HOLLEN FAMILY

NB: The following is prepared from Falkland Islands Registers and files – there may be other family born outside the Falklands. Unless stated otherwise, all dated births, deaths and marriages occurred in the Falklands and all numbered graves are in Stanley Cemetery. Any variations which may occur in name or the spellings of names are recorded as written in the records at the time.

Henry David HOLLEN was from Bremen in Germany and was born circa 1834. In the List of Aliens Residing in the Falkland Islands 1867 [H25] he is listed as living in Stanley and a dairyman from Germany brought by Captain Smyley.

There were two Captains with the surname of Smyley. James W SMYLEY was an American who visited the Falkland Islands twice, once as the master of the *America* 3 June 1847 on route to the South Shetlands on a whaling cruise and the second time as the master of the *Evelina* 15 August 1849 coming from Buenos Aires on route to California. He could not have brought Henry to the Falkland Islands as in 1849 Henry would have been only 15. Therefore Henry must have been brought to the Falkland Islands by James' brother who was the infamous William Horton SMYLEY who spent most of his life in and around the Falkland Islands and South America.

As Henry married in June 1861 he must have arrived at some point before this. There was a big gap from when 1853 to 1857 when Captain W H Smyley did not visit the Falkland Islands and as Henry would have only been 19 in 1853 it is assumed that he probably arrived after 1857. The possible arrival dates are:

28 March 1857	Nancy From Rio Negro to Falklands with 22 horses, 32 cows and 5
	passengers.
27 January 1858	Nancy from Montevideo to Falklands with general cargo & 1 passenger.
31 October 1859	Nancy from Montevideo to Falklands with general cargo & 1 passenger.
9 March 1860	Nancy from Tierra del Fuego to Falklands with general cargo & 9 passengers.

Unless he had been working for Captain Smyley on his vessel it is more likely that he would have come from Montevideo in either January 1858 or October 1859.

Henry, a 27 year old labourer from Bremen, was married to **Charlotte SHORT**, age 19, 14 June 1861 at Trinity Church Stanley according to the Rites and Ceremonies of the Church of England after Banns by Charles Bull MA Colonial Chaplain. The witnesses were Thomas Aldridge, George Short, Fanny Hynam and Hannah Simpson. Henry's father was recorded as Henry David Hollen, a farmer and Charlotte's father as John Short, (*Military*) Pensioner. Both Henry and Charlotte were living in Stanley at the time.

Charlotte, age 49, died 26 December 1891 from cardiac dropsy and is buried in Grave D304.

On 22 March 1897 Andrew Baillon, the FIC Colonial Manager, wrote to Fred Cobb in London requesting that the Directors sanction the payment of a small sum weekly or monthly to old Henry Hollen who had lived for some years at the Dairy House rent free and who was getting very weak and decrepit, although still able to work in MacLauchlan's gang. The directors declined as he had only been allowed to live in the house as a favour. [FIC/D9; 622: FIC/C3; 61]

Henry, age 70 and a German labourer, died 23 October 1904 and is buried in Grave D307.

1. **Annie (Hannah) Caroline HOLLEN** born 25 March 1862 in Stanley. Her father was working as a dairyman for the Falkland Islands Company Ltd at the time. Married **Frederick NEWMAN**,

age 27 and a shepherd, 31 May 1880 in the Parish Church according to the Rites and Ceremonies of the Established Church by Licence by Lowther E Brandon MA Colonial Chaplain. The witnesses were David Mitchell and Margaret Hetterill. Frederick's father was recorded as George Newman, groom. Frederick was reported missing with his 9 year old son in a small cutter enroute to Stanley from Salvador. News that they had been rescued and a report of the voyage and rescue. [FIM May, Aug, Sep 1901] Annie died 27 September 1937 and is buried in Grave K1115. Frederick, age 85, died 8 September 1938 and is buried in Grave K1126.



