## moject: Military W/T Communications - Electrical Interference.

The Honourable, The Colonial Secretary.

Officer Commanding Royal Signals reports that he is experiencing considerable radio frequency interference on all military W/T sets Operating within approximately one mile radius of Port Stanley.

This interference has been traced, with the assistance of the Supervisor, Electrical & Telegraph Department, to an electric hair clipper operated by lr.Shackel, who keeps a hairdressing establishment in John Street. All possible steps have been taken to electrically suppress this apparatus but without result, and the radio frequency interference is now so bad that it is impossible to read W/T signals when this hair clipper is in use.

The authorities in England have power to prohibit the use of any electrical apparatus which produces radio frequency interference on official W/T sets, but as it is understood that no such law exists in this Colony, will you please say what steps can be taken to put a stop to this interference to military W/T traffic.

The Force Commander considers that the radio frequency interference to military W/T sets caused by the hairclipper operated by Ir. Shackel cannot be permitted and he wishes you to take appropriate action under Defence Regulations Malkland Islands 1939, Section 8.

With reference to para 2 of the above-quoted letter, it is emphasized that the worst feature of this interference is the fact that signals cannot now be received from the West Island, when the heirclipper is being used.
