The Wound Stripes and Chevrons will be awarded not only to the Armed Forces including the Home Guard, the Merchant Navy and Fishing Fleet serving at sea, the Civil Air Transport and Coast Guards but also to N A F F I employees in respect of Services with The Forces at Sea or Overseas. They will also be awarded in the U.K. in specified Civil Defence Services, the Fire Guard, the Police and National Fire Services, to Nurses in Hospitals under the control of Government Departments or Local Authorities or in recognised Voluntary Hospitals and in addition to Lighthouse and Light Vessel Keepers serving under the General Lighthouse Authorities.

With reference to my circular telegram No. 66, I enclose a copy of Command Paper No. 6463 which gives details of the scheme relating to the awards of the Africa Star, the 1939-43 Star, the Clasp to the two Stars, the Despatches Emblem, and the institution of Wound Stripes and Chevrons for war service.

2. Instructions as to the method of issue of the Africa Star and the 1939-43 Star are being prepared and a separate communication on this point will be sent to you.

3. In considering what civilian categories should be included in the scheme for Wound Stripes and Chevrons, the following examples of United Kingdom organisations which will be excluded may be of assistance in framing recommendations:-

(a) Examples of Uniformed Organisations -

Admiralty Yard Craft personnel Customs Preventive Branch or Waterguard Mechanised Transport Corps Postmen Prison Service Railway and Road Transport undertakings Women's Land Army

(b) Examples of Civil Defence Organisations -

## THE AFRICA STAR AND THE 1939-43 STAR THE CLASPS TO THE TWO STARS, THE DESPATCHES EMBLEM, WOUND STRIPES AND CHEVRONS FOR WAR SERVICE.

The Committee on the grant of Honours, Decorations and Medals, in time of war, and a special Committee formed therefore have had under consideration proposals and directions by the Prime Minister, First Lord of the Treasury and Minister of Defence relative to recommendations for the institution of awards for service during hostilities. Certain of the Reports by the Committees have been submitted by the Prime Minister to The King and His Majesty has graciously approved the recommendations summarised in the following memorandum.

### THE AFRICA STAR AND THE 1939-43 STAR. CLASPS TO THE TWO STARS.

1. In commemoration of the expulsion of the enemy from North Africa and to recognise services rendered in operations during the first four years of the war, The King has approved the institution of two awards for the Armed Forces and the Merchant Navy, to be known as the Africa Star and the 1939–43 Star. No individual will qualify for both. Consideration of the manufacture and issue of the Stars themselves will be postponed until after the war. The ribbons are to be made now, and will be issued when supplies are ready.

### The Africa Star.

2. The Africa Star will be granted for service in North Africa from the date of the entry of Italy into the war on the 10th June, 1940, up to the date of the cessation of operations against the enemy in North Africa on the 12th May, 1943, inclusive. The ribbon is pale buff in colour, with a central vertical red stripe and two other narrower stripes, one dark blue and the other light blue. The background is intended as a symbol of the desert, the central red stripe stands for the Armies, the dark blue stripe for the Naval Forces and the Merchant Navy, and the light blue stripe for the Air Forces. The ribbon is to be worn with the dark blue stripe furthest from the left shoulder.

(a) Army.—The qualification is entry, as part of the establishment, into an operational command in North Africa. The individual should have been taken on the strength of a unit or formation. The whole of the area between the Canal and the Straits of Gibraltar is included. Service in operations in Abyssinia, Somaliland and Eritrea, and also in Malta, is a qualification. Service in West Africa is excluded.

(b) Air Force.—The qualification is landing in the area of an Army operational command as defined above, including Malta. Casual journeys and inspections, other than those specially approved, are excluded. In addition, service in the air over any of the Army operational commands in North Africa as defined above, or over enemy-occupied territory in North Africa, is a qualification, provided that the individual is not eligible for the 1939–43 Star mentioned below.

(c) Navy.—In the Navy the Africa Star will be awarded only for service on shore or in harbour in the same areas and between the same dates as the Army, and provided that the individual is not eligible for the 1939–43 Star mentioned below. 3 (d) Merchant Navy.—In the Merchant Navy the Africa Star will be

Royal Navy.

3. (a) Army.—A silver emblem in the form of an arabic "8" or "1" will be worn on the ribbon in service dress denoting the award of one of these Clasps in the Army. The awards will be restricted to service in the Eighth and First Armies respectively in the period from the 23rd October, 1942, inclusive, the date of the battle of el Alamein, up to the date of the cessation of operations against the enemy in North Africa on the 12th May, 1943. Only one Clasp will be granted to any individual.

(b) Air Force.—A Clasp, denoted by the standard silver rose emblem on the ribbon, will be awarded to air crew and non-air crew personnel of the Royal Air Force under the command of the A.O.C., Western Desert, or the Air Commander, North-West African Forces, and to air crew personnel under the command of the A.O.C., Malta, or of other A.Os.C., who operated in support of the Eighth Army or First Army or in the cutting of Rommel's or von Arnim's communications, or in the defence of Malta, during the period from the 23rd October, 1942, to the date of the cessation of hostilities in North Africa on the 12th May, 1943. (Royal Air Force personnel eligible for the 1939–43 Star, which in the Air Force will have priority of award over the Africa Star, will be granted a Clasp to the 1939–43 Star for the service referred to in this paragraph. This rose emblem also will be of the standard silver pattern.)

(c) Navy.—As has been stated above, the Africa Star will only be awarded in the Navy for service on shore or in harbour. There will be no awards of a Clasp to the Africa Star in the Navy except for personnel, if any, who served as part of the Eighth or First Armies. For these the time limits will be as for the Army, and an "8" or a "1" emblem will be issued.

(Officers and Ratings of certain units, for instance inshore squadrons and some of the escorting vessels serving off the coast of North Africa, and of submarines and other craft specifically engaged in cutting Rommel's or von Arnim's communications, from the 23rd October, 1942, to the cessation of hostilities in North Africa on the 12th May, 1943, will be awarded a Clasp to the 1939–43 Star referred to below. The rose emblem will be of the standard silver pattern.)

(d) Merchant Navy.—(As in the Royal Navy, the Clasp to the 1939–43 Star will be awarded in the Merchant Navy to the personnel of vessels which worked inshore during the North African Campaign between the 23rd October, 1942, and the 12th May, 1943.)

### The 1939-43 Star.

4. The 1939-43 Star will be granted for service in operations during the period from the 3rd September, 1939, to the 31st December, 1943. The ribbon is dark blue, red and light blue in three equal vertical stripes. The dark blue stripe is intended to mark the service of the Naval Forces and the Merchant Navy, the red stripe that of the Armies, and the light blue stripe that of the Air Forces. The ribbon is to be worn with the dark blue stripe furthest from the left shoulder.

(a) Navy.—The qualification is six months' service afloat in areas of active operations during the period from the 3rd September, 1939, to the 31st December, 1943, inclusive. Service after the 31st December, 1943, will not be reckoned.

These areas are : --

- (i) From the 3rd September, 1939, the Atlantic Ocean, including Home Waters, and the North Sea; the Baltic; the Arctic Ocean between Greenland and longitude 70°E. and that part of the Indian Ocean lying South of 15°S. and West of 55°E.
- (ii) From the 1st June, 1940, as (i) with the addition of the Pacific Ocean and the rest of the Indian Ocean.
- (iii) From the 10th June, 1940, anywhere at Sea.

Naval personnel, not eligible by length of service affoat, who served in operations and Commando Raids accepted as qualifying Army personnel for the 1939–43 Star, will be held to qualify.

Officers and Men of the Fleet Air Arm, who are not qualified by sea service, may be considered for qualification under similar rules to the R.A.F.

(b) Army.—The Army qualification will be six months in an operational command during the period the 3rd September, 1939, to the 31st December, 1943. As, however, there have been campaigns that have not covered six months, certain exceptions will be made. Where troops have been evacuated, e.g., from Dunkirk, Norway, &c., they will be eligible for the 1939–43 Star although their service in operations may have been less than six months, and specified Commando Raids will be similarly treated. The list of such exceptions is under consideration. India will not be regarded as an operational command except for the purpose of operations on the Burma and North-West frontiers. Service on passage to an operational command through dangerous waters will count towards the six months' qualifying period.

(c) Air Force.—The 1939-43 Star will be awarded to all air crews who have taken part in operations against the enemy, subject to the completion of two months in an operational unit. In addition, non-crew personnel serving in the area of an Army operational command will qualify, six months' service in the area of the operational command being the qualification, and special exception being made for those evacuated, e.g., from Dunkirk, Norway, &c., as for the Army above.

(d) Merchant Navy.—The Merchant Navy will be awarded the 1939-43 Star under the same conditions as the Royal Navy, except that six months' service at sea will qualify, provided that at least one voyage had been made through one of the specified areas of active operations. Service in the landings on or after the 8th November, 1942, on the coast of Morocco, will be a qualification.

(e) General.—Operational service for a lesser period than six and two months respectively, but brought to an end by death, wounds or other disability due to service will qualify. The grant for service in operations, of an Honour, Decoration or Mention in Despatches would in the armed forces or the Merchant Navy be a qualification for the award of the Star.

#### Clasp to the 1939-43 Star.

5. This Clasp will be denoted by a silver rose emblem, of the standard pattern, and will be confined to the Navy, the Air Force and the Merchant Navy, for North African service. The conditions will be as stated in brackets under heading 3, "Clasps to the Africa Star" above, sub-paragraphs (b), (c) and (d).

#### Allied Nationals in the British Forces.

6. Allied nationals serving as members of the British Forces (other than those enlisted or commissioned therein by virtue of their membership of Allied Forces) will be eligible for the Stars as members of such Forces, provide their services do not qualify them for similar awards from their own Governments.

### The Dominions, India, Burma and the Colonial Empire.

7. The above arrangements will also apply to the Forces and Merchant Navies of Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, India, Burma and the Colonial Empire.

### THE DESPATCHES EMBLEM, WOUND STRIPES AND CHEVRONS FOR WAR SERVICE.

8. His Majesty has also approved an Emblem to denote Mentions in Despatches and has authorised the institution of Wound Stripes and Chevrons for war service. These will be issued as soon as they are ready, but production may take some months.

#### Mentions in Despatches.

9. The Despatches Emblem is to be granted only for Mentions in Despatches awarded for service in the present war. One such Emblem only will be worn in respect of any number of Mentions in Despatches. The Emblem is in bronze of a new pattern in the form of an oak leaf and is to be worn on the coat immediately after all Medal ribbons. It has been designed by Mr. Percy Metcalfe, C.V.O. It is not intended to be worn during the war on the ribbon of any Medal or Star but is to be attached directly to the coat in the position in which a single ribbon would be worn or in the position in which a ribbon would be placed immediately after those already worn. The stalk would be worn furthest from the shoulder.

### Wound Stripes and Chevrons for War Service.

10. The Wound Stripes and Chevrons will be awarded not only in the Navy, the Army, including the Home Guard, the Air Force, the Merchant Navy and the Fishing Fleet serving at sea, Civil Air Transport and the Coast Guard, but also to N.A.A.F.I. employees in respect of service with the Forces at sea or overseas. They will also be awarded in specified Civil Defence Services, the Fire Guard, the Police and the National Fire Service, to Nurses in hospitals under the control of Government Departments or Local Authorities or in the recognised Voluntary Hospitals, and, in addition, to Lighthouse and Lightvessel keepers serving under the three general Lighthouse Authorities.

#### Wound Stripes.

11. The Wound Stripes, denoting wounds sustained in the present war, will be of narrow gold braid and one and a half inches in length. They are to be worn vertically on the left forearm. One is to be worn in respect of each occasion on which the individual is wounded. The Wound Stripe will, in the Civil Defence Services, be awarded only in respect of wounds or injuries due to enemy action, sustained on duty, and involving not less than seven consecutive days' incapacity. A Wound Stripe in red has also been approved. This is to denote wounds of previous wars, and one such stripe only will be worn in respect of any number of wounds so sustained. It will be worn to the rear of the first gold Wound Stripe.

#### onevrons for War Service.

12. The Chevrons for war service are of one pattern and will on red, the arms being three-quarters of an inch in length. The Chevrons are to be worn in uniform on the right forearm. If uniform has not been issued they will be worn on the armlet or on the coat. One Chevron is to be granted for each completed year of service in the present war. A recipient will become eligible for the first Chevron at the end of his first completed year of war service, and so on. Special regulations will be required in connection with part-time service.

#### Civil Defence Services. Nursing Services.

13. The following Civil Defence Services will be eligible for the Wound Stripe and Chevrons: Ambulance Service (including Casualty Service), Decontamination Service, First Aid Service, Messenger Service, Report and Control Service, Rescue Service, the Warden Service (including Shelter Wardens), the Nursing Service for Public Air Raid Shelters and the Civil Defence Reserve. There will also be included the Royal Observer Corps, and the Port of London Authority River Emergency Service. Civil Servants forming Departmental Civil Defence organisations will be included, if properly enrolled. Enrolled or registered Fire Guards performing duties under the Local Authorities, or at business, or Government premises, and Nurses in Hospitals for which Government Departments or Local Authorities are responsible, or in the recognised Voluntary Hospitals, will also be eligible, in addition to the Civil Nursing Reserve.

THE JFRICA STAR AND THE 1939-43 STAR, THE CLASPS TO THE TWO STARS, THE DESPATCHES EMBLEM, WOUND STRIPES AND CHEVRONS FOR WAR SERVICE.

The Committee on the grant of Honours, Decorations and Medals, in time of war, and a special Committee formed therefrom have had under consideration proposals and directions by the Prime Minister, First Lord of the Treasury and Minister of Defence relative to recommendations for the institution of awards for service during hostilities. Certain of the Reports by the Committees have been submitted by the Prime Minister to The King and His Majesty has graciously approved the recommendations summarised in the following memorandum.

> THE AFRICA STAR AND THE 1939-43 STAR. CLASPS TO THE TWO STARS.

1. In commemoration of the expulsion of the enemy from North Africa and to recognise services rendered in operations during the first four years of the war, The King has approved the institution of two awards for the Armed Forces and the Merchant Navy, to be known as the Africa Star and the 1939-43 Star. No individual will qualify for both. Consideration of the manufacture and issue of the Stars themselves will be postponed until after the war. The ribbons are to be made now, and will be issued when supplies are ready.

### THE AFRICA STAR.

2. The Africa Star will be granted for service in North Africa from the date of the entry of Italy into the war on the 10th June, 1940, up to the date of the cessation of operations against the enemy in North Africa on the 12th May, 1943, inclusive. The ribbon is pale buff in colour, with a central vertical red stripe and two other narrower stripes, one dark blue and the other light blue. The background is intended as a symbol of the desert, the central red stripe stands for the Armies, the dark blue stripe for the Naval Forces and the Merchant Navy, and the light blue stripe for the Air Forces. The ribbon is to be worn with the dark blue stripe furthest from the left shoulder.

(a) <u>Army</u>. - The qualification is entry, as part of the establishment, into an operational command in North Africa. The individual should have been taken on the strength of a unit or formation. The whole of the area between the Canal and the Straits of Gibraltar is included. Service in operations in Abyssinia, Somaliland and Eritrea, and also in Malta, is a qualification. Service in Vert Africa is excluded. (b)/

(b) <u>Air Force.</u> - The qualification is landing in the area of an Army operational command as defined above, including Malta. Casual journeys and inspections, other than those specially approved, are excluded. In addition, service in the air over any of the Army operational commands in North Africa as defined above, or over enemyoccupied territory in North Africa, is a qualification, provided that the individual is not eligible for the 1939-43 Star mentioned **aboven** below

(c) <u>Navy</u>. - In the Navy the Africa Star will be awarded only for service on shore or in harbour in the same areas and between the same dates as the Army, and provided that the individual is not eligible for the 1939-43 Star mentioned below.

(d) <u>Merchant Navy</u>. - In the Merchant Navy the Africa Star will be awarded for service on shore or in harbour under the same conditions as the Royal Navy.

3. (a) <u>Army.</u> - A silver emblem in the form of an arabic "8" or "1" will be worn on the ribbon in service dress denoting the award of one of these Clasps in the Army. 





### The 1939–45 Star, the Africa Star, the Atlantic Star, the Air Crew Europe Star, the Italy Star, the France and Germany Star, the Pacific Star, the Burma Star, and the Clasps to these Stars. The Defence Medal. Chevrons for war service

1. (i) The Committee on the grant of Honours, Decorations and Medal, in time of war have had under consideration directions by the Prime Minister, First Lord of the Treasury and Minister of Defence relating to recommendations for the institution of further Campaign Stars and a Defence Medal for service in the war, and for varying the qualifications for the award of the Stars instituted in 1943.

(ii) Recommendations for the institution of the changes and extensions set out below have been the special subject of His Majesty's attention over a long period during which The King has been advised by the Prime Minister on all matters likely to give rise to difference of opinion. The recommendations have now been duly submitted to The King, and His Majesty has graciously approved them. Consideration of the manufacture and issue of the new Stars themselves and the Defence Medal will be postponed. The ribbons, which have been devised by His Majesty, are being made now on the highest priority, and will be issued as soon as supplies are ready.

(iii) The following paragraphs should be read in conjunction with paragraph 11 which indicates the operational service required before individuals can qualify or begin to qualify for one of the new Stars and the manner in which service is to be reckoued. A principle of this scheme is that there should be complete equality of treatment as between the Services with regard to the maximum number of Stars, and Clasps in lieu of Stars, which may be earned by any individual.

#### The 1939-45 Star

2. (i) Approval has been granted for the prolongation of the currency of the 1939-43 Star to the 8th May, 1945, the date of the end of netive hostilities in Europe. The question of the possible prolongation of the currency of the 1939-45 Star to the end of active hostilities in the Pacific will be a matter for consideration. Meanwhile the temporary use for this distinction of the description 1939-45 Star has been authorised. The requirement that the Africa Star and this Star should not be awarded to the same individual is withdrawn. Those who have already earned the Africa Star qualify for the 1939-45 Star in addition after completing the required period of six months operational service or two months air crew operational service, as the case may be, in that, or any other, operational theatre. The conditions of award will otherwise remain as at present except for the changes referred to in the following paragraphs.

(ii) Those who have already been awarded the 1939-45 Star for service of less than six months in operations in areas and within dates covered by the

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в 2

new Stars, e.g., in Sicily or Malaya, will be required to complete an aggregate of six or two months operational service in any theatre or theatres before becoming eligible for any further Star. Similarly, those who have not already earned the 1939-45 Star would be required to qualify for it by six or two months operational service respectively before becoming eligible for one of the new Stars. (See also paragraph 11 (ii).)

(iii) Special grants of the 1939-45 Star may be made. Selection will be guided by the principle of responsibility for operational decisions. Senior Officers such as the Chiefs of Staff, Commanders-in-Chief, and commanders thus qualified may be awarded the Star. This system will apply only to the 1939-45 Star.

#### Clasp to the 1939-45 Star

3. A Clasp to the 1939-45 Star has been instituted for air crew of fighter aircraft engaged in the Battle of Britain between the 1st July and the 31st October, 1940, and the award of this is to be denoted by a gilt rose Emblem when the ribbon alone is worn.

#### The Africa Star

4. This, as stated above, will now be granted in addition to the 1939-45 Star, to those who have qualified for both Stars. For the award of the Africa Star it is not imperative that the 1939-45 Star should already have been earned. Naval and Merchant Navy service anywhere at sea in the Mediterranean between the 10th June, 1940, and the 12th May, 1943, will now qualify for the Africa Star. The Clasp and silver rose Emblem for North Africa previously awarded with the 1939-43 Star in the Navy and the Air Force and the Merchant Navy for specified service in the African campaign after the 23rd October, 1942, will now be transferred to the Africa Star.

#### The Atlantic Star

5. (i) The institution of a new Atlantic Star has been approved. This is intended to commemorate the Battle of the Atlantic and is designed primarily for Convoys and their Escorts and Anti-Submarine forces, as well as for fast Merchant ships that sailed alone. The Atlantic Star is to be granted for six months service afloat, in the Navy, in the Atlantic and Home waters, since the 3rd September, 1939, and until the 8th May, 1945, the date of the end of active hostilities in Europe and the Atlantic.

(ii) The ribbon is blue, white and sea green, shaded and watered, the design being intended as a symbol of service in the Atlantic. The ribbon is to be worn with the blue edge furthest from the left shoulder.

(iii) The 1939-45 Star must be earned by six, or for air crew, two, months service in operations before a candidate can begin to qualify for the Atlantic Star.

(iv) Service with Convoys to North Russia and service in the South Atlantic west of longitude 20° E. will be included. Naval service from the 6th June, 1944, to 8th May, 1945, within the defined qualifying sea area for the France and Germany Star will not be counted towards the qualifying period for the Atlantic Star. The Merchant Navy will be awarded the Atlantic Star under the same conditions as the Navy except that six months service anywhere at sea will qualify, provided that one or more voyages have been made in the defined area. Service in fishing vessels working on or near the coast and in certain coastal craft is excluded as this will be recognised by the award of the 1939-45 Star. (v) Air Crew of the Royal Air Force will be eligible if they have taken part in operations against the enemy at sea within the areas and between the dates qualifying Naval personnel for the Atlantic Star, subject to the completion of two months service in an operational unit. Army and Air Force personnel serving in His Majesty's ships or in defensively equipped Merchant ships will qualify under rules similar to those for the Navy or Merchant Navy.

(vi) Service for the Atlantic Star brought to an end by death, wounds or other disability due to service, or marked by an award or mention in despatches, will qualify although it may not have amounted to six or two months as the case may be.

