With reference to your Letter 0001 of 30th November 1950 on the subject of relations between Broadcast Committee and the S.P.T., I should be glad to learn whether, in view of para 2, Government Officials in the course of their duty must seek permission from the Broadcast Advisory Board, before the Broadcast system is used for the purpose of approaching the Public or for issuing Government notices to the Public, and at the same time whether normal paid announcements handed over the Post Office counter should also be submitted to the above Board.

The Committee has drawn my attention to the fact that Mr Ikkint broadcast a notice recently - in connection with his duty as Chief Constable- and that the attention of the Committee was not sought before the broadcast. I was similarly approached in connection with an address by His Excellency the Governor some time back, and as neither the two occasions could be classed as entertainment, the suitability of which an advisory committee should decide, I feel that I am infringing your specific directions by accepting any notice or announcement.

The Secretary of the Broadcast Advisory Board has spoken to me in this connection and does not think the Committee are to control ordinary notices, and I am sure there would be no end to confusion if they did, but, your ruling on the subject will be appreciated.

Dear Mr. Chairman,

Referring to our telephone conversation when you advised that H.E. The Governor had been pleased to approve a grant of £25 per annum for my work in connection with the Broadcast Advisory Committee, I have considered the matter and regret I am unable to accept this payment. It is my view that work of this kind - of a community nature - does not require recompense.

The making out of the monthly lists of record requests for London is, I feel, quite another matter. It has no connection whatsoever with local broadcasting and what, in effect, I am doing is acting as a typing agency on behalf of the Secretariat. I do feel, therefore, that this job should be treated as the business arrangement it is and suggest a fee of 10/6 per mail despatch, which I think is not unreasonable in view of the domestic dislocation occasioned and also the fact that the typing of these lists occurs at a time when I am extremely busy with my own mail.

While on this subject, do you think arrangements could be made for these requests to be in my hands immediately after the closing of the 48 hours' time limit, not as has been the case on the last two occasions a few hours before the actual closing of the mail. On the last occasion, as it happened, I had already typed and delivored my letter to the Secretariat when an accumulated botch of requests arrived, together with my letter, necessibting retyping of the whole list.

A further point. Would it be possible for the Secretariat messenger to call for these letters at my house? It is often very inconvenient for me to get to the Secretariat at that time.

 $\underline{Y.E.}$ I am bringing these papers up for verbal discussion, but it may be of assistance if I record now some views and suggestions.

- 2.I consider that Govt:has every right to insist that the news should be factual and should not contain contentious matter. It is not the place for the expression of opinions. There is adequate scope for that in other programmes (c.f. the current "Speak your Mind" series). I would suggest that Govt:informs the Committee in writing of this, framed as a definite policy directive.
- 3. If that is done and the Committee takes umbrage and resigns, it would be a pity but I do not consider that Govt: would have acted wrongly and in the circumstances I would then advise publication of the correspondence.
- 4. The idea of a Director of Broadcasting is attractive.
 Far and away the best person in my opinion would be Mr.
 Howkins, but I fear that he has not got, and is not likely to have, the time to devote to it. Failing him my next choice would be Mr. Cawkell. Education & Broadcasting are allied in many ways as long as the broadcasting does'nt become too educative.
 - 5. I agree that the membership of the Committee should be varied at regular intervals by the introduction of fresh blood. The difficulty, of course, as in so many other cases, is to find the blood donors. The original composition of the Committee is at p. 77 (Vol:1), and at p. 100 there is a note of some temporary members to cover leave vacancies. The temporary members have provided some new blood. We have also unfilled the vacancy caused by the departure of Mr. Lloyd-Jones. At p. 87 it was agreed to await the arrival of his successor. Mr. Steele arrives by this "Fitzroy" and if he seems suitable and willing I certainly think we might rope him in.

As I mentioned to Y.E. verbally earlier in the week, I saw Mr. McNaughton again about this. He, and his Committee, are in favour of the new blood being introduced by retirement of a proportion of the existing members annually.

