From Governor to Colonial Secretary

- There were two seats (wood + iron frame work) on the side of the road between the Colonial Secretary's House + the quarantine station. One seat was fixed in concrete blocks. The back of this seat was broken off several months ago and has now been thrown over the retaining wall of the road into the harbour. The seat itself has been overhauled with concrete blocks still attached to it.
1. The other seat has been removed and thrown over the retaining wall of the road.
 2. The Colonial Engineer should have seats removed, repaired + replaced. And arrangements should be made, both to have them securely fixed when they were originally put.
 3. Will you please ask the Chief Constable to report what steps the Police took to prevent further damage to Government property after the back of the seat was broken + what steps will be taken to find out by whom the damage was done.

I beg to inform you that on the night of the 2nd inst the two Public seats by the Col Secretary quarters were removed from their position and put on the beach over the sea wall.

Constable Frazer was on duty that afternoon and evening. He had to speak to some youths during the afternoon and also at Church time. After Church in the evening Const Frazer patrolled Cross Road to the West, and at the side of the Col Secretarys quarters he met four youths, that would be about 8.30. p.m.

not having any suspicion that any damage had been done he passed them, and unfortunately he is not able to recognize them, owing to him being such a short time in the Colony.

The Police are still making enquiries and are in hopes of yet bringing the culprits to Justice.
