Honourable Gentlemen,

I beg most respectfully to inform the Honourable Board that the local Assistant Keeper, George Perry, left the Lighthouse at the end of last January Month to work for the Colonial Government in Port Stanley. At the present time men are very scarce and the demand for labour is greater than the supply, I honestly believe there is not a man out of work to-day in the Falkland Islands, this is manly due to the building of oil wells for the Admiralty on the north side of Port I have talked matters over with the Stanley Harbour. Colonial Secretary, The Honourable, H. Henniker-Heaton, and I have had that Gentlemen's advice. I have taken on a young man, by name, Thomas Binnie at the following rate of wages £9, nine pounds per month for the first year and the usual service allowances, after one years service the wages to be at the rate of £10, Ten pounds per month, and to stop at that, and the usual service allowances. Thomas Binnie was born on the eighth day of April, 1903 at Port Stanley, Falkland Islands. This statement can be verified at Somerset House, London. The Medical Certificate attached to this letter.
