERI and FIG over the past year. Dr Chura said. It was necessary to have a large enough delegation to "make a real impact in trying to bring together researchers to really understand all of the scientific opportunities that exist here in the Falklands."

"We wanted to get the people who would be of most benefit to science in the Falklands and would amplify the message far and wide across the Americas," said Dr Chura.

The visiting scientists gave presentations on a range of subjects including advances in marine mammal science, remote sensing in the Antarctic, evolutionary ecology of plant reproduction and more social sciencebased talks. In return SAERI and members of the Falkland Islands Government talked about fisheries science, spatial ecology for coastal and marine management and environmental and regulatory legislation for the developing hydrocarbons industry.

There was also an opportunity for the delegation to hear about future research and collaboration opportunities in South Georgia.

In addition to their meetings throughout the week, the visitors had the opportunity to view Falkland Islands wildlife up close with visits to Volunteer Point, Kidney Island and Whale Point.

A number of the delegates also volunteered to give presentations to the public at two events hosted by Bittersweet.

I WAS pleased to see the bust of Margaret Thatcher in place when I arrived home last week; I think the likeness is extraordinarily good, while at the same time it conveys the lady's strength of character, a fantastic achievement by Steve Massam.

This week we see the visit of eminent scientists from the Americas for the Science Symposium. it's unlikely that we have ever before had so many professors and doctors visiting the Islands at any one time. It is to be hoped that the links forged will be valuable and long lasting. In the meantime it is good to hear how much they are enjoying the experience and to learn from such distinguished guests. I have been fascinated by the range of specialism represented from the most esoteric to the most basic.

Back into the regular meetings this week I have meetings at FIDC and with the board of the Chamber of Commerce, a meeting of Mineral Resources Committee and the regular Assembly Members' meetings with the Chief Executive and the Governor. Another significant factor in the use of MLA's time is representative attendance at various social events often for visitors or part of local ceremonials and events. Impact of oil and gas on you **Regeneris** launches study

WHAT are the current features of society and life in the Falklands that are most valued by Falkland Islanders? What are the potential impacts of oil and gas development on these features of the Falklands, both good and bad?

As the Falklands gears up for the next round of oil and gas exploration, a new study is starting up to explore the effects of oil and gas development on society in the Falklands.

The work will provide a detailed understanding of the many different ways that oil and gas developments could affect the daily lives of Falkland Islanders. It will develop a set of society impact measures that will be monitored annually as oil and gas development proceeds.

The study has been commissioned by the Falkland Islands Government supported by some funding from Premier Oil and Noble Energy. UK-based Regeneris Consulting has been appointed to lead the work. Stephen Nicol, project director, and Stuart Younger, project manager, were part of the same team that undertook a detailed study in 2013 of possible scenarios for future oil and gas development.

The current Regeneris-led team also includes two Islanders, Carolyn Montgomerie and Karen Lee, who will be supporting the work throughout.

The Regeneris-led team will be running a series of small focus groups on the Islands over the last

two weeks of February, discussing with the community different ways oil and gas development has affected their lives to date, and their hopes and concerns about its effects in the future.

The team will explore what people value about the way of life on the Falklands, and the particular characteristics that make it what it is. They will seek to understand the aspects that people are most keen to see protected and preserved, and will explore how these things can best be measured.


Following the focus groups, an online survey will run in March which all adult residents will be encouraged to complete. This might include questions to measure how safe people feel, how happy people are with their jobs and other aspects of their lives, or how people feel about diversity in the community.

Jamie Fotheringham Head of Policy at FIG said: "This study is important to help ensure that the economic benefits from oil and gas don't come at the cost of damaging the important social and cultural features of living in the Falklands. Through this work, the Government and the oil companies can monitor and so minimise any negative impacts on the special features of our society and culture

Managing Director of Regeneris Consulting Stephen Nicol said: "We are delighted to be working in the Falklands again. This study is all about finding out from the people of the Falklands what they hold dear about their way of life. It is vital that we properly capture these views over the next few months

Your questions answered

Qunder what circumstances can a non-tax paying individual, for example a contractor at Mt Pleasant or tourist, utilise services at KEMH? Many contractors work at Mt Pleasant on tax-free contracts and are registered as patients at the Medical Centre under the NHS system; tourists, , have very choice when they visit the Islands in seeking assistance at KEMH. How are costs to the patient met in these circumstances?

Sometimes patients are referred to KEMH from MPA, but can an individual refer themselves, or must they only be referred by the Medical Officer?

Director of Health and Social Services Derek Muhl responded to this and the following questions

Any tourist/visitor who Antends KEMH will pay for treatment, unless they are a UK resident and entitled to free treatment on the NHS. In these circumstances, treatment free of charge will be provided under the reciprocal agreement with the UK.

MoD contractors working at MPC receive their primary care (ie GP service) at MPC and are not entitled to use KEMH unless referred by the Medical Officers at the MPC Medical Centre. The only exceptions are those Falkland Islanders or those with F1 status working at MPC who are registered at KEMH.

Qlf the someone has entered the Islands without Falkland Islands status, a work permit or medical insurance and then requires emergency medical evacuation how is this funded?

Although medical insurance Ais not an entry requirement in regard to persons seeking entry to the Falkland Islands by way of a visitor's permit, it is strongly recommended for all visitors to be in possession of a travel medical insurance policy that includes provision for emergency aeromedical evacuation. In the situation described lif an individual has no medical insurance cover, then he she would be liable for the costs of medical evacuation, unless other arrangements have been made; for example, if the visitor has been sponsored by a Falkland Islander, then the sponsor would be hable for the costs.

Obviously, anyone, irrespective of their nationality or status, who is unwell and needs urgent treatment while in the Falklands will be seen and cared for by the KEMH staff. If medical evacuation is deemed necessary then this will be facilitated by the KEMH, even if FIG is not responsible for the cost.

Qls it true locum pharmacists are paid £300 a day? How much have locum pharmacists cost FIG in the last 12 months?

Why is there no on call pharmacists? Has there been a risk assessment put into place for a major incident were to occur? Is it true that overseas medical care for some individuals is weighed up or put aside based on the urgency of each case and made to wait until a new budget is released?

A Locum staff who can be very expensive but not always so, are only engaged to cover gaps in our services due to staff leave, sickness or other absences, where appropriate local arrangements for cover cannot be made. This is inevitable at times, since the health and social services directorate employs a range of highly skilled professionals, but with only small numbers (sometimes only one) in each section. In most cases, the individual locum is not actually employed by FIG, but through a locum agency who are paid by FIG, with the agency then paying the individual locum.

There is no formal pharmacy on-call service, this is not necessary since medical staff have ready access to pharmacy out of hours should this be required. In the event of a major incident, the major incident plan would be activated and any staff required to assist would be available.

All potential referrals for overseas medical treatment/diagnosis are considered at a weekly meeting to which all doctors are required to attend. The discussion focuses on the clinical needs of the individual patient and each case is given very careful consideration. The personal situation of the individual will be taken into account, as will the length of time the patient may have to wait once he she arrives in the UK/ Chile. Financial considerations may be taken into account when looking at whether it is preferable to send a patient to the UK or Chile, for example. The airbridge is expensive, but NHS treatment is provided free of charge; the air fare to Punta is less expensive, but the treatment has to be paid for. In some cases, overseas referral is not considered necessary, because a visiting specialist is due in the Islands and this is considered to be the most appropriate arrangement.

The Medical Treatment Overseas budget is voted to KEMH annually, so there is no question of referrals that need to be made, having to wait 'until a new budget is released'.

Paedophilia must be rooted out says PM

PRIME Minister David Cameron has said that paedophilia and sexual abuse must be "rooted out" on the island of St Helena, which is supported by £20 million a year of British aid.

Mr Cameron commended British newspaper the Telegraph on its report on Tuesday, and called on the authorities to be "very, very tough," on offenders, on the back of the revelation that some child abusers had been given court fines as low as £50.

According to an article by Tom Rowley and Christopher Hope for the Telegraph, Mr Cameron would not confirm that an independent inquiry into the abuse would go back as far as 2002, when the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) was first warned about the problem.

Ivy Ellick, the former head of public health and social services

on the island, said she told the Government 13 years ago that the island "couldn't cope" with the abuse. But the Government only launched the inquiry last year, when it was contacted by two whistleblowers. The inquiry is led by Sasha Wass QC, who prosecuted Rolf Harris.

The Telegraph investigation referred to Leslie Clingham, a former Falklands resident, who was not brought to court until seven years after he admitted to police that he had sexually abused a child and during that time worked as a sheltered accommodation deputy manager and was allowed to carry out a relationship with a resident who had suffered a stroke.

In June 2013, a Dorset Police report failed to substantiate any criminal allegations against Jeromy Cairns-Wicks, the former social work manager, or to suspend him from his job as a police officer. Five months later, after Cairns-Wicks was imprisoned for separate firearms offences, he was finally sentenced to 11 years in prison for sexually assaulting a nine-year-old. Cairns-Wicks was formerly employed as a police officer in the Falkland Islands. Pam Trevillion, who produced the Dorset report, has since been employed as the St Helena's head of crime, running child abuse investigations;

The UK government has invested £250 million into building an airport on St. Helena, due to open in 2016, but the Lucy Faithfull Foundation now warns the airport could make St. Helena a sex tourism destination unless drastic action is taken to improve policing and aid victims of abuse.

Young people 'impassioned and knowledgeable' says returning researcher Matt

A HUMAN geography researcher from Newcastle University will return to the Falklands in the first two weeks of February to continue a research project funded by the Leverhulme Trust.

Matt Benwell has been conducting research on issues related to the Falklands for five years and is particularly interested in how young Islanders (aged 16-30) learn about the geopolitical past and present of the place in which they grow up.

His research involves listening to the perspectives of young people, alongside those of representatives of the Falkland Islands Government, teachers and youth group leaders.

As Mr Benwell was keen to point out: "Young people are rarely credited with having anything useful or well-informed to say about geopolitics but young Falkland Islanders have continually shown me that they are impassioned and knowledgeable when it comes to talking about their community, its history, as well as the Island's relations with the UK.

"These voices are representative of a bright future for the Islands and demand our attention as academics".

Indeed, Mr Benwell has followed with great interest the ways in which the Falklands Government has invited young Islanders, as representatives of the Falklands, to diplomatic meetings at the UN and throughout Latin America and has written a book chapter about these developments

in a forthcoming collection entitled 'Children, young people and critical geopolitics' published by Ashgate.

One of Mr Benwell's more recent research interests focuses on the ways in which Falkland Islanders, both young and old, engage with international relations through their use of social networking and other online technologies. He explained to Penguin News how this interest developed: "Along with my colleague Al Pinkerton (Royal Holloway, University of London) we have been increasingly struck by the assertive ways citizens from the Falkland Islands are using online platforms to make and counter geopolitical points: to. in effect, make diplomatic points aimed at international audiences. Particularly interesting here is the fact that these are no longer just concentrating on the past or the sovereignty dispute but, instead, on projecting the Falkland Islands as a vibrant, diverse and forwardlooking society on the international stage".

While the internet has enhanced the opportunities for Islanders to have their voices heard globally. Mr Benwell wishes to explore the historical precedents to the participation of citizens in international affairs. Thus, during this trip he is very keen to speak to people who can remember another key moment in Falkland's history which saw citizens 'mobilise' and express themselves: the visit of Lord Chalfont to the Falkland Islands in 1968.

"With the 50th anniversary of the Chalfont visit upon us in a few years this is an event which deserves further exploration, especially given its relevance to the more recent diplomatic engagements of Islanders," he added.

If anyone was present at the protest or has any photographs or posters which were used on the day he would be extremely interested. In addition, if anyone has any useful insights concerning Islander participation in other similar kinds of historical events Mr Benwell would be equally interested to hear about them.



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



For next year if you wish to plan ahead and not purchase your favourite well priced Macsween haggis then why not try growing your own just follow this easy step guide


Haggis is best grown from cuttings from the parent tuber than from seeds. Make sure you buy your haggis tuber from Scotland and beware of cheap argentine imitations.

Take a sharp knife I know a few wives that use their tongues but I wouldn't recommend this on hygiene grounds anyway cut cubes of the haggis tuber about 5cm square.Take an old bowl or cup and fill with sheep manure, water liberally then after a week dust the bottom (the cutting's not your own) with a rooting hormone powder. Try and source the best Robbie Burns compost and plant the cuttings in the compost.Place them on a radiator so they get good bottom heat. Commonsense vs bureaucracy

MLA Mike Summers asked the Chief Executive to, "use his good offices to ensure that bureaucracy was not holding up commonsense," with regard to the slow progress on the prison extension at Thursday's meeting of Legislative Assembly.

There appeared to be, "a dispute of a bureaucratic nature," between the Public Works Department and the procurement functions of the Government which was holding up progress on the temporary extension to the back of the building. MLA Summers said he was not clear on all the details surrounding the issue, but added, "with only one supplier for the prison it seems difficult to see why people are being made to jump through so many hoops."

MLA Summers commended Police Officer Matt Jenkins on recently qualifying as a crimes scene investigator but noted that apart from within the management structure there were no local police officers at the moment which was a cause for concern.

Legal highs found in mail

THE import of 61 'legal highs' with an estimated value of £1,500 was intercepted in the mail by Customs and Immigration in December. Falklands law prohibits the import of psycho-active substances into the Islands. Customs and Immigration Officer Mick Floyd said that including the December incident there had been 106 items in eight seizures confiscated since the law had been introduced in 2012.

Teacher shortage means plans for 'more robust' recruitment process

MORE robust form of recruitment teachers of for Falklands schools is to be implemented in the next round, confirmed MLA Elsby Barry at yesterday's meeting of Legislative Assembly

Responding to a question from MLA Jan Cheek who expressed concern that at the Community

School staff shortages holder M had lead to teachers being required to, "cover," which in turn had reduced their lesson

planning and preparation time. MLA Elsby acknowledged that this was a problem. He said there had long been a problem retaining staff at FICS, unlike at the Infant Junior School/CE where the situation had stabilised. Within this more robust recruitment process he said it was their aim not just to interview people face to face but involve the LEAD organisation, "of which we are now a member," to use that expertise to try and view the teacher actually teaching.

He hoped this would lead to the recruitment of teachers that would fit in and would not, "come with a wrong expectation of the Islands"

The issue of a, "long delay," of the publication of the inspection report (see page 4 for more information) on the two schools undertaken some months ago, was also the subject of a question. MLA Elsby explained that inspection of the Infant Junior School/ CE was carried out in November 10.11, with the inspection of FICS in November 12/13. He said the writing up of the report had to fit in with the lead inspector's workload. inspector was The primarily in the Islands to work with school the primary school at MPA, being as he

that at the Community Education portfolio is, a Service Children's School staff shortages holder MLA Elsby Schools Inspector.

The final reports were received by the Education Department in early January 2015 while the schools were on summer break. Small typing corrections were completed by January 14 and the final report was shared with the Chief Executive, Education Board and the Governor in the following week. Teachers received a copy on January 23. From January 26 they were made widely available to the media and public.

MLA Elsby explained: "This is not a formal Ofsted report because that is an organisation. We could have chosen to have a formal Ofsted report by bringing many more people in," but emphasised that the, "person who did this inspection is one of Her Majesty's inspectors," and a senior adviser to inspectors. He said the standards the inspector applied to the Falklands school would be the same applied had he been working as a team of Ofsted inspectors anywhere in the UK.



Opinion formers visit Islands

FIVE Brazilian academic "opinion formers" are currently visiting the Falklands. The group includes professors from the Brazilian Centre for International Relations, the University of Brasilia, the Federal University of Latin American Integration, and the Pontifical Catholic University of Rio de Janeiro. They have been introduced to Falklands hydrocarbon exploration and Falklands economics and met with, among others, Chamber of Commerce members and MLAs.

Sapper Hill housing news

ON the 70th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz, the concentration Camp where more than a million Jews were killed, young children were separated from their families and parents prayed their own lives would be taken rather than their children's, we as a community are, to paraphrase MLA Phly Rendell, in danger of fragmenting, because of the behaviour of a handful of inconsequential and misguided Argentine visitors on the streets of Stanley. I guess they (or more accurately 'she' who funds these visits) is feeling pretty damn good about themselves right now.

Well I don't. I feel ashamed to be caught up in it all. There is enough hatred in the world without us adding to it. We need to get things into perspective and realise we are some of the luckiest people alive. We have a thriving economy, despite Argentina's best efforts to stifle growth: we have zero unemployment or homelessness and a great environment to bring up children who will be given every opportunity within the education system to really make something of their lives. Teach them our history and why we have to maintain a strong political stance in the face of Argentina's sovereignty claim, but don't teach them to hate. "Hatred eats the soul of the hater, not the hated." said Holocaust survivor Alice Herz-Sommer, an inspirational woman who lived to the ripe old age of 110.

Anti-flag petition collects 494 names

TREAT the bad behaviour of Argentine visitor's with the contempt it deserves, was MLA Jan Cheek's advice to the large group who gathered at the Chamber of Commerce for a public meeting on Monday evening.

The meeting chaired by MLA Barry Elsby was dominated by the subject of a recent petition demanding action from the Falkland Islands Government in relation to Argentine visitors displaying Argentine flags which was described as "disturbing and distressing" for many Islanders.

Kris Thorsen presented the petition containing 494 signatures to MLAs at the end of the meeting.

She questioned whether most people were aware of the level of distress in the older population, some of whom locked themselves in their houses when they knew there were Argentines in the town, she told MLAs, adding: "Is this the sort of community we want?"

Attorney General Peter Judge said there was legislation under the public order act which could be applied in these incidences, "If the actions of the individual are intended to be threatening and abusive or if that individual is aware that is the case, they will have committed an offence and the police will be able to take action."

However, Mr Judge warned, all laws have to be seen within the context of the Constitution and enshrined in the freedom of expression.

Chief of Police, Superintendent Len McGill explained that a lot of work, had taken place over the last month to look at how to manage situations. The bottom line was simple, said Supt McGill. The displaying of a national flag did not create an offence, unless accompanied by some chanting, a placard or slogan then maybe it would be a public order offence.

Tim Miller said that when an Argentine flag is displayed in the Falklands it was of a country that was claiming the Falklands "in the same way it did 33 years ago." The only difference was that it was not live bullets that were flying this time, he said adding that "war had been declared albeit it was economic this time."

The RFIP should make it their mission to protect the, "peaceful and quiet, local population from the shock, distress and mental trauma of what these visitors do," said Mr Miller.

MLA Gavin Short agreed with Tim Miller and said that during the Crimes Bill select committee there had seemed to be uncertainty within the Police Force that they had the powers needed. He said this was why he had put forward an amendment to the law, which was not supported by his colleagues. "I believe what is going on now has gone beyond what can reasonably be considered freedom of speech," said MLA Short. He said there were more politically motivated visits than ever before and he believed Falkland Island law should be protecting the population from that group.

