I have posted a notice that bathing is now permitted at the Government Jetty.

- 2. It was with the object of regulating the facilities that I stopped the practice temporarily until the matter could be considered. Personally I should be very sorry to see bathing or swimming discouraged. When it was impossible to allow people the use of the shed and the launch cabins for undressing a facility which I readily approved when some one was there to see that nothing was interfered with I offered Mr. Morales and other persons the use of the washhouse at my house. Since bathing at the Jetty became popular I have repeatedly told the Tugmaster to place as much convenience at the disposal of the bathers as possible.
- 3. On the other hand I thought it necessary that some supervision should be exercised over the number of people who have been in the Dockyard after hours lately, especially after the occurrence last summer when I was on leave which resulted in a notice being published prohibiting free access to the Dockyard.
- 4. The following shows trifling damage found after people have been on the Jetty bathing or watching the bathers:

Nut of winch handle unscrewed and handle thrown into the water. Nut missing.

Coal trimming slice thrown overboard at steps.

Tap of watering pipe missing.

Fendoff cut from dinghy.

Deck of launch strewn with crushed crabs and small fish.

Repairs such as these are not costly but sometimes an article is not noticed to be missing until it is required and time is wasted looking for or replacing it.

At the same time I feared that more serious damage could as easily be done which would prove expensive - Therefore I thought it advisable that I should have authority for continuance of the facilities.

The Honourable the Colonial Secretary.

3rd February, 1933.

I have the honour to inform you that I have temporarily stopped bathing from the Government Jetty. I have found it necessary to do so owing to the work of painting the launch. Furthermore, I do not think it advisable that persons should be allowed in the Dockyard when there is no one there to supervise.

- 2. At the same time I should be sorry to see bathing discouraged. During the afternoon up to 4.30 when some one of the Harbour staff is present there is no objection to bathers using the jetty. After that hour and on Saturday afternoons and Sundays arrangements might be made for bathers to ask permission from the Chief Constable who could use his discretion as to who should be allowed in the Dockyard.
- 3. I shall be glad if a notice is published in the "Penguin" intimating such facilities as are approved.

I shall be grateful to be informed, please, as to whether any action should be taken by the Harbour Department in regard to bathing from the Government Jetty.

With the advent of the warmer weather many bathers are making use not only of the Government Jetty but of the launch "Penguin", this latter being used as a diving platform, resting-place and dressing-room. Bathing has also been taking place during recognised Government working hours.

The question of risk, and the responsibility for accident, loss or damage presents itself. I am unable to say whether all the bathers are able to swim, as in one case only has permission to bathe been sought, and I was not in a position to either grant or withhold this until instructed in the matter.