(vii) A candidate who qualifies for the Atlantic Star, the France and Germany Star and the Air Crew Europe Star mentioned below, or two of these, will be awarded only the Star first earned. A Clasp will be awarded with it denoting that the service which would have qualified for the second Star earned has been rendered. A silver rose Emblem will be worn to denote the award of the France and Germany, Atlantic or Air Crew Europe Clasp as the case may be.

#### The Air Crew Europe Star

6. (i) The institution of an Air Crew Europe Star has been approved. This is intended as an award for operational flying from United Kingdom bases over Europe (including the United Kingdom) since the 3rd September, 1939, and up to the 5th June, 1944. The time qualification will be two months service in air crew so employed. Air crew service in operations at sea will not be a qualification for the Air Crew Europe Star.

(ii) The ribbon is light blue with black edges, and there is in addition a narrow yellow stripe on either side. The design is symbolic of the continuous service of the Air Forces by night and day.

(iii) The 1939–45 Star must be earned by six, or for air crew, two, months service in operations before a candidate can begin to qualify for the Air Crew Europe Star.

(iv) Service for the Air Crew Europe Star brought to an end by death, wounds or other disability due to service, or marked by an award or mention in despatches, will qualify although it may not have amounted to two months.

(v) A candidate who qualifies for the Air Crew Europe Star, the Atlantic Star and the France and Germany Star mentioned below, or two of these, will be awarded only the Star first earned. A Clasp will be awarded with it denoting that the service which would have qualified for the second Star earned has been rendered. A silver rose Emblem will be worn to denote the award of the Atlantic, France and Germany, or Air Crew Europe Clasp as the case may be.

#### The Italy Star

7. (i) The institution of an Italy Star has been approved for entry into operational service on land in Sicily or in Italy at any time during the campaign there from the capture of Pantellaria on the 11th June, 1943, and until the 8th May, 1945, the date of the end of active hostilities in Europe.

(ii) The ribbon is in the Italian colours, green, white and red. There are five vertical stripes of equal width, one in red at either edge and one in green at the centre, the two intervening stripes being in white.

(iii) The 1939-45 Star must be earned by six, or for air crew, two, months service in operations before a candidate can qualify for the Italy Star

(iv) Operational service in the Mediterranean theatre, for instance in the Ægean and Dodecanese. Corsica, Greece, Sardinia and Yugoslavia after the 11th June, 1943, will be a qualification. Operational service in Elba will be a qualification. Service in Sicily after the 17th August, 1943, in Sardinia after the 19th September, 1943, and Corsica after the 4th October, 1943, will not be a qualification.

(v) Naval or Merchant Navy service at sea in the Mediterranean during this period will be a qualification provided it was directly connected with active operations in the Mediterranean theatre, including those in the Ægean and the South of France.

(vi) Air crew service in operations against the enemy, within the Mediterranean theatre, will be a qualification, including sorties from the Mediterranean area over Europe.

(vii) For Naval personnel on duty ashore and non-air crew personnel of the Air Force, entry into the prescribed areas of land operations will be a qualification.

(viii) The Star will be awarded to those who have earned it whatever other Campaign Stars may be granted in addition for services in the present war

#### The France and Germany Star

8. (i) This Star has been instituted for entry into operational service on land from the 6th June, 1944, in France, Belgium, Holland or Germany, until the 8th May, 1945, the date of the end of active hostilities in Europe.

(ii) The ribbon is in the red, white and blue of the Union Flag, and these colours are also used as a symbol of France and the Netherlands. There are five vertical stripes of equal width, one in blue at either edge and one in red at the centre, the two intervening stripes being in white.

(iii) The 1939-45 Star must be earned by six, or for air crew, two, months service in operations before a candidate can qualify for the France and Germany Star.

. (iv) Naval and Merchant Navy service afloat in the North Sea south of a line from the Firth of Forth to Kristiansand (South), in the English Channel or the Bay of Biscay east of longitude 6° W. will be a qualification, provided such service was directly in support of land operations in France, Belgium, Holland, Germany, &c.

(v) Naval and Merchant Navy service afloat in the Mediterranean in support of operations in the South of France will not be a qualification. Such service will qualify for the Italy Star.

(vi) Air crew service in operations against the enemy over Europe from the 6th June, 1944, to the 8th May, 1945, will qualify. Air crew service qualifying for the Atlantic Star will not qualify for this Star. Sorties from the Mediterranean area over Europe will not be a qualification as such service will be a qualification for the Italy Star.

(vii) For Naval personnel on duty ashore and non-air crew personnel of the Air Force, entry into the prescribed areas of land operations will be a qualification.

(viii) The Star will not be awarded in addition to the Atlantic Star or the Air Crew Europe Star. If a candidate should qualify for these three Stars or two of them, the Star first earned will be awarded. If the France and Germany Star is awarded under these conditions a Clasp will be awarded for service which would qualify for the Atlantic Star. A silver rose Emblem will be worn to denote the award of this Clasp.

#### The Pacific Star

9. (i) A Pacific Star has been instituted for entry into operational service in the Pacific theatre from the Sth December, 1941, until further notice (ii) The ribbon is dark green with red edges and with a central yellow stripe. There are also two other narrow stripes, one dark blue and the other light blue. The green and yellow stand for the forests and the beaches of the Pacific, the red edges for the Armies, the dark blue stripe for the Naval Forces and the Merchant Navies, and the light blue stripe for the Air Forces The ribbon is to be worn with the dark blue stripe furthest from the left shoulder.

(iii) The 1939-45 Star must be earned by six, or for air crew, two, months service in operations before a candidate can qualify for the Pacific Star.

(iv) Naval and Merchant Navy service in the Pacific Ocean, including the South China Sea, and the Indian Ocean east of a line running due south from Singapore round the south-east coast of Sumatra, through Christmas Island, and southwards along the Meridian of 110° E., will be a qualification. Qualifying service on land will be restricted to operational service in territories in which there have been enemy or Allied invasions, i.e., Hong Kong, the 8th December, 1941, to the 25th December, 1941; Malaya, the Sth December, 1941, to the 15th February, 1942; Nauru, the Sth December. 1941, to the 1st March, 1942; Ocean Island, the 8th December, 1941, to the 26th August, 1942; Gilbert and Ellice Islands, the 10th December, 1941, until a future date to be notified; Borneo and Sarawak, the 17th December, 1941, to the 31st January, 1942; Celebes, the 10th January, 1942, to the 26th February, 1942; Bismarck Archipelago, the 22nd January, 1942, to the 24th January, 1942, and the 15th December, 1943, until a future date to be notified; Molucca Islands, the 30th January, 1942, to the 26th February, 1942; Solomon Islands (British Solomon Islands Protectorate and Australian Mandated Territory), the 1st February, 1942, until a future date to be notified; Sumatra, the 14th February, 1942, to the 23rd March, 1942; Timor, the 20th February, 1942, to the 31st March, 1942; Java, the 27th February, 1942, to the 9th March, 1942; New Guinea, the 7th March, 1942, until a future date to be notified. Service in Burma is excluded.

(v) The following islands may be mentioned as among those, service in which will not qualify for the Star in any respect: Norfolk Island, New Caledonia, New Hebrides, Fiji Islands, Tonga Islands, Phœnix Islands, Fanning Island.

(vi) Air crew service in operations against the enemy will qualify.

(vii) For Naval personnel on duty ashore and non-air crew personnel of the Air Force, entry into the prescribed area of land operations will be a qualification.

(viii) A candidate who qualifies for both the Pacific and the Burma Star mentioned below will be awarded only one of these, the Star first earned. A Clasp will be awarded with it denoting that service which would have qualified for the other Star has been rendered. A silver rose Emblem will be worn to denote the award of the Burma or Pacific Clasp as the case may be.

#### The Burma Star

10. (i) A Burma Star has been instituted for entry into operational service in the Burma campaign from the 11th December, 1941, until further notice.

(ii) The ribbon is dark blue with a central red stripe, and in addition two orange stripes. The red stands for the British Commonwealth Forces, and the orange for the sun, and these are placed on a contrasting background of dark blue.

(iii) The 1939-45 Star must be earned by six, or for air crew, two, months service in operations before a candidate can qualify for the Burma Star.

(iv) The qualifying area for land operations will be service in Burma. In addition service on land from the 1st May, 1942, to the 31st December, 1943, in the provinces of Bengal and Assam and from the 1st January, 1944, until further notice, in those parts of Bengal or Assam east of the Brahmaputra, will qualify. Service in Malaya and Sumatra subsequent to the 1st November, 1943, will be a qualification for the Burma rather than the Pacific Star.

(v) Naval and Merchant Navy service will be restricted to service in the Bay of Bengal enclosed by a line running from the southernmost point of Ceylon for a distance of 300 miles south, thence to a point 300 miles west of the southernmost point of Sumatra, and continuing east to the western side of Sunda Strait. The Malacca Strait is included.

(vi) Air crew service in operations against the enemy will qualify.

(vii) For Naval personnel ashore and non-air crew personnel of the Air Force, entry into the prescribed area of land operations will be a qualification.

(viii) A candidate who qualifies for both the Burma Star and the Pacific Star mentioned above will be awarded only one of these, the Star first earned. A Clasp will be awarded with it denoting that service which would have qualified for the other Star has been rendered. A silver rose Emblem will be worn to denote the award of the Pacific or Burma Clasp as the case may be.

#### Campaign Stars and Clasps. General

#### 11. (i) Entry into operational service

(a) Service in ships making occasional visits to the defined areas for fuelling and so forth will not necessarily be a qualification.

(b) The expression "entry into operational service" in the case of the new Stars is subject to the qualification that six or two months operational service must already have been rendered. Qualifying service for any one of the new Stars may not run concurrently with service qualifying for, and preceding the date on which a candidate qualifies for the award of the 1939-45 Star.

#### (ii) Previous operational service of less than six or two months

(a) A recipient of the 1939-45 Star who has qualified for it by less than six or two months service respectively must complete the period of six or two months, as the case may be, before he can qualify or, in the case of the Atlantic or Air Crew Europe Stars, begin to qualify for one of the new Stars.

(b) Those to whom grants of the 1939-45 Star have been, or will be made, as a result of the participation in a campaign on the special list, service in which qualifies in itself for the award (House of Commons Official Report, the 22nd March, 1944, column 881), will not qualify, or begin to qualify, for one of the new Stars until the completion of six or two months operational service, as the case may be.

(c) Operational service for a lesser period than six or two months respectively, but brought to an end by death, wounds or other disability due to service, or alternatively the grant for service in operations of an Honour, Decoration, Mention in Despatches, Commendation for brave conduct or Commendation for valuable service in the air, would in the armed Forces or the Merchant Navy, be a qualification for the award of the new Star appropriate to the theatre, without regard to any six or two months service requirement, but subject to the general restrictions relating to alternative awards of the Stars.

(d) Awards made under the conditions described in sub-paragraph (c) above will be additional to any award of the 1939-45 Star.

#### (iii) Exclusion of time spent as prisoner of war

(a) Although time spent as a prisoner of war in consequence of capture in operations may be counted towards the qualifying period for the 1939-45 Star, such time will not be counted towards the period of six or two months operational service which must be completed before the grant of one of the new Stars may be authorised.

(b) An individual who, at the time of his capture, has completed the six or two months operational service required for the award of the 1939-45 Star may, however, count time spent as a prisoner of war towards the period of six or two months service required for the award of the Atlantic Star or the Air Crew Europe Star. The candidate must have begun to earn one of these Stars and, in the case of the Merchant Navy, one or more voyages must have been made in the "defined area" after completion of service required for the award of the 1939-45 Star.

#### (iv) Award of a second or further new Star

(a) Service qualifying for one of the new Stars cannot run concurrently with service qualifying for another of the new Stars.

(b) An individual, however, who has once completed the six or two months operational service required for the award of the 1939–45 Star and has been awarded one of the new Stars will not be required to complete this period of qualifying service a second time in order to qualify, or in the case of the Atlantic Star and Air Crew Europe Star in order to begin to qualify, for a further new Star.

#### (v) Award of Clasps

No individual will be awarded more than one Clasp to any one of the Stars.

#### (vi) Civil Air Transport

Consideration will be given to the production of a scheme for the award of the new Stars in certain conditions, for those civilian crews who have flown into or through theatres of war or over dangerous waters. Air crew of Royal Air Force Transport Command engaged in similar duties will also be considered.

#### (vii) The last six months

In the case of persons in operational service on the 8th May, 1945, that is to say, at the end of active hostilities in Europe, the Italy and France and Germany Stars will be granted by virtue of entry into a theatre of operations, and the prior six or two months service requirement will not apply. A similar waiving of the prior service requirement will extend to the Atlantic and Air Crew Europe Stars. The actual service requirement for the Atlantic Star will also be reduced to entry into operational service, and a similar provision will apply to air crew in relation to the Air Crew Europe Star. The 1939-45 Star will not be awarded in any of these cases in which operational service amounts to less than six or two months respectively.

#### The Defence Medal

12. (i) The institution of a Defence Medal has been approved. This is to be granted (a) for service with Forces in non-operational areas subjected to air attack, or closely threatened, (b) for non-operational service with the Forces overseas from, or outside, the country of residence, (c) for Civil

Defence or other specified civilian service in military operational areas, and (d) for Civil Defence service in non-operational areas subjected to air attack, or closely threatened. The time qualification will be three years for (a), (c) and (d) except for Mine and Bomb Disposal units of the Forces in (a), for which the period will be three months. For (b) the time qualification will be one year.

(ii) The centre of the ribbon is flame-coloured, and the edges are green, symbols of the enemy attacks on our green and pleasant land. Two black stripes represent the black-out.

(iii) Those qualified for any one of the Campaign Stars may be granted this award in addition, and subsequent award of one of the Campaign Stars will not supersede a previous grant of the Defence Medal. Military or Civil Defence service in the territory of residence. neither subjected to air attack nor closely threatened will not be a qualification for this Medal

#### (iv) Service in the Forces

(a) All members of the Forces who have served in the United Kingdom during the war will be eligible for the Defence Medal. Personnel of the Anti-Aircraft Command and all Royal Air Force personnel other than operational air crew will, for example, be included. Members of Dominion Forces who have served in the United Kingdom will be eligible. The United Kingdom Home Guard will also be included.

(b) It is the intention, for example, that service by United Kingdom Forces in West Africa, Palestine or India, as well as service by Dominion Forces in non-operational areas outside their own countries, should also be a qualification.

(c) The part-time service of the Malta Home Guard will be specially recognised by the grant of the Defence Medal.

#### (v) Civil Defence, &c., service

(a) Members of civilian services in the United Kingdom eligible for Chevrons for war service will be eligible for the Defence Medal. A list of most of the categories which will be included is given in the Appendix.

(b) Part time, as well as whole time, civilian service of the kind described in sub-paragraph (a) above will be a qualification. Any period since the 3rd September, 1939, during which the enrolled member was (i) available for duty up to the standard required from time to time, and (ii) performed such duty as and when required, will be reckoned towards the period of three years qualifying service.

(c) It is the intention that Civil Defence service in unilitary operational areas subjected to enemy air attack should be included on a similar basis. Civil Defence services in Gibraltar and Malta and in other territories in the Colonial Empire, which qualify for Chevrons for war service, will also be eligible. Civil Defence service in, for instance, West Africa or the West Indies will not be a qualification.

#### (vi) Time qualification

Service will be counted from the 3rd September, 1939, to the Sth May, 1945, or to the stand-down of the organisation if earlier. United Kingdom Home Guard service, for instance, will be reckoned from June, 1940, to the

stand-down in November, 1944, and Civil Defence service will be counted up to the Sth May, 1945, or whatever date is fixed for the cessation of service in particular cases. Service in the various eligible categories may be aggregated. Time overseas in non-operational areas amounting to less than a year will be added at its actual time value to service of less than three years at home, that is to say, it would not be multiplied by three.

#### (vii) Time qualification in the Colonial Empire

Where in certain cases in the Colonial Empire in territories which have been subjected to aerial bombardment or closely threatened, a three-year qualification cannot be adopted without excluding the full or part-time local military Forces and the Civil Defence organisation, it will be necessary to seek approval for special time qualifications.

#### (viii) Special awards

(a) Service in eligible categories brought to an end before the period of three years or twelve or three months service has been completed, either by death due to enemy action when on duty, or by injuries entitling the candidate to a Wound Stripe, will be a qualification for the grant of the Defence Medal.

(b) The Defence Medal will also be granted, without regard to the three year or twelve or three months service requirement, to those British subjects who may have received an award or Commendation for brave conduct or Commendation for valuable service in the air, provided that the recipient, when the award or Commendation was earned, was serving in a category cligible for the Defence Medal and that the distinction was granted in respect of service qualifying for the Defence Medal.

(c) It will be noticed that, for obvious reasons, the above definition excludes those granted the George Cross or George Medal for actions in service qualifying for Campaign Stars or for actions in territories neither subjected to air attack nor closely threatened.

(d) There are a few other recipients of the George Cross or the George Medal not in any of the categories mentioned in the preceding subparagraphs (b) and (c), mainly those granted these awards for gallantry in Civil Defence, who were not in a service which would qualify them for the Defence Medal. These also will be eligible specially for the Defence Medal. This arrangement will not apply to holders of awards other than the George Cross and the George Medal.

#### (ix) Claims

It will not be practicable for Departments to certify awards untit application has been made and the prescribed form has been submitted and examined. Further information will be issued on this point by the various Departments. A candidate with qualifying time in more than one Service will submit a certificate from the appropriate authorities in respect of his earlier service.

#### (x) Closing date. Continuance in the Pacific

(a) The closing date of the qualifying period for the Defence Medal in respect of service in the Forces will be that on which active hostilities ended in Europe, that is to say, the 8th May, 1945, except that service in the Forces overseas from, or outside, the country of residence, will continue to be reckoned until the end of active hostilities in the Pacific.

(b) Service by local military Forces or Civil Defence Organisations in non-operational areas in territories in the Pacific area classified as qualifying by reason of aerial bombardment or because they have been closely threatened will continue to be reckoned towards the award of the Defence Medal during the interval between the end of active hostilities in Europe and the end of active hostilities in the Pacific.

#### Interpretation

13. Any questions of difficulty in connection with the scheme, including interpretation and so forth, will be a matter for reference to the Committee on the grant of Honours, Decorations and Medals in time of war and in relation to the Stars the practice adopted for the 1939-45 and Africa Stars will be followed as far as may be possible.

#### The Dominions, India, Southern Rhodesia, Burma and the Colonial Empire

14. The above arrangements in relation to Campaign Stars and Clasps will also apply to the Forces and Merchant Navies of India, Southern Rhodesia, Burma and the Colonial Empire. The Defence Medal will also be granted in these Forces for services of the kind described in paragraph 12 above. The arrangements have been generally agreed in discussion with Dominion Governments, though certain questions of detail remain to be settled. It is the intention that Civil Defence services in areas in the British Commonwealth, in addition to the United Kingdom, subjected to air attack or closely threatened, should also be considered for recognition by the grant of the Defence Medal.

#### Analysis

15. (i) The main features of the scheme may be set out in tabular form as follows, the awards being shown in the order in which they will be worn:

No individual will be awarded more than one Clasp to any one Campaign Star, and no one will be able to wear more than one Emblem on any one of the Star ribbons, when the ribbon only is worn.

#### **Chevrons for War Service**

16. Following are the arrangements relating to the continuance of the service qualification for Chevrons for war service. In the Navy, Army, Air Force and Merchant Navy, anywhere, full time service after the Sth May, 1945, the date of the end of active hostilities in Europe and up to the end of active hostilities in the Pacific will continue to be a qualification for Chevrons. In Civil Defence services Chevrons will no longer be earned after the 8th May, 1945, except in the Pacific area. There, such service in territories subjected to aerial bombardment or closely threatened will continue to qualify for Chevrons. Part-time military service in the Pacific, but not elsewhere, will continue to be reckoned towards the award of Chevrons until the end of active hostilities in the Pacific area. In some instances, part-time service in the Forces or Civil Defence service will cease to qualify before the 8th May, 1945. This has been the case in, for instance, the United Kingdom Home Guard.

#### APPENDIX

The following civilian services in the United Kingdom eligible for Chevrons for war service are among the categories eligible for the Defence Medal :--

(a) Civil Defence services established by a Government Department or Local Authority-

> Wardens Service (including Shelter Wardens). Rescue Service (including former First-Aid Party Service), Decontamination Service. Report and Control Service. Messenger Service. Ambulance Service (including Sitting Case Cars). First-Aid Service (including First-Aid Posts and Points, Public Cleansing Centres, Mobile Cleansing Units and the Nursing Service for public air-raid shelters).

(b) Local Authority Civil Defence Services-

Rest Centre Service. Emergency Food Service (including Queen's Messenger Convoy Service). Canteen Service. Emergency Information Service. Mortuary Service.

- (c) National Fire Service (including service in a local authority Fire Brigade or the Auxiliary Fire Service prior to nationalisation)
- (d) Police, Royal Marine Police Special Reserve, Admiralty Civil Police, War Department Constabulary, Air Ministry Constabulary, Railway and Dock Police
- (e) American Ambulance, Great Britain.
- (f) Civil Air Transport.
- (g) Civil Defence Reserve, Kent County Civil Defence Mobile Reserve and West Sussex County Civil Defence Mobile Reserve.
- (h) Civil Nursing Reserve.
- (i) Civilian Technical Corps.
- (i) Coast Guard.
- (k) Fire Guards performing duties under the local authorities, or at Government or business premises.
- (1) Lighthouse keepers serving under the three Lighthouse authorities, and keepers of Light-Vessels under those authorities, who do not qualify for the 1939-45 Star.
- (m) Nurses in hospitals for which Government Departments or local authorities are responsible, or in the recognised Voluntary hospitals.
- (n) Port of London Authority River Emergency Service. Clyde River Patrol.
- (o) Royal Observer Corps.
- (p) Women's Voluntary Services for Civil Defence. (Members of the W.V.S may qualify if (a) they are enrolled in an eligible local authority Civil Defence Service, (b) they perform duties analogous to those of one of the eligible local authority Civil Defence Services and the section of the W.V.S. to which they belong is one which functions operationally during or immediately after enemy attacks.)