2. Mr. McNaughton feels that some at least of our troubles have arisen from the fact that the terms of reference of the Committee are not as closely defined as they should be. He suggested that if we were to appoint a Director of Broadcasting, an idea which he supports, it would be useful to appoint him as from lst.Jan:next, and at the same time to introduce the annual inflow of new blood into the Committee. This would then be the obvious moment to redefine the status of the Committee. He suggested that if Mr. Howkins were prepared to act as titular Director until after Mr. Elliott has returned from South, he, Mr. McNaughton, would be quite ready to do the actual work of the Director during that period.

- 5. I asked Mr.McNaugton, with his experience of the Broadcasting Committee, to draft out for Y.E's consideration a revised "charter", covering the set-up envisaged above, and this he has promised to do.
- 4. If the arrangement suggested in para 2 is adopted, Mr. McNaughton suggests that both he and Mr. Cawkell retire from the Committee, as being the two who have done most of the work in the past year. Clearly it would be less desirable to retire any of those who have been away on leave for half their period of office. Assuming that Mr. Steele takes the place of Mr. Lloyd-Jones, this would leave two vacancies to be filled, both men. After discussion with Mr. McNaughton, we offer the following as possibilities for Y. E's consideration:

Mr.McNaughton did not feel that it would be opportune to "lay down the law" to the Committee as I had suggested in my minute overleaf. He thought that with the new charter and status of the Committee such matters would be easier to handle (I agree), and that present broadcasts should be allowed to take place, the more so as they had already been announced and the person concerned had been told quite clearly by Mr.McNaughton what Govt's views were. Mr.McNaughton rather hopes that given enough rope he may hang himself! We spoke some time ago and I was to give you some of my ideas on <u>Broadcasting</u> to assist you to make recommendations to H.E. I have thoughtabout the matter over the holiday period and some comments follow which I hope will be useful.

I believe H.E. would agree: -

- (1) That the idea of having a Committee to organise programmes has worked very well up to a point, and that the variety and entertainment-value of local broadcasting has improved greatly over the last year.

 Mrs Cawkell's enthusiasm has played a large part in this.
- (2) That the general principle of free discussion on the air on a wide variety of topics including those closely affecting the lives of the people, is, in itself, a good thing. The free exchange of honestly-held and responsibly-expressed viewpoints is necessary in a healthy community.

On the other hand I feel he would also: -

- (a) Welcome having an officer responsible for the whole matter of Broadcasting, to whom he could issue guidance from time to time, and to whom questions affecting broadcasting could be referred in the first instance.
- (b) Wish us to bear in mind the increasing range of our transmitting equipment we shall shortly be received regularly by listeners in parts of South America as well as in the Dependencies. Our programmes should therefore be conducted with efficiency and dignity so as to reflect general credit on the Colony and its people.

(c) Want to ensure that the needs of listeners in the Dependencies are kept in mind and that suitable programmes are broadcast to them from time to time, in so far as the available facilities allow.

(d) Want to make sure that the facilities provided for expressing personal opinions are not used merely to air grievances without constructive comment.

All remarks should be made in a responsible manner and, in so far as it is possible, all criticism should be of a constructive rather than of a destructive nature. In particular, there should be no question of airing personal views in broadcast news bulletins; and when programmes of the "Open Forum" and "Speak Your Mind" type are scheduled, care should be taken to ensure that the teams chosen are comprised of responsible citizens chosen from various sections of the community. Such arrangements make for better entertainment as well as fairer comment.

After over a year as Chairman of the present Broadcast Committee I am confident that (b) to (d) can not readily be covered by a Committee owing to the divergences of opinion which frequently arise in it, and that H.E. should invest final authority for broadcasting in a single officer - "Director of Broadcasting", "Controller of Broadcasting", "Broadcasting Officer" or what you will - to be advised by the Broadcasting Committee in the same way as Mr Mercer is at present except that he, and not they, would be finally responsible. The officer concerned could be provided with general guidance in the form of a sort of "charter" (a copy of which could be provided to the Committee) and instructed that he was to accept the advice of the Committee except when this did not appear. to him to be in accordance with the provisions of the charter. Thus he would be able to amend programme arrangements,

/introduce

introduce additional programmes and so on, provided he was convinced that such changes, additions etc. were required by the provisions of his general instructions.

