Report of Census 1991

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His Excellency W H Fullerton, C.M.G. Governor Government House Stanley Falkland Islands

Your Excellency,

- 1. I have the honour to present this my Report on the Census held on 5 March 1991 pursuant to an Order under section 2 of the Census Ordinance 1990, using Census Forms those prescribed by the Census (Forms) Regulations 1991.
- 2. For the first time, the Census Form used was designed so as to enable the information provided by the Forms to be processed by computer: and indeed an almost infinite number of Tables could be prepared of which those appearing as part of this Report are only those which appeared to be most generally useful or of general interest.
- 3. The Census Form was considered in draft by an ad hoc consultative committee on which Legislative Councillors and officials were both represented. The final draft was, of course, approved by the Executive Council. There was much debate as to what questions should be asked and in what form. I hope what emerged was a fair balance between what might be useful and what it was tolerable for persons to be asked to answer: in particular, to avoid any unnecessary intrusion into any person's privacy. Of course, at the end of the day, statistics can only be provided on the basis of information supplied in answer to questions asked on the Census Form and it could well be said that there were questions left unasked which we ought to have asked. I can only express regret for any defects or shortcomings which anybody sees in the Census exercise as a result.

Mrs Bonita Greenland (Registrar General) and the Census Enumerators;

Mr Graham Gleadell (who did the work resulting in Tables 17 and 18 (Primary and Secondary Occupations)

Mr Michael Peake (Computer Co-ordinator) who designed the Computer Program for the Census and later extracted the data for me;

Mr Robert Titterington (for his particular assistance in the design of the Census Form)

Mr Richard Wagner (who checked the Tables in draft: but who is not responsible for their accuracy)

The staff of my department (Mrs Jenny Cox and Mrs Amara Goss) who have had the labour of deciphering and typing my manuscript).

- 5. There is, I hope, much of interest in the Tables. I resist the temptation myself to comment upon the information in them in this Report. Let the reader draw his own conclusions. The Report will, of course, be a source of data to government departments and others.
- 6. I conclude by expressing my thanks to the public for its co-operation. The Tables follow.