# CAMPAIGN STARS AND CLASPS

### **QUALIFICATIONS FOR** MERCHANT NAVY

The qualifications for the award of campaign stars and clasps for service in the Merchant Navy are set out in a Ministry of War Transport Notice (No. M.279), addressed to masters, officers, and saman of marchant ching

(No. M.279), addressed to masters, officers, and seamen of merchant ships. For the award of the 1939-45 Star in the Merchant Navy the qualification is six months' service at sea—anywhere at sea from June 10, 1940, onwards, or if, before that date, at least one voyage was made through one of the specified danger zones. Failing six months' service, the Star will be awarded only for:— (1) Service in a vessel which note near in the mercura

(1) Service in a vessel which took part in the evacua-tion of Dunkirk: (2) sea service ended by death, injury, or other service disability, provided one voyage was made through a danger zone; or (3) service in dangerous waters which wron an honour, decoration, mention in dispatches, or commendation for brave conduct.

Hitherto no seaman has been awarded the Africa Star if he had also earned the 1939-45 Star, but it will now be granted in addition to the 1939-45 Star to those who have qualified for both

Star, but it will now be granted in addition to the 1939-45 Star to those who have qualified for both. The qualification for the Africa Star in the Merchant Navy is service anywhere at sea in the Mediterranean, irrespective of the length of that service, between the entry of Italy into the war (June 10, 1940) and the cessation of operations against the enemy in North Africa (May 12, 1943). The clasp to the Africa Star will be granted for service in vessels engaged in landing troops, equipment, and stores between el Alamein and the Straits of Gib-raltar during the North Africa campaign from the Battle of el Alamein (October 23, 1942) to May 12, 1943. Service in ships which took part in the landings on the Moroccan coast from November 8, 1942, onwards will also qualify for either the Africa Star or its clasp. The earning of the 1939-45 Star by six months' service at sea is a prerequisite for the Advant of other campaign stars in the Merchant Navy, with the single exception that the Africa Star may he awarded without the 1939-45 Star having been earned. For the Atlantic Star the general qualification is a further six months' service anywhere at sea, with one or more voyages during this second six months in the following area: — The Atlantic and home waters, including service in foca costat craft is excluded. **THE ITALY STAR** 

#### THE ITALY STAR

THE ITALY STAR The Italy Star will be awarded for service at sea in the Mediterrancan directly connected with active operations in that theatre, including those in the Aegean and the south of France. Service in Merchant Navy vessels taking troops and stores into Continental waters in direct support of land operations in France, Belgium, Holland, Germany, &c., earns the France and Germany Star. Those who qualify for the Atlantic Star and the France and Germany Star will be awarded only the star first carned, with a clasp representing the other. In the same way, members of the Merchant Navy who qualify for the Pacific Star and the Burma Star will be awarded only the star first earned, a clasp being awarded in place of the other. For the Pacific Star the special qualification is service from Decem-ber 8. 1941, onwards, irrespective of its duration, in an area defined thus:—







## **BRITISH REVERSES** IN 1942

## **MR. CHURCHILL'S** SURVEY

#### A GRIM RECITAL

What Mr. Churchill described as a "dark panorama of ruin" was submitted by him to the House of Commons in secret session on April 23, 1942, when members were given a grim recital of reverses to our arms. The text of that speech is released for publication to-day.

The closing phrases were prophetic: " As the war rises remorselessly to its climax, the House of Commons, which is the foundation of the British life struggle, this House of Commons which has especial responsibilities, will have the opportunity once again of proving to the world that the firmness of spirit, sense of

to the world that the firmness of spirit, sense of proportion, steadfastness of purpose which have gained it renown in former days, will now once again carry great peoples and a greater cause to a victorious deliverance." The then Prime Minister began with the admission that we were at the time outnum-bered by the sea, land, and air forces of Japan throughout the Far Eastern theatre. "The violence, fury, skill, and might of Japan has far exceeded anything that we had been led to expect," he said. In spite of results up to date, he remained convinced that the broad strategic dispositions which we made of our forces were the best in our power.

#### NAVAL LOSSES

Mr. Churchill recounted the "series of un-exampled losses" which had fallen upon the Royal Navy. The sinking of the Ark Royal by a single torpedo he described as " a feature

Noyal Navy. The sinking of the Ark Royal by a single torpedo he described as "a feature most disquieting to our naval constructors." The Prince of Wales and the Repulse were sent to Singapore on December 2, 1941, as a last-chance deterrent to the war party in Japan; afterwards they were to "vanish as soon as possible into the blue." Their sinking led to the position that "from San Francisco to Aden or Capetown, distances of 14,000 miles, there was no surface fleet capable of fighting a general action with the navy of Japan." Mr. Churchill told the House that "a further sinsiter stroke was to come." On Decem-ber 19, 1941, half a dozen Italians in unusual diving suits were captured in Alexandria har-bour, in spite of precautions against human torpedoes or one-man submarines, including under-water charges exploded at frequent irre-gular intervals in the fairway. "Four hours atter explosions occurred in the bottoms of the Valiant and Queen Elizabeth, produced by limpet bombs fixed with extraordinary courage and ingenuity, the effect of which was to blow large holes in the bottoms of both ships and to flood several compartments, thus putting them both out of action for many months.; Thus we had no longer any battle squadron in the Mediterranean."

According to all paper calculations, " there was no reason why a large German and Italian army should not have been ferried across to invade not merely Libya or Palestine or Syria, but Egypt itself." The sea defence of the Nile valley was confined to submarine and destroyer flotillas, with a few cruisers and shore-based air forces.

## **GERMAN SHIPS' ESCAPE**

This necessitated the transfer of part of our shore-based torpedo-carrying aircraft from the south and south-east coasts of england, where they were soon to be needed, to the North African shore. That "need" was the escape of the Scharnhorst and Gneisenau from Brest. FUTURE AIR POWER The House was told the full story of the Japanese attack in the Bay of Bengal. Admiral Somerville was in command of the Eastern Fleet, and the Admiralty did not interfere at all in his dispositions. "When they put one of their best admirals in charge of a fleet and a theatre, they do not stand over him with a stick jogging his elbow." If we were anxious about the sea, the enemy must be anxious about the air, said Mr. Churchill, with the great flood of American reinforcements soon to give us superiority in number. Of the then impending renewal of the struggle between Germany and Russia, he declared, "With all its power and organiza-tion, it is a haggard Germany that Hitler leads into this new ferocious and sanguinary cam-paign." Commenting on the immense under-takings which we had made to Stalin. Mr. Churchill read to the House a message received from President Roosevelt carly that Morning regarding a combined British and American invasion of Europe in which he shaid: "I believe this move will be very dis-heartening to Hitler and may well be the wedge by which his downfall will be accomplished. ... While our mutual difficulties are many, I am frank to say that I feel better about the war than at any time in the past two years."



### AN APPENDIX CONTAINING A SUMMARY OF THE CONDITIONS OF AWARD OF THE CAMPAIGN STARS, THE DEFENCE MEDAL, THE WAR MEDAL AND THE INDIA SERVICE MEDAL.

1. (i) The Committee on the grant of Honours, Decorations and Medals have had under consideration the proposed institution of a War Medal and an India Service Medal, the amendment of the time qualifications for the Campaign Stars and the Defence Medal, and questions relating to Emblems denoting Mentions in Despatches and King's Commendations.

(ii) Their recommendations have been duly submitted to The King, who has given the matter special attention, and has been advised by the Prime Minister on all matters likely to give rise to difference of opinion. His Majesty has now graciously approved the recommendations set out below. The manufacture and issue of the new Medals themselves will be undertaken when circumstances permit. The ribbons will be issued as soon as supplies are ready.

#### The War Medal, 1939-45

2. (i) Approval has been given for the institution of a War Medal. This is to be granted to full-time personnel of the armed Forces wherever their service during the war has been rendered. A 28-day qualification will be adopted. Operational and non-operational service will qualify. In the Merchant Navy it will be a requirement that the 28 days should have been served at sea.

(ii) The ribbon is in the red, white and blue of the Union Flag. There is a narrow central red stripe with a narrow white stripe on either side. There are broad red stripes at either edge, the two intervening stripes being in blue.

(iii) Service between the 3rd September, 1939, and the 2nd September, 1945, inclusive will qualify wherever rendered.

(iv) The War Medal will be granted in addition to the Campaign Stars and the Defence Medal, if earned.

(v) Operational service brought to an end by death, wounds or other disability attributable to service, capture by the enemy, or the cessation of hostilities on the 2nd September, 1945, will qualify a recipient of one of the Campaign Stars for the award of the War Medal even though the service may not amount to 28 days in all. This concession will not apply to an individual who does not qualify for a Campaign Star. When service

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was ended by capture by the enemy it will be a condition that there should have been freedom from blame. When the 1939-45 Star or one of the other Campaign Stars has been awarded for operational service of less than 28 days, the War Medal will be granted in addition.

#### Civilians

(vi) The few approved categories of civilians who qualify for Campaign Stars, for instance, (a) full-time uniformed civilians serving in army operational areas under the Council of Voluntary War Work, (b) recognised uniformed Press Correspondents serving in army operational commands or in Naval or R.A.F. Establishments in the area thereof, (c) air crew of civil air transport who have flown on specified routes into theatres of war, or (d) R.A.F. Education, Works, Meteorological and similarly classified Officers serving in uniform in the area of army operational commands overseas, will be eligible for the War Medal in addition to the Campaign Stars.

(vii) Categories of civilians, similar to those described in (a) and (b), who served in the United Kingdom only and thus qualified for neither Campaign Stars nor the Defence Medal, and such categories as air crew of civil air transport and R.A.F. Education Officers who served in the United Kingdom only and qualify for the Defence Medal, will not qualify for the War Medal.

(viii) Civil categories similar to those described in (a), (b), (c) and (l) who served outside the country of residence in non-operational areas will not qualify for the War Medal unless such service outside the country of residence was rendered in a territory subjected to enemy air attack or closely threatened.

#### The India Service Medal, 1939-45

3. (i) The great size of India, the diversity of her races and the considerable movement of Forces there, have resulted in conditions of exceptional discomfort and hardship for the majority of Indian troops during the war. Approval has been given for the institution of an India Service Medal for three years non-operational service in the Indian Forces in India or elsewhere between the 3rd September, 1939, and the 2nd September, 1945. This will not be given to anyone qualifying for the Defence Medal. It will be granted in addition to the War Medal and the Campaign Stars.

(ii) The ribbon is in the blue colours of the Order of the Star of India and the Order of the Indian Empire. There is a narrow central light blue stripe with a narrow dark blue stripe on either side. There are broad dark blue stripes at either edge, the two intervening stripes being in light blue.

#### Changes in Time Qualifications for the Campaign Stars

4. When the present rules were drawn up, the war continued both in Europe and the Pacific and no one could tell for how long it would last. It was then necessary to see that the various Stars were not debased by the institution of a scheme on too lavish a scale which might have cheapened them unduly, especially if the war had continued for a considerable time. The whole matter has now been examined in retrospect, and it is evident that in relation to service on land and in the air the requirement that, for the award of the other Stars, the 1939-45 Star must first be earned by six or two months previous operational service, has produced a number of hard cases. The fact that per contra there is a one day rule for the Africa Star has also given rise to some noticeable inequalities of treatment as between the earning of this Star and of the others. The following changes have therefore been approved.

5. (i) Service on land

(a) The time qualification for these Stars is at present six months and one day, that is to say, the 1939-45 Star must be carned by six months service before any of these four Stars may be awarded, and they are then earned by entry into the theatre of operations.

(b) The six months time qualification for these four Stars is now cancelled, and the time qualification is reduced to one day, that is to say, to entry into the qualifying area.

(c) Visits, journeys and inspections will not be a qualification unless they amount to thirty days and were specially approved by the Department concerned, or, in a Command comprising both operational and non-operational areas, by the General Officer Commanding-in-chief or Air Officer Commanding-in-chief.

(ii) Service at sea in the Royal Navy and the Merchant Navy

(a) The time qualification for these four Stars is at present as at (i) (a) above.

(b) The six months time qualification for the first three remains as in (i) (a) unaltered.

(c) The time qualification for the France and Germany Star has been reduced to one day, that is to say, to entry into the qualifying area, in support of land operations in France, Belgium, Holland, Germany, &c. For the three first-named awards the present qualification remains unaltered because of the difference in the conditions of operational service at sea and ashore. Whereas for an individual landed in an operational area, one day's service must nearly always be part of a substantial period in that area, one day's service at sea in an operational area may not necessarily involve the ship concerned in active operations. The six months qualification is also required to obviate the grant of the Stars for service in many river and estuarial eraft as the crews of these could claim to have been at sea on one occasion or another during the war and it would not be possible to exercise any check on such claims. The divergence in respect of the France and Germany Star has been approved because many crews of landing craft would be unable to fulfil a time qualification of six months.

(d) For the three first-named Stars and also the Atlantic Star, however, there will, for service at sea, be a special rule in relation to the last six months of operational service up to the 8th May, 1945, in the European and Atlantic theatres, and up to the 2nd September, 1945, in the Pacific and Burma theatres. Persons who entered operational service during the last six months will qualify for the Pacific, Burma or Italy Star, or the Atlantic Star, as the case may be—the Star granted being that appropriate to the last operational area in which service was rendered—and the prior time qualification of six months will not apply. The 1939-45 Star, however, will not be awarded in these cases in which operational service amounted to less than six months.

(c) Nothing in these provisions will alter the existing rules relating to the grant of Emblems in lieu of certain Stars.

(f) Personnel serving in sea-going vessels operated by the Army and Air Force will qualify under similar rules.

#### (iii) Air crew service

The qualification for these four Stars, for air crew who do not qualify by service on land in the appropriate theatre of operations, is at present two

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months followed by one operational sortie. The two months qualification has now been cancelled, the qualification being reduced to one operational sortie over the appropriate land or sea area.

#### Atlantic Star

#### 6. (i) Service at sea in the Royal Navy.

(a) The time qualification for this Star is at present six months in the Atlantic, provided the 1939-45 Star has first been earned by six months at sea in an operational area.

(b) Under the present rules an individual who serves six months afloat receives the 1930-45 Star. If, thereafter, he serves six months afloat in the area qualifying for the Atlantic Star, he is awarded the Atlantic Star.

(c) If, however, he serves his first six months afloat in the area that would qualify for the Atlantic Star, for that he receives the 1939-45 Star. If thereafter, he serves another six months afloat, but in another area, he does not qualify for the Atlantic Star, although he has served twelve months afloat six of which have been in the Atlantic.

(d) A Naval officer or rating who has served twelve months afloat in operational areas, any six months of which have been in the area qualifying for the Atlantic Star, is now to be regarded as having qualified for the Atlantic Star. This rule will apply also to Army and Air Force personnel serving at sea (otherwise than as air crew).

(e) Time as prisoner of war, however, will not be counted towards the total qualifying period of twelve months, unless the individual had completed his six months service for the 1939-45 Star and had begun to earn the Atlantic Star before being made prisoner.

#### (ii) Service at sea in the Merchant Navy

(a) The time qualification is at present six months service at sea, including a voyage through the Atlantic, provided the 1939-45 Star has first been earned by a previous six months at sea, including at least one voyage through one of the specified areas of active operations.

(b) The time qualification will remain as at present, but, in calculating the second six months service at sea, no deduction will be made of time spent in operational areas entitling the candidate to another Campaign Star.

(c) Time as prisoner of war, however, will not be counted towards the total qualifying period of twelve months, unless the individual had completed his six months service for the 1939-45 Star, including at least one voyage through one of the specified areas of active operations, and had begun to earn the Atlantic Star before being made prisoner.

#### (iii) Air crew service

(a) Following the course taken in paragraph 6 (i) (d) above, four months service as air crew in an operational unit, any two months of which qualify for the Atlantic Star, will now be regarded as a qualification for that Star.

(b) Time as prisoner of war, however, will not be counted towards the total qualifying period of four months, unless the individual had completed his two months service for the 1939-45 Star and had begun to earn the Atlantic Star before being made prisoner.

#### Air Crew Europe Star

7. (a) The time qualification is at present two months service as air crew in a unit engaged in operational flying from United Kingdom bases over Europe (including the United Kingdom) between the 3rd September, 1939, and the 5th June, 1944, inclusive, provided the 1939-45 Star has first been earned by two months air crew service in an operational unit, including participation in operations against the enemy.

(b) Under the present rules an individual who serves two months in operational air crew, and participates in operations against the enemy, receives the 1939-45 Star. If, thereafter, he served two months in operations which qualify for the Air Crew Europe Star, he is awarded the Air Crew Europe Star.

(c) If, however, he served his first two months in the area which would qualify for the Air Crew Europe Star, for that he receives the 1939-45 Star. If, thereafter, he served another two months in operations, in another area, he does not qualify for the Air Crew Europe Star, although he has served four months in operational air crew of which two have been in operations over Europe in the period up to the 5th June, 1944.

(d) Four months service as air crew in an operational unit, any two months of which qualify for the Air Crew Europe Star, will now be regarded as a qualification for that Star.

(e) Time as prisoner of war, however, will not be counted towards the total qualifying period of four months, unless the individual had completed his two months service for the 1939–45 Star and had begun to earn the Air Crew Europe Star before being made prisoner.

#### Africa Star

8. The time qualification for the Africa Star, which is one day, that is to say, entry into the operational area, will remain unaltered. The general rules relating to visits, journeys and inspections also remain unaltered, as set out in paragraph 5 (i) (c) above.

#### Change in the Time Qualification for the Defence Medal

9. The present time qualification is three years at home in a territory subject to enemy attacks or closely threatened, this being reduced to three months for mine and bomb disposal units of the Forces. The time qualification for military service overseas from or outside the country of residence is twelve months. This period of twelve months is now reduced to six for service in territories subjected to enemy air attack or closely threatened.

#### Mentions in Despatches and King's Commendations

10. (i) The single bronze oak leaf Emblem signifying in the Forces and the Merchant Navy, either a Mention in Despatches, a King's Commendation for brave conduct, or a King's Commendation for valuable service in the air, is at present attached directly to the coat after all the ribbons, or by itself. If granted for service in the war of 1939-45, it will be worn on the ribbon of the War Medal.

(ii) The plastic oval Badge granted to civilians awarded King's Commendations for brave conduct during the war is to be replaced, except in the Merchant Navy, by an Emblem of silver laurel leaves, and this will be worn on the ribbon of the Defence Medal. The Emblems are now being manufactured. When supplies become available, issues will be made to those entitled to them. When the Defence Medal has not been granted, or the award is for services subsequent to the war, the Emblem will be worn directly on the coat, after any ribbons, or by itself.

(iii) A small silver oval Badge has been approved for award to those civilians granted King's Commendations for valuable service in the air. This is to be worn on the coat immediately below any medal ribbons, or, in civil air line uniform, on the panel of the left breast pocket. It will be some time before supplies are ready for issue.

#### APPENDIX

#### SUMMARY OF THE CONDITIONS OF AWARD OF THE CAMPAIGN STARS, THE DEFENCE MEDAL, THE WAR MEDAL AND THE INDIA SERVICE MEDAL.

(This Summary incorporates the changes set out above.)

#### The 1939-45 Star

1. (i) The 1939-45 Star is granted for service in operations during the period from the 3rd September, 1939, to the 2nd September, 1945.

(ii) Navy.—(a) The qualification is six months service affoat in areas of active operations during the period from the 3rd September, 1939, to the 2nd September, 1945, inclusive. These areas are:—

- (i) From the 3rd September, 1939, to the 31st May, 1940, the Atlantic Ocean, including Home Waters, and the North Sea; the Baltic; the Arctic Ocean between Greenland and longitude 70° E. and that part of the Indian Ocean lying South of 15° S., and West of 55° E.
- (ii) From the 1st June, 1940, to the 9th June, 1940, as (i) with the addition of the Pacific Ocean and the rest of the Indian Ocean.
- (iii) From the 10th June, 1940, to the 8th May, 1945, anywhere at sea.
- (iv) From the 9th May, 1945, to the 2nd September, 1945, the areas are the Pacific Ocean, including the South China Sea, and the Indian Ocean and the Bay of Bengal, east of a line running from the southernmost point of Ceylon for a distance of 300 miles south, thence to a point 300 miles west of the southernmost point of Sumatra, and continuing east to the Western side of Sunda Strait, thence through Christmas Island, and southwards along the Meridian of 110° E. (Most of the Indian Ocean is excluded.)

(b) Naval personnel, not eligible by length of service afloat, who served in operations and Commando Raids accepted as qualifying Army personnel for the 1939-45 Star, are held to qualify.

(c) Officers and ratings of the Fleet Air Arm, who are not qualified by sea service, may be considered for qualification under similar rules to the R.A.F.

(iii) Army.-(a) The Army qualification is six months in an operational command during the period the 3rd September, 1939, to the 2nd September, 1945. As, however, there have been campaigns that have not covered six months, certain exceptions will be made. Where troops have been evacuated, e.g., from Dunkirk, Norway, &c., they will be eligible for the 1939-45 Star although their service in operations may have been less than six months, and specified Commando Raids will be similarly treated. Lists of these exceptions are to be found in paragraph 13 (iv) (vii) (ix) and (xi) below. Service on passage to an operational command through dangerous waters will count towards the six months qualifying period. Airborne troops of the Army who have taken part in airborne operations will qualify subject to the completion of two months in a fully operational unit.