The "Charter" might be on these lines:

- (%) As Controller of Broadcasting you are to be responsible for all broadcast programmes emanating from the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station at Stanley.
- (2) You are to work in close co-operation with the Supt. Post and Telegraphs Department who will continue to be responsible for the provision and maintenance of the technical equipment required for broadcasting.
- (3) You are to make every effort to improve the efficiency, entertainment value and general usefulness of the broadcasting arrangements, bearing in mind the particular needs of listeners in the Camp and in the Dependencies.
- ensure that Broadcasting offers facilities for the expression of opinions and for useful discussion on various topics. You are to to all in your power, however, to ensure that opinions are expressed in a responsible manner, that criticism is constructive and useful and that, when open discussion takes place, teams are chosen in such a way as to be likely to produce varied viewpoints on the topics in question.
- (5) You are to endeavour further to improve the value of News Broadcasts to the Camp and the Dependencies and are to ensure that the news readers confine themselves to news and general comment and do not express their personal views on controversial topics.

(6) You are to be advised on the contents of broadcast programmes by the Broadcast Advisory Committee and you are to be prepared to justify to the Governor any changes which you make in the Committee's arrangements on the basis of these general instructions. The Committee are to seek your approval before incurring expenditure for materials for broadcasting e.g. gramophone records, plays, transcriptions etc. for which provision is made in the Estimates.

Finally, H.E. has accepted the principle that we should have changes in the composition of the Committee from time to time. The present Committee has been in office since November 1950 but (because of leave and so on) only Mr Cawkell and I have served continuously during this period. H.E. will probably now wish to inveite either the Rev. Steele or Mr McWhan to fill the seat vacated by the Rev. Lloyd-Jones, and to retire two other members in favour of "new blood". I would like to suggest that I should be one of the retiring members - I have served as Chairman for fourteen months and I shall be going on leave in June this year. (The post of Chairman will not be such a responsible one if an Executive Officer is appointed). For the two new members I would suggest consideration to: -

Mr Arthur Biggs.

Sir,

I am directed to refer to your letter of 16th May, 1952 and to state that the views contained therein would appear not only to reveal a sad lack of perception in this matter but also to amount to a criticism of the Governor to which His Excellency takes strong exception.

- 2. I am to point out that this Colony does not differ fundamentally from any other English speaking community and the principles which have guided Governments elsewhere within the Commonwealth on the question of broadcasting, are of equal application here.
- 3. In England, as in all Colonies too, the whole object of broadcasting is to entertain and enlighten; to give as wide scope as possible (particularly here where there is no press) to public opinion, but at the same time, to ensure that the reflection of such opinion is not weighted on one side or the other and that it is not used for airing of tendencious views; and, finally that the standard of programmes should attain as high a level as is possible.
- 4. The broadcasting system in the Falkland Islands is not only/Government sponsored institution but is also Government owned; its voice will soon be carrying over a far wider field, i.e. the Dependencies and the coast and interior of South America, and an increasing responsibility rests upon Government in the direction already indicated.
- 5. Here, therefore, as elsewhere there must be some one individual who will be responsible to the Administration for pursuing the general policy laid down by the latter; that policy for the Falkland Islands has been conveyed in a simple directive to which, it is considered, no person approaching the problem with an open mind, could possibly take exception.
 - 6. Here too, as elsewhere the institution calls for the services of an advisory Committee which will support and assist the Director in giving the best possible service to the community which depends more than most upon a good broadcasting service.
 - 7. On this account, it is all the more regrettable that you should have seen fit to resign from the Committee so precipitately.
 - 8. I am to state that if you have any further views on the subject. His Excellency will be pleased to grant you a personal interview.