- 2. Sarah Matilda HOLLEN born 1 October 1866 in Stanley. Her father was working as a dairyman at the time. Married Ralph Robert PAULINI, labourer, 27 January 1881 in the Parish Church according to the Rites and Ceremonies of the Established Church after Banns by Waite H Falkland Islands. The witnesses were Henry David Hollen and Agnes Sarah Short. Sarah was only 15 years and 4 months old when she married. Ralph's father was recorded as Vincent Paulini, seaman. Ralph died 27 May 1909, age 53, from aortic disease and dropsy and is buried in Grave R1597. He was recorded as a carter for the Falkland Islands Company Limited and Italian. Sarah, age 65, died in Stanley 21 December 1935 and was buried 24 December 1935in Grave K1089.
- 3. Frances Charlotte HOLLEN born 9 September 1873 at the Dairy Farm, Stanley. Her father was working as a dairyman at the time. Married Hansen DETTLEFF, age 33, labourer, 26 April 1897 in the house of H D Hollen according to the Rites & Ceremonies of the Established Church by Licence by Lowther E Brandon MA Dean & Colonial Chaplain. The witnesses were Henry H Dettleff and Alice M Hollen. Hansen's father was recorded as Jurgen Christian Dettleff, sheep farmer. Frances died 20 May 1904 from tubercular gastritis and is buried in Grave D305. Hansen married (2) Frances' sister Mary.
- 4. Henry Billington "Bluff" HOLLEN born 10 December 1864 at the dairy near Stanley. His father was working as a dairyman for the Falkland Islands Company Ltd at the time. Shepherd living at Hillfoot. Married Ann Fraser SMITH, age 20, 7 June 1894 in the Church, Darwin according to the Rites & Ceremonies of the Church of England by Licence by Edwin C Aspinall. The witnesses were Mary Smith and Frederick John Hollen. Ann was living in Darwin at the time and her father was recorded as James Smith, labourer. Henry, age 67 and a shepherd at Darwin, died 31 December 1931 at Darwin and is buried there. Ann moved into Stanley in 1932 and lived on Davis Street. Ann, age 69, died 9 September 1944 and is buried in Grave D1282. [Obituary FI Weekly News 14 Sep 1944]

- 5. Frederick John HOLLEN born 27 November 1868 in Stanley. His father was working as a dairyman at the time. Frederick, age 36 and a shepherd at Black Rock, died 12 September 1905 at Black Rock, Darwin Harbour of stomach cancer and is buried at Darwin.
- 6. Alice Mary HOLLEN born 15 September 1878 in Stanley. Her father was working as a labourer at the time. Married Hansen DETTLEFF (widower of her sister Frances) carter, 18 March 1911 at the Registrar's Office, Stanley by M Craigie-Halkett, Acting Registrar General. The witnesses were Madeline A Kirwan and Albert Newing. Hansen died 29 August 1924, age 61, and is buried in Grave N905. Alice died 13 March 1942 and is buried in Grave O1210.

1. Lucy Emily NEWMAN born 10 May 1881 in Stanley. Her father's occupation was recorded as labourer. Lucy, who was living at the Estancia at the time, was married to Richard DAVIS, age 25 and a shepherd at Teal Inlet 8 April 1901 in the house of Charles Wang according to the Rites & Ceremonies of the Established Church by Licence by Lowther E Brandon MA Dean & Colonial Chaplain. The witnesses were Charles Wang and Annie Newman. Richard's father was recorded as John Davis, mariner. Richard, a labourer age 69, died 19 February 1945 and was buried in Grave O1294. Lucy, a housekeeper, emigrated to New Zealand via the UK in 1960 to reside with her daughter. Lucy, age 80, died 13 January 1961 in Plymouth New Zealand.



2. Annie Caroline NEWMAN born 9 May 1882 in Stanley. Her Her father's occupation was recorded as labourer. Annie, who was living in Stanley at the time, was married to Frans Axel PETTERSSON, age 24 and a mariner from Norrkoping, Sweden, 22 July 1902 in the house of Alex Martin according to the Rites & Ceremonies of the Established Church by Licence by Lowther E Brandon MA Dean & Colonial Chaplain. The witnesses were Alexander Martin and Ann Elizabeth Martin. Frans' father was recorded as Frans August Pettersson, printer. Annie died 27 November 1957 in Stanley and was buried 30 November 1957 in Grave Q1600. Frans, a retired seaman from Sweden and age 80, died 3 April 1959 in Stanley and was buried in Grave 1629.