(b) Qualifying service between the 8th May, 1945, and the 2nd September, 1945, must have been rendered in operations in specified zones in the area bounded on the east by the west coast of the American Continent and on the west by a line running along the Western and then the Southern frontier of the Chinese Republic to the point where the Dihang River crosses the latter into Assam, along the left bank of this river and the Brahmaputra and Meghna Rivers, down the east Coast of India to Point Calimere, to the northernmost point of Ceylon and down the east coast of Ceylon to the southernmost point of the Island, then along a line 300 miles south, thence to a point 300 miles west of the southernmost point of Sumatra, and continuing east to the Western side of Sunda Strait, thence through Christmas Island, and southwards along the Meridian of 110° E.

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(c) The Commonwealth of Australia, the Dominion of New Zealand and India (except parts of Assam and Bengal, for the purpose of the Burma operations) are not regarded as having been in the area of operational commands, and among the other territories in which service was not a qualification there may be mentioned Ceylon, Norfolk Island, New Caledonia, New Hebrides, Fiji Islands, Tonga Island, Phœnix Island and Fanning Island.

(iv) Air Force.—(a) The 1939–45 Star is awarded to all air crew who have taken part in operations against the enemy, subject to the completion of two months in an operational unit.

(b) Air crew service in operations against the enemy between the 8th May, 1945, and the 2nd September, 1945, in the area described in subparagraph (iii) (b) above will qualify, subject to completion of two months in an operational unit.

(c) In addition, non-air crew personnel serving in the area of an Army operational command will qualify, six months service in the area of the operational command being the qualification, and special exception being made for those evacuated, *e.g.*, from Dunkirk, Norway, &c., as for the Army above.

(d) Non-air crew personnel serving afloat qualify under the same conditions as members of the Navy and Merchant Navy.

(v) Merchant Navy.—The Merchant Navy receive the 1939–45 Star under the same conditions as the Royal Navy, except that six months service at sea will qualify, provided that at least one voyage was made through one of the specified areas of active operations. Service as Master or member of the crew of a vessel which took part in the evacuation at Dunkirk will be a qualification.

(vi) General.—(a) Operational service for a lesser period than six and two months respectively, but brought to an end by death, wounds or other disability due to service qualifies. The grant for service in operations, of an Honour, Decoration or Mention in Despatches or King's Commendation is, in the armed Forces or the Merchant Navy, a qualification for the award of the Star.

(b) Those who receive the 1939-45 Star for service of less than six or two months in operations will be required to complete an aggregate of six or two months operational service in any theatre or theatres before beginning to count service for the Atlantic Star or the Air Crew Europe Star. In the Navy, and Merchant Navy, for the Pacific, Burma, or Italy Stars, a prior six months operational service qualification is required. (See also certain modifications of these conditions described in the text below relating to particular Stars.)

#### Clasp to the 1939-45 Star

(vii) The Clasp to the 1939-45 Star is granted to air crew of fighter aircraft engaged in the Battle of Britain between the 10th July and the 31st October, 1940, and the award of this is to be denoted by a gilt rose Emblem when the ribbon alone is worn.

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#### The Atlantic Star

2. (i) The Atlantic Star is intended to commemorate the Battle of the Atlantic and is designed primarily for Convoys and their Escorts and Anti-Submarine forces, as well as for fast Merchant ships that sailed alone. The Atlantic Star will be granted for six months service afloat, in the Navy, in the Atlantic and Home waters, since the 3rd September, 1939, and until the Sth May, 1945, the date of the end of active hostilities in Europe and the Atlantic

(ii) The 1939-45 Star must be earned by six, or for air crew, two, months service in operations before a candidate can begin to qualify for the Atlantic Star. (See also certain modifications of this rule in the sub-paragraphs helow.)

(iii) Navy.-(a) Service with Convoys to North Russia and service in the South Atlantic west of longitude 20° E. will be included. Naval service from the 6th June, 1944, to Sth May, 1945, within the defined qualifying sea area for the France and Germany Star will not be counted towards the qualifying period for the Atlantic Star.

(b) A Naval officer or rating who has served twelve months afloat in operational areas, any six months of which have been in the area qualifying for the Atlantic Star, will be regarded as having qualified for the Atlantic Star. This rule will apply also to Army and Air Force personnel serving at sea (otherwise than as air crew).

(c) Time spent as prisoner of war, however, by a Naval officer or rating. will not be counted towards the total qualifying period of twelve months, unless the individual had completed his six months service for the 1939-45 Star and had begun to earn the Atlantic Star before being made prisoner.

(iv) Merchant Navy.-(a) The Merchant Navy will be awarded the Atlantic Star under the same conditions as the Navy except that six months service anywhere at sea will qualify, provided that one or more voyages have been made in the defined area. Service in fishing vessels working on or near the coast and in certain coastal craft is excluded. This will be recognised by the award of the 1939-45 Star.

(b) In the Merchant Navy, in calculating the second six months service at sea, no deduction will be made of time spent in operational areas entitling the candidate to another Campaign Star.

(c) Time spent as prisoner of war, however, by an officer or rating of the Merchant Navy will not be counted towards the total qualifying period of twelve months, unless the individual had completed his six months service for the 1939-45 Star, including at least one voyage through one of the specified areas of active operations, and had begun to earn the Atlantic Star before being made prisoner.

(v) Air Force.-(a) Air crew of the Royal Air Force will be eligible if they have taken part in operations against the enemy at sea within the areas and between the dates qualifying Naval personnel for the Atlantic Star, subject to the completion of two months service in an operational unit after earning the 1939-45 Star by six or two months operational service, as the case may be.

(b) Four months service as air crew in an operational unit, any two months of which qualify for the Atlantic Star, will be regarded as a qualification for this Star.

(c) Time spent as prisoner of war, however, by air crew, will not be counted towards the total qualifying period of four months, unless the individual had completed his two months service for the 1939-45 Star and had begun to earn the Atlantic Star before being made prisoner.

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(vi) Army and Air Force.-Army and Air Force personnel serving in His Majesty's ships or in defensively equipped Merchant ships will qualify under rules similar to those for the Navy or Merchant Navy.

(vii) General.-(a) Service for the Atlantic Star brought to an end by death, wounds or other disability due to service, or marked by an award or mention in despatches, will qualify although it may not have amounted to six or two months as the case may be.

(b) There is a special rule in relation to the last six months of operational service up to the 8th May, 1945. Persons who entered operational service during the last six or two months, as the case may be, will, if they did not serve subsequently in another operational area, qualify for the Atlantic Star and the prior time qualification of six or two months respectively will not apply. The 1939-45 Star, however, will not be awarded in such cases in which total operational service amounted to less than six or two months. Personnel serving in sea-going vessels operated by the Army and Air Force will qualify under similar rules.

#### Clasp to the Atlantic Star

(viii) A candidate who qualifies for the Atlantic Star, the France and Germany Star and the Air Crew Europe Star mentioned below, or two of these, is awarded only the Star first earned. A Clasp is awarded with it denoting that the service which would have qualified for the second Star earned has been rendered. When the Atlantic Star is awarded under this provision and the ribbon alone is worn, a silver rose Emblem will denote the award of the France and Germany or Air Crew Europe Clasp as the case may be. No individual will be awarded more than one Clasp to the Atlantic Star.

#### The Air Crew Europe Star

3. (i) The Air Crew Europe Star is intended as an award for operational flying from United Kingdom bases over Europe (including the United Kingdom) since the 3rd September, 1939, and up to the 5th June, 1944. The time qualification is two months service in air crew so employed. Air crew service in operations at sea will not be a qualification for the Air Crew Europe Star.

(ii) The 1939-45 Star must be earned by six, or for air crew, two, months service in operations before a candidate can begin to qualify for the Air Crew Europe Star.

(iii) Four months service as air crew in an operational unit, any two months of which qualify for the Air Crew Europe Star, is regarded, however, as a qualification for that Star.

(iv) Time as prisoner of war, however, is not counted towards the total qualifying period of four months, unless the individual had completed his two months service for the 1939-45 Star and had begun to earn the Air Crew Europe Star before being made prisoner.

(v) Service for the Air Crew Europe Star brought to an end by death. wounds or other disability due to service, or marked by an award or mention in despatches, qualifies although it may not have amounted to two months.

#### Clasp to the Air Crew Europe Star

(vi) A candidate who qualifies for the Air Crew Europe Star, the Atlantic Star and the France and Germany Star, or two of these, is awarded only the Star first earned. A Clasp is awarded with it denoting that the service which would have qualified for the second Star earned has been rendered. c\* 2

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When the Air Crew Europe Star is awarded under this provision and the ribbon alone is worn a silver rose Emblem will denote the award of the Atlantic, or France and Germany, Clasp as the case may be. No individual may be awarded more than one Clasp to the Air Crew Europe Star.

#### The Africa Star

4. (i) The Africa Star is granted for operational service of any length in North Africa from the date of the entry of Italy into the war on the 10th June, 1940, up to the date of the cessation of operations against the enemy in North Africa on the 12th May, 1943, inclusive.

(ii) Army.—The qualification is entry, as part of the establishment, into an operational command in North Africa. The individual should have been taken on the strength of a unit or formation. The whole of the area between the Canal and the Straits of Gibraltar is included. Service in operations in Abyssinia, Somaliland and Eritrea, and also in Malta, is a qualification. Service in West Africa is excluded. Airborne troops of the Army who have taken part in airborne operations, in a qualifying Army area for land operations, will qualify.

(iii) Air Force.—The qualification is landing in the area of an Army operational command as defined above, including Malta. Casual journeys and inspections, other than those specially approved, are excluded. In addition, service in the air over any of the Army operational commands in North Africa as defined above, or over enemy-occupied territory in North Africa, is a qualification.

(iv) Navy and Merchant Navy.—Naval and Merchant Navy service anywhere at sea in the Mediterranean between the 10th June, 1940, and the 12th May, 1943, or in direct support of the Army in the Abyssinian, Somaliland and Eritrean campaigns between the 10th June, 1940, and the 27th November, 1941, qualifies for the Africa Star. The Africa Star will also be awarded in the Navy on shore or in harbour in the same areas and between the same dates as the Army. Service in Merchant Navy vessels which took part in the landings on the coast of Morocco between the 8th November, 1942, and the 12th May, 1943, will also be a qualification.

(v) General

(a) There is no condition that the 1939-45 Star should already have been earned.

(b) Visits, journeys and inspections will not be a qualification unless they amount to thirty days and were specially approved by the Department concerned.

#### Clasps to the Africa Star

(vi) Army.-(a) An Emblem in the form of a silver arabie "8" or "1" or a silver rose is worn on the ribbon in service dress denoting the award of one of these Clasps in the Army. The awards are restricted to service in the Eighth and First Armies respectively in the period from the 23rd October, 1942, inclusive, the date of the battle of el Alamein, up to the date of the cessation of operations against the enemy in North Africa on the 12th May, 1943. The silver rose Emblem is granted to those of 18th Army Group Headquarters who did not qualify either for the "8" or the "1" Emblem. Union Defence Force personnel attached to South African Air Force Squadrons which qualified for the silver rose Emblem, qualify for that emblem.

(b) The rear or eastern boundary of the Eighth Army for this purpose ran approximately as follows: For the period from the 23rd October, 1942, to the 12th May, 1943, the line started from a point on the coast about

 $16\frac{1}{2}$  miles south-west of the centre of Alexandria and ran due south for about 6 miles. The line there turned south-south-east for about 36 miles, then due south for 61 miles and afterwards south-west for 40 miles. The line then turned westwards and ran more or less parallel with the coast.

(c) The qualification for the First Army Clasp is (i) service in a unit or formation in Tunis or Algeria between the 8th November, 1942, the date of the landings, and the 31st December, 1942, or (ii) thereafter, between the 1st January, 1943, and the 12th May, 1943, service in a unit or formation located forward of the First Army rear boundary or in a unit or formation under the command of First Army, including units or formations which were under the command of First Army for local defence and administration, irrespective of whether or not the unit or formation was on the First Army Order of Battle. The First Army rear boundary during the period the 1st January, 1943, to the 12th May, 1943, started on the coast of Algeria about 30 miles east of Bone and, subject to certain local digressions ran in a south-south-westerly direction for about 190 miles to Zribet-el-Oued.

(vii) Air Force.—A Clasp, denoted by the standard silver rose Emblem on the ribbon, is awarded to air crew and non-air crew personnel of the Royal Air Force who were under the command of the A.O.C., Western Desert, or the Air Commander, North-West African Forces, and to air crew personnel who were under the command of the A.O.C., Malta, or of other A.O.S.C., who operated in support of the Eighth Army or First Army or in the cutting of Rommel's or von Arnim's communications, or in the defence of Malta, during the period from the 23rd October, 1942, to the date of the cessation of hostilities in North Africa on the 12th May, 1943.

(viii) Navy.—Officers and ratings of certain units, for instance inshore squadrons and some of the escorting vessels serving off the coast of North Africa, and of submarines and other craft specifically engaged in cutting Rommel's or von Arnim's communications, from the 23rd October, 1942, to the cessation of hostilities in North Africa on the 12th May, 1943, qualify for a Clasp to the Africa Star. The rose Emblem is of the standard silver pattern. The Clasp to the Africa Star is also granted in the Navy to those who served as part of the Eighth or First Armies. For these the time limits will be as for the Army, and an "8" or a "1" Emblem will be issued.

(ix) Merchant Navy.—As in the Royal Navy, the Clasp to the Africa Star is awarded in the Merchant Navy to the personnel of vessels which worked inshore during the North African Campaign between the 23rd October, 1942, and the 12th May, 1943. Service in Merchant Navy vessels which took part in the landings on the coast of Morocco between the 8th November, 1942, and the 12th May, 1943, will also be a qualification.

(x) No individual will be awarded more than one Clasp to the Africa Star.

#### The Pacific Star

5. (i) (a) The Pacific Star is awarded for entry into operational service in the Pacific theatre between the 8th December, 1941, and the 2nd September, 1945, inclusive.

(b) In the Army and the Air Force there is no prior time qualification. For air crew who have not already qualified by service on land, the qualification is one operational sortie over the appropriate land or sea area. This qualification also applies to Naval air crew.

(c) In the Navy and Merchant Navy the 1939-45 Star must be earned by six months service in operations before a candidate can qualify for the Pacific Star.

(ii) Navy and Merchant Navy.—(a) Naval and Merchant Navy service in the Pacific Ocean, including the South China Sea, and the Indian Ocean east

of a line running due south from Singapore round the south-east coast of Sumatra, through Christmas Island, and southwards along the Meridian of  $110^{\circ}$  E., will be a qualification.

(b) There is, for service at sea, a special rule in relation to the last six months of operational service up to the 2nd September, 1945. Persons who entered operational service during the last six months will, if they did not serve subsequently in another operational area, qualify for the Pacific Star and the prior time qualification of six months will not apply. The 1939-45 Star, however, will not be awarded in such cases, in which total operational service amounted to less than six months. Personnel serving in sea-going vessels operated by the Army and Air Force will qualify under similar rules.

(c) For Naval personnel on duty ashore entry into the prescribed area of land operations will be a qualification, and the awards are made under the same rules as those for the Army.

(iii) Army.—(a) Qualifying service on land in the Army is restricted to operational service in territories in which there have been enemy or Allied invasions. The dates vary for each particular territory. Service in Burma is excluded.

(b) Operational service in China and Malaya from the 8th December, 1941, up to the 15th February, 1942, qualifies for the Pacific Star and from the 16th February, 1942, to the 2nd September, 1945, for the Burma Star. Airborne troops of the Army who have taken part in airborne operations, in a qualifying Army area for land operations, will qualify.

(iv) Air Force.—(a) Air crew service in operations against the enemy will qualify. One operational sortie is the qualification.

(b) Non-air crew service on land qualifies under the same rules as those for the Army.

(v) General.—Visits, journeys and inspections will not be a qualification unless they amount to thirty days and were specially approved by the Department concerned, or, in a Command comprising both operational and non-operational areas, by the General Officer Commanding-in-chief or Air Officer Commanding-in-chief.

#### Clasp to the Pacific Star

(vi) A candidate who qualifies for both the Pacific Star and the Burma Star mentioned below is awarded only one of these, the Star first earned. A Clasp is awarded with it denoting that service which would have qualified for the other Star has been rendered. When the Pacific Star is awarded under this provision and the ribbon alone is worn a silver rose Emblem will denote the award of the Burma Clasp.

#### The Burma Star

6. (i) (a) The Burma Star is granted for entry into operational service in the Burma campaign between the 11th December, 1941, and the 2nd September, 1945, inclusive.

(b) In the Army and the Air Force there is no prior time qualification. For air crew who have not already qualified by service on land, the qualification is one operational sortie over the appropriate land or sea area. This qualification also applies to Naval air crew.

(c) In the Navy and Merchant Navy the 1939-45 Star must be earned by six months service in operations before a candidate can qualify for the Burma Star.

(ii) Army.—(a) The qualifying area for land operations is service in Burma. In addition service on land from the 1st May, 1942, to the 31st December, 1943, in the provinces of Bengal and Assam and from the 1st January, 1944, until the 2nd Séptember, 1945, in those parts of Bengal or Assam east of the Brahmaputra, qualifies.

(b) Operational service in China and Malaya from the 8th December, 1941, up to the 15th February, 1942, qualifies for the Pacific Star, from the 16th Februry, 1942, to the 2nd September, 1945, for the Burma Star. Airborne troops of the Army who have taken part in airborne operations, in a qualifying Army area for land operations, will qualify.

(iii) Navy and Merchant Navy.—(a) Naval and Merchant Navy service is restricted to service in the Bay of Bengal enclosed by a line running from the southernmost point of Ceylon for a distance of 300 miles south, thence to a point 300 miles west of the southernmost point of Sumatra, and continuing east to the western side of Sunda Strait. The Malacca Strait is included.

(b) There is, for service at sea, a special rule in relation to the last six months of operational service up to the 2nd September, 1945. Persons who entered operational service during the last six months will, if they did not serve subsequently in another operational area, qualify for the Burma Star and the prior time qualification of six months will not apply. The 1939-45 Star, however, will not be awarded in such cases, in which total operational service amounted to less than six months. Personnel serving in sea-going vessels operated by the Army and Air Force will qualify under similar rules.

(c) For Naval personnel ashore entry into the prescribed area of land operations is a qualification and the awards are made under the same rules as those for the Army.

(iv) Air Force.—(a) Air crew service in operations against the enemy gualifies. One operational sortie is the qualification.

(b) Non-air crew service is dealt with under the same rules as those for the Army.

(v) General.—Visits, journeys and inspections will not be a qualification unless they amount to thirty days and were specially approved by the Department concerned, or, in a Command comprising both operational and non-operational areas, by the General Officer Commanding-in-chief or Air Officer Commanding-in-chief.

#### Clasp to the Burma Star

(vi) A candidate who qualifies for both the Burma Star and the Pacific Star mentioned above is awarded only one of these, the Star first earned. A Clasp is awarded with it denoting that service which would have qualified for the other Star has been rendered. When the Burma Star is awarded under this provision and the ribbon alone is worn, a silver rose Emblem will denote the award of the Pacific Clasp.

#### The Italy Star

7. (i) (a) The Italy Star is granted for entry into operational service on land in Sicily or in Italy at any time during the campaign there from the capture of Pantellaria on the 11th June, 1943, and until the Sth May, 1945, the date of the end of active hostilities in Europe.

(b) In the Army and the Air Force there is no prior time qualification. For air crew who have not already qualified by service on land the qualification is one operational sortie over the appropriate land or sea area. This qualification also applies to Naval air crew. Airborne troops of the Army who have taken part in airborne operations, in a qualifying Army area for land operations, will qualify.

(c) In the Navy and Merchant Navy the 1939-45 Star must be earned by six months service in operations before a candidate can qualify for the Italy Star.

(ii) Operational service in the Mediterranean theatre, for instance in the Ægean and Dodecanese, Corsica, Greece, Sardinia and Yugoslavia after the 11th June, 1943, is a qualification. Operational service in Elba is a qualification. Service in Sicily after the 17th August, 1943, in Sardinia after the 19th September, 1943, and Corsica after the 4th October, 1943, is not a qualification.

(iii) Navy and Merchant Navy.—(a) Naval or Merchant Navy service at sea in the Mediterranean during this period is a qualification provided it was directly connected with active operations in the Mediterranean theatre, including those in the Ægean and the South of France.

(b) There is, for service at sea, a special rule in relation to the last six months of operational service up to the 8th May, 1945. Persons who entered operational service during the last six months will, if they did not serve subsequently in another operational area, qualify for the Italy Star and the prior time qualification of six months will not apply. The 1939-45 Star, however, will not be awarded in such cases, in which total operational service amounted to less than six months. Personnel serving in sea-going vessels operated by the Army and Air Force will qualify under similar rules.

(c) For Naval personnel on duty ashore, entry into the prescribed areas of land operations will be a qualification and the awards are made under the same rules as those for the Army.

(iv) Air Force.—Air crew service in operations against the enemy, within the Mediterranean theatre, is a qualification, including sorties from the Mediterranean area over Europe.

(v) General.—(a) Visits, journeys and inspections will not be a qualification unless they amount to thirty days and were specially approved by the Department concerned, or, in a Command comprising both operational and non-operational areas, by the General Officer Commanding-in-chief or Air Officer Commanding-in-chief.

(b) The Star will be awarded to those who have earned it whatever other Campaign Stars may be granted in addition for services in the war.