MLA Mike Summers said there was another element to be considered and that was "the reality of who these people are and what they could do to us." He said that but by and large they were a bunch of fantasists. "These people can't hurt us, they are just here to try and justify to themselves that they got their backsides severely kicked 30 odd years ago, and pretending that they are something in this country. They are not. They are nothing," he said. The way to help people who may feel frightened, was to explain that they cannot be hurt by these visitors. said MLA Summers.

MLA Phyl Rendell recognised that the issue had been, "pussy footed around" for quite some time, perhaps worried about speaking out about the subject. "It's very important for people to know that we are all joined up and are one community. "We MLAs back the police, back the Attorney General and we must work together to make sure our laws are enforced and enforceable.

"As a community we must not fragment we must work together." said MLA Rendell.

Electronic ship clearance

LIMITED electronic clearance by Customs and Immigration for some Falklands flagged fishing vessels is expected to commence next month, but had taken "an unseemly long time," to put in place, said MLA Mike Summers on Thursday.

He said the Director of Emergency Services and MLAs were unhappy with how long it had taken to get the request from the Falkland Islands Fishing Companies Association (FIFCA) operational .

Limited electronic clearance for some FI flagged vessels probably those working in the Loligo fishery that have already been cleared by Customs and Immigration and then go on fishing which have limited or no contact with other vessels, would be available, said MLA Summers, adding that it would not be the case for vessels with unknown or regular contact with other vessels on the high seas.

New role for Stephanie at FITB

STEPHANIE Middleton is to be the Interim Chief Executive Officer, of the Tourist Board "with a view to her taking on the full role in two years time following further strategic mentoring," it was announced this week.

This interim appointment becomes effective on April 1. 2015, to coincide with the move to London of the current CEO Tony Mason where he takes up the newly established position of Director of International Communications.

The Board meanwhile recognises that the Tourism Development Strategy (TDS) requires considerable focus and is to appoint an appropriately qualified strategist to work alongside Stephanic, other board members, the tourism industry and FIG in order to update and implement significant elements of the TDS as soon as is practicable.

Burglar in custody

A STANLEY youth has been remanded in custody after he admitted eight charges of burglary on January 21.

On Wednesday the youth reappeared in court when it was established that he could be remanded for a longer length of time pending a pre-sentence report and the arrival of consultant psychiatrist Tim McInnerney for assessment.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds adjourned the court until February 18, when she said further consideration would be given to what could be done for the youth's future.

Extra lawyer required

AN additional lawyer is to be brought to the Islands for the trial of Bono and Lauren McKay, Dylan Stephenson and Arthur Turner.

A date is yet to be confirmed for the trial, however due to court availability it was beginning to look more like April. A further pre-trial review is to be held on February 3.

RM widow brings husband's ashes to the Islands he loved

THIRTY-three years after Royal Marine, the late Cpl Mick Sellen, served with Naval Party 8901 in the Falklands, his widow Sandie has carried his ashes back to the Islands.

As a result of a poignant coincidence she was also presented with her husband's original kit bag by an Islander who came across it after the 1982 War.

Sandie Sellen told Penguin News this week that her husband, who died just over a year ago, so enjoyed his 1981-82 tour of the Falklands that he asked that his ashes be scattered in the Islands.

At a recent Royal Marine reunion party, she told Mick's friends Figgy, and also Ray Bloye, who were in the Falklands with him during his tour, about his wish.

In no time at all the pair arranged the visit and along with Sandie and Mick's sister Jo, five of Mick's former Royal Marines and a number of spouses flew to the Islands.

Because Mick loved the sea and the beautiful Falklands wildlife the group arranged to fly to Carcass Island last Friday and were then transported to Steeple Jason on Michael and Jeanette Clarke's boat *Condor*.

Esther's new Conservation CEO

ESTHER Bertram is the new face of Falklands Conservation but she's not a face new to the Falklands

Speaking to Penguin News last week, Chief Executive Officer Mrs Bertram, who arrived two weeks ago, has been visiting the Islands for the last fourteen years on cruise ships, and is well acquainted with the superb hospitality (and cooking) of Guest House owner Kay McCallum.

During her many visits to the Islands Mrs Bertram was primarily examining the Falklands (along with Punta Arenas, Ushuaia and ports of South Africa) for their potential as 'gateways' to the Antarctic.

She studied how they and the cruise ships might benefit from both a tourism and economic perspective.

Over that period she got to know staff of Falklands Conservation and was thus able to observe the organisation grow, courtesy of its, "very dedicated," team.

Mrs Bertram has other family reasons for her fascination for this part of the world. Her Grandfather spent time in Antarctica in the 1930s as part of an expedition that discovered the peninsular was attached to the rest of the continent. He was a biologist and in charge of the dog teams, she explained.

The eccentric gentleman even offered up a bit of seal meat to her grandmother while asking for her hand in marriage.

Mrs Bertram, who is accompanied by husband Sacha (a marine biologist) and two year old daughter Xenia (pronounced Zenya) is from Cambridge and has for ten years worked for an organisation called Flora and Fauna International, an international species conservation organisation.

She also runs a small organisation based in Uganda that undertakes conservation and education projects. In fact it was in Uganda where she met her husband, while working as a cook on a wildlife reserve. Her brief and, "not very successful," career as a chef occurred after the organisation she was starting up, "was having lots of problems with insurgents coming over from the Congo. So I decided I had better go and see some wildlife rather than spend the time in a war zone," she said.

But why the Falklands? "There are so many things happening here and everyone has such a passion for their natural environment. I wanted to be part of that strong feeling. Even though I am not from here I want to try to have a role where one can connect with the people and find the best way to enhance that environment. I want to try and learn from people what it is they are passionate about and how Falklands Conservation can be of benefit to them."

With SAERI dealing with the more science side of things, "we can be more outreach, for example with the Watch Group, and do very practical on the ground work," said Mrs Bertram. She added: "You can really

She added: "You can really only learn from the people who are there working in the environment. It is their resource; they are responsible for it. It's not about us coming in and telling them what to do, but finding out what are the things they really care about; if they have needs, and what they want from Falklands Conservation."

She said she was: "still in that absorbing time trying to speak to as many people as possible, without making too many judgements at this stage."

I HOPE the public meeting this week has clarified a few matters for people. It is sad that people are made anxious by the provocative behaviour of a minority of Argentine visitors. It is important that anyone who feels genuinely alarmed or threatened by the conduct of others, including visitors contact the police immediately. They need to have firm evidence; they cannot act upon hearsay and rumour. As I said at the public meeting there is also much to be said for treating those who behave badly while guests in our country with the contempt they deserve, much as you would the bully who tries to intimidate or provoke.

My sympathy for those who scour the internet for material to be offended by is limited. I too could find things I would regard as offensive but have much better things to do with my time. As with Facebook, life is much too short to waste on a virtual world when you can enjoy real life. A couple of recent studies have shown that some people who spend a lot of time on social networking sites end up rather dissatisfied with their lives, possibly because they do not match up to the way others portray their lives on line, even though those postings often are very selective and

sometimes pure fantasy. With the 'Visiting season well underway MLAs spend a fair amount of time each week meeting visiting politicians. journalists and other visitors. This week is no exception with several meetings time tabled. It is time well spent if they then leave with a clear idea of how we operate with what is in effect the population of a village running a sizeable country. One thing that surprises many is that we are well aware of the many pitfalls associated with a potential oil industry and that much of our planning and preparatory work began in the mid-1990s, years before the first exploratory drilling round. As importantly, if they come with open eyes and minds, none of our visitors will leave in any doubt that we Falkland Islanders are the rightful inhabitants.

Final phase for rat eradicators

THE RRS Ernest Shackleton departed Stanley on Thursday night bound for Mare Harbour to pick up the South Georgia Heritage Trust Rat Eradication team flying in on the LAN flight to continue with their programme at South Georgia

The third and final part of the project will cover some 380 square kilometres from King Edward Point to the southern end of the island in the final push to wipe out rats from South Georgia once and for all, to protect the island's wildlife.

The world's largest rodent eradication project to ever take place, the UK-led effort will see three helicopters dropping 100 tonnes of the poison Brodifacoum on the British overseas territory next year.

Project Director Tony Martin told Penguin News last week that the team of 20 would include the same pilots let by new Zealander Peter Gordon as well as the same aircraft which had been used in the previous phases in 2011 and 2013.

Some 400 hours flying was anticipated to spread the poison, said Mr Martin adding that the team would remain in South Georgia until either the project was completed or the onset of winter forced their departure. With suitable weather conditions the project was hoped to be completed by the end of March.

Mr Martin said he was also pleased to be working with Captain Robert Paterson who along with his crew on the Shackleton had carried out some "pretty remarkable work," getting the vast quantities of supplies ashore in 2013.

South Georgia is a crucial breeding ground for over 100 million seabirds including penguins, albatrosses and pintails, which feed on the foodrich waters of the Southern Ocean.

Rats introduced two centuries ago by sailors and whalers have devastated the island's seabirds, causing their populations to drop by more than 90 per cent.

While Mr Martin could not say how many rats had been killed during the eradication so far, he did say that so far there had not been evidence of any rats remaining in the cleared areas, and Sally Poncet's recent find of a South Georgia Pipit nest with five young in an area cleared in 2013, was "a good indication that it was working."



IJS teaching standards raised says report

THE Infant and Junior School and Camp Education have raised the standard of education from 'Satisfactory' in 2010 to a rating of 2 'Good' in every judgement area according to a report of the school inspection carried out in November 2014 by Mike Chislett of Service Children's Education

This is believed to be the first time since formal inspection grades were introduced in the Falkland Islands that a school has been graded as 'Good'.

The report for IJS and Camp Education praised the pupils' highly positive attitudes to learning and noted that consistently good teaching alongside the engaging and creative curriculum achieved the high quality of learning. The report also highlights the collaboration between IJS and Camp Education, FICS and Mount Pleasant School. Ms Steen said: "IJS and Camp

Ms Steen said: "IJS and Camp Education are thrilled with the outcome of the inspection: it is evidence of the diligence, dedication and determination of our staff, children and school leaders. Our children receive a good education and we aim to strive towards achieving outstanding teaching and learning. The report verifies our self evaluation and supports our next steps as we work alongside our colleagues at FICS towards our shared goals."

The Falkland Islands Community School (FICS) has improved significantly since 2010.

FICS gained an overall rating of 3 'requires improvement' which is a grade up from the last inspection.

The report praised the calm and balanced learning environment, the provision for students with special educational needs (SEN) and the commitment to improving consistent teaching standards under the new leadership team. Another inspection of FICS is scheduled for the first term of the 2015/16 academic year.

2015/16 academic year. Headteacher of FICS Mar-tin Winward said: "The school recognises the significant steps achieved in a relatively short space of time. Such rapid change has been necessary and we look forward to implementing recommendations from the report with the continued support of our School Managers, Education Board, staff, students and parents. The report is long overdue and we welcome this benchmark in being able to build capacity and improve further. Our collaborative and collegiate approach with our partners at IJS & Camp Education is vital as we strive for excellence in raising standards and attainment at FICS."

Playing into their hands

I WAS heartened by the letter entitled "Sad at hatred" in last week's Penguin News. I thought it ably put into perspective the current hyped-up furore about flags and uniforms.




Mr Alazia said he thought they had eaten as many as they had shorn.

Over the garden fence with Ginge Kidd

Yesterday was rather unpleasantly windy in the front garden by the afternoon, but in a sheltered spot at the back the lawn sprinkler came into play. Not a requirement for the lawn but a wonderful game for the girls. They were tired out and slept like logs till late morning so I took the opportunity this offered for some physic for my knee. I do get plenty of exercise every day and a friend has loaned me an exercise cycle to use in quiet moments, but I seldom get to go for a walk, so I left Grandpa guarding all sleeping beauties and took myself to the Kelper Store, west of us.

The morning was so quiet and beautiful that the smell of honeysuckle, lupins, pinks, Rosa alba (known as the Chilean rose) and many other flowering plants, was strong and lovely. A joy to be out for a stroll, (or a bit of a canter really) in those conditions.

Weeding on the front border is finally showing results, with more areas clean than those covered in grass. It has obviously been considerably wetter than last year at this time because the Hostas, when uncovered are in fine fettle and have grown a great deal too.

Having said that, although the days since Christmas have been mainly windy and therefore cool, under cover everything remains very warm and thirsty. Watering in the heat of the day may not

it is very necessary, and this is true of some areas outside as well, especially where bushes or trees shelter plants from rain and also remove a lot of the moisture with their stronger roots. Water is best applied before wilting and suffering begins, and it does no harm in heat providing it is a good soak. preferably of the surrounding soil, although, as long as it is lots of water it should not do much damage to a plant as it will cool it. But, a swift sprinkle will cause spotting and wilting as the plant 'cooks'. After all, in hotter countries, gardeners are employed during daylight hours, rather than evenings aren't they? And lawn sprinklers running through the day, seldom required in this coun-

try, do no harm elsewhere. Speaking of lawns, my 'mechanical gardener' has been out with his lawn mower and his electric lawn raker. Not to be outdone one of the younger grandchildren was out with a blunt pair of scissors trimming the grass edges and raking also. The girls, while staying here have been encouraged to garden also (well did they really have a choice?) Each has an area under cover and outside to call their own. They are each growing strawberries tomatoes and other bits and pieces. It has also lead to quite a competition between them especially over the sunflowers.

Under cover feeding of toma-

toes, peppers, aubergines and the various marrows is almost a daily thing now, certainly every second watering. The sweet corn, which I love but had stopped growing due to the dust it produces, has been planted next to the western door of one of the tunnels. So far in that position, the pollen has not troubled anyone and the cobs are coming on nicely. The celery is also doing well in there. The potatoes are dying down and look set to be a good crop inside; outside ones are also looking good. So far the children and I have picked five kilos of garden peas from the inside plants (considerably less than that making it as far as the pot). Those planted outside are almost ready as well so should have a bumper crop this year. The runner beans inside are prettily in flower also. While back outside, the swedes are growing well and have almost all been thinned

to about four inches apart. I will remove the middle ones as they grow on. I think I've mentioned the problem with one of the raised beds outside where we lost all carrots; the rest are fine as are those I grew in styrofoam boxes, which the earwigs (not so plentiful this year) seem to leave alone. The wood-lice are becoming bolder and I have found quite a few have eaten their way in to the carrots.

I have planted some more cabbage and other brassica seeds to have some spring greens. It is not too late as they will grow quickly now and our seasons have all changed anyway. It is also a good time to cut off or peg down strawberry runners to form new plants, and to remove the unwanted ones which will just stop the fruit production.

I have just cut back those lupins and oriental poppies which have flowered to tidy them up and hopefully, get more flowers from them later.

It is a very good time to take cuttings of many outdoor shrubs, including roses, but mainly of hebes, escallonias, honeysuckle and hollies; the list is endless as all are worth trying, especially outdoor fuchsias. Indoor fuchsias will happily root in water, as well as in a pot, but pelargoniums prefer to dry off for a few hours and then go into gritty soil in a pot. Any succulents also like to be treated that way.



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Local lads admit Mission burglary

STANLEY men Dominic Robert Watson (22) and Andrew James Felton (24) made full admissions to the Police on Friday after they were arrested in connection with a break in and burglary at the Lighthouse Scamen's Centre near FIPASS in the early hours of January 29.

Mr Watson remains in custody while Mr Felton was released on conditional bail which included a curfew from 8pm to 8am at his home at 5 Pioneer Row.

In the Magistrates Court on Monday, Crown Prosecutor Simon Rowe said the two men had smashed their way into the Centre, which as locals they undoubtedly knew to be a charitable organisation, and then carried out a systematic and thorough search of the premises. They had stolen cash and phone eards, a computer and hard drive, the safe and various food items with an estimated value of more than £4,000.

Mr Rowe said that the menhad been unable to carry all their "booty" and had gone to someone's drive on Ross Road and found a vehicle with the keys in, which Mr Watson had driven to collect the items and deliver to their home at 5 Pioneer Row, before returning the vehicle.

He added that Mr Watson by his own admission had been so drunk he was, "literally driving all over the road."

Looking at Mr Watson's previous convictions Mr Rowe noted that he had committed seven burglaries while still in the Youth Court with the most recent being at the Malvina House Hotel in 2014 for which he was only released from prison in




September

He was a "persistent offending young man who cares not for any sentences imposed," said Mr Rowe adding that he had been locked up, released and was, "back to committing serious offences."

The case was adjourned for defence lawyer Simon Crowder to take instructions and on Tuesday both men pleaded guilty to all charges. Mr Watson was convicted of burglary, taking a vehicle without consent, driving while unfit through drink and driving without insurance.

Mr Felton who had no previous convictions was convicted of



burglary and allowing himself

to be carried in an unauthorised vehicle. The case was further adjourned

until February 23. (the maximum time Mr Watson can be remanded in custody before sentencing) when a progress update on the pre-sentence reports will be provided by Probation Officer Beccy Roberts.

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said it was unrealistic to suggest that anything other than custody would be considered, while Mr Crowder said Mr Watson did not apply for bail as time spent in custody would count towards his final sentence.

Falklands 'high alert' stories rubbished by Commander

THE Commander British Forces South Atlantic Islands has rubbished a story in The Express news paper that the Falklands is on a high security alert.

Air Commodore RW La Forte CBE MA BA RAF told Penguin News yesterday: "Throughout the year, UK military personnel travel to the Falkland Islands to take advantage of the excellent training opportunities. On occasion, this leads to a temporary increase in the number of military personnel here.

"This training is routine business. Our military posture in the South Atlantic is unchanged; we undertake regular assessments of potential threats to ensure that we retain an appropriate level of defensive capability." Friday, February 6, 2015



Stanley Services Ltd exclusive fuel import licence renewed

STANLEY Services Limited's exclusive licence for the importation of Hydrocarbons into the Falkland Islands and its territorial waters, has been approved until the year 2023.

A statement from Executive Council (ExCo) noted that security of supply and continuous availability of products to the Falkland Islands were the major factors behind the Government's decision to extend the contract with Stanley Services Ltd (SSL).

It was agreed that the domestic market has been wellserved by Stanley Services Ltd over the past 27 years and the Domestic Fuel Formula - which is audited on an annual basis by FIG - has been successful in keeping prices down in a small market. As a result of the extension to the licence, the profit element of the Domestic Fuel Formula has reduced from 2.5 per cent to 1.5 per cent and this will come into force on April 1,2015.