- 3. **Frederick Silas NEWMAN** born 29 October 1883. Died 10 October 1885 from debility and is buried in Grave A95.
- 4. **Ellen Henrietta NEWMAN** born 24 November 1884. Her Her father's occupation was recorded as labourer. Died 26 October 1890 from bronchitis and is buried in Grave A95.
- 5. **Kate Ella NEWMAN** born 1 March 1886. Her Her father's occupation was recorded as labourer. Died 9 October 1890 from bronchitis and is buried in Grave A95.
- 6. **Frederick George NEWMAN** born 13 May 1887. His father's occupation was recorded as labourer. Died from natural causes 11 August 1890 and is buried in Grave A94.

- 7. William Silas Penfold NEWMAN born 11 August 1888 in Stanley. His Her father's occupation was recorded as labourer. Died 1 October 1890 from bronchitis and is buried in Grave A94.
- 8. Winnifred Ivy NEWMAN born 6 February 1890. Her Her father's occupation was recorded as labourer. Died 5 October 1890 from bronchitis and is buried in Grave A96.
- 9. Frederick John NEWMAN born 28 November 1891. His Her father's occupation was recorded as labourer. When he was 9 Fred was lost at sea with his father for 62 days. In August 1914 Fred in was a Volunteer living at North Arm and was called up to Headquarters in Stanley. [FIC/EG/1914] Fred, one of the crew, went to Montevideo in 1919 with the ss Falkland which was undergoing repairs there. On 6 November 1919 he fell into the water off the dock and being unable to swim drowned despite the best efforts of his crewmate, Tom Curran.

Edward's father was recorded as Richard Upton, shepherd. Frances died 14 April 1913 from pelvic allulitis, cardiac failure and congestion of the lungs and was buried in Grave 1758.

11. **Silas NEWMAN** born 21 October 1894 in Stanley. His father's occupation was recorded as labourer. Silas, a cook, was married to **Margaret Milne Summers JAFFRAY** 19 July 1918 at the Cookhouse, North Arm by Governors Licence by Alex Moir, Deputy Registrar. The witnesses were Maggie Jaffray and Henry Hollen. Margaret's father was recorded as Alexander Jaffray, shepherd. [Account of wedding FIM Oct 1918]

Silas worked for the Falkland Islands Company Ltd for 21 years and had left before April 1934. [FIC/EF/5] Margaret and Silas emigrated to the UK in 1954. Silas was 5 foot 6 inches tall with grey eyes and dark hair and Margaret was 5 foot 1 inch tall with blue eyes and dark hair.

- 12. **Malvina Helen Eveline Irene NEWMAN** born 10 February 1896. Her father was working as a labourer at the time. Died 1 March 1899 from acute bronchitis and is buried in Grave A45.
- 13. Isabella Alice Theresa "Terri" NEWMAN born 18 July 1897 at Teal Inlet. Her father's occupation was recorded as carpenter. Theresa was married to Leslie Holliday NICHOLSON, steward, 17 March 1921 at Christ Church Cathedral by Special Licence by J Stanley Smith, Clerk in Holy Orders. The witnesses were A Pettersson and H Newman. Leslie's father was recorded as Joseph Kirwan Nicholson, deceased solicitor. Theresa and Leslie moved to the USA in 1960. Leslie was recorded as being 5 foot 8 inches tall with grey eyes, dark brown hair and a tattoo of a ship on his right arm. Theresa was recorded as being 5 foot 5 inches tall with blue eyes and dark brown hair. Leslie died in 1976 and was buried in Crescent Grove Cemetery, Tigard, Oregon, USA. Theresa, age 93, died 9 June 1991 and was buried in Crescent Grove Cemetery, Tigard, Oregon, USA.





Away back in 1915, in the early days of the first world war, the freighter Freshfield arrived at Stanley with a party of workmen to build the Naval Wireless Station at the west of Stanley harbour. Among the party was young Leslie Nicholson who little realised that it would be forty-six years before he again left the islands.

The new station was built and continued in operation until 1922, when the naval staff was withdrawn. 'Nick', who by this time was married, moved into the Station to maintain the buildings and equipment and to be watchman. He intended to return to England within two or three years. But time passes quickly and when the world was plunged into another war 'Nick' was still at the Station. From 1939 to 1946 the station was again staffed and operated by the navy; during this period 'Nick' was employed on day work about the station. When this staff was withdrawn he stayed on again as caretaker.