My apologies for the delay. What I have in mind for the Broadcasting Dept. is someone with energy and enthusiasm who can take over the present Secretary's duties and expand and enlarge upon them. He (or she) would be responsible for the day to day work of the Broadcasting Dept. under the supervision of the Director of Broadcasting, who would continue to be advised by the Committee as at present. Among the duties which come readily to mind, and which may help to illustrate the kind of person I have in mind, are these:

- 1. Arrange programmes as far ahead as possible and make necessary alterations as required.
- 2. Supervise, and assist with, the work of the Studio Announcers and ensure a high standard of studio technique.
- 3. Maintain registers of B.B.C. and other transcriptions, arrange for the ordering and disposal of these, and correspond with the Transcription Service, the Norwegian Broadcasting Service etc. as required by D/B.
- 4. Maintain similar registers of gramophone records, keeping them revised as necessary. Arrange for regular supplies of new records. Examine all records at regular records and discard old and cracked ones. Supply suitable music for plays, feature programmes etc.
- 5., Operate the tape recorder, recording programmes from the B.B.C. and other services for subsequent rebroadcast to Falklands or Dependencies listeners. Record local programmes, important events or speeches, Leg.Co. meetings etc. and edit this material as required.
- 6. Write and produce local features e.g. the new hospital, the new F.I.C. workshops, the Beaver aircraft all of which cry aloud to be dome at the moment but which none of us have time to do. Produce special programmes for F.I.D.S. and programmes for special occasions like Chrismas, Empire Day and so on.
- 7. Maintain logs of all material broadcast so that we can notice and check undesirable trends. Organise a limited amount of "Listener Research" to see how the Public are reacting we get precious little spontaneous reaction at present, I'm afraid.
- 8. Maintain records of reception from the B.B.C. and other systems and send regular reports to them.
- 9. Broadcast special programmes for schools on at least one afternoon a week and more as required by S/E.
- 10. If necessary compile and read the odd local news bulletin and arrange commentaries on events of interest, sports meetings etc.

I could give many more - in short I would like to see someone with secretarial ability, a pleasant speaking voice and manner, limited technical knowledge - but, most important of all, with energy and enthusiasm for the job. I believe we must get such a person if we are to make broadcasting what it should be - a powerful instrumant for social progress. Given such a person I believe, with respect, we can give him a full-time job.

From what I can learn locally it seems unlikely that Mr Butcher would fill the bill - for one thing people I spoke to doubt his secretarial suitability, and emphasise that his strong point is the sechnical side. INSTRUCTIONS TO STUDIO AMNOUNCARS

ISSUED WITH THE APPROVAL OF THE BROADCASTING ADVISORY CONDITTEE

9. Moraughten

- The Studio Announcer should arrive at the Studio

 15 minutes before the advertised time of the first

 programme. This time should be used to make purely local

 announcements over the Stanley Re-diffusion System, switch

 on and warm transmitters, check the programmes to be broad
 cast and so on.
 - While the station is actually on the air, (no matter from where the broadcast material is coming,) the Studio Announcer must continually monitor the programme and be prepared to take action immediately should anything go wrong.
 - The announcement record should be played for approximately

 l_minute before announcements or programmes on the Stanley

 Re-diffusion System.
 - The announcement record should be played for approximately 3 minutes before the commencement of a broadcast.

 It should cease at the time advertised for the commencement of a programme. In the case of relays of the G.O.S. of the B.B.C. it will have to end approximately 15 seconds before the advertised time to allow time for station identification. (This means that when announcements are made first over the Stanley Re-diffusion System and then the transmitters are put on, that the former must be switched off after the announcements, and kept off till 1 minute before the broadcast programme is due to start.
 - 5 A typical evening schedule might therefore commence as follows:-

- 2.35 Announcement record
- 7.36 "Good evening everyone. Here are several local announcements."

Local announcements. Switch off.

- 7.42 Broadcast announcement record.
- 7.44 Switch on Re-diffusion System.
- 7.443 "This is the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station at Stanley. We commence our programme this evening by joining the overseas service of the B.B.C. for Sports Roundup and the News."
- 7.45 Big Ben.