Additionally, under the new fuel supply agreement, Stanley Services Ltd will construct a Petrol/Kerosene Installation at Fox Bay allowing consumers and visitors on the West to have easy access to both products and negotiations are underway for Stanley Services Ltd to take over responsibility for the diesel tanks at Fox Bay.

The new agreement also allows for the continuance of Stanley Services Ltd's arrangement with Lavinia Corporation to import small parcels of diesel at very competitive prices. Continued page 3

GRUMBLING about the telecommunications company, cruise ship cancellations, Argentines complaining about oil exploration, someone lost on Mt Usborne and the Department of Health worrying about its budget... You could be mistaken for thinking 1'm listing current issues, but in fact

You could be mistaken for thinking I'm listing current issues, but in fact they're extracted from this week's Memory Lane column; a number from twenty years ago (see Page 9).

Usually the Deputy Editor writes that particular piece, but occasionally while I have her safely trapped in a lengthy lands/environmental committee meeting, I sneakily purloin this particular pleasure for myself. But from whence its popularity? Well quite apart from the amusement and cries of amazement it always generates, a Memory Lane has a sort of cathartic effect on a writer. It serves to remind us that while every now and then we all get terribly stressed and upset about the latest controversy, ultimately it is just a small part of the big Falklands pattern; and in a few weeks time the debates will turn from oil, or Argentines, or fires in Camp to the failure of road networks, unresolved school parking and complaints about the bank or PWD, before circling irrevocably back to the beginning.

bank or PWD, before circling irrevocably back to the beginning. And I swear blind that in 250 years time, when the future population come upon Taff's time capsule, complete with January 2015 Penguin News, they will smile wryly at the oh-so-familiar issues, over which they still wrangle in 2265.

Of course the hope is that while the issues repeat themselves, the complaints will be relative to the increased expectations of the time, and the Falklands industry and population will have developed in entirely the right direction - be wealthier, healthier, better served by public services and better educated.

Hold on - better educated? So how's that going right now?

Apparently we're meant to be cheering because the Falkland Islands Community School has achieved the fabulous rating of 'requires improvement.' Personally if I were a parent of a student in FICS I'd be choking on my comflakes reading that.

OK 1 know it takes a while for any organisation to recover from being a bit rubbish (a polite description of the last inspection rating of FICS) but does it not also seem reasonable to suggest that if by the next inspection there hasn't been a marked improvement in the rating, and FICS hasn't done a whole lot better at retaining staff, then MLA Elsby, instead of suggesting it's just the recruitment process that isn't up to scratch (which, incidentally, seems to be working for the Infant/Junior School) or that the teachers that have left didn't 'fit in', should start some serious examination of the management itself?



Planning and building

THREE items were deferred at Wednesday's Planning and Building Committee meeting with the construction of a second storey with full length porch decking at 37 Fitzroy Road (behind the Charity Shop) for Mr and Mrs Chantada being the first.

Planning Officer Fiona Wallace-Nannig said there had been a number of objections to the application and noted that most of the other buildings on that street were east/west orientated. Director of Public Works Manfred Keenleyside however said that there were a lot of different styles of building in the area and the committee agreed to defer until more information and clearer plans were received.

Also deferred until the March meeting was the Government's application to create a footpath from the west end of Victory Green to Join up with the path to the Blacksmith's Shop in the Dockyard, when a further application for another path will also be considered. Plans for the enhancement of the gardens at Whalebone Arch were also deferred until the March meeting.

The Falkland Islands Company Ltd had several applications approved with the first being the demolition of 2 and 2A Fitzroy Road and outline permission for the construction of two pairs of semi-detached dwellings. The condition that the footprint should not occupy more than 25 per cent was added and that the matter should come back to the committee for full planning permission. Their application to demolish a garage at 28-30 John Street and construct a single storey house was also approved with the condition that off street parking be provided before work commenced. The erection of VHF and HF aerials was also temporarily approved for FIC properties Flat 1 Hebe Street and 30 John Street (retrospectively) until the end of the season.

A retrospective application for change of use from business to residential was approved for Mr L Quinto at 88 Davis Street as was an extension to the building provided the entire building was recladded, a right of access was retained, parking provision made and ownership tied to the main residence.

Dick Sawle had his application to put a two storey extension on his house at Seaview Cottage on Ross Road East was refused on the grounds that the proposed building was not in keeping with the area or in line with the Town Plan

Also refused because it was not in accordance with the Development Plan was Ryan Hawksworth's application to change the use of public greenspace to private garden to the north of his property at 2 Goss Road

Steve -Toolan's application to construct retail premises and parking on land on the north side of the Airport Road (along the back of McKay Close) was refused on the grounds that it was green space and also that the strip needs to be retained for the maintenance of services when needed. Mr Keenleyside said there was land available across the road at 2VPC which should be out for tender in the near future. MLA Michael Poole reminded that this land had been noted as available for some 12 months and should be progressed.

Since the last meeting three items were approved under delegated powers: Grimmer and Jones Haulage to build a garage and hardstanding at 10 Kiel Canal Road, Goodwin Offshore Ltd to build a new warehouse onto the existing one at 9 Coastel Road and extension to her house at 10 Rex Hunt Road for Lyndsey Bonner.

Think of others who need Dr's appointment

CHIEF Medical Officer Dr Beccy Edwards made a plea to the public at Thursday's Health and Medical Services Committee for patients to please make every effort to cancel appointments if they no longer need them.

She referred to one clinic last week when four patients did not turn up, adding that others are complaining because they cannot get an appointment. "It's a serious issue and very frustrating," said Dr Edwards. MLA Mike Summers described it as "rude," adding that the system should keep a record of persistent offenders. "Some will have genuine reasons for not turning up, but it is important to let reception know in advance," said MLA Summers.

Oil industry scholarships on offer from Trinidad energy skills centre

THREE SCHOLARSHIPS for Falkland Islanders at the National Energy Skills Centre (NESC) in Trinidad and related to the oil and gas industry are likely to be available within two years and will be overseen by the Training Centre in the Falklands.

A delegation of Falklands residents comprising MLA lan Hansen. Steve Dent (Invenio, Falkland Islands) FICS Head Teacher Martin Winward and FIG Oil & Gas Programme Manager Mike Brough recently attended the annual Trinidad and Tobago Energy Conference, a premier Energy Conference in the Caribbean, during which time they were able to examine the potential for Islanders to train at the Trinidad government funded NESC in trades and craft type skills relating to oil industry.

Mr Winward said they had looked. "at the next steps with regard to what we do not have here and in to developing a link based on that for the future."

Penguin News asked Mr Winward who would fund the scholarships, to which he replied that they would be, "supported right from government level, through to 1 guess ourselves supporting post 16 provisions: it would be through access to Community Development Scheme funds for post 16 education or post 18 education and it would be done in partnerships, so it would be supported from government here, but the actual costs of the courses, the provision, would be met by Trinidad."

Mr Dent was impressed with the NESC apprenticeship schemes and said he saw them as, "a really good fit for the Falklands; it is a two year programme for 18 plus," and this fitted well with young people currently in the vocational stream, working in the yard or already undertaking offshore work. These people could go to Trinidad to, "re-skill into drilling, trades and some of the black skills that are required in the Falklands in the future. So it won't really be something that would fit into this current exploration round but may fit in to further work in the future."

This would, "allow us to have some more Shaun Jaffray types who have been away, got some offshore experience under their belt and come back and we'll have more and more Falkland Islanders able to either interact offshore or provide more skilled labour onshore."

He suggested that the trained persons could also come back, "and we can use them as trainers," in 2019 and beyond, "when we get to production."

He explained that the apprenticeship schemes were broad and specific trades suitable to the Falklands industry might comprise skills around drilling, automotive trades, electronic skills (repair and engineering) and even ROV work.

Mr Dent cautioned though that at the same time they did not want to branch too far away from the UK system.

As well as their high quality offering in terms of training the other major advantage to a relationship with a Trinidad institution is that courses are far cheaper than the equivalent courses in the UK or the USA.

Mr Dent added that there were also shorter courses available, for example project management and IVQ courses that Invenio might be able to sell locally and assist those individuals in obtaining 50 per cent funding from the Falkland Islands.

Speaking to Penguin News earlier in the week about the conference itself, MLA Hansen said Mr Brough's presentation to the conference on where the Falklands currently are with renewable energy was well received and created much interest. "Unfortunately the Argentine ambassador was tasked to make a token protest against us attending the conference, but this obtained no support from any attendees at all. In fact, a deafening silence followed the usual pathetic statement," said MLA Hansen

Also during the Conference, Mr Dent signed a business agreement between Invenio and Hummingbird Helicopter Services Ltd (HHSL).

The new partnership will see Invenio promoting HHSL's broad range of services in the Falkland Islands and acting as their point of contact.

To gain a better understanding of the training on offer Mr Dent undertook some of the programmes on offer at HHSL's state-of-the-art training centre, including HUET: helicopter underwater escape training, which is essential for anyone required to fly to an offshore oil platform.

Mr Dent said: "I am delighted, on behalf of Invenio to have signed this ground breaking agreement with HHSL. The support of FIG in making this possible is very much appreciated."

Driving ban

STANLEY man Rene Saldivia Patricio Cisternan (39) has been banned from driving and awaits a report from the probation officer prior to sentencing after he admitted drink driving and driving without due care and attention on December 23.

Crown Prosecutor Simon Rowe said Mr Cisternan had a previous conviction for drink driving as recent as February 2013, which as it was in the last 10 years meant the defendant qualified for the maximum sentence of three years in prison and a mandatory three year ban from driving. Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said she was not going to exclude the possibility of custody for the offence.

The court heard that Mr Cisternan had been drinking at the Globe with his workmates from Graeme Hay's electrical business and at around 10.25pm had left and driven the work Land Rover from the Home Builder car park, east along Ross Road.

Mr Rowe said it was not clear where he went, "but we know where he ended up."

At 10.26 it was reported that Mr Cisternan crashed head on into a Government Ford Ranger parked outside 21 Ross Road East causing considerable damage to the Ranger and writing the Land Rover off. Mr Cisternan was the only person in the vehicle and remained at the scene until Police arived.

A Camic breath test at the Police Station gave a lower reading of 107.4mg per 100ml of breath – almost three times the legal limit.

Mr Rowe noted Mr Hay could not claim insurance for the Land Rover which was valued at $\pounds1,200$, as it was only covered for third party, fire and theft.

Mr Cisteman will be sentenced on February 27.

Not guilty plea

EAST Falkland farmer Lee Charles Molkenbuhr (40) pleaded not guilty to assault by beating of David Barnsley at Johnsons Harbour on November 11, 2014.

Crown Prosecutor Simon Rowe said it was a straightforward case with the complainant the only witness to be called. He said the trial would last one day, but three weeks would be needed to serve evidence to defence lawyer Simon Crowder and arrange for the complainant to travel from the UK. The trial was listed for April 22 at 9am.

Trial date set

THE trial of Lauren and Bono McKay, Arthur Turner and Dylan Stephenson who are charged with the assault of George Toolan in June last year, has been set for April 8. An additional lawyer from the UK has been sourced to represent Mr McKay after new evidence was disclosed by the Crown at the end of last month.

Stanley Services Ltd have reconfirmed their acceptance of the principle of regulation and being open and Transparent for all records to be reviewed by FIG.

Tom Swales of Stanley Services Ltd is confident that the licence extension will be a positive step for fuel consumers in the Falkland Islands: 'I am delighted that ExCo have agreed to extend our Exclusive Licence until 2023. With the strong support of our shareholders the Company will continue to invest in the Islands and together with all colleagues and partners will strive to improve levels of service to all our customers. "Having an Exclusive Licence is a huge responsibility for all involved in the Company and our aim is to continue to serve the Islands with integrity as we have done over the past 27 years." Our loyalty and love of our country are driven by a myriad of things that include the landscape. the sea, flora and fauna, the ever changing light and access to wide open space.

To more mundane matters, we meet more visitors this week and next in addition to all the regular meetings. Finding time to read all the papers can be a challenge, possibly because the number of meetings seems to have increased month on month. The Gilbert House staff do an amazing job juggling all the diaries in spite of being short staffed with all their minute taking and all their other tasks. Their good humoured patience with sometimes demanding MLAs is exemplary.

New Falklands house designs on the drawing board

VISITING Stanley this week is the man who designed the many houses popping up around town and being built by the Falkland Islands Company Ltd's (FIC) Falklands Building Service.

Bill Cartledge who is the owner of The Frame and Log Cabin Company is making his first visit to the Islands on a fact finding mission prior to preparing new designs specifically for the Falklands.

The predominant designs currently being built are Albany and Runswick with the more recent additions being the single storey Fenby and Ashby. The latter were quite simply named after Mr Cartledge's home village and a nearby area

But new designs coming onto the market in the future will carry Falklands related names and PR manager Eva Jaffray said input from the public on what they might be called would be appreciated. "There will be several different designs catering for the larger house with four to five bedrooms down to the smaller first time buyer type home," she told Penguin News, adding that the search would be on for suitably grand names for the larger properties as well as something more



Including Choco Dessert, Tiramisu Cake, Milk Latte, Mix/Max, Rollino, Strawberry Bars and Fingerellas! fitting for the more compact cosy homes.

FIC have been working with Frame and Log Cabin Company for more than three years with some 26 houses constructed since early 2012. "We use our own construction team for the main build, but local sub-contractors are called in to assist with the finish," said Mrs Jaffray, explaining that each house was individually tailored according to the needs of the customer. "You design the interior to suit your taste and budget and apart from your five per cent deposit, don't pay a penny until you stick the key in the door," she said, adding that the only part of the process they did not assist with was purchasing a plot of land. "But the Government is very helpful in that area and there are plenty of serviced plots available," she added.

Meanwhile Mr Cartledge who is accompanied by his contracts manager Peter Cooper and Commercial Director Callum Stewart is out and about getting a feel for the Islands and what the requirements are to meet the need of the customer and the environment.

He is particularly taken with the use of colour throughout Stanley and the extraordinary mix of designs and architecture. "I love the fact people can pick whatever colours they want and are indeed quite adventurous with their choice," he said, adding that seeing his designs sitting so well with the Falklands landscape was very gratifying.

Learning how people lived, what their budgets were and exactly what they wanted in their new home, would all be factored in the new designs, he told Penguin News.

Elderly care to be pursued

FINALLY, 1'm packing at last for a visit home, and 1'm looking forward very much to seeing old friends again. This visit has been put off time and time again over the last 18 months, but now 1 can almost smell that peculiar aroma of the islands; that mix of salt air and diddle-dee.

This time I will have the excitement of seeing my little home at Teal Inlet, which my old friend Simon Goss erected, and is now only in need of plumbing, a chimney and electrics. I may not be able to spend a night in it during this visit, but I will certainly try to.

Building a little home in the camp seems an odd thing to do, even to me, because I was born and grew up in Stanley. But some of my happiest memories are of holidays and fishing trips in the camp, so I am not a total stranger to it.

One thing is for sure, though: I will not be raising sheep on what I have called "The Postage Stamp Ponderosa". I own just 1.500 square metres of East Falkland, and a rough calculation tells me that I could run a third of a sheep on this and significantly less of a cow. But as long as there is room for a small cabin and a fishing rod, I will be happy.

3 February 2015

It is very early on a Tuesday morning, and I am seated comfortably in the departure area at Mt Pleasant Airport. I am nursing a NAAFI tea (not bad at all) and thinking about the last three weeks in the Falklands.

Packing my bags to return to London has not been easy, but 1 am cheered by the knowledge that the huge new RAF Airbus tankerpassenger plane parked on the tarmac will be carrying just 80 of us. The paucity of passengers means that we will each have at least two seats. I know from my flight south three weeks ago that, even when full, the new plane offers greater leg room than economy class in any civilian aircraft. It is a degree of comfort that would make an EasyJet or Ryan Air passenger weep. Assuming I am left alone and almost horizontal as I read my e-book, watch films and eat my eccentric alternatives to airline food (as you asked, mainly tuna with spicy beans and pasta), this will surely be an enjoyable flight.

Looking back on my return to the Falklands, I'm thinking of one of George Orwell's lesser known books, in which he described emotions and memories as he returned to a place where he had lived many years earlier. I understand exactly why he called his book Coming up for Air.

I feel refreshed, reassured and generally happy, even though I haven't had much time to sit back and smell the diddle-dee. Instead I had business to conduct, legal aspects of my late mother's estate to sort out (thank you, dear solicitor,



for without you I would have been lost), and an unfinished holiday house in the camp to decorate. I needed every bit of my time in Stanley and at Teal Inlet, where my little home has risen (thank you, dear builders) from the rolling white grass like a single fluorescent red cherry on the top of a brown fruit cake.

Now, sitting here at Mt Pleasant, my mind slips almost randomly between experiences over the last three weeks. Usually they involved meetings of some kind, and most were very pleasant. A few however, were thoughtprovoking and even puzzling. Into the former bracket I happily place reunions with friends. Being embraced by them again - either literally or figuratively - has been just wonderful. You all know who you are, so I will spare your blushes and just thank you, while apologising to those (again 1 am sure you know who you are) who I just did not find time to visit.

Into the thought-provoking and puzzling bracket I place two fleeting meetings. No names, no pack drill, as they say, but I am still thinking about the individual, known to me for many years, who refused to say hello or even shake my hand. The only explanation he gave was this interesting statement, "You don't live here any more." Perhaps he/she was just having a bad day, but I did wonder if there might be a feeling at large that Islanders who choose or need to live mainly overseas (and there are many) have abandoned their people and their home. I think any member of the worldwide Falkland diaspora would say that this is far from true, but some

Bridge closed due to damage

FOLLOWING a single vehicle road traffic accident last weekend resulting in significant damage to the bridge over the Malo River, the bridge was temporarily closed.

An assessment of the damage has been undertaken in consultation with the manufacturers and the bridge will have to remain closed to all traffic for the foreseeable future it was noted in a statement from the Public Works Department (PWD). residents may, nevertheless, think it. If so, then I have to say that is just a bit hurtful.

At Teal Inlet, which I had not previously considered to be a wildlife haven. I met some creatures that charmed me. Driving along the graded road just outside the settlement, I - almost literally - ran into pugnacious carancho, or crested cara-cara to give the bird his formal name. He stood there, legs stretched across the centre of the road and head inclined as he fixed me with a beady stare, apparently daring me to confront him more closely. 1 stopped, smiled at him and told him he was a beauty, even if farmers hated him for his cruel practices. With mutual respect established, we both went on our way.

In the settlement, a stone's throw from my cabin, 1 found a flock of smaller but equally beautiful creatures: bright yellow siskins who fussed around a copse of macrocarpa trees singing loudly as they foraged for food. It seemed to me that they were very satisfied with life, and that 1 should be too.