When the Water Filtration Plant was built outside 'Nicks' front gate, in Moody Valley, he was employed by government as assistant operator. He took a particular interest in this work and had the pumps working every morning by 5.30 whether it was his duty day or not.

After all these years residence 'Nick' looked on the Falklands as home and was quite content in the quiet, peaceful way of life here until, as he told us, "When I took my spade out to cut my peat this year I realised that at 69 it was just too much for me. It was then that I decided to accept the repeated invitation from my son Derwent and his wife, in New York, to go there and retire."

Having made all the necessary arrangements for entering the United States, Mr. and Mrs. Nicholson left for Montevideo in the Darwin on February 13th. They are to travel from Monte to New York in a Norwegian cargo/passenger vessel. We know that readers will join with us in wishing them many happy years of retirement in their new country.

Henry, a carpenter, was married to **Dorothy Elizabeth CHEEK** 29 December 1928 at Christ Church Cathedral by Special Licence by S E E Aylward, Clerk in Holy Orders. The witnesses were Joseph Arthur David Newman and Henry Newing. Dorothy's father was recorded as Frederick Cheek, shepherd. Henry, a farm foreman, died 26 August 1968 at Teal Inlet and was buried 29 August 1968 in Grave T2109. Dorothy died 8 April 1996 in Stanley and was buried 13 April 1996 in Grave T2110.

Obituary: Joan at - Insted Jeansani

The late Richard George Henry Newman, who died very suddenly at Teal Inlet on 26th August, 1968, was the nineteenth of 24 children born to the late Mr. and Mrs. Fred Newman of Teal Inlet and Stanley.

Henry was born at Teal Inlet on oth January, 1900, and later moved with his parents to Stanley. His first employment, at a very early age, was removing dandelions from the lawn at Malvina House, then owned by the late Mr. J.J. Felton. In 1912 Henry returned to Teal Inlet as the first houseboy, to the late Mr. and Mrs. G.J. Felton, in the new Manager's house, built to replace the one destroyed by fire in 1910. Later he became handyman/carpenter and on 1st December, 1943, he was appointed foreman, a position which he held until his untimely death, thus giving him no less than 56 years' unbroken service to the Farm and to four generations of the Felton family - a record which is surely unique in the history of the Colony.

In December, 1928, he married Dorothy Cheek, who also has a life-long association with Teal Inlet. A presentation was made to Henry on completion of 50 years' service with the Farm, and he was to have retired later this year on pension, and remain at Teal Inlet, the place which meant so much to them both.

Left to mourn are his widow, two sons, two daughters, twelve grandchildren, two brothers, two sisters, and the Monthly Review joins with Teal Inlet and countless sympathisers in this tribute to a devoted employee, husband and father.

16. **Frederica May "Rica" NEWMAN** born 12 May 1901 in Stanley. Her father was working as a shepherd at the time. Frederica was married to **Frank WHITE**, labourer, 24 June 1921 at Christ Church Cathedral by J Stanley Smith, Clerk in Holy Orders. The witnesses were L H Nicholson and I A T Nicholson. Frank's father was recorded as Amos White, deceased mason. Frank was involved in Operation Taberin, working as a cook at Port Lockroy from 1945-1946. Frederica emigrated to the UK in 1949 with her adopted niece, Iris. Frank was chief cook on the *Lafonia* and Rica and Iris were passengers. Frederica was 4 ft 10 in tall with grey eyes and brown hair. Frank, a cook, applied for a passport to be repatriated to the UK 11 December 1951 and was booked by the South Atlantic Sealing Company to leave on the *Fitzroy* in March. Frank was 5 ft 6½ in tall with blue eyes and brown hair He did not leave, possibly for health reasons, and died at Fox Bay 19 August 1952 from lung cancer and was buried at the Albemarle Sealing Station. His occupation at death was ship's cook on my *Protector III*.

