PASSENGERS' BAGGAGE.

The examination of passengers baggage is adopted not so much for the sake of the duty which may be due on foreign goods from bona fide passengers as for the purpose of checking fraud, which but for systematic vigilance by the authorities would grow up. The Customs officers, therefore, are bound to give all necessary advice and information to passengers on the subject of the landing and examination of baggage, exercising a liberal discretion in this duty. But as notices in English and French are pested up at all packet ports and in London relative to the duties of passengers in these uniters, the plea of ignorance of the law is not admitted.

If passengers have any tobacco,

detained until the owner or his agent could attend with the keys of the packages. Now however, all luggage, whether accompanied or not, is examined immediately on arrival in this country (or in the case of registered luggage, immediately upon arrival at the London Stations to which registered.) Passengers should, therefore, be in attendance with their keys, or their baggage will be opened by the Customs Ollicers without keys, and by the best available means. If Prassagers cannot accompany their packages, they should secure the services of a trustworthy agent to appear for thom, and produce the keys upon the arrival of the ships or trains, as the ensample. The Examination, instead of being merely formal, to which travellers have become accustomed in England, is now conducted in a rigorous and searching manner, every package, however insignificant, being thoroughly overhauled.

#### PARCELS POST.

PARCELS POST.

Although the Parcels Post is extended to the Isle of Man and the Channel Islands, articles upon which duty is leviable in the United Kingdom must not be sent in parcels post packages from those places without they are duly declared first of all, at the Post Olices where such packages have been posted. If this be not done, the packages and all their contents, dutiable or not, are confiscated upon arrival in the United Kingdom.

Tobacco must not under any circumstances he sent by Parcels Post from the Isle of Man or Channel Islands to Great Britain or Ireland

#### REGISTRATION OF BIRTHS AND DEATHS.

Birns.—The parents of every child born alive are required, under a penalty of 148a. to give to the Registrar of the Sub-district in which they reside, within 42 days after the birth, information of the particulars to be registered. The birth is registered free of charge at the house of the Informant, he becomes entitled to a fee of 1s. In default of the paronis, the occupior of the house in which the child was born, and other persons, are held responsible for giving information to the Registrar. After a lapse of 3 menths from the date of birth, the registration can only be offected in the prosence of the Superintendent Registrar, and on payment of fees to him and the Registrar. No birth can be registrated after 12 months from date of birth without the special authority of the Registrar-General, and on payment of further fees.

Diarus.—Information of a doeth must be given within 5 days after its occurrence, by the nearest Relative of deceased present at the death or in attendance during last illness, to the Registrar of the Stud-district in which the death occurred, under a penalty of 40s. in case of omission. No fee is payable if the Informants attend at the Registrar's Office, but he becomes entitled to a fee of 1s. if he attends by request at their houses. In all cases where a registered medical man has been in attendance, his corrificate of the Registrar by any Relative who may be at the time within the Sudistrict, or by any person present at the death, or the occupier, or any inmate of the house in which the death occurred, or by the person who causes the body to be buried.

Certificates of registration from the Registrar, or subsequently either at the General Register Office, or at the General Register Office, or at the General Register Office, or at the fee is 3s. 7d.

#### VACCINATION REGULATIONS.

—Marriage, according to the Rites of the Church of England, can be effected either by publication of banns or by license. PASSPORTS.

A British Subject travelling on the Continent seldom needs a Passport, except in war times; but it is nevertheless advisable to carry one, as it is at all times proof of identity. A Passport is necessary for Austra, Egypt, Greece, Portugal, Russia, and Turkey, and is occasionally domanded in Gormany and Spain. Travellers intending to visit Russia are advised to have their passports vise before starting. Passports are issued to British-horn subjects by the various British Consuls abroad on personal application, or in London on presentation of a recommendation from a Banker under seal, or upon the production of a Certificate of Identity, signed by a Magistrate, Clergyman, Physician, Solicitor, Notary, or M.P., and countersigned by the porson on whose behalf the Certificate is granted.