Who or what else did I en-counter? Oh, I could write on right through to the classified ads pages, but of course the editor won't let me do that. So here are fleeting mentions only of some more encounters that moved me: the local journalist who combined parochial and global awareness perfectly when making an important moral point in writing; a group of soldiers who were cheerfully helping a farmer with work so back-breaking that I could barely watch: the crew of a research ship who were searching for the sunken warships of the First World War and enjoying the adventure just because it was an adventure; the local entrepreneurs and the oil experts from the United States and Britain whose optimism and excitement about the future beamed from their faces; and the local playing in a Stanley cafe and at the race course, who demonstrated that TV and Facebook have failed to kill the great local tradition of music making.

As I said, I could go on but my allocated maximum word-count of 1,000 is fast approaching. Coming up for air again has been wonderful. Thanks to my friends, to the newcomers and even to the carancho and the siskins for having me back.


Counter balance to Bill Luxton

Shackleton Scholarship could fill a gap in rich tapestry of Falklands life

Spotted a gap in the rich tapestry of Falkland's life? Got a talent or hobby that you would like to share with the Falklands community? Identified someone else who could bring a new club or interest to the Islands? If so the Shackleton Scholarship Fund's Quality of Life scheme might be just what you need to pull it all together.

Sir Ernest Shackleton was an outstanding leader in the golden age of Antarctic exploration at the dawn of the twentieth century. His astonishing feats of leadership, navigation, endurance and survival have recently inspired a revival of interest in Britain, the United States and elsewhere in the world. His son Edward, Lord Shackleton, began as an explorer who won acclaim as a scientist, businessman, wartime Royal Air Force officer, statesman and author of two reports for the British Government which laid the foundation for the Falkland Islands' development and prosperity. The Shackleton name has played a vital role in the history and growth of the Falkland Islands, and the Shackleton Scholarship Fund was set up in 1995 to commemorate these two remarkable men and to stimulate human endeavour, initiative and

research.

As well as Academic scholarships, the fund offers Quality of Life Scholarships for people whose visits to the Falkland Islands, or from the Falkland Islands to other parts of the world, benefit the region and enhance the quality of life for the Islanders.

The Fund benefits both the scholars and the Falkland Islands by creating wider knowledge and promoting new skills and activities. Of particular success in recent years has been visits from a shearing instructor in 2010 and 2014 with shearing contractors and farmers alike commenting on the improved technique and reduction in second cuts on shearing floors around the Falklands; the improvement amongst novice shearers was particularly noticeable and the option for teenage shearing wannabes to pick up some tips has to be good. The Falklands success at international competitions is testament to the value of such instruction

David Tatham's Dictionary of Falklands Biography is another product of the Quality of Life Scheme, as is the pathway and bridges between the Seaman's Mission and East Stanley. The Netball, Badminton, Cricket, Shooting and Golf Clubs have all benefited from funding to bring coaches down or send competitors away. The fields of botany in the form of training at Kew Garden and horse taming (Len Yule's visit in 2001) have received funding, as have many art and music projects ranging from the purchase of hand chimes to a drumming instructor and Adam Howe's photography project in South Georgia.

So whether you are a resident of the Falklands and require assistance in perhaps qualifying or purchasing equipment to help share your talents, or you know of an individual or organisation overseas who could bring something to enhance the quality of life of Islanders this is the time to make it happen.

Normally two or three awards in the region of £2000 - £3000 each are made annually (around April/May), and can be used to cover travel expense or course fees, but not wages.

Bank Manager responds to tourist protest



Sergeant Gary Webh (RFIP) with Robert Peel A TOURIST angered by bank charges, protested outside Standard Chartered Bank (SCB) last Friday, but SCB Chief Executive Officer Stuart Horswood told Penguin News that in fact the charges had not come from the Stanley based bank.

Denmark resident Robert Peel held up a placard stating: Dear Falklanders. Your Island is super and you are friendly BUT forget this bank who overcharges us all, also your internet is expensive and slow. My advice is protest now.

Mr Peel was politely asked to leave the premises of the bank by a member of the Royal Falkland Islands Police, so continued his protest outside where he was seen chatting to a number of Falklands' residents.

Mr Horsewood said: "This gentleman came to the bank to undertake a transaction for which we required photo identity, usually through a passport. He advised that he had no such document with him, such that we could not proceed to serve him. He then went across to the Police Station for assistance, which I believe was not fortheoming.

"He later produced a copy of his passport but then objected to the bank charges for the transaction and left without concluding his business with the bank. This led to the reference in his placard regarding 'This Bank's charges'.

"I invited him into the bank towards the end of his peaceful demonstration and explained that the charges are not our own, but those levied on us by the UK clearing bank we use for our transactions.

We parted on good terms after he had heard my explanation of the above and after he had advised me of his work, that involves travel journalism." Published by FIG Civil Aviation Department

ALWAYS REMEMBER:



You are legally responsible for the safe conduct of each flight; this includes being responsible for avoiding collisions with other people or objects – including aircraft.



Think about what you do with any images you obtain as you may breach privacy laws.



You must not fly your unmanned aircraft over a congested area, or within 50m of a person, vehicle or building. Also, stay well clear of airports and airfields.



Before each flight, check that your unmanned aircraft is not damaged and^{1/1} that all components are working.

You must keep the unmanned aircraft within your sight at all times.



If you intend to use an unmanned aircraft for any kind of commercial activity, you must get 'Permission' from Falkland Islands Director of Civil Aviation prior to commencing the activity.

Twenty years ago

A REPORT on the new abattoir project draws lengthy comment from Editor John Fowler and columnist Gail Steen. Recipes for the Falklands Carrot, avocado and orange salad

With the carrots in the garden ready for thinning and a glut of fresh oranges available in the shops, finding some beautifully ripe avocados at the Chandlery called for the creation of a real summer salad which would do justice to a fine piece of fresh sea trout, courtesy of dedicated anglers Paul and Julie Chapman (Pictured below served with green salad and fresh baby beetroot)

Ingredients

4 medium garlic cloves, smashed and peeled

sea salt

1 1/2 teaspoons cumin seeds, toasted and ground

1 ½ teaspoons coriander seeds, toasted and ground

(If using already ground herbs about half the quantities)

1 to 1 1/2 teaspoons crumbled red pepper flakes - or fresh chili to taste ¼ cup plus 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil

30 or so similarly sized (each about the size of your

pointer finger) young carrots, not peeled, ½ inch of the green tops left on

3 oranges

3 ripe avocados, chilled

2 tablespoons freshly squeezed lemon juice (or

Jif lemon) A handful of coriander sprigs

3-4 servings

Preheat the oven to 400°F (Gas mark 6). Pound the garlic with a healthy pinch of salt in a mortar until you have a wet, fairly smooth paste. (You can also do this on a cutting board, chopping and mashing) Put the paste in a large mixing bowl. Add the cumin, coriander, chilles, and ¼ cup of the olive oil and stir well, then add the carrots and toss well so they're coated with the oil and spices. Sprinkle on 3 healthy pinches of salt, crushing the grains with your fingers as you add them, and toss again.

Put the carrots in a large shallow baking dish in one layer. Add a splash of water into an empty spot in the casserole then cover the dish tightly with foil and put it in the oven. Cook the carrots for 25 minutes. Take off the foil turn up the heat and keep cooking until lightly browned Segment two oranges and set aside. Remove the juice from the other

Segment two oranges and set aside. Remove the juice from the other and save. When the carrots are done, take the dish out of the oven and let cool Halve and peel the avocados. Cut the flesh lengthwise into slices about the same size as the carrots.

Put the avocado slices in a large mixing bowl and add the orange juice, the lemon juice, remaining 2 tablespoons olive oil, and a healthy pinch or two of salt. Toss gently and well with your hands. Push the avocado to one side of the bowl. Add the carrots a

vocado to one side of the bowl. Add the carrots a handful at a time, scraping and tossing them in the beautiful green liquid in the bowl before adding the next handful. Make sure to scrape out and add all the garlicky spices left in the baking dish. Toss it all together then stack the carrots, avocado, and orange segments on to plates top with the fresh coriander sprigs and serve. Soldier jailed for sexual High take activity with 14 year old

MARK Anthony Sampson (22) was remanded in custody after he was found guilty of three counts of sexual activity with a child in the Senior Magistrates Court on Thursday morning.

The three day trial began on Monday with two military personnel alleged to have had sexual activity with a girl under the age of 16, in the Malvina House Hotel on June 1. However the case took an unexpected turn on the second day when Crown Prosecutor Simon Rowe chose to offer no further evidence against the second man Christopher Clive Beechey (22).

PARAGUAYAN diplomats Martin Burt and Hugo Esteban Estigarribia Gutierrez have enjoyed a visit to the Islands this week which has included a close look at the work removing Argentine mines from the Wall Mountain area, a visit to the military base at Mount Pleasant as well as Government departments and the Chamber of Commerce.

Mr Gutierrez was invited by the International Mission of Observation of Canada as its representative in the Falklands referendum in 2013, however he was prevented from attending due to duties at the Congress of Paraguay.

Mr Burt has served as the Chief of staff to the President of Paraguay and has twice been elected as the president of Paraguayan-American Chamber of Commerce. He is the founder and CEO of Fundacion Paraguaya, a 30 year old non-governmental organisation devoted to the promotion of entrepreneurship and and self reliance to eliminate poverty around the world

Rowe said that, since it appeared the claimant could not be sure of the sequence of events as it related to Mr Beechey, he had decided not to offer any further evidence against him. Mr Beechey was formally acquitted by the Senior Magistrate and was free to leave the court

Mr Sampson chose not to give evidence in court and Mr Beechey was not called as a defence witness at the trial.

Giving her verdict. Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said she was satisfied that the sexual activity with the 14 year old girl had taken place after Mr Sampson

had been warned that she was not 16

Faulds said she had Mrs placed great reliance on the CCTV footage recovered from the Malvina House Hotel which provided timings which corresponded with reliable evidence from two witnesses.

Mr Sampson was taken to the Stanley prison to await sentencing on March 5, after a pre-sentence report has been prepared.

Mrs Faulds said she was prepared to consider a report because of his previous good character, but a custodial sentence was in mind

up for 2015 illex fishing licences ONE hundred and five jiggers

and one trawler have been offered Illex squid licences for the coming season which opens on February 15.

The total number of licences offered matches those taken up in 2014, confirmed Director of Natural Resources John Barton at vesterday's Fisheries Committee Meeting

He said: "Fishing has already started on the high seas with a significant fleet and some reasonable catches of Illex reported.

The Falklands Calamari season is due to start on February, 24. A pre-recruit survey started on February 8 with three scientists embarked on the F/V Baffin Bay Fishery protection

A report on fishery protection and boardings was examined at the meeting and it was noted that last year the FPV Protegat patrolled a total of 267 days with 30 days unavailable due to weather.

The FPV's first patrol of the year was delayed until January 12 due to the Scout colliding with the vessel whilst it was berthed at FIPASS

The FPV steamed 45,244 nautical miles and 113 vessels were boarded and inspected last year.

During the meeting a committee member expressed concern that the vessel was too predictable with regard to its returning times to Stanley, however Mr Barton reassured that there was no evidence of fishing vessels changing their fishing patterns when the Protegat returned to port.

At the end of the debate Mr Barton commented: "We have a new gun system - we are ready.

WHILE having no inclination to spend time in the company of what might loosely be termed 'celebrity' - not that they're very readily available in the Falklands anyway - I'm always suitably bowled over by those feted for such covetable (but sadly not always easily attainable) virtues as courage or talent, integrity or selflessness

So on Friday I approached my interview with French visitor Dr Christine Janin with a degree of nervousness: quite warranted I think bearing in mind the sheer degree of awesomeness that must embody an individual that has not only climbed Everest and "strolled" to the North Pole, but spent so many years of her life helping children live with the effects of cancer. Would she be sprouting angel wings and sporting a halo I shakily wondered?

Not at all; the teensy, wirv, blonde haired lady was entirely real, cheerfully describing the walk to North Pole as "worth eeet" because it gave her "the tightest butt," and causing me a good minute of barely controlled silent giggling, with the sentence: "But I am not a magician, I do not have a magic....errrr BAGUETTE." (OK I know it's probably the correct term in French but to me it's just a big long loaf of bread.)

Ultimately though what really struck me was not only her tangible understanding of the mental challenges cancer patients face during their treatment, but the difficult journey after the cure, or, "going back down the mountain," as she termed it.

How does the person return to normality? While the physical trauma may (or may not if a limb is lost) have ended, how do they deal with the mental trauma of having faced down death? In the Falklands we are all aware of the term PTSD and its relationship with war, but up until Friday I had not considered that this might also apply to a personwho had suffered a life-threatening illness.

However I don't wish to her pre-empt her story so I can only direct you to the interview on page 5

Oil impact on society the consultation begins



Check out the FaceBook page FALKLAND Islanders will this month began to grapple with the big questions about how oil and gas development will impact on their society and culture.

The start of a series of focus groups run as part of the Social Effects Monitoring Programme study, led by Regeneris Consulting, and Falkland Island partners Karen Lee and Carolyn Montgomerie Started on Saturday Mrs Lee

We want to explore the importance of new job opportunities and how that might alter people's career aspirations for themselves and for their children.

Mrs Lee explained that spaces remain in many of the focus groups, so if readers would like to be part of the conversation, then please get in touch with the local team to get involved.

There will also be a second

opportunity in March for people to give their views as the team will launch a short online survey, which all residents will be encouraged to complete

Stephen Nicol. Managing Director of Regeneris Consulting said. "We are keen to hear the voices of a wide range of Falkland Islanders through this study to help us get a really comprehensive picture of how people feel about oil and gas development and the things that they hold most dear about their quality of life.

We will encourage everybody to complete the short online survey in March and make sure their voice is heard, and for those that can offer the time to attend a focus group, we would be delighted to see you, so please get in touch and sign up.

The overall aim of the study, which has been commissioned by the Falkland Islands Government and supported by some funding from Premier Oil and Noble Energy, is to provide a detailed understanding of the many different ways that oil and gas developments could affect the daily lives of Falkland Islanders.

It will develop a set of society impact measures that will be monitored annually as oil and gas development proceeds.

Local fix not an option for Malo bridge says DPW

DEPUTY Director of Public Works Colin Summers said this week that the Malo Bridge cannot be fixed without being lifted.

The bridge suffered some damage after a single vehicle accident a fortnight ago.

He said as well as localised damage there is considerable deflection to the bridge structure. "We have sought advice from the bridge manufacturer and our structural engineers in PWD," he said, while Director of PWD Manfred Keenleyside said "a local fix isn't an option sadly. That is where we started as we are keen to get it back into use as soon as possible."

Mr Summers explained that the bridge is designed in such a way that a lot of the members act in compression. "Therefore we can't fix the bridge without lifting the bridge to take the

weight off the members and then replacing the damaged members with replacement parts that are designed for the type of load that each member takes.

"We are currently in the process of having the whole bridge assessed to determine if anything else needs replacing other than the visible damage. This would include assessment of the pins, nuts and bolts and the underside of the bridge as well as checking for less visible deformation or damage that may have occurred."

Replacement parts will then be ordered as well as a jacking system to lift the bridge.

"Replacement members have been identified and it is hoped that they can be in the Islands on the April SAAS vessel." said Mr Summers.

Until then, the bridge will remain closed to all traffic and PWD have spoken to farmers and the RBA to inform them of the current situation. They and the general public will be kept informed if there are any changes.

A depth marker will be installed in the pass to help inform users of the depth, and PWD will monitor the conditions.

FIC's Chair resigns

FALKEAND Islands Holdings chairman David Hudd has resigned from the board with immediate effect and been succeeded by non-executive deputy chairman Edmund Rowland, it was reported on Monday. John Foster continues as group managing director.

Mr Hudd said: "Since I became chairman in 2002 we have developed the Group from its sole focus on the Falkland Islands, to an international services business as a result of two excellent acquisitions.

"I believe that the time is right to hand over to a new, younger chairman in order that the group can take full advantage of the opportunities available to it.

"In the year ended 31 March 2014, we generated record profits and at 30 September 2014 the group had surplus cash resources of some £4m."

Lady Thatcher museum plans

PRIME Minister David Cameron has given his backing to a £15 million museum and library planned as a permanent memorial to Margaret Thatcher. Mr Cameron said the ambitious project, is to be modelled on the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library and Museum in California, and would "ensure [Lady Thatcher's] legacy lives on."

It will also house artefacts from her time in power, and will run training courses and exchange programmes with overseas students.

Mr Cameron said: "During her life Margaret Thatcher believed in action - and this memorial will produce real results for generations to come

Pension approval

HER Majesty's Revenue and Customs in the UK has approved the Falkland Islands Pensions Scheme (FIPS) as a Qualifying **Recognised Overseas Pensions** Scheme (QROPS). QROPS status will allow existing UKregistered pension scheme funds to be transferred to members' funds held in FIPS. For those FIPS members who reside in the UK, a transfer from their FIPS fund to their UK pension scheme should also be easier. QROPS status does not, however, apply to the Retirement Pensions Contributions (RPC) scheme which is the mandatory pension system for employees in the Falkland Islands.

Pressing need for Ro-ro repairs

Continued from front page A member of the Fisheries Committee expressed dismay that the ro-ro barge at FIPASS was still unusable almost a year after it was put out of action.

Cheryl Roberts of Beauchene Fishing Company Ltd outlined how, with launches unable to use the area, it lead to increased costs to fishing companies.

She said some operations involving launches, that would normally only take one hour, could currently take up to three hours.

Harbour Master Captain Malcolm Jamieson said with regard to repairing the barge, two tenders had been received and the preferred tender was awaiting relevant certification.

He cautioned that although they would be assessing the preferred bidder in the next two weeks, the repairs required would involve pre-fabrication that would need to be shipped to the Falklands so the end result was still months away.

Mr Barton said it was, "a substantial bit of work," and Committee Chair MLA Phyl Rendell added that it was not going to just be a, "quick fix," but acknowledged there was a, "pressing need for it to be completed."

The management of FIPASS has transferred to Atlink Ltd.

Code of practice

A draft code of practice in relation to fishing vessel crew conditions is currently with the Attorney General's Chambers it was reported at the meeting.

MLA Phyl Rendell said once it was, "polished up," it would be brought back to the working group for examination. It is hoped the final draft will be presented

to the committee in April. A Port Welfare Committee chaired by Mrs Roberts was set up in the latter part of 2014 which included hospital representation, Scamens Mission, the Marine Officer and industry/agents representation.

Mr Barton commented that some of the recommendations were in fact already in practice.

Rockcod

A survey of rockcod biomass is underway using the F/V Castelo. This will provide a further assessment of the rockcod stock in advance of the assessment work and consideration of fishing limits for 2016. Seven scientists and observers are embarked.