#### The France and Germany Star

8. (i) (a) This Star is granted for entry into operational service on land from the 6th June, 1944, in France, Belgium, Holland or Germany, until the 8th May, 1945, the date of the end of active hostilities in Europe.

(b) There is no prior time qualification. For air crew who have not already qualified by service on land, the qualification is one operational sortie over the appropriate land or sea area. This qualification also applies to Naval air crew. Airborne troops of the Army who have taken part in airborne operations, in a qualifying Army area for land operations, will qualify.

(ii) Navy and Merchant Navy.—(a) Naval and Merchant Navy service afloat in the North Sea south of a line from the Firth of Forth to Kristiansand (South), in the English Channel or the Bay of Biscay east of longitude 6° W. is a qualification, provided such service was directly in support of land operation in France, Belgium, Holland, Germany, &c.

(b) Naval and Merchant Navy service affoat in the Mediterranean in support of operations in the South of France is not a qualification. Such service will qualify for the Italy Star.

(c) For Naval personnel on duty ashore, entry into the prescribed areas of land operations is a qualification.

(iii) Air Force.—(a) Air crew service in operations against the enemy over Europe from the 6th June, 1944, to the 8th May, 1945, qualifies. Air crew service qualifying for the Atlantic Star will not qualify for this Star. Sorties from the Mediterranean area over Europe will not be a qualification as such service will be a qualification for the Italy Star.

(b) Non-air crew personnel of the Air Force are awarded the Star under the same rules as the Army.

(iv) General.—Visits, journeys and inspections will not be a qualification unless they amount to thirty days and were specially approved by the Department concerned.

#### Clasp to the France and Germany Star

(v) The Star is not awarded in addition to the Atlantic Star or the Air Crew Europe Star. If a candidate should qualify for these three Stars or two of them, the Star first earned will be awarded. If the France and Germany Star is awarded under these conditions a Clasp will be awarded for service which would qualify for the Atlantic Star. When the ribbon alone is worn a silver rose Emblem is attached to it to denote the award of this Clasp.

#### Campaign Stars and Clasps. General

#### 9. (i) Entry into operational service

(a) Service in ships making occasional visits to the defined areas for fuelling and so forth will not necessarily be a qualification.

(b) The expression "entry into operational service" in the case of the Atlantic and Air Crew Europe Stars is subject to the qualification that six or two months operational service must already have been rendered. For awards in the Navy and Merchant Navy of the Pacific, Burma and Italy Stars a similar prior time qualification of six months also applies. Certain modifications of these rules are mentioned in the text relating to particular Stars.

#### (ii) Previous operational service of less than six or two months

(a) A recipient of the 1939-45 Star who has qualified for it by less than six or two months service respectively must complete the period of six or two months, as the case may be, before he can begin to qualify for the Atlantic or Air Crew Europe Stars respectively, or before he can earn the Pacific, Burma or Italy Stars by service in the Navy or Merchant Navy. For exceptions to this rule see (c) below.

(b) Those to whom grants of the 1939-45 Star have been, or will be made, as a result of the participation in a campaign on the special lists, in paragraph 13 (iv), (vii), (ix) and (xi) below, service in which qualifies in itself for the award, will not begin to qualify for the Atlantic or Air Crew Europe Stars until the completion of six or two months operational service, as the case may be. A similar condition applies to Navy and Merchant Navy candidates for the Pacific, Burma or Italy Stars.

(c) For the Atlantic or Air Crew Europe Stars in the armed Forces or Merchant Navy, or for the Pacific, Burma or Italy Stars in the Navy or Merchant Navy, operational service for a lesser period than six or two months as the case may be, but brought to an end by death, wounds or other disability due to service, or alternatively the grant for service in operations of an Honour, Decoration, Mention in Despatches, King's Commendation for brave conduct or King's Commendation for valuable service in the air, is a qualification for award, without regard to any six or two months service requirement, but subject to the general restrictions relating to alternative awards of the Stars.

(d) Awards made under the conditions described in sub-paragraph (c) above will be additional to any award of the 1939-45 Star.

#### (iii) Exclusion of time spent as prisoner of war

(a) Although time spent as a prisoner of war in consequence of capture in operations may be counted towards the qualifying period for the 1939-45 Star, such time will not be counted towards the period of six or two months operational service which must, in circumstances described in subparagraph (ii) above, be completed before the grants of certain Stars may be authorised.

(b) An individual who, at the time of his capture, has completed the six or two months operational service required for the award of the 1939-45 Star may, however, count time spent as a prisoner of war towards the period of six or two months service required for the award of the Atlantic Star or the Air Crew Europe Star. The candidate must have begun to earn one of these Stars and, in the case of the Merchant Navy, one or more voyages must have been made in the "defined area" after completion of service required for the award of the 1939-45 Star.

#### (iv) Award of a second or further Star

(a) Service qualifying for one of the Stars cannot run concurrently with service qualifying for another of the Stars.

(b) An individual, however, who has once completed the six or two months operational service required for the award of the 1939-45 Star and has been awarded either the Atlantic Star or Air Crew Europe Star will not be required to complete this period of qualifying service a second time in order to begin to qualify for the other. A similar arrangement applies to the prior service qualification for awards in the Navy or Merchant Navy of the Pacific, Burma and Italy Stars.

(c) An exception to the rule in (a) is made in the Merchant Navy in relation to the Atlantic Star and is set out in the text referring to that Star.

#### (v) Award of Clasps

No individual will be awarded more than one Clasp to any one of the Stars.

#### (vi) Civil Air Transport

The 1939-45 and Africa Stars are awarded under certain approved conditions to air crew of transport aircraft for service on specified overseas routes. Consideration will be given to the production of a scheme for the award of the other Stars in certain conditions, for those civilian crews who have flown into or through theatres of war or over dangerous waters. Air crew of Royal Air Force Transport Command engaged in similar duties will also be considered.

#### (vii) The last six months

(a) In the case of persons in operational service in the Navy or Merchant Navy on the Sth May, 1945, that is to say, at the end of active hostilities in Europe, or during the six months immediately preceding the Sth May, 1945, the Italy Star will be granted by virtue of entry into a theatre of operations, and the prior six months service requirement will not apply. A similar waiving of the prior service requirement will extend to the Atlantic Star. The actual service requirement for the Atlantic Star will thus be reduced in this period to entry into operational service. (b) Similarly, persons in operational service in the Navy or Merchant Navy on the 2nd September, 1945, that is to say, at the end of active hostilities in the Pacific and Burma, or during the six months immediately preceding the 2nd September, 1945, will receive the Pacific or Burma Star as the case may be, by virtue of entry into a theatre of operations and the prior six months service requirement will not apply. In such cases only one Star will be granted for service at sea during the last six months in the Atlantic, Italy, Pacific and Burma areas, *i.e.*, the Star appropriate to the last operational area in which service was rendered.

(c) The 1939-45 Star will not be awarded in any of these cases in which operational service amounts to less than six or two months respectively.

#### (viii) Civilians

As stated in paragraph 11 (v) below a few approved categories are eligible.

#### The Defence Medal

10. (i) The Defence Medal is to be granted (a) for service in the Forces in non-operational areas subjected to air attack, or closely threatened, (b) for non-operational service in the Forces overseas from, or outside, the country of residence, (c) for Civil Defence or other specified civilian service in military operational areas, provided the civil category was not eligible for Campaign Stars, and (d) for Civil Defence service in non-operational areas subjected to air attack, or closely threatened. The time qualification will be three years for (a), (c) and (d) except for Mine and Bomb Disposal units of the Forces in (a), for which the period will be three months. For (b) the time qualification will be (i) one year, except for (ii) service in territories subjected to enemy air attack or closely threatened, for which the qualifying period will be six months. Specified islands in non-operational areas in the Pacific are included among these territories.

(ii) Those qualified for any one of the Campaign Stars may be granted this award in addition, and subsequent award of one of the Campaign Stars will not supersede a previous grant of the Defence Medal. Military or Civil Defence service in the territory of residence, neither subjected to enemy air attack nor closely threatened is not a qualification for this Medal.

#### (iii) Service in the Forces

(a) All members of the Forces who have served in the United Kingdom during the war up to the 8th May, 1945, will be eligible for the Defence Medal. Personnel of the Anti-Aircraft Command and all Royal Air Force personnel other than operational air crew will, for example, be included. Members of Dominion Forces, other than operational air crew, who have served in the United Kingdom will be eligible. The United Kingdom Home Guard will also be included.

(b) It is the intention, for example, that service up to the 2nd September, 1945, by United Kingdom Forces in West Africa, Palestine or India, as well as service by Dominion Forces, other than operational air crew, in non-operational areas outside their own countries, should also be a qualification.

(c) The part-time service of the Malta Home Guard will be specially recognised by the grant of the Defence Medal.

(d) In dealing with claims under sub-paragraph (i) (b) above, relating to service outside the country of residence, Cyprus, Syria, Lebanon, Palestine and Egypt are treated as one territory. Kenya, Tanganyika, Uganda, Nyasaland, Northern Rhodesia and Zanzibar are also, for this purpose, treated as one territory.

### (iv) Civilians serving with the Forces

Members of the few approved categories of civilians who qualify for Campaign Stars. for instance (a) full time uniformed civilians serving under the Council of Voluntary War Work, (b) recognised uniformed Press Correspondents, (c) air crew of Civil Air Transport, or (d) R.A.F. Education, Works, Meteorological and similarly classified Officers serving in uniform, will, if they served overseas, from the place of residence for six months in a non-operational territory subjected to enemy attack or closely threatened, be eligible for the Defence Medal. Members of categories (a), (b), (c) and (d) will not be eligible for the Defence Medal for service in non-operational areas overseas from the place of residence, which are not in the list of territories subjected to enemy air attack or closely threatened.

## (v) Civil Defence, &c., service

(a) Members of civilian services in the United Kingdom eligible for Chevrons for war service will be eligible for the Defence Medal.

(b) Part time, as well as whole time, civilian service of the kind described in sub-paragraph (a) above will be a qualification. Any period between the 3rd September, 1939, and the 8th May, 1945, during which the enrolled member was (i) available for duty up to the standard required from time to time, and (ii) performed such duty as and when required, will be reckoned towards the period of three years qualifying service.

(c) A list of civilians serving in the United Kingdom eligible for Chevrons for war service and the Defence Medal was printed as an Appendix to the White Paper Cmd. 6633 of May 1945. There have been added to the list R.A.F. Education Officers, the Joint War Organisation of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John, the Scottish Branch of the British Red Cross Society and the St. Andrew's Ambulance Association. Members of the Joint War Organisation and of the two last named bodies can qualify if (a) they were enrolled in an eligible local authority Civil Defence Service, or (b) they performed duties analogous to those of one of the eligible local authority Civil Defence Services, and the section of the Joint War Organisation or of the Scottish Branch of the British Red Cross Society or of the St. Andrew's Ambulance Association to which they belonged was one which functioned operationally during or immediately after enemy attacks. The usual conditions will apply that the individuals (i) should have been available for duty up to the required standard from time to time, and (ii) that they performed such duty as and when required.

(d) It is the intention that Civil Defence service in military operational areas or in non-operational areas subjected to enemy air attack should be included on a similar basis. Civil Defence services in Gibraltar and Malta and in other territories in the Colonial Empire, which qualify for Chevrons for war service, will also be eligible. Civil Defence service in, for instance, West Africa or the West Indies will not be a qualification.

## (vi) Time qualification

Service in the United Kingdom will be counted from the 3rd September, 1939, to the 8th May, 1945, or to the stand-down of the organisation if earlier. United Kingdom Home Guard service, for instance, will be reckoned from the 14th May, 1940, to the stand-down on the 31st December, 1944, and Civil Defence service will be counted up to the 8th May, 1945, or whatever earlier date is fixed for the cessation of service in particular cases. Service in the various eligible categories may be aggregated. Time overseas in the Forces in non-operational areas amounting to less than a year or 21

six months, as the case may be, will be added at its actual time value to service of less than three years at home, that is to say, it would not be multiplied by three.

## (vii) Time qualification in the Colonial Empire

Where in certain cases in the Colonial Empire in territories which have been subjected to aerial bombardment or closely threatened, a three-year qualification cannot be adopted without excluding the full or part-time local military Forces and the Civil Defence Organisation, it will be necessary to seek approval for special time qualifications.

## (viii) Special awards

(a) Service in eligible categories brought to an end before the period of three years or twelve, six or three months service has been completed, either by death due to enemy action when on duty, or by injuries entitling the candidate to a Wound Stripe, will be a qualification for the grant of the Defence Medal.

(b) The Defence Medal will also be granted, without regard to the three year or twelve, six or three months service requirement, to those British subjects who may have received an award or King's Commendation for brave conduct or King's Commendation for valuable service in the air, provided that the recipient, when the award or King's Commendation was earned, was serving in a category eligible for the Defence Medal and that the distinction was granted in respect of service qualifying for the Defence Medal.

(c) It will be noticed that, for obvious reasons, the above definition excludes those granted the George Cross or George Medal for actions in service qualifying for Campaign Stars or for actions in territories neither subjected to air attack nor closely threatened.

(d) There are a tew other recipients of the George Cross or the George Medal not in any of the categories mentioned in the preceding subparagraphs (b) and (c), mainly those granted these awards for gallantry in Civil Defence, who were not in a service which would qualify them for the Defence Medal. These also will be eligible specially for the Defence Medal. This arrangement will not apply to holders of awards other than the George Cross and the George Medal.

#### (ix) Claims

It will not be practicable for Departments to certify civil awards of the Defence Medal until application has been made and the prescribed form has been submitted and examined. Further information will be issued on this point. A candidate with qualifying time in more than one Service will submit a certificate from the appropriate authorities in respect of his earlier service.

#### (x) Closing dates

(a) The closing date of the qualifying period for the Defence Medal in respect of service in the Forces will be that on which active hostilities ended in Europe, that is to say, the 8th May, 1945, except that service in the Forces overseas from, or outside, the country of residence, will continue to be reckoned until the 2nd September, 1945, the date of the end of active hostilities in the Pacific. (b) Service by local military Forces or Civil Defence Organisations in non-operational areas in territories in the Pacific area classified as qualifying by reason of aerial bombardment or because they have been closely threatened will continue to be reckoned towards the award of the Defence Medal during the interval between the end of active hostilities in Europe and the end of active hostilities in the Pacific, that is to say between the 8th May, 1945, and the 2nd September, 1945.

# (xi) Non-operational areas subjected to enemy air attack or closely threatened

The territories, in addition to the United Kingdom, which for the purpose of (a), (b) (ii), and (d) of sub-paragraph (i) above are classified as non-operational areas subjected to enemy air attack or closely threatened are shown below, with dates.

## The War Medal, 1939-45

11. (i) The War Medal 1939-45 is to be granted to full-time personnel of the Armed Forces wherever their service during the war has been rendered. A 28-day qualification will be adopted. <u>Operational and non-operational</u> service will qualify. In the Merchant Navy it will be a requirement that the 28 days should have been served at sea. (ii) Service between 3rd September, 1939, and 2nd September, 1945, inclusive, will qualify wherever rendered.

(iii) The War Medal will be granted in addition to the Campaign Stars and the Defence Medal, if earned.

(iv) Operational service brought to an end by death, wounds or other disability attributable to service, capture by the enemy, or the cessation of hostilities on the 2nd September, 1945, will qualify a recipient of one of the Campaign Stars for the award of the War Medal even though the service may not amount to 28 days in all. This concession will not apply to an individual who does not qualify for a Campaign Star. When service was ended by capture by the enemy it will be a condition that there should have been freedom from blame. When the 1939-45 Star or one of the other Campaign Stars has been awarded for operational service of less than 28 days, the War Medal will be granted in addition.

### Civilians

(v) The few approved categories of civilians who qualify for Campaign Stars, for instance, (a) full-time uniformed civilians serving in army operational areas under the Council of Voluntary War Work, (b) recognised uniformed Press Correspondents serving in army operational commands or in Naval or R.A.F. Establishments in the area thereof, (c) air crew of civil air transport who have flown on specified routes into theatres of war, or (d) R.A.F. Education, Works, Meteorological and similarly classified Officers serving in uniform in the area of Army operational commands overseas, will be eligible for the War Medal in addition to the Campaign Stars, provided that 28 days of such qualifying service has been rendered.

(vi) Categories of civilians, similar to those described in (a) and (b), who served in the United Kingdom only and thus qualified for neither Campaign Stars nor the Defence Medal, and such categories as aircrew of civil air transport and R.A.F. Education Officers who served in the United Kingdom only and qualify for the Defence Medal, will not qualify for the War Medal.

(vii) Civil categories similar to those described in (a), (b), (c) and (d) who served outside the country of residence in non-operational areas will not qualify for the War Medal unless such service outside the country of residence was rendered in a territory subjected to enemy air attack or closely threatened.

No individual will be awarded more than one Clasp to any one Campaign Star, and no one will be able to wear more than one Emblem on any one of the Star ribbons, when the ribbon only is worn.

#### **Operational** service

13. (i) The areas of qualifying operational service for the Campaign Stars in the Navy and Merchant Navy are given in detail in the foregoing paragraphs dealing with the various Campaign Stars.

(ii) The areas of qualifying operational service for the Campaign Stars on land are set out as shortly as possible below. These apply to Army, Navy and Air Force service on land and also to operational air crew service.

For the 1939-45 Star the qualification is six months operational service, or for air crew, two months, including at least one operational sortie. Service may be aggregated. In certain operations the qualification for the 1939-45 Star for service on land is reduced to entry into operational service.

For the Africa, Pacific, Burma, Italy and France and Germany Stars the qualification is entry into operational service on land, or for air crew, one operational sortie. To avoid repetition the areas of operational service for the 1939-45 Star and these other Stars are shown together.

## The 1939-45 Star and the Pacific Star

(vi) In the following operations, service of six or two months qualifies for the award of the 1939-45 Star. Entry into operational service qualifies for the Pacific Star.

## (a) Central Pacific and South China Sea.

Operational service qualifies in all islands South of Latitude  $40^{\circ}$  N. in the Central Pacific and the South China Sea in the area subjected to enemy invasion during the war, and including islands occupied by the enemy up to the cessation of hostilities, for the period from the date of enemy invasion or occupation in each instance and up to the 2nd September, 1945.

The area is bounded on the North by Latitude 40° N. and on the East by the 180th meridian. The southern boundary of the area runs along Latitude 12° South from the 180th meridian to Longitude 145° East. The boundary then turns North along Longitude 145° East to Latitude 9° 40' South. It runs westward along this line to Timor. It then turns due South of Latitude 12° South, runs along this westwards to the Longitude 110° and then to Christmas Island (excluding the Island). The boundary then runs northwards round the South-East coast of Sumatra to Singapore.

It will be seen that this line encloses, for instance, the Marshall Islands, the Gilbert and Ellice Islands, and the Santa Cruz Islands. It excludes the Phœnix Islands, the Samoa Islands, the Fiji Islands, the New Hebrides and New Caledonia.

### The India Service Medal, 1939-45

14. The India Service Medal will be awarded for three years nonoperational service in the Indian Forces in India or elsewhere between the 3rd September, 1939, and the 2nd September, 1945. This will not be given to anyone qualifying for the Defence Medal. It will be granted in addition to the War Medal and the Campaign Stars and will be worn after the War Medal.

#### Allied and other Foreign Nationals in the British Forces

#### The Campaign Stars and the War Medal

15. (i) The categories of Allied and other foreign nationals in the British Forces eligible for British Campaign Stars and the War Medal are as follows: —

- (a) Foreign nationals commissioned or enlisted as individuals into British Forces.
- (b) Foreign nationals commissioned or enlisted into British Forces by virtue of their membership of Allied Forces.
- (c) Foreign nationals serving as individuals, (i) in British Merchant ships, or (ii) in Foreign vessels chartered on bare-boat (or nett) charters by His Majesty's Government, flying the British flag and with crews serving under British conditions.

(ii) The above three categories are eligible provided the individuals do not receive a similar award from their own Government. It is explained to recipients that the British ribbons are issued provisionally, and that their claim to the corresponding Stars (and therefore the right to continue to wear the ribbons) would be invalidated by the acceptance from their own or other Allied Governments of any other medal employed or instituted for general use in this war.

(iii) Foreign nationals in the categories in sub-paragraph (i) above (mainly in (a) and (c)) who subsequently transferred to the Forces or Merchant Navies of their own countries must, in order to qualify, have completed their qualifying service before their own countries declared war.

#### Defence Medal

(iv) The position in relation to the Defence Medal on the civil side is that all foreign subjects who were required to carry out, or who voluntarily undertook, Civil Defence or other civil duties of the kind for which the Defence Medal is to be awarded, and who, it may be assumed, have no expectation of any comparable medal from their respective Governments, should be allowed to have it on the same terms as British subjects, regardless of nationality.

(v) On the military side, the six months, or one year, overseas rule for the Defence Medal is intended to recognise British subjects who were put to the discomfort and inconvenience of service overseas during the war. It is intended that foreign subjects from the continent who came here during the war, for instance in 1940, should be required to serve the whole three years. Subject to the other regulations it will be necessary to apply this rule to all foreign nationals who served here whether they served either as in (i) (a) or (b) above or in Civil Defence.

#### Interpretation

16. Any questions of difficulty in connection with the scheme, including interpretation and so forth, will be a matter for reference to the Committee on the grant of Honours, Decorations and Medals.

#### The Dominions, India, Southern Rhodesia, Burma and the Colonial Empire

17. The above arrangements in relation to Campaign Stars and Clasps also apply to the Forces and Merchant Navies of India, Southern Rhodesia, Burma and the Colonial Empire. The Defence Medal will also be granted in these Forces for services of the kind described in paragraph 10 above. The arrangements have been generally agreed in discussion with Dominion Governments, though certain questions of detail remain to be settled. It is the intention that Civil Defence services in areas in the British Commonwealth, in addition to the United Kingdom, subjected to air attack or closely threatened, should also be considered for recognition by the grant of the Defence Medal.

