- Your co-operation in bringing it up-to-date would be appreciated; to that end I should be grateful if you would arrange for the most recent information under the same headings as in the fourth edition to be forwarded to reach me not later than the end of October.
 - 3. It is hoped that it may be possible to print the new edition to include some photographs and give it a wider circulation. In order to add to the interest of the document I therefore invite you to furnish, together with the information requested above, a short history of broadcasting and/or wired rediffusion services in your territory, of not more than 200 words. You may wish to include reference to the main personalities who have been responsible for local broadcasting development, and to give an idea of your programme output.

HICHORY.

The Falkland Islands holds the honour of establishing the first Colonial Broadcasting Service, for in the early part of 1929 a wired broadcasting service was established in Stanley under the direction of the Governor, the late Cir Arnold Bedson, M.C.N.G. The early experiments in this direction had began a year earlier and sufficient experience gained to enable a regular service to be established in 1929. The service was also carried to some out-lying farms by telephone line and brought to many their first experience of radio. The engineer responsible for the establishment of this service was Mr. F.A.W. Byron who later carried out similar ventures in Sierra Leone and the Gold Coast.

Broadcast recalition on short wave in those days was anything but good since the f.b.C. short wave service as we know it today had not begun and wireless reception had perforce to be chiefly confined to the reception of fouth herican programmes on medium waves. However, by the aid of gramophone records, local news and an occasional local programme, interest in the new venture was maintained. It is interesting to record that the Governor himself often conducted a local program e and did his own announcing.

Prosdesting is now a well established service in the Islands and a 5 km medium wave transmitter was intelled in 1951; to give increased coverage. About the same time a complete wired broadcasting service, designed by the 0.7. in embley, was installed under the supervision of a congineer who was seconded to the Colony for this purpose.







2. Enclosed herewith are two copies of revised naterial for inclusion in the Handbook on Breadcasting Services. It has not been possible to produce suitable photographs as requested in paragraph 5 of your Circular under reference.

History

In the early part of 1929 a wired broadcasting service was established in Port Stanley under the direction of the Governor, the late Sir Arnold Hodson, K.C.M.G. The early experiments in this direction had begun a year earlier and sufficient experience was gained to enable a regular service to be established in 1929. The service was also carried to some outlying farms by telephone line and brought to many their first experience of radio. The engineer responsible for the establishment of this service was Mr. F. A. W. Byron who later carried out similar ventures in West Africa.

Broadcast reception on short waves in those days was anything but good since the B.B.C. short wave service as we know it today had not begun, and wireless reception had perforce to be chiefly confined to the reception of South American programmes on medium waves. However, by the aid of gramophone records, local news and an occasional local programme, interest in the new venture was maintained. It is interesting to record that the Governor himself often conducted a local programme and did his own announcing.

Broadcasting is now a well established service in the islands and a 5 kV medium wave transmitter was installed in 1954 to give increased coverage. About the same time a complete wired broadcasting service, designed by the G.P.O. in Wembley, was installed under the supervision of the G.P.O. engineer who was seconded to the colony for this purpose.

History

In the early part of 1929 a wired broadcasting service was established in Port Stanley under the direction of the Governor, the late Sir Arnold Hodson, K.C.M.G. The early experiments in this direction had begun a year earlier and sufficient experience was gained to enable a regular service to be established in 1929. The service was also carried to some outlying farms by telephone line and brought to many their first experience of radio. The engineer responsible for the establishment of this service was Mr. F.A.W. Byron who later carried out similar ventures in West Africa.

Broadcast reception on short waves in those days was anything but good since the B.B.C. short wave service as we know it today had not begun, and wireless reception had perforce to be chiefly confined to the reception of South American programmes on medium waves. However, by the aid of gramophone records, local news and an occasional local programme, interest in the new venture was maintained. It is interesting to record that the Governor himself often conducted a local programme and did his own announcing.

Broadcasting is now a well established service in the islands and a 5 kW medium wave transmitter was installed in 1954 to give increased coverage. About the same time a complete wired broadcasting service, designed by the G.P.O. in Wembley, was installed under the supervision of the G.P.O. engineer who was seconded to the colony for this purpose.

Broadcast reception on short waves in those days was anything but good since the B.B.C. short wave service as we know it to-day had not begun, and wireless reception had perforce to be chiefly confined to the reception of South American programmes on medium waves. However, by the aid of gramophone records, local news and an occasional local programme, interest in the new venture was maintained. It is interesting to record that the Governor himself often conducted a local programme and did his own announcing.

Broadcasting is now a well established service in the islands and a 5kW medium wave transmitter was installed in 1954 to give increased coverage. About the same time a complete wired broadcasting service, designed by the G.P.O. in Wembly, was installed under the supervision of the G.P.O. engineer who was seconded to the colony for this purpose.

Would you please refer to my Circular Savingram No. 134 of 31st March, 1965.

It is proposed to issue an eighteenth edition of the Handbook this year, and your help would once more be appreciated in providing the latest information (in triplicate) under the headings shown in the Appendix to this savingram. It would be appreciated if this information could reach the Colonial Office by 6th May, 1966.

- 2. The histories should be checked and brought up to date; where none has previously been included it would be appreciated if relevant material could be supplied. Reference should be made to any firm future plans for the development of sound radio and/or television.
- 3. The material supplied should cover commercial stations as well as Government broadcasting services and statutory broadcasting corporations. Commercial broadcasting organisations and statutory corporations should of course be invited to submit their own material and the final text forwarded to the Colonial Office should be cleared with them.
- 4. In territories where more than one service operates it would be appreciated if the entries could be completed separately rather than together, i.e. as for the Barbados entry in the 1965 edition.
- 5. Recent photographs illustrating the activities of local broadcasting stations, which could be considered for inclusion, would be very welcome.
- 6. A copy of the relevant entry in the 1965 editions is enclosed.

GIBRALTAR (Contd.)

The printing of the weekly programmes which was published weekly as a supplement to the Gibraltar Chronicle, continued to be the responsibility of the station until 30th September. It was then incorporated in the Gibraltar Broadcasting Corporation Radio and T.V. Times.

The establishment of an independent Corporation to be responsible for radio services was mooted as long ago as 1957. In May 1963 the Government of Gibraltar were asked to consider a merger of Radio Gibraltar and Gibraltar Television, which was operated by Gibraltar Television Limited under a Government Licence. Agreement was reached in September and the merger took place on the 1st October when the Gibraltar Broadcasting Corporation was formed. The Government appointed Messrs. Gibraltar Broadcasting Lit. (a subsidiary of Thomson Television International) as Managing Agents for the Corporation and the final agreement was signed by the parties concerned on the 11th December, 1963.

However, by the aid of gramophone records, local news and an occasional local programme, interest in the new venture was maintained. It is interesting to record that the Governor himself often conducted a local programme and did his own announcing.

Broadcasting is now a well established service in the islands and a 5km medium wave transmitter was installed in 1954 to give increased coverage. About the same time a complete wired broadcasting service, designed by the C.P.O. in Wembly, was installed under the supervision of the G.P.O. engineer who was seconded to the colony for this purpose.