Mesh sizes

The new finfish mesh regulations came in at the start of 2015. Vessels are arriving with the new codends (the part of the trawl where fish are retained). Observers and Fishery Officers will monitor to see if any issues arise said Mr Barton.

Observers

Observer Co-ordinator Joost Pompert explained that staffing levels were still at 7 Scientific Fisheries Observers, one of whom is assigned to collect bird interaction data and conduct various studies and tasks associated with seabird by-catch mitigation.

Deployments are dictated by the requirement for scientific data, with a secondary enforcement role.

Two members of the committee expressed a desire for more observers employed by FIG with Tom Blake of RBC Ltd suggesting 5 per cent observer coverage, "rightly or wrongly," might not give the impression of good management of the fishery. Page 3

IT has been another busy week with more international visitors with whom to discuss our Islands. and our plans for the future. While the most important part of these visits is for them to learn about the Falklands it is also useful for us to get from them their impressions. We can learn how best to ensure that people are well informed and counter political misinformation. There is real danger when we try to tell people what to think, so much better to give them access to accurate information and allow them to draw their own conclusions. Different aspects of our case are more telling for different nationalities but self-determination is hard to argue against, as is the need to manage our resources in a sustainable and safe way. Oddly the most intractable myth is that the climate is grim and grey, so it is always good wher, people disembark into brilliant sunlight against a vast blue sky.

The end of an era is an overused phrase but I. like several generations of Islanders felt that recently when we heard of the death of Mr Booth, as we all knew our former teacher. He and his wife arrived in the Islands in 1951 where he took up his role as a teacher, eventually becoming headmaster. I believe his subjects were maths and science but he also taught other subjects including book keeping and history when necessary. He was a keen walker, bird watcher and naturalist and served as a trustee of Falklands Conservation until his failing hearing made meetings difficult for him. After retiring from education he was town librarian for many years. He and his wife enjoyed an adventurous retirement, regularly driving around France in a camper van and travelling further afield. He will be remembered by many with great affection and I will never forget the role he played in my education, helping me catch up on years of maths in a few months. I also remember his sense of humour and the twinkle in his eye as he delivered a stern lecture.My thoughts are with Jessie.

Head to the Historic Dockyard Museum for the earliest editions of Penguin News

THE Historic Dockyard Museum has recently taken delivery of early edition Penguin News courtesy of Graham Bound who was the founding editor.

No. 1 published on October 3 1979 introduces 'Plato the Penguin' with the words ''...while his cheery beak may not be appropriate for some of the sad and sober news contained herein, we're not going to change it because he's an optimist - and they're hard to come by around here."

Published by Woodbine Publications, the 16 page paper makes a fascinating read - stories include one about Chilean workers hired to supplement the local workforce being delayed by Argentine authorities and "white card" formalities; news that work on the Darwin Road had commenced with three or four men at Pony's Pass and more to arrive by the end of the month; and coverage of a children's fancy dress party at the Stanley Social Club. (More information about the stars of that particular event below)

The collection covers 1982 and of course includes the famous Victory' edition published on June 30, and bowing out with No. 78 of February 25, 1985.

Museum Manager Leona Roberts said the newspapers provide a fascinating commentary of life in the Falklands, "at a time of enor-


mous change

"The major events leading up to, and after, 1982 are recorded in dozens of books, but the 'small stuff' that is going on in the background is much harder to learn about. These stories are so important and really help to illustrate the social history of the Islands."

Mrs Roberts said they were very grateful to Graham for the donation. "it's a real treasure trove and will be very useful for both research and illustrating exhibitions."

The papers will go into the Tim Simpson Memorial Reading Room at the Historic Dockyard Museum.

Graham Bound is also one of the founding members of the



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FIMA Friends (a UK organisation set up with the aim of supporting the Museum & National Trust and also the Jane Cameron Memorial National Archives).

Penguin News also now has copies of these papers from Graham and plans to incorporate them into future Memory Lanes in the current paper.

However settling down with that first edition of October 3 1979, it was impossible not to draw on a few little gems to share with our readers right now rather than wait until the relevant date.

For example it is reported that Councillor Stuart Wallace held a public meeting on September 28, and it was noted that other councillors would do well to follow suit.

Cllr Wallace said the Falkland Islands Company Etd needed to be pressured to move with the times, "the writing is on the wall for them, he said, while on the subject of needing more people in the Islands he suggested taking in four or five Vietnamese families. Tourism needed to be improved, particularly inter-island travel and there was a need for a commercial bank, he said and also announced that £17,000 had been allocated for repairs to Stanley roads. The order of repairs would include Magazine Valley, John St, Davis St and then the streets connecting Ross, John and Fitzroy Roads. (Phew! That is a lot of road repairs for £17k).

At the childrens fancy dress party costumes of note were Corina Goss and Daniel Cork as Kermit the Frog and Miss Piggy. Mark Spruce as a bluebottle, Troyd Bowles as Obelix, Paula Pole-Evans as a PATA man (Plant and Transport Authority), John Pole-Evans as a witch. Jonothan Butler and Anita Short as customs man and a tourist and Ralph Harris as wizard.

The woman who moves mountains for 'les enfants'

TO each their Everest is a philosophy that mountaineer Dr Christine Janin, offers the victims of cancer who recuperate at her chalet in the French Alpine resort of Chamonix.

The choice of 'a Chacun son Everest' as a description of the challenge faced by the children and women she supports via her charitable association of the same name, is no mere affectation. Dr Janin was the first French woman to climb Mount Everest (1990) the first woman in the world to reach the North Pole on foot (1997) and the first European woman to conquer the Seven Summit challenge (climbing the highest peaks on all seven continents in 1992).

Speaking to Penguin News on Friday, Dr Janin, who docked at Stanley on yacht *Kotick* (skippered by Alain and Claudine Caradec) had spent the last 15 days enjoying a "relaxing" but exciting 'round the West Falkland Islands' trip, viewing on the way, dolphins, seals and penguins and meeting up with others from the yachting world, Kiki Ericson and Thies Matzen at West Point and Marie Paul and Hughes Delignières at Dunbar.

So how did this tiny French lady find herself a world renowned adventurer I asked.

"I am a doctor, I am not alpinist but was just a good amateur," she said. "I always liked mountaineering and skiing, running and other sports," and so it happened that a friend invited Dr Janin to go on an expedition in the role of doctor. She agreed and discovered a mental and physiological aptitude for mountaineering. Perhaps most importantly she did not suffer altitude sickness, the affliction that can undo even the strongest and fittest of men and women.

It led to further offers of trips and ultimately the challenge of Mount Everest. This was not something she had previously considered but again she was invited in her role as doctor. Her first attempt on the north face starting in Tibet failed but eventually she succeeded in ascending the south face - a 34 hour dangerous climb into the 'death zone' and to the summit at 8,516 metres above earth.

Unable, of course, to climb any higher, her next step was to take on the challenge of the seven summits, "less difficult (but still difficult) allowing me to see different countries and for the beauty."

Now feted in France, Dr Chanin discovered that although she felt exactly the same, "people see you as different... you are unique, you are so great," and as such she contemplated how to utilise this perceived transformation.

tered a very new and different challenge, "I was asked to help make dreams come true for children with cancer." During that time she came upon the poignant parallel between the challenge of mountain climbing and the struggle through cancer treatment towards the ultimate cure, the summit, 'a Chacun son Everest'.

To the children she would compare each stage of their treatment with parts of the climb, "I would say this is Camp One, this is Camp Two, you have to fight to the summit and never stop."

From this point Dr Janin made the decision to leave the dangerous life of mountaineering and put all of her energy into further developing her Everest parallel and supporting sick children. Why not take the children to the mountains she thought.

"So I did it once but I did not feel it was change enough in my life. It was so strong what happen to the children. I need them to know they are not just sick children but they are strong and they are capable." This idea of treating the mental well being of the patient was fairly unusual 20 years ago, but she was encouraged to go on, and up to today 3,729 children have spent time at the house in Chamonix.

They visit for one week, and this is time to help them, "change their own view of the sickness, to make them proud of themselves, to make them confident and meet other children who have the same thing and to do things they could not do. Walking, climbing, being in the big house in Chamonix. Some children would never have had the money to do any of this so now they say, 'Oh because 1 am sick 1 can do this' yes it is resilience to change difficult into good things and strengths."

A great deal of Dr Janin's time is spent there but she says, "when you give you receive a lot."

Taking the idea further she now also opens the beautiful house to women recovering from breast cancer, 53,000 women a year are diagnosed with the horrific disease and Dr Janin feels that because it is common, some women feel they should not, "make a fuss," about their treatment and be strong and continue to care for their children and family. But, she says, cancer is a terrible thing for every individual whether or not it is common, "they are afraid, they are young and it is important that someone says to them 'what you have done is really important, how do you want to go on with that, how can you go on without fears, how can you transform your thinking?"

She explained that once cured the journey back to normality "going back down," may also be difficult for them as they are traumatised and may be treated differently by their family and friends, "there is fear, or pity or they may not want to face your illness."

The house in Chamonix is a place to rest, "and have a moment only for them," to speak and ery and laugh, and cut from their families briefly and meet other women in the same place."

Why did Dr Janin choose the Falklands as a place of relaxation," I asked. On the yacht with her friends she can cut herself off from everything: "It is a beautiful place and yes it is a rest but it is also an adventure where the weather and the sea is strong. Here I get my energy back and you must be strong if you are to help people."

Pressed further she spoke of the children: "When they know I'm still going to different places it makes them dream when I show them the photos. For them it is important I am still the adventurer. I haven't got comfortable. I tell them one day they can go also to such places."



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Argentines, flags and uniforms

THE public debate that has arisen in recent weeks in response to actions taken by visiting Argentines is positive and healthy, and refleets the free and open society we live in. It also reflects the degree of annoyance and anger that the continuing Argentine claim engenders in us all. The question, not only for MLA's and FIG officials, but for the public at large, is how we respond to such actions and move forward, within the bounds of commitment to a free and open democracy.

What is the problem ?

It is clear that some Argentine visitors in the last year or two have become bolder in the actions they are prepared to take here, particularly in their reporting on social media. Some also show visible signs of their country's illegal claim to our Islands, including taking photographs with flags and wearing pseudo-military uniform. This annoys many of us, some are very angry that it should be allowed to happen at all, and some are afraid that it will lead to other things, or from recalling events of the past. That people are afraid in their own community is unacceptable, and it is up to all of us to help them feel more secure.

What is the Law?

All Falklands law is subject to the provisions of the Constitution. Those principal sections which come into effect here are.

- Clause 1 Fundamental rights and freedoms of the individual

- Clause 9 Protection for private and family life

- Clause 13 Protection of freedom of expression

- Clause 14 Protection of freedom of assembly and association - Clause 16 Protection from

discrimination A number of provisions appear in the new Crimes Bill which has been passed by the Assembly and will be brought into force shortly. This repeats existing law which is already in place providing protection to the individual, and is in accordance with the Constitution. The most relevant provisions in the new Crimes Ordinance are in Section 21 – Public Order, and in particular

- 513 Violent disorder

- 514 Affray

- 515 Fear of provocation or violence

- 516 Intentionally abusive conduct

- 517 Disorderly conduct

 - 531 Prohibition of uniforms in connection with political objects
 - 532 Behaviour likely to cause

a breach of the peace All of these offences other than

section 517 carry sentences of imprisonment or a fine (517 is a fine only).

How is the law applied to visitors?

All visitors on arrival in the Falkland Islands are issued with a leaflet at the point of entry (im-

migration) describing what is regarded as acceptable behaviour and what is not. The RFIP carry out intelligence led policing to be aware of possible troublemakers; there is a list of persona non grata who would not be permitted entry. The RFIP also regularly visit hotels and guest houses to provide further advice where required. They will also approach groups or individuals in the street if need be.

The Constitution and laws apply to all people equally who are legally in the Islands, regardless of origin or status. This includes visitors. The RFIP will attend any incident reported to them if the incident appears to them, or the person reporting it, to be against the law. In taking any action the RFIP need to be reasonably certain that a law has been broken or is about to be broken. The police have not been told by the FCO or by FIG not to arrest Argentines.

What sort of behaviour is illegal ?

There are a number of different offences, but the most likely to be relevant is Section 515 Fear of Provocation of Violence. In essence under this law, a person who, with intent to cause another person harassment, alarm or distress, uses threatening, abusive or insulting words or behaviour (and thereby cause harassment, alarm or distress) commits an offence. Clearly there is much more to the law than just this, but for the issue at hand this is the core of it. Carrying or displaying an Argentine flag of itself is not illegal, but including on it any provocative language, or chanting slogans, would be. Claiming our country is not of itself illegal, but doing so in a threatening, abusive or insulting manner is.

In the first instance it is for the police to determine if the threshold for illegal behaviour has been reached, and to provide a file of evidence to the Attorney General. He must then decide if there is sufficient evidence, and if it is in the public interest, to prosecute.

Posting things on social media is not illegal of itself. The law of defamation applies, which means untrue and defamatory statements can give rise to legal action.

Is our law too soft ?

There have been calls for more restrictive measures, but not everyone agrees that is necessary or desirable. We must be sure we have considered all of the issues and options before reaching any final conclusions. The proposals for new or additional laws tend to centre around banning Argentine flag waving and photographic records of it, and wearing uniform type clothing.

The Argentine flag is the recognised flag of a UN Member State; it is highly unlikely to be in our interest to try to make it illegal (see further below). It can however be illegal to use it in conjunction with many of the offences listed above.

Section 531 deals with uniforms. It is short and is reproduced in full (so far as it is relevant). It says: ".....a person who in any public place or at any public meeting wears a uniform signifying his or her association with -(a) any political organisation; or (b) the promotion of any political object, commits an offence."

The judgement for each police officer is whether the clothing worn by any individual constitutes a uniform. Simply wearing a camouflage jacket or cargo pants will probably not. Wearing insignia or a beret might in some circumstances: it is for the police officer to make that judgement.

What prevents simply passing more restrictive laws?

There are three issues to take into account here, our own Constitution and democratic freedoms, the advice we receive from the UK Government, and our own assessment of international reaction.

The Constitution is absolutely clear about people's right to freedom of conscience and freedom of speech. This is fully in accordance with UN law and the European Convention on Human Rights (ECHR), and is a fundamental part of our democracy. It is also clear about the right for people to live in peace and freedom in their own country. How to balance these two provisions is the issue at hand.

Any move to curb the freedom of speech, and particularly for a single group of people, would undoubtedly attract huge criticism from a wide variety of sources including from many who we count as our friends and supporters. That is why section 516 is especially important, because it makes it an offence to turn opinions into harassment and alarm. The policy and wording used in our law are widely used by others, and have been tested in the Courts, it would be acutely embarrassing, and lose us a lot of support, if we ended up in the European Court for imposing curbs on the freedom of speech that cross the line.

Whatever the strength of our case for self-determination, and the right to be left in peace, we cannot go it alone. We need the support of the UK Parliament and Government, and of our many friends and supporters around the world. Taking a strong and dignified stance against bullying has won us a lot of admiration and a lot of friends. We should not put that at risk for the sake of a few fantasists struggling with the fact that they lost the war in `82.

Why does it matter what others think - it's our country ?

The common aim of Falkland Islanders is to live in peace in our own country under a Government of our choosing...the right to selfdetermination. Argentina seeks to deny that and to colonise the Islands, and seeks international support for its claim.

UN law and doctrine is on our side in this, and we have regular and widespread success in convincing others to support our fundamental human right to determine our own future. The refcrendum greatly reinforced this in many countries (though obviously not all). Those who support us tend to be those in which the rule of law and the rights of individuals is fully established. It is certain that any action we took, however deeply felt, to restrict the freedom of speech of one nationality (irrespective of the fact that they claim our country) would not be well received. We would certainly lose much of the respect and moral authority we have over this issue, and the UK would find it much harder to provide the level of unequivocal support it currently does.

Are they any danger?

Absolutely not. In the months leading up to the invasion in 1982 the British Government was not clear on its approach to the Falklands, and we had little defence capability.

Now the British Government is absolutely clear about its support for the right to self-determination, and works hard around the world to uphold that principle. We are well defended with sufficient capability and resources to deter and defeat any attempted invasion, and with substantial rapid reinforcement capability. Argentina by contrast is militarily weak, and despite its propaganda campaign does not have the capability to support a military incursion.

That doesn't mean that some groups won't try some kind of stunt.....but it would be just that, and represents no threat to our defence and our freedom.

So what can we do?

Stay strong. Work within the bounds of established law. Help the police to identify any potential offenders by phoning them immediately with any concerns. Reassure those who are afraid that the situation now is in no way similar to 1982. The last thing they need is to be further disturbed by alarmist behaviour.

For our part we will keep under close scrutiny the behaviour of visitors and the adequacy of the law and its enforcement. Above all let's work together as we have for the last 32 years. Welcome visitors to our Islands and let them see the successes we have achieved and the high standards we maintain. Page 8

Belittling FICS improvements

I WAS saddened to read your editorial in last week's PN where you clearly try to belittle the improvements brought about by the staff in the Community school over the last 12 months.

You wrote: "Apparently we're meant to be cheering because the Falkland Island Community School has achieved the fabulous rating of, "requires improvement." Personally, if I were a parent of a student in FICS I'd be choking on my cornflakes reading that."

Any child at FICS between 2007 and 2014 would have been attending a school that, according to Ofsted criteria, was inadequate, ie failing. The management was not as good as it should have been, systems for tracking students' progress were not in place and not all the teaching was good. It's during that period that parents should have been 'choking on their cornflakes'. demanding to see their Councillors, demanding excellence of the school.

When I took over MLA responsibility for Education at the last election I told parents that I would not disguise the seriousness of the situation but that I believed the new Director and Head of FICS were the right people to bring about the desperately needed improvements.

We are committed to FICS undergoing an annual, external inspection until it is a good school before then reducing the frequency.

Had you found the time to speak to Karen Steen. Head of IJS Camp and acting Director, you would have learned that she fully supports the changes being implemented at FICS. They mirror what she and her predecessor introduced at IJS and why IJS scored so highly.

This most recent inspection shows that the changes being implemented at FICS are working; we have seen the first grade improvement in at least seven years. It has not been easy otherwise it would have been done before. It has demanded very hard work on the part of the Head, his senior management team and all staff; this hard work continues as we address recruitment issues. Many of us had children attend FICS when it was a failing school. If we are not to condemn our grandchildren to the same fate I believe we must all support the changes the Director. Head and teachers are bringing about at FICS.



Over the garden fence with Ginge Kidd

AS always at this time of year. life is busy. Bill has 'turned-to amongst the vegetables, pulling out weeds and finding the paths again, and this has allowed me to really put every available moment into the flower beds. The weeds and the grass in there was beyond a joke, and sadly the grass had seeded before I got to it. so I will have to hoe the border frequently to keep it down. especially after rain.