> The procedure for obtaining and verify ing applications for the Defence Medal from ex-members of the Armed Forces, from the Home Guard, and from members of eligible civilian services in the United Kingdom has been approved.

Forms Numbers 1 to 8 as used in this country, and I should be glad if you would be good enough to arrange locally for the registration of claims and for the award of the ribbon to those eligible. The issue of ribbon is  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " per person and this should be obtained from the Crown Agents for the Colonies.

5. Nominal rolls giving the particulars as stated in Form D.M. 8, should be prepared separately for civil and military claims and forwarded to me in due course for transmission to the office of the Central Index.

The Defence Medal

Sir,

1. I am directed by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury to refer to the institution of the Defence Medal and to invite the co-operation of Government Departments in the verification of claims, and the issue of the Medal Ribbon to qualified persons who last served in one of the qualifying categories with which Government Departments were concerned during the war.

2. Particulars of the award were published in the White Paper on Campaign Stars and the Defence Medal (Cmd. 6633), in which it was explained that the production of the Medal was being postponed, but that the ribbon was being made and would be issued when supplies were ready.

3. A general announcement concerning the method of claiming, and the issue of the Medal Ribbon has been released for publication in the Press.

4. The conditions of eligibility and the procedure to be followed by persons whose last qualifying service was in a civilian service are set out in form D.M.1 a copy of which, together with forms D.M.2 (the claim form showing the last period of qualifying service), D.M.3 (the record of a period of qualifying civilian service prior to the last), and D.M.4 (the record of a period of qualifying service in the Armed Forces, including the Home Guard, prior to qualifying civilian service), will be available to members of the public at Post Offices. All applicants should obtain their claim forms in this way. Copies of forms D.M.1, 2, 3 and 4, and also of D.M.5, 6, 7 and 8 — see Appendix II, are attached for reference.

5. The list of eligible categories is shown in paragraph 15 of D.M.1, these being the categories the members of which were eligible for war service chevrons. Government Departments generally will receive for varification forms D.M.2 and D.M.3 in respect of persons who served in any part of Great Britain in categories 17 and 36.

"17. Fire guards (including civil defence and fire brigade personnel) who performed duties at government or business premises under arrangements made under the Fire Guard (Business and Government Premises) Order, 1943, or any previous provision (or under the corresponding Orders in Northern Ireland) being service which was qualifying service for the award of Chevrons for war service."

"36. Civil Servants forming departmental Civil Defence organisations."

In addition the Admiralty, the War Office, the Air Ministry, the Ministry of Civil Aviation, the Ministry of Supply and Aircraft Production, the Home Office, the Ministry of Health, the Department of Health for Scotland, the Ministry of Information and the Ministry of War Transport will receive for verification forms from persons who served in categories peouliar to those Departments. Should these Departments require copies of the forms to attach to orders or circulars for the guidance of those concerned in the administration of the scheme, they should obtain them from the Home Office.

The detailed action to be taken is set out in the Appendices which are designed to serve as a working guide for staff dealing with the verification of claims.

6. The required period of service for the Defence Medal, with the exception of the special cases mentioned in the next paragraph, is three years' qualifying service (whole-time or part-time) in the aggregate given between 3rd September, 1939, and 8th May, 1945. Qualifying service is service during which the person was (a) available for duty up to the standard of duty required from time to time, and (b) performed such duty when required. Any period during which two or more types of qualifying service were given concurrently is to be reckoned as only one period of outifying service.

7. The requirement of three years' qualifying service will not apply in the types of cases specified in paragraphs 2 and 3 of form D.M.1, thus:-

"2. Service in eligible categories brought to an end before the period of three years' service has been completed, either by death due to enemy action when on duty or by injuries entitling the candidate to a Wound Stripe, will be a gualification for the grant of the Defence Medal,"

"3. The Defence Medal will also be granted, without regard to the three year requirement, to those who may have received an Honour, Decoration or Medal or King's Commendation for brave conduct or King's Commendation for valuable service in the air, which has been published in the London Gazette, provided that the recipient, when the Award or King's Commendation was earned, was serving in a category eligible for the Defence Medal and that the distinction was granted in respect of service qualifying for the Defence Medal."

Cases of doubt relating to paragraph 3 only of Form  $D_*M_1$  should be referred to the Treasury. Any cases of doubt relating to paragraph 2 of form  $D_*M_1$  should be referred to the Home Office.

8. Next-of-kin who are entitled, in a case of death due to enemy action when on duty, to receive the Defence Medal in terms of paragraph 2 of D.M.1 (as quoted in the preceding paragraph) may become entitled also to a document to be issued centrally. It is accordingly requested that, when the Defence Medal ribbon is issued to the next-of-kin in such a case, the Government Department should send the notification provided for at (d) of Appendix II.

9. Persons who were guilty of misconduct within the meaning of paragraph 14 of D.M.1 should not be awarded a Defence Medal.

## 10. Central Index

A central index of civilian awards, comprising the forms D.M.8 which are furnished as provided for at c(v) of Appendix II, will be built up as the basis for the central distribution later of the Defence Medal. The ribbon is now available in rolls of 36 yards, from which the requisite roll of 36 yards should be cut departmentally: allowing for wastage in cutting, each roll of 36 yards should provide 500 lengths for issue. Requisitions for an initial supply, representing say 50% of the Departments estimated total requirements, should be sent as soon as possible by letter to the Controller, Post Office Stores Department, 230-238 Gray's Inn Road, London, W.C.1. Departments which do not expect to receive anything like 500 applications should make arrangements to obtain their supply from a bigger prospective user.

Supplementary requisitions for ribbon should be made in the same way.

Requisitions should be for rolls of ribbon, except where the final requirement is estimated to be less than 36 yards.

12. When ribbon is requisitioned, a requisition for forms D.N.7 and 8 should be sent at the same time, by letter, to the Director, H.M. Stationery Office, Duplicating and Distributing Division, Shepherdess Walk, London, N.1. The number of each of these two forms so requisitioned should ordinarily be 500 times the number of rolls of ribbon asked for.

Each supply of form D.M.7 will be accompanied by a corresponding number of official paid "aperture" envelopes.

Forms D.M.5 and 6 should be requisitioned from the same source, as required.

13. Departments should make suitable arrangements for the safe custody of supplies of the ribbon, and for ensuring that forms D.N.8 are furnished. It will be realised from what is said in paragraph 10 above that it is of prime importance that form D.M.8 should reach the Central Index Office in every case where the ribbon is issued. Departments are asked to maintain a simple running record to ensure that there is at all times strict correspondence between the number of ribbons issued and the number of forms D.M.8 sent to the Central Index Office.

14. METHOD OF WEARING THE RIBBON

(a) As is stated in paragraph c(1) of Appendix II of this circular the length of ribbon sent to each applicant whose claim is approved is  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inches. This is enough for two coats. A piece  $\frac{1}{14}$  inches in length should be folded so that the surface showing on one side is  $\frac{3}{4}$  thich inlength by  $\frac{1}{2}$  inches, the breadth of the ribbon. The ribbon should be sewn up in this way and afterwards stitched on to the coat. In civilian uniforms it should be worn above the centre of the left breast pocket or in a similar position, if there is no such pocket.

(b) In plain clothes the ribbon sewn up in the way described, or mounted on a bar brooch, may be worn on the left lapel of the coat or in a similar position.

(c) The Defence Medal ribbon should be placed after the ribbons of the Campaign Stars, that is to say, nearer to the left shoulder. It is worn, however, in front of Jubilec and Coronation Medals, Police Medals for Valuable Service, Efficiency and Long Service Decorations and Medals, and foreign awards, that is to say, further from the left shoulder.

15. General questions arising out of this circular should be referred to the Treasury as regards claims in respect of duty performed at Government Offices, and to the Home Office (J. Division), 60, Princes Gate, Kensington, S.W.7; as regards all other cases, except that in Scottish category 17 cases (relating to duty performed other than at Government offices) the Scottish Home Department, St. Andrew's House, Edinburgh, 1. should be consulted.

## APPENDIX I



## Verification of claims

(To be read with the general conditions set out in paragraphs 4-7 and 9 of the Circular)

1. The qualifying period for fireguard duty in category 17, with the exception of the special cases referred to in paragraph 7 of the circular, is three years service between the relevant date shown in paragraph 8 of T.C. No.12/44 and the date on which the area or the premises were deprescribed.

2. The qualifying period for civil defence or fire brigade duty under category 17 and for civil defence duty under category 36, being duty which qualified for war service chevrons (see T.C. No.12/44) is three years service between the 3rd September, 1939 and 8th May, 1945.

3. The qualifying period for duty in categories 1, 2, 23, 24, 25, 26, 29, 30, 31, 32, 35, 42, 43 and 44 with which the Departments mentioned in paragraph 5 of the circular are concerned, is also three years service between the 3rd September, 1939 and 8th May, 1945, except for category 2 (the Home Guard) when the final date for qualifying service is the 31st December, 1944.

4. The category number and the period of service claimed in D.M.2 or in D.M.3 received for certification of previous service under the Department, should be verified by reference to the relevant departmental records, applying the principles set out in paragraph 9 of T.C. No.12/44.

5. Where records are defective, and necessary enquiries have been made the applicant should be given the benefit of any doubt.

6. Certificate F in D.M.3 should be completed, and the form returned to the applicant for association with his D.M.2, except that, where the service cannot be accepted for the reasons indicated in paragraph 9 of the circular, the applicant should be informed by letter or by a suitable entry on the D.M.3 that, in view of the terms of paragraph 14 of form D.M.1, 54217-1(5) 1 /the

the service claimed cannot be admitted as qualifying service (Form D.M.6 should not be used in these cases.)

7. Certificate E in D.M.2 should be completed. Action on the certified D.M.2 claims, taking into account qualifying service certified in any accompanying forms D.M.3 or 4 should be completed in accordance with Appendix II.

8. In the case of category 17 service performed at premises of which the Department was not the occupier but for which it was the appropriate authority under the Fire Guard Orders, the action is:-

(a) Forms D.M.2 or 3 with certificate E completed, will reach Departments from the occupiers. The Department, in their capacity as appropriate authority, should determine, from their knowledge of the obligations imposed upon the occupier, whether duty at the premises may be accepted as qualifying service.

(b) Certificate F in D.M.3 should be completed and returned to the applicant.

(c) Action on D.M.2 claims, taking into account qualifying service certified in any accompanying forms D.M.3 or 4, should be completed in accordance with Appendix II.

(d) In addition to certified forms, Departments may receive (in accordance with the directions contained in the Notes on the forms) uncertified forms D.M.2. or 3 sent by category 17 applicants to occupiers of business premises and returned undelivered by the Post Office. The great majority of these forms will, no doubt, relate to duty performed at the premises of small firms which have gone out of existence. Departments are, therefore, asked to deal with such claims, and also with any claims in which they are satisfied on representations from an applicant that a certified D.M.2 or 3 cannot be obtained from the occupier.

A Department should either ordinarily admit the service claimed in the incomplete D.M.2 if they determine that duty at the premises may be accepted as qualifying service, and

/complete

complete action in accordance with Appendix II, or transfer the form to the local authority if it is known that the local authority last acted as appropriate authority for the premises.

## 9. Incomplete forms

(i) Where an applicant has attached to his D.M.2 a D.M.3 in respect of category 17 service, returned undelivered by the Post Office, or an uncertified copy of D.M.3 as provided for in the Note at the head of the form, action should be taken as follows:-

(a) If the Department was the appropriate authority for the premises shown in the uncertified D.M.3, the service claimed should ordinarily be admitted if the Department determines that duty at the premises may be accepted as qualifying service. Certificate F in D.M.3 should be completed.

(b) If the Department was not the appropriate authority for the premises, the service claimed should be admitted if there is no reason to doubt the validity of the claim.

(ii) Where examination of forms D.M.2, 3, or 4 discloses that a form is incomplete in any material particular, otherwise than as provided for in the preceding paragraph, the defective items should be marked "X" and the form or forms returned to the applicant asking him to get them properly completed.

It is important that the National Registration No., should appear on every form.



## APPENDIX II

## ACTION WHEN ELIGIBILITY HAS BEEN DETERMINED

When the eligibility of an applicant has been determined as prescribed in Appendix I above (as read with the general conditions set out in paragraphs 4-7 and 9 of the circular), action should be taken as follows:-

# (a) Not eligible, because less than three years' qualifying service

D.M.5 should be sent to the applicant (in a sealed envelope), the necessary record being made in the section at the foot of the D.M.2. which should be retained.

Where the D.M.5 is being sent to the next-of-kin, the text should be amended by deleting in the fourth line the words "you did not complete", and by adding at the end the words, "was not completed".

## (b) Not eligible, because disqualified under paragraph 14 of D.M.1 as read with paragraph 9 of the circular

D.M.6 should be sent to the applicant (in a sealed envelope), the necessary record being made in the section at the foot of the D.M.2. which should be retained.

(c) Eligible

(i) D.M.7 accompanied by the medal ribbon,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inches in length, should be sent to the applicant, in the "aperture" envelope supplied with the forms.

The National Registration No., as well as the name and address in the "box", should be entered in Part B of D.M.7 in every case.

(ii) Where the award is being notified to the next-ofkin, Part A of the D.M.7 should be amplified by the addition, after the claimant's name, of the following:-

/"as

"as next-of-kin of (full name in which service was rendered)".



(iii) Where Part A of D.M.7 is amplified as in (ii) above, Part B should be amended by deleting the "surname" entry below the 'box', and substituting 'As next-of-kin of', followed by the full name of the deceased person as shown in Part A after claimant's name.

(iv) Where the entries below the National Registration No. in Section A of D.M.2 show that the applicant is of foreign nationality, a postscript should be added to Part A of the D.M.7, as follows:-

> "Approval is given on the condition that the Defence Medal will be issued to you only if you do not receive a comparable medal from your own Government."

(v) D.M.8 should be completed in typewriting or block letters throughout and sent unfolded and without any covering letter or accompanying documents, to the Defence Medal Central Index, Home Office, Whitehall, London, S.W.1.

(Note - Forms D.M.8 will be supplied in strips of three, to facilitate typing. The completed strips will be cut into single cards on reaching the Central Index Office.) Only a single card is required for each person to whom the ribbon has been issued.

(vi) The necessary record of eligibility, and of the despatch of D.M.7 and 8, should be made in the section at the foot of the D.M.2.

(d) <u>Next-of-kin eligible in terms of paragraph 2 of D.M.1</u> by reason of a death due to enemy action when on duty. (See paragraph 8 of the circular.)

In addition to action as at (c) above, write to the Home Office, or, where the death occured in Scotland, to the /Scottish 1

Scottish Home Department, St. Andrew's House, Edinburgh 1., to the effect that the Defence Medal ribbon has been issued to the next-of-kin (full name and address) who qualified in terms of paragraph 2 of D.M.1 by reason that the death of (full name in which service was rendered) was due to enemy action when on duty; and that the person named as next-ofkin may accordingly be entitled also to the document referred to in paragraph 8 of T.C. No.11/46.

Forms D.M.2 and accompanying forms D.M.3 or 4, and any supporting correspondence, should be retained by the Department.

The name and address of the Department should be inserted in forms D.M.5, and 6, and at the top-right of Part A of D.M.7.

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## THE DEFENCE MEDAL

## Instructions Relating to Claims

## **Conditions of Award**

1. His Majesty the King has been graciously pleased to approve the institution of a Defence Medal to be granted to individuals who have served whole time or part time, for not less than three years in the United Kingdom during the period of active hostilities in Europe from 3rd September, 1939, to 8th May, 1945, in any of the categories named in paragraph 15 below. These are the categories the members of which, in the United Kingdom, were eligible for Chevrons for war service.

2. Service in eligible categories brought to an end before the period of three years service has been completed, either by death due to enemy action when on duty or by injuries entitling the candidate to a Wound Stripe, will be a qualification for the grant of the Defence Medal.

3. The Defence Medal will also be granted, without regard to the three-year requirement, to those who may have received an Honour. Decoration or Medal or King's Commendation for brave conduct or King's Commendation for valuable service in the air, which has been published in the London Gazette, provided that the recipient, when the Award or King's Commendation was earned, was serving in a category eligible for the Defence Medal and that the distinction was granted in respect of service qualifying for the Defence Medal.

4. Service in the various eligible categories may be aggregated providing the periods of service were not concurrent. Two types of qualifying service rendered at different times in the same period will be reckoned as one type of qualifying service only.

#### Claims

5. Except as provided for in paragraphs 10 and 11 below, a claimant for the award of the Medal must complete form D.M.2 and send it to the authority shown in paragraph 15. The claim on form D.M.2 should be sent to the authority responsible for the category in which the claimant is serving, or in which he or she last served.

## Certification of Earlier Civilian Service

6. If the length of qualifying service in the category in which the claimant last served was less than three years and he or she had previous qualifying service with a different authority or authorities a claimant should obtain form D.M.3 from a Post Office and fill it in and send it to the authority or authorities responsible for the earlier service as shown in para. 15. When the certified form D.M.3. is returned to the claimant he should attach it to form D.M.2. If, however, the authority is the same for all the periods of service, only form D.M.2 need be completed.

## Next-of-Kin

7. The next-of-kin of an individual whose death occurred as a result of enemy action when on duty need only enter particulars in form D.M.2.

If death occurred otherwise the procedure should follow that in paragraphs 5 and 6 above.

#### Special Qualifications

8. If the service rendered by the claimant is not sufficient in itself to justify the grant of the Medal, but he or she wishes to claim on the ground that service was brought to an end by injuries entitling him or her to a Wound Stripe, form D.M.2. should be completed and sent to the authority responsible for the category in which the claimant last served. A copy of the official notification of the award of a Wound Stripe must be attached to form D.M.2.

9. If the service rendered by the claimant is not sufficient in itself to justify the award of the Medal, but he or she wishes to claim in respect of the grant of a qualifying Award or King's Commendation, form D.M.2 should be completed and sent to the authority responsible for the category in which the claimant has served.

#### Ex-members of the Armed Forces

10. Ex-members of the Navy or of the W.R.N.S., whose most recent qualifying service was rendered with these forces, should apply by letter to the Admiralty, Whitehall, stating full particulars of their service in respect of which they claim to be qualified for the Defence Medal.

Ex-members of the Army or of the A.T.S., whose most recent qualifying service was rendered with these forces, should obtain Army Form B.2068 from a Post Office. The claimant when he has entered particulars on the form should send it to the Service Record Office.

Ex-members of the Royal Air Force or W.A.A.F., whose most recent qualifying service was rendered with these Forces, should apply by letter stating full particulars of their service in respect of which they claim to be qualified for the Defence Medal. Letters should be addressed by ex-officers to the Under Secretary of State (S.7(d)), Air Ministry, Kingsway, W.C.2, and by ex-airmen to the Air Officer in Charge of Records (C.1 Cam.), Royal Air Force, Gloucester.

If ex-members of the Armed Forces or of the Auxiliary Military Services wish to add previous service in a different arm of the Forces (for example, R.A.F. service which was followed by Army service), they must obtain certification of the previous service in addition. Previous Naval service can be certified by application by letter to the Admiralty, Whitehall ; previous Army service by completing A.F.B.2068, and previous R.A.F. service by letter of application to the Air Ministry or R.A.F. Records Office. When certification of previous service has been received by the claimant it must be attached to the final claim form or letter.

Those who rendered qualifying civilian service before being commissioned or enlisted and who wish to aggregate military service with civilian service, must obtain a certificate on form D.M.3 and attach it to the Army form, or to the letter to the Admiralty or to the Air Ministry or R.A.F. Records Office, as the case may be, when sending the claim to the Service Record Office or Service Department concerned.

before being commissioned or enlisted and wish to aggregate such service with Military service should complete Army Form B.2068.

Those who rendered qualifying civilian service of less than three years after retirement or discharge from the armed Forces and wish to aggregate military service with it, should obtain form D.M.4 from a Post Office, fill It in and send it to the appropriate Service Record Office or Service Department. When the certified D.M.4 is returned to the claimant he should attach it to form D.M.2 when making a claim to the authority shown in paragraph 15 responsible for the later service.

## Home Guard Service

11. Ex-members of the Home Guard whose most recent qualifying service was rendered in the Home Guard, should obtain Army Form B.2068 from a Post Office and, on completion, should send it to the appropriate County Territorial Army Association concerned (in Northern Ireland, the Inspector General, Royal Ulster Constabulary, or the appropriate County Commandant, Ulster Special Constabulary).

Those who rendered qualifying civilian service before becoming members of the Home Guard and wish to aggregate such service with Home Guard service must obtain a certificate on form D.M.3, and attach it to Army Form B.2068 when sending the claim to the County Territorial Army Association.

Those who rendered qualifying service in the Army before becoming members of the Home Guard and wish to aggregate such previous service with Home Guard service, must obtain a certificate on Part III of Army Form B.2068. If qualifying service was in the Navy or Royal Air Force a certificate should be obtained by application by letter to the Admiralty. Whitehall, or the Air Ministry or R.A.F. Record Office and attached to A.F. B.2068 when sending the claim to the County Territorial Army Association.

Those who rendered qualifying civilian service of less than three years after leaving the Home Guard and wish to aggregate Home Guard service with it, should obtain form D.M.4 from a Post Office, fill it in and send it to the appropriate County Territorial Army Association. When the certified D.M.4 is returned to the claimant he should attach it to form D.M.2 when making a claim to the authority shown in paragraph 15 responsible for the later service.