 Sports Roundup.
- 8.00 News
- 8.15 Weather forecast, messages & announcements.
- The announcement record should not be played during normal programme time unless it proves necessary to interupt a scheduled programme to make an AMARGANCY ANNOUNCEMENT. In this case the record should be used to draw special attention and should not be played for more than half a minute. Such occasions will seldom arise.
- 7 In such a case the Studio Announcer should interrupt with an announcement on the following lines:-

"You are listening to the F.I.B.S. at Stanley. We interrupt our programme to bring you an <u>MANGENCY ANNOUNCEMENT</u> (or to broadcast an urgent message to so-and-so.)" and resume with an announcement like :-

"That was an Emergency Announcement and we now rejoin our normal programme."

B Local announcements are 16t to be made during broadcast time. In particular, they are not to be broadcast during the "broadcast announcements" period, unless they are really urgent and could not have been sent to the Studio for

broadcast over the S.R.S. only. Announcements received during the evening may be broadcast at the end of the broadcasting period, at the Announcer's discretion but only after the radio broadcast service has been closed down.

9 The order of messages etc. during a "broadcast amouncements period should follow the following pattern :-

Leather forecast (if any)
Announcements
Lessages
Advertisements
Sweenstake results

In particular, it is of great importance to read sweepstake results <u>last</u> and to / indicate that this is being done i.e. to inform listeners that if they are not interested in sweepstake results they may switch off without fear of missing further announcements.

- and once only. The weather forecast is deliberately designed to be read once, and has usually been broadcast previously, and at dictation speed. The Studio Announcer may occasionally feel that an announcement is of such importance or interest (e.g. Air Service notices) that it should be read twice, but this should be done very sparingly and only when really necessary. In general, it is better to read a notice once clearly, firmly and at reasonable speed carefully emphasising the important points and (if necessary) extracting these and repeating them at the end. The laborious repetition of every item merely irritates the Stanley listener and amnoys the Camper with little battery to spare.
- The Studio Announcer should read carefully all announcements programme notes etc. which he is going to read before he actually faces the microphone to ensure that he knows exactly what they are about, and can convey their meaning clearly to the listening audience.

The Studio Asnouncer should set a good example to all broadcasters. He should speak clearly and distinctly and not allow his voice to drop at the end of sentences or phrases. He should be friendly but not femiliar. He should keep his listening audience fully informed of what is going on. He should always know what he is going to say and say it directly and with conviction.

features by which the efficiency of our broadcasting service will be judged abroad. The time signals (both "pips" and "big Den") of the B.B.C. should be radiated whenever possible and announcers should base their timing on these during the course of an evening. The identification of "big Ben" is frequently helpful to listeners. Thus the quarter hour after the evening news might be identified immediately by the Announcer in summer as :-

"2315 Greenwich Mean Time; 7.15p.m. Comp Time; 8.15 p.m. Stanley Time."

B.B.C. transcribed programmes normally last about 45 seconds less than their "nominal" times - the exact time is given on the records and on one sheets. The time thus made available should be used for station identification etc. The Studio announcer should ensure that there are no "dead" periods exceeding 10 seconds and should have "fill-up" music on records ready for this purpose. "Fill-up" music lasting less than one side of a record should not be identified. It should be be faded in but never faded out.