I have now cleaned the four biggest borders leaving me the stumpery and small borders dotted about left to clean up. Mind you, as I look around and, dare I say it, admire the clean areas, I have to admit that the first border is already showing signs of weed growth. As this is the border in which the couch grass thrives, I shall have to get in there again, soonest.

No matter The roses are excelling themselves this year. even the young plants showing off their beautiful blooms, but some geraniums had become a little large in the borders, some reaching as much as three foot in height and width, naturally they were making their neighbours a tad unhappy, and so had to be cut down to a reasonable size

and some replanted elsewhere. The other plants which had growing beside them been immediately gave a sigh of relief as they stretched their toes out and I was able to find many little treasures again in the spaces they had vacated. Many lilies and hardy gladioli had been hiding in the geraniums and are now showing off quite happily.

lupins and perennial poppies. The pansies and little violas can be guaranteed to keep the show going. And of course the various pinks continue to do their best.

The girls are busy picking the outdoor peas now and have also started to pick the runner beans which are growing in the tunnels, these have done very well and look to be set to continue as long as we keep harvesting them and don't allow them to become seedy.

The various marrows are doing well as are the tomatoes and peppers, the pumpkins have produced both female and male flowers at last, they are very easy to pollinate as the female have a very obvious fruit behind the flower, it is just a matter of removing the petals from the male

> flower and putting the middle of that into the middle of the female flower, job done, now to feed and water plentifully until. hopefully, the pumpkins grow large

The seedlings of the various greens

I planted a couple of weeks ago have done very well, and have been pricked out and grown on outside, they are lovely healthy looking plants and are waiting till we start digging out the 'early' potatoes outside to have a nice rich home for the winter. that plot having been well fed for the potatoes earlier in the season.

The berries of the red, white and some of the black currants are ready and some have been


picked and put in the freezer till a later date, the gooseberries are filling out as are the raspberries, though I do believe it might not be just the birds picking the 'odd' one of those and the strawberries! Never mind, they are there to be enjoyed! The family apple tree is not so full this year but the plum is looking promising once again and, so far anyway, the winds have not whipped off all the cherries.

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The weekly mowing continues, and the hedging has started, rather drastically as it happens, the Olearia hastii (New Zealand daisy bush) had become so large it was threatening the fence, and gate opening was becoming hard to do, it could not be trimmed any further so Bill cut it out. As a new picket fence is due one of these days anyway, it made sense to make some space, I have loads of new shrubs growing from cuttings off this shrub to pop another one in some-where but, perhaps further away from the

The Dahlia seedlings have just come into flower, so far it is only the pompom ones and they haven't grown very tall, we will see what the cactus dahlias do.

The best finish of day one was by young James Tyrrell who birdied the 16th with a chip-in, parred 17, birdied 18 and parred the difficult 1st to finish. James was well placed in the Nett competition, but Ah Bonner had a significant lead in the nett after a first round nett 62.

After day one, the Island Games team was taking shape. Troyd, Ian and Kevin had pretty much assured their places but the 4th spot was still up for grabs. Eugene Hurley, Wayne, Adam and

Roy were all within three shots of each other with just one round remaining.

Sunday's weather was very windy from the NW with wind speeds in excess of 30kt at times. but thankfully the rain held off.

Kevin started the final round with a three shot lead on Troyd and five on Ian. A birdie for Troyd whilst Kevin was unfortunate enough to lose a ball ended holing a long putt for a six, meant the two were tied for the lead after just one hole. Pars on 2 and 3 meant Troyd sprinted into a two shot lead. However a careless second shot on 5 into the water hazard, meant he dropped two shots and was joined at the top of the leaderboard again by Kevin.

A bounce back birdie on 6 saw Troyd regain his two shot lead. A brilliant approach to within 2ft on 8 led to a birdie for Kevin and the lead was cut to one which was how things stood after the front 9. Troyd had a 35, Kevin 39, whilst lan lost ground with a 40. Elsewhere on the course most were struggling with the windy conditions and the winner was sure to come from the final group

Troyd started the back nine brilliantly with a par on 10 followed by tap-in pars on the difficult 11th and 12th after great tee shots. Troyd now stood on the easy 13th with a 3 shot lead, however even the easier holes can be punishing

when the wind is howling. A loose tee shot led to a lost ball for Troyd and he limped of the green somewhat shell shocked after a triple bogey 7.

Kevin and Ian meanwhile played the hole superbly in par 4 and Kevin had once more drawn level at the top of the leaderboard. Troyd regained the lead on 14 and looked like going two clear on 16 after a regulation par whilst Kevin missed the green left leaving a blind approach. However his superb short game came through as he saved par. Troyd grabbed the initiative on the short 17th with a lovely wedge shot to 12ft, whilst Kevin came up well short. A two putt par for Troyd gave him a two shot lead with one to play.

The 18th was playing tough with the strong wind blowing straight across from left to right with out of bounds tight to the right side of the fairway, this was far from a done deal. Fisherman drowns as nine jump overboard from Taiwanese ships

THE body of a fisherman was detected in the water off Yorke Point on Wednesday, after two crewmen were reported to the Falkland Islands Emergency Services as missing from the Taiwanese vessel *Hsiang Hao* 6. The second man has not been located and is also presumed dead.

The tragic incident followed reports the day before of seven men missing from Taiwanese vessel *Jin Yi*

An extensive search by the emergency services followed the report and clothing presumed belonging to the seven men was discovered at Hadassa Bay where they are hkely to have swum ashore.

Two of the group of seven were discovered on Tuesday night having first been spotted heading towards Gypsy Cove by youngsters Darby and Regan Newman at 8.40pm who were in the area with their father. Their presence reported the men attempted to evade those searching for them but were eventually found.

The other five were apprehended on Wednesday morning having presented themselves at a house on H Jones Road in East Stanley and asked for food.

Reasons for the men taking such desperate measures to leave their vessels have not yet been made public as the survivors were still being questioned at the time of Penguin News going to print.

The squid jigging vessels crowded in to Stanley Harbour this week in order to collect fishing licences from the Fisheries Department. Fishermen jumping overboard during this time is almost an annual occurrence.

FIG responds Member of Legislative Assembly Phyl Rendell who has portfolio responsibility for fisheries assured Penguin News, "It is not true to say that FIG is turning a blind eye on these matters."

She said the problem extended beyond the Falklands' fishery and there was regular dialogue with the flagged states through the FCO about fishing in the South Atlantic and the need to better inform crew of what they were signing up to. She said FIG officials thoroughly investigated all incidents and if there was evidence of any mistreatment of crew, prosecutions were conducted She said a committee had been addressing the, "complex issues around conditions on foreign flagged vessels and a code of practice is being compiled for distribution to licensees.

Director of Fisheries John Barton also emphasised that there was a protocol for dealing with cases where crew jump off their ship in this manner.

He said "If the vessel has left

the harbour it will be instructed to return. The crew remaining on the vessel will be interviewed to establish whether there are any reasons as to why crew might leave in this way, or whether there are any problems or complaints which the crew wish to bring to FIG's attention. The crew who have jumped off the ship and who survive and are onshore will be interviewed to establish the reasons for jumping."

If there is any suggestion of maltreatment then that will be investigated with a view to presenting a case for prosecution. The vessel will be held for those investigations to take place.

If there is no suggestion or evidence of maltreatment, abuse or unacceptable conditions, then the vessel will be allowed to sail: there will be no reason to detain it, explained Mr Barton.

He said that in previous cases there has been one prosecution for maltreatment. In most of the other cases the crew had left for various other reasons, "not the sort of things which would generate much further investigation let alone further legal action.

"In these cases the crew have seemingly freely stated that they were not being harmed or abused but they have decided the work is not for them and/or they wish to go home."

Mr Barton believes the bigger issue is to stop such events before they happen: "The reasons in some cases appear to be to do with the fact that the crew have been recruited with little understanding of what they are signing up for. It has possibly been the lure of better wages than they might get onshore. Many of the crew are recruited through agencies in countries separate from the flag states which we primarily deal with. The vessels are flagged in South Korea and Taiwan whereas many crew are recruited from Indonesia, Philippines and Vietnam. Again FIG has sought via FCO to inform such countries of the issues and to seek to ensure that crew are better informed before they sign up."

A licence holder responds

Stuart Wallace of Fortuna Ltd, the licence holder vessel Jin Yi expressed deep sadness regarding news of the death of the fisherman from Hsiang Hao 6. (The latter is licensed by J K Marine). He added: "Unfortunately

He added: "Unfortunately the Illex jigger fishery is not yet in our quota management system, and although as licence holders in this fishery we work closely with the authorities in the progressive introduction of controls and standards including a code of practice to be followed by vessels; we believe that being part of the quota system would strengthen the ability of all local stakeholders to increase standards in this fishery. **Cont. on page 3**

IT is pitifully ironic that a scene that represents the source of Falklands economic security is also one that sometimes heralds tragedy

A harbour full of jiggers awaiting their fishing licences is on the one hand a pleasing sight and no doubt elicits a Stanley-wide sigh of relief; their presence indicating continuing confidence in Falkland Islands squid stocks and cash in the coffers.

At the same time it has become standard to hear an announcement that crewmen are missing. This week was no exception, and news that a number of men were found unharmed is small comfort knowing that one did not survive.

The Falkland Islands Government assures us that investigations into the reasons why the men jump are thorough, and that measures are being actively implemented to dissuade men from jumping in the first place. And in the face of explanations of the protocols and efforts being made it is difficult for any layman to imagine what else they might do. However, while these horrific events continue the Falklands cannot rest on its laurels in terms of seeking new solutions, and I trust FIG and the local companies involved will not.

For ourselves, it is not enough to gloss over the situation using phrases like 'it's not because of mistreatment'

Even if this is now true (and there are conflicting stories) the fact remains that men are risking their lives and dying in order to leave ships. All of this in an industry that pays for our college age children to study in the UK, funds our free health care and has this year increased our income tax personal allowance.

This is not a situation that any one Falklands resident can turn a blind eye to. Every single one of us has a responsibility, not just to care (which I know we all do) but to support the Falklands Government and local fishing companies in vigorously pursuing potential solutions even if it means losing a few licence fees from less scrupulous companies.

And bearing in mind that we had record catches last year and another good season predicted, then this is exactly the time to be putting pressure on vessel owners who might be under suspicion of exploitative behaviour or substandard conditions

High winds cause jigger to go aground near FIPASS

WINDS gusting up to 52 knots caused problems for some of the jigger fleet in Stanley harbour on Monday morning with one having to be pulled to safety by the tug Afon Alaw

Harbour Master Captain Malcom Jamieson said that the Korean jigger 601 Sam Young dragged its anchor in the high wind while the skipper was ashore for his licence briefing.

Captain Jamieson said that without the aid of the tug, he doubted any consideration would have been able to be given to towing the jigger until first light the following morning which would have coincided with a higher tide and much less wind

The depth of water in the area to the immediate west of FIPASS would have made using another jigger difficult, explained Captain Jamieson and while he commended the work of the launches and crews who are often overlooked during an incident, they could not compete with the 34 tonne bollard pull of, a dedicated and purpose built tug such as the Afon Alaw.

The fact that the tug has had successful involvement in an incident such as this within a month of becoming available for wider work says a lot," he told Penguin News.

With regard to the environmental risk of a jigger which usually has between 200 and 600 tonnes of fuel aboard, running aground within the harbour, Captain

Jamieson said that dragging anchor and coming ashore from a relatively short distance in the harbour onto a shingly beach with relatively low seas was much less of an issue compared with a truly high energy grounding like drift-ing into cliffs or a rocky shore with a high swell. "But there is a risk all the same," he said.

Workboat Services Managing Director Adam Cockwell said the crew of the tug under Skipper Ben McCabe had done an excellent job getting a line onto the jigger and having her back afloat and under her own power in just over an hour from receiving the call asking for assistance.

He said the company did not make any salvage claim, but had carried out the operation for the flat hourly rate.

A second jigger had a narrow escape as it nearly run ashore directly in front of 34 Ross Road East, but managed to get back out into the harbour under its own power.

The 24 metre Aflon Alaw which is powered by two Cummins KTA38 engines arrived in the Islands in November and is under charter to Premier Oil to assist with berthing operations at the TDF east of FIPASS.

At Mount Pleasant a maximum gust of 62 knots was recorded on Monday, with regular gusts of 50-60 knots and a mean wind speed of 45-50 knots for some four hours.

Suspended jail sentence for eight burglaries

A STANLEY youth who pleaded guilty to eight charges of burglary was sentenced to a six month prison sentence suspended for two years to run in conjunction with a supervision order on Wednesday, after spending 28 days in custody

Crown Prosecutor Simon Rowe told the court how the 17 year old had entered seven houses in Stanley where he had removed underwear from the female occupant's rooms and masturbated on it before leaving the underwear in various outdoor locations, because he knew the owners would not want it back

Mr Rowe pointed out however that the youth had never caused damage to the properties, there was no soiling or vandalism and the doors had been unlocked apart from one incident when a key had been sourced. None of the properties had been occupied at the time of the offences

One of the victims said she had known the youth all his life and described him as a, "grown man with a boy's mind." After accepting his apology she said she was proud of him for telling her the truth, adding that he should be, "given support or assistance rather than punished.

Mr Rowe said that none of the seven victims who ranged from a. middle-aged woman, to an 18year old, all of whom knew the youth, sought compensation for their lost property

Defence lawyer Simon Crowder said the victims realised justice had to be done, but there was no move to obtain compensation. "It's refreshing to live in such a community," he added

Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said the six month sentence was for each of the more serious of the offences when the youth had planned entry to two properties, with a further three months for each of the other offences, to run concurrently

Mrs Faulds said she had given consideration to his age, the various reports prepared and the fact he was responding to help. "You asked for help, have received it and must carry on doing so," she told the youth, adding, "If you behave yourself you will be able to build a life again, but if you re-offend, you will be back in prison.

Speeding fine

STANLEY man Peter John McKay (54) was fined £300 for speeding on Ross Road West on December 30. Mr McKay was recorded travelling at 41mph in a 25mph zone.

He was also ordered to pay £85 prosecution costs and had his licence endorsed.



Suspended sentence for drink driving

A WORKER at the Snooze Box was given a suspended prison sentence on Friday after he admitted a series of road traffic offences which included drink driving

James Mark Raymond Hewison (25) pleaded guilty to being more than three times over the legal limit to drive (114.5mg per 100ml of breath - 35mg is the legal limit), taking a vehicle without consent, driving without due care and attention and without a licence or insurance

Crown Prosecutor Simon Rowe said the incident took place around 8.45pm on February 10. after Mr Hewison had been drinking at the Globe Tavern and had taken the vehicle belonging to the Snooze Box, which had the keys left in it.

After driving up Philomel Street Mr Hewison lost control of the vehicle, crossed the ByPass Road and ended up in the ditch on the other side. In Police interview he said he had intended to drive to his accommodation at 10 Discovery Close, accepted he did not have permission to drive the vehicle and was the holder of a UK provisional licence. He was the only person in the vehicle.

Defence lawyer Simon Crowder said Mr Hewison had arrived in the Islands on January 25 on a six week contract and now found himself in the difficult position of having his employment terminated which meant he no longer had a work permit.

Probation Officer Beccy Roberts providing a brief report to Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said that Mr Hewison who lives in the UK said he had only had three drinks, but had found himself to be, "very tired and lethargic" after long days at work

He had told her that during his time in the Islands he had developed the view that drink driving was, "not frowned upon," in the Falklands, and that as he was far from home he was unlikely to be detected His employers would pay any fine and would fly him back to the UK. Mrs Faulds was told

Delivering judgement Mrs Faulds said there were various mitigating factors in that the incident was not premeditated, there were no passengers and, "miraculously," no damage to the vehicle, the driver or other traffic.

However the level of drink driving and driving without due care and attention coupled with the other factors, despite the fact it was a first offence made custody appropriate, said Mrs Faulds, adding that because of Mr Hewison's particular situation, it would be suspended.

A 14 day prison sentence, suspended for 18 months was delivered for the drink driving offence and £100 prosecution costs to be paid.

For the other offences a total of 24 months driving ban was imposed and licence endorsed for each offence.

It should be noted that the endorsements can not be put on a UK licence and as no FI licence was held, they will be held on Mr Hewison's FI driving record

Falkland Islands Fishing Companies Association (FIFCA) responds

Penguin News asked Andrew Pollard of FIFCA whether it was felt company owners do enough to reduce these incidences in terms of demanding good working conditions on vessels they have assisted in obtaining licences?

Mr Pollard said FIFCA valued, "crew welfare and safety as the very highest of its priorities. We are therefore saddened to hear of the incidents of the past week and in particular the loss of life. In 2014 a working group looking at this very issue, was reconvened to investigate exactly what could be further implemented. This working group consists of the Fisheries Department, KEMH, Attorneys Generals all of FIG. Lighthouse Seaman's Mission, MLAs and FIFCA. A Code of Practice is being developed and will set the standards vessels should be abiding by.

A Port Welfare Committee has also been created to make sure the requirements of crew both on vessels and onshore are addressed. This committee comprises of the Fisheries Department, KEMH. Lighthouse Seaman's Mission and FIFCA

"At licencing, customs and fishery officials board the vessels and are required to carry out certain checks. These checks were amended a number of years ago based on the findings of the working group. All masters are warned at licence briefing that any evidence of crew welfare problems will be investigated. They therefore will lose fishing time whilst the investigation takes place and run the risk of having their licence revoked. All the jigging fleet are governed by their flag states and it is the rules of those countries that these vessel owners must adhere to.

Penguin News also asked if fishing companies insisted that vessel owners provide employees with full and factual information with regard to their employment and conditions on board.

Mr Pollard said: "The employment of crew for the 'jigging' fleet is more complicated than it is for vessels fishing under the Falkland Islands ITQ system. There is more ownership under the current ITQ system. None of the jigging fleet comes under the ITQ system and their crews tend to be supplied from agencies through the vessel owners in Taiwan and/or South Korea. This is an International practice, not just to fish in the Falkland Islands EEZ. Whilst the vessel owners are informed of the requirements from the Falkland Islands, the Code of Practice will be sent to all vessel owners and they will be expected to pass this onto agencies.



MLA Jan Cheek shares a glimpse into her working week

THIS week I will chair Environment Committee as deputy to The Honourable Michael Poole who is taking a short break. Some very useful stuff comes to this committee as the special Falklands environment is perceived by some to be at risk. I believe most understand that we must ensure all necessary safeguards are in place before potential oil development takes place. Much work is underway on analysis of the gaps in collective knowledge so that we have a baseline to know what we are protecting. The growing population of scientists now working in the Islands and projects about them bring a wealth of knowledge and experience to inform future debate. Almost everything that funds our daily lives comes from our surroundings. Fishing, tourism and farming are sustainable resources that we will want to develop for the future whether or not we see oil production.