## Notification of Award

12. The result of the claim will be notified to the claimant. If the claim is approved, the ribbon of the Defence Medal will be despatched to the address given by the claimant on form D.M.2, or on the Navy or Royal Air Force letter of application or Army Form B.2068, as the case may be. Owing to other demands on manufacturing capacity, the production of the Medal cannot be undertaken for some considerable time. Arrangements for the issue of the Medal will be announced when the time arrives.

## Non-operational Service in the Forces Overseas

13. Non-operational service in the Forces overseas from or outside the country of residence is a qualification for the award of the Defence Medal and the time qualification is one year, reduced to six months in some islands in the Pacific. Such time amounting to less than a year, or six months as the case may be, may be added at its actual time value to service of less than three years at home. It will not, for instance, be multiplied by three.

## **Disgualification and Forfeiture**

14. Persons who were dismissed or discharged from civilian service on account of misconduct, who left civilian 10. C.D. Gas Identification Service. service in contravention of an Order made under Defence Regulations, or who failed persistently to perform duty which they were under obligation to perform shall be liable to be disqualified for the Defence Medal to which

Those who rendered previous Home Guard Service they might otherwise be entitled. Persons who are awarded the Defence Medal and are subsequently found guilty of grave misconduct may be required to forfeit the Medal.

## **Eligible Categories**

15. Categories (other than serving members of the Armed Forces or the Women's Auxiliary Services) in the United Kingdom eligible for the award of the Defence Medal and addresses to which claims should be sent.

Category and address for claims

Category No Ex-members of the Armed Forces or of the Women's Military 1. Auxiliary Services.

Send claims to the Admiralty, Whitehall (by letter of application), the appropriate Army Record Office (Army Form B.2068 should be used), or the Air Ministry or R.A.F. Record Office (by letter of application).

2. Home Guard.




## CERTIFICATION OF EARLIER CIVILIAN SERVICE





I have the honour to transmit to you the becompanying copies of a notice issued by the Ministry of War Transport regarding the regulations governing the award of Campaign Stars and War Medal to Merchant Seamen resident in Colonial territories. Copies of forms of application and of instructions, which have been prepared by the Ministry of War Transport, for the guidance of Colonial authorities in dealing with applications are also enclosed.

In view of the difficulties which may prise in verifying whether or not the service claimed has actually been performed it is proposed that all undication forms, when completed, should be forwarded with the optropriate certificates to me for transmission to the Registrar General of Shipping and Seamen, who will issue the ribbons to which the applicants are entitled and maintain the necessary records for use when the Campaign Stars and War Medals are available for issue.

In regard to Colonial Scamen employed in local waters, it will not usually be possible for the Registrar General of Shipping and Seamen to verify the services claimed and he will therefore have to rely on the certificates issued by the local authorities. In these circumstances it is desirable that the responsible officer issuing the certificates should satisfy himself that the service claimed by applicants has in fact been rendered.

### CAMPAIGN STARS AND WAR MIDAL 1939-45.

# Issue of Ribbons and Mablens to Officers and men of the Morchant Navy who are domiciled in the Colonies.

(1) There is attached for information and guidance, a copy of <u>Ministry of Transport Notice H.279</u> (Revised) relating to the award of the 1939-45 Star, Africa Star, Atlantic Star, Italy Star, France and Germany Star, Pacific Star, Burna Star and the War Medal 1939-45, and also the Clasps to the Campaign Stars, to recognise services rendered by H.M. Forces and the Merchant Navy during the recent war.

(2) The qualifications required for the award of the Campaign Stars, and Clasps, and the War Hodal to officers and men of the Morchant Navy are set out in the Notice.

(5) It will be observed that, subject to certain exceptions mentioned in the Notice, six nonths service at sea (qualifying for the 1939-45 Star) must have been completed before a seaman can qualify for the Italy, Pacific or Burne Stars. Similarly there must have been six months' service at sea (qualifying for the 1959-45 Star) before a seaman could begin to qualify for the Atlantic Star, for which a further six months' service at sea is normally required (see paragraph 8'. The Africa Star and the France and Germany Star may, however, have been carned even if six months' service at sea had not proviously been rendered.

(4) The only Stars for which a period of sea service is required are the 1939-45 Star and the Atlantic Star. In the case of the 1939-45 Star, six months' service at sea (with at least one voyage through one of the specified danger zones) is required. Where the service has been in vessels employed wholly or mainly in harbours or estuaries, it is necessary for the applicant to show that he performed in the aggregate not less than six months' service outside sheltered waters or protected anchorages. Service on N.124 and similar Agreements may be taken into account, but men still serving on such Agreements should be told that their applications should be made to their Conmending Officers.

(5) If the applicant is unable to produce discharge papers in support of his claim for the 1939-45 Star and the service claimed is not of the nature which can be verified from records maintained by the Colonial Authorities, or by the Registrar General of Shipping and Seamen, the applicant should be informed that his claim cannot be admitted unless it is supported by a certificate furnished by his employers (or Neval Authority responsible) in the following terms:-

"I hereby certify that Mr. while serving as (rank or rating) in the s.s. performed not less than six months' service outside sheltered waters and protected anchorages during the period of 3rd September 1939 to 2nd September 1945.

Pilots who are employed full-time on pilotage work, may qualify for the 1939-45 Star in accordance with these arrangements.

(6) The six months' sea service required for the Atlantic Star cannot run concurrently with service qualifying for the 1939+4.5 Star, which must be earned before a seaman can begin to qualify for the Atlantic Star. As stated

in Notice M.279 (Revised) the Atlantic Star is intended, so far as Merchant Navy ships are concerned, for convoys and fast ships that sailed alone. Service in vessels which were employed in, or in the vicinity of, harbours or estuarial: waters, or in particular localities, cannot be regarded as qualifying service for the Atlantic Star. Pilots are not eligible for this Star unless they rendered the necessary service, (i.e. an aggregate of six months' service) while actually employed as a pilot at sea outside the Pilotage District in which they were normally employed. If discharge certificates are not available, it will be necessary for the applicant to furnish full particulars of voyages which he claims to have made during the qualifying period.

(7) It will be noted that in general a seamen with less than six months' sea service whose service was terminated by death, injury or other disability arising out of service, or a seaman who is granted an honour, may be regarded as qualifying for the 1939-45 Star and for the Star of the Zone in which he was serving at the time the death occurred, the injury was sustained, or the honour was earned. He may also be cligible for the Africa Star or the France and Germany Star if he served in those areas during the prescribed periods, subject always to the limitations haid down in paragraph 8.9.

(8) Special attention is drawn to paragraphs 13(d), 20(d), and 23(d) of the Notice. It is the intention that a seaman who did not qualify for the 1939-45 Star on the 8th May 1945 (i.e. the end of active hostilities in Europe) may, if serving in the Merchant Navy on that date, be awarded the Star appropriate to the area (other than the Pacific or Burma) in which he was serving at that date. Similarly, a seaman serving in the Pacific and Burma areas on the 2nd September 1945, may, if he did not qualify for the 1939-45 Star, be awarded the Star appropriate to the area in which he was serving on that date.

(9) It will be noted that the Atlantic Star and the France and Germany Star are alternative, and the Pacific Star and the Burma Star are also alternative. In these cases, the Star first earned will be awarded with a Clasp to denote that the second Star has been earned where this is the case. It is therefore essential that particular attention should be directed to the chronological order of the service rendered by applicants.

(10) With regard to the War Medal 1939-15, it will be observed that, in the Merchant Navy, twenty-eight days' service at sea between the 3rd September, 1939, and 2nd September, 1945, will qualify, but that in certain circumstances, the War Medal may be granted for sea service of less than twenty-eight days provided that one of the Campaign Stars has been carned.

(11) Applications may be accepted from British officers and men who have the necessary qualifying service on British vessels or on foreign vessels on charter to H.M. Government.

(12) Applications should not be accepted from Dominion or other seamen who are not domiciled in the Colony in which application is made. In general, the Campaign Stars are issued by the Government of the country in which the seamen is domiciled and applications should normally be made to the appropriate Authority in that country.

(13) Applications may also be accepted from Allied or other foreign seamen domiciled in the Colonies who performed the necessary qualifying service as <u>individuals</u> in British merchant ships, or in foreign ships chartered on bare boat charters by H.M. Government, flying the British flag and with crews serving under British conditions. Applications should not be accepted from Allied seamen who have served in the British Merchant Nevy by virtue of their membership of Allied Merchant Navies e.g. Free French serving in ships flying the British flag and manned by Free French crews.

(14) The right to the Campaign Stars and Clasps and the War Medal may be forified by reason of misconduct during the war. Then applications are made the opplicants' records of service (Dis.A.etc.) should be carefully scrutinised and in all cases where it appears that an applicant has during the war deserted or failed to join or has been given adverse reports for conduct, or has been discharged from the Merchant Navy on account of misconduct, the application should be referred for consideration. 766

(15) The procedure to be followed in dealing with applications should be as follows:-

- (a) An applicant for any of the Compaign Stars and Clasps, and the War Medal must complete part 1 of form CRS.109.
   Supplies of this form are being sent to all Colonies.
   Further supplies can be obtained through the Colonial Office in London.
- (b) Applicants should be required to produce their Dis. A or other discharge certificate from which the service claimed should if possible be checked.
- (c) If the responsible Officer is satisfied that the conditions are not, he will complete part 2(a) of form CRS.109. Where the responsible Officer is unable to verify that the service has been sufficient to warrant the issue of all the awards claimed, or is doubtful whether the service claimed qualifies for an award, he should complete part 2(b), as well as part 2(a) if appropriate, of OKS.109. On completion, the form should be forwarded to the Colonial Office for transmission to the Registrar General of Shipping and Seamen.
  - (d) The Registrar General of Shipping and Seamen will issue ribbons and Emblems which will be forwarded to the Colonial Authorities for disposal. They will be accompanied by forms CRS.102.
     If a seamen who holds CRS.102 applies to the Shipping Office for the awards to be noted in his Discharge Book, the Shipping Master should comply with the request and impress the Office stamp. CRS.102 should be retained by the seaman.

(16) Form CRS.109 was printed bofore the War Medal 1939-45 was instituted. Pending a reprint of the form, the responsible officer, when issuing application forms should make the following chandments

- (a) Paragraph 8 should read "1939-45 Star and/or War Medal 1939-45".
- (b) In Part 2(a), "(n) The Mar Medal 1939-45" should be inserted.
- (c) The cortificates in Part 2(a) and (b) should be appropriately amonded.

#### NOTICE TO MASTERS, OFFICERS AND SEAMEN OF MERCHANT SHIPS

# CAMPAIGN STARS AND WAR MEDAL 1939-45

The King has been graciously pleased to approve the institution of a War Medal for service during the 1939-45 war and the variation of qualifications for the award of the Stars previously instituted.

2. Members of the Merchant Navy are eligible for the following Campaign Stars and Clasps if they have rendered the necessary sea-going service. The qualifications required are set out in the following paragraphs.

1939-45 STAR.

3. The ribbon of the 1939-45 Star, which is the same for all Services, is dark blue, red and light blue in three equal vertical stripes. The dark blue stripe is intended to mark the service of the Naval Forces, the Merchant Navy and Fishing Fleet; the red stripe that of the Armies and the light blue stripe that of the Air Forces. The ribbon is to be worn with the dark blue stripe farthest from the left shoulder.

4. The qualifications for the award of the 1939-45 Star in the Merchant Navy are:—

(a) Six months' service at sea, provided that at least one voyage was made through one of the following danger zones—

(i) from 3rd September, 1939, to 31st May, 1940:---

The Atlantic Ocean, including Home Waters and the North Sea: Baltic, Arctic Ocean between Greenland and longitude 70°E and that part of the Indian Ocean lying South of 15°S and West of 55°E.

(ii) from 1st June, 1940, to 9th June, 1940: ----

As (i) with the addition of the Pacific Ocean and the rest of the Indian Ocean.

(iv) From 9th May, 1945, to 2nd September, 1945:-

The Pacific Ocean, including the South China Sea and the Indian Ocean and the Bay of Bengal, east of a line running from the southernmost point of Ceylon for a distance of 300 miles south thence to a point 300 miles west of the southernmost point of Sumatra and continuing east to the western side of Sunda Strait thence through Christmas 2

Island and southwards along Meridian 110°E. (Most of the, Indian Ocean is excluded.)

If six months' service at sea has not been rendered the 1939-45 Star will be awarded only in the following circumstances—

(b) Service as Master or member of the crew of a vessel which took part in the evacuation at Dunkirk.

(c) Service at sea brought to an end by death, injury or other disability arising out of service, provided one voyage was made through one of the danger zones.

(d) A grant for service in dangerous waters of an Honour Decoration, Mention in Despatches or Commendation for Brave Conduct.

5. Time spent as a prisoner of war consequent on service at sea in dangerous waters will count towards the six months' qualifying period for the award of the 1939-45 Star.

6. Subject to certain exceptions defined later in this Notice those who have already been awarded the 1939-45 Star for less than six months' qualifying service (see paragraph 4 (b), (c) or (d) above) will be required to complete a total of six months' qualifying service before becoming eligible for the Atlantic, Italy, Pacific and Burma Stars. Similarly those who have not already earned the 1939-45 Star will be required to qualify for it by six months' qualifying service. before becoming eligible for one of these Stars. For the award of the Africa Star and the France and Germany Star it is not imperative that the 1939-45 Star should already have been earned.

AFRICA STAR.

7. The Africa Star will now be granted in addition to the 1939-45 Star to those who have qualified for both Stars.

8. The ribbon of the Africa Star is pale buff in colour with a central vertical red stripe and two other narrower stripes, one dark blue and the other light blue. The background is intended as a symbol of the desert, the central red stripe stands for the Armies, the dark blue stripe for the Naval Forces, the Merchant Navy and Fishing Fleet and the light blue stripe for the Air Forces. The ribbon is to be worn with the dark blue stripe furthest from the left shoulder.

9. In the Merchant Navy, service of any length at sea in the Mediterranean between the date of the entry of Italy into the War on the 10th June, 1940, to the date of the cessation of operations against the enemy in North Africa on the 12th May, 1943, inclusive or in direct support of the Army in the Abyssinian, Somaliland and Eritrean Campaigns between the 10th June, 1940, and the 27th November, 1941, will qualify. Service in Merchant Navy vessels which took part in the landings on the Coast of Morocco on or after the 8th November, 1942, will also be a qualification. CLASP TO THE AFRICA STAR.

To. The Clasp to the Africa Star, denoted by the silver rose Emblem, will be granted to members of the Merchant Navy who served in vessels engaged in landing troops, equipment, stores, etc., a orts, or on the shores, of North Africa between el Alamein and the Straits of Gibraltar, during the North Africa Campaign from the 23rd October, 1942 (the date of the Battle of el Alamein) to the cessation of hostilities in North Africa on the 12th May, 1943, irrespective of the length of that service. Service in ships which took part in the landings on or after the 8th November, 1942, on the Coast of Morocco will also be a qualification.

#### THE ATLANTIC STAR.

II. The Atlantic Star is intended to commemorate the Battle of the Atlantic and is designed primarily for convoys and their escorts and anti-Submarine forces as well as for fast merchant ships that sailed alone.

12. The ribbon of the Atlantic Star is blue, white and sea green, shaded and watered, the design being intended as a symbol of service in the Atlantic. The ribbon is to be worn with the blue edge furthest from the left shoulder.

13. In the Merchant Navy the qualifications for the award of the Atlantic Star are: -

(a) The 1939-45 Star must have been earned by six months' service at sea and there must be a further six months' service anywhere at sea rendered since the 3rd September, 1939, and until the 8th May, 1945, with one or more voyages in the following area during the second six months: —

the Atlantic and/or Home Waters, including service in convoys to North Russia and service in the South Atlantic West of longitude 20°E.

If twelve months' service at sea has not been rendered, the Atlantic Star will be awarded only in the following circumstances: —

(b) Service specified in paragraph 13 (a) brought to an end by death, wounds or other disability arising out of service.

(c) Service at sea in the area specified in paragraph 13 (a) marked by an Honour, Decoration, Mention in Despatches or Commendation for Brave Conduct.

(d) Seamen who have not already earned the 1939-45 Star but who served in the Merchant Navy at sea in the area specified in paragraph 13 (a) during the last six months of operational service up to the 8th May, 1945, will qualify for the Atlantic Star, provided that service was not subsequently rendered in another operational area. The 1939-45 Star will not be awarded in such cases.

14. Time spent as a prisoner of war, consequent on service at sea in dangerous waters will count towards the six months' qualifying period for the award of the Atlantic Star, provided that at the time of capture the 1939-45 Star had been earned by six months' service at sea and one voyage had subsequently been made through the area specified in paragraph 13 (a).

15. Service in local coastal craft is excluded, as this will be recognised by the award of the 1939-45 Star.



#### CLASP TO THE ATLANTIC STAR

16. Merchant Navy personnel who qualify for the Atlantic Star and the France and Germany Star (see paragraph 21 below) will be awarded only the Star first earned. A Clasp will be awarded with it denoting that the service which would have qualified for the second Star has been rendered. A Silver rose Emblem will be worn to denote the award of the France and Germany or the Atlantic Clasp as the case may be.

#### THE ITALY STAR

17. The Italy Star will be granted for entry into operational service in the Italian Campaign.

18. The ribbon of the Italy Star is in the Italian colours, green, white and red. There are five vertical stripes of equal width, one in red on either edge and one in green at the centre, the two intervening stripes being in white.

19. The Italy Star will be awarded for service at sea in the Mediterranean during the campaign subsequent to the capture of Pantellaria on the 11th June, 1943, and until the 8th May, 1945, irrespective of the length of that service, provided the service was directly connected with active operations in the Mediterranean theatre, including those in the Aegean and the South of France.

20. In the Merchant Navy the qualifications for the Italy Star are: ---

(a) The 1939-45 Star must have been earned by six months' service at sea and be followed by service in a vessel landing troops, stores, etc., at ports in, or on the shores of, the Mediterranean, excluding those in Spain, the Balearic Islands, North Africa, Palestine, Syria, Turkey (East of 30°E) and in Cyprus. Service in vessels passing through the Mediterranean will not be a qualification.

If six months' service at sea has not been rendered, the Italy Star will be awarded only in the following circumstances:-

(b) Service specified in paragraph 20 (a), terminated by death, wounds or other disability arising out of service.

(c) Service specified in paragraph 20 (a) marked by an Honour, Decoration, Mention in Despatches or Commendation for Brave Conduct.

(d) Service specified in paragraph 20 (a) during the last six months of operational service up to the 8th May, 1945, provided that service was not subsequently rendered in another operational area. The 1939-45 Star will not be awarded in such cases.

#### THE FRANCE AND GERMANY STAR.

21. The France and Germany Star will be granted for entry into operational service on land from the 6th June, 1944, until the 8th May, 1945, in France, Belgium, Holland or Germany.

22. The ribbon of the France and Germany Star is the red, white and blue of the Union Flag, and these colours are also used as a symbol of France and the Netherlands. There are five vertical stripes of equal width, one in blue at either edge and one in red at the centre, the two intervening stripes being in white.

23. In the Merchant Navy, the qualifications for the France and Germany Star are: ---

Service, irrespective of the length of that service, in the following area provided it was directly in support of land operations in France, Belgium, Holland, Germany, etc. (i.e. service in Merchant Navy vessels taking troops, stores, etc., into Continental waters) :---

The North Sea south of a line from the Firth of Forth to Kristiansand (South), in the English Channel or the Bay of Biscay cast of longitude 6°W.

24. Merchant Navy service in the Mediterranean in support of operations in the South of France will not be a qualification. Such service will qualify for the Italy Star.

#### CLASP TO THE FRANCE AND GERMANY STAR.

25. The France and Germany Star will not be awarded in addition to the Atlantic Star. If a candidate should qualify for both of these Stars, the Star first earned will be awarded. If the France and Germany Star is awarded under these conditions a Clasp will be awarded for service which would qualify for the Atlantic Star. A silver rose Emblem will be worn to denote the award of this Clasp.

#### THE PACIFIC STAR.

26. The Pacific Star will be awarded for entry into operational services in the Pacific theatre from the 8th December, 1941, until the 2nd September, 1945.

27. The ribbon of the Pacific Star is dark green with red edges and with a central yellow stripe. There are also two other narrow stripes, one dark blue and the other light blue. The green and yellow stand for the forests and beaches of the Pacific, the red edges for the Armies, the dark blue stripe for the Naval Forces and the Merchant Navies, and the light blue stripe for the Air The ribbon is to be worn with the dark blue stripe Forces. furthest from the left shoulder.

28. In the Merchant Navy, the qualifications for the Pacific Star are: ---

(a) The 1939-45 Star must have been earned by six months' service at sea and be followed by service on or after the 8th December, 1941, irrespective of the length of that service in the following area: -

The Pacific Ocean, including the South China Sea and the Indian Ocean east of a line running due south from Singapor round the south east coast of Sumatra, through Christmu Island and southwards along the Meridian of 110° E.

If less than six months' service at sea has been rendered the Pacific Star will be awarded only in the following circumstances: —

(b) Service specified in paragraph 28 (a) terminated by death, wounds or other disability arising out of service.

(c) Service specified in paragraph 28 (a) marked by an Honour, Decoration, Mention in Despatches or Commendation for Brave Conduct.

(d) Service specified in paragraph 28 (a) during the last six months of operational service up to the 2nd September, 1945, provided that service was not subsequently rendered in another operational area. The 1939-45 Star will not be awarded in such cases.

CLASP TO THE PACIFIC STAR.