- 17. Wilfred Lawrence Augustus "Wilf" NEWMAN born 18 August 1902 in Stanley. His father was working as a carpenter at the time. Wilf, a shepherd, was married to Jessie Brown HOLLEN (first cousin) 28 August 1931 at Darwin Harbour, East Falkland Island by Registrar General's Licence by J Traill Wood, Registrar. The witnesses were Mary Ann Middleton and Frank Hollen. Jessie's father was recorded as Henry Billington Hollen, shepherd. Jessie died 7 January 1973 in Stanley, age 68, and was buried 10 January 193 in Grave U2197. Wilf died 23 April 1993 and was buried 29 April 1993 in Grave U2198.
- 18. **St Joseph David Arthur NEWMAN** born 16 February 1905 in Stanley. His father was working as a carpenter at the time. Joseph, a labourer, was married to **Frances Mary MIDDLETON**, labourer, 5 July 1937 at Christ Church Cathedral by Banns by Gerald K Lowe, Senior Chaplain. The witnesses were B W Biggs ad K R E Paice. Frances' father was recorded as Lindsay Middleton, shepherd. Frances went to the UK volunteering for war work in 1944, leaving March 1944 on board the *Fitzroy*. Joseph had already left on board the *San Casto* and by February 1945 still had not returned. He was working as a fireman on board. [FIC/EF/] In October 1944 FIC, London Office, sent an authority from Joseph to remit his Government Savings Bank balance of approximately £500 to Midland Bank, London. [FIC/EF/10#11]
- Ellen Henrietta NEWMAN born 11 May 1906 in Stanley. Her father was working as a carpenter at the time. Died 25 August 1907 from whooping cough and is buried in Grave H489.
- 20. **Sylvia "the baby" NEWMAN** born 12 October 1907 in Stanley. Her father was working as a carpenter at the time. Sylvia was married to **Joseph CURRAN**, shepherd, 31 May 1933 at the Registrar's Office, Stanley by Special Licence by G R L Brown, Registrar General. The witnesses were Henry Newman and Nellie Gleadell. Joseph's father was recorded as Edward Curran, shepherd. Sylvia died 5 September 1942 from shock, labour of 12 hours at term and a flat pelvis and was buried 5 September 1942 in Grave N1233. Joseph, a retired lighthouse keeper age 62, died 29 November 1966 in Stanley and was buried 1 December 1966 in Grave R1768.

- Ralph Robert PAULINA born 3 November 1881 in his grandfather's house, Stanley and baptised 3 June 1883 by Holy Trinity Church. His father's occupation was recorded as labourer. Robert was baptised Robert Rodulphus PAULINI by St Mary's Roman Catholic Church 24 January 1892. Ralph conveyed Crown Grant 118 to his sister Ada 25 February 1939. [BUG-REG-10] Ralph PAULLINI, age 75, died 15 October 1957 and was buried 18 October 1957 in Grave R1597.
- Ralph "Adolph" PAULINE born 26 June 1883 and baptised Rudolph PALLINI 15 September 1884 by Holy Trinity Church. His father's occupation was recorded as seaman. Rudolph was baptised by St Mary's Roman Catholic Church 24 January 1892. Adolph, age 22 and a labourer, died at San Salvador 15 June 1905 from an intestinal obstruction and gangrene and was buried in Grave I 675.
- 3. **Alfred Henry "Henry" PAULINE** born 26 March 1885 and baptised 12 May 1885 by Holy Trinity Church. His father's occupation was recorded as labourer and he signed with a X. Alfred was baptised by St Mary's Roman Catholic Church 24 January 1892. Henry, a seaman on the ss *Falkland*, accidentally drowned 27 July 1921 at San Carlos North and his body was recovered 19 August 1921 [FIM Sep 1921]
- 4. **Frederick George PAULINE** born 20 September 1886 and baptised 28 April 1887 by Holy Trinity Church. His father's occupation was recorded as labourer and he signed with a X. Frederick was baptised by St Mary's Roman Catholic Church 24 January 1892. Fred enlisted in 1917 and by May 1917 was in the 16th Cheshire regiment. [FIM May 1917, Dec 1917]
- 5. **William Arthur "Arthur" PAULINE** born 14 March 1888 in Stanley and baptised 10 October 1888 by Holy Trinity Church. His father's occupation was recorded as labourer and he signed with a X. William was baptised by St Mary's Roman Catholic Church 24 January 1892.
- 6. **Florence Caroline PAULINI** born 10 October 1890 and baptised 10 October 1890 by Holy Trinity Church. Her father's occupation was recorded as labourer. Florence was married to **Edward Noah SUMMERS**, navvy, 30 November 1911 at St Mary's Church after Banns by Patrick O'Leary Roman Catholic Priest. The witnesses were Henry Pauline and Ada Pauline. Florence's father was recorded as Ralph Pauline, labourer. On 1 January 1924 Edward was

living in Rock Cottage and purchased Bungalow No 1 on St Mary's Walk (Crown Grant 426). On 10 January 1929 Edward, the Government sanitary carter, wrote to the Government stating that he had been advised that his daughter needed a change of climate and that he wished to sell the property and move to England. At that point he had been in Government service for some 18 years, 13 years on sanitary work. Edward, a labourer, died 27 January 1942 from cardio-vascular degeneration and an old fracture of his skull.