As I have a number of friends staying for a few days I am especially conscious of how Stanley will appear to them. It is great to see a number of formerly hideous site have been revamped and the oil yards set an excellent example of orderly storage. There are unfortunately still some extensive vehicle grave yards, but probably the most unsightly thing is shredded plastic flapping on fences. Each time I see it I vow to remember my bags for life. but often fail. Unsightly waste disposal and lack of recycling are most frequently unfavourably commented upon by visitors. The remedies are not easy and potentially very expensive, but we could do somewhat better.

It is always good to see the jiggers coming in for their IIlex licences. During Monday's storm there were near misses and groundings. I'm sure several captains were relieved by the presence of a tug which did a rescue or two, perhaps making the case for a tug to be permanently based in the Islands a commercially viable proposition.

On Tuesday we received news we dread, that men were missing from one of the jiggers and extensive searches underway. At the time 1 write we can only hope that they are safe.

Recognising skin cancer

The KEM Hospital looks at recognising skin cancer and how to protect yourself in the sun TOO much exposure to sunlight is harmful and can damage the skin. Some of this damage is short-term (temporary), such as sunburn. However, allowing skin to burn can lead to skin cancer due to long-term (permanent) skin damage.

There are two main types of damaging ultraviolet (UV) sunlight: UVA and UVB. UVA rays penetrate deeper into the skin and have the effect of ageing the skin and causing wrinkles. UVB rays are absorbed by the top layer of skin, causing sun tanning and burning. Both UVA and UVB rays increase the risk of developing skin cancer and can also cause non-cancerous growths on the skin.

Basal cell carcinoma (BCC)

BCC is the most common skin cancer in white and fair-skinned people. It is more common in older people. A BCC typically develops on a sun-exposed area of the skin such as the head and neck. However, one can develop on any area of skin. The first sign is often a small red, pink or pearly lump which appears on previously normal skin.

Squamous cell carcinoma (SCC)

SCC is the second most common skin cancer in white and fairskinned people. It is also more common in older people. An SCC typically develops on the face most commonly on or around the ears or lips. However, any area of skin can be affected. It typically starts as a small crusted or scaly area of skin with a red or pink base. It may grow into a lump which may look like a wart. An SCC may ulcerate or bleed from time to time.

Melanoma (malignant melanoma)

Melanoma is the least common form of skin cancer, but it is the most serious. It most likely spreads to other parts of the body. Melanoma is the second most common cancer in people aged 15-34 years. It is more than twice as common in young women as it is in young men. If diagnosed at an early stage, before it has spread, treatment is likely to be curative.

Solar Keratosis (Actinic Keratosis)

A solar keratosis is the most common skin condition resulting from skin damaged by the sun over many years. Solar keratoses are usually small, rough, thickened, scaly patches on sun-exposed areas such as the head and face. They are common, especially in older people. Usually they are harmless but there is a small risk that they may eventually turn into skin cancer.

Groups who may be at higher risk



· Fair skin people

• Children (babies are at greatest risk of burning and should be kept out of direct sunlight)

- Young peopleOutdoor workers
- · Those having low immunity
- Those with a personal or family

history of skin cancer

• Those with a lot of moles (more than 50)

• Those who put themselves at risk of overexposure to UV rays by sunbathing or by using indoor tanning devices such as sunbeds and sunlamps

How to protect

 Avoid getting sunburnt by avoiding excess or prolonged sun exposure. This includes staying in the sun until the skin goes red.

Protect the skin when it is sunny especially between 11am and 3pm
Seek shade whenever possible

• Where possible, wear clothing that protects areas which may be vulnerable to burning

• Wear a broad-brimmed hat that shades the face, neck and ears, a long-sleeved top and trousers; preferably loose fitting and light clothing

• Where possible, choose closeweave fabrics that don't allow the sun through.

• If it needs to be out in the sun (for example, for work purposes/ outdoor workers) and when it is not possible to stay in the shade or wear protective clothing (for example, because of work requirements) then protect the skin as much as possible to avoid burning, including using sun screen

• Apply sunscreen (SPF 15 or above)

Sunscreen application;

• Sunscreens should not be used as an alternative to clothing and shade; rather they should offer additional protection

• Choose a 'broad spectrum' sunscreen which offers both UVA and UVB protection

• Sunscreen should be at least SPF 15 to protect against UVB and offer high UVA protection

• Use water resistant products if sweating or contact with water is likely

• Apply liberally half an hour before and after going out in the sun, including head, neck, ears, lips, around the eyes, scalp (particularly if bald or have thinning hair), backs of hands and tops of feet

• Re-apply at least every 2 hours if constantly been in sun

• Reapply immediately after being in water, even if the sunscreen is 'water resistant'

• Also re-apply after towel drying Keep checking the skin regularly and if there is any lump or patch on the skin or if a mole changes in its shape, border, colour or size see a doctor.

EOIs will be used to assist FIG in refining its approach to a possible funding programme. While submission of an EOI is not a prerequisite for participating in any future programme, interested parties are strongly encouraged to submit responses.

The expression of interest should be no more than 2 pages in length and should address the following:

- The location and estimated length of the road to be constructed (including start and end points);
- A description of who the main users of the road will be (and in cases where the proposal is to upgrade an existing track, an indication of the current traffic levels, and possible future traffic generated by a new road);
- A statement as to how you will provide match funding towards the construction of the road, and ideally, an indication of what proportion (%) of the costs you will bear;
- A description of how you propose that any such road would be maintained on an ongoing basis;
- A brief summary of the economic benefits to the Islands that would arise as a result of the construction of the road;
- Any other factors that you feel are relevant.

Queen's is an interesting university because it is located in that region of Canada where the British who remained 'loyal' to Britain in the War of Independence with the United States were given land grants to settle in the region now known as Kingston. These 'United Empire Loyalists' are people who remain strongly connected to the United Kingdom and to the Commonwealth of Nations.

The Queen's University Royal Charter was granted by the young Queen Victoria in 1841 and so Queen's University remains the only Canadian university directly chartered by the Crown. The visit was highly successful in identifying areas of mutual interests and areas where Queen's may be able to assist in the ongoing challenge of recruiting and retaining excellent physicians for the Falklands.

Each meeting we had was productive; everyone we met was welcoming and highly dedicated to their work. Our message to the people of the Falklands is that they can rest assured that from His Excellency the Governor Colin Roberts, to the Legislative Members we met, the newly arrived Director of Health and Social Services, lan Bainbridge, the hospital management, to Chief Medical Officer Dr Rebecca Edwards and to so many other staff in the hospital. All are dedicated to creating and maintaining an excellent health care system.

Our impression is that there should be great pride in the system and in the dedication of the people providing health care in the Falklands.

With warm thanks for the wonderful hospitality and friendship expressed by everyone we met in the Falkland Islands.

There was parental representations about various issues and staff from the Community School shared their concerns with Board Members and the Director of Education. The Education Board and councillors, (MLAs) of that time, did not shirk their responsibilities and embarked on a process that they knew was going to be difficult.

We did put in place policies that we thought would improve the performances of the schools and after a period of consultation, within the Community School and the IJS, we introduced policies that would monitor teaching, record learning and give teachers a clear pathway for career development.

There are many positives like the quality of individual teachers and some young and dynamic Islanders joining the teaching staff. One can only hope that this, rather than finding a diplomatic scapegoat, will bring cohesion, success and excellence to the Community School in the future.

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RFIP Prison Officers trained as part of reform process

THREE Royal Falkland Islands Police (RFIP) prison staff have successfully completed the first modular training package specifically for Prison Officers

Officers Trudi Felton, Jeremy Clarke and Brenda Berntsen were presented with certificates by HE The Governor Colin Roberts at a ceremony at RFIP headquarters on February 12

Her Majesty's Prison, as part of the Royal Falklands Island Police Service, is undergoing a prison reform process under the direction of the Chief of Police, Superintendent Len McGill and leadership of the new Prison Manager. lan Sargent. An important part of this reform is the training and development of Prison Staff.

The recently appointed Prison Officers have undergone specific Prison Officer training and mentoring programmes.

The training consisted of a 30 module package covering Security and Supervision, Legislation, Functions and Roles of a Prison Officer, Communications, Pro Social Modelling and Offender Rehabilitation. The initial train-

ing will be followed by monthly sessions on key developmental subjects

Mr Sargent said that developing staff and delivering tailored training for staff to ensure they had the skills and tools to effectively perform their role was of vital importance "As a service we need to give the public confidence that the staff working in a diverse field of custodial care are skilled and actively engaged in both security and reducing re offending." He said he had been impressed with the quality of staff and their commitment to the training schedules and ongoing learn-"This is a significant time for ing. the Prison Service in the Falkland Islands as it will be the first time staff working in the prison have undergone such complete Prison Officer training. This phase of prison reform is also extremely rewarding on a personal level, as transferring skills and knowledge to the staff is indeed a professional highlight."

Superintendent McGill added that the decision by Members to accept the recommendation of the Southern Oceans Prisons Advisor and provide dedicated prison staff and an experienced prison manager, was a great step forward.

Working closely with other professionals and the local community the team is ensuring that prisoners are well cared for, receive appropriate rehabilitation and training and are successfully reintegrated into the community.

"The new prison legislation, when introduced in the near future, will consolidate all that has been achieved.

"I would like to acknowledge the exceptional effort by Mr Sargent in delivering such intense training in such a short time frame and Prison Officers Trudi Felton. Brenda Berntsen and Jeremy Clarke for their commitment to learning their new craft.

FULL time potter Bridget Drake- now installed at the Museum: ford recently spent three weeks in 2 the Falklands teaching her craft to Islands residents.

She said: "It has been quite an adventure for me and a life-long ambition. As a distantly related Lafone I am glad I have set foot on the Islands and hope that my visit might encourage and inspire a few artist potters in the future.

Wandering albatross survey A scientific expedition but a mesmerising experience

NOT everyone gets to visit South Georgia, and very few get the privilege to fully circumnavigate the island, but only a handful of very lucky people get to experience what was undertaken on this very special trip on the Hans Hansson

Juliette Hennequin takes up the story

Sixteen of us left Stanley early in January for a month trip during which the Government of South Georgia had chartered the Hans Hansson to do an island wide survey of the Wandering albatross population. This meant that we would have to visit every single nest we could find on South Georgia, with the exception of Bird Island and Annenkov island, write down their position and any relevant data. Sally Poncet was the lead sci-

entist on this trip, assisted by Ken Passfield and Andy Black, the latter being the SGGSSI liaison officer, making daily reports of our progress to the government. Another scientist, Jessica Hoskins tagged along on the trip to study insects, and mainly check out for any invasive species. To help fund the project, Cheesemans' Ecology Safaris filled the remaining space with eight lucky tourists and their guide. Most of them already big fans of the island. all were very keen to be part of the survey and have the opportunity to approach Wandering albatross. The itinerary on this trip was dictated by the location of nesting albatross, and made it an extraordinary trip too because it gave us the opportunity to land in sites that are usually closed to visitors.

Our captain and expedition leader Dion Poncet had already done the Ada II, along with his mother Sally, and took great pleasure in sailinground South Georgia and sneaking in close to the coast to show us peculiar details or just to make zodiac rides shorter.

There are no guides like the Poncet's to show you around South Georgia, and it is hard to find words to describe the fascination one can develop for this unique place on carth

The island combines fantastic landscapes, astonishing wildlife and a dramatic human history This trip was even more special, as it took us to many remote locations, following the breeding pattern of the biggest seabird on earth. These magnificent birds have a wingspan greater than any species (over 3 metres), and are also well known for their faithfulness, most birds pairing for life. Wanderers travel huge distances, sometimes as far as 7500km on foraging trips, seeking krill, squid and fish with which they will rear their chick. They have a very effective flight and make use of wind and currents to minimize energy con-

sumption January is the peak period for courtship, where established pairs will reunite and lay a single egg. whilst the younger birds will try finding a partner. They engage in an elaborate courtship dance in which the birds go through a series of positions and produce various sounds, from groaning to bill vibration which produce a drumming sound. To witness this perfectly orchestrated 'ballet' is an absolutely breathtaking experience, and I have to admit that we were spoiled with

counted 341 nests with eggs, which sadly is 15 per cent less than in 2004 These numbers are not final. as the nests on both Bird and Annenkovisland have to be added, and hence we will have a better view of how the population is doing.

amongst the sites surveyed, the sites with larger numbers of nesting birds were doing relatively well compared to the smaller sites, and for example the population on Albatross island shows only a 3 per cent decline in the same period It gives a brighter perspective and keeps the hopes high for the future. The adults are still vulnerable to mortality from the long line fisheries, as outside of South Georgia maritime zone, fisheries can be less regulated, some hardly at all.

It again shows how vulnerable these birds are and how important it is to maintain and pursue efforts worldwide to try and save these


competitors and those who swim purely for fun-

Vietnamese seamen to fly home

THE seven Vietnamese fisherman who jumped ship from Korean squid jigger Jin Yi. in Stanley harbour last week are to be repatriated on Saturday pending flight availability, MLA Phyl Rendell told Penguin News yesterday

MLA Rendell said however that the authorities had stated that any offences, if there were any, took place outside Falklands jurisdiction so there would not be any prosecution. At time of going to print Penguin News was unable to obtain an official response from FIG, however it is understood the men were unhappy with the cold conditions and the heavy work on board. Also some minor assaults had taken place on a previous voyage.

Two more Vietnamese menjumped overboard from another vessel, the Hsiang Hao 6 last Wednesday; one was found drowned and another was not located. It is presumed his body was washed out to sea.

Following inspection of the vessel and interviews with the crew on board as well as interviews with the survivors, both ships were allowed to return to their fishing grounds; the Hsiang Hao 6 with the permission of the Coroner. It has been reported that conditions on the ships were good and the crew appeared well looked after.

MLA Rendell said the Falklands Government takes such incidents very seriously and work is ongoing through the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) and the Embassies of the flagged vessels when such incidents occur. The Fisheries Department inspects vessels when they are in for licensing and checks that they have sufficient life saving equipment on board she said.



Antarctic memorial honours those who never returned

STANLEY'S historic link as the gateway for British Antarctic exploration was acknowledged on Wednesday evening with the dedication of the southern component of a unique memorial to the 28 men and one woman of the British Antarctic Survey (BAS) and before that the Falkland Islands Dependencies Survey (FIDS) who have perished in the Antarctic since the establishment by the British Government of the first permanent research base there in 1944.

The monument created by Oliver Barrett is made up of two parts, separated by 8.000 miles.

Addressing the large crowd on Wednesday, Roderick Rhys-Jones, chairman of the British Antarctic Monument Trust (BAMT), said the northern part of the sculpture which has been erected in the grounds of the Scott Polar Research Institute in Cambridge, consists of two columns of British oak so carved and positioned as to surround an

extended elliptical shape between them. The southern monument represents that shape in stainless steel, as if the wooden northern part had been its mould.

3.25m high and 350mm at its widest point, the mirror-polished metallic needle inclines to the south and particularly towards the Narrows of Stanley Harbour through which those who lost their lives would have departed for Antarctica.

It is so set that each day the shadow of the sculpture will pass one by one over the names of those killed in Antarctica, which are engraved on the base.

Antarctic British The Monument Trust believe that Oliver Barrett's design reflects the environmental and scientific link between Britain and Antarctica, but also recognises the emotional separation physical and experienced by explorers and their families.

In addition to the separated sculpture, BAMT have also placed a memorial plaque in the crypt of St Paul's cathedral in London.

The Trust's Chairman, Roderick Rhys-Jones, told Penguin News that the service in the crypt of St Paul's and the reception which followed the unveiling of this memorial on May 10, 2011 brought together some 300 families and friends from all over the world.

"It was an incredibly moving occasion," said Mr Rhys-Jones, who lost three of his own companions when their Snowcat disappeared into a crevasse when he was working for BAS at Halley Bay in 1996. Their bodies, like many others of those who died in the Antarctic, were never recovered.

PROBABLY the most important word on the Government's application to enhance Arch Green is "proposal." It is a suggestion as to how the area may be improved for both residents and visitors and is in no way set in stone. And, you'll be pleased to hear, neither is a Falklands flag to be. (See page 3)

Having poured over the plans and tried to work out just how much of the flower beds we will lose (and I'm still not entirely sure) to widen the pavement, the only definite conclusion I did come to is that I agree that a Falklands flag mosaic should not be a part of the area. But, I hasten to add, I don't think we need to be bringing a penguin rookery into town either, in case changing the design is an option, and as for dolphin and geese decorating the pathway, I'm afraid I find that just a tad twee and (to trot out a well used Planning and Building phrase) not in keeping with the surrounding area. Next thing we'll have a Falklands 'Walk of Fame' where self appointed 'celebrities' will cast their hands in cement so we can gaze upon them in awe.

But, I have to confess that despite my best efforts to find fault with a path across Victory Green leading into the Dockyard Development and creating a scenic and accessible amenity for all, I can find none. Apart from a very small loss of some of the grass (a mere 5.5 per cent of the entire area) for me the pros far outweigh the cons.

The possibility of more seating in the bank just above the path and some flower beds, pushchair access to the green without risk of being blown over the sea wall or losing a wayward toddler overboard, filtering of tourists away from Ross Road and to the Dockyard with relevant signage, a far superior entrance to the Dockyard than the current one which involves a gravel road and a squeeze through vehicles into a narrow space, improved access to The Shack the list goes on.

I'm not for change for the sake of it. I'm an Islander after all and there are those who say we quite simply "don't do change," (and that is another discussion altogether) but when there is a very obvious benefit for many from a very simple project. I'm all for it.

You can keep your airy fairy flags and dolphins which to my mind wouldn't fit in with the historic setting of the Arch Green area, but as far as I'm concerned, yes please to a basic path which will make Stanley more user friendly for everyone all year round.

How apprenticeship schemes must be completely reassessed

GOVERNMENT needs to completely reassess how apprenticeship courses are offered, said MLA Barry Elsby at yesterday's meeting of the Legislative Assembly.

The future of apprenticeships schemes in the Falkland Islands was raised by MLA Phyl Rendell.

She asked what apprenticeship programmes were currently in place at the Training Centre and how many of those were filled.

She also enquired of MLA Barry Elsby, who retains the education portfolio, what plans there were for further technical training for apprenticeships and when any new schemes would be available."

MLA Elsby confirmed the Training Centre currently ran apprenticeships in carpentry (one person) mechanical (two people) electrical (two people) childcare (two people) hospitality (one person) and aircraft engineering (one person). Of those nine one is undertaking training in the UK and two others are due to go overseas in September as part of their programme.

