At 2300 G.M.T. on January 25th when South Georgia called Stanley latter requested former to "wait 30 minutes until after London Bridge" and there was no interference during remainder of programme. Our Radio Diffusion System which was purchased in March 1931 at a cost of about £120 is now considerably overloaded and cannot be relied on to continue giving almost trouble freeservice. Unfortunately the equipment was not designed to allow for additional panels being added as more power was required and as the plant was designed for only 90 loudspeakers, it will be realised that the overload has been a fact for quite a number of years,

I have approached the makers of our equipment- The Marconiphome Co Ltd, of Hayes- and they cannot suggest any modification to the present gear and there-

fore recommend new equipment.

We have the honour to refer to your telegram dated 17th August asking us to obtain and forward by air mail quotations for a broadcasting transmitter delivering 300 to 500 watts to the aerial and to our telegram of 23rd October advising you that we were experiencing difficulty in

obtaining a quotation owing to the low power required.

The Marconi co., The General Electric co., and The Standard Telephone Co. all declined to quote. The only offer we have received is one from Rediffusion Ltd. of which we enclose a copy. You will note that this set requires a 3 phase supply at 400 volts which we understand is not at present available although, if the new power station which is commended materialises, it will become available. The alternative would be to supply a small separate generating set but we fear the delivery would be prolonged. The cost would be in the neighbourhood of £125.

A further alternative would be the provision of a motor generator set (single phase to3phase) but here again delivery would not be less than 12 to 18 months at earliest.





It has been clear for some time that one of the first requirements in the development of broadcasting in the Colonies etc., is the availability of wireless receivers of suitable design, at a cost within the means of the ordinary citizen and preferably of British manufacture. There is at present no suitable receiver of British, nor, so far as is known, of foreign, manufacture, on the market at less than about £10. - f.o.b.

- An entirely new method of radio production, recently invented in the United Kingdom, seems, however, to hold some promise that this situation may before long be improved. This new method is being developed by a British firm, SARGROVE ELECTRONICS LTD. The cost of receivers produced by this method will depend on the number manufactured and on other factors not yet certain; but, if satisfactory initial orders are forthcoming, the Company expects to be able to offer onem for approximately £3.15.0. f.o.b. in the first instance, and hopes to be able, with production in full swing, to reduce this figure to about £2.10.0.
- The Company has so far concentrated particularly on receivers for medium-wave reception and deriving power from a mains supply. It has offered to provide one such receiver free / of

of charge, for trial purposes, to any appropriate Colony, and I have accordingly invited it to send one to each territory served by a local medium-wave wireless broadcasting system.

- 4. This hopeful development may also be of interest to other territories not at present so served. The Company is aware of the demand in many Colonies etc., for receivers designed for all-wave or short-wave reception, covering particularly the "tropical" wavebands, and for receivers able to be operated from dry or wet batteries and to be used for communal listening. The application of this new method of production to other designs such as these is already engaging its attention.
- 5. If you would like to receive a medium-wave mains supply receiver on these conditions, and would arrange for it to be given a thorough trial in reasonably exacting conditions, typical as far as possible of those in which such receivers would be required to operate in the hands of ordinary private owners, I should be glad to approach the manufacturers on your behalf.



As we announced last week, the time of the Sunday afternoon broadcast is to be altered. Further consideration has, however, been given to the question of times of transmission, and it has now been decided that instead of 5.30 p.m. Stanley Summer Time, the programme will commence at 6 p.m. throughout the year. That means 6 p.m. Local Mean Time in winter, and 5 p.m. Local Mean Time during the summer. The News Bulletin will be given at 6 p.m., prefaced by some music, so that people can tune in properly, and talks will normally be broadcast at 6.15 p.m.

Religious services from the studio will be discontinued.

Instead, services will be relayed from the Churches at 7 p.m.

They will be in this order: - the 1st, 3rd, and when there is one, the 5th Sunday of the month, from Christ Church Cathedral; the second Sunday from St. Mary's Church; and the 4th Sunday from the Tabernacle. The weather forecast will be broadcast immediately after the church service.
