Hon. Colonial Secretary,

In event of it being known that a boat is due to arrive after 9 p.m., instructions will be given for the Lighthouse to be plugged through to the duty Medical Officer and also the duty official of the Falkland Is. Co., generally Mr Hodgson. The Lighthouse Keeper will be instructed to ring through either at 6.30 or 7 a.m. (this would be arranged at the time) and inform the necessary persons that the boat had or had not been sighted.

The duty Police Constable could if necessary be instructed to keep a close watch on the exchange after 6.30 a.m. in case the Medical Officer or F.I.Co's official wish to ring other officers to receive or pass on instructions.