29. Merchant Navy personnel who qualify for both the Pacific Star and the Burma Star mentioned below, will be awarded only one of these, the Star first earned. A Clasp will be awarded with it denoting that service which would have qualified for the other Star has been rendered. A silver rose Emblem will be worn to denote the award of the Burma or Pacific Clasp as the case may be.

#### THE BURMA STAR.

30. The Burma Star will be awarded for entry into operational service in the Burma campaign from the 11th December, 1941, until the 2nd September, 1945.

31. The ribbon of the Burma Star is dark blue with a central red stripe, and in addition two orange stripes. The red stands for the British Commonwealth Forces, and the orange for the sun, and these are placed on a contrasting background of dark blue.

(a) the 1939-45 Star must have been earned by six months' service at sea and be followed by service on or after the 11th December, 1941, irrespective of the length of that service, in the following area: —

The Bay of Bengal enclosed by a line running from the southernmost point of Ceylon for a distance of 300 miles south, thence to a point 300 miles west of the southernmost point of Sumatra, and continuing east to the western side of Sunda Strait. The Malacca Strait is included.

(b) Service specified in paragraph 32 (a) terminated by death, wounds or other disability arising out of service.

(c) Service specified in paragraph 32 (a) marked by an Honour, Decoration, Mention in Despatches or Commendation for Brave Conduct.

(d) Service specified in paragraph 32 (a) during the last six iths of operational service up to the 2nd September, 1945, provided that service was not subsequently rendered in another operational area. The 1939-45 Star will not be awarded in such cases.

33. Service in Merchant Navy vessels passing through the area specified in paragraph 32 (a) will not be a qualification.

CLASP TO THE BURMA STAR.

34. The Burma Star will not be awarded in addition to the Pacific Star. If a candidate should qualify for both, the Star first earned will be awarded. A Clasp will be awarded with it denoting that service which would have qualified for the other Star has been rendered. A silver rose Emblem will denote the award of this Clasp.

#### GENERAL

35. Although time spent as a prisoner of war consequent on service at sea in dangerous waters may be counted towards the qualifying period for the award of the 1939-45 Star, and of the Atlantic Star provided that an individual had at the time of his capture begun to earn that Star and had made one or more voyages in the area defined in paragraph 13 (a) after completion of service required for the award of the 1939-45 Star, such time will not be counted towards the period of six months' qualifying service which must be completed before the grant of the Italy, Pacific and Burma Stars may be authorised.

36. Service qualifying for the 1939-45 Star cannot run concurrently with service qualifying for the Italy, Atlantic, Pacific and Burma Stars. In calculating the six months' service at sea required for the 1939-45 Star no deduction will be made of the time spent in operational areas entitling the applicant to the Africa Star and the France and Germany Star. Similarly, in calculating the second six months' service at sea required for the Atlantic Star no deduction will be made for the time spent in operational areas entitling the applicant to another Campaign Star.

WAR MEDAL

37. The War Medal 1939-45 will be granted to full time personnel of the Armed Forces and the Merchant Navy.

38. The ribbon of the War Medal is in the red, white and blue of the Union Flag. There is a narrow central red stripe with a narrow white stripe on either side. There are broad red stripes at either edge, the two intervening stripes being in blue.

39. In the Merchant Navy the qualifications for the award of the War Medal are: --

(a) 28 days' service anywhere at sea between the 3rd September, 1939, and the 2nd September, 1945.

(b) Sea going service brought to an end by death, wound br other disability attributable to service, capture by the enemy or cessation of hostilities on the 2nd September, 1945, even though the service may not amount to 28 days in all. This incession will not apply to an individual who does not qualify for a Campaign Star.

(c) When the 1939-45 Star or one of the other Campaign Stars has been awarded for sea going service of less than 28 days the War Medal will be granted in addition.

MENTIONS IN DESPATCHES AND KING'S COMMENDATIONS.

40. The single bronze oak leaf Emblem signifying a Mention in Despatches, or a King's Commendation for brave conduct, which is at present attached directly to the coat after all the ribbons, or by itself, should, if granted for service in the war of 1939-45, be worn on the ribbon of the War Medal. GENERAL.

41. Pending the manufacture and the issue of the Stars and the War Medal the ribbons and Emblems only will be supplied.

42. The right to the Stars and Clasps and to the War Medal may be forfeited by reason of misconduct during the war.

43. The Stars and Clasps and the War Medal earned by officers and ratings who have not lived to receive them will, in due course, be issued to the legatees or next-of-kin entitled to receive them. The ribbon will not be sent in advance to the legatee or next-ofkin.

44. The Stars and the War Medal and the ribbons of the Stars and the War Medal should be worn in the following order, working outwards towards the left shoulder:—

1939-45 Star. Atlantic Star. Africa Star. Pacific Star. Burma Star. Italy Star. France and Germany Star. War Medal.

45. Applications for the ribbon of the Stars and Emblems should be made to Mercantile Marine Offices on a form which can be obtained at any of those Offices. If application cannot be made in person at a Mercantile Marine Office, application should be made by post to the Registrar-General of Shipping and Seamen, Llantrisant Road, Cardiff, Wales. Personnel resident in the Dominions whose qualifying service was on Dominion registered ships should apply to the Dominion Authorities.

### KING'S COMMENDATIONS

1. (i) The Committee on the Grant of Honours, Decorations and Medals have had under consideration the need for the recognition by some general award or awards of service in specified operations in the South-East Asia Command after 2nd September, 1945, and also of service in minesweeping and mine clearance generally since that date and since the conclusion of hostilities in Europe.

(ii) Their recommendations have been duly submitted to The King, who has been advised by the Prime Minister on matters likely to give rise to difference of opinion. His Majesty has now graciously approved the recommendations set out below. The manufacture and issue of the Medals themselves will be undertaken when circumstances permit. The ribbons will be issued as soon as supplies are ready.

2. The Pacific Star and the War Medal 1939-45 will not be granted for any service after 2nd September, 1945. Consideration has been given to the possibility of recommending the institution of a new General Service Medal. There would be something to be said for starting the post-war era with a new award common to all co-operating Forces. There are, however, some obvious objections to the creation of a new award or new awards soon after the institution of a large number of Campaign Stars and Medals, and approval has been given for the award of the two current General Service Medals with an appropriate Clasp or Clasps. For specified service in the Navy, as described below, the Naval General Service Medal, instituted in 1915, will be awarded. For specified Army or Air Force service, the General Service Medal (Army and Royal Air Force) instituted in 1918, will be granted.

# SERVICE IN OPERATIONS IN THE SOUTH-EAST ASIA COMMAND

#### Navy

3. (i) In the Naval Forces the qualifying period will be, for officers and ratings afloat, a total of 28 days in close support of Army operations as defined in paragraph 4 below. Service in trooping ships, for instance, will not be a qualification.

(ii) Close support of Army operations means service within five miles of any qualifying land operational areas as defined in paragraph 4 below. Any day, part of which was spent in close support of the Army, will be reckoned as a qualifying day.

(iii) Officers and ratings of the Navy who were landed from ships for operational duty ashore, or who served ashore, in the qualifying land operational areas as defined in paragraph 4 below, will qualify under Army rules. (iv) For official visits, inspections, &c. on duty in the land operational areas the time gualification will be one week.

(v) Naval air crew will qualify under Air Force rules, *c.g.*, by one operational sortie over the land operational area as defined in paragraph 4 below. (v) The grant for gallantry on a specific occasion during the uncompleted qualifying period, not amounting to 28 days, of a British Honour, Decoration or Medal of the status of the British Empire Medal or above or a Mention in Despatches or King's Commendation, will qualify the recipient for the General Service Medal.

(vii) If qualifying service is brought to an end before the completion of 28 days, on account of death or evacuation owing to wounds or other disability due to service, the reduced period of service will be sufficient qualification for the award.

#### Army

4. (i) The qualification in the Army will be entry into the land operational area as defined below.

- (ii) The qualifying land operational areas for the Army are:
- (a) Java and Sumatra from 3rd September, 1945, until the final date of withdrawal, 30th November, 1946, inclusive.
- (b) French Indo-China from 3rd September, 1945, until 28th January. 1946, inclusive. (Although the French assumed command on 1st January, 1946, British troops subsequently remained operational under French overall command. The date of 28th January has been selected as the date on which Major-General Gracey handed over command to Brigadier Maunsell, at which time the British forces in French Indo-China had been largely transferred.)

(iii) For official visits, inspections, &c., on duty in the land operational areas defined in sub-paragraph (ii) above the time qualification will be one week.

#### Air Force

5. (i) In the Air Force, for air crew, one operational sortie over the land operational areas defined in paragraph 4 above will be a qualification.

(ii) Transport service by air crew who flew in connection with the removal of internees and prisoners of war in South-East Asia to Singapore or other ports for onward shipment, between 3rd September, 1945, and 4th October, 1945, is a qualification. One sortie in the defined service will qualify.

(iii) This transport service included Java, Sumatra, Malaya, Siam, French Indo-China and the Andaman Islands and was undertaken by air crew based outside the qualifying land operational areas defined in paragraph 4 above.

(iv) Non-air crew personnel of the Air Force serving in the land operational areas defined in paragraph 4 above will qualify under Army rules.

(v) For official visits, inspections, &c., on duty in the land operational areas defined in paragraph 4 above the time qualification will be one week.

(vi) Non-air crew personnel who did not serve in the land operational areas referred to in paragraph 4 above, but belonged to Air Force units which carried out qualifying operational sorties under sub-paragraphs (i) and (ii) above will qualify. The time qualification will be one month.

(vii) Navy or Army personnel, or Air Force non-operational personnel, who served ashore in co-operation with the Air Force units mentioned in subparagraph (vi) above, and not in the qualifying land operational areas defined in paragraph 4 above, will not qualify.

(viii) Non-air crew personnel who will qualify under-sub-paragraph (vi) above must have rendered one month's service in any of the undermentioned operational units not based in the land operational areas, within the dates indicated :—

(d) No. 321 Squadron is a Netherlands squadron and only British personnel, if any, which served with the unit will be eligible for consideration, as Dutch personnel will be eligible for awards from their own Government. Some units appear under more than one heading because their activities were not confined to one operational area or to the operation in sub-paragraph (c) above.

(ix) The zones in which the operational units shown in sub-paragraph (viii) above were based between the dates indicated, and outside the qualifying land operational areas defined in paragraph 4 above, were as follows:—

The whole of Burma and the Indian provinces of Bengal and Assam.

(x) The grant to non-air crew personnel referred to in sub-paragraph (vi), (viii) and (ix) above for gallantry on a specific occasion during the uncompleted qualifying period, not amounting to a month, of a British Honour, Decoration or Medal of the status of British Empire Medal or above or a Mention in Despatches or King's Commendation, will qualify the recipients for the General Service Medal.

(xi) If qualifying service by non-air crew personnel referred to in subparagraphs (vi), (viii) and (ix) above is brought to an end before the completion of one month, on account of death or evacuation owing to disability due to service, the reduced period of service will be sufficient qualification for the award.

Clasps

6. The Clasps for the above services will bear the inscription "S.E. Asia, 1945-6," or "South-East Asia, 1945-6."

### MINESWEEPING. BOMB AND MINE CLEARANCE

#### Navy

7. (i) Naval minesweeping service affoat will be a qualification for the Naval General Service Medal. The time qualification will be six months since 3rd September, 1945, inclusive.

(ii) Although the War Medal, 1939–45, is granted for service up to 2nd September, 1945, wherever the service was rendered, Naval minesweeping service afloat in Home, Atlantic or Mediterranean waters in the period 9th May to 2nd September, 1945, may also be reckoned towards the total qualifying period of six months.

(iii) The minesweeping zones and probable length of operations are as follows:-

(iv) The grant of a British Honour, Decoration or Medal of the status of the British Empire Medal or above or a Mention in Despatches or a King's Commendation for minesweeping service in a qualifying period and zone, when there has been some qualifying service but this is short of six months, will qualify the recipient for the General Service Medal.

(v) If qualifying service is brought to an end before the completion of six months, on account of death or evacuation owing to wounds or other disability due to service, the reduced period of service will be sufficient qualification for the award.

#### Army

8. (i) At the same time six months', *i.e.*, 180 days', bomb and mine clearance ashore by the Army since 3rd September, 1945, inclusive, will be a qualification.

(ii) Although the War Medal 1939-45 is granted for service up to 2nd September, 1945, wherever the service was rendered, bomb and mine clearance ashore by the Army during the period 9th May to 2nd September, 1945, in the qualifying area for the General Service Medal defined below will also be reckoned towards the total qualifying period of six months (180 days).

(iii) Unexploded bombs were distributed all over the United Kingdom, including Northern Ireland, and beach minefields were laid along many stretches of the coast of the United Kingdom. The qualifying area will be anywhere in England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland.

(iv) Since the first qualifying date, viz., 9th May, 1945, Bomb Disposal Units, R.E., have been engaged solely on the clearance of unexploded bombs and beach minefields. Personnel take tours of duty at one or the other of the two tasks. Work is not likely to be completed before the end of February 1948. The closing date will be fixed in due course.

(v) To qualify for the award a soldier must have been actively engaged for an aggregate of not less than 180 days on the actual excavation down to, removal of, or final disposal of, unexploded bombs or on clearance operations inside the perimeter fencing of live minefields, on the disarming of live mines, or acting as water-jet operator. Other service in a Unit engaged on bomb disposal or heach mine clearance will not be counted as qualifying service.

(vi) The grant of a British Honour, Decoration or Medal of the status of the British Empire Medal or above or a Mention in Despatches or a King's Commendation for mine or bomb clearance in a qualifying period and zone, when there has been some qualifying service but this is short of 180 days, will qualify the recipient for the General Service Medal.

(vii) If qualifying service is brought to an end before the completion of 180 days on account of death or owing to wounds or other disability due to service the reduced period of service will be sufficient qualification for the award. 9. Any Officers, ratings or airmen of the Navy or Air Force engaged on bomb or mine clearance on land will qualify under the same conditions as those for the Army.

#### Clasps

10. The Clasp to the Naval General Service Medal for the above service will bear the inscription "Minesweeping, 1945–7." The Clasp to the General Service Medal will be inscribed "Bomb and Mine Clearance, 1945–8."

### MENTIONS IN DESPATCHES

#### KING'S COMMENDATIONS

÷

11. (i) A Mention in Despatches in the First World War, 1914–18, is denoted by the wearing of the bronze oak leaf Emblem of many leaves. It was granted up to 10th August, 1920. A Mention in Despatches in the Second World War. 1939–45, is denoted by the single bronze oak leaf Emblem.

(ii) The single bronze oak leaf Emblem will now be worn by those mentioned in despatches for operational service in the period between the two World Wars, that is, from August 1920 to 2nd September, 1939, and for service after the cessation of hostilities in the Second World War.

(iii) In this way the single bronze oak leaf Emblem will be worn by those, granted a Mention in Despatches for service in one or other of the campaigns between the two World Wars, for instance, Waziristan 1921–24, Burma 1930–32, North-West Frontier 1935, &c., and for service in Palestine in the period from 19th April, 1936, to 2nd September, 1939. The Emblem will be worn on the ribbon of the Naval General Service Medal (1915), the General Service Medal (Army and Royal Air Force) (1918) or the India General Service Medal (1908 or 1936).

(iv) Similarly the Emblem will be worn on one or other of the first two named General Service Medal ribbons to denote a Mention in Despatches granted for service, for instance, in the Netherlands East Indies since 2nd September, 1945, or for minesweeping or mine clearance work since 8th May in the European theatre, and since 2nd September, 1945, in the Pacific, &c., theatre.

(v) In some instances a Mention in Despatches may have been granted to a person ineligible for the appropriate Medal. The Emblem will then be worn on the coat after all medal ribbons, or, should there be no other medal ribbons, in the position in which a single medal would be worn.

(vi) A King's Commendation for brave conduct or a King's Commendation for valuable service in the air granted for service in the Forces since the cessation of hostilities in 1945 will be indicated by the wearing of the single bronze oak leaf Emblem. When a King's Commendation for brave conduct is granted for service during duties for which a General Service Medal is awarded, the Emblem will be worn on the ribbon in the same way as an Emblem indicating a Mention in Despatches. Otherwise the Emblem will be worn on the coat in the manner described in sub-paragraph (v) above.

(vii) Not more than one oak leaf Emblem will be worn on the ribbon of one Medal. Two or more Mentions in Despatches or King's Commendations for brave conduct for service during duty recognised by the same Medal will be marked by the wearing of one Emblem only.

I have the honour to transmit to you, for your information the accompanying Ilda copy of a notice which has been published in this country relating to the arrangements for the issue of Campaign Stars and Medals for services rendered in connection with the late war.

It will be observed that the arrangements concern primarily residents in 2. the United Kingdom and that residents overseas who are ex-members of United Kingdom forces are not required to make use of the postcards provided for applicants in this country but should apply by letter, giving full service particulars, to the headquarters of their respective services.

Claims in respect of service in Colonial local forces not administered by 3. the sar Office, Admiralty or Air Linistry, and in civil defence organisations, will be dealt with by the appropriate authorities in the territories concerned, and on my being furnished with nominal rolls of awards duly approved. of by you, accompanied by a statement of the numbers of Stars and Medals required, arrangements will be made for the necessary supplies to be sent to you in bulk for distribution to the recipients the cost is suc cases will be charged to Colonial funds.

### Campaign Stars and Clasps, the Defence Medal and the Jar Medal 1939-45.

The issue of Campaign Stars and Clasps, the Defence Medal and the Mar Medal awarded for service in the Car of 1939-45 will begin shortly.

Ex-Members of the Regular Army, the Royal Air Porce, and the Army and Air Force Women's Services, the Merchant Lavy and Home Guard. Hembers and ex-Members of the Supplementary Reserve and of the Perritorial Army.

Issues will be made to ex-members of the Regular Army, Royal Air Force, Army and Air Force Women's Services, Ecrebant Navy and Home Guard and to members and ex-members of the Supplementary Reserve and of the Territorial Army only on notification of the address, etc., on the appropriate card. Similar legatees or, in the absence of legatees, the next of kin, of deceased members of these pervices should use these cards. The chief reason for this is that up-to-date addresses would not otherwise be available.

The address should be notified only by means of one of the official post cards specially printed for the purpose. These will be obtainable, from any post office in the United Hingdom, including for therm Ireland.

The post eard for use in respect of service in the Regular Army, Army Momen's Services and Home Guard, the Supplementary Reserve and the Territorial Army is printed in black that for the R.A.M. and Air Force Momen's Services is printed in light blue and for the Merchant Mavy in green. Those eligible are asked to complete the appropriate card and post it as soon as possible.

Exception to this arrangement is made for the legated, or in the absence of a legated, the next of kin, of a deceased member of the Morchant Navy. These should fill in a special form which may be obtained from any Mercantile Marine Office. If application cannot be made in person at a Mercantile Marine Office a request for the form should be sent by post to the Registrar-General of Shipping and Jeamen, Llantrisant Road, Llandaff, Cardiff, Wales.

Serving Personnel of the Regular and Army omen's Services.

It is not necessary for serving personnel of the Regular Army and Army Women's Services to send in post cards. The Stars etc., will be issued through Units.

Serving personnel of the Royal Air Force and Air Force Momen's Services.

Those serving in the K.A.F. and Air Force Women's Services who have qualified for the Stars, etc., should complete and send in the official post card printed in light blue. Special arrangements have been made for those serving overseas.

Serving personnel of the Merchant Navy and Fishing Fleet.

Those serving in the Merchant Navy and Fishing Fleet who have qualified for the Stars, etc., should complete and send in the official post card printed in green.

Officers and Marrant Officers who belonged to the Indian Army or the Royal Indian Navy before August, 1947 (including Special List ex-Indian Service).

Officer (Naval or Military) and next of kin, etc., of deceased Officers even though already registered, should make use of the special Army post cards mentioned above, and address them to the Ear Office, Shitehall, London, S.W.1.. The letters "I.A." in large print should in all cases be inserted on the card after the name of "Last Regiment or Corps." Any other correspondence on the subject, however, should be addressed to the Commonwealth Relations Office, Medal Section, 4, Central Buildings, Westminster, S.W.1.

The issue of the Defence Medal to persons who qualified for the Medal by service in Civil Defence in the United Kingdom, is being undertaken by the Home Office. Issues will be made to individuals who have been notified of entitlement on form D.M.7. Recipients of this form should now complete art B. of the form and post it to the Home Office.

#### Special Categories.

Persons who qualified for Campaign Stars and War Medals by service in the Civil Defence and National Fire Service Overseas Columns, will receive these awards from the Home Office, and no application need be made.

Individuals in the few other special civilian categories which quality for Campaign Stars or the Defence Medal by service with the Anny in qualifying areas overseas should apply by letter to the E.g. of their respective organisations; entitled civilians who were not members of a specified civilian organisation should apply by letter direct to the Mar Office (A.G.4. Hedals) Droitwich, pore starshire. Entitled civilians whose service was with the R.A.F. should apply on the card appropriate to the Force.

Residents overseas who are ex-Members of United Kin dom Forces.

Those eligible should apply by letter, stating full service particulars, to the R.G. of their respective Services.

Note.

It is regretted that it has not been found possible to stamp the awards with the names of the recipients. No objection will be raised to this being done privately.

Oving to the large numbers of awards made they will not be sent by registered post. Several months must class before many of the issues can be completed. Changes of address in the interval should be notified.

#### Royal Navy.

The Admiralty will be unable to begin the issue of Campaign Stars and Clasps, and of the Defence and ar Medals, until later. This postponement is unaveraable because the Admiralty have also the determine entitlement to Prize Money, and although the rules governing entitlement to Prize Money will not be the same as those applicable to the various Stars and Medals, the same details of service will be required and it is the intention to invite applications for Campaign Stars, Medals and Prize Money on a single form.
