Your Excellency,

I have the honour to request, in view of the close associations between the Falkland Islands and H.M.S. "EXETER", that you will give permission for a piece of damaged plating to be presented to the Colony for exhibition in the Museum at Stanley.

The plating has been cut from the lower deck of H.M.S. "EXETER". It was damaged by an eleven inch shell fired by the German Armoured Ship (Pocket Battleship) "ADMIRAL GRAF SPEE" in the action of 13th December 1939.