Five apprenticeship schemes are funded each year but not all are taken up he explained. "The Head and the Manager of the Training Centre are working to improve this system at the moment and are very much guided by the training needs analysis when that is finally available," said MLA Elsby.

MLA Rendell said she hoped there were plans in the future, "to enhance that training," and indicated that bearing in mind, "where we are in the economy, we have a massive number of opportunities for young Islanders in technical skills and 1 would like to think that even if they are not currently available at the training centre now that there are plans and considerations in place for an expansion of the opportunities we can offer young people." MLA Elsby agreed and acknowledged, "the Falkland Islands has in many ways followed the route of countries such as the UK where perhaps too much emphasis has been put on academic training at universities as being the pinnacle of having succeeded..."

He said: "perhaps we haven't put enough emphasis on the vocational course and 1 think that is highlighted by the fact that we only fund a maximum five courses for apprenticeships in the Islands each year and yet we have an unlimited access to academic courses in Peter Symonds and at universities. We have to completely reassess how we are going to offer those courses."

He explained that currently there were 15 different courses available in the training centre but it was a matter of finding approved assessors in the Island.

MLA Elsby said he thought everybody was committed to the fact that "we have to raise the level of the importance of vocational courses and they should no longer he viewed in any way as secondary to an academic performance."

MLA Rendell said she was motivated to ask the question after a visit to the PWD, "where they really would like to see opportunities for people currently employed in FIG to embark on skills training, and there is also great demand in the private sector."

MLA Elsby said there was a difference between formal apprenticeship schemes, "and the need to perhaps improve people's skills when they are already in their 30s or 40s." While there were only nine people on formal apprenticeships schemes in the training centre, "there are over 63 undergoing some form of training based in the training centre." While they are not formal they are a way of up-skilling a person to, "better their career prospects."

Difficulties being experienced at FICS says MLA Elsby

MLA Barry Elsby believes there are "difficulties" in the Community School at the moment, but says he does not know what the specific problems are.

Responding to a question by MLA Jan Cheek at yesterday's Legislative Assembly in which she expressed her concern that there were four vacancies due to health reasons, MLA Elsby said he was of course concerned that two teachers had resigned due to health reasons and another two were signed off due to health issues. He said he had held meetings with Government officers, including the Chief Executive to put in place measures that can help support the teachers and improve the situation in the Community School.

MLA Phyl Rendell said she hoped that those who had left FICS had, in line with Human Resources policy, given exit interviews with complete anonymity so that those reports could be reflected on to try and understand why so many staff were being lost.

MLA Elsby said he did not know if exit interviews had taken place, but he hoped they would.

New funding for environmental projects

MORE than €6 million has been made available to European Overseas Countries and Territories (OCTs) some of which can be accessed for environmental projects within the Falkland Islands

The European Commission has announced that in order to address the need for facilitated access to funding in the OCTs. it is allocating new resources for concrete projects through a five year programme; BEST 2.0 (Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services in European Outermost Regions and Overseas Countries and Territories). The European Commission's Directorate General for International Cooperation and Development (EuropeAid) has two calls for proposals organised in the coming two years, with a total budget of over €6 million for this initiative

BEST 2.0 recognises a need for support of projects on the ground whilst a long term financial mechanism is created from the existing BEST III initiative. which began last year. The aim of the BEST III project is to support and maintain biodiversity and sustainable use of ecosystem services, including looking at ecosystem-based approaches to climate change adaption and mitigation methods. This is taking place simultaneously across all European OCTs

The South Atlantic Environmental Research Institute (SAERI) is the coordinator for the South Atlantic Hub, which includes Ascension Island, St Helena and Tristan da Cunha, the Falkland Islands and South Georgia and South Sandwich Isles

Five of the existing BEST III knowledge hubs will help assure the calls are adapted to the varying conditions and situations encountered in OCTs and will provide support to local organisations for submission of proposals.

The objective of BEST 2.0 is to empower local actors, authorities and civil society organisations in OCTs. Within the Falkland Islands this will involve organisations who are committed to local development, maintaining biodiversity and the sustainable use of ecosystem services. This will particularly apply to the key biodiversity areas identified through the participative Ecosystem profiles process led by the BEST knowledge hub for the region. Eligible beneficiaries will be local authorities and services. civil society organisations and stakeholders working within the Falkland Islands.

COMMUNITY interest in the Waterfront Development has been heightened by a Planning application from the Government to widen the footpath in front of Arch Green as well as enhance the area and incorporate a paved area with a mosaic

A flag of the Falklands was used as representative of what could be created within the paved area, and this has proved to be the most controversial aspect of the development. Residents were concerned that it would provide some Argentine tourists and particularly those who come to the Islands with a political agenda an opportunity to deface it.

However Waterfront Development Project Co-ordinator Michael Betts assured Penguin News this week that if a high level of objection is received the project will not go ahead.

He said he appreciated the concerns residents had about the Falklands flag being defaced by some visitors, and this had been taken on board. The flag won't be in the planning application that goes to the March 4 meeting of the Planning and Building Committee," he said.

With regard to widening the footpath he said the aim was to get tourists past the Whalebone Arch and the, "pinch point," by the Boat House into the more open part of the Waterfront. He said Dave Eynon had opted not to have anything changed on his land, as was his right, but this was why there was a need to have crossings. "Opening up Arch Green would allow people to stop and take pictures, as they tend to do with less congestion." said Mr

The proposed changes are not just for tourists, they are for residents as well, he assured, adding. "we all want to enjoy the Waterfront.

He said that people visited for Stanley's charm and character as had rightly been pointed out on a Facebook discussion, adding: "We don't want to take that away. We just want to improve people's accessibility of the Waterfront so they can see Whalebone Arch, walk on Victory Green and access people's businesses.

Referring to the proposed path along the top side of Victory Green, south of The Shack and to the north of the Town Hall, Mr Betts said it provided an additional path on the Waterfront and also an alternative access to the Historic Dockyard Museum

"The Museum project is brilliant and we want to be able to get people from the Public Jetty along Ross Road to access it.

He said the pathway from behind the Town Hall brings users into the centre of the Dockyard development. "It's not just about access for tourists, it could be a pleasant route for all pedestrians to use on a regular basis.

Mr Betts said he was grateful for the input from the public and the interest shown in the project. "We're not coming up with these ideas for the sake of change, we're following strategy, but it's important people are involved, because at the end of the day it is our Stanley," he said.

Rig in position for drilling campaign

SEMI-SUBMERSIBLE oil rig Eirik Raude entered Falklands waters to the north this week. She has already been served by supply vessels, and has undergone a crew change operation.

Two of the rig's three supply vessels are in the Falklands along with three support helicopters.

Three large coaster vessels recently delivered supplies to the Islands to support the drilling programme.

The Eirik Rande will shortly begin a six-well drilling campaign operated by Premier Oil and Noble Energy

The programme is scheduled to commence with the Premier operated Zebedee well, which will test the southern lobe of the Sea Lion field in the North Falklands basin. It is aimed that three more wells will be drilled in the north before the rig moves to the South Falkland basin

Oil development

FIDC has been working closely with consultants to develop The South Atlantic Registry of Oil Suppliers, a procurement data base that will connect oil and gas companies with local suppliers, said MLA Jan Cheek yesterday. She said the data base is finished and the website is close to being finalised and launched, "and local suppliers will then be able to complete their company profiles and search for oil and gas contracts."


Scalion development

AS on previous occasions people feel great sadness for the loss of life last week when men jumped off two jiggers. Hearts go out to the families of those two lost. They have not only lost loved ones but also the income paid to families by the agencies that recruited them. Considerable work has been done with owners and authorities in the countries of origin but sadly there are still incidents and it seems likely that some crewmen have no idea of where they will be working and how tough the conditions are, even on the best run ships. Thankfully one group made it safely to shore. little short of miraculous given water temperatures and kelp forests. It remains to be seen why they jumped and I'm sure efforts to improve conditions will continue.

When this is published on Friday the oil rig should be in the area being readied for work. A couple of the huge support ships have already been in and out of the harbour and Port William. It could be a noisy few months for those of us in line with the Narrows and can hear ships in Port William if it is calm or if the wind is northerly. I'm also aware of the huge volume of work recently undertaken in the Mineral Resources and Environment Departments to ensure that everything is in order and permissions in place so that the campaign can start promptly. This is just one example of the immense volume of work undertaken by small departments in FIG.

This week we will see the unveiling of the memorial to those who went to work in the Antarctic and did not return. It is a reminder of our long links with FIDS (Falkland Islands Dependencies Survey) and BAS as it was later renamed. Dozens of Falkland Islanders served on the Antarctic bases and the support vessels and for many years most personnel travelled though the Falklands 'gateway to the Antarctic'. The memorial will remind us all of those links with people who did, and those still doing, important, world respected scientific research.

He said that while ignorance was no excuse, he was new and was not aware of the speed limit in the area.


Senior Magistrate Clare Faulds said that any Falklands licence would also be endorsed.

SENIOR Fisheries Scientist at the Department of Natural Resources Dr Alexander Arkhipkin participated in two separate workshops last month in Chile and Australia; at the invitation of, and funded by, the organisers themselves.

The Chilean workshop was held in the Department of Oceanography in the University of Concepcion mid month and Dr Arkhipkin explained that the organisers decided to invite a small group of squid experts to obtain advice on their one and a half year research project and report on the jumbo squid *Dosidicus*.

This large squid attains 30-40 kg in weight and is the subject of a relatively new fishery in central and southern parts of Chile.

It has appeared regularly in Chilean waters in the last decade and is thought to severely damage the stocks of hakes and other finfish there.

Port facilities required

WE are now approaching peak season on FIPASS once more. There is little to no talk anymore of a new port, so users are confined to East and Central berths on FIPASS and limited usability of West berth.

We have vessels from various sectors. Fishing, Cargo, etc looking for berths, and they are not always readily available in peak times. We are short of port facilities and we are short of layup facilities, given the number of vessels of one type or another operating here seasonally and all year round.

I wonder if thought could be given to provision of reasonable port facilities through replacing FIPASS, by moving the existing structure to the other side of the harbour, say allied to The Camber, to provide a lay- up facility for vessels out of season, for repair works, or for any other calls that did not require the facility currently at FIPASS.

Then to replace FIPASS, could thought be given to replacing the existing structure with a similar structure, say 400-450 Metres long, with free access to berths for the full length of the structure, situated so as allow access on the southern side as well for smaller vessels, and sufficient space for vessels to manoeuvre for berthing. Provision would of course have to be made for those businesses operating on FIPASS, with the allocation of alternative facilities elsewhere, so their business is not impacted.

This would increase the capacity of a port facility for Stanley while utilization of the existing structure at the other side of the harbour would provide a layup facility, for repairs and other have revealed that during its twoyear life cycle, this squid migrates to Chilean waters from Peru, stays there for about a year feeding on various small mesopelagic fish, and migrates back to Peruvian tropical waters to spawn

The organisers had further advice on sampling strategy, age and growth studies, ecology and acoustics.

Another International Workshop 'Trends in world cephalopod resources' took place in the School of Biological Sciences, the University of Adelaide later the same month and Dr Arkhipkin was invited as an external expert together with Prof G. Pierce (University of Aberdeen).

The organisers collected data series on cephalopod abundance from about 70 various fisheries on octopus, cuttlefish and squid from all parts of the world ocean.

The main aim of the workshop was to reveal any possible trends in cephalopod abundance that might have happened globally or in any specific part of the world, and try to relate them to exploitation of other fishery resources and climate variability.

The results showed, "quite surprisingly," said Dr Arkhipkin, that positive trends in cephalopods' abundance in all major regions of the world ocean, and for all types of life cycle of cephalopods.

These positive trends in cephalopod abundance in the last 20 years may be explained by the partial removal of their main competitors and predators, that is, demersal and pelagic fishes.

Also, short-living cephalopods have a greater flexibility to adapt to greater changes in the environment than long-living fishes.

Dr Arkhipkin said: "Overall, participation at both workshop 'brainstorming sessions' was useful and productive, and incidentally promoted the scientific and management work of the FIG Fisheries Department."



ROADS TO NON-AGRICULTURAL DESTINATIONS

IN October 2014 Executive Council agreed a policy to support the construction of roads to non-agricultural destinations where a clear economic justification for doing so could be demonstrated. The Falkland Islands Government is now seeking initial expressions of interest (EOI) from businesses that might wish to benefit from the subsidy that such a scheme might offer in the future.

Interested parties should note that no funding for this policy has yet been allocated and the purpose of the expression of interest stage is to ascertain the potential level of demand for such a scheme, and the nature of proposals in order that these can be considered within the National Infrastructure Plan and associated FIG budget deliberations. EOIs will be used to assist FIG in refining its approach to a possible funding programme. While submission of an EOI is not a prerequisite for participating in any future programme, interested parties are strongly encouraged to submit responses







WHAT a wonderful weekend! The weather was calm and warm, even a little hot for me at times, but great for gardening. The front border which suffers from couchgrass 'squatters' was dealt with again, although, in some cases, the plants had to be dug out as the 'strings' of couch-grass roots had embedded themselves only too well amongst them. Those I could clean were put back in, others, such as the small species iris growing on roots rather than bulbs or visible rhyzomes and which seem to play host to the couch-grass. I have lifted out completely. Once cleaned up and split I shall pop them into a different border.

I was delighted with the crop we got from the 'Charlotte' seed potatoes. As I have mentioned before I was totally reliant on friends for potato seed this last season, having lost most of our crops the year before. These seeds were put in simply to create enough seed potatoes for another year with perhaps, a few for ourselves if only for a potato salad, which they are wonderful in. The soil they were in was a bit shallow so I did not expect much else anyway. It was shallow enough to show the green potatoes lying on the top, these gave me a large bucket full of seed potatoes, but, on digging to clean up the row I was delighted to find beautiful and big, potatoes nestling beneath the surface - enough to fill two bags. Not bad for 15 seeds ch?

As I've cleaned up in the borders, it's been easy enough to prune shrubs which have flowered, plants such as the Philadelphus (mock orange) some of the spiraeas and even the fuchsias that have finished flowering outside benefit from a trim. Speaking

of fuchsias, when Bill gave me a raised flower bed in a rather messy area a couple of years ago I put a few indoor fuchsias I had grown from cuttings into it in an effort to fill it and have some colour for that season. I was surprised to see them come up again last year, but, the frost hit them and that was that, however, they have once again, come through and have started to flower this year, so proving they are rather hardier here than they would seem.

In the fruiting area it is also time to trim back the currants and any raspberry canes that have fruited. The strawberries also need their runners cutting off, the plant's strength is going into those instead of the fruit. The bigger ones are good to start more new plants with, they very quickly root into moist soil and form good little plants to start another bed elsewhere.

The fruit trees have, once again, been hammered by the wind, but some fruits continue to grow. There are a few cherries and some plums and we may get to see some apples ripen yet.

The rhubarb continues to crop but it is getting past it's best now, and the currants, gooseberries and other soft fruit bushes are well picked.

The sunflower competition is nearly at an end, three of them grew incredibly tall, whilst one, obviously damaged at 'birth' formed four, more dwarf flowers, making judging a little easier.

The strawberries and 'tumbling

Tom' tomatoes grown by the girls are also producing well and all are eaten as soon as spied, and some of them are growing better peppers than I am!

The pumpkins and various marrows are doing well and the sweet corn promises a grand crop. The runner beans also continue to crop well while the peas, grown inside, have been picked to death and have really done well, those outside have also nearly finished cropping, They have really done well this year.

Circumstances made me start driving again, although I still feel the odd twinge and the knee does swell up by night time, it no longer quivers when on the clutch, thanks mainly, I think, to the exercise cycle I have on loan from a dear friend and which has returned some strength to the knee. Life would have been easier if I could have made myself drive an automatic vehicle but I have never liked those. Actually, I have never really liked driving either. but it is convenient and it does give some independence (I might also be able to nip to the garden centre more often) but I far prefer being a passenger.

I don't know where this season has gone, it seems that already we are getting to the end of it, with main crop potatoes nearly ready to dig up and the last of the earher ones out, their ground now cleaned up and ready to be planted with the overwintering brassicas which are now a very reasonable size. I have planted more spring cabbage seeds and lettuce seeds also to grow now and over-winter

The cyclamen corms need to be brought back into growth, some will have restarted anyway, just removing about an inch of the old compost inside the pot and replacing it with fresh new stuff should do the trick, their flowers are such a treat in winter.



Dek hockey players get set to transfer to ice for Chile comps

DEK hockey club manager and a former ice hockey professional Grant Budd recently returned from playing for a Punta Arenas team in a mini international tournament in Chile. He has ambitious plans for his Falklands players next year involving taking a team to Chile to compete in a similar tournament.

Kotaix lee Hoekey Club President Ricardo Matus invited Mr Budd to play with his team in mid January against two Argentine teams from Rio Grande (The Dragons A and B teams) at the Zona Franca Cool Centre in Punta Arenas.

Having not played a competitive game in 17 years since moving to the Falklands. Grant was worried about his fitness more than his stick skills or skating.

"Playing dek hockey here has kept the puck control and shooting to a respectable level and experiencing ice skating at the Zona Franca rink back in November last year gave me the confidence that with my own skates it wouldn't take long before I was comfortable playing again."

Ile scored goals and gained assists despite his teams losing. Impressed with his play they asked him to stay another week and provide hockey schooling for their pee wee and junior players. "which I was happy to do," said Grant. It proved a convenient



time to gain more experience and find out more about the setup.

His interest had been piqued last November when he accompanied his son Malachi on the junior football team trip to Chile they took the youngsters skating and Grant had spotted an advertisement for ice hockey. He spoke to the management and maintained contact on his return to the Islands.

"After plenty of messaging on Facebook and becoming a friend on the Kotaix Hockey Club site 1 booked my ticket and was able to represent the Falkland Islands in a sport I played from 1983 to 1998." Grant played professionally for England and Great Britain during that time. Speaking of his plans for his Falklands players he said: "The fact that the Falklands has no ice rink should not deter us from entering such events as this. In fact it creates more interest and as such I want to take a dedicated Falklands team to represent us in the Punta Arenas International Tournament to be held in early July 2015."

He said: "For many here, this may be considered the impossible or even bordering on the line of stupidity, but I always consider the impossible possible and if it was not meant to be you can at least say you have tried. We are set to make history entering a competition when we don't have an ice rink facility. However, the

Argentine teams I played against were actually an in-line hockey team, which only proves that if you are able to roller skate, you can certainly ice skate as it is easier. Jamaica managed to compete in the bobsleigh event in Winter Sports after all."




He said the tournament is a huge event not only in Punta Arenas, but in Chile itself and well covered by the media.