- 7. **Matilda Rebecca PAULINE** born 15 September 1892 and baptised 2 October 1892 St Mary's Roman Catholic Church. Her father's occupation was recorded as labourer. Matilda, age 1, died from hydrocephalus 11 September 1893 and was buried in Grave I 649.
- 8. Ada Mabel Matilda PAULINI born 9 August 1896 and baptised by St Mary's Roman Catholic Church. Her father's occupation was recorded as labourer. Ada was married to Henry James ANDERSON, labourer, 12 July 1926 at the Registrar's Office, Stanley by Registrars Licence by M Craigie-Halkett, Registrar General. The witnesses were Anna Pettersson and Ludwick Riley Anderson. Henry's father was recorded as Louis Anderson, cook, and Ada's father was recorded as Ralph Pauline, deceased. Ada travelled to England via Montevideo in 1932 for medical treatment; Henry accompanied her. Henry, age 49 & a labourer, and Ada, age 51, went away in 1948 with their daughter.
- 9. **Boy PAULINI** born 5 February 1898. Stillborn.

- 1. **Henry David HOLLEN** born 10 April 1895 at Norton Inlet. Henry, age 60 and a shepherd, died 16 July 1955 and is buried in Grave Q1553.
- 2. **James "Jim" HOLLEN** born 8 August 1896 at Norton Inlet. James, age 75 and a retired hepherd, died 27 June 1972 in Stanley and is buried in Grave U2190.
- 3. **Frederick John HOLLEN** born 10 July 1898. Frederick, age 5, died 19 January 1904 at High Hill, Darwin from chronic nephritis and is buried at Darwin.
- 4. **Thomas "Tom" HOLLEN** born 27 May 1900 at Darwin. Thomas, age 66 and a shepherd, died 1 July 1966 in Stanley and is buried in Grave T2059.
- 5. **Boy HOLLEN** born 16 June 1902. Died at 14 hours old from debility. Buried at Darwin.
- 6. Jessie Brown HOLLEN born 13 April 1904 at High Hill, Darwin. Married Wilfred Lawrence Augustus NEWMAN, shepherd, 28 August 1931 at Darwin Harbour, East Falkland Island by Registrar General's Licence by J Traill Wood. The witnesses were Mary Ann Middleton and Frank Hollen. Wilfred's father was recorded as Frederick Newman, independent. Jessie died 7 January 1973 in Stanley and is buried in Grave U2197. Wilfred died 23 April 1993 and is buried in Grave U2198.
- 7. **William Adam HOLLEN** born 15 February 1906 at High Hill, Darwin. William, age 27 and ¾, died 26 November 1933 in Stanley from congenital epilepsy and is buried in Grave K1052. He had resided in Stanley for two years before his death.
- 8. **Francis HOLLEN** born 29 July 1908 at High Hill, Darwin. Francis, age 29 and a shepherd, died 4 September 1939 from pulmonary and abdominal tuberculosis and was buried in Grave K1141.