This will assure the listening udience that the Announcer expected the break and knew exactly what he was going to do with it. 15 For station identification between programmes it is normally sufficient to say "You are tuned to (or you are listening to) the Falkland Islands Broadcasting Station at Stanley." If the next part of the programme is to follow at once this fact need not be stated. If there is to be a short delay (say 1 minute), which will be filled up with music, an announcement should be made like :-"The next part of our programme follows at 8.30, in approximately 1 minute." MEVAR Say "the next part of the programme follows ALMOST at once" - this apparently annoys most listeners. Try as far as possible to avoid the phrase "Mext we have". Relays from the B.D.C. should commence immediately prior 16 to the programme to be broadcast. They should not commence so early as to catch the last part of the previous programme. The cue "This is the British Broadcasting Corporation" (when given) ends exactly 40 seconds before the next quarterhour. The best time to join is usually during the 20 seconds prior to the exact quarter-hour. The Greenwich Time Signal (when given) commences 5 seconds before the hour and ends on it. Announcers should take a pride in joining G.O.S. smoothly and should strictly avoid doing so in the middle of announcements etc. Shen a programme has already started this should be stated. A musical programme should be "faded" in. Speech should be "cut" in. B.B.C. Transcriptions should not generally be announced-17 this is done on the record. An Amnouncer who is unsure of the pronunciation of the title of a transcription. he may wish to "trail" earlier in the evening or

previous night), should listen to the opening announcement for guidance. Any visitors who are being introduced should be asked how they like their names pronounced.

The use of courtesy titles (r. Miss Mrs.) should be 18 avoided as far as possible, though in a small community like this, it is difficult to lay down hard and fast rules. Good sense and common courtesy must be the guides. In general. gentlemen will be referred to by christian name or initials. whichever is in more common usage, and the term "Hr" will be reserved for "official"use. Thus, if Mr. Cawkell broadcasts as a private individual he may be announced as "A.M.Cawkell." but if he makes a broadcast in an official capacity he would be referred to as "Mr. B. M. Cawkell, Superintendent of duc tion The same would hold good of officials of the Falkland Islands Company, the Town Council and so on. The Covernor will never broadcast in a "private" capacity and must always be given his full courtesy title. The Colonial Secretary and Colonial Manager F.I.C. will always be called "Mr." even for "private" broadcasts. In general the above rule will apply apply at other times.

For ladies the general rule will be to use christian names for unmarried and younger married ladies and "Mrs." for older married ladies. There will have to be a certain amount of flexibility in this however, and Studio Announcers should follow the lead of the Broadcast Secretary in the programme notes.

These rules apply only to programme announcements etc.

The method of addressing an individual within a programme
will be the responsibility of the Chairman, Question Master
or other person concerned. Even here, however, these rules
form a useful guide if it is wished to avoid giving needless
offence.

The Studio Announcer should always have some careful selected music ready to fill up any gaps in the pro-

for use if a programme fails (e.g. B.B.C. relay is faulty, transcription record is damaged.) They should follow a definite pattern and should reflect the mood of the programme that is to follow or for which they are being substituted.

Never play dance music after an orchestral concert or before the Church Service. The best introduction to a classical concert is a pianoforte solo. Bearing this rule in mind, fill-up records should be chosen from music that is popular and cheerful.

- Programmes of gramophone records should be punctuated with interesting and well varied introductions. Avoid the phrase "Next we have" and try to think of new ways to introduce each record. Encourage guests to adopt a similar system and to impart something from their own personality to the programme. Operate the equipment so that the music commences with as soon as the introduction finishes normally by dropping the needle just before the speedh ends. It will help to know what is to be said.
- 21 Studio Announcers should take an obvious interest in other broadcasters. Encourage them to speak clearly and loudly straight at the microphone. Give them hints. Be interested in their programmes. Help in any way you can.
- 22 The Studio telephone should be switched OFF for any periods during which the microphone will be live for more than 15 seconds. The idea is to ensure that the Studio can be contacted in emergency but to reduce the possibility of the telephone ringing while the Studio is actually on the air. (Appropriate steps will be taken later to eliminate this danger.)
- Remember that you are there to help and interest the listening audience. Tell them about interesting B.B.C.

 Programmes soon to be heard. Explain why you do a as often as this is practical. If you miss

because of poor conditions, or through some other fault, advise your listeners exactly what has happened. A Football Association Handbook is available in the Studio. Should the football results be missed on Saturday evening they can almost certainly be obtained by telephone from a local enthusiast, (First and Second division will suffice), entered in the book, and read out with the announcements. Services of this kind are of inestimable value in promoting friendly relations with the listening audience and opportunities to provide them should never be wasted.