- 9. Sarah Matilda HOLLEN born 3 February 1910 at High Hill, Darwin. Married Henry George CARTMELL, shepherd, 4 June 1931 at Darwin Harbour, East Falkland Island by Special Licence by J Traill Wood, Registrar. The witnesses were Jessie Brown Hollen and Thomas Hollen. Henry's father was recorded as Robert Cartmell, shepherd. Henry died 29 December 1962 in Stanley and is buried in Grave R1730. Sarah died 9 July 1989 and is buried in Grave V3115.
- 10. **Frances Mary HOLLEN** born 30 March 1912 at High Hill, Darwin. Frances, age 22, died 12 April 1934 from oral sepsis and necrosis of bones of the skull and is buried in Grave K1057.
- 11. Hannah Caroline HOLLEN born 21 May 1914 at High Hill, Darwin. Domestic. Married William John SMITH (see (8) (2)), labourer, 24 October 1936 at the Registrar's Office, Stanley by Special Licence by Malcolm J Stewart, Registrar General. The witnesses were J A Kirk and Ann Hollen. Hannah's father was recorded as Henry Hollen, deceased shepherd. William drowned 12 February 1956 "under conditions amounting to misadventure" and was buried in Grave Q1565. Hannah died 5 March 1986, age 71, and is buried in Grave V3054.
- 12. Ada Mabel HOLLEN born 14 June 1916 (twin) at High Hill, Darwin. Married James WATTS, soldier, 24 February 1940 at the Nonconformist Church (Tabernacle), Stanley by Special Licence by Walter Forrest McWhan, Nonconformist Minister. The witnesses were Marigold D Pearson and Thomas Hollen. James' father was recorded as John Watts, mason. James died 19 July 1963, age 61, in Stanley and is buried in Grave T2003. Ada died 3 December 1990 and is buried in Grave T2004.
- 13. Ann Fraser HOLLEN born 14 June 1916 (twin) at High Hill, Darwin. Domestic servant. Married William McMULLEN, labourer, 9 June 1951 at the United Free Church (Tabernacle), Stanley by Walter Forrest McWhan, Minister. The witnesses were William John Smith and Hannah Caroline Smith. William's father was recorded as David McMullen, deceased farmer. William died 23 May 1956 in Stanley, age 71, and is buried in Grave S1573. Ann married (2) Albert CLIFTON (no record in Falkland Islands). Ann died 2 January 1965 and is buried in Grave T2021. Albert emigrated to New Zealand with his son in 1972.

- 1. Mary Jane HOLLEN born 20 April 1906 in Stanley. Her father's occupation was recorded as labourer. Mary Jane Holland DETTLEFF was married to Harry WAGHORN, tractor engine driver, 13 March 1928 at the Registrar's Office, Stanley by Special Licence by M Craigie Halkett, Ag Registrar General. The witnesses were Orissa Dettleff and F J Jennings. Harry's father was recorded as William Waghorn, barge captain. Mary went to the UK in February 1944 to take up full war work. Harry and Jonty emigrated to the UK in August 1944. In 1946 Mary was working in the Rowntrees factory in York, England, having left the Land Army with her two years good service badge. [FI Weekly News 19 Dec 1946, pg 16]
- Hanson Christopher HOLLEN born 9 March 1909 in Stanley and baptised Hanson Christopher DETTLEFF 4 June 1911 by St Mary's Roman Catholic Church. His father's occupation was recorded as carter. Hanson, a labourer, died 23 September 1977 in Stanley and is buried in Grave R1900.
- 3. **Ellen Malvina DETTLEFF** born 9 April 1911 in Stanley and baptised 3 June 1911 by St Mary's Roman Catholic Church. Her father's occupation was recorded as carter. Ellen died 4 November 1912 from convulsions and is buried in Grave D752.

- 4. **Orissa Charlotte DETTLEFF** born 9 January 1913 in Stanley. Her father's occupation was recorded as carter. Orissa was married to **James CLIFTON**, motor driver 29 March 1941 at the house of Mrs Hansen, Port Stanley by Special Licence by A R Hoare, Registrar General. The witnesses were A Clarke and Mary Clarke. James' father was recorded as Harry Clifton, slaughterman.
- 5. **Henry Houseward DETTLEFF** born 24 April 1915 in Stanley and baptised 2 June 1915 by St Mary's Roman Catholic Church. His father's occupation was recorded as carter. Henry died 26 September 1915 from teething and infantile convulsions and is buried in Grave D799.
- 6. Alice Florence DETTLEFF born 26 October 1917 in Stanley and baptised 20 November 1917 by St Mary's Roman Catholic Church. Her father's occupation was recorded as carter. Alice was married to David John DUNCAN, able seaman, 25 September 1942 at the Registrar's Office, Stanley by Special Licence by J E Hamilton, Registrar General. The witnesses were N Peck, Ellen Peck and James P Peck. David's father was recorded as David Henry Duncan, shepherd. Alice and David divorced 5 May 1955. David died 21 September 1978 at Roy Cove, suicide, and is buried in Grave U1932. Alice died 25 June 1987 and is buried in Grave R3079.
